

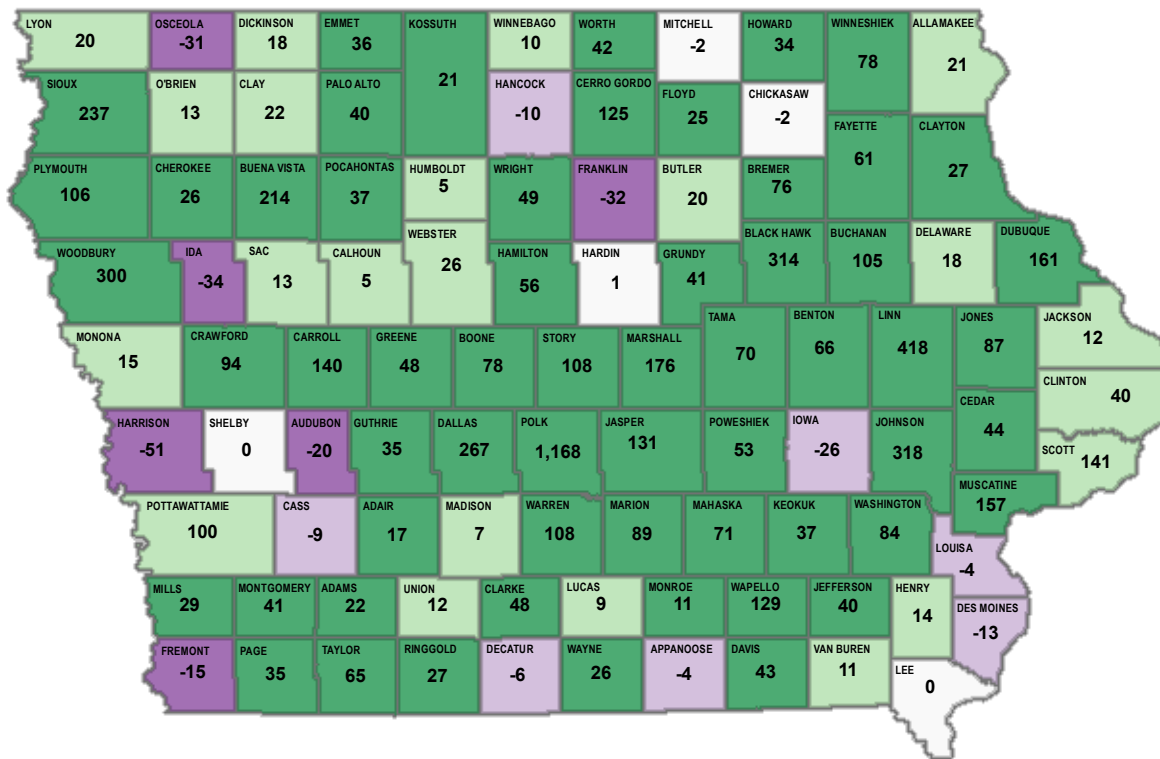
Children's Health Insurance Program

The Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) provides health care coverage for children and families whose income is too high to qualify for Medicaid but too low to afford individual or work-provided health care. CHIP includes the Medicaid expansion, the Healthy and Well Kids in Iowa (*hawk-i*) Program, and the *hawk-i* dental-only plan. CHIP is largely funding by federal dollars and is administered by the state.

Families enrolled in CHIP can choose a plan from one of the two managed care organizations: Amerigroup Iowa, Inc. and UnitedHealthcare Plan of the River Valley, Inc.; they can also choose a dental plan provided by Delta Dental of Iowa or MCNA Dental.

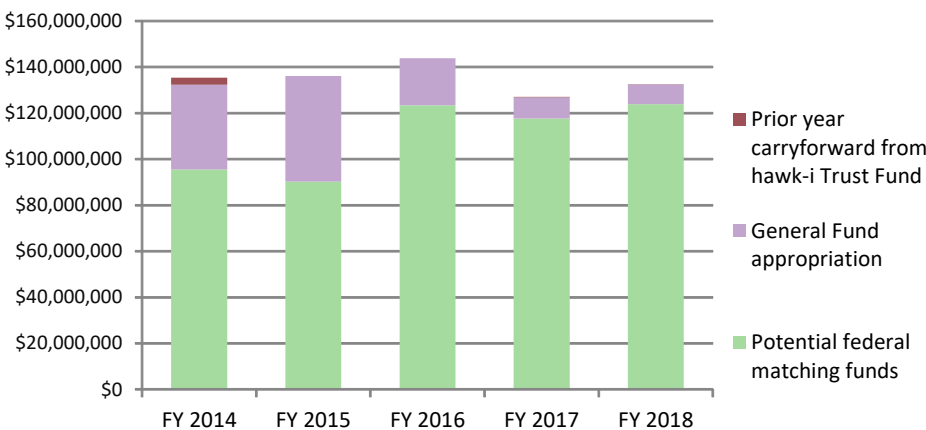
Potential federal matching funds represent the total matching funds that available State dollars could generate, and not necessarily the federal dollar amount that will be available to Iowa.
