

Native Iowa Wine — 2018

According to the Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Midwest Grape and Wine Industry Institute, the Iowa wine industry has experienced dramatic growth since 2000. Growth has leveled off in recent years with the number of wineries increasing slightly and the number of vineyards decreasing since 2009. According to the Institute:

- The number of vineyards in Iowa have dropped approximately 40% since 2010. The total acreage in vineyards has dropped approximately 10% from a high of 1,250 estimated acres.
- Approximately 20% of lowa wineries are selling 80% of the wine produced in lowa.
- lowa wine sales have leveled off over the last four to five years to around 300,000 gallons per year.
- Native wine is taxed at \$1.75 per gallon. Since 2008, lowa native wineries paid a total of \$2.8 million in State wine taxes. Native wine that is directly shipped to consumers or is sold to consumers at the wineries, is not subject to the excise tax.
