Homeland Security and Emergency Management Department

The Homeland Security and Emergency Management Department (HSEMD) receives an annual General Fund appropriation of approximately \$2.2 million that is leveraged with federal funds to support 36.0 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions. These funds support state and local efforts in planning for, responding to, recovering from, and mitigating natural and man-made disasters and acts of terrorism. The Department is responsible for current federal obligations in recovery and hazard mitigation exceeding \$2.4 billion. The Department is funded by multiple nondisaster and disaster-related grants. The following provides information on these grants and programs.

Administering Federal Funds – Some federal funds are maintained in restricted accounts that are transferred out or expended for a specific purpose.

- Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) (BU Number 58300000168) This is a grant from the U.S. Office of Domestic Preparedness (OPD). This program is 100.0% federally funded and requires an 80.0% pass-through to local governments. Funds in this program are used to plan and prepare for terrorist attacks, protect critical infrastructure, and conduct exercises to assess the readiness of state and local jurisdictions to prevent and respond to terrorist attacks. These funds have been used to create the following capabilities: Urban Search and Rescue, Special Weapons and Tactics, Explosive Ordinance Disposal, Bomb Squad, Veterinary Rapid Response Teams, Multi-State Agriculture Partnership, and Incident Management Teams.
- Emergency Management Performance Grant (BU Number 58300000381) This grant is designed to assist in the development, maintenance, and improvement of state and local emergency management capabilities. Emergency management involves the planning for, responding to, recovering from, and mitigating man-made and natural disasters. This grant is the primary federal funding support for state and local emergency management agencies. The distribution of funds to localities is determined by the Department. The Department has historically passed 50.0% of the funding through to local governments. This grant has a 50.0% federal and 50.0% state/local cost share. In lowa, this funding has provided specialized training to more than 15,000 first responders from the local level up to the state level. Additionally, this funding ensures that emergency response plans are systematically reviewed and exercised in accordance with state and federal guidelines.
- Hazard Materials Emergency Preparedness Grant (BU Number 58300000330) The Hazardous Materials Transportation Safety and Security Reauthorization Act of 2005 authorizes the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) to provide assistance to public sector employees through training and planning grants for emergency response. The purpose of this grant program is to increase state and local effectiveness in safely and efficiently handling hazardous materials in transportation-related accidents and incidents. This grant is allocated annually and supports approximately 1.35 FTE positions.
- Emergency Response Fund (BU Number 58300000330) Created and funded through lowa Code section <u>29C.8A</u>. These
 funds are received annually and are used to match the Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Grant through the U.S.
 DOT.

Disaster Recovery – The Department is also responsible for assisting in disaster recovery as follows:

- Public Assistance (PA) Grant Program (BU Number 58300000491) The PA Program is a disaster-based Federal Emergency
 Management Agency (FEMA) grant with a 75.0% federal government/25.0% state and local match cost share. Funds are used
 for disaster-related emergency and permanent work, including debris removal, emergency protective measures, and repair or
 restoration of public facilities such as roads and bridges, water control facilities, buildings and grounds, utilities, parks, and
 recreation facilities.
- Hazard Mitigation Assistance (BU 58300000257) Hazard mitigation is any sustained action taken to reduce or eliminate long-term risk to people and property from natural hazards and their effects. The FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Assistance (HMA) grant programs provide funding through states for eligible mitigation projects. The majority of mitigation funding utilized in Iowa has been through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP). The HMGP is authorized by Section 404 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act following a presidential major disaster declaration. The amount of HMGP funding available to the state is based on the estimated total federal assistance to be provided by FEMA for disaster recovery under the presidential declaration. The HMGP is a disaster-based grant with a 75.0% federal/25.0% state and local match rate cost share.

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Mitigation funds are used for mitigation planning, property acquisitions, tornado-safe rooms, and infrastructure projects. Infrastructure projects may include structural and nonstructural retrofitting of existing public buildings, facilities, or utilities to protect against wind, ice, or flood hazards (e.g., strengthening electric utility systems), minor structural hazard control or protection projects such as stormwater management (e.g., culverts, floodgates, retention basins), and localized flood control projects (e.g., a floodwall). According to Homeland Security, mitigation projects average \$4 in avoided future damages for every \$1 spent.

Administering Programs – The Department is also responsible for administering the following programs:

- E911 Wireless Surcharge (BU Number 583TP010046) Annually receives an estimated \$28.0 million that is used to provide enhanced 911 wireless services to the citizens of lowa. Beginning in FY 2017, an estimated \$17.0 million of this revenue will annually be passed on to local governments for processing the wireless calls. Additional funds are to be used for wireless carrier cost recovery, reimbursement of communication service providers, network improvements, the annual lease costs for the Statewide Interoperable Communications System (FY 2016 and FY 2017 only so far), and other items. There are 2.0 FTE positions associated with this Program.
- Radiological Emergency Preparedness (BU Number 58300000250) Receives approximately \$1.1 million from the four
 private nuclear power plants to support the planning, training, and exercise activity at the Duane Arnold Energy Center near Palo,
 IA; the Quad Cities near Cordova, IL; Ft. Calhoun near Ft. Calhoun, NE; and Cooper Station near Brownsville, NE. The state has
 annual requirements for all off-site planning, training, and exercise activities. Successfully passing these federally evaluated
 exercises allows the facilities to maintain operating licenses.
- State and Local Assistance (BU Number 58300000267) This money is administered by the Executive Council and provided to the Department to address costs related to responding to disasters.
- Radio Communications Platform Lease E911 Surcharge (BU Number 583TP020046) House File 651 (E911 Funding) was enacted during the 2015 Legislative Session and stated that the HSEMD will pay on a quarterly basis for the lease costs associated with the Statewide Interoperable Communications System that will interface with the lowa interoperability radio platform. This platform is under the joint purview of the Department of Public Safety (DPS) and the Department of Transportation (DOT). The three Departments are to jointly submit a biannual report to the Iowa Statewide Interoperable Communications System Board beginning July 1, 2016. An appropriation of \$4.0 million was provided from the E911 Emergency Communications Fund for the first-year lease payment (FY 2016). Senate File 2326 (E911 Funding Act) allocated \$4.4 million for the FY 2017 lease-purchase payment for the Statewide Interoperable Communications System. Funding for FY 2018 and future years is still to be determined.
