## CHAPTER 46.

## TO LEGALIZE ORDINANCES OF WINTERSET.

AN ACT to Make Valid Certain Ordinances of the City of Winter- S. F. 358. set and Acts Performed Thereunder.

WHEREAS, The council of the city of Winterset, Madison Preamble. county, Iowa, a city of the second class, in the month of July, 1885, revised the ordinances of said city, and in such revision there were twenty-three chapters covering the various subjects upon which in the judgment of said council ordinances were

required; and,
WHEREAS, In the adoption of said ordinances by said council Ordinances

adopted as on the ninth day of July, 1885, the whole twenty-three chapters revised and adopted as a of said ordinances were acted upon and adopted in accordance whole. with the form of law as if one ordinance, and thereafter duly published and entered on record and authenticated by the mayor and city clerk as if one ordinance; and,

Whereas, Doubts have arisen as to the validity of said ordinance; therefore,

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

SECTION 1. That the said revised ordinances of the city of Legalized. Winterset, adopted on the ninth day of July, 1885, are hereby made valid and of the same force and effect as if the same had contained but one subject, and which subject had been clearly expressed in its title, and all acts heretofore done and per formed under said ordinances shall have the same validity as if the said ordinances had been fully adopted, published, and authenticated as required by law.

SEC. 2. This act being deemed of immediate importance Publication. shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication. in the Iowa State Register, a newspaper published in Des Moines, Iowa and the Madisonian and Chronicle, a newspaper published at Winterset, Iowa without expense to the State.
