CHAPTER 171

CITIES AND TOWNS

H. F. 253

AN ACT to amend section sixty-two hundred eleven (6211), code, 1935, relating to the power of cities and towns to levy taxes for the building and maintenance of free public libraries.

Be It Enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

SECTION 1. Section sixty-two hundred eleven (6211), code 1935, is amended by inserting immediately after the period (.) following the word "maintenance" in line four (4) of subsection nineteen (19), 3 the following, to wit:

"Provided that said maintenance levy may be not to exceed two 6 and one-half $(2\frac{1}{2})$ mills in any city of more than ten thousand population and less than 75,000 population and having situated therein 7 ጸ a state-owned educational institution with a regular attendance of 9 more than three thousand students, and also a state commission regu-10 larly employing more than one hundred heads of families."

Section sixty-two hundred eleven (6211), code 1935, is amended by inserting immediately after the period (.) following the word "indebtedness" in lines eight (8) and nine (9) of subsection twenty (20), the following to wit:

"Provided the levy for said purposes may be not to exceed one and one-half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ mills in any city of more than ten thousand (10,000)population and less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) population, and having situated therein a state owned educational institution with a regular attendance of more than three thousand students, and also a state commission regularly employing more than one hundred heads of families."

SEC. 3. This act being deemed of immediate importance shall be in full force and effect from and after its publication as provided by 2 3 law in the Ames Daily Tribune, a newspaper published at Ames, Iowa, 4 and in the Boone News-Republican, a newspaper published at Boone,
