CHAPTER 1001

TOOLSBORO HISTORICAL SITE

H. F. 1040

AN ACT relating to the development and reconstruction of a historical site and making an appropriation therefor.

Be It Enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated from the general fund 2 of the state to the state historical society the sum of ten thousand 3 (10,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the following purpose:

To develop and reconstruct a historical site in and around the town 5 of Toolsboro, Iowa, including the beautification of the mounds of the Hopewell Mound Builders, the completion of the existing museum, the recreation of an earthen fort, the development of the site of the war council of the Blackhawk War, the development of the first landfall of Joliet and Marquette, and the site of the naming of the

10 11 state of Iowa.

Any unencumbered balance of the funds appropriated by this Act remaining on July 1, 1973, shall revert to the general fund 3 of the state as provided in section eight point thirty-three (8.33) of the Code.

Approved April 10, 1970.
