Lt. Norman P. Klinker, was killed in action in the Italian war zone. This news came to Denison Friday night, Jan. 21. While the news came as a great shock, Judge Klinker insisted that he drive to Jefferson the following Monday and hold district court as usual. He returned from Jefferson Wednesday afternoon.

The drive under the direction of County School Supt. F. N. Olry and Mrs. A. Kregness, county woman bond chairman, was opened on Sept. 15 and closed on Dec. 7. A total of \$235,446.55 in war bonds and stamps was realized either by or through the town and rural schools. the town and rural schools.

Town schools, including public and parochial, decided to buy a medium bomber, the cost of which was \$175,000. Bond sales made by or through the rural schools were made available for the purchase of jeeps.

Judge Klinker had two hobbiesagriculture and fishing. He owned a large number of acres of land in North Dakota, and after the first world war brought four cousins from Germany, equipped the large farm with livestock and farming implements and established the four young men thereon. He and his son had often visited the land holdings in Dakota, Nebraska and here in Crawford county, and the father would spend hours in going over the proper ties as though giving the son instructions for later activities. Together they spent hours and days in hunting and fishing, and during the resting period would discuss polities and law, oftimes until the small hours.
