

Mr. Walters was married June 30, 1898, to Miss Pearl Reedy of Toledo. To them was born one son, Charles. Mrs. Walters died in 1911, and the son on November 23, 1925, at Talache, Idaho. On May 25, 1917, Mr. Waltars married Clara Burkhart Watson, who, with her son, Ellsworth Watson, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, survives. Other survivors in the immediate family are two grandsons, Donald and Dudley Walters, Amboy, Illinois, and a brother, J. P. Walters of Toledo.

Membership by Mr. Walters was held in the Toledo Masonic and Odd Fellow lodges, Scottish Rite Masonic and Shrine orders and the Meth-

odist church.

Many earned and well deserved honors came to him in life. He was appointed judge of the district court in 1936. He was special assistant attorney general in the highway department from 1932 to 1936.

He was Tama county representative in the Twenty-ninth General Assembly, had served as county attorney of Tama county, was a member of the Toledo school board for six years chairman of the Tama county defense council during the World war, and had been active in the promotion of good roads.

An important part was taken by Mr. Walters in drawing up the bill which created the State Juvenile Home, and he had a prominent part in the location of this institution in Toledo, an institution which has done much in the conservation of Iowa's dependent and neglected children.

HONORABLE ALFRED WENSTRAND

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life, character, and public services of the Honorable Alfred Wenstrand of Page county, begs leave to submit the following report:

Alfred Wenstrand was born in Sweden May 13, 1855. He died at Essex, Iowa, on September 4, 1936, at the age of eighty-one years, three months and twenty-one days. He was survived by his wife, Christin Wenstrand, four sons, two daughters, and fourteen grandchildren.

Mr. Wenstrand was graduated from the public schools of Sweden, and immigrated with his father from their native land to Illinois in 1869. They later came to northern Page county, Iowa, and settled in what was then called Binn's Grove, and which is now the Nyman vicinity. He received a further school education in the public schools of Iowa, and studied law for two and one-half years. In 1879 he was married to Christin Olson and they began farming the virgin prairie. He was a pioneer and soon was recognized as a civic and spiritual leader of his community. He served as road superintendent, secretary and president of the school board, assessor, township clerk, township trustee, and justice of the peace. Mr. Wenstrand followed farming until 1896 when he was elected clerk of the district court of Page county, and served three consecutive terms in that office. He then removed to the farm again.

A Republican in politics, he was, in 1914, elected to the House of Reprentatives of Iowa as representative from Page county, and was re-elected 1916; he thus served in the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh General Assemblies of his state. He was associated with all movements for the good of his community, and was president of the bank at Essex. Mr. Wenstrand interested himself in church work and took an active part as a member of the Swedish Mission Church.

He was a man of many friends, of sterling qualities, and sought to make his community a better place in which to live. He loved the young folks, was respected and honored by all who knew him, and no one doubted his integrity and sincerity of purpose. He gave unstintingly of his talents and strength for the welfare of his county and state, and was to his family a kind and loving husband and father.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That in the passing of the Honorable Alfred Wenstrand, the state has lost a valuable and honored citizen and the House would tender, by this resolution, its sincere sympathy to the surviving members of his family in their sorrow, and



Honorable Ulysses Grant Whitney, reporter of the Supreme Court from 1914 to 1938, was born July 10, 1864, near Union, Hardin county,

WALTER HERMAN WELLHAUSEN

Walter Herman Wellhausen, born January 21, 1909, two miles southwest of Immanuel Lutheran Church, son of Albert Lewis and Caroline Elisa (Otte) Wellhausen. His brother and sisters: Carl H., 1904-1962; Maria (Mary) Wellhausen Bode, 1907-1955; Erna Wellhausen Buesing, 1910-).

In 1915, the family moved to a farm near Page City, now Page Center, (FN-11-18-3). Albert and Caroline had purchased the home from John Steeves.

After residing in the home a short time, it burned in 1917. During the rebuilding of a two and one-half story home, Walter and family lived in Page City with Fred Eilers.

On February 15, 1939, he married Vera Sump. Vera, daughter of William L. and Dorothea (Nothwehr) Sump, born October 7, 1918. Both Walter and Vera were faithful and active members of Saint Paul's Lutheran Church, Yorktown, having been baptized, confirmed and married there. Their children: Donald Lee, July 18, 1940 - June 1, 1941; Janice Eileen, March 15, 1942 - March 16, 1942;

Lynette Sue, January 12, 1944, married Larrie Palmer, contractor-carpenter, August, 1964. Their children: Lanna Sue, 1966; Lyle Floyd Walter, 1969.

Connie Lou, July 18, 1946, married Dennis Carlson, Sales Manager New York Life, August, 1969. Their children: Jeree Kristi, 1973; Brandi Lynn, 1975; Jama Sue, 1981.

Keith Allan, August 30, 1950, farmer-cattle feeder, married Dana McKee, August 1975. Their children: Chad Allan, 1977; Brett Joseph, 1979.

Walter, a successful farmer, purchased good tillable farm ground in Page County and Missouri. He raised corn, oats, wheat, soybeans, and also hogs and cattle.

During Walter and Vera's life on the homeplace the following incidents will be especially remembered:

German Prisoners-in 1944-1945, during World War Two, captured Germans were transported to the Clarinda Prison Camp. Two to four prisoners were brought every morning to the Wellhausen farm. Helping with haying, threshing and other farm work, they worked approximately two years.

Threshing-1939, Walter's father, Albert bought and operated a threshing machine for


himself and other area farmers. With large crews of approximately twenty-one farmers and their sons, they spent long days harvesting. It also involved hard work for Vera as she prepared daily meals for the threshers. Churning butter, baking bread, pies and cakes, and butchering chickens, filled her early morning hours.

Horses-tractors-being one of the fastest corn huskers in the area, Walter used horses to pull the wagons while he picked the corn by hand. All the other farming was done with horses or mules. Around 1935, Albert bought their first tractor, a McCormick Deering. In 1942, Walter purchased his first International Farmall H tractor, planter, cultivator and later a mower. With the invention and availability of the tractor in Page County, a dramatic change occurred in the pace of acreage farming.

SVEN GUSTAF WENSTRAND

Sven Gustaf Petersson Wenstrand, son of Peter Manson, Talleryd, Vena Parish, Smaland, Sweden, was born in 1829. Peter Manson, born in 1791, was the owner of land, sawmill, tile and brick kiln, also was an auctioneer.

As a young man, Sven Gustaf acquired land holdings at Hultstedt across a lake from his father-in-law who was in the Parliament. A younger brother, Anders Eric, made two trips to the midwest United States, the first in 1852. On his return he taught Sven Gustaf and his older children some English - then Sven Gustaf made two exploratory trips to the midwest. On returning from his second, he learned of his wife's death. He sold his interests at Hultstedt, bought passage for himself and five children, arriving at the Binns Wood settlement near Nyman, Fremont Township in March, 1870, building a cabin on Tarkio Creek. That same year Sven Gustaf with his two oldest children became charter members of the Fremont Lutheran Church. Seven years later, and at a location five miles south, they became charter members of the Fremont Mission Church.

While "Gust" could have been considered affluent in Sweden by the yardstick of the day—the sale price of his land was about nine krona per acre—but after buying passage, acquiring land here (the exchange rate between the Swedish krona and the American dollar having an

inverse ratio of five to one), he had very little in reserve funds. One time when he took wheat to St. Joseph to be ground into flour, a team of horses and new harness were stolen. His fortunes were at low ebb. However, remarrying and raising a second family, he broke the prairie and probably attained a life style not too different from that which he enjoyed in Sweden.

Sven Gustaf's oldest son, Sven Alfred (born 1855 died 1936) played the organ at both churches, got into surveying, farming, and studied law at home. He married Christine Olson and raised seven children: Paul Petrus, Sigfred Sven, Oscar Olof, Laura Christine, Lydia (died at age 32), Bennett Beriah and Veda Eleanor. Alfred, having learned some English in Sweden and speaking the language fluently with little noticeable accent, entered into politics, serving as Page County Clerk of Court and two terms in the lowa Legislature. He was a Republican.

Their eldest son, Paul Petrus (born 1884 died 1961) attended elementary school near Nyman, played football at Clarinda High School, and attended Western Normal College in Shenandoah. He took a short course in Spanish as a prerequisite for a contract with the J.I. Case Company to represent them in a South American country. A revolution there upset those plans, at which time he went into farming, raising and feeding livestock in Fremont Township, Paul was married to Mabel Herman, Hiawatha, Kansas, also a student at Western Normal, in 1913. Their children were William (Bill) — find reference to him elsewhere in this book — and Mary Elizabeth (Betty). After graduating from Red Oak High School, Betty worked in a law firm; served as Page County Deputy Clerk of Court, managed the office for a corporation law firm in Omaha, and in 1984 is a Magistrate in Montgomery County, Red Oak. WILLIAM WENSTRAND

William Sherwood Wenstrand, son of Paul and Mabel Herman Wenstrand, was born on a farm in Fremont Township, Page County, on August 2, 1914. He received his elementary education in a one room school house near Nyman, graduated from Red Oak High School and an engineering school in Chicago, In 1937 the heart of the "thirties" depression, he joined his father in farming and livestock business. He promoted soil conservation and rural electrific-tion. During this period both had to be "sold" aggressively. Some families who resisted having electric power in their homes were descendants of families who in earlier time resisted having a telephone. Bill served in the Air Force, World War II, four years stateside, in the South Pacific and Southeast Asia. After the War, Bill resumed active operation of farming and livestock raising, expanding into commercial cattle feeding; also started a construction business for land clearing and dirt moving.
