## JOHN F. HERMAN DIES, PORTLAND

Was Formerly Well-Known Boone Banker. Remains to Be Returned for Funeral

John F. Herman, 70, well-known former Boone banker, died Sunday at 11:40 a.m. at his home in Portland, Ore., according to word received here by relatives. His death followed an illness of several months during which he had been ill with a complication of diseases.

With Mrs. Herman, the former banker left Boone four years ago last January. It is planned to return the remains to this city for funeral services and interment but arrangements had not been completed this forenoon.

Mrs. Herman and the following children survive: Mrs. Ivan Powers of Waterloo; Fritz Herman of Marshfield, Ore.; George Herman of Berkeley, Calif.; Buell Herman of Chicago and Edward Herman, the latter residing with his parents.

Mr. Herman is also survived by a brother, J. H. Herman, and a sister, Miss Emma Herman, both of this city. Sympathy is extended to the bereaved by their many friends.



# SET MINIMUM FOR STOCK MART DROPS

(By International News Service) London, Sept. 27—Stock market jobbers with the approval and full support of the government and London stock exchange committee decided today to fix minimum prices for future declines in gilt-edged securities.

Declines in gilt-edged issues hereafter will be conducted by "negotiation," with one point of difference between buying and selling.

For example, the war loan will be fixed at 93 for buyers and 94 for sellers. These prices represent approximately a seven-point drop as compared to two weeks ago.

Meanwhile, there were hectic dealings in dollars on the foreign market. Shortly before noon the rate was about \$4.74 to the pound sterling.

### Late Boone Banker and Former State Legislator Succumbed at Portland, Oregon

Funeral services for the late John F. Herman, former Boone banker, who died at his home in Portland, Ore., were held here September 24 at 2:30 p. m., at the home of his brother, J. Henry Herman, 711 So. Story street.

Dr. H. C. Schneider, pastor of First Presbyterian church, was in charge of the last rites, reading from the Scripture throughout the service. Mrs. R. L. Cooper and Joel Carlson, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. A. H. Smith, sang "Going Home" and "I Know My Redeemer Liveth."

Floral tributes were in charge of Mrs. W. H. Longworth, Mrs. Robert Munn, Miss Mary Goldthwaite and Miss Harriett May. Casket bearers were Albert Herman, Paul Herman, Arthur Herman, John C. Herman, Robert Herman and David Goepfinger.

At the grave in Linwood Park cemetery, east, the Presbyterian church committal service was used. No life sketch of the late banker was read at the last rites.

Mr. Herman served for many years as vice-president of the Security Savings bank, resigning because of ill health in 1930. He served one term as Boone county representative in the Iowa legislature.
