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EX-SEN. CHAPMAN CALLED BY DEATH

Robt. G. Cousins Speaker at Davenport February 8th

Horace R. Chapman, Prominent Man
Throughout Eastern Iowa, Succumb
to Heart Attack.

Dr. H. R. Chapman, of Bennett, Ia., highly esteemed and widely acquainted business man in this section of the state, passed away suddenly at his home Monday, at the age of 52 years. His health had not been the best for some time, but the announcement of his sudden passing came as a severe shock to the entire community.

Funeral services were held this forenoon at 10:00 o'clock from the Bennett Methodist church, Rev. H. Perry, of Monmouth officiating.

Cedar Lodge A. F. & A. M., Tipton, attended the services, the beautiful Masonic funeral, ceremonials being conferred by A. M. McCormick, P. M. Chas. H. Foy, Mearl Clark, H. R. Ripley and C. N. Wallick of Tipton assisted as pall bearers. Following the services at Bennett the body was transported to Maquoketa and will be placed in the mausoleum.

Surviving besides his wife are three children, Ray Chapman, now a student at Iowa university, Imogene Chapman who is a student at Mt. Carroll, Ill., and Caroline Chapman at home; one sister, Mrs. Nettie Sullivan, of Portland, Ore., and two brothers, Frank Chapman, of Perry, Iowa, and Dwight Chapman, of Oxford Junction, Ia.

Dr. Chapman was born in Monticello, Iowa, where he obtained his grade school education. Later he spent 3 years at Cornell college, Mt. Vernon, and then took up the study of medicine at Iowa university.

He was married to Miss Pearl Heiner of Maquoketa, Sept. 15, 1897.

He practiced medicine in Bennett since 1901 when he graduated from University of Iowa. Dr. Chapman was the organizer of the Davenport & Tipton Telephone Co., which is the largest independent phone company in the state. He served two terms as mayor of Bennett; was president of
