WHEREAS, 2004 marks the 50 th anniversary of the WHEREAS, 2004 marks the 130 th anniversary of the diagnosis of the first case of postpolio sequelae in which often disabling symptoms occur 35 years after the initial attack of the polio virus, including overwhelming fatigue, muscle weakness, muscle and joint pain, sleep disorders, cold pain, and difficulty swallowing and breathing; and WHEREAS, while the polio vaccines have eliminated naturally occurring polio cases in the United States, more than 40 percent of children in the United States do not receive all doses of the vaccine, polio has not been eliminated in other parts of the world, and nearly 1.6 million polio survivors live in the United States who are susceptible to postpolio sequelae; NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE, That 2004 is recognized as the 50 th anniversary of the injectable polio vaccine that virtually eradicated naturally occurring polio in the United States; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Senate encourages health care providers and health educators to continue
