## A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act relating to career and technical programs offered by
- 2 community colleges or administered by the department of
- 3 education and making appropriations.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

1 Section 1. Section 256.40, subsection 2, unnumbered 2 paragraph 1, Code 2013, is amended to read as follows: The purpose of the program shall be to build a seamless 3 4 career, future prepare students for the workforce, and economic 5 development system in Iowa to by connecting business and 6 education and offering relevant workplace and career learning 7 activities to students and teachers. The program shall be 8 structured to accomplish all of the following: 9 Sec. 2. Section 256.40, subsection 2, paragraphs d, f, and 10 h, Code 2013, are amended by striking the paragraphs. Sec. 3. Section 256.40, subsection 2, paragraph e, Code 11 12 2013, is amended to read as follows: e. Provide a one-stop contact point for information useful 13 14 to both educators and employers, including a state-level 15 clearinghouse for but not limited to information relating to 16 internships, job shadowing experiences, and other workplace 17 and career learning opportunities for students that are linked 18 to the state's economic goals, particularly opportunities in 19 occupations relating to science, technology, engineering, 20 or mathematics or to opportunities in targeted industries 21 identified by the economic development authority in accordance 22 with chapter 15. 23 Sec. 4. Section 256.40, subsection 2, Code 2013, is amended 24 by adding the following new paragraphs: 25 NEW PARAGRAPH. *i*. Integrate services with other activities 26 related to exploring workforce and career opportunities, 27 such as the core curriculum plan developed pursuant to 28 section 279.61 and the state-designated career information 29 and decision-making system administered by the department as 30 provided in section 279.61. NEW PARAGRAPH. k. Facilitate the attainment of portable 31 32 credentials of value to employers, when appropriate. 33 Sec. 5. Section 256.40, subsections 4, 5, 6, and 7, Code 34 2013, are amended to read as follows: 4. The steering committee shall develop a design for a 35

1 statewide network comprised of fifteen regional work-based 2 learning intermediary networks. The design shall include 3 network specifications, strategic functions, and desired 4 outcomes. The steering committee shall recommend program 5 parameters and reporting requirements to the department. Each regional network shall establish an advisory 6 5. 7 council to develop provide advice and implement assistance to 8 the regional network. Membership on the advisory council shall 9 include but not be limited to representatives of business and 10 industry. The advisory council shall meet at least annually. Funds Moneys deposited in the statewide work-based 11 6. 12 learning intermediary network fund created in subsection 1 13 shall be distributed to each region for the implementation of 14 the statewide work-based learning intermediary network based 15 upon the distribution of the kindergarten through grade twelve 16 student enrollments in each region. The amount shall not 17 exceed three dollars per student. Upon approval of the plan 18 submitted pursuant to subsection 7, moneys in the fund shall be 19 distributed annually as follows: 20 a. If the moneys in the fund total less than one million 21 five hundred thousand dollars, the moneys in the fund shall 22 be distributed by the department on a competitive basis to 23 regional networks or to consortia of regional networks. 24 If the moneys in the fund total one million five hundred b. 25 thousand dollars or more, not less than one hundred thousand 26 dollars shall be distributed to each regional network and all 27 remaining funds shall be distributed utilizing the state aid 28 distribution formula established pursuant to section 260C.18C 29 as if a regional network was a community college. 30 The department shall provide oversight of the statewide 7. 31 work-based learning intermediary network and shall annually 32 evaluate the statewide and regional network progress toward 33 the outcomes identified by the steering committee pursuant to 34 subsection 4. Each regional network, or consortium of regional 35 networks, shall annually submit a report to the department

1 that details its operations and activities for the most 2 recent fiscal year and includes a plan for providing, in the 3 following year, core services to all school districts within 4 its region and for integrating job shadowing activities into 5 secondary career and technical education programs, and any 6 other information required by the department. Sec. 6. Section 256.40, Code 2013, is amended by adding the 7 8 following new subsection: 9 NEW SUBSECTION. 9. The state board of education shall adopt 10 rules which establish the parameters of the program. Sec. 7. Section 257.11, subsection 3, paragraph b, 11 12 subparagraph (2), Code 2013, is amended to read as follows: 13 Included in the fall, spring, or summer community (2) 14 college catalog or an amendment or addendum to the a fall, 15 spring, or summer catalog. 16 Sec. 8. Section 297.22, subsection 2, paragraph a, Code 17 2013, is amended to read as follows: The board of directors of a school district may sell, 18 а. 19 lease, exchange, give, or grant, and accept any interest 20 in real property to, with, or from a county, municipal 21 corporation, school district, community college, township, 22 or area education agency if the real property is within the 23 jurisdiction of both the grantor and grantee. In the case of a 24 community college, the provisions of this paragraph shall apply 25 only for purposes of a joint infrastructure project as provided 26 in section 298.3, subsection 1, paragraph n'', or section 27 423F.3, subsection 3, paragraph "a". Sec. 9. Section 298.3, subsection 1, Code 2013, is amended 28 29 by adding the following new paragraph: NEW PARAGRAPH. n. Notwithstanding sections 28E.41 and 30 31 274.1, joint infrastructure projects with one or more school 32 districts or one or more school districts and a community 33 college established under chapter 260C, for which buildings 34 or facilities are constructed or leased for the purpose of 35 offering classes under a district-to-community college sharing

1 agreement or concurrent enrollment program that meets the 2 requirements for funding under section 257.11, subsection 3. 3 A school district that seeks to enter into a contract for the 4 construction or lease of a building or facility pursuant to 5 this paragraph shall hold a public hearing on the question 6 prior to entering into the contract.

7 Sec. 10. Section 423F.3, subsection 1, Code 2013, is amended 8 by adding the following new paragraph:

9 <u>NEW PARAGRAPH</u>. *g.* Notwithstanding sections 28E.41 and 10 274.1, for joint infrastructure projects with one or more 11 school districts or one or more school districts and a 12 community college established under chapter 260C, for which 13 buildings or facilities are constructed or leased for the 14 purposes of offering classes under a district-to-community 15 college sharing agreement or concurrent enrollment program 16 that meets the requirements for funding under section 257.11, 17 subsection 3.

18 Sec. 11. Section 423F.3, subsection 3, paragraph a, Code
19 2013, is amended to read as follows:

20 If the board of directors adopts a resolution to use a. 21 funds received under the operation of this chapter solely 22 for providing property tax relief by reducing indebtedness 23 from the levies specified under section 298.2 or 298.18 24 or, notwithstanding sections 28E.41 and 274.1, for joint 25 infrastructure projects with one or more school districts 26 or one or more school districts and a community college 27 established under chapter 260C, for which buildings or 28 facilities are constructed or leased for the purpose of 29 offering classes under a district-to-community college sharing 30 agreement or concurrent enrollment program that meets the 31 requirements for funding under section 257.11, subsection 3, 32 the board of directors may approve a revenue purpose statement 33 for that purpose either of such purposes without submitting the 34 revenue purpose statement to a vote of the electors. 1 LEARNING INTERMEDIARY FUND. There is appropriated from the 2 general fund of the state to the department of education for 3 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 4 2014, the following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, 5 to be used for the purposes designated:

10 FORCE.

11 1. a. The director of the department of education, or the 12 director's designee, shall convene a task force that includes 13 secondary and postsecondary education stakeholders to review 14 current secondary career and technical programming offered by 15 community colleges and make recommendations for programming 16 that reduces skill shortages, enhances the state's economic 17 growth, and ensures that all students statewide have access 18 to high quality globally competitive career and technical 19 education programs.

The task force shall review appropriate provisions 20 b. 21 of the Iowa Code, including but not limited to Code chapter 22 258, relating to vocational education, and section 256.11, 23 subsection 5, paragraph "h", relating to vocational service 24 area requirements in the core curriculum standards for 25 grades nine through 12, and related provisions of the Iowa 26 administrative code. The task force shall consider measures 27 to ensure rigorous standards, consistency in program quality 28 statewide, alignment with postsecondary programs leading 29 to middle-skill occupations with family-sustaining wages, 30 responsiveness to labor market needs, robust business and 31 industry participation, including participation on advisory 32 committees, and efficient statewide delivery of programming. 33 The task force shall also review the definition of "career 34 academy" for purposes of Code sections 260C.18A and 261E.10, 35 and review and recommend core components of career academies

1 and regional centers.

c. The task force shall recommend specific changes in policy 3 or statute to ensure that all students statewide have access 4 to high-quality, globally competitive career and technical 5 education programs. The task force shall submit an interim 6 progress report by January 15, 2014, and a final report with 7 its findings and recommendations by November 1, 2015, to 8 the state board of education, the governor, and the general 9 assembly.

10 2. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state 11 to the department of education for the fiscal year beginning 12 July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2014, the following amount, 13 or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes 14 designated:

15 For expenses associated with the activities of the secondary 16 career and technical programming task force pursuant to 17 subsection 1:

18 ..... \$ 50,000 19 EXPLANATION

This bill relates to career and technical programs offered by community colleges or administered by the department of education and makes appropriations.

STATEWIDE WORK-BASED LEARNING INTERMEDIARY NETWORK —
APPROPRIATION. The bill makes a number of changes to Code
section 256.40, relating to the statewide work-based learning
intermediary network program administered by the department
of education. The purposes of the program are modified to
purposes focused on preparing students for the workforce by
connecting business and education and offering relevant,
work-based learning activities to students and teachers,
particularly opportunities in occupations relating to science,
technology, engineering, or mathematics or to opportunities
in targeted industries identified by the economic development
authority.

35 The program's purposes must also include integrating

services with other career exploration-related activities and
 facilitating the attainment of portable credentials of value
 to employers, when appropriate.

4 Current purposes stricken by the bill relate to the sharing
5 of best practices; implementing services to all students,
6 staff, and districts and integrating workplace skills into
7 the curriculum; and improving the skills of Iowa's future
8 workforce.

9 The program's steering committee is directed to recommend 10 program parameters and reporting requirements to the 11 department. The state board of education is directed to adopt 12 rules which establish the parameters of the program.

Each regional network's advisory council is directed to 14 provide advice and assistance to the regional network. The 15 council must also meet at least annually and must include in 16 its membership representatives of business and industry.

17 Each regional network, or consortium of regional networks, 18 must annually submit a report to the department that includes a 19 plan for providing core services to all school districts within 20 its region and for integrating job shadowing activities into 21 secondary career and technical education programs, and any 22 other information required by the department. Upon approval 23 of the plan, moneys in the statewide work-based learning 24 intermediary network fund shall be distributed annually to 25 each region for the implementation of the statewide work-based 26 learning intermediary network. If the moneys in the fund total 27 more than \$1.5 million, the moneys shall be distributed using 28 the state aid distribution formula established for community 29 colleges, but if the moneys in the fund total less than \$1.5 30 million, the moneys shall be distributed on a competitive 31 basis.

The bill appropriates \$3 million from the general fund of the state to the department of education for FY 2013-2014 for deposit in the statewide work-based learning intermediary network fund.

WEIGHTING FOR DISTRICT-TO-COMMUNITY COLLEGE SHARING OR CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT — SUMMER. Code section 257.11, relating to additional weighting under a district-to-community college sharing or concurrent enrollment program, is amended to specify that "community college catalog" includes the fall, spring, or summer catalog.

USE OF SCHOOL DISTRICT PROPERTY - PHYSICAL PLANT 7 8 AND EQUIPMENT LEVY (PPEL) REVENUES AND STATEWIDE SCHOOL 9 INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDS. The bill permits a school district 10 to sell, lease, exchange, give, or grant, and accept any ll interest in real property to, with, or from a community 12 college for purposes of a joint infrastructure project, and 13 allows the district to use PPEL revenues or statewide school 14 infrastructure revenues for a joint infrastructure project 15 with one or more school districts or one or more school 16 districts and a community college for buildings or facilities 17 constructed or leased for the purpose of offering classes under 18 a district-to-community college sharing agreement or concurrent 19 enrollment program. If the district intends to use PPEL funds, 20 it must hold a public hearing on the question of using the 21 funds prior to entering into a contract. However, to use 22 statewide school infrastructure revenues, the school board may 23 adopt a resolution to use the funds for such purpose and may 24 approve a revenue purpose statement without submitting it to 25 election.

SECONDARY CAREER AND TECHNICAL PROGRAMMING TASK FORCE — APPROPRIATION. The director of the department of education secondary and postsecondary education stakeholders to review current statutory secondary career and technical programming offered by community colleges and make recommendations for programming that reduces skill shortages and enhances the state's economic growth. The task force shall consider measures to ensure rigorous standards, consistency in program guality statewide, alignment with postsecondary programs

1 that focus on income levels and skills, as specified in the 2 bill, robust business and industry participation, including 3 participation on advisory committees, and efficient statewide 4 delivery of programming. The task force shall also review the 5 definition of "career academy" for purposes of Code sections 6 260C.18A and 261E.10, and review and recommend core components 7 of career academies and regional centers. The task force shall 8 recommend specific changes in policy or statute to ensure that 9 all students statewide have access to high-quality, globally 10 competitive career and technical education programs. The task 11 force shall submit an interim progress report by January 15, 12 2014, and a final report with its findings and recommendations 13 by November 1, 2015, to the state board of education, the 14 governor, and the general assembly.

15 The bill appropriates \$50,000 from the general fund of the 16 state to the department of education for FY 2013-2014 for 17 expenses associated with the activities of the task force.
