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#### **FUNDING SUMMARY**

Other Funds — FY 2025: This Bill appropriates a net total of \$212.4 million for FY 2025 from the following sources:

- Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF): \$213.7 million in FY 2025. (See note)
- Technology Reinvestment Fund (TRF): \$19.8 million in FY 2025.

General Fund — FY 2025: This Bill suspends a \$17.5 million standing appropriation from the General Fund to the TRF for FY 2025 and appropriates \$21.1 million to the TRF from the RIIF. This action funds the TRF for FY 2025 and makes funding available for \$19.8 million in new TRF appropriations enacted in this Bill and \$1.3 million in FY 2025 appropriations that were previously enacted. This Bill also suspends a \$5.0 million appropriation from the General Fund to the Renewable Fuels Infrastructure Fund (RFIF) for FY 2025 and appropriates \$14.0 million to the RFIF from the RIIF.

Note: To avoid double counting, the \$21.1 million appropriation to the TRF from the RIIF is excluded from the total above.

#### **FUNDING FOR PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS**

This section reviews funding for projects and programs that are at least \$500,000.

#### **Department of Administrative Services (DAS)**

**Major Maintenance**: Appropriates a total of \$112.0 million for five fiscal years from the RIIF to the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) for major maintenance, major repairs, and improvements to State facilities. The appropriations include:

- FY 2025: \$24.0 million
- FY 2026: \$22.0 million
- FY 2027: \$22.0 million
- FY 2028: \$22.0 million
- FY 2029: \$22.0 million

Of the total amount appropriated in FY 2025, \$2.0 million is a one-time appropriation, a portion of which must be used to improve and repair the steps on the West Side of the Capitol building in FY 2025, as directed by the Legislative Branch.

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<b>Elevator Upgrades:</b> Appropriates \$5.4 million in FY 2025 from the RIIF to the DAS for elevator upgrades and replacement on the Capitol Complex.

**Civil Commitment Unit for Sexual Offenders (CCUSO) Renovations:** Appropriates \$7.0 million in FY 2025 from the RIIF to the HHS for renovations at the CCUSO.

**Iowa Office of the State Medical Examiner (IOSME):** Appropriates a total of \$36.3 million for three fiscal years from the RIIF to the HHS for expansion of the IOSME. The appropriations include:

- FY 2025: \$5.0 million
- FY 2026: \$28.0 million
- FY 2027: \$3.3 million

**Woodward Resource Center:** Appropriates a total of \$28.8 million for three fiscal years from the RIIF to the HHS for the tunnel decentralization project at the Woodward Resource Center. The appropriations include:

- FY 2025: \$14.5 million
- FY 2026: \$14.3 million

#### **Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEMD)**

**Levee Improvement Fund:** Appropriates \$10.0 million in FY 2025 from the RIIF to the HSEMD for deposit in the Levee Improvement Fund.

#### **Department of Natural Resources (DNR)**

**Lake Restoration:** Appropriates \$9.6 million in FY 2025 from the RIIF to the DNR for lake restoration, dredging, and water quality projects.

**State Park Infrastructure:** Appropriates \$6.0 million total in FY 2025 from the RIIF to the DNR for infrastructure improvements at State parks. Of this total amount, \$1.0 million is additional one-time funding, which is to be used to prioritize projects that increase accessibility for persons with disabilities when visiting State parks and recreation areas.

Water Trails and Low Head Dams Safety Grants: Appropriates \$1.5 million in FY 2025 from the RIIF to the DNR for the Water Trails and Low Head Dams Public Hazard Program.

- \$2.5 million for camera system upgrades at DOC institutions.
- \$200,000 for Iowa Medical and Classification Center (IMCC) pharmacy pill counting/sealing machine replacements.
- \$100,000 for IMCC network switch equipment replacements.
- \$500,000 for Iowa Correctional Institution for Women (ICIW) network switch equipment replacements.
- \$200,000 for statewide ICIW/IMCC server replacement.
- \$140,000 for various Community-Based Corrections (CBC) technology updates.

## **Department of Education (DE)**

**Educational Data Warehouse:** Appropriates \$600,000 in FY 2025 from the TRF to the Department of Education to develop and maintain the statewide educational data warehouse.

**Iowa Communications Network (ICN) Part III Maintenance and Leases:** Appropriates \$2.7 million in FY 2025 from the TRF to the DE for maintenance and lease expenses associated with Part III fiber connections for the ICN.

**Criminal Justice Information System Integration (CJIS):** Appropriates \$1.4 million in FY 2025 from the TRF to the HHS for continued development and implementation of the CJIS.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF) appropriations to the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) for major maintenance projects to State facilities. This Bill appropriates a total of \$112,000,000 from the RIIF for FY 2025 to FY 2029.

DETAIL: Major maintenance funds are used to correct deficiencies in State buildings and make a wide range of repairs. DAS defines major maintenance as "expenditures made beyond the regular, normal upkeep of physical properties for the repair or replacement of failed or failing building components as necessary to return a facility to its currently intended use, to prevent further damage, or to make it compliant with changes in laws, regulations, codes, or standards."

Recent RIIF appropriations include:

• FY 2024: \$20,000,000

• FY 2023: \$20,000,000

• FY 2022: \$20,000,000

• FY 2021: \$12,000,000

• FY 2020: \$20,000,000

• FY 2019: \$24,500,000

As of December 2023, unfunded major maintenance projects under the purview of the DAS exceeded \$466,000,000.

DETAIL: This appropriation is new in FY 2025 and is intended to be a one-time additional appropriation for major maintenance.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DAS for elevator upgrades and replacements.

DETAIL: This appropriation would fund the elevator upgrades and replacements on the Capitol Complex.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship (DALS) for the Iowa Water Quality Initiative. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section 8.57(5)(c).

DETAIL: The Water Quality Initiative provides funding for prioritized watersheds to implement conservation practices that will reduce nutrient transport to bodies of water in Iowa. Funded projects are typically managed by soil and water conservation districts. The Initiative was appropriated \$5,200,000 from the RIIF each year from FY 2016 through FY 2022. In FY 2023 and FY 2024, the Initiative was appropriated \$8,200,000 from the RIIF. The Initiative has also received funding from the General Fund and the Environment First Fund. Since FY 2013, the Water Quality Initiative has received a total of \$109,945,201 from the General Fund, Environment First Fund, and RIIF.

DETAIL: The amount of funding to the CAT Program from the RIIF has varied across fiscal years. In FY 2023 and FY 2024, the CAT Program has received \$10,000,000 in annual appropriations from the RIIF.

The CAT grants assist communities in the development and creation of multipurpose attraction and tourism facilities. Eligible CAT projects must be permanent recreational, cultural, educational, or entertainment attractions; be available to the general public; and promote tourism in local communities. Eligible applicants include cities, counties, public organizations, and school districts in cooperation with a city or county. Previously funded projects include the development of attractions such as wellness centers, recreational centers, parks, recreational trails, swimming pools and aquatic centers, riverfront plazas and marinas, streetscapes, museums, libraries, performing arts centers, sports complexes, public gardens, visitor centers, and campgrounds.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the IEDA for deposit in the Destination Iowa Fund. This appropriation is exempted from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section 8.57(5)(c).

- Economically significant projects that increase tourism opportunities.

- Projects that contribute to quality of life in rural communities.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the IEDA for Regional Sports Authority districts. This appropriation is exempted from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section 8.57 (5)(c).

DETAIL: Since FY 2008, Regional Sports Authority districts have received annual appropriations of \$500,000 from the RIIF or General Fund, with the exception of FY 2024. The Regional Sports Authority District Program authorizes the IEDA to certify up to 10 districts for the promotion of youth sports, high school athletics, the Special Olympics, or other nonprofessional sporting events. Each district receives an equal share of the appropriation. Funding is awarded to the convention and visitors bureaus for each area. The funds are used for marketing and other promotional efforts to attract youth sports, high school athletics, or other sporting events to the communities. Other expenses include venue rental, facility conversion, timing systems, field preparation, and other expenses related to hosting various sporting events.

Some recent examples of events are the Iowa Special Olympics Winter Games, Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) Junior Olympics, National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Division II Women's Basketball National Championship, U.S. Hockey League Fall Classic, National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division II Super Regional Wrestling Tournament, Iowa Summer Games Sports Festival, and NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships.

DETAIL: This was a new appropriation for the IEDA in FY 2024. Funding was previously appropriated to the Department of Cultural Affairs. The funds will be used primarily to provide grants to communities for building and facility improvements to YMCA facilities located in cities with a population of less than 28,000. In total, \$2,750,000 has been appropriated since FY 2016 for these projects. Project examples include updated boiler systems, roofs, parking access, energy efficiency improvements, and renovations to gyms and classrooms.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the IEDA to provide a grant for deck replacement on the U.S.S. Iowa (BB-61).

DETAIL: The U.S.S. Iowa Battleship, located in the port of Los Angeles, is home to the National Museum of the Surface Navy.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Iowa Major Events and Tourism Fund.

NOTE: This appropriation will not be made since it was contingent upon the enactment SF 2419 (Tourism and Opportunity Fund Bill), or successor legislation, which was not passed by the General Assembly.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) for renovation of the Lucas Building.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the HHS for renovations at the CCUSO.

DETAIL: This appropriation would fund the the remodel of the Voldeng building to house the growing Transition Release Program (TRP) and to house secure patients. This project originally received \$2,000,000 in RIIF funding in FY 2023; however, the cost of the project increased to \$9,500,000 through the design, development, and bidding process. This included increasing the scope of work to increase bed capacity by 50 beds.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriations to the HHS for renovation and expansion at the Iowa Office of the State Medical Examiner (IOSME). This Bill appropriates \$36,300,000 from the RIIF for FY 2025 to FY 2027.

DETAIL: This appropriation would fund the addition of eight new stations to accommodate the increasing caseload at the IOSME. The current site was designed to accommodate 800 cases per year, and the IOSME is currently processing approximately 2,000 cases per year. The estimated total budget for the project is \$36,300,000.

The role of forensic pathologists and death investigators at the IOSME is to investigate sudden, unnatural, suspicious, or violent deaths. In summer 2024, the IOSME will have six full-time board-certified forensic pathologists, seven part-time board-certified forensic pathologists, and four medical examiner investigator liaisons.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriations to the HHS for tunnel decentralization at the Woodward Resource Center (WRC). The Bill appropriates \$28,775,000 from the RIIF for FY 2025 and FY 2026.

DETAIL: This is a multiyear project to decentralize the utilities, replace the fire alarm system, and decommission the tunnels at the WRC. As of October 2023, the total cost of the project is \$42,626,269 with five expected phases between FY 2023 and FY 2027. The project received \$5,108,533 in FY 2023 and \$3,170,000 in FY 2024 from DAS major maintenance. The project also received \$5,572,736 in funding from the RIJE in FY 2024.

DETAIL: The Levee Improvement Fund was established in 2023 Iowa Acts, <u>House File 711</u> (Levee Safety and Improvements Act), within the HSEMD. Moneys in the Fund are appropriated to the HSEMD for the exclusive purpose of supporting the following:

- The Office of Levee Safety, including to conduct a statewide analysis of the condition of the State's levees.
- The Flood Mitigation Board, including to award cost-share moneys to levee districts pursuant to the Levee Improvement Program. The purpose of the Levee Improvement Program is to administer and fund the repair or reconstruction of levees that require immediate capital expenditure to reduce and manage a hazardous event. Moneys are awarded to levee districts on a 50.00% cost-share basis.

Pursuant to Iowa Code section <u>8.57</u>, there is an off-the-top deposit of \$5,000,000 from State wagering tax receipts to the Levee Improvement Fund each year from FY 2024 to FY 2028. This off-the-top deposit and the Fund are repealed on July 1, 2028.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for lake restoration, dredging, and water quality projects. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section 8.57(5)(c).

DETAIL: The funds are used for projects identified in the annual Lake Restoration Plan and Report, focusing on 35 projects on the priority list of 127 lake candidates. Since FY 2008, the DNR has received \$49,500,000 for infrastructure improvements at State parks from the RIIF.

DETAIL: This is intended to be a one-time additional appropriation for FY 2025.

Requires the DNR to submit an electronic report to the General Assembly before July 1, 2024, detailing the maintenance projects at the State parks in Iowa.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DNR for the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Public Hazard Program. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section 8.57(5)(c).

DETAIL: Projects related to eligible water bodies as defined in Iowa Code section <u>456A.33C</u> (On-Stream Impoundment Restoration Fund) are eligible for grants from the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Safety grants appropriation in FY 2025.

These funds support grant awards to local entities for water trail enhancements and dam mitigation grants to dam owners, including State and local government entities and private owners, to improve low head dam safety. State-designated water trails are designed to provide the following four basic types, or levels, of recreational experiences: gateway, recreational, challenge, and wilderness. Each segment of a water trail is assigned one of these experience ratings to reflect a range of conditions available to the user in the designated waterways.

While there are different types of low head dams, they generally consist of a riverwide dam that is normally overtopped by the entire river's flow. Flood gates may or may not be present to reduce upstream flooding effects. The height of these dams is less than 30 feet. Low head dams were originally constructed throughout lowa to power gristmills and sawmills. Some dams were later used for hydroelectric generation. Low head dams can be extremely dangerous due to the powerful recirculating hydraulics that are generated. Since FY 2009, appropriations for the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Public Hazard Program from the RIIF have totaled \$13,800,000. Recent prior year appropriations for the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Public Hazard Program include the following:

- FY 2023 and FY 2024: \$1,500,000 from the RIIF
- FY 2022: \$1,000,000 from the RIIF
- FY 2021: \$250,000 from the RIIF
- FY 2020: \$500,000 from the RIIF

DETAIL: This appropriation will be used to fund the annual lease payment and tower maintenance. The difference will be funded from the Primary Road Fund. In FY 2024, there was an increase in the appropriation amount due to the State contractually assuming an annual maintenance agreement in the amount of \$2,315,350 beginning in FY 2024. The final payment for the lease purchase is expected to be in FY 2026, and the Motorola maintenance agreement will continue through FY 2030.

A lease-purchase contract was signed with Motorola in 2015 at an estimated cost of \$39,500,000 (\$36,400,000 in principal and \$3,100,000 in interest) over 10 years. This is the ninth payment made by the State. This is the eighth year the payment for the Communications System has been funded by the RIIF. In prior years, the payment was funded by the E911 Fund. The final payment is estimated to be in FY 2026.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DPS for the Public Safety Equipment Fund. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section 8.57(5)(c).

DETAIL: This Fund was created during the 2021 Legislative Session and provides for the purchase, maintenance, and replacement of equipment used by the DPS.

NOTE: <u>Senate File 2434</u> (FY 2025 Justice System Appropriations Bill) also includes an appropriation of \$2,500,000 from the General Fund for the Public Safety Equipment Fund.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Board of Regents to replace tuition used to pay debt service on academic revenue bonds.

DETAIL: This appropriation replaces student tuition and fees that pay the debt service on academic revenue bonds authorized in prior fiscal years. Iowa Code chapter <a href="262A">262A</a>, enacted in the 1969 Legislative Session, authorizes the sale of academic revenue bonds by the Board of Regents.

The first academic revenue bonds were issued in 1970 and provided the primary source of funds for construction of academic facilities at the universities for several decades. Academic revenue bonds are secured by student tuition and fees. The appropriation is not mandatory by statute, but the Board of Regents indicated that without a tuition replacement appropriation, an aggregate tuition increase of 3.40% across the universities will be required to pay the debt service.

Funding for tuition replacement has been provided for many decades. Until FY 2002, the appropriation was made solely from the General Fund. After FY 2002, portions were funded from the General Fund and from infrastructure-related funds such as the RIIF and the Restricted Capitals Fund. From FY 2006 to FY 2008, funding for this appropriation was divided between the General Fund and the RIIF. Since FY 2009, the entire appropriation has been funded from the RIIF. The exception to this is FY 2018, in which appropriations were made from both the RIIF and the State Bond Repayment Fund.

The tuition replacement appropriation provides most of the annual debt service on the academic revenue bonds, but a portion of the debt service is paid from annual reductions in the Debt Service Reserve Fund.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Board of Regents for the renovation and construction of the Industrial Technology Center at the University of Northern Iowa (UNI).

DETAIL: The General Assembly has previously appropriated \$1,000,000 in FY 2021, \$13,000,000 in FY 2022, and \$26,500,000 in FY 2023 for this project. In Senate File 577 (FY 2024 Infrastructure Appropriations Act), the Board of Regents was permitted to redirect a portion of its FY 2022 and FY 2023 appropriation for the Industrial Technology Center for the purpose of emergency steam tunnel repairs at UNI. This appropriation for FY 2025 is to recover the costs of those repairs that were redirected from previously appropriated moneys. This project will expand the existing facility by 48,000 square feet. The current facility was constructed in 1974 and has \$10,000,000 in deferred maintenance. The Center will support the programs that educate students for management, manufacturing, construction, graphics, and technology education fields.

DETAIL: This appropriation will fund renovations to education and laboratory infrastructure at the Iowa Lakeside Laboratory.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Department of Transportation (DOT) for the Recreational Trails Program.

DETAIL: The State Recreational Trails Program consists of developed multiuse recreational trails and off-road paths throughout the State. A local match of 25.00% is required in accordance with the DOT administrative rules. Trails that receive funding must be maintained for public use for a minimum of 20 years. Applications for funding from the Trails Program are considered twice per year and are approved by the Transportation Commission. Appropriations for the last seven years include the following:

- FY 2023: \$2,500,000 from the RIIF
- FY 2022: \$1,500,000 from the RIIF
- FY 2021: \$1,000,000 from the RIIF

- FY 2018: \$1,000,000 from the RIIF

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DOT for the Recreational Trails Program.

DETAIL: This appropriation is new in FY 2025 and is intended to be a one-time additional appropriation for recreational trails.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DOT for public transit infrastructure grants through the Public Transit Infrastructure Grant Fund.

DETAIL: Between FY 2012 and FY 2024, there has been an annual appropriation of \$1,500,000 from the RIIF for the Grant Program, with the exception of FY 2021 when \$500,000 was appropriated from the RIIF and FY 2024 when \$1,000,000 was appropriated from the RIIF. Transit agencies may apply for grants that are approved through the

Transportation Commission, and projects must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure. The State match requirement may be up to 80.00%. Funds are used for capital projects such as new bus storage buildings, administrative buildings, maintenance facilities, storage buildings, reconstruction of steam cleaning areas, or vehicle storage and wash bays, as well as for replacing roofs or other improvements.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DOT for the Railroad Revolving Loan and Grant Program. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section 8.57(5)(c).

DETAIL: Historically, this Program has received appropriations from the RIIF. Recent appropriations include the following:

- \$500,000 in FY 2024
- \$2,000,000 in FY 2023
- \$1,000,000 in FY 2022
- \$500.000 in FY 2021
- \$1,000,000 in FY 2018, FY 2019, and FY 2020

The funds are used to provide grants and loans for construction and improvements to railroad facilities such as railroad main lines, branch lines, switching yards, sidings, rail connections, intermodal yards, and highway grade separations. The Railroad Revolving Loan and Grant Program is targeted toward job growth and economic development. The Program has the following three eligible funding categories: job creation, rail network improvement, and rail port planning and development. Industries, railroads, local governments, and economic development agencies are eligible to apply for grants and loans from the Program.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DOT for infrastructure improvements at commercial service airports.

DETAIL: Since FY 2012, appropriations have been made from the RIIF for improvements at commercial service airports. Since FY 2022, \$1,900,000 has been appropriated annually from the RIIF. There are eight commercial service airports in the State, located in Burlington, Cedar Rapids, Des Moines, Dubuque, Fort Dodge, Mason City, Sioux City, and Waterloo.

The funds are distributed through a 50/40/10 formula. For this

 appropriation, \$950,000 will be allocated equally among each of the commercial service airports, \$760,000 will be allocated based on the percentage of enplaned passengers during the previous fiscal year, and \$190,000 will be allocated based on the proportion of air cargo tonnage at each airport during the previous fiscal year. Airports submit applications to the DOT Office of Aviation for specific projects that are considered for approval by the Transportation Commission. No local match is required. Projects must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure.

In FY 2024, there was an additional \$10,000,000 appropriated from the RIIF for commercial service airport terminal improvements. Commercial airports were required to provide a 90.00% match for grants and could not utilize federal funds to provide the match.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DOT for infrastructure improvements at general aviation airports.

DETAIL: Funds have historically been appropriated from the RIIF with the exception of FY 2007 when the appropriation was made from the Restricted Capitals Fund and FY 2017 when then appropriation was made from the State Aviation Fund. Since FY 2022, \$1,000,000 has been appropriated annually from the RIIF for infrastructure improvements at general aviation airports.

General aviation airport vertical infrastructure projects may receive up to 85.00% of the total project costs but require a minimum level of \$5,000 in local match to be considered. Projects must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure. Eligible airports apply to the DOT Office of Aviation. Projects receive final approval from the Transportation Commission. These grants are available only for public use general aviation airports.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Treasurer of State for distribution to county fair societies that belong to the Association of Iowa Fairs.

DETAIL: County fair societies have received an annual appropriation of at least \$1,060,000 since FY 1998. Funds are used for vertical infrastructure improvements at the 105 fairs in the Association. County fairs receive approximately \$10,095 each. Examples of facilities recently renovated or constructed include sheep barns, grandstand roofs, offices, Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant restrooms and

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Judicial Branch for renovations and furniture at the Dallas County Courthouse. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section 8.57(5)(c).

DETAIL: It is estimated that work will begin on the internal office spaces of the Dallas County Courthouse in late 2024. This appropriation will support furniture and equipment for the courtrooms, jury deliberation rooms, judge chambers, jury waiting area, storage room, reception desk, workstations, offices, and Clerk of Court office spaces when renovations are complete.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Judicial Branch for renovations and furniture at the Johnson County courthouse. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section 8.57(5)(c).

DETAIL: The Johnson County Courthouse is remodeling and repurposing areas on the second and third floors. This appropriation will support the replacement of all existing furniture in the revised court offices and the purchase of furniture for newly constructed offices. All work surfaces/desks will be electric sit-to-stand desks.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Department of Veterans Affairs for replacement of cemetery equipment. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section 8.57(5)(c).

Technology Reinvestment Fund (TRF) appropriation to the Department of Justice, Attorney General's Office, for cybersecurity and technology projects.

DETAIL: This appropriation would fund the continued improvement and standardization of office equipment and software. The Attorney General's Office received the same appropriation from the TRF in FY 2024. This appropriation will provide upgraded desktops and laptops, consulting services regarding replacement of an outdated case management system, and ongoing server support and security assessment.

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the Department of Corrections (DOC) for camera upgrades and replacements at prisons and judicial districts.

DETAIL: The DOC received \$1,879,936 from the TRF for this purpose in FY 2024. This appropriation will support upgrades to a more modernized camera system across correctional facilities to increase security and to add increased visibility, increased facial recognition, and contact tracing.

DETAIL: The DE has received an annual appropriation of \$600,000 for the warehouse since FY 2008. The statewide education data warehouse is used in conjunction with systemwide improvements for education resources and accessibility of the resources. The data warehouse, known as EdInsight, is intended to create a combined education information system for teachers, parents, administrators, Area Education Agency (AEA) staff, policymakers, and others.

Allows the DE to use a portion of the funds appropriated for an e-transcript data system that can track students between multiple schools.

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the DE to pay the costs of maintenance and leases associated with Part III fiber connections for the Iowa Communications Network (ICN).

DETAIL: The DE has received an annual appropriation of \$2,727,000 for this purpose since FY 2007. The funding covers maintenance expenses and leases. The fiberoptic cable for Part III sites is leased from the private sector vendors that installed the cable.

The ICN administers leased digital data circuits to over 400 K-12 facilities, school districts, and AEAs. These leases and maintenance costs are a continuation of the Part III build-out project authorized during the 1995 Legislative Session. The funding is used for lease and maintenance expenses.

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the DE for Iowa PBS's digital asset management system.

DETAIL: This appropriation would fund remaining infrastructure costs of procuring a searchable digital asset management system. In FY 2024, Iowa PBS received an appropriation from the TRF of \$343,808 for this purpose. The system will allow individuals to access Iowa PBS productions through an online platform.

Medicaid Enterprise Modernization Effort (MEME).

DETAIL: Iowa Medicaid launched a systems modernization initiative called the MEME that is focused on updating Medicaid systems and simplifying processes. The General Assembly has appropriated a total of \$9,799,355 for this project between FY 2019 and FY 2025. This additional appropriation will fund the transition costs associated with system modules moving from the development phase to the operations phase.

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the HHS for the Iowa Poison Control Center (IPCC).

DETAIL: The General Assembly has appropriated \$34,000 for this purpose annually since FY 2021. This funding will be used to replace a toxicology database and enhance the IPCC's electronic medical record system.

The IPCC offers free, confidential medical advice 24 hours per day, 7 days per week, regardless of health insurance, immigration status, or language preference. Calls are answered by physicians, nurses, and pharmacists with highly specialized training in handling poison, with the goal of reducing emergency department visits and fatalities through in-home treatment. Funds are utilized as an administration match for the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the HHS for continued development and implementation of the Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS).

DETAIL: Since FY 2021, the CJIS has received an annual appropriation of \$1,400,000 from the TRF. Up until FY 2024, this funding was appropriated to the Department of Human Rights. The CJIS enables and facilitates the automated exchange of criminal justice information among local, State, and federal criminal justice agencies. The initiative provides a real-time electronic information sharing system for members of the criminal justice community in Iowa. Current collaboration with other criminal justice systems includes the County Attorney ProLaw Case Management and Judicial Dialog Case Management systems, the Traffic and Criminal Software (TraCS) system, the Iowa Corrections Offender Network (ICON), Iowa Online Warrants and Articles, Judicial Branch information technology, and

DETAIL: Since FY 2018, \$1,290,544 has been appropriated from the TRF for the JDW. This appropriation supports the maintenance and hosting costs of the JDW. The database is used to provide statistical information to State government entities regarding justice system activities. Examples of how the information is used include prison population forecasts, foster care notifications, recidivism analysis, and a number of other reports and analysis. Up until FY 2024, this funding was appropriated to the Department of Human Rights.

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the HSMED for continued maintenance of a statewide mass notification and emergency messaging system.

DETAIL: The HSMED has received an annual appropriation of \$400,000 each year from FY 2015 through FY 2024 from the TRF or RIIF. The funds are used to operate the Alert lowa Statewide Messaging System. The System can be used by State and local authorities to quickly disseminate emergency information to residents in counties that utilize it. The System is available free of charge to all counties.

Approximately 92 of Iowa's 99 counties have now signed up to use the Alert Iowa Statewide Messaging System.

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the Department of Management (DOM) for an online searchable budget and financial information database.

and tax rate information with specified information included. Since FY 2018, the DOM has received an annual appropriation of \$45,000 for this project. The DOM has also used funding from the DOM operating budget to implement the project.

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the DOM for Iowa's Electronic Grant Management System.

DETAIL: <u>lowaGrants.gov</u> provides a single portal for potential applicants to search for open solicitations for ongoing grant programs offered by State agencies. The portal tracks all grants applied for and received by State agencies. Since FY 2018, the DOM has received an annual appropriation of \$50,000 or \$70,000 from the TRF for this purpose.

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the DOM for the Local Government Budget and Property Tax System.

DETAIL: Since FY 2018, the DOM has received a total of \$2,304,000 to complete the project. This appropriation will fund the ongoing maintenance and upgrades of the budget and property tax system used by local governments to submit information to the DOM. The DOM is required by statute to collect local government budgets. The DOM currently uses a number of applications to collect this information.

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the DOM to pay for licensure fees for online databases.

DETAIL: This appropriation funds the license for <u>data.iowa.gov</u>, which is hosted by Socrata. The website provides online data for a variety of topics related to the State.

Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation to the DOM Security Office of the Chief Information Officer, including for statewide endpoint detection and response, cybersecurity incident investigation response, and miscellaneous purposes.

DETAIL: This is a new appropriation in FY 2025. This appropriation will scale and modernize cybersecurity incident investigation and response technologies, providing additional automation of initial triage tasks, reduction of caseloads, and faster incident responses. The
