# **JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE**

Thirty-eighth Calendar Day - Twenty-seventh Session Day

#### **PETITION FILED**

The following petition was received and placed on file:

By Arnold of Lucas, from four hundred eighty-nine constituents of the Seventy-second District opposing the Iowa Department of Natural Resource's practice of draining the recreational areas known as Brown's Slough and the Colyn Area each spring. They request that the water levels in the respective areas be maintained at levels to support fish habitat and to allow sufficient water levels for canoeing and other, similar non-motorized boating areas.
