GOVERNOR'S ITEM VETO MESSAGE

Christopher Rants Speaker of the House State Capitol Building L O C A L February 12, 2004

Dear Speaker Rants:

I hereby transmit <u>House File 2039</u>, an Act relating to state budget provisions involving the ending balance in the general fund of the state and the state general fund expenditure limitation by transferring funds from the cash reserve fund and by

revising the percentage amount used for the limitation, providing for a standing limited appropriation to the senior living trust fund, and including effective date and applicability provisions.

<u>House File 2039</u> is approved on this date with the following exceptions, which I hereby disapprove:

I am unable to approve the item designated as Section 2 in its entirety. This section establishes a 98 percent expenditure limitation for the state general fund, which will compromise the state's ability to protect Iowan's priorities and fund essential services. Putting an additional 1 percent of the state's budget in a savings account will shortchange our commitment to excellence in education, impede our ability to provide basic health care for seniors and veterans, and jeopardize efforts to ensure the safety and security of all Iowans. Furthermore, the state currently maintains healthy reserve accounts with over \$160 million in reserves following the appropriation of \$45.8 million from the cash reserve fund. I am disappointed the legislative leadership rejected my efforts to find a compromise on this issue. I am more than willing to work with you on establishing a 98 percent expenditure limitation if it applies to a larger budget where priority services would not be compromised and if the income generated from the interest on the one percent were devoted to early childhood education.

I am unable to approve the item designated as Section 4, subsection 2 in its entirety. This subsection establishes the effective date for Section 2 of this Act. By vetoing Section 2, this subsection is no longer relevant.

For the above reasons, I respectfully disapprove these items in accordance with Article 3 Section 16 of the Constitution of the State of Iowa. All other items in House File 2039 are hereby approved as of this date.
