Pursuant to Rule 31.7, <u>Senate File 2270</u> was referred to committee on ways and means.

#### COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

<u>Senate File 2284</u>, a bill for an act relating to the establishment of a regional transit district within the unincorporated areas of certain counties and within certain cities, requiring creation of a regional transit district commission, authorizing the voluntary imposition of a regional transit property tax levy, and providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds and revenue bonds.

**Committee Bill** (Formerly <u>House File 2477</u>), relating to fire protection service by requiring certain counties to negotiate emergency services agreements for townships, relating to dissolution of benefited fire districts, authorizing certain fire department to assess fees to certain property owners for fire protection service, and delaying the budget certification deadline for certain townships, and including an effective date provision and applicability date provision.

Fiscal Note is not required.

Recommended Amend and Do Pass March 29, 2004.

**Committee Bill** (Formerly <u>House File 2491</u>), creating a job corps center new jobs tax credit and providing effective and retroactive applicability dates.

Fiscal Note is not required.

Recommended Amend and Do Pass March 29, 2004.

**Committee Bill** (Formerly <u>House File 2501</u>), relating to electrical and mechanical amusement devices that are required to be registered with the department of inspections and appeals, establishing fees, making an appropriation, making penalties applicable, and including an effective and retroactive applicability provision.

Fiscal Note is not required.

Recommended Amend and Do Pass March 29, 2004.
