## A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to and making appropriations to agencies,  
2 institutions, commissions, departments, and boards  
3 responsible for education programs in this state.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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1 Section 1. There is appropriated from the general fund  
 2 of the state for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1976 and  
 3 ending June 30, 1977 except as provided in subsection four  
 4 (4) of this section, the following sums, or so much thereof  
 5 as may be necessary, to be used by the following agencies  
 6 for the purposes designated:

4 Sec. 2. There is appropriated from the general fund of  
5 the state to the higher education facilities commission for  
6 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1976 and ending June 30,  
7 1977, the following sums, or so much thereof as may be  
8 necessary, to be used for the funding of the following programs  
9 for the purposes designated:

33 To finance tuition grants to full-

3 seventeen (261.17) of the Code..... \$ 150,000

4 Sec. 3. There is appropriated from the general fund of  
5 the state to the higher education facilities commission for  
6 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1976 and ending June 30,  
7 1977 the sum of one million two hundred thousand (1,200,000)  
8 dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be paid  
9 to the college of osteopathic medicine and surgery for the  
10 subvention program created pursuant to Acts of the Sixty-sixth  
11 General Assembly, 1975 Session, chapter sixty (60), sections  
12 five (5) and six (6). The subvention shall be used for the  
13 admission and education of not more than thirty percent of  
14 each of the three classes of students in the college of  
15 osteopathic medicine and surgery for the fiscal year beginning  
16 July 1, 1976 and ending June 30, 1977. Funds shall only be  
17 expended for resident students and funds expended on behalf  
18 of each class shall not exceed four hundred thousand dollars.  
19 It shall be a condition of this appropriation that the college  
20 of osteopathic medicine and surgery submit to an audit by  
21 the office of the legislative fiscal director and to a re-  
22 view by a committee of six members. Two members shall be  
23 chosen by the lieutenant governor and speaker of the house  
24 from a list of ten doctors of osteopathy not on the faculty,  
25 staff or board of the college or its clinics and submitted  
26 by the osteopathic society of Iowa. Four members shall be  
27 members of the general assembly, two selected from each house  
28 who shall be of opposite political parties and shall be  
29 designated by the presiding officers of the respective houses.

30 Sec. 4. There is appropriated from the general fund of  
31 the state for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1976 and  
32 ending June 30, 1977 to the higher education facilities  
33 commission the sum of thirty thousand (30,000) dollars, or  
34 so much thereof as may be necessary, to be used in the manner  
35 provided in sections five (5) and six (6) of this Act.

1     Sec. 5. The higher education facilities commission shall  
2 contract with the proper officials of states which have  
3 accredited schools and colleges of optometry for the admission  
4 and education of qualified applicants who are domiciliaries  
5 of Iowa and who have demonstrated interest, aptitude, and  
6 readiness for study in the field of optometry. In making  
7 a final determination of who is a domiciliary of Iowa, the  
8 higher education facilities commission shall adopt rules for  
9 the academic year commencing in 1976 and for each academic  
10 year thereafter consistent with those followed for determining  
11 Iowa resident students in section two hundred sixty-one point  
12 fifteen (261.15) of the Code and subject to the provisions  
13 of chapter seventeen A (17A) of the Code.

14     Sec. 6. In carrying out its duties under the provisions  
15 of section five (5) of this Act the higher education facilities  
16 commission shall contract for the right of not less than ten  
17 qualified persons to enter accredited schools and colleges  
18 of optometry during the school year commencing in the year  
19 1976. Funds expended on behalf of each person shall not  
20 exceed three thousand dollars during any one fiscal year.  
21 The higher education facilities commission shall make a report  
22 regarding its duties under section five (5) of this Act to  
23 the legislative fiscal committee at such time as the  
24 legislative fiscal committee shall request.

25     Sec. 7. There is appropriated from the general fund of  
26 the state for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1976 and  
27 ending June 30, 1977 to the department of public instruc-  
28 tion the following amounts, or so much thereof as may be  
29 necessary, to be used in the manner designated:

28 (280A.23), subsection nine (9), Code 1975, as amended by Acts  
29 of the Sixty-sixth General Assembly, 1975 Session, chapter one  
30 hundred fifty-nine (159), section one (1), is amended to read  
31 as follows:

32 9. Set the salary and other emoluments of the area  
33 superintendent subject to the approval of the state board  
34 of public instruction. In setting the salary, the board shall  
35 consider the salaries of administrators of educational

1 institutions in the merged area and the enrollment of the  
2 area school.

3 Sec. 9. There is appropriated from the general fund of  
4 the state to the state board of regents for the fiscal year  
5 beginning July 1, 1976 and ending June 30, 1977 the following  
6 amounts, or so much thereof as may be necessary to be used

21 Sec. 10. The intent of the general assembly in appro-

22 priating funds pursuant to section eight (8) of this Act is

23 to provide additional funds, if needed, during the 1977 Session

24 of the general assembly for the purchase of fuel and

25 electricity if the costs for fuel and electricity will exceed

26 eleven million six hundred eighty-three thousand (11,683,000)

27 dollars for 1976-77. Any funds remaining which are in excess

28 of such estimated fuel and electricity costs during 1976-77

29 may be used for other purposes such as maintenance, equipment,

30 and miscellaneous purposes.

31 Sec. 11. The state board of regents may transfer funds

32 appropriated to the state sanatorium--Oakdale to the university

33 hospitals.

34 Sec. 12. For losses of federal funds during 1975, there

35 is appropriated to the state board of regents, to be allo-

1 cated by the board of regents to the institutions under its  
2 control to supplement existing appropriations for such losses  
3 the sum of two million five hundred thousand (2,500,000) dol-  
4 lars, or so much as may be necessary, from the general fund  
5 for the fiscal year 1976-77. No funds shall be allocated  
6 under this section without the approval of the governor and  
7 the state comptroller.

8 The appropriation in this section is intended to supple-  
9 ment existing appropriations related to educational and  
10 capitation grants to the institutions and not for solely  
11 sponsored research grants to the institutions.

12 Sec. 13. All federal grants to and the federal receipts  
13 of agencies appropriated funds under this Act are appropriated  
14 for the purposes set forth in such federal grants or receipts.

15 Sec. 14. Moneys appropriated by this Act shall not be  
16 used for capital improvements.

17 Sec. 15. When any laws of this state are in conflict with  
18 this Act, the provisions of this Act shall govern for the  
19 fiscal year 1976-1977.

20 EXPLANATION

21 Section 1.

22 Iowa Commission for the Blind

23 The \$686,000 appropriation to the commission for the blind  
24 funds salaries and wages at the current level including merit  
25 and fringe benefit increases. Funding at this level represents  
26 a 28% increase over 1974-75 actual expenditures for salaries  
27 and wages. Nonsalaried items are funded at the revised  
28 departmental request level.

29 Bonus Board

30 The appropriation in paragraphs a and b of subsection 2  
31 of section 1 funds the war orphans educational aid and Vietnam  
32 service compensation funds at the anticipated usage levels.  
33 Any unused moneys from these fundings will revert to the  
34 general fund. Paragraph c funds salaries and support at a  
35 reduced level from the current year due to the phasing out

1 of the Vietnam service compensation funds which allows for  
2 a reduction of both staff and nonsalary expenditures.

3 Department of General Services--ETV

4 The moneys appropriated to the educational radio and  
5 television facility fund all three segments of the facility  
6 at current levels plus necessary personnel costs for the new  
7 transmitter installations scheduled to come on line. Nonsalary  
8 items are funded at the level established by the appropriations  
9 subcommittee during its deliberations a year ago.

10 Section 2.

11 Higher Education Facilities Commission

12 The \$193,000 appropriated to the commission is intended  
13 to fund total operational salaries and nonsalary items  
14 including federally funded operational costs at the current  
15 level with increases included for merit and fringe benefits  
16 and an inflation factor for nonsalary items.

17 Tuition Grant Program

18 The \$9,000,000 appropriation maintains the current level  
19 of state funding for this program.

20 State Scholarship Program

21 An increase in federal matching funds will maintain this  
22 program at approximately full funding with the state share  
23 maintained at the current level.

24 Vocational-Technical Tuition Grants

25 A doubling in the level of current state funding is included  
26 and the program will quadruple in total available funds with  
27 matching federal funds being applied.

28 Section 3.

29 College of Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery Subvention

30 This provision of financial assistance or support to assist  
31 an enterprise deemed advantageous to the public includes  
32 funding for each class of students at a level of \$400,000.  
33 Provision for audit is provided and a committee to review  
34 the audit is created.

35 Sections 4, 5, and 6.

1 Optometric Assistance Program

2 A program is established through which contracts with  
3 existing schools of optometry can be made for guaranteed seats  
4 for qualified Iowa residents. It is anticipated that seats  
5 contracted for this first year would be funded each of the  
6 next three years necessary for the student to complete the  
7 program of study. The sum of \$30,000 is appropriated for  
8 not more than 10 seats at not more than \$3,000 each.

9 Section 7.

10 This section appropriates moneys for the following pur-  
11 poses:

12 1. To fund the following areas at the current level of  
13 operation plus increases for merit and fringe benefits for  
14 salaries and an inflation factor for nonsalary items with  
15 changes in nonstate funds taken into account at department  
16 estimates.

17 a. General department of public instruction, office  
18 administration (Includes Drivers' Education Administration,  
19 costs of uniform accounting system, and an Indian education  
20 consultant.)

21 b. Vocational Education Administration

22 c. National Defense Education

23 2. To continue funding the following areas at the current  
24 level.

25 a. Migrant Education

26 b. Drug Education

27 c. Environmental Education

28 d. Professional Teaching Practices Commission

29 e. Vocational Youth Organization Fund

30 f. Compact for Education

31 3. To fund the following area at levels anticipated by  
32 departments. Any unspent funds will revert.

33 a. School Food Service

34 b. School Budget Review Committee

35 c. Transportation of Nonpublic School Pupils

1 4. To fund the following areas at levels consistent with  
2 the governor's recommended levels.

- 3 a. Vocational Rehabilitation
- 4 b. Merged Area Schools - General Aid
- 5 c. Merged Area Schools - Federal Matching
- 6 Section 8.

7 Provision for setting salaries and other emoluments of  
8 area superintendents is provided subject to approval of the  
9 state board of public instruction.

10 Sections 9 through 12.

11 Section 9 appropriates funds to the state board of regents  
12 and institutions under the jurisdiction of the board in amounts  
13 sufficient to fund all operational salaries at the current  
14 level of operation plus increases for merit and fringe benefits  
15 and including an inflation factor for nonsalary items. Changes  
16 in nonstate funds estimated for 1976-77 excepting tuition  
17 and fee increases at the governor's estimate.

18 Section 10 establishes legislative intent regarding costs  
19 of fuel and electricity for 1976-77. The option of use of  
20 any savings for other purposes provides an incentive to save  
21 fuel costs.

22 Section 11 provides greater flexibility in the use of the  
23 Oakdale facilities and certain programs which may be better  
24 served in the new University hospital unit.

25 Section 12 provides funds to replace lost federal funds.

NEW SUBSECTION. "Half-time resident student" means an individual resident of Iowa who is enrolled at an accredited private institution in a course of study including at least six semester hours or the trimester or quarter equivalent of six semester hours. "Course of study" does not include correspondence courses.

Sec. 6. Section two hundred sixty-one point ten (261.10), Code 1975, is amended to read as follows:

261.10 WHO QUALIFIED. A tuition grant may be awarded to any resident of Iowa who is admitted and in attendance as a full-time or half-time resident student at any accredited

Sec. 21. Section four hundred forty-two point seven  
(442.7), as amended by Acts of the Sixty-sixth General  
Assembly, 1975 Session, chapter seventy-nine (79), section  
nineteen (19), is amended by adding the following new  
subsection:

NEW SUBSECTION. For the school year beginning July 1,

1976, the state percent of growth otherwise computed by the state comptroller under this section shall be increased by an amount equal to seven-tenths of one percent for school districts in which all employees are members of the Iowa public employees' retirement system to compensate for the cost of increased employer contributions to the Iowa public employees' retirement system.

For the school year beginning July 1, 1976, the school budget review committee may approve an increase in the state percent of growth otherwise computed by the state comptroller under this section by an amount not to exceed thirty-five hundredths of one percent for school districts for which contributions are made both to a retirement system established by the school district under section two hundred ninety-four point eight (294.8) of the Code and to the Iowa public employees' retirement system. In order to receive the additional allowable growth, such school districts shall show that there is a need of additional funds in order to compensate for the cost of increased employer contributions to retirement systems.

Sec. 22. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the state board of regents for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1976 and ending June 30, 1977 the following amounts, or so much thereof as may be necessary to be used for the following purposes, provided that, as a condition for the appropriation of these funds and notwithstanding any provision of chapter twenty (20) of the Code to the contrary, the state board of regents, for purposes of implementing collective bargaining pursuant to chapter twenty (20) of the Code, shall continue to act as a "public employer" for its academic, professional and scientific, and other employees who are exempt from its merit system by chapter nineteen A (19A) of the Code and who are defined as "professional" employees by chapter twenty (20) of the Code:

Sec. 23. NEW SECTION. DESIGNATION. The state hospital located at Oakdale shall be known as the Oakdale campus.

Sec. 24. NEW SECTION. PURPOSES. The Oakdale campus shall be primarily devoted to health related research, education, and service programs, including experimental health care delivery models. To the extent that Oakdale campus resources are not required to meet the primary purposes, its resources shall be devoted to meeting other related needs of the state university of Iowa.

Sec. 25. NEW SECTION. GOVERNANCE. The state board of regents shall have full power to manage, control, and govern the Oakdale campus in the same manner as other institutions under its control.

Sec. 26. NEW SECTION. PATIENT TREATMENT. Oakdale campus authorities may provide for treatment of such patients as they deem advisable and for which facilities and services are available. Except for patients admitted who are patients referred from the university hospitals, the Oakdale campus shall collect from the patients or a person liable for such support, such reasonable charges for care, service, and treatment as may be fixed by the state board of regents. Earnings shall be deposited with the treasurer of the state university of Iowa for the use and benefit of the Oakdale campus and to supplement any other sources of income. Patient treatment and care on the Oakdale campus shall be provided by the faculty of the health science colleges of the state

university of Iowa, staff of the university hospital, and professional and other staff as may be employed by the Oakdale campus.

Sec. 27. NEW SECTION. CARE OF PATIENTS--PROFESSIONAL SERVICES. Physicians and dentists who care for patients on the Oakdale campus may charge for their professional services under such rules and plans as may be approved by the state board of regents.

Sec. 28. NEW SECTION. INTEGRATED TREATMENT OF UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL PATIENTS. The authorities of the Oakdale campus may authorize patients for admission to the hospital on the Oakdale campus who are referred from the university hospitals and who shall retain the same status, classification, and authorization for care which they had at the university hospitals. Patients referred from the university hospitals to the Oakdale campus shall be deemed to be patients of the university hospitals. The provisions of chapter two hundred fifty-five (255) of the Code and operating policies of the university hospitals shall apply to the patients and to the payment for their care the same as the provisions apply to patients who are treated on the premises of the university hospitals.

Sec. 29. Section two hundred sixty-two point seven (262.7), subsection six (6), Code 1975, is amended to read as follows:

6. The ~~state-sanatorium~~ Oakdale campus.

Sec. 30. Chapter two hundred seventy (270), Code 1975, is amended by adding the following new section:

NEW SECTION. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the state board of regents the sum of one hundred forty-eight thousand seven hundred fifty (148,750) dollars, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be distributed to the school for the deaf and the Iowa braille and sight-saving school for payments to the parents or guardians of pupils in either institution as follows:

1. Transportation reimbursement at the rate specified in section two hundred eighty-five point one (285.1), subsection three (3), of the Code to the parents or guardians

of children who do not reside in the institution, but are transported to the institution on a daily basis.

2. Transportation reimbursement at the rate specified in section two hundred eighty-five point one (285.1), subsection three (3), of the Code to the parents or guardians for not more than ten trips per year from the institution to the residence of the parent or guardian and return to the institution for children who reside in the institution.

Sec. 31. Chapter two hundred seventy-one (271), Code 1975, is repealed.

Sec. 32. The intent of the general assembly in appropriating funds pursuant to section twenty-two (22) of this Act is to provide additional funds, if needed, during the 1977 Session of the general assembly for the purchase of fuel and electricity if the costs for fuel and electricity will exceed eleven million six hundred eighty-three thousand (11,683,000) dollars for 1976-77. Any funds remaining which are in excess of such estimated fuel and electricity costs during 1976-77 may be used for other purposes such as maintenance, equipment, and miscellaneous purposes.

Sec. 33. The state board of regents may transfer funds appropriated to the Oakdale campus to the university hospitals.

Sec. 34. For losses of federal funds during 1975, there is appropriated to the state board of regents, to be allocated by the board of regents to the institutions under its control to supplement existing appropriations for such losses the sum of two million five hundred thousand (2,500,000) dollars, or so much as may be necessary, from the general fund for the fiscal year 1976-77. No funds shall be allocated under this section without the approval of the governor and the state comptroller.

The appropriation in this section is intended to supplement existing appropriations related to educational and capitulation grants to the institutions and not for solely sponsored research grants to the institutions.

Sec. 35. All federal grants to and the federal receipts of agencies appropriated funds under this Act are appropriated

for the purposes set forth in such federal grants or receipts.

Sec. 36. Moneys appropriated by this Act shall not be used for capital improvements.

Sec. 37. When any laws of this state are in conflict with this Act, the provisions of this Act shall govern for the fiscal year 1976-1977.
