A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to the compensation and benefits for faculty,
2 public officials, employees, and certain legislators by
3 providing adjustments for salaries, by specifying properly
4 related matters, and by making appropriations and providing an
5 effective date.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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SF 2422

1 Section 1.

2 1. The salary rates specified in this section are ef-
3 fective for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and for
4 subsequent fiscal years until otherwise provided by the
5 general assembly. The salaries provided for in this section
6 shall be paid from funds appropriated to the department or
7 agency specified in this section pursuant to an Act of the
8 general assembly or if the appropriation is not sufficient,
9 from the salary adjustment fund created in section 8.43.

10 2. The following annual salary rates shall be paid to the
11 person holding the executive position indicated:

12 a. OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

13 Salary for the governor:

14 \$ 72,500

15 b. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

16 The salary for the attorney general shall be the same as
17 the salary for the governor.

18 Sec. 2.

19 1. The salary rates specified in this section are effec-
20 tive for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and for
21 subsequent fiscal years until otherwise provided by the
22 general assembly. The salaries provided for in this section
23 shall be paid from funds appropriated to the department or the
24 agency specified in this section pursuant to an Act of the
25 general assembly or if the appropriation is not sufficient,
26 from the salary adjustment fund created in section 8.43.

27 2. The following annual salary rates shall be paid to the
28 persons holding the judicial positions indicated:

29 a. Chief justice of the supreme court:

11 Sec. 3.

12 Persons receiving the salary rates established under
13 sections 1 and 2 of this Act shall not receive any additional
14 salary adjustments provided by this Act.

15 Sec. 4.

16 The governor shall establish a salary for appointed
17 nonelected persons in the executive branch of state government
18 holding a position enumerated in section 5 of this Act within
19 the range provided by considering, among other items, the
20 experience of the individual in the position, changes in the
21 duties of the position, the incumbent's performance of
22 assigned duties, and subordinates' salaries. However, the
23 attorney general shall establish the salary for the consumer
24 advocate and the state fair board shall establish the salary
25 of the secretary of the state fair board each within the
26 salary range provided in section 5 of this Act. A person
27 selected to act for another for an appointed nonelected
28 position shall not receive more than the salary range allows
29 for a person appointed to that nonelected position.

30 The governor, in establishing salaries as provided in
31 section 5 of this Act, shall take into consideration other
32 employee benefits which may be provided for an individual
33 including, but not limited to, housing.

34 A person whose salary is established pursuant to section 5
35 of this Act and who is a full-time permanent employee of the

1 state shall not receive any other remuneration from the state
2 or from any other source for the performance of that person's
3 duties unless the additional remuneration is first approved by
4 the governor or authorized by law. However, this restriction
5 does not exclude the reimbursement for necessary travel and
6 expenses incurred in the performance of duties or fringe
7 benefits normally provided to employees of the state.

8 Sec. 5.

9 The following annual salary ranges are effective for the
10 positions specified in this section for the fiscal year
11 beginning July 1, 1990, and for subsequent fiscal years until
12 otherwise provided by the general assembly. The governor or
13 other person designated in section 4 of this Act shall
14 determine the salary to be paid to the person indicated at a
15 rate within the salary ranges indicated from funds
16 appropriated by the general assembly for that purpose.

17 1. The following salary ranges are effective beginning
18 with the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and as otherwise
19 provided in this section:

27 range 1 positions as of the fiscal year beginning July 1,

29 3. The following are range 2 positions: administrator of
30 criminal and juvenile justice planning, administrator of the
31 arts division of the department of cultural affairs,
32 administrators of the division of persons with disabilities,
33 the division on the status of women, the division on the
34 status of blacks, the division for deaf services, the division
35 for Spanish-speaking people, and the division of children,

1 youth, and families of the department of human rights,
2 administrator of the division of professional licensure of the
3 department of commerce, and administrators of the division of
4 disaster services, and the division of veterans affairs of the
5 department of public defense.

6 4. The following are range 3 positions: administrator of
7 the library division of the department of cultural affairs,
8 administrator of the division of community action agencies of
9 the department of human rights, and chairperson and members of
10 the employment appeals board of the department of inspections
11 and appeals.

12 5. The following are range 4 positions: superintendent of
13 banking, superintendent of credit unions, superintendent of
14 savings and loan associations, administrator of the alcoholic
15 beverages division of the department of commerce, state public
16 defender, executive director of the board of educational
17 examiners, and chairperson and members of the board of parole.

18 6. The following are range 5 positions: chairperson and
19 members of the utilities board, consumer advocate, job
20 services commissioner, labor commissioner, industrial
21 commissioner, insurance commissioner, administrators of the
22 historical division and the public broadcasting division of
23 the department of cultural affairs, the administrator of the
24 state racing and gaming commission, and the secretary of the
25 state fair board.

26 7. The following salary ranges are effective beginning
27 with the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and as otherwise
28 provided in this section:

35 8. The following are range 6 positions: department

1 coordinator of the department of human rights, director of the
2 civil rights commission, executive director of the college aid
3 commission, director of the law enforcement academy, director
4 of the department for the blind, and executive director of the
5 campaign finance disclosure commission.

6 9. The following are range 7 positions: director of the
7 department of cultural affairs, director of the department of
8 personnel, director of the department of public health,
9 executive director of the department of elder affairs,
10 commissioner of public safety, director of the department of
11 general services, director of the department of commerce, and
12 director of the department of inspections and appeals.

13 10. The following are range 8 positions: executive
14 director of the Iowa finance authority, director of the
15 department of management, director of revenue and finance,
16 director of the department of natural resources, director of
17 the department of corrections, director of the department of
18 employment services, and the state court administrator.

19 11. The following are range 9 positions: director of the
20 department of education, director of the department of human
21 services, director of the department of economic development,
22 executive secretary of the state board of regents, director of
23 the state department of transportation, and lottery
24 commissioner. All elected officials of the executive branch
25 for which a specific salary has not been set in this Act shall
26 have a salary equal to the minimum salary set for this range.

27 Sec. 6.

28 1. The salary rates specified in this section are
29 effective for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and for
30 subsequent fiscal years until otherwise provided by the
31 general assembly. The salaries provided for in this section
32 shall be paid from funds appropriated to the department or
33 agency specified in this section.

34 2. The following annual salary rates shall be paid to the
35 persons holding the positions indicated:

1 a. Chairperson of the public employment relations board:
2 \$ 53,000

3 b. Two members of the public employment relations board:
4 \$ 49,200

5 Sec. 7.

6 The annual salary rates or ranges provided in sections 1,
7 2, 5, and 6 of this Act become effective for the fiscal year
8 beginning July 1, 1990, with the pay period beginning June 22,
9 1990.

10 Sec. 8.

11 The funds appropriated to the various state departments,
12 boards, commissions, councils, and agencies shall be used to
13 fund the following annual pay adjustments, expense
14 reimbursements, and related benefits:

15 1. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
16 to chapter 20 for employees in the blue collar bargaining
17 unit.

18 2. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
19 to chapter 20 for employees in the state police officers
20 council bargaining unit.

21 3. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
22 to chapter 20 for employees in the security bargaining unit.

23 4. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
24 to chapter 20 for employees in the technical bargaining unit.

25 5. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
26 to chapter 20 for employees in the professional fiscal and
27 staff bargaining unit.

28 6. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
29 to chapter 20 for employees in the university of northern Iowa
30 faculty bargaining unit.

31 7. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
32 to chapter 20 for employees in the clerical bargaining unit.

33 8. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
34 to chapter 20 for employees in the Iowa united professionals
35 bargaining unit.

1 9. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
2 to chapter 20 for employees in the community-based corrections
3 bargaining unit.

4 10. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated
5 pursuant to chapter 20 for employees in the judicial branch of
6 government bargaining unit.

7 11. The annual pay adjustments, related benefits, and
8 expense reimbursements referred to in sections 9 and 10 of
9 this Act for employees not covered by a collective bargaining
10 agreement.

11 Sec. 9.

12 1. All pay plans provided for in section 19A.9, subsection
13 2, as they exist for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1990,
14 shall be increased for employees who are not included in a
15 collective bargaining agreement made final under chapter 20
16 and who are not otherwise specified in this Act, by 5 percent
17 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, effective with the
18 pay period beginning June 22, 1990. The department of
19 personnel shall revise the pay plans as provided under section
20 19A.9, subsection 2, by increasing the salary levels for the
21 various grades and steps within the respective plans. In
22 addition to the increases specified above, employees may
23 receive merit increases or the equivalent of a merit increase.

24 2. The pay plans for state employees who are exempt from
25 chapter 19A and who are included in the department of revenue
26 and finance's centralized payroll system, and the board office
27 employees of the state board of regents shall be increased by
28 the same percent and in the same manner as provided in
29 subsection 1.

30 3. This section does not apply to members of the general
31 assembly, board members, commission members, salaries of
32 persons set by the general assembly pursuant to this Act, or
33 set by the governor, employees designated under section 19A.3,
34 subsection 5, and employees under the state board of regents,
35 but subsection 2 does apply to office employees of the state

1 board of regents.

2 4. The pay plans for the bargaining eligible employees of
3 the state shall be increased by the same percent and in the
4 same manner as provided in subsection 1. As used in this
5 section, "bargaining eligible employee" means an employee who
6 is eligible to organize under chapter 20, but has not done so.

7 5. The policies for implementation of this section shall
8 be approved by the governor.

9 Sec. 10.

10 The funds allocated to the state board of regents for the
11 purpose of providing increases for employees not covered by a
12 collective bargaining agreement shall be used as follows:

13 1. The amount necessary to fund for the fiscal year
14 beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, an average
15 base salary increase of 5 percent for the fiscal year
16 beginning July 1, 1990, of the base salaries of professional
17 and scientific staff members, except board office employees as
18 provided for in section 8 of this Act, paid during the
19 preceding fiscal year, to be allocated to professional and
20 scientific staff members at the discretion of the state board
21 of regents. In addition to the increase specified above,
22 employees may receive the equivalent of a merit increase.

23 2. For employees under the state board of regents' merit
24 system who are not included in the collective bargaining
25 agreement made final under chapter 20, except board office
26 employees, the amount necessary to increase the state board of
27 regents' merit system pay plans as they exist for the fiscal
28 year beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, by
29 increasing the salary levels for each grade and step within
30 the plans by 5 percent for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
31 1990. In addition to the increases specified above, employees
32 may receive merit increases or the equivalent of a merit
33 increase.

34 3. For faculty members who are not included in the
35 collective bargaining agreement made final under chapter 20,

1 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June
2 30, 1991, an average base salary increase for the fiscal year
3 beginning July 1, 1990, to be allocated at the discretion of
4 the state board of regents.

5 4. The collective bargaining representatives for the
6 faculty at the university of northern Iowa and for the
7 university of northern Iowa shall determine the distribution
8 of the university of northern Iowa faculty's allocation of
9 salary adjustment funds which are provided in excess of the
10 amount necessary to fund the collective bargaining agreement
11 negotiated pursuant to chapter 20 for employees in the
12 university of northern Iowa faculty bargaining unit. The
13 distribution shall be either according to the contract in
14 effect for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, or
15 according to a different procedure that is agreeable to both
16 parties.

17 Sec. 11.

18 1. There is appropriated from the road use tax fund to the
19 salary adjustment fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
20 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, the following amount, or so
21 much thereof as may be necessary, to be used for the purpose
22 designated:

23 To supplement other funds appropriated by the general
24 assembly:
25 \$ 1,785,755

26 2. There is appropriated from the primary road fund to the
27 salary adjustment fund, for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
28 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, the following amount, or so
29 much thereof as may be necessary, to be used for the purpose
30 designated:

31 To supplement other funds appropriated by the general
32 assembly:
33 \$ 5,213,662

34 3. Except as otherwise provided in this Act, the amounts
35 appropriated in subsections 1 and 2 and section 12 of this Act

1 shall be used to fund the annual pay adjustments, expense
2 reimbursement, and related benefits for public officials and
3 employees as provided for in this Act.

4 Sec. 12.

5 There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to
6 the following listed departments, commissions, councils,
7 boards, or offices, for the fiscal year beginning July 1;
8 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, the following amounts, or so
9 much thereof as may be necessary, to supplement other funds
10 appropriated by the general assembly to the following state
11 departments, commissions, councils, boards, or offices and
12 local agencies or programs listed:

15 1. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
16 to chapter 20 for employees in the blue collar bargaining
17 unit.

18 2. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
19 to chapter 20 for employees in the state police officers
20 council bargaining unit.

21 3. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
22 to chapter 20 for employees in the security bargaining unit.

23 4. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
24 to chapter 20 for employees in the technical bargaining unit.

25 5. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
26 to chapter 20 for employees in the professional fiscal and
27 staff bargaining unit.

28 6. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
29 to chapter 20 for employees in the university of northern Iowa
30 faculty bargaining unit.

31 7. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
32 to chapter 20 for employees in the clerical bargaining unit.

33 8. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
34 to chapter 20 for employees in the Iowa united professionals
35 bargaining unit.

1 9. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant
2 to chapter 20 for employees in the community-based corrections
3 bargaining unit.

4 10. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated
5 pursuant to chapter 20 for employees in the judicial branch of
6 government bargaining unit.

7 11. The annual pay adjustments, related benefits, and
8 expense reimbursements referred to in sections 9 and 10 of
9 this Act for employees not covered by a collective bargaining
10 agreement.

11 Sec. 9.

12 1. All pay plans provided for in section 19A.9, subsection
13 2, as they exist for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1990,
14 shall be increased for employees who are not included in a
15 collective bargaining agreement made final under chapter 20
16 and who are not otherwise specified in this Act, by 5 percent
17 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, effective with the
18 pay period beginning June 22, 1990. The department of
19 personnel shall revise the pay plans as provided under section
20 19A.9, subsection 2, by increasing the salary levels for the
21 various grades and steps within the respective plans. In
22 addition to the increases specified above, employees may
23 receive merit increases or the equivalent of a merit increase.

24 2. The pay plans for state employees who are exempt from
25 chapter 19A and who are included in the department of revenue
26 and finance's centralized payroll system, and the board office
27 employees of the state board of regents shall be increased by
28 the same percent and in the same manner as provided in
29 subsection 1.

30 3. This section does not apply to members of the general
31 assembly, board members, commission members, salaries of
32 persons set by the general assembly pursuant to this Act, or
33 set by the governor, employees designated under section 19A.3,
34 subsection 5, and employees under the state board of regents,
35 but subsection 2 does apply to office employees of the state

1 board of regents.

2 4. The pay plans for the bargaining eligible employees of
3 the state shall be increased by the same percent and in the
4 same manner as provided in subsection 1. As used in this
5 section, "bargaining eligible employee" means an employee who
6 is eligible to organize under chapter 20, but has not done so.

7 5. The policies for implementation of this section shall
8 be approved by the governor.

10 The funds allocated to the state board of regents for the
11 purpose of providing increases for employees not covered by a
12 collective bargaining agreement shall be used as follows:

13 1. The amount necessary to fund for the fiscal year
14 beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, an average
15 base salary increase of 5 percent for the fiscal year
16 beginning July 1, 1990, of the base salaries of professional
17 and scientific staff members, except board office employees as

31 1990. In addition to the increases specified above, employees
32 may receive merit increases or the equivalent of a merit
33 increase.

34 3. For faculty members who are not included in the
35 collective bargaining agreement made final under chapter 20,

1 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June
2 30, 1991, an average base salary increase for the fiscal year
3 beginning July 1, 1990, to be allocated at the discretion of
4 the state board of regents.

5 4. The collective bargaining representatives for the
6 faculty at the university of northern Iowa and for the
7 university of northern Iowa shall determine the distribution
8 of the university of northern Iowa faculty's allocation of
9 salary adjustment funds which are provided in excess of the
10 amount necessary to fund the collective bargaining agreement
11 negotiated pursuant to chapter 20 for employees in the
12 university of northern Iowa faculty bargaining unit. The
13 distribution shall be either according to the contract in
14 effect for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, or
15 according to a different procedure that is agreeable to both
16 parties.

13 Sec. 18. Section 2.10, subsections 1 and 3, Code 1989, as
14 amended by 1989 Iowa Acts, chapter 302, section 10 and 1989
15 Iowa Acts, chapter 303, sections 13 and 18, are amended to
16 read as follows:

17 1. Every member of the general assembly except the
18 president presiding officer of the senate, the speaker of the
19 house, and majority and minority floor leader of each house
20 shall receive an annual salary of eighteen thousand one
21 hundred dollars for the year 1991 and subsequent years while
22 serving as a member of the general assembly. The presiding
23 officer-of-the-senate-and-the-majority-and minority floor
24 leader of each house shall receive an annual salary of twenty-
25 five twenty-six thousand nine hundred seventy-five dollars for
26 the year 1991 and subsequent years while serving in the
27 capacity. In addition, each such member shall receive the sum
28 of fifty dollars per day for expenses of office, except
29 travel, for each day the general assembly is in session
30 commencing with the first day of a legislative session and
31 ending with the day of final adjournment of each legislative
32 session as indicated by the journals of the house and senate,
33 except that in the event the length of the first regular
34 session of the general assembly exceeds one hundred ten
35 calendar days and the second regular session exceeds one

1 hundred calendar days, such payments shall be made only for
2 one hundred ten calendar days for the first session and one
3 hundred calendar days for the second session. However,
4 members from Polk county shall receive thirty-five dollars per
5 day. Each member shall receive a seventy-five dollar per
6 month allowance for legislative district constituency postage,
7 travel, telephone costs, and other expenses. Travel expenses
8 shall be paid at the rate established by section 18.117 for
9 actual travel in going to and returning from the seat of
10 government by the nearest traveled route for not more than one
11 time per week during a legislative session. However, any
12 increase from time to time in the mileage rate established by
13 section 18.117 shall not become effective for members of the
14 general assembly until the convening of the next general
15 assembly following the session in which the increase is
16 adopted; and this provision shall prevail over any
17 inconsistent provision of any present or future statute.

18 3. The speaker of the house, presiding officer of the
19 senate, and majority floor leader of each house shall receive
20 an annual salary of twenty-seven thousand nine hundred dollars

22 the-house serving in that capacity. The president pro tempore
23 of the senate and the speaker pro tempore of the house shall
24 receive an annual salary of twenty-two thousand five hundred
25 dollars for the year 1991 and subsequent years while serving

The rate of a local sales and services tax shall not be more than one percent as set by the governing body. The state commissioner of elections

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shall establish by rule the form for the ballot proposition which form shall be uniform throughout the state.

5. a. If a majority of those voting on the question of imposition of a local option tax favor imposition of a local option tax, the governing body of that county shall impose the tax at the rate specified for an unlimited period. However, in the case of a local sales and services tax, the county shall not impose the tax in any incorporated area or the unincorporated area if the majority of those voting on the tax in that area did not favor its imposition. For purposes of the local sales and services tax, all cities contiguous to each other shall be treated as part of one incorporated area and the tax ~~would~~ shall be imposed in each of those contiguous cities only if the majority of those voting on the tax in the total area covered by the contiguous cities ~~favor~~ favored its imposition. The local option tax may be repealed or the rate increased or decreased ~~only~~ after an election at which a majority of those voting on the question of repeal or rate change ~~favor~~ favored the repeal or rate change. The election at which the question of repeal or rate change is offered shall be called and held in the same manner and under the same conditions as provided in subsections 3 and 4 for the election on the imposition of the local option tax. However, in the case of a local sales and services tax where the tax has not been imposed countywide, the question of repeal or imposition shall be voted on only by the qualified electors of the areas of the county where the tax has been imposed or has not been imposed, as appropriate.

When submitting the question of the imposition of a local sales and services tax, the county board of supervisors may direct that the question contain a provision for the repeal, without election, of the local sales and services tax on a specific date, which date shall be the end of a calendar quarter.

b. Within ten days of the election at which a majority of

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those voting on the question favors the imposition, repeal, or change in the rate of a local option tax, the governing body shall give written notice to the director of revenue and finance or, in the case of a local vehicle tax, to the director of the department of transportation, of the result of the election."



Senate File 2422 is, therefore, approved on this date with the following exceptions which I hereby disapprove.


I am unable to the designated portion of Section 5, subsection 5. This item would place the Executive Director of the Board of Educational Examiners in salary range four. The salary range established for this position would be higher than for comparable positions which are responsible for the administration of other licensing programs in state government. The salary for this position should be established by the Department of Personnel in cooperation with the Board of Educational Examiners.

I am unable to approve the item designated as Section 20, in its entirety. This provision would exempt the Iowa Finance authority from the pre-audit and central accounting systems of the Department of Revenue and Finance. It is important that the Iowa Finance Authority continue to operate within the pre-audit and central accounting systems of state government. Information about the financial transactions of the Authority should be handled in a manner which is consistent with the rest of state government in order to assure integrity in the expenditure of public funds. Additionally, the establishment of separate pre-audit, payroll, and accounting systems for the Authority would be expensive and inefficient.

Persons receiving the salary rates established under sections 1 and 2 of this Act shall not receive any additional salary adjustments provided by this Act.

Sec. 4.

The governor shall establish a salary for appointed nonelected persons in the executive branch of state government holding a position enumerated in section 5 of this Act within the range provided by considering, among other items, the experience of the individual in the position, changes in the duties of the position, the incumbent's performance of assigned duties, and subordinates' salaries. However, the attorney general shall establish the salary for the consumer advocate and the state fair board shall establish the salary of the secretary of the state fair board each within the salary range provided in section 5 of this Act. A person selected to act for another for an appointed nonelected position shall not receive more than the salary range allows for a person appointed to that nonelected position.

The governor, in establishing salaries as provided in section 5 of this Act, shall take into consideration other employee benefits which may be provided for an individual including, but not limited to, housing.

A person whose salary is established pursuant to section 5 of this Act and who is a full-time permanent employee of the state shall not receive any other remuneration from the state or from any other source for the performance of that person's duties unless the additional remuneration is first approved by the governor or authorized by law. However, this restriction does not exclude the reimbursement for necessary travel and

expenses incurred in the performance of duties or fringe benefits normally provided to employees of the state.

Sec. 5.

The following annual salary ranges are effective for the positions specified in this section for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and for subsequent fiscal years until otherwise provided by the general assembly. The governor or other person designated in section 4 of this Act shall determine the salary to be paid to the person indicated at a rate within the salary ranges indicated from funds appropriated by the general assembly for that purpose.

9. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant to chapter 20 for employees in the community-based corrections bargaining unit.
10. The collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant to chapter 20 for employees in the judicial branch of government bargaining unit.

11. The annual pay adjustments, related benefits, and expense reimbursements referred to in sections 9 and 10 of this Act for employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement.

Sec. 9.

1. All pay plans provided for in section 19A.9, subsection 2, as they exist for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1990, shall be increased for employees who are not included in a collective bargaining agreement made final under chapter 20 and who are not otherwise specified in this Act, by 5 percent for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, effective with the pay period beginning June 22, 1990. The department of personnel shall revise the pay plans as provided under section 19A.9, subsection 2, by increasing the salary levels for the various grades and steps within the respective plans. In addition to the increases specified above, employees may receive merit increases or the equivalent of a merit increase.

2. The pay plans for state employees who are exempt from chapter 19A and who are included in the department of revenue and finance's centralized payroll system, and the board office employees of the state board of regents shall be increased by the same percent and in the same manner as provided in subsection 1.

3. This section does not apply to members of the general assembly, board members, commission members, salaries of persons set by the general assembly pursuant to this Act, or set by the governor, employees designated under section 19A.3, subsection 5, and employees under the state board of regents, but subsection 2 does apply to office employees of the state board of regents.

4. The pay plans for the bargaining eligible employees of the state shall be increased by the same percent and in the same manner as provided in subsection 1. As used in this section, "bargaining eligible employee" means an employee who is eligible to organize under chapter 20, but has not done so.

5. The policies for implementation of this section shall be approved by the governor.

Sec. 10.

The funds allocated to the state board of regents for the purpose of providing increases for employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement shall be used as follows:

1. The amount necessary to fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, an average base salary increase of 5 percent for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, of the base salaries of professional and scientific staff members, except board office employees as provided for in section 8 of this Act, paid during the preceding fiscal year, to be allocated to professional and scientific staff members at the discretion of the state board of regents. In addition to the increase specified above, employees may receive the equivalent of a merit increase.

2. For employees under the state board of regents' merit system who are not included in the collective bargaining agreement made final under chapter 20, except board office employees, the amount necessary to increase the state board of regents' merit system pay plans as they exist for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, by increasing the salary levels for each grade and step within the plans by 5 percent for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990. In addition to the increases specified above, employees may receive merit increases or the equivalent of a merit increase.

3. For faculty members who are not included in the collective bargaining agreement made final under chapter 20, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, an average base salary increase for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, to be allocated at the discretion of the state board of regents.

4. The collective bargaining representatives for the faculty at the university of northern Iowa and for the

university of northern Iowa shall determine the distribution of the university of northern Iowa faculty's allocation of salary adjustment funds which are provided in excess of the amount necessary to fund the collective bargaining agreement negotiated pursuant to chapter 20 for employees in the university of northern Iowa faculty bargaining unit. The distribution shall be either according to the contract in effect for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, or according to a different procedure that is agreeable to both parties.

Sec. 11.

1. There is appropriated from the road use tax fund to the salary adjustment fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, the following amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be used for the purpose designated:

2. There is appropriated from the primary road fund to the salary adjustment fund, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, the following amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be used for the purpose designated:

3. Except as otherwise provided in this Act, the amounts appropriated in subsections 1 and 2 and section 12 of this Act shall be used to fund the annual pay adjustments, expense reimbursement, and related benefits for public officials and employees as provided for in this Act.

Sec. 12.

The distribution of salary adjustment funds to the various departments, divisions, commissions, councils, offices, boards, and other state or local agencies or programs as provided by this section is requested by the general assembly to fulfill its constitutional responsibility to appropriate funds to provide for the maintenance and operation of state government. It is the intent of the general assembly to fund critical unmet needs that result from the elimination of the past practice of the state board of regents, of diverting salary adjustment funds to equipment purchases, utility costs, and other nonsalary needs. If after expending all of the salary adjustment funds to increase salaries, the state board of regents have critical unmet needs that the board had planned on meeting with salary adjustment funds, the board shall submit a list of those needs to the education appropriations subcommittees no later than February 1, 1991.

52. Notwithstanding section 8.33, the moneys appropriated in 1989 Iowa Acts, chapter 303, section 6, subsections 36 through 49, that remain unencumbered or unobligated on June 30, 1990, shall not revert to the general fund but shall be available to the institutions to which appropriated for expenditures during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, for salaries.

Sec. 13.

There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the state board of regents for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1991, the following amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be used for the purpose designated:

Moneys received by local programs under this section shall be used to pay the state's share of the authorized salary increases for local program employees.

Sec. 15.

To departmental revolving, trust, or special funds, except for the primary road fund or the road use tax fund, for which the general assembly has established an operating budget, a supplemental expenditure authorization is provided, unless otherwise provided, in an amount necessary to fund salary adjustments as otherwise provided in this Act.

Sec. 16.

All funds appropriated to the salary adjustment fund for the state department of transportation and for state agencies paid through the department of revenue and finance's centralized payroll system shall be used to fund salary and fringe benefit expenditures for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1991.

Sec. 17.

Funds appropriated from the general fund of the state in this Act relate only to salaries supported from general fund appropriations of the state.

Sec. 18.

Beginning July 1, 1990, the lieutenant governor shall be paid at an annual salary rate of \$26,700 until the next inauguration of the lieutenant governor at which time the lieutenant governor shall be paid at an annual salary rate of \$60,000 for the remainder of the fiscal year. Personal expense and travel allowances shall be the same for the lieutenant governor as for a senator. The lieutenant governor while performing administrative duties of the office of lieutenant governor when the general assembly is not in session or serving as the president of the senate during special sessions of the general assembly shall receive \$60 per diem and reimbursement for expenses incurred in performing such duties until the next inauguration of the lieutenant governor. The lieutenant governor may elect to become a member of a state group insurance plan for employees of the state established pursuant to chapter 509A and the disability insurance program established pursuant to section 79.20 on the same basis as a full-time state employee excluded from collective bargaining as provided in chapter 20. The lieutenant governor shall authorize a payroll deduction of any premium due. The salary, per diem, and expenses of the lieutenant governor provided for under this section, including office and staff expenses, shall be paid from funds appropriated to the office of the lieutenant governor by the general assembly.

Sec. 19. Section 2.10, subsections 1 and 3, Code 1989, as amended by 1989 Iowa Acts, chapter 302, section 10 and 1989 Iowa Acts, chapter 303, sections 13 and 18, are amended to read as follows:

1. Every member of the general assembly except the president presiding officer of the senate, the speaker of the house, and majority and minority floor leader of each house shall receive an annual salary of eighteen thousand one hundred dollars for the year 1991 and subsequent years while serving as a member of the general assembly. The presiding

officer-of-the-senate-and-the-majority-and minority floor leader of each house shall receive an annual salary of twenty-five twenty-seven thousand nine hundred seventy-five dollars for the year 1991 and subsequent years while serving in the capacity. In addition, each such member shall receive the sum of fifty dollars per day for expenses of office, except travel, for each day the general assembly is in session commencing with the first day of a legislative session and ending with the day of final adjournment of each legislative session as indicated by the journals of the house and senate, except that in the event the length of the first regular session of the general assembly exceeds one hundred ten calendar days and the second regular session exceeds one hundred calendar days, such payments shall be made only for one hundred ten calendar days for the first session and one hundred calendar days for the second session. However, members from Polk county shall receive thirty-five dollars per day. Each member shall receive a seventy-five dollar per month allowance for legislative district constituency postage, travel, telephone costs, and other expenses. Travel expenses shall be paid at the rate established by section 18.117 for actual travel in going to and returning from the seat of government by the nearest traveled route for not more than one time per week during a legislative session. However, any increase from time to time in the mileage rate established by section 18.117 shall not become effective for members of the general assembly until the convening of the next general assembly following the session in which the increase is adopted; and this provision shall prevail over any inconsistent provision of any present or future statute.

3. The speaker of the house, presiding officer of the senate, and majority floor leader of each house shall receive an annual salary of twenty-seven thousand nine hundred dollars for the year 1991 and subsequent years while the speaker-of-the-house serving in that capacity. The president pro tempore

of the senate and the speaker pro tempore of the house shall receive an annual salary of nineteen thousand one hundred dollars for the year 1991 and subsequent years while serving in that capacity. Expense and travel allowances shall be the same for the speaker of the house and the presiding officer of the senate, the president pro tempore of the senate and the speaker pro tempore of the house, and the majority and minority leader of each house as provided for other members of the general assembly.

Sec. 20. Section 421.31, subsections 2 and 6, Code Supplement 1989, are amended to read as follows:

2. Preaudit system. To establish and fix a reasonable imprest cash fund for each state department and institution, for disbursement purposes where needed. These revolving funds shall be reimbursed only upon vouchers approved by the director. It is the purpose of this subsection to establish a preaudit system of settling all claims against the state, but the preaudit system is not applicable to the institutions under the control of the state board of regents, to the Iowa finance authority, or to the state fair board.

6. Fair board, Iowa finance authority, and board of regents. To control the financial operations of the state fair board, Iowa finance authority, and the institutions under the state board of regents:

a. By charging all warrants issued to the respective educational institutions, Iowa finance authority, and the state fair board to an advance account to be further accounted for and not as an expense which requires no further accounting.

b. By charging all collections made by the educational institutions, Iowa finance authority, and state fair board to the respective advance accounts of the institutions, Iowa finance authority, and state fair board, and by crediting all such the repayment collections to the respective appropriations and special funds.

c. By charging all disbursements made to the respective allotment accounts of each educational institution, Iowa finance authority, or state fair board and by crediting all such the disbursements to the respective advance and inventory accounts.

d. By requiring a monthly abstract of all receipts and of all disbursements, both money and stores, and a complete account-current each month from each educational institution, Iowa finance authority, and the state fair board.

Sec. 21. Section 422B.1, subsections 4 and 5, Code Supplement 1989, are amended to read as follows:

4. The county commissioner of elections shall submit the question of imposition of a local option tax at a state general election or at a special election held at any time other than the time of a city regular election which may. The election shall not be held sooner than sixty days after publication of notice of the ballot proposition. The ballot proposition shall specify the type and rate of tax and in the case of a vehicle tax the classes that will be exempt and in the case of a local sales and services tax the date it will be imposed. The ballot proposition shall also specify the approximate amount of local option tax revenues that will be used for property tax relief and shall contain a statement as to the specific purpose or purposes for which the revenues shall otherwise be expended. If the county board of supervisors decides under subsection 5 to specify a date on which the local option sales and services tax shall automatically be repealed, the date of the repeal shall also be specified on the ballot. The rate of the vehicle tax shall be in increments of one dollar per vehicle as set by the petition seeking to impose the tax. The rate of a local sales and services tax shall not be more than one percent as set by the governing body. The state commissioner of elections shall establish by rule the form for the ballot proposition which form shall be uniform throughout the state.

5. a. If a majority of those voting on the question of imposition of a local option tax favor imposition of a local option tax, the governing body of that county shall impose the tax at the rate specified for an unlimited period. However, in the case of a local sales and services tax, the county shall not impose the tax in any incorporated area or the unincorporated area if the majority of those voting on the tax in that area did not favor its imposition. For purposes of the local sales and services tax, all cities contiguous to each other shall be treated as part of one incorporated area and the tax would shall be imposed in each of those contiguous cities only if the majority of those voting on the tax in the total area covered by the contiguous cities favor favored its imposition. The local option tax may be repealed or the rate increased or decreased only after an election at which a majority of those voting on the question of repeal or rate change favor favored the repeal or rate change. The election at which the question of repeal or rate change is offered shall be called and held in the same manner and under the same conditions as provided in subsections J and K for the election on the imposition of the local option tax. However, in the case of a local sales and services tax where the tax has not been imposed countywide, the question of repeal or imposition shall be voted on only by the qualified electors of the areas of the county where the tax has been imposed or has not been imposed, as appropriate.

When submitting the question of the imposition of a local sales and services tax, the county board of supervisors may direct that the question contain a provision for the repeal, without election, of the local sales and services tax on a specific date, which date shall be the end of a calendar quarter.

b. Within ten days of the election at which a majority of those voting on the question favors the imposition, repeal, or change in the rate of a local option tax, the governing body

shall give written notice to the director of revenue and finance or, in the case of a local vehicle tax, to the director of the department of transportation, of the result of the election.

28B.4 REPORT.

The commission shall report to the governor and to the legislature within fifteen days after the convening of each general assembly, and at such other time as it deems appropriate. Its members and the members of all committees which it establishes shall be reimbursed for their travel and other necessary expenses in carrying out their obligations under this chapter and legislative members shall be paid a per diem of forty dollars as specified in section 7E.6 for each day in which engaged in the performance of their duties, such the per diem and legislators' expenses to be paid from funds appropriated by sections 2.10 and 2.12. Expenses of commission members shall be paid upon approval of the chairperson or the secretary of the commission.

d. Members of the commission shall receive a per diem of forty-dollars as specified in section 7E.6, travel expenses at the rate provided by section 79.9, and reimbursement for other necessary expenses incurred in performing their duties under this section and section 42.6. The per diem and expenses shall be paid from funds appropriated by section 2.12.

Sec. 24. Section 56.9, subsection 3, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

3. Members of the commission shall, while serving on the business of the commission, be entitled to receive a per diem of forty-dollars as specified in section 7E.6 and actual and necessary expenses actually incurred in the performance of their duties.

67.12 COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES OF COMMISSIONERS.

The council shall meet at least monthly. 4. Members of the authority are entitled to receive forty dollars a per diem as specified in section 7E.6 for each day spent in performance of duties as members, and shall be reimbursed for all actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of duties as members.

Sec. 39. Section 225C.5, subsection 3, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

3. Members of the commission shall qualify by taking the oath of office prescribed by law for state officers. At its first meeting of each year, the commission shall organize by electing a chairperson and a vice chairperson for terms of one year. Commission members are entitled to forty-dollars a per diem as specified in section 7E.6 and reimbursement for actual and necessary expenses incurred while engaged in their official duties, to be paid from funds appropriated to the department.

Sec. 40. Section 246.803, subsection 2, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

2. Biennially, the industries board shall organize by election of a chairperson and a vice chairperson, as soon as reasonably possible after the new appointees have been named. Other meetings shall be held at the call of the chairperson or of any three members, as necessary to enable the industries board to discharge its duties. Board members shall be reimbursed for expenses actually and necessarily incurred in the discharge of their duties, and those members not state employees shall also be entitled to forty-dollars a per diem as specified in section 7E.6 for each day they are so engaged.

For each council meeting, other than those held during the time the general assembly is in session, each legislative

Sec. 42. Section 249D.13, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

249D.13 MEETINGS -- OFFICERS.

Members of the commission shall elect from the commission's membership a chairperson, and other officers as commission members deem necessary, who shall serve for a period of two years. The commission shall meet at regular intervals at least six times each year and may hold special meetings at the call of the chairperson or at the request of a majority of the commission membership. The commission shall meet at the seat of government or such other place as the commission may designate. Sec. 46. Section 333A.3, subsection 2, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

2. Each member is entitled to reimbursement for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of committee duties. Each member, except officers and employees of the state and full-time elected county officials, is entitled to receive a per diem of forty-dollars as specified in section 7E.6 for each day spent in the performance of committee duties.

Sec. 47. Section 442A.5, subsection 4, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

4. The appointed members of the authority receive forty dollars a per diem as specified in section 7E.6 for each day spent in performance of duties as members, and shall be reimbursed for all actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of duties as members.

Sec. 48. Section 455B.444, unnumbered paragraph 2, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

Temporary members who may be appointed under this section shall serve on the commission only during discussion and proceedings relating to the application for a site license which the temporary members were appointed to consider and shall vote only on questions relating to the issuance of that

site license. Temporary members shall serve on the commission until final action is taken on the application for the site license which the temporary members were appointed to consider. Temporary members who are not public employees shall receive forty-dollars a per diem as specified in section 7E.6 and actual and necessary expenses incurred in performance of their official duties. Temporary employees who are public employees shall receive reimbursement for expenses only. Per diem and expenses under this section shall be paid by the state.

Sec. 49. Section 543A.4, subsection 1, Code Supplement 1989, is amended to read as follows:

1. The Iowa grain indemnity fund board is established to advise the department on matters relating to the fund and to perform the duties provided it in this chapter. The board is composed of the secretary of agriculture or a designee who shall serve as president; the commissioner of insurance or a designee who shall serve as secretary; the state treasurer or a designee who shall serve as treasurer; and four representatives of the grain industry appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by the senate, two of whom shall be representatives of producers and who shall be actively participating producers, and two of whom shall be representatives of grain dealers and warehouse operators and who shall be actively participating grain dealers and warehouse operators, each of whom shall be selected from a list of three nominations made by the secretary of agriculture. A vacancy in the membership of the board does not impair the rights of a quorum to exercise all the rights and perform all the duties of the board.

Sec. 50. Section 568.9, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

568.9 COMMISSIONERS' COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES.

Commissioners, for their services in making such appraisement shall be paid a forty-dollar per diem as specified in section 7E.6 and shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses. All per diem moneys paid to the commissioners shall be paid from funds appropriated to the secretary of state.

Sec. 51. Section 601A.4, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

601A.4 COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES -- RULES.

Commissioners shall be paid a forty-dollar per diem as specified in section 7E.6 and shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred while on official commission business. All per diem and expense moneys paid to commissioners shall be paid from funds appropriated to the commission. The commission shall adopt, amend or rescind such rules as ~~shall~~ be necessary for the conduct of its meetings. A quorum shall consist of four commissioners.

Sec. 52. Section 601K.54, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

601K.54 MEETINGS OF THE COMMISSION.

The commission shall meet at least six times each year, and shall hold special meetings on the call of the chairperson. The commission shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 17A as it deems necessary for the commission and division. The members of the commission shall receive a per diem of ~~forty-dollars~~ as

specified in section 7E.6 and be reimbursed for actual expenses while engaged in their official duties. ~~Members may also be eligible to receive compensation as provided in section 7E.6.~~ Legislative members of the commission shall receive payment pursuant to sections 2.10 and 2.12.

Sec. 53. Section 602.1513, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

602.1513 PER DIEM COMPENSATION.

The supreme court shall set the per diem compensation under sections 602.1511 and 602.1512 at forty-dollars a rate per day not exceeding the rate specified in section 7E.6.

Sec. 54. Section 602.10106, Code 1989, is amended to read as follows:

602.10106 OATH -- COMPENSATION.

The members thus appointed shall take and subscribe an oath to be administered by one of the judges of the supreme court to faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of the office. The members shall, in addition to receiving actual and necessary expenses, set the per diem compensation for themselves and the temporary examiners appointed under section 602.10107 at a rate not exceeding forty-dollars the per diem specified in section 7E.6 for each day actually engaged in the discharge of their duties. ~~Such~~ The duties shall include the traveling to and from the place of examination, the preparation and conducting of examinations, and the reading of the examination papers. The per diem authorized under this section shall be reasonably apportioned in relation to the funds appropriated to the board.

The members of the board shall be paid a forty-dollar per diem as specified in section 7E.6 and shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses, these moneys to be payable out of the state treasury upon warrants drawn by the director of revenue and finance.
