A BILL FOR

1 An Act appropriating federal funds made available from federal
2 block grants and other federal grants, allocating portions of
3 federal block grants, and providing procedures if federal
4 funds are more or less than anticipated or if federal block
5 grants are more or less than anticipated or if categorical
6 grants are consolidated into new or existing block grants and
7 providing an effective date.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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1 Section 1. SUBSTANCE ABUSE APPROPRIATION.

2 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
3 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
4 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September
5 30, 1994, the following amount:

6 \$ 10,017,948

7 a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the
8 anticipated funds to be received from the federal government
9 for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-
10 35, Title XIX, Subtitle B, section 202, which provides for the
11 substance abuse and mental health services administration
12 block grant. The department shall expend the funds
13 appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law
14 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
15 17A.

16 b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount
17 not exceeding 4.25 percent shall be used by the department for
18 administrative expenses.

19 c. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount
20 not exceeding \$24,585 shall be used for audits.

21 2. The funds remaining from the appropriation made in
22 subsection 1 shall be allocated as follows:

23 a. At least 20 percent of the allocation shall be spent
24 for prevention programs.

25 b. At least 35 percent of the allocation shall be spent on
26 drug treatment and prevention activities.

27 c. At least 35 percent of the allocation shall be spent on
28 alcohol treatment and prevention activities.

29 d. At least 5 percent of the allocation shall be used to
30 increase, from the amount available in fiscal years beginning
31 July 1, 1991, and July 1, 1992, the amount available for
32 treatment services for pregnant women and women with dependent
33 children with provisions that prenatal and child care be
34 provided to those women while they are in treatment.

35 Sec. 2. COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

1 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by
2 section 8.41 to the Iowa department of human services for the
3 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending
4 September 30, 1994, the following amount:

5 \$ 2,047,187

6 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
7 funds to be received from the federal government for the
8 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-321,
9 Title II, Subpart I, section 1911, which provides for the
10 community mental health services block grant. The department
11 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
12 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
13 conformance with chapter 17A.

14 b. The administrator of the division of mental health,
15 mental retardation, and developmental disabilities shall
16 allocate not less than 95 percent of the amount of the block
17 grant to eligible community mental health services providers
18 for carrying out the plan submitted to and approved by the
19 federal substance abuse and mental health services
20 administration for the fiscal year involved.

21 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds
22 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department
23 of human services for administrative expenses. From the funds
24 set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the
25 division of mental health, mental retardation, and
26 developmental disabilities shall pay to the auditor of state
27 an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
28 administration of the state's portion of the funds
29 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
30 the division of mental health, mental retardation, and
31 developmental disabilities for the costs of the audits.

32 Sec. 3. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

33 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
34 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
35 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September

1 30, 1994, the following amount:

2 \$ 6,827,338

3 a. The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
4 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
5 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
6 V, which provides for the maternal and child health services
7 block grant. The department shall expend the funds
8 appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law
9 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
10 17A.

11 b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount
12 not exceeding \$45,700 shall be used for audits.

13 c. Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used
14 by the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect
15 costs.

16 2. a. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds
17 appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public
18 health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health
19 for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be
20 used for audits in subsection 1.

21 b. The departments of public health, human services, and
22 education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
23 child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the
24 maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of
25 services to women and children in selected pilot areas.

26 3. a. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds
27 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement
28 appropriations for maternal and child health programs within
29 the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds,
30 \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care
31 program.

32 b. Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds
33 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to the
34 university of Iowa hospitals and clinics under the control of
35 the state board of regents for mobile and regional child

1 health specialty clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals
2 and clinics shall not receive an allocation for indirect costs
3 from the funds provided for this program. Priority shall be
4 given to establishment and maintenance of a statewide system
5 of mobile and regional child health specialty clinics.

6 4. Those federal maternal and child health services block
7 grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and
8 health services block grant funds under section 4, subsection
9 4 of this Act for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
10 1993, are transferred to the maternal and child health
11 programs and to the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
12 child health specialty clinics according to the percentages
13 specified in subsection 3.

14 5. The Iowa department of public health shall administer
15 the statewide maternal and child health program and the
16 crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional
17 child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities
18 to improve the health of low-income women and children and to
19 promote the welfare of children with actual or potential
20 handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance
21 with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social
22 Security Act.

23 Sec. 4. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES
24 APPROPRIATION.

25 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
26 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
27 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September
28 30, 1994, the following amount:

29 \$ 1,676,381

30 a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
31 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
32 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-531,
33 Title XIX, Subtitle A, which provides for the preventive
34 health and health services block grant. The department shall
35 expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided

1 in the federal law making the funds available and in
2 conformance with chapter 17A.

3 b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount
4 not exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

5 2. An amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds
6 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa
7 department of public health for administrative expenses in
8 addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

9 3. Of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1,
10 the specific amount of funds stipulated by the notice of block
11 grant award shall be allocated to the rape prevention program.

12 4. Pursuant to Pub. L. No. 102-531 Title XIX, Subtitle A,
13 as amended, 7 percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
14 subsection 1 is transferred within the special fund in the
15 state treasury created by section 8.41, for use by the Iowa
16 department of public health as authorized by Pub. L. No. 97-
17 35, Title V, and section 3 of this Act.

18 5. After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in
19 subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated
20 in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for healthy
21 people 2000/healthy Iowans 2000 program objectives, preventive
22 health advisory committee, and risk reduction services,
23 including nutrition programs, health incentive programs,
24 chronic disease services, emergency medical services,
25 monitoring of the fluoridation program and start-up
26 fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome.
27 The moneys used by the department concerning acquired immune
28 deficiency syndrome shall not be used for the funding of
29 indirect costs. Of the funds used by the department under
30 this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$90,000 shall be used
31 for the monitoring of the fluoridation program and for start-
32 up fluoridation grants to public water systems, and at least
33 \$50,000 shall be used to provide chlamydia testing.

34 Sec. 5. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM
35 APPROPRIATION.

1 1. There is appropriated from the fund created in section
2 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug enforcement
3 and abuse prevention coordinator for the federal fiscal year
4 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
5 following amount:

6 \$ 5,040,000

7 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated
8 funds to be received from the federal government for the
9 designated fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 100-690 which
10 provides for the drug control and system improvement grant
11 program. The drug enforcement and abuse coordinator shall
12 expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided
13 in the federal law making the funds available and in
14 conformance with chapter 17A.

15 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds
16 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug
17 enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for
18 administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this
19 subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement
20 and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of
21 state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use
22 and administration of the state's portion of the funds
23 appropriated in subsection 1.

24 Sec. 6. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

25 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
26 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the
27 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
28 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
29 following amount:

30 \$ 4,060,977

31 a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
32 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
33 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
34 VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services
35 block grant. The division of community action agencies of the

1 department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated
2 in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the
3 funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

4 b. The administrator of the division of community action
5 agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not
6 less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to
7 eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting
8 low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a
9 minimum allocation of no less than \$100,000. The minimum
10 allocation shall be achieved by proportionately redistributing
11 increased funds from agencies experiencing a greater share of
12 available funds. The remaining funds shall be distributed on
13 the basis of the poverty-level population in the area
14 represented by the community action agencies compared to the
15 size of the poverty-level population in the state as
16 established by the federal poverty guidelines as published by
17 the United States department of health and human services.

18 2. An amount not exceeding 4 percent or \$155,349,
19 whichever is less, of the funds appropriated in subsection 1
20 shall be used by the division of community action agencies of
21 the department of human rights for administrative expenses.
22 From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative
23 expenses, the division of community action agencies of the
24 department of human rights shall pay to the auditor of state
25 an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
26 administration of the state's portion of the funds
27 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
28 the division of community action agencies for the costs of the
29 audits.

30 Sec. 7. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATION.

31 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
32 8.41 to the department of economic development for the federal
33 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September
34 30, 1994, the following amount:

35 \$ 29,500,000

1 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
2 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
3 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
4 III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development
5 block grant of which a minimum of four percent shall be set
6 aside with one-half the actual amount set aside to be expended
7 for a grant program for the homeless for the construction,
8 rehabilitation, or expansion of group home shelter for the
9 homeless and with the other one-half to be expended for a home
10 ownership program to help lower-income and very low-income
11 families achieve single-family home-ownership. However, after
12 January 1, 1994, the department may allocate the set-aside
13 money between the programs based on the number of applications
14 received. If the allocation for the current federal fiscal
15 year is not fully obligated, the excess shall be allocated to
16 the general competitive program for the following federal
17 fiscal year. The department of economic development shall
18 expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided
19 in the federal law making the funds available and in
20 conformance with chapter 17A.

21 2. An amount not exceeding \$1,380,000 for the federal
22 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, shall be used by the
23 department of economic development for administrative expenses
24 for the community development block grant. The total amount
25 used for administrative expenses includes \$690,000 for the
26 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, of funds
27 appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from
28 the state equal to \$690,000 from the appropriation of state
29 funds for the community development block grant and state
30 appropriations for related activities of the department of
31 economic development. From the funds set aside for
32 administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of
33 economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an
34 amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
35 administration of the state's portion of the funds

1 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
2 the department for the costs of the audit.

3 Sec. 8. EDUCATION APPROPRIATION.

4 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
5 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year
6 beginning July 1, 1993, and ending June 30, 1994, the fol-
7 lowing amount:

8 \$ 4,796,625

9 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
10 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
11 Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The
12 department shall expend the funds appropriated in this
13 subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds
14 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

15 2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
16 1, not to exceed \$959,325, shall be used by the department for
17 targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students
18 at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and
19 educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out
20 schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and
21 professional development, for programs to enhance personal ex-
22 cellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the
23 ability of teachers and school counselors to identify,
24 particularly in the early grades, students with reading and
25 reading-related problems which place those students at risk
26 for illiteracy in their adult years, and for other innovative
27 projects. However, not more than 25 percent of the amount
28 available for state programs shall be used by the department
29 for state administrative expenses.

30 3. Eighty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
31 1 shall be allocated by the department to local educational
32 agencies in this state, as local educational agency is defined
33 in Pub. L. No. 100-297. The amount allocated under this
34 subsection shall be allocated to local educational agencies
35 according to the following percentages and enrollments:

1 a. Eighty percent shall be allocated on the basis of
2 enrollments in public and approved nonpublic schools.

3 b. Twenty percent shall be allocated to those local edu-
4 cational agencies enrolling the greatest percent of dis-
5 advantaged children.

6 4. Funds appropriated in this section shall not be used to
7 aid schools or programs that illegally discriminate in
8 employment or educational programs on the basis of sex, race,
9 color, national origin, or disability.

10 Sec. 9. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATION.

11 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
12 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the
13 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
14 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
15 following amount:

16 \$ 24,584,274

17 The funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
18 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
19 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
20 XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the
21 low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division
22 of community action agencies of the department of human rights
23 shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as
24 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
25 conformance with chapter 17A.

26 2. An amount not exceeding \$2,458,427, or 10 percent of
27 the funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may
28 be used for administrative expenses for the low-income home
29 energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be
30 used for administrative expenses of the division of community
31 action agencies of the department of human rights. Not more
32 than \$179,966 shall be used for administrative expenses for
33 the affordable heating program. From the total funds set
34 aside by this subsection for administrative expenses for the
35 low-income home energy assistance program, an amount

1 sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and
2 administration of the state's portion of the funds
3 appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of
4 state shall bill the division of community action agencies for
5 the costs of the audits.

6 3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall
7 be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in ac-
8 cordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of
9 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to
10 meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable
11 portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the
12 funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the
13 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, at least 15
14 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be
15 used for low-income residential weatherization or other
16 related home repairs for low-income households. Of this
17 amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for
18 administrative expenses.

19 4. An eligible household must be willing to allow
20 residential weatherization or other related home repairs in
21 order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible
22 household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the
23 landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related
24 home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving
25 home energy assistance.

26 5. Of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, \$3,500,000
27 shall be used to fund the affordable heating program.

28 6. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated in
29 subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution of
30 energy problems.

31 Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

32 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
33 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal
34 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September
35 30, 1994, the following amount:

1 \$ 30,860,312
2 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
3 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
4 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
5 XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-
6 1397f, which provides for the social services block grant.
7 The department of human services shall expend the funds
8 appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law
9 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
10 17A.

11 2. Not more than \$1,534,720 of the funds appropriated in
12 subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services
13 for general administration. From the funds set aside by this
14 subsection for general administration, the department of human
15 services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount
16 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
17 administration of the state's portion of the funds
18 appropriated in subsection 1.

19 3. In addition to the allocation for general
20 administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds
21 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the
22 following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal
23 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, for the following
24 programs within the department of human services:

- 25 a. Field operations:
- 26 \$ 12,273,528
- 27 b. Child and family services:
- 28 \$ 14,274,580
- 29 c. Child care assistance:
- 30 \$ 1,326,784
- 31 d. Local administrative costs and other local services:
- 32 \$ 1,178,317
- 33 e. Volunteers:
- 34 \$ 124,289
- 35 f. Community-based services:

1 \$ 148,094

2 Sec. 11. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department
3 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop
4 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant
5 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

6 1. The proposed plan shall include all programs and
7 services at the state level which the department proposes to
8 fund with federal social services block grant funds, and shall
9 identify state and other funds which the department proposes
10 to use to fund the state programs and services.

11 2. The proposed plan shall also include all local programs
12 and services which are eligible to be funded with federal
13 social services block grant funds, the total amount of federal
14 social services block grant funds available for the local
15 programs and services, and the manner of distribution of the
16 federal social services block grant funds to the counties.
17 The proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which
18 will be used to fund the local programs and services.

19 3. The proposed plan shall be submitted with the
20 department's budget requests to the governor and the general
21 assembly.

22 Sec. 12. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM
23 HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from
24 the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health
25 administration to provide mental health services for the
26 homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation,
27 and developmental disabilities of the department of human
28 services shall assure that a project which receives funds
29 under the formula grant from either the federal or local match
30 share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to
31 persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who
32 are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless
33 shall do all of the following:

34 1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic
35 services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and

1 rehabilitation services.

2 2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary
3 hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health
4 services and substance abuse services.

5 3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide
6 services to persons targeted by the grant.

7 4. Provide case management to homeless persons.

8 5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain
9 homeless persons living in residential settings which are not
10 otherwise supported.

11 6. Projects may expend funds for housing services
12 including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing,
13 security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance
14 in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing
15 services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless
16 individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental
17 payments to prevent eviction.

18 Sec. 13. JOBS CHILD CARE ENTITLEMENT BLOCK GRANT. There
19 is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the
20 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
21 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
22 following amount:

23 \$ 3,346,421

24 Funds appropriated in this section are the funds
25 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
26 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5081, which provides for the JOBS
27 child care entitlement block grant. The department shall
28 expend the funds appropriated in this section as provided in
29 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
30 with chapter 17A.

31 Sec. 14. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is
32 appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the
33 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
34 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
35 following amount:

1 \$ 7,754,522

2 Funds appropriated in this section are the funds
3 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
4 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the
5 child care and development block grant. The department shall
6 expend the funds appropriated in this section as provided in
7 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
8 with chapter 17A.

9 Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

10 1. If the funds received from the federal government for
11 the block grants specified in this Act are less than the
12 amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be
13 prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than
14 for the rape prevention program under section 4, subsection 3
15 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according
16 to the percentages that each program is to receive as
17 specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines
18 that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be
19 sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or
20 if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the
21 governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect
22 to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various
23 programs for which the block grants are available.

24 2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for
25 in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

26 a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and
27 house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate
28 chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those

14 by the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect
15 costs.

16 2. a. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds
17 appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public
18 health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health
19 for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be
20 used for audits in subsection 1.

21 b. The departments of public health, human services, and
22 education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
23 child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the
24 maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of
25 services to women and children in selected pilot areas.

26 3. a. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds
27 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement
28 appropriations for maternal and child health programs within
29 the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds,
30 \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care
31 program.

32 b. Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds
33 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to the
34 university of Iowa hospitals and clinics under the control of
35 the state board of regents for mobile and regional child

1 health specialty clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals
2 and clinics shall not receive an allocation for indirect costs
3 from the funds provided for this program. Priority shall be
4 given to establishment and maintenance of a statewide system
5 of mobile and regional child health specialty clinics.

6 4. Those federal maternal and child health services block
7 grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and
8 health services block grant funds under section 4, subsection
9 4 of this Act for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
10 1993, are transferred to the maternal and child health
11 programs and to the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
12 child health specialty clinics according to the percentages
13 specified in subsection 3.

14 5. The Iowa department of public health shall administer
15 the statewide maternal and child health program and the
16 crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional
17 child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities
18 to improve the health of low-income women and children and to
19 promote the welfare of children with actual or potential
20 handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance
21 with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social
22 Security Act.

23 Sec. 4. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES
24 APPROPRIATION.

25 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
26 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
27 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September
28 30, 1994, the following amount:

29 \$ 1,676,381

30 a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
31 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
32 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-531,
33 Title XIX, Subtitle A, which provides for the preventive
34 health and health services block grant. The department shall
35 expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided

1 in the federal law making the funds available and in
2 conformance with chapter 17A.

3 b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount
4 not exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

5 2. An amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds
6 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa
7 department of public health for administrative expenses in
8 addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

9 3. Of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1,
10 the specific amount of funds stipulated by the notice of block
11 grant award shall be allocated to the rape prevention program.

12 4. Pursuant to Pub. L. No. 102-531 Title XIX, Subtitle A,
13 as amended, 7 percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
14 subsection 1 is transferred within the special fund in the
15 state treasury created by section 8.41, for use by the Iowa
16 department of public health as authorized by Pub. L. No. 97-
17 35, Title V, and section 3 of this Act.

18 5. After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in
19 subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated
20 in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for healthy
21 people 2000/healthy Iowans 2000 program objectives, preventive
22 health advisory committee, and risk reduction services,
23 including nutrition programs, health incentive programs,
24 chronic disease services, emergency medical services,
25 monitoring of the fluoridation program and start-up
26 fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome.
27 The moneys used by the department concerning acquired immune
28 deficiency syndrome shall not be used for the funding of
29 indirect costs. Of the funds used by the department under
30 this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$90,000 shall be used
31 for the monitoring of the fluoridation program and for start-
32 up fluoridation grants to public water systems, and at least
33 \$50,000 shall be used to provide chlamydia testing.

34 Sec. 5. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM
35 APPROPRIATION.

1 1. There is appropriated from the fund created in section
2 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug enforcement
3 and abuse prevention coordinator for the federal fiscal year
4 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
5 following amount:

6 \$ 5,040,000

7 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated
8 funds to be received from the federal government for the
9 designated fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 100-690 which
10 provides for the drug control and system improvement grant
11 program. The drug enforcement and abuse coordinator shall
12 expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided
13 in the federal law making the funds available and in
14 conformance with chapter 17A.

15 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds
16 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug
17 enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for
18 administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this
19 subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement
20 and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of
21 state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use
22 and administration of the state's portion of the funds
23 appropriated in subsection 1.

24 Sec. 6. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

25 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
26 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the
27 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
28 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
29 following amount:

30 \$ 4,060,977

31 a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
32 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
33 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
34 VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services
35 block grant. The division of community action agencies of the

1 department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated
2 in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the
3 funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

4 b. The administrator of the division of community action
5 agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not
6 less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to
7 eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting
8 low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a
9 minimum allocation of no less than \$100,000. The minimum
10 allocation shall be achieved by proportionately redistributing
11 increased funds from agencies experiencing a greater share of

30 Sec. 7. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATION.

31 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
32 8.41 to the department of economic development for the federal
33 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September
34 30, 1994, the following amount:

35 \$ 29,500,000

1 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
2 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
3 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
4 III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development
5 block grant. The department of economic development shall
6 expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided
7 in the federal law making the funds available and in
8 conformance with chapter 17A.

9 2. An amount not exceeding \$1,380,000 for the federal
10 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, shall be used by the
11 department of economic development for administrative expenses
12 for the community development block grant. The total amount
13 used for administrative expenses includes \$690,000 for the
14 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, of funds
15 appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from
16 the state equal to \$690,000 from the appropriation of state
17 funds for the community development block grant and state
18 appropriations for related activities of the department of
19 economic development. From the funds set aside for
20 administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of
21 economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an
22 amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
23 administration of the state's portion of the funds
24 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
25 the department for the costs of the audit.

26 Sec. 8. EDUCATION APPROPRIATION.

27 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
28 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year
29 beginning July 1, 1993, and ending June 30, 1994, the fol-
30 lowing amount:

31 \$ 4,796,625

32 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
33 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
34 Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The
35 department shall expend the funds appropriated in this

1 subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds
2 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

3 2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
4 1, not to exceed \$959,325, shall be used by the department for
5 targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students
6 at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and
7 educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out
8 schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and
9 professional development, for programs to enhance personal ex-
10 cellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the
11 ability of teachers and school counselors to identify,
12 particularly in the early grades, students with reading and
13 reading-related problems which place those students at risk
14 for illiteracy in their adult years, and for other innovative
15 projects. However, not more than 25 percent of the amount

18 3. Eighty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
19 1 shall be allocated by the department to local educational
20 agencies in this state, as local educational agency is defined
21 in Pub. L. No. 100-297. The amount allocated under this
22 subsection shall be allocated to local educational agencies
23 according to the following percentages and enrollments:

24 a. Eighty percent shall be allocated on the basis of
25 enrollments in public and approved nonpublic schools.

26 b. Twenty percent shall be allocated to those local edu-

29 4. Funds appropriated in this section shall not be used to
30 aid schools or programs that illegally discriminate in
31 employment or educational programs on the basis of sex, race,
32 color, national origin, or disability.

33 Sec. 9. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATION.

34 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
35 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the

1 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
2 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
3 following amount:

4 \$ 24,584,274

5 The funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
6 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
7 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
8 XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the
9 low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division
10 of community action agencies of the department of human rights
11 shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as
12 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
13 conformance with chapter 17A.

14 2. An amount not exceeding \$2,458,427, or 10 percent of
15 the funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may
16 be used for administrative expenses for the low-income home
17 energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be
18 used for administrative expenses of the division of community
19 action agencies of the department of human rights. Not more
20 than \$179,966 shall be used for administrative expenses for
21 the affordable heating program. From the total funds set
22 aside by this subsection for administrative expenses for the
23 low-income home energy assistance program, an amount
24 sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and
25 administration of the state's portion of the funds
26 appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of
27 state shall bill the division of community action agencies for
28 the costs of the audits.

29 3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall
30 be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in ac-
31 cordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of
32 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to
33 meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable
34 portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the
35 funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the

1 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, at least 15
2 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be
3 used for low-income residential weatherization or other
4 related home repairs for low-income households. Of this
5 amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for
6 administrative expenses.

7 4. An eligible household must be willing to allow
8 residential weatherization or other related home repairs in
9 order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible
10 household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the
11 landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related
12 home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving
13 home energy assistance.

14 5. Of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, \$3,500,000
15 shall be used to fund the affordable heating program.

16 6. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated in
17 subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution of
18 energy problems.

19 Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

20 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
21 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal
22 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September
23 30, 1994, the following amount:

24 \$ 30,860,312

25 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
26 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
27 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
28 XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-
29 1397f, which provides for the social services block grant.
30 The department of human services shall expend the funds
31 appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law
32 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
33 17A.

34 2. Not more than \$1,734,720 of the funds appropriated in
35 subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services

1 for general administration. From the funds set aside by this
2 subsection for general administration, the department of human
3 services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount
4 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
5 administration of the state's portion of the funds
6 appropriated in subsection 1.

7 3. In addition to the allocation for general
8 administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds
9 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the
10 following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal
11 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, for the following
12 programs within the department of human services:

- 13 a. Field operations:
- 14 \$ 12,189,823
- 15 b. Child and family services:
- 16 \$ 14,177,228
- 17 c. Child care assistance:
- 18 \$ 1,317,735
- 19 d. Local administrative costs and other local services:
- 20 \$ 1,170,281
- 21 e. Volunteers:
- 22 \$ 123,441
- 23 f. Community-based services:
- 24 \$ 147,084

25 Sec. 11. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department
26 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop
27 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant
28 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

29 1. The proposed plan shall include all programs and
30 services at the state level which the department proposes to
31 fund with federal social services block grant funds, and shall
32 identify state and other funds which the department proposes
33 to use to fund the state programs and services.

34 2. The proposed plan shall also include all local programs
35 and services which are eligible to be funded with federal

1 social services block grant funds, the total amount of federal
2 social services block grant funds available for the local
3 programs and services, and the manner of distribution of the
4 federal social services block grant funds to the counties.
5 The proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which
6 will be used to fund the local programs and services.

7 3. The proposed plan shall be submitted with the
8 department's budget requests to the governor and the general
9 assembly.

10 Sec. 12. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM
11 HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from
12 the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health
13 administration to provide mental health services for the
14 homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation,
15 and developmental disabilities of the department of human
16 services shall assure that a project which receives funds
17 under the formula grant from either the federal or local match
18 share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to
19 persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who
20 are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless
21 shall do all of the following:

22 1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic
23 services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and
24 rehabilitation services.

25 2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary
26 hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health
27 services and substance abuse services.

28 3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide
29 services to persons targeted by the grant.

30 4. Provide case management to homeless persons.

31 5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain
32 homeless persons living in residential settings which are not
33 otherwise supported.

34 6. Projects may expend funds for housing services
35 including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing,

1 security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance
2 in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing
3 services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless
4 individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental
5 payments to prevent eviction.

6 Sec. 13. JOBS CHILD CARE ENTITLEMENT BLOCK GRANT. There
7 is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the
8 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
9 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
10 following amount:

11 \$ 3,346,421

12 Funds appropriated in this section are the funds
13 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
14 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5081, which provides for the JOBS
15 child care entitlement block grant. The department shall
16 expend the funds appropriated in this section as provided in
17 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
18 with chapter 17A.

19 Sec. 14. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is
20 appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the
21 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
22 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
23 following amount:

24 \$ 7,754,522

25 Funds appropriated in this section are the funds
26 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
27 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the
28 child care and development block grant. The department shall
29 expend the funds appropriated in this section as provided in
30 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
31 with chapter 17A.

32 Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

33 1. If the funds received from the federal government for
34 the block grants specified in this Act are less than the
35 amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be

1 prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than
2 for the rape prevention program under section 4, subsection 3
3 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according
4 to the percentages that each program is to receive as
5 specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines
6 that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be
7 sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or
8 if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the
9 governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect
10 to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various
11 programs for which the block grants are available.

12 2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for
13 in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

14 a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and
15 house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate
16 chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those
17 committees, and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau
18 shall be notified of the proposed action.

19 b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and
20 information on the reasons why particular percentages or
21 amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the
22 departments and programs affected, and other information
23 deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at
24 least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action
25 before the action is taken.

26 Sec. 16. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

27 1. If funds received from the federal government in the
28 form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in
29 sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12, 13, and 14 of this
30 Act, the excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs
31 according to the percentages specified in those sections,
32 except additional funds shall not be prorated for
33 administrative expenses.

34 2. If funds received from the federal government from
35 block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 9 of

1 this Act, 15 percent of the excess shall be allocated to the
2 low-income residential weatherization program.

3 3. If funds received from the federal government from
4 community services block grants exceed the amount appropriated
5 in section 6 of this Act, 100 percent of the excess is
6 allocated to the community services block grant program.

7 Sec. 17. PROCEDURE FOR CONSOLIDATED, CATEGORICAL, OR
8 EXPANDED FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS.

9 1. Notwithstanding section 8.41, federal funds made
10 available to the state which are authorized for the federal
11 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, resulting from the
12 federal government consolidating former categorical grants
13 into block grants, or which expand block grants included in
14 Pub. L. No. 97-35, to include additional programs formerly
15 funded by categorical grants, which are not otherwise
16 appropriated by the general assembly, are appropriated for the
17 programs formerly receiving the categorical grants, subject to
18 the conditions of this section. The governor shall, whenever
19 possible, allocate from the block grant to each program in the
20 same proportion as the amount of federal funds received by the
21 program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
22 1992, as modified by the 1993 Session of the Seventy-fifth
23 General Assembly for the state fiscal year beginning July 1,
24 1993, compared to the total federal funds received in the
25 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, by all programs
26 consolidated into the block grant. However, if one agency did
27 not have categorical funds appropriated for the federal fiscal
28 year beginning October 1, 1992, but had anticipated applying
29 for funds during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
30 1993, the governor may allocate the funds in order to provide
31 funding.

32 2. If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or
33 expanded block grant is less than the total amount of federal
34 funds received for the programs in the form of categorical
35 grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992,

1 state funds appropriated to the program by the general
2 assembly to match the federal funds shall be reduced by the
3 same proportion of the reduction in federal funds for the
4 program. State funds released by the reduction shall be
5 deposited in a special fund in the state treasury and are
6 available for appropriation by the general assembly. The
7 governor shall notify the chairpersons and ranking members of
8 the senate and house standing committees on appropriations,
9 the appropriate chairpersons and ranking members of the
10 subcommittees of those committees, and the legislative fiscal
11 director before making the allocation of federal funds or any
12 proportional reduction of state funds under this section. The
13 notice shall state the amount of federal funds to be allocated
14 to each program, the amount of federal funds received by the
15 program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
16 1992, the amount by which state funds for the program will be
17 reduced according to this section and the amount of state
18 funds received by the program during the state fiscal year
19 beginning July 1, 1992. Chairpersons notified shall be
20 allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the
21 proposed action before the action is taken.

22 3. If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or
23 expanded block grant is more than the total amount of federal
24 funds received for the programs in the form of categorical
25 grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992,
26 the excess funds shall be deposited in the special fund
27 created in section 8.41 and are subject to the provisions of
28 that section.

29 Sec. 18. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP.
30 Federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants,
31 receipts, and funds, available in whole or in part for the
32 fiscal year beginning July 1, 1993, and ending June 30, 1994,
33 are appropriated to the department of agriculture and land
34 stewardship for the purposes set forth in the grants,
35 receipts, or conditions accompanying the receipt of the funds,

1 unless otherwise provided by law.

2 Sec. 19. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE. Federal grants, receipts,
3 and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds,
4 available in whole or in part for the fiscal year beginning
5 July 1, 1993, and ending June 30, 1994, are appropriated to
6 the department of justice for the purposes set forth in the
7 grants, receipts, or conditions accompanying the receipt of
8 the funds, unless otherwise provided by law.

9 Sec. 20. OFFICE OF AUDITOR OF STATE. Federal grants,
10 receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and
11 funds, available in whole or in part for the fiscal year
12 beginning July 1, 1993, and ending June 30, 1994, are
13 appropriated to the office of auditor of state for the
14 purposes set forth in the grants, receipts, or conditions
15 accompanying the receipt of the funds, unless otherwise
16 provided by law.

A BILL FOR

1 An Act appropriating federal funds made available from federal
2 block grants and other federal grants, allocating portions of
3 federal block grants, and providing procedures if federal
4 funds are more or less than anticipated or if federal block
5 grants are more or less than anticipated or if categorical
6 grants are consolidated into new or existing block grants and
7 providing an effective date.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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1 Section 1. SUBSTANCE ABUSE APPROPRIATION.

2 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
3 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
4 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September
5 30, 1994, the following amount:

6 \$ 10,017,948

7 a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the
8 anticipated funds to be received from the federal government
9 for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-
10 35, Title XIX, Subtitle B, section 202, which provides for the
11 substance abuse and mental health services administration
12 block grant. The department shall expend the funds
13 appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law
14 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
15 17A.

31 economic development. From the funds set aside for
32 administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of
33 economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an
34 amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the
35 administration of the state's portion of the funds

1 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
2 the department for the costs of the audit.

3 Sec. 7. EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS.

4 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
5 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year
6 beginning July 1, 1993, and ending June 30, 1994, the fol-
7 lowing amount:

8 \$ 4,796,625

9 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
10 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
11 Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The
12 department shall expend the funds appropriated in this
13 subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds
14 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

15 2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
16 1, not to exceed \$959,325, shall be used by the department for
17 targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students
18 at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and
19 educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out
20 schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and
21 professional development, for programs to enhance personal ex-
22 cellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the
23 ability of teachers and school counselors to identify,
24 particularly in the early grades, students with reading and

11 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
12 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the
13 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
14 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
15 following amount:

17 The funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
18 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
19 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
20 XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the
21 low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division
22 of community action agencies of the department of human rights
23 shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as
24 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
25 conformance with chapter 17A.

26 2. An amount not exceeding \$2,458,427, or 10 percent of
27 the funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may
28 be used for administrative expenses for the low-income home
29 energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be
30 used for administrative expenses of the division of community
31 action agencies of the department of human rights. Not more
32 than \$179,966 shall be used for administrative expenses for
33 the affordable heating program. From the total funds set
34 aside by this subsection for administrative expenses for the
35 low-income home energy assistance program, an amount

1 sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and

6 3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall
7 be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in ac-
8 cordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of
9 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to
10 meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable
11 portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the

7 The department of human services shall expend the funds

35 Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department

1 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop
2 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant
3 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

4 1. The proposed plan shall include all programs and
5 services at the state level which the department proposes to
6 fund with federal social services block grant funds, and shall
7 identify state and other funds which the department proposes
8 to use to fund the state programs and services.

9 2. The proposed plan shall also include all local programs
10 and services which are eligible to be funded with federal
11 social services block grant funds, the total amount of federal
12 social services block grant funds available for the local
13 programs and services, and the manner of distribution of the
14 federal social services block grant funds to the counties.
15 The proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which
16 will be used to fund the local programs and services.

17 3. The proposed plan shall be submitted with the

20 Sec. 11. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM
21 HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from
22 the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health
23 administration to provide mental health services for the
24 homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation,
25 and developmental disabilities of the department of human
26 services shall assure that a project which receives funds
27 under the formula grant from either the federal or local match

12 in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing
13 services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless
14 individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental
15 payments to prevent eviction.

28 with chapter 17A.

29 Sec. 13. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is
30 appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the
31 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
32 beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the
33 following amount:

34 \$ 7,754,522

35 Funds appropriated in this section are the funds

1 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
2 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the
3 child care and development block grant. The department shall
4 expend the funds appropriated in this section as provided in
5 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
6 with chapter 17A.

7 Sec. 14. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

8 1. If the funds received from the federal government for
9 the block grants specified in this Act are less than the
10 amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be
11 prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than
12 for the rape prevention program under section 3, subsection 3
13 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according
14 to the percentages that each program is to receive as
15 specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines
16 that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be
17 sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or

20 available to the state which are authorized for the federal

22 federal government consolidating former categorical grants
23 into block grants, or which expand block grants included in
24 Pub. L. No. 97-35, to include additional programs formerly
25 funded by categorical grants, which are not otherwise

AN ACT

APPROPRIATING FEDERAL FUNDS MADE AVAILABLE FROM FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS AND OTHER FEDERAL GRANTS, ALLOCATING PORTIONS OF FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS, AND PROVIDING PROCEDURES IF FEDERAL FUNDS ARE MORE OR LESS THAN ANTICIPATED OR IF FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS ARE MORE OR LESS THAN ANTICIPATED OR IF CATEGORICAL GRANTS ARE CONSOLIDATED INTO NEW OR EXISTING BLOCK GRANTS AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

Section 1. SUBSTANCE ABUSE APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 10,017,948

a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XIX, Subtitle B, section 202, which provides for the substance abuse and mental health services administration block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding 4.25 percent shall be used by the department for administrative expenses.

c. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$24,585 shall be used for audits.

2. The funds remaining from the appropriation made in subsection 1 shall be allocated as follows:

a. At least 20 percent of the allocation shall be spent for prevention programs.

b. At least 35 percent of the allocation shall be spent on drug treatment and prevention activities.

c. At least 35 percent of the allocation shall be spent on alcohol treatment and prevention activities.

d. At least 5 percent of the allocation shall be used to increase, from the amount available in fiscal years beginning July 1, 1991, and July 1, 1992, the amount available for treatment services for pregnant women and women with dependent children with provisions that prenatal and child care be provided to those women while they are in treatment.

Sec. 2. COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 2,047,187

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-321, Title II, Subpart I, section 1911, which provides for the community mental health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. The administrator of the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities shall allocate not less than 95 percent of the amount of the block grant to eligible community mental health services providers for carrying out the plan submitted to and approved by the federal substance abuse and mental health services administration for the fiscal year involved.

2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities for the costs of the audits.

Sec. 3. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 6,827,338

a. The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title V, which provides for the maternal and child health services

block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$45,700 shall be used for audits.

c. Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect costs.

2. a. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

b. The departments of public health, human services, and education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of services to women and children in selected pilot areas.

3. a. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement appropriations for maternal and child health programs within the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds, \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care program.

b. Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of regents for mobile and regional child health specialty clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall not receive an allocation for indirect costs from the funds provided for this program. Priority shall be given to establishment and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile and regional child health specialty clinics.

4. Those federal maternal and child health services block grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and

health services block grant funds under section 4, subsection 4 of this Act for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, are transferred to the maternal and child health programs and to the university of Iowa's mobile and regional child health specialty clinics according to the percentages specified in subsection 3.

5. The Iowa department of public health shall administer the statewide maternal and child health program and the crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities to improve the health of low-income women and children and to promote the welfare of children with actual or potential handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social Security Act.

Sec. 4. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 1,676,381

a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-531, Title XIX, Subtitle A, which provides for the preventive health and health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

2. An amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa department of public health for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

3. Of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1, the specific amount of funds stipulated by the notice of block grant award shall be allocated to the rape prevention program.

4. Pursuant to Pub. L. No. 102-531 Title XIX, Subtitle A, as amended, 7 percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 is transferred within the special fund in the state treasury created by section 8.41, for use by the Iowa department of public health as authorized by Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title V, and section 3 of this Act.

5. After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for healthy people 2000/healthy Iowans 2000 program objectives, preventive health advisory committee, and risk reduction services, including nutrition programs, health incentive programs, chronic disease services, emergency medical services, monitoring of the fluoridation program and start-up fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome. The moneys used by the department concerning acquired immune deficiency syndrome shall not be used for the funding of indirect costs. Of the funds used by the department under this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$90,000 shall be used for the monitoring of the fluoridation program and for start-up fluoridation grants to public water systems, and at least \$50,000 shall be used to provide chlamydia testing.

Sec. 5. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created in section 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 5,040,000

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 100-690 which

provides for the drug control and system improvement grant program. The drug enforcement and abuse coordinator shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

Sec. 6. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 4,060,977

a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services block grant. The division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. The administrator of the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a minimum allocation of no less than \$100,000. The minimum allocation shall be achieved by proportionately redistributing

increased funds from agencies experiencing a greater share of available funds. The remaining funds shall be distributed on the basis of the poverty-level population in the area represented by the community action agencies compared to the size of the poverty-level population in the state as established by the federal poverty guidelines as published by the United States department of health and human services.

2. An amount not exceeding 4 percent or \$155,349, whichever is less, of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the division of community action agencies for the costs of the audits.

Sec. 7. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of economic development for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 29,500,000

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development block grant. The department of economic development shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding \$1,380,000 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, shall be used by the department of economic development for administrative expenses

for the community development block grant. The total amount used for administrative expenses includes \$690,000 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, of funds appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from the state equal to \$690,000 from the appropriation of state funds for the community development block grant and state appropriations for related activities of the department of economic development. From the funds set aside for administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the department for the costs of the audit.

Sec. 8. EDUCATION APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1993, and ending June 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 4,796,625

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The department shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, not to exceed \$959,325, shall be used by the department for targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and professional development, for programs to enhance personal excellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the ability of teachers and school counselors to identify, particularly in the early grades, students with reading and

reading-related problems which place those students at risk for illiteracy in their adult years, and for other innovative projects. However, not more than 25 percent of the amount available for state programs shall be used by the department for state administrative expenses.

3. Eighty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated by the department to local educational agencies in this state, as local educational agency is defined in Pub. L. No. 100-297. The amount allocated under this subsection shall be allocated to local educational agencies according to the following percentages and enrollments:

a. Eighty percent shall be allocated on the basis of enrollments in public and approved nonpublic schools.

b. Twenty percent shall be allocated to those local educational agencies enrolling the greatest percent of disadvantaged children.

4. Funds appropriated in this section shall not be used to aid schools or programs that illegally discriminate in employment or educational programs on the basis of sex, race, color, national origin, or disability.

Sec. 9. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 24,584,274

The funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding \$2,458,427, or 10 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may be used for administrative expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be used for administrative expenses of the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights. Not more than \$179,966 shall be used for administrative expenses for the affordable heating program. From the total funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program, an amount sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of state shall bill the division of community action agencies for the costs of the audits.

3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in accordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, at least 15 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be used for low-income residential weatherization or other related home repairs for low-income households. Of this amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for administrative expenses.

4. An eligible household must be willing to allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs in order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving home energy assistance.

5. Of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, \$3,500,000 shall be used to fund the affordable heating program.

6. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution of energy problems.

Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 30,860,312

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-1397f, which provides for the social services block grant. The department of human services shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. Not more than \$1,734,720 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services for general administration. From the funds set aside by this subsection for general administration, the department of human services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

3. In addition to the allocation for general administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, for the following programs within the department of human services:

a. Field operations:

..... \$ 12,189,823

- b. Child and family services:
..... \$ 14,177,228
- c. Child care assistance:
..... \$ 1,317,735
- d. Local administrative costs and other local services:
..... \$ 1,170,281
- e. Volunteers:
..... \$ 123,441
- f. Community-based services:
..... \$ 147,084

Sec. 11. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop a plan for the use of federal social services block grant funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

1. The proposed plan shall include all programs and services at the state level which the department proposes to fund with federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify state and other funds which the department proposes to use to fund the state programs and services.

2. The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and services which are eligible to be funded with federal social services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social services block grant funds available for the local programs and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal social services block grant funds to the counties. The proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will be used to fund the local programs and services.

3. The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

Sec. 12. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health administration to provide mental health services for the homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities of the department of human

services shall assure that a project which receives funds under the formula grant from either the federal or local match share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless shall do all of the following:

1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and rehabilitation services.
2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health services and substance abuse services.
3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide services to persons targeted by the grant.
4. Provide case management to homeless persons.
5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain homeless persons living in residential settings which are not otherwise supported.
6. Projects may expend funds for housing services including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing, security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental payments to prevent eviction.

Sec. 13. JOBS CHILD CARE ENTITLEMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 3,346,421

Funds appropriated in this section are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5081, which provides for the JOBS child care entitlement block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated in this section as provided in

the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Sec. 14. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, and ending September 30, 1994, the following amount:

..... \$ 7,754,522

Funds appropriated in this section are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the child care and development block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated in this section as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

1. If the funds received from the federal government for the block grants specified in this Act are less than the amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than for the rape prevention program under section 4, subsection 3 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according to the percentages that each program is to receive as specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various programs for which the block grants are available.

2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those committees, and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau shall be notified of the proposed action.

b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and information on the reasons why particular percentages or amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the departments and programs affected, and other information deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action before the action is taken.

Sec. 16. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

1. If funds received from the federal government in the form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12, 13, and 14 of this Act, the excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs according to the percentages specified in those sections, except additional funds shall not be prorated for administrative expenses.

2. If funds received from the federal government from block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 9 of this Act, 15 percent of the excess shall be allocated to the low-income residential weatherization program.

3. If funds received from the federal government from community services block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 6 of this Act, 100 percent of the excess is allocated to the community services block grant program.

Sec. 17. PROCEDURE FOR CONSOLIDATED, CATEGORICAL, OR EXPANDED FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS.

1. Notwithstanding section 8.41, federal funds made available to the state which are authorized for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, resulting from the federal government consolidating former categorical grants into block grants, or which expand block grants included in Pub. L. No. 97-35, to include additional programs formerly funded by categorical grants, which are not otherwise appropriated by the general assembly, are appropriated for the programs formerly receiving the categorical grants, subject to the conditions of this section. The governor shall, whenever possible, allocate from the block grant to each program in the

same proportion as the amount of federal funds received by the program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, as modified by the 1993 Session of the Seventy-fifth General Assembly for the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1993, compared to the total federal funds received in the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, by all programs consolidated into the block grant. However, if one agency did not have categorical funds appropriated for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, but had anticipated applying for funds during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, the governor may allocate the funds in order to provide funding.

2. If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or expanded block grant is less than the total amount of federal funds received for the programs in the form of categorical grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, state funds appropriated to the program by the general assembly to match the federal funds shall be reduced by the same proportion of the reduction in federal funds for the program. State funds released by the reduction shall be deposited in a special fund in the state treasury and are available for appropriation by the general assembly. The governor shall notify the chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate chairpersons and ranking members of the subcommittees of those committees, and the legislative fiscal director before making the allocation of federal funds or any proportional reduction of state funds under this section. The notice shall state the amount of federal funds to be allocated to each program, the amount of federal funds received by the program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, the amount by which state funds for the program will be reduced according to this section and the amount of state funds received by the program during the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1992. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action before the action is taken.

3. If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or expanded block grant is more than the total amount of federal funds received for the programs in the form of categorical grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, the excess funds shall be deposited in the special fund created in section 8.41 and are subject to the provisions of that section.

The department of management and the department of revenue and finance may transfer from any unencumbered moneys in the health insurance premium reserve fund an amount sufficient to maintain the program funding levels until federal reimbursement is made available. Any amounts so transferred shall be returned to the source of the transfer on or before October 4, 1993.

Sec. 55. Sections 17 and 54 of this Act, being deemed of immediate importance, take effect upon enactment.
