

## DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

In Congress, July 4, 1776.

### THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

(Adopted by the Continental Congress July 2, and authenticated and proclaimed July 4, 1776.)

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident; that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such forms, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world:

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained, and, when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the repository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long time after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the state remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these states; for that purpose obstructing the laws of naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution and unacknowledged by our laws, giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation—

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us;

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states;

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world;

For imposing taxes on us without our consent;

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury;

For transporting us beyond seas, to be tried for pretended offenses;

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province; establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies;

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments;

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely parallel in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow-citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress, in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts, by their legislatures, to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity; and we have conjured them, by the ties of our common kindred, to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and consanguinity. We, must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connections between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor.

## THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

[Recommended by the convention of the states to congress Sept. 11, 1787, and by it submitted to the states for ratification, which by the concurrence of nine states, was consummated and proclaimed Sept. 13, 1788.]

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution for the United States of America.

#### ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives.

SEC. 2. (1)\* The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states; and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

(2) No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

(3) [Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons.]\*\*\* The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each state shall have at least one representative, and, until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

(4) When vacancies happen in the representation from any state, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

(5) The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

SEC. 3. (1) The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the legislature thereof for six years; and each senator shall have one vote.

(2) Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the legislature of any state the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

(3) No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

(4) The vice-president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided.

(5) The senate shall choose their other officers and also a president pro tempore, in the absence of the vice-president or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

\*The figures in brackets are inserted for convenience of reference; they are not in the original.

\*\*The foregoing clause included in brackets is amended by SEC. 2 of the 14th amendment, *post*.

(6) The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

(7) Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

Sec. 4. (1) The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof, but the congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

(2) The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Sec. 5. (1) Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

(2) Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

(3) Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

(4) Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

Sec. 6. (1) The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall in all cases, except treason, felony and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the sessions of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

(2) No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased, during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

Sec. 7. (1) All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

(2) Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate, shall, before it become a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law,

in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

(3) Every order, resolution or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SEC. 8. The congress shall have power:--

(1) To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and provide for common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.

(2) To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

(3) To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

(4) To establish a uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States.

(5) To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

(6) To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting and securities and current coin of the United States;

(7) To establish post offices and post roads;

(8) To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

(9) To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

(10) To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations;

(11) To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

(12) To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

(13) To provide and maintain a navy;

(14) To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

(15) To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

(16) To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States; reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by congress.

(17) To exercise exclusive legislation, in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of congress, become the seat of the government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards and other needful buildings; and--

(18) To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. (1) The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

(2) The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

(3) No bill of attainder or ex post facto law shall be passed.

(4) No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

(5) No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state.

(6) No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

(7) No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law, and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

(8) No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States; and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them shall, without the consent of the congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title, of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

SEC. 10. (1) No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

(2) No state shall, without the consent of the congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any state on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the congress.

(3) No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

## ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. (1) The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice-president chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

(2) Each state shall appoint in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and if no person have a majority then from the five highest on the list, the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the votes shall be taken by states, the representation for each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice-president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice-president.

[The foregoing clause has been superseded and annulled by the twelfth amendment, *post.*]

(3) The congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

(4) No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

(5) In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice-president, and the congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of the president and vice-president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed or a president shall be elected.

(6) The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States or any of them.

(7) Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the constitution of the United States."

SEC. 2. (1) The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion in writing of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

(2) He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint, ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for and which shall be established by law. But the congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

(3) The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions, which shall expire at the end of their next session.

SEC. 3. He shall from time to time give to the congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them and, in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper. He shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SEC. 4. The president, vice-president, and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

### ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior

courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services as compensation, which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

SEC. 2. (1) The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects.

(2) In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases, before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under regulations as the congress shall make.

(3) The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the congress may by law have directed.

SEC. 3. (1) Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

(2) The congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

#### ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SEC. 2. (1) The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

(2) A person charged in any state with treason, felony or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

(3) No person held to service or labor in one state, under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

SEC. 3. (1) New states may be admitted by the congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned as well as of the congress.

(2) The congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

#### ARTICLE V.

The congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing

amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; *provided* that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

#### ARTICLE VI.

(1) All debts contracted and engagements entered into before the adoption of this constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this constitution as under the confederation.

(2) This constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution of laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

(3) The senators and representatives before mentioned and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

#### ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the convention of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

Done in convention, by the unanimous consent of the states present, the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, and of the independence of the United States of America the twelfth. In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our names.

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

(Proposed by congress, and ratified by the legislatures of the several states, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution. For dates of ratification see foot note.\*)

#### ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or the

\*The first ten of these amendments were proposed by congress to the legislatures of the several states September 25, 1789, and were ratified by all of the

press; or of the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

#### ARTICLE II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

#### ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

#### ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

#### ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject, for the same offense, to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled, in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

#### ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

#### ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact, tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

#### ARTICLE VIII

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

states, except Connecticut, Georgia and Massachusetts, before the end of the year 1791, thereby becoming a part of the organic law, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution.

The eleventh amendment was in like manner proposed September 5, 1794, and was in a message of the president to congress, January 8, 1798, declared to have been duly ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states.

The twelfth amendment was in like manner proposed December 12, 1803, in lieu of the original third paragraph of the first section of the second article, and September 25, 1804, was proclaimed by the secretary of state to have been duly ratified.

The thirteenth amendment was proposed February 1, 1865, and was December 18, 1865, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fourteenth amendment was proposed June 16, 1866, and was July 28, 1868, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fifteenth amendment was proposed February 27, 1869, and was March 30, 1870, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The sixteenth amendment was proposed July 12, 1909, and was February 25, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The seventeenth amendment was proposed May 16, 1912, and was May 31, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

## ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

## ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people.

## ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

## ARTICLE XII.

SECTION 1. The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice-president, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice-president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president, and of all persons voted for as vice-president, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the person having the highest number, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice-president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

SEC. 2. The person having the greatest number of votes as vice-president shall be the vice-president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice-president; a quorum for that purpose, shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

SEC. 3. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice-president of the United States.

## ARTICLE XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

## ARTICLE XIV.

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president of the United States, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

SEC. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in congress, or elector of president and vice-president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in an insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each house, remove such disability.

SEC. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. The congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

#### ARTICLE XV.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. The congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

#### ARTICLE XVI.

The congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

#### ARTICLE XVII.

SECTION 1. The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

SEC. 2. When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

SEC. 3. This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the constitution.

#### ARTICLE XVIII.

SECTION 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

SEC. 2. The congress and the several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

SEC. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by the legislatures of the several states, as provided in the constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by congress.

#### ARTICLE XIX.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

SEC. 2 Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

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#### LAW AS TO PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION.

The presidential succession is fixed by chapter 4 of the acts of the Forty-ninth congress, first session. In case of the removal, death, resignation or inability of both the president and vice president, then the secretary of state shall act as president until the disability of the president or vice-president is removed or a president is elected. If there be no secretary of state, then the secretary of the treasury will act; and the remainder of the order of succession is as follows: The secretary of war, attorney-general, postmaster-general, secretary of the navy, and secretary of the interior. The acting president must, upon taking office, convene congress, if not at the time in session, in extraordinary session, giving twenty days' notice. This act applies only to such cabinet officers as shall have been appointed by the advice and consent of the senate, and are eligible under the constitution to the presidency.

## THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

## Historical Review

The name "State of Iowa" is the result of some interesting changes in the governmental history of the territory bearing the name. It is often claimed that the word "Iowa" was taken from the name of a tribe of Indians who had been and were still dwelling in that part when the first white men came, the "Ioway Indians"; but, it is more probable that it has been named for the Ioway River. The country was first referred to as a district,—the "Iowa District," in 1836, while still a part of the Wisconsin Territory. Two years later it was organized as an independent territory, the "Territory of Iowa." When it was admitted to the Union in 1846, it became the "State of Iowa."

The Iowa territory, as part of the whole Mississippi Valley, was taken into formal possession by France in 1682, as a result of the explorations of the Frenchmen Marquette and Joliet in 1673, the Hennepin, in 1680. In 1762 France ceded the western half of this valley, including Iowa, to Spain, who retroceded it to France in 1800. France ceded it to the United States in 1803, as a part of the Province of Louisiana.

Marquette and Joliet were the first explorers of the Iowa territory, going along the Iowa river as early as 1783. Beginning with the first year after its cession to the United States, explorers came quite frequently. The Lewis and Clarke expedition went through western Iowa in 1804; Zebulon M. Pike explored the west bank of the Mississippi in 1805; and Albert M. Lea explored the eastern portion of the state in 1835.

Iowa government began with the Louisiana purchase in 1803. For two years it was under the government of the Indiana Territory, as a part of the District of Louisiana. In 1805 the District of Louisiana was organized as the Territory of Louisiana, and in 1812 the Territory of Louisiana was reorganized as the Territory of Missouri. In 1821, the State of Missouri, then a part of the Territory of Missouri, was admitted to the Union, thus leaving Iowa a part of the unorganized territory of the United States without a constitutional status, in which condition it remained until 1834. From 1834 to 1836 it was attached to the Michigan Territory. When the Wisconsin Territory was organized in 1836 it became a part thereof.

In 1838 the Independent Territory of Iowa was established, on the fourth day of July. It then included a large part of the present state of Minnesota, which remained as Iowa territory until 1849 when the Minnesota Territory was organized, at which time Iowa received its present boundaries.

The Territory of Iowa was the ancient abode of the Sac, Ioway, Dakota and Fox tribes of Indians, and did not have any permanent settlers until 1833. The Indians refused permission to white settlers to come in to mine and farm, and the United States troops protected their rights until 1832. The Black Hawk War resulted in letting white men in, for its conclusion in 1832 resulted in the cession of thousands of square miles of the eastern part of Iowa. During the next few years, practically the whole of the Iowa territory was secured from them through treaties.

The frontiersmen rushed in to farm and mine. The population increased very rapidly with the influx of prospectors and homeseekers from all parts of the Union. During the ten years from 1836 to 1846 the increase in inhabitants was from 10,531 to 102,388.

Government was established among the early settlers by voluntary associations. They selected their own homes and began improving them, building huts and clearing and breaking the ground. "Claim associations" and "land clubs" were formed for the protection of their claims to the land they worked. These organizations were the only government they had and their proceedings were later recognized by the United States government.

The Act of Congress of 1838, entitled "an act to divide the territory of Wisconsin and to establish the Territorial Government of Iowa" gave the Territory of Iowa its constitution. Until the formation of the State in 1846, this Constitution was its fundamental law.

Iowa having separated from Wisconsin in 1838 for the want of sufficient courts for judicial relief, the question of applying for admission into the Union as a state was recommended as early as 1839. The first recommendation brought no result, and in 1840 the question of calling a constitutional convention was voted on by the people. It was defeated by a large majority, as it was again in 1842 by those who most wished to avoid an increase in taxes. In 1844, however, the vote was in favor of a convention. Application for a state government was made. The question of boundaries, a result of the question of slavery, held back its admission as a state until 1846, when on the 28th day of December it was admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the thirteen original states. It was the sixteenth state so admitted.

The first constitutional convention was convened at Iowa City, October 7, 1844. The constitution adopted by this convention was twice voted on and each time defeated in the year 1845.

At a second constitutional convention at Iowa City, May 4, 1846, a constitution was adopted by the convention, which was adopted by the people at an election held on the 3rd day of August, 1846, there being 9,462 votes cast "for the constitution," and 9,036 votes cast "against the constitution." This constitution was presented to Congress in December, 1846, and on the 28th day of the same month an act was passed for the admission of Iowa into the Union.

A third constitutional convention was authorized by the people by a majority of over eighteen thousand, for the purpose of revising and amending the constitution. At the November election, 1856, delegates to the convention were elected; and the convention met at Iowa City in January, 1857. The constitution adopted by this convention was adopted by the people at an election held on the 3d day of August, 1857, there being 40,311 votes cast "for the constitution" and 38,681 votes cast "against the constitution" and took effect by proclamation of the governor September 3, 1857. A copy of this constitution, taken from the original records, is contained herein.

The constitution of Iowa has been amended eight times since its adoption, all of which amendments are contained herein.

**PREAMBLE**

We, the people of the State of Iowa, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government, by the name of the State of Iowa, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, at a point due east of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines river, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river, to a point on said river where the northern boundary line of the State of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that state—adopted June 12th, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river; thence westwardly along the said northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux river, according to Nicollet's map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux river, according to said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes north latitude; thence east along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, thence down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi river to the place of beginning.

## ARTICLE I—BILL OF RIGHTS.

SECTION 1. All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

SEC. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

SEC. 3. The General Assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister, or ministry.

SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law, or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this state who may hereafter be engaged, either directly, or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the constitution and laws of this state.

SEC. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the general assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

SEC. 7. Every person may speak, write, and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the general assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

SEC. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life, or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

SEC. 11. All offenses less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a justice of the peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury, except in cases arising in the army, or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 12. No person shall, after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

SEC. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion, or invasion the public safety may require it.

SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the state in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

SEC. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 16. Treason against the state shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open court.

SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishment shall not be inflicted.

SEC. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.\*

SEC. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

SEC. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for a redress of grievances.

SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

SEC. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this state, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property, as native born citizens.

SEC. 23. There shall be no slavery in this state; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

SEC. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

## ARTICLE II—RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE.

SECTION 1. Every white\*\* male citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this state by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military or naval place, or station within this state.

SEC. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

SEC. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.†

## ARTICLE III—OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

SECTION 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the legislative, the executive, and the judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

## LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a general assembly, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 2. The session of the general assembly, shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the governor of the state shall, in the meantime, convene the general assembly by proclamation.

SEC. 3. The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of the respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November; and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.†

SEC. 4. No person shall be a member of the house of representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a free white male citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this state one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the county, or district he may have been chosen to represent.\*

SEC. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of representatives as to residence and citizenship.

SEC. 6. The number of senators shall not be less than one-third, nor more than one-half the representative body; and shall be classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one-half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

SEC. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

SEC. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and, with the consent of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the general assembly of a free and independent state.

SEC. 10. Every member of the general assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

SEC. 11. Senators and representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the General Assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

SEC. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the governor or the person exercising the functions of governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions, as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

SEC. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses shall be signed by the speaker and president of their respective houses.

SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the general assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to re-consider it; if, after such re-consideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two-thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the general assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the general assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the secretary of state, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

SEC. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the general assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the general assembly.

SEC. 19. The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SEC. 20. The governor, judges of the supreme and district courts, and other state officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under state; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the General Assembly may provide.

SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this state, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

SEC. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this state, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the general assembly; but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

SEC. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public moneys, shall have a seat in either house of the general assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this state, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

SEC. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

SEC. 25. Each member of the first general assembly under this constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no general assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

SEC. 26. No law of the general assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session, shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the general assembly by which they were passed. If the general assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the state.

SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the general assembly.

SEC. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this state; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

SEC. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

SEC. 30. The general assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for state, county, or road purposes:

For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;

For changing the names of persons;

For the incorporation of cities and towns;

For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;

For locating or changing county seats.

In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the state; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

SEC. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the general assembly.

SEC. 32. Members of the general assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm, (as the case may be,) that I will support the constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of senator, (or representative, as the case may be,) according to the best of my ability." And members of the general assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

SEC. 33. The general assembly shall, in the years one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, one thousand

and eight hundred and sixty-nine, and one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, an every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the white inhabitants of the state.\*

Sec. 34. The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white inhabitants in each.†

Sec. 35. The senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the house of representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the state, according to the number of white inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative; and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law, one-half of that number, or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereinafter be formed.‡

Sec. 36. At its first sessions under this constitution, and at every subsequent regular session, the general assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.§

Sec. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties. It shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

Sec. 38. In all elections by the general assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

#### ARTICLE IV.

##### EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The supreme executive power of this state shall be vested in a chief magistrate, who shall be styled the governor of the State of Iowa.

Sec. 2. The governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the general assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Sec. 3. There shall be a lieutenant governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the governor. In voting for governor and lieutenant governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as governor, and for whom as lieutenant governor. The returns of every election for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the state, directed to the speaker of the house of representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both houses of the general assembly.

Sec. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the general assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons governor, or lieutenant governor, as the case may be.

Sec. 5. Contested elections for governor, or lieutenant governor, shall be determined by the general assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the state, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

SEC. 7. The governor shall be commander in chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this state.

SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

SEC. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

SEC. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

SEC. 13. In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor shall have power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this state, execute the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

SEC. 15. The official term of the governor, and lieutenant governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for governor; and while presiding in the senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a senator, and none other.

SEC. 16. The governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting, when the general assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reason therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

SEC. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the lieutenant governor.

SEC. 18. The lieutenant governor shall be president of the senate, but shall only vote when the senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of governor, the senate shall choose a president pro tempore.

SEC. 19. If the lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the president pro tempore of the senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the officer of governor, the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the house of representatives.

SEC. 20. There shall be a seal of this state, which shall be kept by the governor, and used by him officially and shall be called the great seal of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the State of Iowa, sealed with the great seal of the state, signed by the governor, and countersigned by the secretary of state.

SEC. 22. A secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

#### ARTICLE V.—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the general assembly may, from time to time establish.

SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of three judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold court.

SEC. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the general assembly may prescribe. The judges of the supreme court so elected, shall be classified so that one judge shall go out of office very two years; and the judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be chief justice of the court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each judge of the supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The judges of the supreme court shall be ineligible to any other office in the state, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 4. The supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals throughout the state.

SEC. 5. The district court shall consist of a single judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the district in which he resides. The judge of the district court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of judge of the supreme court, during the term for which he was elected.

SEC. 6. The district court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 7. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the state.

SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

SEC. 9. The salary of each judge of the supreme court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each district judge, one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year eighteen hundred and sixty; after which time, they shall severally receive such compensation as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 10. The state shall be divided into eleven judicial districts; and after the year eighteen hundred and sixty, the general assembly may reorganize the judicial districts and increase or diminish the number of districts, or the number of judges of the said court, and may increase the number of judges of the supreme court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one district, or one judge of either court, at any one session; and no re-organization of the districts, or diminution of the number of judges, shall have the effect of removing a judge from office. Such re-organization of the districts

or any change in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.\*

SEC. 11. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each judge shall commence on the first day of January next after his election.

SEC. 12. The general assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an attorney general by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

SEC. 13. The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of district judge, elect a district attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.†

SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the general assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the courts of this state.‡

ARTICLE VI—MILITIA.

SECTION 1. The militia of this state shall be composed of all able-bodied white male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this state, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the general assembly may provide by law.§

SEC. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace: Provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

SEC. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia, (staff officers excepted,) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the governor.

ARTICLE VII—STATE DEBTS.

SECTION 1. The credit of the state shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the state shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 2. The state may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 3. All losses to the permanent, school, or university fund of this state, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the state. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the state, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.\*

SEC. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the state may contract debts to repel invasions, suppress insurrection, or defend the state

in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this state, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each county, if one is published therein, throughout the state, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

SEC. 6. The legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrevocable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

SEC. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

#### ARTICLE VIII—CORPORATIONS.

SECTION 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the general assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation the same as that of individuals.

SEC. 3. The state shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

SEC. 5. No act of the general assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

SEC. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the general assembly may also provide for the establishment of a state bank with branches.

SEC. 7. If a state bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

SEC. 8. If a general banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning, by an officer of state, of all bills, or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the state treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of states in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent below their average value in the City of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their average deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by

depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all of its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

SEC. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the billholders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payments by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

SEC. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the general assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the general assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

## ARTICLE IX—EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LANDS.

### *1st. Education.*

SECTION 1. The educational interest of the state, including common schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a board of education, which shall consist of the lieutenant governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the state.

SEC. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the state.

SEC. 3. One member of said board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this constitution, the board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

SEC. 4. The first session of the board of education shall be held at the seat of government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the general assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

SEC. 5. The session of the board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the board, the governor may order a special session.

SEC. 6. The board of education shall appoint a secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the board, and the laws of the state. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the general assembly.

SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the board shall be published and distributed to the several counties, townships, and school districts, as may be provided for by the board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

SEC. 8. The board of education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to common schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the school or university fund of this state; but all acts, rules, and regulations of said board may be altered, amended, or repealed by the general assembly; and when so altered, amended, or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the board of education.

SEC. 9. The governor of the state shall be, *ex officio*, a member of said board.

SEC. 10. The board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of moneys. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the general assembly.

SEC. 11. The state university shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the university fund shall be applied to that institution and no other.

SEC. 12. The board of education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the state, through a system of common schools and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

SEC. 13. The members of the board of education shall each receive the same per diem during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the general assembly.

SEC. 14. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of common schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the board shall be, "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 15. At any time after the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the general assembly shall have power to abolish or reorganize said board of education, and provide for the educational interest of the state in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

#### *2nd. School Funds and School Lands.*

SECTION 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the general assembly of this state.

SEC. 2. The university lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all moneys belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the state university. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said university.


SEC. 3. The general assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this state, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new states, under an act of congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several states of the union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent, as has been or may hereafter be granted by congress, on the sale of lands in this state, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the general assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of common schools throughout the state.

SEC. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several counties in which said money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of common schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the board of education shall from time to time provide.


SEC. 5. The general assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this state, for the use of the university, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall





be applied to the support of said university, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the general assembly as soon as may be, to provide effectual means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said university.

SEC. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same, that by law, receive and control the state and county revenue for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

SEC. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the general assembly.

#### ARTICLE X.—AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the general assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the general assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the general assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the general assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the constitution of this state.

SEC. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the general assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a convention for such purpose, the general assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such convention.

#### ARTICLE XI. MISCELLANEOUS.

SECTION. 1 The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend to all civil cases, (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise,) where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

SEC. 2. No new county shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the county of Worth, and the counties west of it, along the northern boundary of this state, may be organized without additional territory.

SEC. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last state and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SEC. 4. The boundaries of the state may be enlarged, with the consent of congress and the general assembly.

SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States, and of this state, and also an oath of office.

SEC. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 7. The general assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been, or may be granted by congress to this state, and the location of which may be given to the general assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupants, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred and twenty acres.

SEC. 8. The seat of government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law, at the city of Des Moines, in the county of Polk; and the state university at Iowa City, in the county of Johnson.

#### ARTICLE XII.—SCHEDULE.

SECTION 1. This constitution shall be the supreme law of the state, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The general assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this constitution into effect.

SEC. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment, in the same manner as they have been, had not this constitution been made.

SEC. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the state, or to any county therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the state, county, or school funds, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the state, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

SEC. 6. The first election under the constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, at which time the electors of the state shall elect the governor and lieutenant governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such state senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and the members of the house of representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the general assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

SEC. 7. The first election for secretary, auditor, and treasurer of state, attorney general, district judges, members of the board of education, district attorneys, members of congress and such state officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, (except the superintendent of public instruction,) and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except prosecuting attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight: *Provided*, That the time for which any district judge or other state or county officer elected at the April election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

SEC. 8. The first election for judges of the supreme court, and such county officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

SEC. 9. The first regular session of the general assembly shall be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by vote of the general assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this constitution, (except as in this constitution otherwise provided,) shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this constitution prescribed.

SEC. 12. The general assembly, at the first session under this constitution, shall district the state into eleven judicial districts, for district court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the general assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this constitution.

SEC. 13. This constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this state. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general election of the state, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the secretary of state, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of state officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this constitution are in favor of the same, the governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such constitution shall be the constitution of the state of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

SEC. 14. At the same election that this constitution is submitted to the people for its adopting or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "White" from the article on the right of suffrage shall be separately submitted to the electors of this state for adoption or rejection in the manner following—namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this constitution, then said word "White" shall be stricken from said article and be no part thereof.

SEC. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the county of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth judicial district of this state\*

#### PROCLAMATION

Whereas an instrument known as the "New Constitution of the State of Iowa" adopted by the constitutional convention of said state on the fifth day of March, A. D. 1857, was submitted to the qualified electors of said state at the annual election held on Monday the third day of August, 1857, for their approval or rejection.

And whereas an official canvass of the votes cast at said election shows that there were forty thousand three hundred and eleven votes cast for the adoption of said constitution and thirty-eight thousand six hundred and eighty-one votes were cast against its adoption, leaving a majority of sixteen hundred and thirty votes in favor of its adoption.

Now therefore I, JAMES W. GRIMES, Governor of said state, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me, hereby declare the said new constitution to be adopted, and declare it to be the supreme law of the state of Iowa.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the state of Iowa.

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

from 1857 to 1919

##### AMENDMENTS OF 1868

1.

Strike the word "white" from section 1 of article II.

2.

Strike the word "white" from section 33 of article III.

3.

Strike the word "white" from section 34 of article III.

4.

Strike the word "white" from section 35 of article III.

5.

Strike the word "white" from section 1 of article VI.

NOTE.—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1866: re-adopted by the general assembly of 1868; ratified at the election of November 3, 1868, and proclaimed adopted on December 8, 1868.

Sections 34 and 35 have been amended twice. The present amendment was adopted in 1904.

##### AMENDMENT OF 1880

1.

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1878; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1880; ratified at the election of November 2, 1880, and proclaimed adopted on December 3, 1880.

## AMENDMENT OF 1882.

1.

Add as section 26, to article I of the constitution, the following: No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1880; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1882, and ratified at a special election held on June 27, 1882, and certified adopted on July 28, 1882. On April 21, 1883, the supreme court in Koehler and Lang v. Hill, 60 Iowa 543, held that owing to certain irregularities the amendment was not legally submitted to the electors, and thence did not become a part of the constitution.

## AMENDMENT OF 1884.

1.

The general election for state, district, county and township offices, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

2.

At any regular session of the general assembly the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of the said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

3.

The grand jury may consist of any number of members, not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

4.

That section 13 of article V of the constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section.

Section 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter, elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

NOTE.—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1882; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1884; ratified at the election of November 4, 1884, and certified adopted on December 10, 1884.

## AMENDMENTS OF 1904.

1.

Add as section 16, to article XII of the constitution, the following:

SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, a lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators

whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

## 2.

That section thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, be repealed and the following be adopted in lieu thereof:

SEC. 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three-fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

SEC. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as herein before required.

NOTE.—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1902; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1904; ratified at the general election of November 8, 1904, and certified adopted on November 29, 1904. Section 16 is a new section.

## AMENDMENT OF 1908.

Add to section 18 of article I of the constitution the following: The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefitted thereby. The general assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1906; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1907; ratified at the election of November 3, 1908, and certified adopted on November 23, 1908.

## AMENDMENTS OF 1916.

Repeal section 7, article II and enact in lieu thereof the following:

SEC. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors. or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1913; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1915, and ratified on November 7, 1916.

AMENDMENT OF 1917.

That the following amendment to article one (1) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be and the same is hereby proposed: To add thereto following section twenty-six (26) thereof and as section twenty-seven (27) of article one (1) of said constitution the following, to-wit:

SEC. 27. The manufacture, sale, or keeping for sale, as a beverage, of intoxicating liquors, including ale, wine and beer, shall be forever prohibited within this state. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1915; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1917; defeated at the special election October 15, 1917.

Yes: 214,693; no: 215,625—932.

AMENDMENT PROPOSED 1919.

1.

Joint resolution proposing that section 1 of article II of the constitution be repealed, and the following enacted in lieu thereof, to-wit:

SECTION 1. Every citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one (21) years, who shall have been a resident of this state six (6) months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he or she claims his or her vote, sixty (60) days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

Resolved further, that the foregoing proposed amendment be, and the same is hereby referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election for members of the next general assembly, and that the secretary of state cause the same to be published for three (3) months previous to the day of said election as provided by law.

NOTE.—The general assembly was convened in special session on July 2, 1919, for the purpose of considering the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States providing that the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

Federal amendment ratified on said date which made further action on the "Amendment Proposed 1919" unnecessary.

At the general election on the second day of November, 1920, in pursuance of the law as found in section 1061 of the code and in article X, section 3 of the constitution of Iowa, there was submitted to the electors the following question:

"Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution and amend the same?"

Yes: 279,652; no: 221,763—57,889.

Thirty-ninth general assembly failed to provide for constitutional convention.

NOTE.—This amendment in substantially this form was proposed by the general assembly 1913; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1915; but was not adopted by the people. It was again proposed by the general assembly of 1917, but was not published as provided by Sec. 1 of Art. X of the constitution and sec. 55 of the code of Iowa, which caused its second defeat. The present amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1919.

\*\*Thomas M. Bowen was born in Demoin County, Territory of Michigan, October 26, 1835. He was one of the earliest students at Iowa Wesleyan College at Mount Pleasant. He was elected representative from the counties of Wayne and Decatur in the Sixth General Assembly while still a minor, becoming of legal age before the Legislature convened December 2nd. He voted with the Democratic party for William F. Coolbaugh for United States Senator against James Harlan. He became Captain of a company raised in Page County, Iowa, May, 1861, which became a part of the First Nebraska Regiment. Later he became Colonel of the Thirteenth Kansas Regiment, which regiment he raised. He was breveted Brigadier-General in 1864. He was a delegate to the National Convention in Baltimore from the State of Kansas which renominated Lincoln. After the war he became a resident of Arkansas and was president of the Constitutional Convention and later a Judge of the Supreme Court. He was appointed by President Grant, Governor of the Territory of Idaho. He later moved to Colorado where he was chosen a district judge, a member of the state legislature and was elected and served as United States Senator from 1883 to 1889. He died at Pueblo, December 30, 1906.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor, whose term of office is two years. He receives an annual salary of \$5,000 and an allowance of \$600 for house rent, and \$1,200 for services as member of the executive council.

No person shall be eligible who shall not have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which expires at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation and shall state to both houses when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have convened.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor has power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

All bills must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutation and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reason therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgments of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the requests of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

#### LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR

*Term of incumbent ends January, 1925.*

JOHN HAMMILL, Britt, Hancock County, Born in Wisconsin.

The lieutenant-governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the governor. He does not give bond.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the lieutenant-governor, for the residue of the term, or until the governor shall be acquitted, or the disability removed.

The lieutenant-governor is president of the senate, but can only vote when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and double the per diem of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building during the meetings of the general assembly.

The secretary of state is the head of the department of state. He is elected by the people for a term of two years, and receives a salary of \$4,000 a year. He is ex officio a member of the executive council. He is also ex officio a member of the board of trustees of the state library and the historical department of Iowa, of the state board of health, and of the state printing board.

The secretary of state countersigns all commissions and proclamations issued by the governor, and keeps a record thereof in the executive register.

The enrolled copies of the constitution and the laws of the state, the authenticated copies of the journals of the senate and house of the general assemblies, and many other legislative and state papers are filed in his office. He prepares for publication certain laws and resolutions passed by the general assembly, and is charged with the work of distributing the codes, code supplements and session laws.

Certificates of nomination and all papers and records pertaining to the nomination, election and qualification of state and district officers are filed in his office.

All papers relative to the incorporation of cities and towns, the annexation or severance of territory, and the consolidation or abandonment of municipal corporations are transmitted to him and preserved as a part of the permanent records of his office.

Articles of incorporation of both domestic and foreign corporations, as well as all amendments thereto, are filed and recorded in his office, and certificates of authority to transact business within the state of Iowa are issued by him. Applications for the registration of trade-marks, labels and forms of advertising are made to him and certificates issued thereon.

He compiles the Iowa Official Register, and is required by law to place therein historical, political and other statistics and facts of general value, but nothing of a partisan character.

The records, files, field notes and plats of survey, and other papers and documents of the state land office are in his custody. Patents for school, university, agricultural college, railroad, swamp and other lands, are prepared in the land office, and, when signed by the governor, are countersigned by the secretary of state and recorded in the patent record books in the land department. He makes a biennial report to the governor of the transactions of this department.

Iowa corporations organized for pecuniary profit, and all foreign corporations authorized to do business in this state, are required to report annually, in July, to the secretary of state and pay him an annual fee of one dollar each. The secretary of state is required to send, during May and June of each year, to each corporation of record in his office, a notice, advising as to the provisions of the law, and a blank for use of the corporation in making report. On receipt of annual report and fee, the secretary of state is required to issue to the corporation an annual permit.

The registration in the office of the secretary of state is required to be made of all charitable organizations soliciting public aid in the state and a permit must first be procured from his department before any such organization, its agents or representatives may lawfully solicit public donations in any county, city, or township in Iowa except within the county or adjoining counties in which such association or institution is located.

An important branch of the work in the office of the secretary of state is that relating to the administration of the so-called Blue Sky Law, the same being an act passed by the thirty-sixth general assembly to prevent fraud in the sale and disposition of stocks, bonds and other securities.

A record of the registration of motor vehicles is also kept by him.

The auditor of state keeps the accounts between the state and the United States, or any state, public official or person; makes settlement of accounts with county treasurers and receivers of state revenues; keeps accounts of all revenues, funds and income of the state and of all disbursements; settles accounts with public debtors for debts due the state; settles claims against the state treasury; superintends and enforces payment of moneys payable into the state treasury; superintends the fiscal affairs of the state and furnishes forms for reports to be made by county officials to the state; issues all warrants on the state treasurer of money directed by law to be paid out of the treasury; has custody of all books, securities, bonds, etc., pertaining to the fiscal affairs of the state, where such are not required to be kept in some other office; reports to the governor biennially as to the revenues, funds, income, taxable property, also as to expenditures and estimates expenditures for the biennial period following; makes apportionments of interest on the permanent school fund among the counties and directs the payment of the proceeds of escheats estates to the school fund.

The auditor of state also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, as well as having supervision of companies selling bonds on the installment plan, and building and loan associations; he appoints the building and loan examiners, the county examiners, and the examiners of municipal accounts. All reports by any of the companies or associations above named are made to him, all fees, except fees for incorporation, are paid to him, and all deposits required by law of any such companies or

associations to be made with the state are deposited in the auditor's office. None of the companies or associations named can transact business in the state until they have received a certificate of authority from the auditor.

In addition to the above he is a member of the executive council of the state, which body constitutes the board of assessment and review and also has general supervision of the state's business, and is also a member of the state printing board, the geological board and ex-officio member of the state board of health. He is also ex-officio secretary of the state board of audit.

The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department; books are kept in which are recorded the names of all persons from whom money for any purpose is received, the time received, the purpose for which the money was remitted, and the amount thereof. Receipts in duplicate are issued for each item received, and the duplicate is filed with the state auditor. When remittance of state dues is made by bank draft, check or certificate of deposit, such draft, check or certificate must be deposited for collection in some bank in the city of Des Moines which has been previously designated as a depository for state funds, and no receipt for any sum remitted by check or draft can be issued by the treasury department until the depository receiving the deposit notifies the department of the collection thereof. All county treasurers, auditors and superintendents of schools required to remit to the state treasury, on or before the 15th of each month, all state moneys received by them during the preceding calendar month.

All state officers elective or appointive, all boards, commissions, and departments except the department of agriculture shall remit within three days after receipt of any moneys or fees and furnish a statement showing the source from which received and the fund to which it is to be credited.

The treasurer of state with the consent of the executive council, may designate banks in the city of Des Moines as depositories of state funds. Each bank so designated shall give bonds to be approved by the executive council, and shall pay interest on daily balances at such rate and at such times as may be agreed by the banks and the treasurer of state, with the approval of the executive council. At this time such depositories pay interest monthly at the rate of two and one-half per cent per annum.

Disbursements from the state treasury are made only upon warrants issued by the state auditor and a record is kept of each warrant paid, showing date of issue, date of payment, to whom paid and upon what account drawn. During the last biennial period warrants amounting to \$52,353,683.49 passed over the counter of this department and were paid. All accounts of each state institution under the board of control are paid by checks issued by this department in favor of the person to whom the account is payable. These accounts are not paid until after they have been audited by the board of control and an abstract of the total amount due on account of each institution and the names and post office addresses of the persons to whom each of the several accounts are payable has been forwarded to this department by the board of control, together with a warrant or warrants of the auditor of state to cover the total amount to be paid. The state treasurer is the custodian of the permanent endowment fund of the state agricultural college. This fund amounts to about \$680,000 and is loaned at not less than five per cent, secured by first mortgages upon real estate in Iowa. The interest only may be used by the college. This interest is payable to the state treasurer and is by him paid to the treasurer of the college. The receipts of the state of Iowa from all sources, as shown by the books of this department, for the fiscal period ending June 30, 1922, are \$46,536,658.97 and are as follows: Mileage taxes from county treasurer, \$19,708,131.65; motor vehicle, \$10,542,653.44; from state officials and commissions, \$3,460,321.18; refunds from state institutions, \$1,331,685.53; collateral inheritance tax, \$1,348,384.80; miscellaneous sources, \$4,687,576.73. (See Treasurer's Biennial Report for details.) The accounts of the department are examined by some one appointed from the governor's office and one from the auditor's office, four times per year, and may be examined by the governor at any time.

The fortieth general assembly passed an act consolidating into one department, to be known as the state department of agriculture, the following administrative agencies of state and the laws governing same to wit:

1. The former department of agriculture with all its statutory activities and duties, except such as relate to the state fair.
2. The dairy and food department and all the administrative agencies connected therewith.
3. The animal health commission and veterinary department and all their administrative agencies.
4. The petroleum inspection service and hotel license and inspection, and all matters pertaining thereto.
5. State horticultural society.
6. Iowa corn and small grain growers' association.
7. Iowa beef and cattle producers' association.
8. Iowa state dairy association.
9. The state weather and crop service.
10. Iowa state poultry association.

Also the office of secretary of agriculture was created, whose duties are in addition to any other duty which may be prescribed by law:

1. To encourage, promote and advance the interests of agriculture, including horticulture, live stock industry, dairying, cheese making, poultry raising, bee keeping, forestry, production of wool, and other kindred and allied industries.

2. To promote and devise methods of conducting said industries with the view of increasing production and facilitating an adequate distribution of the same at the least cost to the producer.

3. To compile statistics and information, in cooperation with the federal government, relative to crop production, farm economics, the production and marketing of beef, pork, mutton, wool, poultry, milk, butter, cheese and all other agricultural products, insofar as such statistical information may be deemed of value to agriculture and its allied interests in the state, which statistics, when published, shall constitute the official agricultural statistics of the state.

4. To cooperate with the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts in all ways that may be beneficial to the agricultural interests of the state.

5. To include in his compilation and publication, the reports of agriculture, horticultural, live stock associations and other like associations or societies organized for the promotion of the agricultural interests of the state.

The attorney general is elected for a period of two years.

It is the duty of the attorney general to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the governor, executive council or general assembly or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all causes in the supreme court in which the state is a party or interested.

The attorney general is given supervisory power over county attorneys and in a general way looks after the enforcement of the law over the entire state.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the general assembly, or either house thereof, the governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, and other state departments.

It is also his duty to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

In addition to the above the attorney general is chairman of the state board of law examiners, whose duty it is to examine and pass upon the

qualifications of all applicants for admission to the bar. He is a member of the state printing board created by the thirty-ninth general assembly. He is also the chief of the bureau of investigation and information designed for the purpose of co-ordinating law enforcement in the state.

The state board of law examiners was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly which went into effect on the 4th day of July, 1901.

The attorney general is, by virtue of his office, chairman of the board, and the other members are appointed by the supreme court.

The members of the board are paid as compensation fifteen dollars per day out of the fund arising from examination fees. Under the statute the supreme court may also appoint from time to time, when necessary, temporary examiners to assist the commission, who shall serve for one examination only.

Every applicant for admission to the bar must pass an examination by the board as to his legal attainments, and also as to his preliminary educational qualifications, unless he furnishes proof of such qualification by presenting a diploma or certificate that he is a graduate of a college, high school, normal school or academy, or that he has regularly and in good faith pursued and successfully completed four years of the regular course of an accredited high school, or the certificate of the state board of educational examiners that he has successfully passed an examination by that board, or the certificate of the president of the state university or of any college in this state having an equivalent collegiate or liberal art study, that he has been found on proper certification or examination to be entitled to admission, without condition, as a student of such university or college, for which admission the applicant must have actually and in good faith acquired a general education substantially equivalent to that involved in the completion of a high school course of study of at least four years extent.

If the applicant fails to pass the examination he may not take a second examination within three months after such failure. Each applicant is required to pay an examination fee of five dollars, and one dollar for his certificate of admission.

*The work of the Department of Public Instruction.* The duties of the superintendent of public instruction may be classified as educational quasi-judicial, and ex-officio.

*Educational.* Among the duties of an educational nature may be named her general supervision over the county superintendents of the state, which necessitates her meeting with these officers at least twice each year, and the publication of numerous circulars of instruction and suggestion. She is at the head of the public school system of Iowa, and her duties as such leader are to appoint institutes, and approve institute faculties. She is required by law to promote among the people of the state a proper interest in the general subject of education, including industrial and commercial education, agriculture, manual and vocational training, domestic science and continuation work. Also to classify and define various public schools belonging to her department, and to formulate suitable courses of study therefor, and to publish and distribute such classifications and courses of study. It is also her duty to collect statistics, and report on education, and educational questions, and the condition of the public schools of the state, and to publish them in reports and pamphlets. Among the publications that have become a part of the educational needs of the state and are of national note may be named: The Manual of Methods for the Elementary Schools of Iowa, Special Day Book, Educational Directory, Proceeding of the Iowa State Teachers' Association, Standards for Approved Graded and High Schools, Reference Books for the Approved High Schools of Iowa, Outlines in Agriculture, Domestic Science and Manual Training, Outlines of Psychology and School Management, Outline of Music for Normal Training High Schools and Normal Training Courses in Four Year High Schools, and Iowa Day. Many others of minor importance on various subjects are published.

In order to aid her in organizing and classifying the public schools of the state, the superintendent of public instruction is permitted by law to appoint one normal training inspector, two graded and high school inspectors, and one inspector of rural and consolidated schools. She is also empowered to distribute to the normal training schools and the consolidated schools certain aid which is set aside for these schools under certain conditions. It is her duty to pass upon them finally, and to determine what schools shall receive state aid.

For the purpose of increasing the facilities for training teachers for the rural schools by requiring a review of such common branches as may be deemed essential by the superintendent of public instruction, and for instructions in elementary pedagogy, and the art of teaching elementary agriculture and home economics, provision is made for normal courses of study and training in such approved four-year high schools as the superintendent of public instruction may designate.

She reports biennially to the governor on the conditions of the public schools of the state, and makes suggestions and recommendations as investigation and experience dictate.

*Judicial.* The quasi-judicial duties of the superintendent of public instruction include the hearing of appeals from the decisions of county superintendents, the rendering of opinions, in writing, when requested by school officials (but in fact opinions are rendered to all who request them) and publication of the school laws and notes on the same, and pamphlets containing session laws.

*Ex-officio duties.* The superintendent of public instruction is *ex-officio* member of the Iowa library commission, president of the educational council, president of the educational board of examiners and president of state board of vocational education.

As executive of the educational board of examiners, a great amount of responsibility is incurred since all licenses to teach are issued under authority of this board, and the work is conducted under her personal supervision.

The board of educational examiners consists of four members *ex-officio* and three members appointed by the governor for a term of four years. Of the appointive members, one must be a woman and one a representative of the privately endowed colleges of the state maintaining teachers' training courses. The nineteenth general assembly created the board of educational examiners by legislative enactment which went into effect March 24, 1882. The board originally consisted of five members. The thirty-seventh general assembly added the president of Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts to the members *ex-officio*; the thirty-ninth general assembly added the representative of privately endowed colleges.

A board for the examination of teachers was created December 20, 1861, composed of the members of the faculty of the state university. Of this board the professor of the normal department of the state university and the secretary of the board of trustees were *ex-officio* chairman and secretary. It issued life certificates to graduates of the normal department of the state university and to holders of first grade state certificates of other states without examination; it also issued certificates upon examination. This board was abolished by the adoption of the code of 1873. The certificates issued by it are still valid licenses for teaching in the public schools of the state.

The statute provides that the board of educational examiners shall meet at such times and places as the president shall direct. It is the practice to have five meetings a year.

All teachers' certificates are issued by the board of educational examiners. There are three series of certificates, viz., (1) state diplomas and state certificates, (2) high school normal training certificates, (3) uniform county certificates.

State certificates are issued upon (1) graduation from accredited Iowa colleges; (2) graduation from colleges and normal schools of other states which meet the Iowa standard; provided the applicants file proofs of two years' successful teaching; (3) state certificates of other states which meet the Iowa standard; (4) examination. The state diploma is issued only upon examination.

High school normal training certificates are issued upon graduation from approved normal training high schools and examination.

Uniform county certificates are issued only upon examination.

The board of educational examiners makes regulations for the granting of certificates to graduates of the regular and collegiate courses of the state university, the state teachers' college, and the state college of agriculture and mechanic arts, and determines what other colleges and normal schools are entitled to like recognition.

The statute makes it a duty of the board of educational examiners to prepare and publish a list of books suitable for rural school libraries, from which list the library committee of all rural schools must make selection when purchasing books for their libraries.

The commissioner of insurance is the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa and has direction of all insurance business transacted in the state and the execution of laws relating to insurance. All powers vested in, and all duties imposed upon the auditor of this state, relating in any way to insurance matters prior to July 1, 1914, were on that date vested in and made incumbent upon the commissioner of insurance.

The commissioner is authorized to conduct examinations of insurance organizations transacting business in the state domestic companies, associations and societies are required to be so examined at least biennially. The companies are visited and the audits made in their offices.

All deposits required by law to be made with the state by any such company, association or society, are directly in charge of the commissioner and a careful record is kept thereof, showing each item. A daily record and monthly balance is maintained, showing the amount of securities on deposit to the credit of each company. Each security deposited is carefully examined and, before acceptance, must comply with the statutes governing investment of insurance funds. The companies and associations are required to keep their deposit up to the amount prescribed by law. No company or association is permitted to withdraw securities sufficient to bring the amount below the reserve required to be maintained on deposit. The amount of approved securities representing capital stock and the legal reserve value of policies of Iowa life companies and associates on deposit in this department on January 1, 1923, was \$169,792,435.72.

All fees due the state from insurance companies and associations are paid to the commissioner of insurance and turned over to the treasurer of state and placed in the general funds.

The commissioner passes upon the articles of incorporation of new insurance organizations. He has entire control over the organization of new insurance companies in the state. No policies can be sold in the state until the policy forms have been approved by him, and all agents appointed by the companies and associations to represent them in the state must be licensed by the insurance department.

The superintendent of banking is the head of the banking department of Iowa and has general control, supervision and direction of all banks and trust companies incorporated under the laws of Iowa, and he is charged with the execution of the laws of the state relating to banking.

The deputy superintendent and bank examiners are appointed by the superintendent of banking. The number of examiners and employes is regulated by the number of banks. One examiner to each one hundred banks or major fraction thereof and one clerk to each two hundred banks or major fraction are allowed by law. The banking department is self-supporting, and the total of salaries and expenses is not permitted to exceed in any one year the amount of fees collected from banks and trust companies by the superintendent.

The clerk of the supreme court shall have an office at the seat of government, keep a complete record of the proceedings of the court, file all printed matter and papers in pending cases, issue writs, orders and executions to carry out the directions of the supreme court, announce by mail to one of the attorneys on each side any ruling made or decision rendered, record every opinion rendered as soon as filed, and allow no opinions filed to be removed except by the reporter.

Every applicant for admission to the bar shall make application, under oath, and upon the form prescribed by the board of law examiners, which will be furnished by the clerk of the supreme court, \* \* \* and shall file his appli-

cation with the clerk of the supreme court. Each applicant shall pay to the clerk of the supreme court an examination fee of \$5.00. The members of the board of law examiners shall be paid \$15 each for each day spent in conducting examinations, such compensation to be paid by the clerk of the supreme court out of funds in his hands derived from fees of candidates for admission. A record of all admissions to the bar is kept by the clerk of the supreme court.

Each applicant for examination for shorthand reporter shall pay to the clerk of the supreme court as an examination fee the sum of \$5.00. The fees thus paid shall be retained by the clerk as a special fund for paying the fees and expenses incident to the examination of candidates for shorthand reporters.

The powers and duties of the board of railroad commissioners are: To generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical conditions, conduct and management of such railroads and report their condition to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to pass on necessity for spur tracks to be constructed and maintained not exceeding three miles in length to an existing industry under terms and conditions approved by the commission as set out by law; to make reasonable rules for the crossing of steam and interurban railways and to require, when necessary, interlocking switches at railroad crossings; to make report on first Monday in December in each year to the governor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied with appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate, and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any

such corporation; to examine under oath employes of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission is prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable maximum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates; unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before a railroad company may appropriate coal, coke or oil received for shipment, it must first secure the written consent of the railroad commission.

Before any railway company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the board must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used, consent of the board must be obtained.

The thirty-fifth general assembly gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale, or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power, or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes over, along and across any public land, highways or streams or the lands of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time, prescribe."

The board is directed by an act of the thirty-ninth general assembly to "undertake and carry forward such investigation and preparation as shall be necessary to properly represent the interests of the state in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission."

The thirty-ninth general assembly authorized the railroad commission upon application to them to issue to any warehouseman a license for the conduct of a bonded warehouse under the provisions of chapter 119, laws of the thirty-ninth general assembly, and such rules and regulations as might be made thereunder.

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the board of railroad commissioners for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subjects to the approval of the board of railroad commissioners. The duties of the office briefly are as follows:

#### DUTIES OF COMMERCE COUNSEL

The legal advisor of the board of railroad commissioners. To investigate and present matters with reference to interstate rates to the board of railroad commissioners, prosecute the same before said board, or to any court to which same may be taken. To investigate on his own motion, or at the request of the board, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested, and present the same to the interstate commerce commission and prosecute same to the final determination. To act as attorney for and represent the board of railroad commissioners in all courts of this state or of the United

States, in which the validity of any order of said board is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary to the proper enforcement of any rule or order of said railroad commissioners or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be called in question.

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa, are the following: to purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for state departments and officers; the execution of contracts for fuel, lights, repairs, blanks books; the approval of articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plan for liquidation of said associations; the custody of paper and supplies for state officers and commissions; the assessment of railway, express, sleeping and equipment car, telegraph and telephone properties; the classification of railways; the making of tax levies for state purposes and the certification of the same to the several county auditors; the certification of tax valuations, fixed by the executive council, to the several county auditors; the adjustment of property valuations between counties; the canvass of votes cast for state and district officers; the compilation of a state census once in ten years (next 1925); the declaration of changes in classification of cities; the compilation and publication of annual reports of (a) railway, express, sleeping and equipment car assessments, (b) telegraph and telephone assessments and (c) of the biennial report of expenses of all state departments; the determination of the territory outside of Iowa in which Iowa life insurance companies may loan money; the making of annual settlement with all state officers, under section 161-a of the supplement to the code 1913; the assignment of office rooms to state officers in capitol building; the appointment of the board of examiners of mine inspectors; the approval of bonds by depositories of state funds; the fixing of reserve lists of state documents and publications and the approval of requisitions for documents and publications within said reserve list; to dispose of state documents which the state librarian, curator of historical department and curator of law department may certify are not required for state uses; to approve rules for uniformity of assessments in counties; to approve claims for the expenses of collection of inheritance taxes and for the repayment of such taxes when wrongfully paid; the approval of plans for buildings at the state educational institutions, under certain conditions; to determine the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and the amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof; the development of the capitol grounds extension. The secretary of the executive council is also (after July 4, 1923) secretary of the board of conservation and of the board of engineer examiners.

CUSTODIAN

The thirty-ninth general assembly adopted an act providing that the executive council shall appoint a custodian of public buildings and grounds, and in conformity with said act the executive council adopted a resolution whereby the secretary of the executive council was to assume the duties of custodian.

The state board of audit was created by the thirty-sixth general assembly and is composed of the auditor of state, the attorney general or one of his assistants, and the secretary of the executive council.

It is the duty of this board to audit all claims except those for salaries of various officers which are fixed by law and claims on account of the institutions under the control of the board of control of state institutions and the state board of education. Before approving any claim it is the duty of this board to determine that such claim is fully and clearly authorized by law; that the officer, board, commission, department or executive council empowered to authorize the creation of the claim has granted or authorized the same and has certified the fact to the board of audit; that all the legal requirements have been observed, including notice and competition, if required by law; that the claim is in proper form and duly verified and that the charges are reasonable, proper and correct.

The board is authorized and directed to formulate such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary to enable it to determine: that services charged for were actually performed; the time necessary devoted to such service and the exact and necessary expenses incurred in the performance thereof. The board will require information relative to any and all other matters which will aid it in performing its duties and protecting the interests of the state, and may require a strict compliance with said rules before auditing any claim.

This department was established in 1913 by legislative act. It has jurisdiction in the matter of adjusting claims for personal injury arising out of and occurring in course of employment where the same is not agricultural, clerical, domestic or casual. The deputy commissioner is invested with full authority of administration in the absence or disability of the commissioner. In case of controversy arbitration is resorted to, each party in interest appointing an arbitrator, the commissioner or deputy acting as chairman of the committee. Appeal may be taken from the decision of the arbitration committee to the courts under statutory limitation. Employers not under insurance are definitely excluded from the provisions of the act. With the approval of the insurance and industrial commissioners employers may be authorized to carry their own risks upon satisfactory financial showing. The department has a standing appropriation of \$20,000 annually.

The staff of the commander-in-chief consists of an adjutant general, with rank of brigadier general, who is chief of staff and acting quartermaster general, an assistant adjutant general, with rank of major, and twelve aids who have the rank of lieutenant colonel, except that any person so appointed, who has held a higher rank for a period of one year or more in the guard may be appointed with the rank of the highest rank so held by him, or the twelve aids may be detailed for such service from the active membership of the guard, but if so detailed they hold their rank in the guard and shall perform the duties of aid in addition to their regular duties.

The adjutant general is appointed by the governor. He issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all the general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military

force and his duties. He holds office for a period of four years, first period starting July 4, 1915, and also performs the duty of quartermaster general in addition to his duties as adjutant general. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes and receives and issues all quartermaster and ordnance stores and camp equipage upon the order of the commander-in-chief. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the general assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of this office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the organized militia are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers of the Civil and Spanish-American wars are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia are given by him under the seal of the state. He is the disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the organized militia and as acting quartermaster general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the militia, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the organized militia of the state as the secretary of war may from time to time require. As chief of staff he is to perform his duties as such officer as directed by the commander-in-chief or required by the laws of Iowa governing its organized militia or by orders and regulations.

In addition to the duties above defined, the adjutant general also has the direction of the compilation of the roster for soldiers, sailors and marines in the Mexican border service of 1916-1917, and the World's war, 1917, 1918 and 1919, and other historical data in connection with the World's war. The thirty-eighth general assembly in passing H. F. 362, provided for a commission to be known as the "War Roster Commission" to consist of the governor as chairman, and the adjutant general as member and disbursing officer. The thirty-eighth general assembly appropriated \$20,000.00 for the estimated work, but it was found necessary to request the thirty-ninth general assembly to appropriate \$15,000.00 additional, and it now becomes necessary to request \$12,000.00 additional from the fortieth general assembly, which it is hoped will carry the work to the publication period. The adjutant general, under the provisions of the bonus law, becomes a member of the bonus board, consisting of the state auditor, the state treasurer, the adjutant general, and the adjutant of the Iowa department of the American Legion.

The adjutant general is chairman of the armory board appointed by the governor to fix the armory and other allowances for the national guard units with the state. This board is composed of the following named officers:

The statutes of Iowa provide the sentence of a prisoner convicted of a felony shall be for the maximum term provided for the crime committed; thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the time of confinement. The board of parole is given authority to release on parole outside the prison, all prisoners, except those sentenced for life terms. Rules and regulations are provided which must be observed by the man while on parole, and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison.

The board of control of state institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the twenty-seventh general assembly which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the following named institutions:

Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown; Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport; Institution for Feeble Minded Children at Glenwood; State Sanatorium for the Treatment of Tuberculosis at Oakdale; Training School for Boys at Eldora; Training School for Girls at Mitchellville; Mount Pleasant State Hospital at Mount Pleasant; Independence State Hospital at Independence; Clarinda State Hospital at Clarinda; Cherokee State Hospital at Cherokee; Hospital for Female Inebriates at Mount Pleasant; State Penitentiary at Fort Madison; Men's Reformatory at Anamosa; Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City; State Hospital and Colony for Epileptics at Woodward; State Juvenile Home, Toledo; Hospital for Male Inebriates at Independence.

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept, associations and societies receiving friendless children and detention homes provided for juvenile offenders.

Prior to July 1, 1898, the foregoing state institutions, except the reformatory and penitentiary were in charge of separate boards, each of which had its officers and each had a secretary and treasurer.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control. At that time the various boards of trustees and commissioners cease to exist.

The board publishes quarterly a bulletin, devoted to the scientific investigation of the treatment of insanity and epilepsy and the feeble minded, and information embodying the experience of soldiers' homes, charitable, reformatory and penal institutions in this and other counties.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial condition of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some members of the board or its agent is also required to visit each hospital once each month. It is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to publish a bulletin, to require official bonds of certain institution officers, to make a semi-annual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to appoint a state architect and perform other duties provided by law.

#### IOWA SOLDIERS' HOME—MARSHALLTOWN

The United States government pays to the state of Iowa the sum of \$120 per year for each male inmate of the soldiers' home who served in any war in which the United States was engaged, which amount is used as a part of the support fund of the institution. Persons who have sufficient means for their own support may be admitted to the home on payment of the cost of their support, if there be room, but pension money received by any member of the home from the United States government may not be taken from him for his support in the home. The regular appropriation by the state is \$28 per month for each member, and \$15 per month for each officer and employe not a member of the home.

#### IOWA SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME—DAVENPORT

There is in connection with this institution a school building. A kindergarten is operated for young pupils. The age limit beyond which children are not kept in the home is sixteen years. Fewer than 20 per cent remain to the age limit. A library of well selected juvenile literature is maintained. Much of the clothing of the children is manufactured at the home, the large girls assisting in its manufacture. The table is supplied with a good variety of plain, wholesome food and a reasonable amount of luxuries. The home is supported by a regular appropriation of \$25 per month for each child and the actual transportation charges of children to and from the institution. Each county is liable to the state for the support of its children to the extent of \$12.50 per month, except soldiers' orphans, who are cared for at the expense of the state.

#### INSTITUTION FOR FEEBLE MINDED CHILDREN—GLENWOOD

There is a regular appropriation for this institution of \$21 per month for each inmate. The purpose or objects of this institution are to provide special methods of training for the class of children deficient in mind or marked with such peculiarities as to deprive them of the benefits and privileges provided for children with normal faculties. The object is to make each child as nearly self-supporting as practicable, and to approach as nearly as possible the movements and actions of normal people. It further aims to provide a home for those who are not susceptible of mental culture, relying wholly on others to supply their simple wants.

## TRAINING SCHOOL FOR BOYS—ELDORA

## TRAINING SCHOOL FOR GIRLS—MITCHELLVILLE

There is appropriated for the support of these schools the sum of \$24.00 monthly for each inmate at Eldora and Mitchellville.

The object of the institutions is the reformation of juvenile delinquents. They are not prisons but compulsory educational institutions where wayward boys and girls are brought under the influence of Christian instructors and taught by example, as well as precept, the better ways of life and where the moral, intellectual and industrial education of the child is carried on at one and the same time.

Any boy or girl over ten and under eighteen years of age, excepting married women, prostitutes, or any girl who is pregnant, found guilty in any court of record of any crime excepting that of murder, may be ordered committed, if a boy to the school at Eldora, and if a girl to the school at Mitchellville. Any boy or girl may be discharged, or paroled from the school, at any time after one year's training, upon satisfactory evidence or reformation. They may also in exceptional cases be paroled or discharged in less than one year.

## MT. PLEASANT STATE HOSPITAL

The manufacture of chairs and work shirts at the penitentiary and butter tubs and aprons at the reformatory, has given employment to about 600 men, with very satisfactory results.

On July 1, 1909, the management and control of the State University, the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, and the Iowa State Teachers' College was assumed by the Iowa state board of education. This board consists of nine members, who are appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate, under the provisions of an act of the thirty-third general assembly, approved by the governor March 29, 1909. By chapter 141 of the acts of the thirty-fourth general assembly, the college for the blind was placed under the control of this board, and the thirty-seventh general assembly transferred the supervision of the school for the deaf from the board of control of state institutions to the state board of education. Under the provisions of the law, not more than five members of the board may be members of the same political party; and not more than one alumnus from each of the institutions may be members of the board. As required by the act, three of the members of the board were appointed for two years, three for four years, and three for six years. Subsequent appointments on the board, except to fill vacancies, are to be for terms of six years. Offices at the seat of the state government are to be furnished the board by the executive council, and the board also maintains an office at each of the institutions. Members of the board are not required to give bond; and they are to receive a compensation of ten dollars per day for the time actually employed in the performance of their duties not exceeding sixty days in any one

year, and are also allowed traveling expenses. The board is required to have four regular meetings each year and may hold additional ones on the call of the president or secretary. The duties of the board as set out in the act are as follows:

Sec. 4. The state board of education shall have power to elect a president from its members; a president and treasurer for each of said educational institutions, and professors, instructors, officers and employes; to fix the compensation to be paid to such officers and employes; to make rules and regulations for the government of said schools, not inconsistent with the laws of the state; to manage and control the property, both real and personal, belonging to said educational institutions; to execute trusts or other obligations now or hereafter committed to the institutions; to direct the expenditure of all appropriations the general assembly shall, from time to time, make to said institutions, and the expenditure of any other moneys; and to do such other acts as are necessary and proper for the execution of the powers and duties conferred upon them by law. \* \* \*

Members of the board choose, from outside their own membership, a finance committee of three members, not more than two of whom shall be members of the same political party. Each member of the finance committee receives a compensation of thirty-six hundred dollars a year, and serves for three years unless sooner removed by the board. The board designates one of the finance committee as chairman and one as secretary, and the secretary of this committee also serves as secretary of the board. The secretary has charge of the general offices and of all books and papers of the board at the seat of government. The members of the committee, in addition to their salaries, are entitled to mileage and necessary expenses. Each member of the finance committee is required to file a bond in the sum of \$25,000, which is to be approved by the governor. The members of the finance committee are required to visit each of the institutions once a month, and to familiarize themselves with the work there being done.

## ORGANIZATION

An act of congress, July 20, 1820, authorized the secretary of the treasury to set apart and reserve from sale of lands in the territory of Iowa funds for the use and support of a university to be established when Iowa should become a state. In 1846 Iowa was admitted to the Union with a constitution which provided that the general assembly should take measures to care for the lands granted and for the application of the income to support the university. In accordance with this provision the first general assembly on February 25, 1847, passed an act establishing and locating at Iowa City a state university. The capitol building and the land upon which it stood were donated to the university in view of the contemplated removal of the seat of government from Iowa City. Delay in removing the capitol prevented the opening of the institution until March, 1855. The organization of departments began in the same year. From 1858 until 1860, owing to the lack of funds, the normal department was the only one in operation, and the university was reorganized in 1860. The law department was established in 1868, the medical department in 1870, the dental department in 1882, the department of pharmacy in 1885, the graduate college in 1900, the college of applied science in 1905, the college of education in 1913, and the college of commerce in 1921. In the course of the evolution of the university the various departments became, and now are, colleges.

From 1847 to 1870, the management of the university was in the hands of trustees, elected throughout most of the period by the legislature. In 1870 the legislature substituted a board of regents consisting, aside from ex-officio members, of one member from each congressional district. In 1909, pursuant to an act of the thirty-third general assembly, the control of the state university of Iowa, together with that of the Iowa state teachers' college and the Iowa state college of agriculture and mechanic arts, passed into the hands of a state board of education.

The state university of Iowa is an integral part of the public school system of the state. As contemplated in its establishment, the work of the university is based upon the preparation afforded by the duly accredited high schools of the state, whose students are admitted to the undergraduate and professional courses upon the presentation of the proper certificates—except in the colleges of medicine and law, which require two years, and the college of dentistry which requires one year of collegiate work in preparation. The state, through the university, undertakes to furnish instruction in the various branches requisite for an education in the liberal arts, law, dentistry, pharmacy, fine arts, nursing, commerce, etc. It also aims to encourage research work in all departments.

The Graduate College united the university's equipment for advanced study and research, its courses beginning where the courses in the other colleges end. It offers work leading to the degrees of M.A., M.S., and Ph.D.

The College of Liberal Arts is the center around which the university has grown. It offers upwards of six hundred liberal and vocational courses in the arts and sciences, these courses leading to the degree of B.A. or B.S., the latter only in connection with combined courses in liberal arts and professional studies.

The College of Law offers a course of three years leading to the degree of LL.B. For admission two years of study in a liberal arts college are required.

The College of Medicine offers a course of four years leading to the degree of M.D. The college is recognized by the American Medical Association in "Class A." Two years of liberal arts study are required for admission.

The College of Dentistry offers a course of four years leading to the degree of D.D.S. The college is recognized by the Dental Faculties Association of American Universities in "Class A." One year of liberal arts study is required for admission.

The College of Pharmacy offers a two years' course leading to the degree of Ph.G.; a three years' course leading to the degree of Ph.C.; and a four years' course leading to the degree of B.S. in Pharmacy.

The College of Applied Science offers courses in civil, sanitary, mechanical, electrical, chemical, and general engineering. These are each of four years and lead to the degree of B.E. Five-year and six-year courses are also arranged. Advanced degrees are given in C.E., M.E., etc.

The College of Education unites the various faculties of the university for the training of teachers, with special reference to administrative work and the higher positions. Its courses lead to the degree of B.S. in School Supervision.

The College of Commerce offers courses leading to the degree of B.S. in Commerce.

The School of Nursing is conducted in the university hospitals under the college of medicine, and affords a scientific and practical training in nursing.

The School of Public Health Nursing is organized under the college of medicine and includes also work in the college of liberal arts and the graduate college.

The School of Music is a part of the college of liberal arts. It offers courses in piano, voice, pipe organ, violin, band instruments, and in the history and theory of music, leading to the degrees of B.A. and B.M.


The Summer Session of two terms, one of six, the other of five weeks, is a regular session of the university. The session also includes the Iowa Lakeside Laboratory and the School for Library Training.

"Combined Courses" in Liberal Arts and professional studies permit the attainment in a shortened period of the double degrees of B.S. or B.A. and M.D.; B.A. and LL.B.; B.S. and D.D.S.; B.S. and B.E.; and D.D.S. and M.D.




OLD CAPITOL—UNIVERSITY OF IOWA, IOWA CITY










GLIMPSES OF GOOD ROADS IN IOWA

and electric power, engineering economics and others. The results have been published in more than fifty-eight bulletins for free distribution. Any of these bulletins not out of print will be sent free upon request addressed to Director Anson Marston, Engineering Experiment Station, Ames, Iowa.

The station has given special attention to water supply, sewerage and lighting for farm homes.

Many notable contributions to engineering science have been made by the engineering experiment station. Some of these which are of special value to Iowa are as follows:

The discovery of the true theory of loads on drain tile and sewer pipe, making possible the safe construction of large tile drains to reclaim wet lands.

The discovery of the true theory of loads on pipe culverts, invaluable to large Iowa industries and to Iowa road improvement.

The discovery of a reliable practical method of making good concrete from Iowa gravels without preliminary screening and the wastage of a considerable percentage.

The discovery of the amounts of saving in fuel consumption effected by changing earth road surfaces to gravel or paving.

These discoveries are saving the state millions of dollars.

#### VETERINARY INVESTIGATIONS

C. H. Stange, Dean.

This work was organized under provisions made by the thirty-fifth general assembly. Considerable information concerning hemorrhagic septicemia in cattle has been secured, a serum produced and a number of herds treated. Other diseases have been studied and much time has been given to hog cholera and complications of this disease.

#### EXTENSION WORK

R. A. Pearson, President.

The extension work of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts is divided into two branches—agricultural extension and engineering extension.

#### AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION

R. K. Bliss, Director.

The agricultural extension work was established permanently by enactment of the thirty-first general assembly. This act provided for the dissemination of information concerning agriculture and home economics.

The thirty-fifth general assembly passed an act which authorized the incorporation in each county of the state of an association for the advancement and improvement of agriculture and domestic science to define the powers and rights of such association and its members and to provide for appropriations by boards of supervisors. As amended by the thirty-eighth general assembly, farm bureaus receiving county funds must be organized to co-operate with the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts.

The thirty-sixth general assembly accepted the provisions of the Federal Smith-Lever Act passed by the congress of the United States in 1914 and providing federal aid for agricultural extension work in the state.

Extension work is now so organized that it reaches every community in the state.

#### ENGINEERING EXTENSIONS

D. C. Faber, Director.

The thirty-fifth general assembly of Iowa provided an appropriation for the establishment of trade school and engineering extension work. Two-year courses in trades and industry are conducted at the college for young men wishing to prepare themselves for expert positions in industrial lines. Short courses of instruction and technical institutes are conducted in industrial centers. Technical information is supplied municipalities and civic organizations. Bulletins of information are issued from time to time. The visual instruction service furnishes educational slides and films. Correspondence courses are offered in trade and industrial subjects.

## HOG-CHOLERA SERUM PLANT

C. H. Stange, Director.

This work was started under an appropriation of \$35,000 made by the thirty-fifth general assembly for the production of biological products, especially hog-cholera serum. The law provides the plant shall be used for veterinary investigations except in cases of emergency.

## STATE APIARIST

Appointed by the State Board of Education. Term at pleasure of board. Appropriation \$1,500 annually.

F. B. Paddock, of Ames, Story County.

By an act of the thirty-seventh general assembly of Iowa, the state board of education was authorized to appoint a state apiarist to work under the supervision of the director of agricultural extension and professor of entomology of Iowa State College. Previous to July 1, 1917, the duties of this office were carried by the inspector of bees, who was appointed by the governor.

It is the duty of the apiarist to give lectures and demonstrations in the state of Iowa on the production of honey, the care of the apiary, the marketing of honey, and upon other kindred subjects relative to the care of bees and the profitable production of honey. Also, upon request the apiarist shall examine the bees in a locality suspected of being affected with any of the contagious diseases common to bees. It is the duty of the apiarist to furnish the owner of the bees, without cost, written instructions in regard to the nature of the diseases and the best methods of treating it. It is a misdemeanor of anyone to fail to properly take care of a colony of diseased bees or in other ways cause the spread of contagious diseases among bees.

The state apiarist also is required to make an annual report to the governor, stating the number of apiaries visited, number of demonstrations held, number of lectures given, the number of examinations made upon the request of the bee-keepers, together with such other matters of general interest concerning the business of bookkeeping.

This institution was founded in 1876 as a school for the instruction and training of teachers for the public schools. It used the title of Iowa State Normal School from 1876 to 1909 and since that time the title Iowa State Teachers College was authorized by an act of the general assembly. It is a college in its standards as to graduating with a degree from its courses, though it admits and instructs teachers and grants diplomas of special varieties for all classes of teachers, rural and elementary, needed by the public schools. For admission to college courses, graduation from an accredited high school is required. For admission to sub-collegiate courses and rural teachers work an elementary education is required. For information regarding courses and organization of the institution see another page in this publication.

The institution is organized to give teacher education and training and does not undertake any other kind of educational work. Its courses are planned to give efficiency and capability to the students as workers in public schools. Its

A gymnasium provides means of physical exercise for both boys and girls. The boys maintain football, basket ball and base ball teams, each in its season, providing for plenty of outdoor recreation. The girls also have gymnastic training and maintain basket ball teams, while the tennis club furnishes additional sport for both sexes. All of these activities are under the direct supervision of competent instructors.

The school is non-sectarian in character, but moral and religious instruction is provided, the nature of the instruction being general, such as is accepted by all churches and creeds. The pupils are allowed to attend the places of worship in the city designated by their parents.

#### INDUSTRIAL TRAINING

Vocational training is also provided and instruction given in the following: Printing, sign painting, carpentry, shoemaking, gardening and baking to the boys; sewing, dressmaking, embroidery, weaving, cooking and domestic science to the girls.

#### TERMS OF ADMISSION

Children 5 years of age and upward may be received from any part of the state and persons over 21 up to 35 are admitted under special conditions. All are educated in the school at the expense of the state. Tuition, board, lodging and medical attendance, including nursing, in ordinary sickness, are provided by the school. Stationery and necessary school books are also furnished.

In case parents are unable to provide railroad fare and other expenses, provision is made to secure such support from the county.

The regular time of admission is at the commencement of the term, which is about the middle of September. Upon application, new pupils will be received at other times. The summer vacation begins about the middle of June and extends to about the middle of September. A recess is given at Christmas. Special exercise and change of program characterize the celebration of the legal holidays during the school term.

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#### IOWA COLLEGE FOR THE BLIND—VINTON

Superintendent, Francis Eber Palmer; physician, J. E. Luckey, M.D.; and visiting ophthalmic surgeon, L. W. Dean, M.D., state university.

The aim and purpose of the Iowa College for the Blind is purely educational. The course of study includes not only the subjects required for admission to the colleges and the university of the state, but also subjects that aim to prepare our students for some of the occupations in which it has been demonstrated that the blind are usually successful. After a pupil of this school reaches the high school department, he is given some latitude in the choice of courses of study, and in the making of his choice he always has the guidance and advice of teachers and matrons. However, the courses are so arranged that a student who chooses one course, say one of the vocational courses of study, has the benefit of subjects in other courses. In fact, both literary and industrial work is required of all students.

In the music department, students are given the opportunity for thorough training in piano, violin, organ and voice; and in order to graduate from this department pupils must satisfactorily complete courses in harmony, harmonic analysis, musical history and staff notation, besides having as his major either piano, organ, voice or violin, requiring at least two hours practice a day. In addition to the major work, the student must take minor work along some other line offered in the department.

In the industrial department the girls are given work as follows: sewing, cooking, crocheting, tatting, hammock-making, basket weaving, rug and carpet weaving both plain and art, and chair caning. The boys are given work as follows: broom-making, chair caning, rug and carpet weaving both plain and art, hammock-making, and piano tuning.

In the commercial department all students in the seventh and eighth grades are required to take typewriting; two years of typewriting are also offered in the high school department. In the high school department this is combined with dictaphone practice.

There is a well equipped hospital in connection with the school where a trained nurse is on duty during the entire time that the students are in attendance. Three or four times a year an eye specialist from the State University Hospital visits the College for the Blind for the purpose of examining the pupils and giving such advice and aid as he finds needful. The college physician visits the school as often as needed on account of sickness. Thus the health of all pupils is well guarded.

A well equipped gymnasium is another asset to the work that the school is trying to do for the blind boys and girls of the state. Here all pupils, unless excused by the college physician, have at least an hour of gymnasium work each day, under a competent director.

Board and room and tuition are free to all boys and girls of the state who are eligible, and, where necessary, clothes also are furnished. The blind or those whose eyesight is so defective as to make work in the public schools impracticable, and who are of suitable age and capacity, that is between the ages of seven and twenty-one years are eligible. Others are sometimes admitted on the approval of the board of education. Boys and girls who are decidedly subnormal are not admitted.

The school year begins the first Wednesday of September and closes the last week of May.

## IOWA STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION

## COMMISSIONERS

William Collinson, Chariton, Iowa, chairman; James W. Holden, Scranton, Iowa; Dean Anson Marston, Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa.

By the act of the thirty-fifth general assembly, creating the highway commission, the Dean of Engineering of the Iowa State College is ex officio a member of the commission. The other two members are appointed from different political parties for a term of four years.

The two commissioners appointed by the governor receive as compensation \$10.00 per day not to exceed two hundred days per year. The ex officio member of the commission receives no additional compensation. All members receive actual traveling expenses. Terms begin July 1st.

The highway commission was first established in Iowa under chapter 105, acts of the thirtieth general assembly, which constituted the Iowa State College as an institution to act as the highway commission for the state. From 1904 to 1913 the work was carried on under this law.

The thirty-fifth general assembly reorganized the entire system of road administration in the state and created a commission of three men as outlined above. The office of the commission is located at the Iowa State College and the duties prescribed by the law are such that an extensive organization is necessary. Under the law as amended by the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh general assemblies, the duties of the commission are as follows:

First. To devise and adopt plans of highway construction suited to the needs of the different counties of the state.

Second. To disseminate information and instruction to road officers of the state.

Third. To issue an annual report to the governor relative to the operations of the commission.

Fourth. To appoint such assistants as are necessary to carry on the work of the commission.

Fifth. To make investigations as to conditions of road and bridge work in the counties.

Sixth. To have general supervision over the county and township officers in the state and enforce the provisions of the road law.

Seventh. To devise plans and conduct negotiations between railroad and public officials for the elimination of danger at railroad crossings.

Eighth. To assist county boards of supervisors and the attorney general in the defense of patent suits.

Ninth. To have charge of the survey and administration of meandered lakes.

Tenth. To prepare plans and specifications for federal aid road projects and to supervise the construction and maintenance of same.

Under the laws of the thirty-eighth general assembly, the commission is charged with the duty of making all surveys, plans, and specifications, and the supervision of construction work on the primary road system, and of giving general supervision to the maintenance of the said primary road system.

## COMPENSATION

The members of the board receive \$900 per year and traveling expenses for services as members of the state board of health, medical examiners, embalmers, nurses and optometry. The sanitary engineer, who is also a member of the board receives the sum of \$2,500 per year, and necessary traveling and incidental expenses. The secretary receives \$3,000 per year, the assistant secretary \$1,500 per year; chief clerk \$1,500 per year; the director of the bacteriological laboratory receives his compensation from the state university.

The state board of health has a general supervision of health matters and has power to make rules and regulations respecting the public health and declare that such rules and regulations when made shall have the force of legislative enactments.

The board through local boards of health establishes, maintains and releases quarantine; requires the disinfection of persons and premises exposed to contagion; supervises through its sanitary engineer the installing of water works systems, the construction of sewerage systems, and makes sanitary surveys through the sanitary engineer and the state laboratory of the board located at

the state university, Iowa City. It investigates into the causes of diseases and issues to the people of the state instructions relative to the prevention of transmissible diseases and how to correct insanitary conditions in general which may exist in any part of the state.

The board also supervises the examination and registration of licensed embalmers. In connection with this work the board has adopted rules and regulations for the transportation of the dead so that bodies, dead of infectious diseases, may be so prepared as to be shipped without interference or danger to any point in the United States, Canada, Mexico or Cuba. The rules for the shipment of corpses are the same in the countries just mentioned.

The board also supervises the examination, and licenses those who desire to practice nursing as registered or graduate nurses.

It is required to make rules and regulations for the inspection of petroleum products; to determine the manner and methods, and to prescribe the instruments and apparatus to be used for the government of inspectors. It is the duty of the state board of health, to examine lamps and apparatus to be used, as shall be presented to such board, and test said lamps or apparatus, and if it shall find any lamp or apparatus to be safe, said board shall enter the findings of the board upon the records of the proceedings of said board. It is further made the duty of the board to fix a standard of purity of oils and other illuminating materials to be used in mines and to establish regulations for testing the same, and when so determined and established shall be recognized by all of the courts of this state.

It is the duty of this board to dispose of unclaimed bodies by directing to what medical college of the state such bodies shall be sent for anatomical purposes.

In addition to the above specified duties the board supervises the disinterment, burial and transportation of all dead bodies within the state and keeps a record of such disinterments and burials.

The board also has a thoroughly equipped and up-to-date bacteriological laboratory at Iowa City, in connection with the state university, where upon short notice tests are made to determine the presence of tuberculosis, typhoid fever, diphtheria, rabies, etc., and where the best methods of disinfection are determined.

The physicians of the board of health and its secretary are constituted the members and secretary of the board of medical examiners and as such, determine the standing of medical colleges, examine their graduates, and license those who pass satisfactory examinations as physicians and osteopaths, with authority to refuse to issue certificates and to revoke those issued under certain specified conditions and the board also issues certificates on reciprocity with other states and is authorized to grant itinerant licenses.

#### STATE BOARD OF HEALTH LABORATORY

The thirty-ninth general assembly, in providing for the state hygienic laboratory, made an appropriation of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) annually or so much thereof as may be necessary for the salary of the director, assistants and the running expenses of the laboratory.

At the first meeting of the state board of health following the passage of chapter 101, acts of the thirtieth general assembly, it was decided at that time, on account of limited funds, a great deal of work which the laboratory should do in the interests of the public health must be postponed, and that the work of the laboratory must be limited to the routine diagnostic work in connection with diphtheria, typhoid fever, tuberculosis and rabies. Because of the action of the thirty-ninth general assembly, in appropriating fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) annually, the laboratory is able to do more and better work than formerly.

Examinations are held in June and at such other times as may seem necessary. Correspondence relating to practice of medicine or osteopathy should

be sent to the secretary of this board. Every person practicing medicine or osteopathy in the state is required to secure a certificate from this board. Every physician or osteopath itinerating within the state is required to procure a special license. The board is authorized to issue two classes of certificates; *first to physicians*, and *second to osteopaths*.

Undertakers and coroners are required on or before the 5th day of each month to return to the state registrar certificates of death that have come under their professional or official notice for the month preceding. Clerks of district court report, on forms prescribed by the registrar, all marriages and divorces recorded in their respective offices, and the city. Births are reported by attending physicians, midwives and the people in general, to the clerk of court of the county wherein they occurred.

The board consists of three optometrists appointed by the governor from a list of registered optometrists recommended by the Iowa State Association of Optometrists and one physician member of the state board of health appointed by the governor. The secretary of the state board of health acts as secretary of this board.

The terms of all members of the board are for one year and expire June 30th each year. The members of the board receive \$5 a day for time actually employed. They also receive necessary traveling expenses. The fee for examination is \$15. Applicants are required to possess certain qualifications before they are admitted to examination. The act creating the board does not apply to merchants or dealers who sell glasses as merchandise and who do not profess to be optometrists.

The State Board of Agriculture was created by legislative enactment of the twenty-eighth general assembly in the year 1900.

The law creating the board provides for a state agricultural convention to be held at the state capitol on the second Wednesday in December of each year. The delegates to this convention consist of the officers and members of the State Board of Agriculture, the president and secretary of each of the county or district fairs. In counties where there are no county or district fairs, the board of supervisors may appoint a delegate. The president or an accredited representative of the following organizations: The State Horticultural Society, the State Dairy Association and each farmers' institute organized according to law and receiving state aid.

The convention elects the president and vice president for a term of one year. The directors are elected for a term of two years. The directors from the even numbered districts are elected the even year and those from the odd numbered districts the odd year. The secretary and treasurer are elected annually by the board. The law fixes the compensation of the president, vice president and directors at ten dollars per day and expenses while in attendance at board or committee meetings.

An act of the fortieth general assembly relieved the board of all duties conferred upon them by the original law with the exception of the management of the Iowa State Fair.

By statute the State Board of Agriculture is made custodian of the state fair grounds and the board of managers for the annual exposition.

The state makes no regular appropriations for the maintenance of the state fair grounds and buildings or for the operating expense of the fair. Special appropriations totaling \$685,000 have been made since 1902 for the construction of permanent buildings, additional land and other improvements. During this same period approximately \$680,000 from the receipts of the state fair have been expended for permanent buildings and other improvements on the grounds. The inventory shows the present value of the grounds and buildings to be worth \$1,583,580.

Title to the grounds and all property is held in the name of the state of Iowa.

The general assembly in 1884 provided for the creation of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the appointment of a commissioner, defining his duties, and his tenure of office. The work as outlined was purely statistical and was designed for the purpose of making inquiry into the conditions surrounding the employment of labor, its connection with the development of industries both mechanical and those arising from the natural resources of the state, the advantages and inducements offered in various localities for the establishment of desirable industries, the extent and productive value of industries already established and information relative to the home life and general welfare of the workers.

The inspection of factories, mercantile establishments, theaters, buildings, etc., embracing employment of over a half million workers, is one of the most important services the bureau renders to the state.

Under jurisdiction of the Bureau of Labor are laws relating to health and safety in factories, work shops, mercantile establishments, theaters, etc., the fire escape law, child labor law, inspection of employment bureaus, both public and private, arbitration and conciliation, report of accidents.

Another service of the bureau is that rendered by the State Free Employment Bureau. Through co-operation of the state and federal governments, under direction of the Iowa commissioner of labor, the State-Federal Employment Service referred 49,158 applicants to jobs, of whom 39,368 were actually placed, during the biennial period ending June 30, 1922.

The office of state fire marshal was created by an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly. The principal duties of the fire marshal are to investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring in the state; to determine if any building or structures, by reason of want of proper repair or by reason of age and dilapidated conditions, are especially liable to fire and to order their repair or removal; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month and instruct the pupils at least four times a year in the causes and dangers of fires; to make an annual report to the governor. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the fire marshal

suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the state fire marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire he shall cause such person to be arrested. Reports are required to be made to the fire marshal by all chiefs of fire departments of each and every fire, and where there is no established fire department the report is to be made by mayors and by township clerks outside of incorporated cities and towns. An appropriation of \$18,300 a year is provided for defraying the expenses of the office.

The Iowa Library Commission was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly in March, 1900. Two years later the Traveling Library previously under the State Library was transferred to the commission.

The executive officer of the commission is the secretary who also bears the title of director of library extension. The activities of the commission consist (1) of the work of extension and supervision carried on by the secretary assisted by the organizer.

This consists of help given by personal correspondence and visits in the inaugurating of library projects and the arousing of interest in the submission of the question of tax support in communities without public libraries, and of advice and help in the selection of building plans, equipment and furniture, books, etc.

The second activity of the commission is the Traveling Library which is made up of fixed groups of 50 volumes each for general reading by adults and children. These groups become small libraries in the communities to which they go.

The work of publication includes the Iowa Library Quarterly, leaflets, lists and other material helpful in giving library information and increasing the reading of good books throughout the state.

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The accession list of the general, law and legislative reference departments of the state library on the first day of July, 1922, included 177,864 volumes. The total accessions of the biennial period ending June 30, 1922, were 14,906 volumes. The historical department is separately reported. The mission of the general library as a reference is that of a final report for information in science, the mechanic arts, the fine arts, biography, general history, literature and philosophy. A legislative reference bureau has been developed during the past few years, and the use made of the new bureau by legislators, legislative committee clerks and other persons interested in legislation has steadily increased. Annual appropriations for the several departments are as follows: The general library, \$6,000; the historical department, \$6,000; law department and legislative reference bureau, \$6,000.

The medical department has an appropriation of \$2,000 for librarian's salary and \$2,000 for books, periodicals, etc. This department has been in operation for two years with a trained medical librarian in charge, and with about 5,000 volumes of books and periodicals on its shelves. By the utilization of traveling library methods of reaching remote localities, and in other ways the department is serviceable to the medical profession.

This department has more than made good. Physicians, surgeons and medical students from all parts of the state, have availed themselves of its books and periodicals, and additional assistants are necessary to enable the librarian to respond to the many demands made upon its resources.

## GENERAL

This department dates from the first day of July, 1892. Its chief purpose is the collection of historical data relating to Iowa and the territory of the middle west.

The department publishes the Annals of Iowa, an illustrated quarterly historical magazine of eighty pages. It is made up largely of original contributions in history and biography, most of which relate to Iowa and her people. It is sent free to every organized library in our state. Its price to subscribers is \$1 per year.

In addition to the Annals the Historical Department is to be credited with the following publications: thirteen biennial reports; "John Brown Among the Quakers and Other Sketches," by Hon. Irving B. Richman; "First Census of the Original Counties of Dubuque and Des Moines," edited by Dr. Benj. F. Shambaugh; "History of the Constitution of Iowa," by Dr. Shambaugh; Reprints of the laws of Iowa, 1838-39 and of 1839-40, and the hitherto unpublished journals of the council and house of representatives of the extra session of 1840; "Early Settlement and Growth of Western Iowa," by Rev. John Todd; "Rafinesque, Life and Biography," by T. J. Fitzpatrick; "Downing's Civil War Diary," by Alexander G. Downing, and "Iowa Authors and their Works," by Alice Marple. Miss Marple has also assisted in and has sponsored the following publications: "Index of Vols. 1-8 of Annals of Iowa," "Iowa Authors and Their Works," 2d edition, 359 pp.

The department has secured 164 oil portraits of distinguished Iowans, which are now on exhibition in the art gallery of the historical building, and has thousands of photographs and other black and white portraits and exhibits. In addition to these the department has acquired or accounts for the original cartoons of J. N. Darling, a collection of autograph letters, etc., from the presidents, noted men of letters, artists, etc., numbering over 5,000 items, and over 3,000 half-tones of Iowa citizens and historic scenes.

Original manuscripts of noted Iowa men and women are another feature of the historical department work and the collection of Senator Allison, Hon. John F. Lacey, Governor Kirkwood, Judge Horace E. Deemer and General Grenville M. Dodge are only a part of the collections.

Since January, 1918, the department has engaged in assembling original materials relating to the contribution of Iowa in the late war and the collections, aimed at complete and authentic facts, have invaluable material upon the following phases:

1. A biographical census record of men and women serving their country during the world war.
2. Iowa's honor roll, records and pictures.
3. Iowa's decorated men and women, records and pictures.
4. Navy records.
5. Council of Defense activities.
6. Red Cross activities.
7. Pictures, souvenirs and relics of World War Veterans.

Special efforts are made to collect works of state and general western history, biography and genealogy; works on the histories of all our wars from the earliest times; works relating to the North American Indians; county histories, maps, Iowa pamphlets, biographies of our noted men and women, printed or in manuscript; written or printed documents relating to early settlers and settlements; reports, catalogues and broadsides relating to the churches, educational and benevolent institutions of the state; in short every species of data which can throw light upon local state or western history.

#### MUSEUM DIVISION

The museum includes nine large cases for autograph letters, manuscripts, portraits, etc.; a collection of recent, aboriginal and prehistoric pottery found in our state; a large collection of pre-historic implements, hundreds of flints; many teeth, tusks, and other bones of the mammoth and mastodons, all of which were found in Iowa, many of the larger specimens being of recent discovery. Several large cases of birds found within our state, including all the larger birds such as eagles, pelicans, loons and wild turkeys, etc.; many Iowa mammals including the moose, buffalo, elk, deer, wolves, foxes; a case of Indian baskets, bead work, implements and weapons, many of which were manufactured by the Musquakie Indians of Tama County; a collection of arms—cannons, mortars, swivel guns, rifles, muskets, carbines, swords and pistols, in use during the Civil, Spanish, Philippine and World Wars; and duplicates

in bronze of most of the historic medals issued by the United States government. All the work of mounting of the birds and mammals is done in the department by the taxidermist, who is also the museum director.

## NEWSPAPER DIVISION

Special efforts are made to collect Iowa newspapers from the earliest dates to the present time. Three hundred weeklies and thirty dailies are currently received and the department endeavors to acquire all Iowa newspapers. It has ceased the collection of papers from other states, with the exception of the New York Times.

## PUBLIC ARCHIVES DIVISION

The public archives material is derived from the state departments, boards, bureaus, etc., and date from 1838 down to a ten-year period prior to the date of removal. These materials are taken from the vaults, garrets and storage places and in most cases they are a chaotic mass covered with dust and dirt. These must all be read, classified, cleansed, repaired, filed and indexed. In addition to the above work this division annually cares for some four or five hundred requests for information gleaned from these materials and the requests are constantly increasing.

There are now between ten and eleven millions of documents on file and in storage and practically eight millions of these are finished and indexed.

It is provided by an act of the Fortieth General Assembly that the secretary of the executive council shall, without additional compensation, act as secretary of the state board of conservation. The board is authorized to investigate places in Iowa rich in natural history, forest reserves, archaeological specimens, and geological deposits, and it is the duty of the board, under the supervision and direction of the executive council, to establish, maintain, improve and beautify public parks upon the shores of lakes, streams or other waters, or at other places within the state which have become historical or which are of scientific interest, or which by reason of their natural scenic beauty or location are adapted therefor.

Jurisdiction over all meandered streams and lakes of the state and of state lands bordering thereon, not now used by some other state body for state purposes, is conferred upon the board. The board, with the approval of the executive council, may establish parts of such property into state parks, and when so established all of the provisions of the law relative to public parks applies thereto.

The law, as amended by the Fortieth General Assembly, for the purpose of carrying into effect the purposes stated, appropriates \$75,000.00.

Each person who shall desire to conduct the business of selling at retail, compounding or dispensing drugs, etc., for medical use, must be a registered pharmacist and their names registered in a book kept by the board for that purpose, showing also their residence, together with the date of issuing their certificate. Fee examination and certificate, \$5. The license fee for itinerant vendor of drugs is \$100 a year, and they are transferrable upon assignment and payment of a fee of one dollar to the secretary of the board. The penalty for selling without a vendor license is not less than \$100 nor more than \$200.

The State Board of Vocational Education was established by the thirty-seventh general assembly in the act accepting the terms of the federal law on vocational education commonly known as the Smith-Hughes Act.

The membership of the board is ex-officio. The board cooperates with public schools in formation of day classes in agriculture, trade and industry, and home making. Also in each of these lines part-time and evening classes are conducted by public schools working with the board.

In all cases mentioned above the districts receive reimbursement on teachers' salaries from federal funds alone or from federal and state funds combined.

The thirty-ninth general assembly approved the federal law of June 2, 1920, called the Industrial Rehabilitation Act, for operation in Iowa. By the federal law the State Board for Vocational Education became the board for conducting rehabilitation for all eligible disabled cases excepting those coming directly under the federal government for persons disabled as a result of enlisted service in army and navy.

All deputies shall receive their expenses while away from their homes in the performance of their duties.

The state fish and game warden is appointed by the governor and holds office for three years. He has charge and management of the state fish hatcheries, used in stocking the waters of the state with fish. He makes a biennial report to the governor of all work pertaining to the department. He may grant certificates to proper parties to collect birds, their nests or eggs for scientific purposes. He may appoint such number of deputies as he may deem necessary, their duties being to report all violations of the fish and game laws, to make arrests where crime is committed in their territory, and to aid the state warden in the enforcement of the law.

No person may lawfully hunt, kill or take any wild animals, birds or game without first procuring a hunting license, at a fee of \$1 for residents of the state and \$10 for nonresidents. Licenses are issued by the county auditors. Owners of lands, their children and tenants may lawfully hunt on their own premises without obtaining a license. Penalties are provided for the enforcement of the law.

Under licenses issued from the fish and game department persons may lawfully fish with nets and seines in the boundary waters of the state.

Game birds may lawfully be propagated under a game breeder's license, issued from the office of the fish and game warden, fee for license being \$2.00.

The office of state mine inspector was created by the eighteenth general assembly in the year 1880. At that time the mining of coal in this state was in its infancy. But few large mines were in operation and the tonnage of coal was small as compared to that of the present time. Then but one inspector was needed. Owing to the growth of the coal industry, the twenty-first general assembly amended the mining laws and provided for three inspectors, and gave the governor power to divide the state into three inspection districts. Today the entire time of the three inspectors is taken up with the work of inspecting the mines of the state and seeing that they are worked in conformity

with the mining laws of the state as regards safety to the employes therein, proper ventilation, condition of the shafts, escape ways in times of danger, safety catches on cages, condition of the cables for hoisting men and coal, and everything that would tend to guard against accidents to men employed in the mines.

A general office for the inspectors is maintained in the state house and a complete record is kept therein of all inspections, accidents, etc., in record books for that purpose. A monthly report of the general conditions of all mines is made to the mine inspectors and a general report of the conditions of the mines of the state, tonnage, accidents, number of employes, and other information relative to the coal industry, is published every two years. Copies of the state mining laws are also published and circulated. Blue prints of maps of all mines in the state, brought up to date once each year, are on file in the offices of the mine inspectors subject to public inspection. A secretary, elected by the inspectors, has charge of the general correspondence and books in the office, as the duties of the three inspectors keep them almost constantly in the field.

The first district includes the counties of Appanoose, Lucas, Taylor, Monroe (part), Wayne, Page and Adams. Mr. W. E. Holland of Albia, Iowa, is the inspector in this district, where mines employing 5,088 men, and producing 1,524,921 tons of coal during the calendar year 1921, are located.

The second district comprises the counties of Mahaska, Marion, Monroe (part), Jasper, Keokuk, Van Buren, Davis, Jefferson, Wapello and Warren. Mr. Rhys T. Rhys of Ottumwa is inspector for this district, in which 2,337,572 tons of coal were produced by the mines of the second district in 1921 and employment was given to 4,920.

The third district comprises the counties of Polk, Webster, Boone, Greene, Guthrie, Scott and Dallas. Mr. Edward Sweeney of Des Moines is the inspector. During the calendar year 1921 the mines in this district produced 1,310,997 tons of coal and employed 3,147.

The state board of mine examiners was created by the twenty-second general assembly, and is composed of five members; two coal operators, two miners, and one engineer. Their duties are to examine and issue certificates to those qualified to act as state mine inspectors, hoisting engineers and mine foremen. An examination for state mine inspectors is held the first Monday in March in even-numbered years in the office of the state mine inspectors in the state house. Examinations for hoisting engineers and mine foremen are held at various times during the year in different parts of the state. A fee of two dollars for registration, and an additional fee of two dollars is required of those taking and passing the examination for mine foremen and hoisting engineers. The law requires that each certificate issued by the board shall be recorded in the office of the examining board, and shall show the name, age, residence and years of experience of the person to whom it was issued.

The members of the board receive as compensation \$10 per diem for the time actually employed and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties. All bills for the per diem and expenses are audited and allowed by the executive council and paid from fees received from applicants.

Under the provisions of the law, the board meets at least once annually to examine persons desiring to practice in Iowa as certified public accountants and issues certificates to those qualifying.

The examination fee is \$25.00.

An applicant for examination must be a citizen of the United States and a resident of the state of Iowa; must be 25 years of age or more and of good moral character; must be a graduate of a high school with a four-year course, have an equivalent education, or pass a preliminary examination by the board; must have had at least three years of practical accounting experience, at least one of which shall have been as a public accountant.

The board may register the certificate of any person who is the lawful holder of a certified public accountant's certificate issued under the laws of another state, which extends similar privileges to certified public accountants of this state, or to holders of degree of certified public accountant or chartered accountant or the equivalent thereof, issued by any foreign government provided that the requirements of such certificate or degree are, in the judgment of the board, equivalent to those provided for Iowa.

Practicing as a certified public accountant or chartered accountant or posing as such without having secured the necessary certificate is made a misdemeanor under the law.

Persons granted a certificate to practice, must furnish bond to the auditor of state in the sum of \$5,000.00.

## BOARD OF VOTING MACHINE COMMISSIONERS

*Appointed by the Governor. Term, five years. Compensation not to exceed \$1,500.*

The voting machine commission was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly, providing for the use of voting machines at all state, county, city, town and township elections. By this act the governor was authorized to appoint three commissioners, not more than two of whom should be from the same political party. The commissioners are appointed for the term of five years, subject to removal at the pleasure of the governor.

Individuals or corporations owning or interested in any voting machine may call upon the commissioners to examine the said voting machine. After such examination, the commissioners are to report the results to the secretary of state, giving the capacity of such machine to register the vote of the people, its accuracy and efficiency, and its mechanical perfections or imperfections.

No board is acting at the present time.

*Organization.* Pursuant to a call signed by D. F. Wells, then of the Muscatine schools, and seventeen others, a number of teachers met in the court house at Muscatine May 10, 1854, and organized the Iowa State Teachers' Association, adopted a constitution and elected the following officers: President, J. A. Parvin, Muscatine; Vice President, Rev. Daniel Lane, Davenport; Recording Secretary, D. Franklin Wells, Muscatine; Corresponding Secretary, Rev. Samuel Newberry, Dubuque; Treasurer, G. W. Drake, Oskaloosa; Executive Committee, Rev. Samuel Newberry, Dubuque; G. B. Denison, Muscatine; Rev. W. W. Woods, Iowa City; D. S. Sheldon, Davenport, and H. K. Edson, Denmark.

The real work of the association began with its second session, which convened at Iowa City December 27th and 28th of the same year. After a very important meeting, this session adjourned to meet at Davenport September 4, 1855. When the time came for this meeting, so few were present it was abandoned.

An educational convention was called to meet at Iowa City June 16 to 18, 1856. At this meeting a permanent organization was effected and the constitution of the association of 1854, somewhat modified, was adopted. Since that time a session has been held each year.

At the session in December, 1905, the semi-centennial anniversary of the association was celebrated by a special campfire program, which was participated in, either in person or by letter, by many of the veterans in education in Iowa.

In the fall of 1917 a reorganization of the association was effected by the incorporation of the five district or section associations with the Iowa State Teachers' Association and the establishment of a permanent office in the city of Des Moines with a permanent secretary in charge.

The state historical society of Iowa was organized in January, 1857. The purposes of the society are to preserve the history of Iowa and further its dissemination among the people of the state. In fulfillment of these purposes, a permanent program of activities has been gradually developed and put into execution during the past sixty-four years. This program of activities includes (1) the discovery, collection and preservation of the materials of Iowa history, (2) researches in the field of Iowa history, (3) publication of the materials of Iowa history, and (4) of the dissemination of the materials of Iowa history through public depositories and members.

Since its organization, the society has published a quarterly magazine of history under three different titles. From 1863 to 1874, inclusive, it published *The Annals of Iowa*, twelve volumes, now called the first series. From 1885 to 1902, inclusive, it published *The Iowa Historical Record*, eighteen volumes. From 1903 to date, the society has published *The Iowa Journal of History and Politics*, now in its twenty-first volume.

The society issues a monthly magazine entitled *The Palimpsest*, which aims to present the materials of Iowa history in a form that is attractive and a style that is popular in the best sense. This magazine is now in its fourth volume.

Numerous other publications have been issued by the society, the most important of which are the *Messages and Proclamations of the Governors of Iowa*, in seven volumes; *The Executive Journal of Iowa, 1838-1841*; the *Lucas Journal of the War of 1812*; seven volumes in the *Iowa Economic History Series*; eleven volumes in the *Iowa Biographical Series*; three volumes in the *Iowa Applied History Series*; two volumes in the *Iowa Social History Series*; six volumes in the *Iowa Chronicles of the World War Series*; the *Proceedings of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Constitution of Iowa*; a volume entitled *Amana: the Community of True Inspiration*; the *Territorial Governors of the Old Northwest*; the *Battle of Shiloh*; the *Hollanders of Iowa*; the *Quakers of Iowa*; the *History of Senatorial Elections in Iowa*; the *History of Township Government in Iowa*; five volumes on the *History of Education in Iowa*; *Third Party Movements Since the Civil War—With Special Reference to Iowa*; *Marches of the Dragoons in the Mississippi Valley*; *Old Fort Snelling*; the *Spirit Lake Massacre*; the *Legal and Political Status of Women in Iowa*, and the *British in Iowa*. The society has also issued a series of twenty-four numbers entitled *Iowa and War*.

The library of the society now contains about 60,000 titles. The membership of the society includes over twelve hundred active members and twenty-six auxiliary members. One hundred and sixty public and college libraries within the state have been designated as official depositories for the publications of the society, and sixty libraries and institutions outside of the state have been designated as exchange depositories.

The present geological survey was organized in 1892 and since that time has been engaged in two lines of research. The first of these is the detailed study of the geology of the state by counties. In this work all the natural features of interest and value are studied and described, such as the general character of the surface, its soils, water resources, deposits of valuable minerals and other topics.

The second line of work has been that of special investigation of the minerals of the state. In this work studies have been made of the coal and peat beds, lead and zinc, gypsum, clays and shales, limestone and sandstone, and the surface and underground water resources. The different geological formations are being studied as units.

For several years past the state survey has co-operated with the national survey in the making of topographic maps of the Des Moines valley. These maps show the character of the surface, the drainage, and elevations above sea level, as well as cultural features. They are of especial value in coal prospecting, engineering and drainage prospects.

## SUPREME COURT OF IOWA

## ORGANIZATION

The supreme court consists of seven judges, four of whom constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but one alone may adjourn from day to day, or to a particular day, or until the next term.

The judge whose term first expires is the chief justice, and so on in rotation, except when the terms of two of the justices expire at the same time the senior in age serves first as chief justice.

## JURISDICTION

The supreme court has appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery and constitutes a court for the correction of errors at law. It has appellate jurisdiction over all judgments and decisions of all courts of record, except as otherwise provided by law.

An appeal may also be taken to the supreme court from:

1. An order made affecting a substantial right in an action, when such order, in effect, determines the action and prevents a judgment from which an appeal might be taken;
2. A final order made in special actions affecting a substantial right therein, or made on a summary application in an action for judgment;
3. An order which grants or refuses, continues or modifies a provisional remedy; grants or refuses, dissolves or refuses to dissolve an injunction or attachment; or grants or refuses a new trial; or sustains or overrules a demurrer;
4. An intermediate order involving the merits or materially affecting the final decision;
5. An order or judgment on habeas corpus.

If any of the above orders or judgments are made or rendered by a judge, the same are reviewable, the same as if made by a court.

\*Will be chief justice after January 1, 1924.

The supreme court has power to issue all writs and processes necessary to secure justice to parties, and to enforce its appellate jurisdiction, and it may exercise supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals.

It may enforce its mandates upon inferior courts and officers by fine and imprisonment, which imprisonment may continue until mandates are obeyed.

#### TERMS

There are three regular terms in each year, held as follows, to-wit: The first term beginning with the second Tuesday in January and ending with the first Monday of May; the second beginning with the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May and ending with the third Monday of September, and the third beginning with the first Tuesday after the third Monday of September and ending with the third Saturday of December.

The time allotted to each term is divided as nearly as practicable into periods of four weeks each, the first part of each period is devoted to the argument and submission of cases, and the second to consultation and the preparation of opinions. Cases assigned for each period are called in their order as shown on the term docket but no more submissions are taken for one period than in the judgment of the court can be properly considered and determined before the next succeeding session. All causes on the docket are heard at each term unless continued or otherwise disposed of by order of court.

The regular public sessions of the court are held in the supreme court room at the capitol, commencing at 9 o'clock A. M., standard time. On Tuesday and Friday of the first and second week of each four weeks' period submission of motions are taken before calling the calendar. Motions noticed for a day when the court is not sitting are taken on the next motion day on which the court sits.

Judgments of affirmance, rulings and orders in causes submitted and orders authorized by law may be made and entered by the court at any time regardless of the term of court.

#### APPEALS IN CIVIL CASES.

Appeals from the superior and district courts may be taken to the supreme court at any time within six months from the rendition of the judgment or order appealed from, and not afterwards. No appeal shall be taken in any causes in which the amount in controversy between the parties, as shown by the pleadings does not exceed one hundred dollars, unless the trial judge shall, during the term in which judgment is entered, certify that the cause is one in which the appeal should be allowed, and upon certificate being filed the same shall be appealable regardless of the amount in controversy, but this limitation shall not affect the right of appeal in any action in which an interest in real estate is involved, nor shall the right of appeal be affected by the remission of any part of the verdict or judgment returned or rendered.

#### APPEAL IN CRIMINAL CASES.

Appeals from the final judgment of the district court may be taken in all criminal cases within six months after the judgment is rendered; and either the defendant or the state may appeal. Upon appeal the supreme court may affirm, reverse or modify the judgment or render such judgment as the district court should have done. It may order a new trial or reduce the punishment, but cannot increase it. If the state appeals, the court cannot reverse or modify the judgment so as to increase the punishment, but may affirm it and shall point out any error in the proceedings and its decision shall be obligatory as law.

#### SALARY.

The salary of each justice is six thousand dollars (\$6,000) a year. Each general assembly also appropriates sufficient funds for the payment of stenographers, bailiffs and such other incidental expenses as may be incurred by the court.

## THE DISTRICT COURT OF IOWA

There are at the present time sixty-four judges of the district court of the state of Iowa. The state is divided into twenty-one judicial districts and each district is entitled to from one to five judges, the number being fixed by statute. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary of \$4,000. Each judge appoints a shorthand reporter, who receives \$10 per day for each day's attendance upon said court, and in case the per diem does not equal \$2,400, then the county or counties composing the district make up the deficiency in proportion to the number of days of court held in such county or counties.

The following is the section of the code governing the jurisdiction of the district court:

SECTION 225. *Jurisdiction—civil, criminal, probate—successor of circuit court.* The district court shall have general original and exclusive jurisdiction of all actions, proceedings and remedies, both civil and criminal, except in cases where exclusive or concurrent jurisdiction is or may hereafter be conferred upon some other court or tribunal by the constitution and laws of the state, and shall have and exercise all the powers usually possessed and exercised by courts of record. It shall also possess and exercise jurisdiction in all appeals and writs of error taken in civil and criminal actions and special proceedings authorized to be taken from all inferior courts, tribunals, boards or officers, under any provisions of the laws of this state, and shall have a general supervision thereof, in all matters, to prevent and correct abuses, where no other remedy is provided.

*First.* The district court of each county shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction to probate the wills of, and to grant administration upon the estates of, all persons who at the time of their death were residents of the county and of non-residents of the state who die leaving property within the county subject to administration, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

*Second.* To appoint guardians of the persons and property of all persons resident in the county subject to guardianship.

*Third.* To appoint guardians of the property of all such persons non-residents of the state who have property within the county subject to guardianship, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

*Fourth.* It shall have jurisdiction in all matters in relation to the appointment of executors and trustees, and the management and disposition of the property of and settlement of such estates; *provided*, that where jurisdiction has heretofore been acquired, the same shall be retained until such estate is closed.

The district court shall succeed to and exercise full authority and jurisdiction over the records of the circuit court, and may enforce all judgments, decrees and orders thereof in the same manner and to the same extent as it may exercise like jurisdiction and authority over its own records, and for the purpose of the issuance of process, and of any and all other acts necessary to the due and efficient enforcement of the orders, judgments and decrees of the circuit courts the records thereof shall be deemed records of the district court.

Transcripts and process from the judgments, decrees and records of the circuit court shall be issued by the clerk of the district court and under the seal of his office.

## MUNICIPAL COURTS

Any city, whether organized under a special charter, commission form of government or the general law for the incorporation of cities or towns, now or hereafter having a population of five thousand or more, as shown by the last preceding state or United States census, may establish a municipal court, and for the purpose, the territorial limits of any such city extend to the limits and include therein all civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located.

The salary of municipal court judge is \$3,000 in cities with population less than 30,000, \$3,400 with population between 30,000 and less than 75,000, \$3,600 with population 75,000 or over. Compensation of court reporter is fixed by the judge at not to exceed \$8.00 per day. Salary of clerk is \$1,800, \$2,200 and \$2,600 according to population of city as above indicated.

*Jurisdiction.* Said municipal court shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the district court, in all civil matters, where the amount in controversy does not exceed one thousand dollars, except in probate matters, actions for divorce, alimony, separate maintenance, those directly affecting the title to real estate, and juvenile proceedings, and said court shall have no power to grant injunctions, except where the issuance of the writ is auxiliary to the other relief demanded and of which the court has jurisdiction. Said court shall have all criminal jurisdiction that is now or hereafter may be conferred on justice of peace, mayor's courts and police courts. Prisoners may be committed to the city prison or any other place or institution for confinement or punishment instead of the county jail or may be paroled or their sentence suspended, at the option of the judge.

## SUPERIOR COURTS

The statutes provide that any city containing four thousand inhabitants, whether organized under a special charter or under the general law for incorporation of cities and towns, may establish a superior court. There are at present seven of such courts, located respectively in the cities of Council Bluffs, Cedar Rapids, Grinnell, Keokuk, Oelwein, Perry and Shenandoah. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary of \$2,000,

which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which said court is located. Salary of judge, \$3,750 in cities of forty thousand or more population.

The judges of the superior courts appoint a shorthand reporter, who receives five dollars per day for each day's attendance upon said court, eight dollars per day in cities of forty thousand or more population.

The following is a copy of the section of the code, amended, governing the jurisdiction of the superior court:

SECTION 260. *Jurisdiction—attachment of real estate—city prisons used.* Said court shall have jurisdiction concurrent with the district court in all civil matters, except in probate matters and actions for divorce, alimony and separate maintenance. It shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to try and determine all actions, civil and criminal, for the violation of city ordinances, and all jurisdictions conferred on police courts as now or as may hereafter be provided by law, and concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace. Writs of errors and appeals may be taken thereto from justices' courts in the township in which the court is held, and, by consent of parties, from any other township in the county. For the trial of criminal actions on information and complaint, the court shall be open at such times and under such rules as it shall prescribe. In actions by attachment, where real property is levied on by writ of attachment, the officer levying the writ shall make entry thereof in the incumbrance book in the office of the clerk of the district court, in like manner with like effect as of levies made in the district court. Parties may be committed to the city prison for confinement or punishment, instead of the county jail, at the option of the judge. In the absence of the judge, or in case of his inability to act, then, during such time, proceedings for the violation of city ordinances may be had before a justice of the peace, residing in such city.

Superior courts shall have original concurrent jurisdiction with the district courts of the state of Iowa, in all matters pertaining to the detention and treatment of dipsomaniacs, inebriates and those addicted to the excessive use of narcotics, as provided in title XII, chapter 2-a of the supplement to the code, 1907, and the same proceeding shall be held so far as applicable. Wherever the words "district judge," "district court" or "judge of the district court" appear in title XII, chapter 2-a the same shall be construed to apply to the superior courts or the judge thereof to the same extent that the same applies to the district court or the judge thereof.

## THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

The legislative department of the state of Iowa is vested in a general assembly, which consists of a senate and house of representatives.

The senate consists of fifty members. Senators are elected for terms of four years; twenty-one senators being elected at one general election and twenty-nine at the next.

The house of representatives consists at present of one hundred and eight members, who are elected for a term of two years.

Sessions of the general assembly are held biennially in the odd numbered years, and they commence on the second Monday of January.

The compensation of the members of the fortieth general assembly was \$1,000 for the session. This is in accordance with an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly which went into effect July 4, 1911. They were also allowed five cents a mile from their homes to the capital and return for traveling expenses. Members are permitted to draw such stationery as they need during the session, the cost to the state for the supplies varying from \$1.50 to \$14.00 per member. No allowance is permitted for postage.

The lieutenant governor is the presiding officer of the senate. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session of the fortieth general assembly.

The speaker of the house is chosen by the members from among their own membership. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session.

The lieutenant-governor appoints all committees in the senate and the speaker of the house all committees in the house.

In the regular proceedings of the senate motions made by members are not seconded but are put directly by the presiding officer, the formality of a second being waived. In the house all motions are seconded before being placed before the house by the speaker.

Sessions in both branches of the general assembly are opened by prayer. No regular chaplains are employed, but ministers from Des Moines and elsewhere over the state are assigned dates for these services and are allowed \$5 for each opening prayer.

Bills passed are re-written (enrolled) by the enrolling clerk of the branch of the general assembly where the bill originates; they are then signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house in presence of these respective bodies, in open session; then by the governor, if meeting with his approval, and then are filed with the secretary of state and by him bound in book form, after the close of a session.

## JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE

## DISAGREEMENT AND CONFERENCE

1. Whenever either house shall amend a measure and the other house shall refuse to concur in and adopt the amendment, the house which has adopted such amendment shall either insist on or recede from the same. But when a measure originating in one house is amended in the other, the house in which it originated may amend such amendment and a motion therefor shall take precedence of a motion to concur. In case said house refuses to concur, the house which adopted the amendment may either recede from or insist upon such amendment, and a motion to recede takes precedence of a motion to insist. In case a motion to insist on the amendment be decided in the negative, such action shall be deemed a receding from the amendment and so entered upon the journal of the house. In case the amendment is insisted upon, the house so insisting shall request a committee of conference on the subject of disagreement and shall appoint a committee therefor. The other house shall thereupon appoint such a committee. Unless another number is specified in said request, such conference committee shall consist of four members from each house. They shall meet at a convenient time, to be agreed upon by their chairman, and having conferred freely, each shall report to their respective house the result of their conference. In case of agreement, the report shall be first made, with the papers referred accompanying it, to the house which refused to concur, and there acted upon; and such action shall be immediately reported by the secretary or clerk to the other house, the papers referred accompanying the message. In case of disagreement of conference committee, the papers shall remain with the house which insisted on the amendment. The agreeing report of a conference committee shall be made, read and signed in duplicate by all the members of the committee, or by a majority of those of each house, one of the duplicates being retained by the committee of each house.

## PRESENTATION OF MESSAGES

2. When a message shall be sent from either house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it is sent by the doorkeeper thereof, and shall be respectfully communicated to the chair by the person by whom it is sent.

## TRANSMISSION OF MESSAGES

3. All messages between the two houses shall be communicated by the secretary or chief clerk or their respective assistants.

## ENROLLMENT OF BILLS

4. When a bill shall have passed both houses it shall be duly enrolled by the enrolling clerk of the house in which it originated, and the fact of its origin shall be certified by the endorsement of the secretary or clerk thereof.

## EXAMINATION OF ENROLLED BILLS

5. When the bills are enrolled they shall be examined by a joint committee of two from the senate and two from the house of representatives, who shall be a standing committee for that purpose, and who shall carefully compare the enrollment with the engrossed bills, as passed in the house, correct any errors therein, and make report thereof forthwith to their respective houses.

## AUTHENTICATION OF ENROLLED BILLS

6. After the report, each bill shall be signed, first by the speaker of the house of representatives, and then by the president of the senate, in the presence of their respective houses.

## TRANSMISSION OF BILLS TO THE GOVERNOR

7. After a bill shall have been thus signed in each house, it shall be forthwith presented, by committee of the house in which the bill originated, to the governor, for his approval, and they shall forthwith report the date of presentation, which shall be entered upon the journal of the house in which the bill originated.

## CONCERNING OTHER ENROLLMENTS

8. All orders, resolutions, memorials or other votes, which are to be presented to the governor for his approval, shall be enrolled, examined, signed and presented in the same manner as bills.

## CERTIFICATION OF BILLS AND OTHER ENROLLMENTS

9. When any bill, resolution or memorial, which shall have passed in one house, is rejected or adopted in the other, notice of such action shall be given to the house which passed the same. And each bill, resolution or memorial shall have properly endorsed thereon, at the time of its transmission, a statement, signed by the secretary or clerk, of the action which has been taken thereon by the house transmitting the same, with the date thereof.

## REINTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND OTHER MEASURES

10. When a bill, resolution or memorial which shall have passed one house is rejected in the other, it shall not be again introduced during the session without five days' notice and leave of a majority of the members of the house in which the same is sought to be introduced.

## TRANSMISSION OF PAPERS

11. Each house shall transmit to the other with any bill, resolution or memorial all papers upon which the same shall be founded.

## PRINTING OF BILLS AND OTHER DOCUMENTS

12. Bills and joint resolutions shall be printed in form as provided by law. Each house may direct the printing of an additional number of its own bills. A substitute for a bill offered by a member or by a committee, where it is entirely or substantially a complete substitute for the particular bill, unless otherwise ordered, shall be printed as a substitute for the original bill (and the caption shall so indicate, giving the substitute the same number as the original bill, but reciting "substitute for" such bill), and such substitute bill shall, by the file clerk, be included in the bill file next to the original bill, and such substitute bill shall not be printed in the journals.

Local or legalizing acts of a strictly private interest shall not be printed in the journal, but are to be printed in bill form only when the cost of such printing shall be deposited with the document editor at the rate of \$2.00 per page, and the newspaper publication of such bill shall be without expense to the state, and same shall not be published until the cost of same has been paid to the secretary of state.

## CONCERNING THE PRINTING OF DOCUMENTS

13. It shall be the duty of the chief clerk of the house of representatives and the secretary of the senate, when any document, except bills and resolutions, is ordered to be printed in their respective houses, forthwith to communicate such order to the other house.

## FORM OF BILL

14. All bills and joint resolutions introduced shall be typewritten on legal cap paper, double spaced, with titles, enacting clause and body of the bill as directed by the secretary of the senate and chief clerk of the house. The written or printed lines in the body of the bill except the last line of each paragraph, shall contain in spaces, characters and letters, approximately sixty-five (65). Each bill shall be presented securely fastened in a bill cover, and be accompanied by two carbon or correct copies thereof, and by three copies of the title alone, on separate slips.

## COMPANION BILLS

15. Where bills are introduced in both houses containing indentially the same text, they shall be called companion bills. The senate shall designate its author in the usual way, followed immediately by the name of the house member introducing the companion bill in the house, which name shall be in parenthesis. The opposite shall be the rule for house bills. As soon as possible after the introduction of the respective bills, the secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house shall ascertain the corresponding file number of the companion bill in the other house and note the same on the bill.

## ADDITIONAL EMPLOYEES

16. The joint committee on retrenchment and reform is authorized to nominate such additional employes other than committee clerks, as may be deemed necessary for the work of the session, and the committee shall recommend the positions to be filled and the compensation of such employes so nominated.

## ROLL CALL IN JOINT CONVENTION

17. In all elections in joint convention of the two houses, the names of all members shall be arranged in alphabetical order, and they shall be called upon to vote in the order in which they stand arranged.

## RECORDS OF THE COMMITTEE ON CLAIMS

18. It shall be the duty of the committee on claims in each house to keep a book of record, in which shall be entered each claim for money against the state referred to them, whether presented in favor of private persons or municipal or other corporations, entering therein the name of the claimant, the amount of the claim, the grounds therefor, with note of the evidence offered in support of the same, and the final conclusion of the committee thereon. At the close of the session said book of record shall be deposited with the auditor of state, to be kept by him, and he shall provide an index, showing the names of the claimants recorded therein. At any subsequent session the same shall be delivered, when desired, to the like committee having jurisdiction of such claims and shall always be open to the examination of the said committee of either house.

19. Final action shall not be taken on any bills providing appropriations (except emergency appropriations, approved by the executive council), until March 1, 1923.

All bills carrying appropriations for state educational institutions and the institutions in charge of the board of control shall be introduced not later than February 15th, and that no bills carrying an appropriation for any purpose shall be introduced after March 1st, except by the committee on appropriations.

20. The following rule shall be applicable to code commissioners' bills.

Odd numbered bills shall first be put upon passage in the Senate, and even numbered bills shall first be put upon passage in the House.

The code revision committee shall report from time to time, suggesting such code commissioners' bills as in its opinion should be given precedence both in the matter of consideration by the several standing committees to which they have been referred, and in the matter of consideration upon the floor of the Senate and House.

The several standing committees to which bills are referred shall be requested and directed to report upon bills recommended for precedence as soon as practicable.

Any rule of the Senate or House requiring standing committees to report on bills within a given time after their reference shall not apply to code commissioners' bills unless so ordered by the Senate and House.

Any standing committee desiring to report on code commissioners' bills other than those recommended by the code revision committee for precedence is requested to report such fact to the code revision committee before reporting out such bills for passage.

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 RULES OF THE SENATE

## REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS

1. The following order shall govern:
  - (1) Presentations of petitions and memorials, addressed to the senate or the general assembly.
  - (2) Introduction of bills.
  - (3) Resolutions.
  - (4) Communications on the president's table, including house messages.

- (5) Reports of standing committees, in order in which they stand in the rules, except the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills, rules and printing.
- (6) Reports of select committees.
- (7) Unfinished business before the senate.
- (8) Third reading of bills.
- (9) General order of the day.

#### DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT

2. The president shall take the chair at the hour to which the senate is adjourned and call the senate to order; and, if a quorum be present, he shall proceed with the regular order of daily business, unless otherwise ordered by the senate, or unless a special order for the day shall interfere therewith. He shall preserve order and decorum, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the senate. He shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise specially ordered. Immediately preceding the adjournment of each morning session, or, in case it cannot be done during that session, then as soon after the convening of the next following session as he may find most convenient, the president shall call for corrections of the journal of the last day's proceedings. He shall then cause any mistakes therein to be corrected by the secretary, and the journal shall then be approved.

#### THE PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE

3. The senate shall, at its pleasure, elect a president pro tem, who shall hold his office during the remaining portion of the time for which the president was elected; and when the president shall, from any cause, be absent the president pro tem shall preside, except when the chair is filled by appointment by the president.

#### MESSENGERS

4. There shall be appointed by the lieutenant governor, at each session of the senate, to hold their positions during such session, but subject to be discharged by the president of the senate for inefficiency or misbehavior, or other reasons, in his judgment justifying such discharge, six messengers for the senate. And the president may appoint other messengers in the place of any discharged.

#### CALL OF THE SENATE

5. One-fourth of the members may have a call of the senate, and absent members sent for and their attendance enforced.

#### DEBATE AND DECORUM

6. When a member is about to speak, in debate, or deliver any matter to the senate, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to "Mr. President," and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoid personalities and the imputation of improper motives.

#### MANNER OF VOTING

7. When the vote is taken viva voce, questions shall be distinctly put in this form: viz: "As many as are of the opinion (as the case may be) say 'aye'" And after the affirmative voice is expressed: "As many as are of the contrary opinion say 'no.'" If the president doubt, or a division be called for, the senate shall divide—those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterwards those in the negative.

#### DUTY AND RIGHT OF VOTING

8. Every member present when a question is put shall vote, unless he shall, for special cause, be excused by a vote of the senate; but no member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is directly and personally interested, or except by consent of the senate, in any case where he was not present when his name was called in the taking of the vote. Provided, that any member who was absent by leave of the senate may vote at any time before the result is announced.

## FORM AND WITHDRAWAL OF MOTIONS

9. All motions (except to adjourn, postpone, or commit) shall be reduced to writing, if required by any member of the senate. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, provided the same has not been amended by the senate, and that no amendment is pending thereto.

## ORDER AND PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS

10. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone to a day certain, to commit or amend, to postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are named; and no motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit or postpone indefinitely, being decided shall be again allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill shall have the precedence of a motion to amend; and, if carried, shall be considered equivalent to the rejection of the bill.

## MOTIONS NOT DEBATABLE

11. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, and all incidental questions of order arising after the motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided—whether an appeal or otherwise—without debate.

## THE PREVIOUS QUESTION

12. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the senate to a direct vote upon the pending amendments and then upon the main question, unless otherwise indicated by the motion and ordered by the senate, except that the member in charge of the measure under consideration shall have ten minutes in which to close the discussion, immediately before the vote is taken upon the main question. If the previous question is decided in the negative, the senate shall proceed with the matter before it, the same as though the previous question had not been moved.

## DIVISION OF THE QUESTION

13. Any member may call for a division of a question which shall be divided, if it comprehends propositions in substance so distinct that one being taken away, substantive propositions shall remain for the decision of the senate. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but, a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendments to the matter attempted to be stricken out, nor a motion to strike out and insert.

## RECONSIDERATION

14. When a motion or question has been decided, any member having voted on the prevailing side may move a reconsideration, on the same or next legislative day.

## CONCERNING THE PRINTING OF PAPERS

15. A motion to print any paper presented to the senate may, on motion, be referred to the committee on printing, whose duty it shall be to report, at the earliest time practicable, on the propriety of printing.

## INTRODUCTION, READINGS, AND FORM OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

16. Every bill shall be introduced on the report of a committee, or by leave, and shall at once be given its first reading. Every bill and joint resolution shall have received three several readings previous to its passage; but no bill or joint resolution shall have its second and third readings on the same day, without a suspension of this rule; and every bill and joint resolution shall express in its title the object thereof. All rules of the senate applicable to bills shall apply with equal force to joint resolutions.

## ENDORSEMENT AND PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS, BILLS, AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

17. Before the same is presented, there shall be endorsed on each petition a brief statement of the subject matter thereof, and on each bill and joint resolution the title thereof, and in either case the name of the senator presenting the same. In presenting a petition, the senator shall briefly state from his place in the senate chamber the subject matter to which the petition relates.

## FIRST READING AND RECEPTION OR REJECTION OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

18. The first reading of a bill or joint resolution shall be for information, and, if objection be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall the bill (or joint resolution, as the case may be) be rejected?" If no objection be made, or the question to reject be lost, the bill or joint resolution shall go to its second reading without further questioning.

## SECOND READING AND COMMITMENT

19. Upon the second reading of a bill or joint resolution, the president shall refer the bill to an appropriate standing committee, unless otherwise ordered by the senate. If ordered by the senate to be considered by the committee of the whole, the senate shall fix the day for its consideration. If the bill or joint resolution be ordered to be engrossed, it shall be in order for its third reading any session after that day. No bill or joint resolution shall be committed or amended until it shall have been twice read.

## COMMITMENT OF APPROPRIATION BILLS

20a. All bills carrying appropriations or involving the expenditure of state funds shall be referred to the committee on appropriations, which the committee shall report back to the senate not later than the first Monday after March 1st. After the third legislative day prior to said Monday, house bills shall be reported back by said committee within three days from the reference thereto.

No amendment to any bill reported by the committee on appropriations, or to any item thereof, shall be in order, except such as is germane to the subject matter of the bill, or item thereof, sought to be amended, and shall trench expenditures and reduce the amounts of money covered by the bill or items thereof.

## TIME OF INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

20b. No bills other than Code Commission or revision bills shall be introduced in the senate after the second legislative day in March, except such bills as may be reported from standing committees as committee bills, as in conformity with concurrent resolution heretofore adopted.

## SCHEDULE AND CONSIDERATION OF APPROPRIATION BILLS

20c. On or before the first Monday after March 10th, the committee on appropriations shall prepare an itemized schedule of all appropriations recommended by the committee on appropriations, and have the same printed and laid upon the desks of members, and no appropriation bill shall be taken up for consideration and passage until the third legislative day thereafter.

## TIME OF INTRODUCTION OF APPROPRIATION BILLS

20d. Bills carrying appropriations for state educational institutions and the institutions under the charge of the board of control shall not be introduced later than February 15th, and no bill carrying an appropriation for any purpose shall be introduced after March 1st, except by the committee on appropriations.

## ENGROSSMENT OF BILLS

20e. Every bill shall be considered engrossed when ordered to a third reading unless the senate shall affirmatively direct its engrossment.

## THIRD READING AND PASSAGE OF BILLS

21. When a question is lost on engrossing a bill, or joint resolution for a third reading on a particular day, it shall not preclude a question to engross

it for a third reading on a different day. After a third reading of a bill or a joint resolution, no amendment (except to fill blanks) shall be received, except by unanimous consent of the members present; and the vote on its final passage shall be immediately taken without debate.

#### COMMITMENT OF BILLS

22. A bill or joint resolution may be committed at any time previous to its third reading.

#### THE FILLING OF BLANKS

23. In filling blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be first put.

#### HOUSE AMENDMENTS

24. On the return of a bill or joint resolution from the house, with an amendment, it shall be placed with the third reading of bills, unless the senate shall otherwise order. On the question of adopting the amendment the vote shall be taken on the final passage of the bill, and if the amendment be adopted by a constitutional majority, no further vote is necessary.

#### TIME OF MAKING CERTAIN COMMITTEE REPORTS

25. It shall be in order for the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills, on rules and on printing, to report at any time, when no member is addressing the senate.

#### CONSIDERATION OF SPECIAL ORDERS

26. When any special order of the day is not proceeded with on the day assigned, it shall stand as a general order on each succeeding day until disposed of, unless otherwise ordered, but its consideration cannot be moved until that order of business is reached, when it shall be taken up in order of its file, and shall be taken up in order of precedence.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS AFTER A SPECIAL ORDER

27. When the pending question is interrupted by a "special order," it shall, upon the disposal of the special order, be before the senate in the same stage as if it had not been so interrupted.

#### COMMITTEE CLERKS

28. Committees are permitted to employ clerks by the majority vote of the whole committee. All applicants for the position of committee clerkship shall be examined by a committee of three appointed by the president of the senate. The clerk shall be selected by such vote, and in like manner may be discharged for inefficiency, or when the services of the clerk become unnecessary. All committee clerks shall be competent stenographers and of good moral character. Any clerk may be discharged for inefficiency, immorality or indecent or unbecoming conduct, whether in or out of the senate chamber; and, upon the request of any senator or the president of the senate, made to the chairman of a committee, a meeting of the committee shall be called for the purpose of considering the question of the discharge of such clerk upon any of the grounds above specified.

#### DUTIES OF COMMITTEE CLERKS

29. Clerks of senate committees, when not engaged in duties pertaining to such committees, or work assigned them by the committee chairman, shall be subject to the discretion of the secretary of the senate for any labor connected with the duties of his position or his assistants. The secretary shall, from time to time, make detail from said clerks to assist in preparing copy or correcting proof for the daily journal.

#### FORM OF COMMITTEE REPORTS

30. All reports of committees on bills or resolutions shall be made in triplicate and be accompanied with the original bill or resolution to which the report relates. Provided, that this rule shall not apply to the reports of committees on enrolled and engrossed bills.

No code commission bill shall be acted upon by the senate the same day it is reported upon by the committee to whom it was referred.

#### TIME OF MAKING COMMITTEE REPORTS

31. The chairman or clerk of a committee, except of the appropriation committee, to whom a bill is referred, shall note thereon the date of its reference, and it shall be the duty of each committee to report back all bills in its hands, within fifteen days after the order of reference, unless a different time is granted by a vote of the senate.

#### VOTING IN COMMITTEE

32. When a vote is taken in any committee upon any bill or resolution before it, or any motion relating to the merits thereof, the chairman shall see that no person is present except the members and clerk of said committee, unless otherwise ordered by the committee.

#### SMOKING

33. Smoking in the senate chamber is hereby prohibited, while the senate is in session. And any officer or employe who shall indulge in smoking while on duty in the senate chamber or doorways leading thereto shall thereby subject himself to liability of discharge.

#### ADMISSION TO SENATE CHAMBER AND PROHIBITION OF LOBBYING

34. Admission to the floor of the senate chamber shall be granted by the doorkeeper to the governor and his private secretary, members of the house of representatives, the state officers and their deputies, judges of the several courts, ex-members of the legislature, ex-state officers, uniformed soldiers and sailors of the United States army and navy, and the regular reporters of the senate and clerks of committees. No persons, except those herein specified, shall be admitted, except upon special permission of the president of the senate, or of a member of the senate. And no person shall be permitted, by members or otherwise, to come upon the floor of the senate or into the cloak rooms to solicit or influence senators in their official action, or to sell any article or to solicit subscriptions. No officer, or employe elected or appointed by the senate or any of its committees, shall solicit or endeavor to influence members of the legislature in their official action. Any person violating this rule shall be summarily dismissed by the senate.

#### CLEARING OF LOBBY AND GALLERY

35. In case of disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery, the presiding officer shall have the power to order the same cleared.

#### EXECUTIVE SESSION

36. Before acting on executive business, the senate chamber shall be cleared, by direction of the president, of all persons except members, the secretary, the sergeant-at-arms, members enjoined and the secretary and sergeant-at-arms sworn to observe secrecy.

#### ANNOUNCEMENT OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS

37. When an adjournment has been ordered by a vote of the senate and before adjournment is declared by the president of the senate, it shall be in order for the chairmen of the several committees to announce in open senate the time and place of meeting of their respective committees.

#### SUSPENSION OF THE RULES AND TAKING FROM TABLE

38. No standing rule or order of the senate shall be rescinded or suspended, nor shall any matter, tabled upon motion, be taken up, unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, except an order fixing the hour to which the senate shall stand adjourned.

#### CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTIONS

39. Resolutions, including concurrent resolutions, shall not be acted upon by the senate upon the day the same are introduced or received by the senate, but shall lie upon the table for one legislative day if any member object to

the immediate consideration thereof. But if no member object, the same may have immediate consideration. Nothing in this rule shall abridge or prevent the usual right to reference to committee.

#### RULES OF PARLIAMENTARY PRACTICE

40. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules or orders of the senate, and joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.

#### TIME OF CONVENING

41. The hours to which the senate shall stand adjourned from day to day shall be 9 o'clock a. m. and 2 o'clock p. m., unless otherwise ordered by the senate.

#### DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

42. The duties of the officers and employes of the senate are as stated in the Paragraph relating thereto, and appended to these rules.

*Secretary.*—The secretary of the senate shall have charge of the secretary's desk, and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him. He shall be responsible for the custody and safe-keeping of all bills, resolutions and other matters laid before or introduced into the senate, except while the same are in the possession of the committee to whom the same shall have been referred, and when delivering the same to said committee he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall see that the journal of each day's proceedings is correctly and fully kept, and fully made up before the next day's session, and be responsible for its safe-keeping. He shall have control of Rooms 25 and 26, which are assigned to said secretary for the use of himself and his assistants. He shall endorse on every bill or joint or concurrent resolution the date of its introduction, and by what senator, or of its receipt from the house, and also what action relating thereto is taken by the senate. The assistant secretaries shall be under his direction and he shall assign to them their several duties in connection with the duties of the secretary's desk.

*Sergeant-at-arms, File Clerk, and Bill Clerk.*—The sergeant-at-arms shall wear the appropriate badge of his office; shall attend the senate during its sessions; shall aid in the enforcement of order under the direction of the president of the senate; shall execute the commands of the senate from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the presiding officers; shall see that the rule prohibiting smoking in the senate chamber is strictly enforced; shall, upon the request of any five members, have the senate chamber lighted up during any evening within the session, except Sunday, to an hour not later than 10 p. m.; shall see that no person, except one authorized to do so, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers, etc., thereof; shall see that the printed bills and daily journals are, at the earliest practicable period, properly distributed and filed upon the desks of senators; shall have charge of the files in the senate room, and shall see that no copy of a bill is given out except to or upon the order of the president, a senator, or state officers; shall see that an additional doorkeeper is detailed for duty at the senate chamber upon each day within the session, except Sunday, from 8:30 a. m. to 10 p. m., but should not five members of the senate desire to occupy the chamber to that hour the detail may be relieved at 9 p. m.; shall have charge of the messengers of the senate and see that they severally perform their duties, and shall promptly report to the president of the senate any inefficiency or violations of duty on the part of said messengers. He shall direct the file clerk, and bill clerk, if any employed, in the discharge of their duties.

*Doorkeeper.*—The doorkeeper of the senate shall wear his appropriate badge of office, shall have special charge of the main door of the chamber during the sittings of the senate, and shall see that the other doors of the senate are properly attended to; shall have general charge and oversight of the additional doorkeepers of the senate; shall detail such of the additional door-

keepers for such general or special duties as the sergeant-at-arms may deem proper and necessary for the efficiency of the senate and the protection of property within the chamber; shall see that the rule relating to the admission to the floor of the chamber is strictly enforced; shall, ten minutes before the opening of each session of the senate, see that the floor is cleared of all persons not entitled to occupy the same during the session; shall attend to seating visitors, and shall announce all committees and messengers from the governor or house.

*Janitor.*—The janitor of the senate shall have charge, under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, of the cloak and retiring rooms adjoining the chamber, and shall see that the same are kept in proper order.

*Messengers.*—The messengers of the senate shall attend the senate during its sittings and perform the duties generally devolving on like employes. While the senate is sitting, two of their number shall be detailed for service in front of the secretary's desk. The messengers shall be under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, while the senate is not sitting, and shall attend to such duties as he may assign them.

At least four messengers shall be on duty in the senate chamber upon every day of the session, except Sundays, from 8:30 a. m. until 6 p. m., whether the senate is in session or not.

#### VOTING IN EXECUTIVE SESSION

43. In all executive sessions the method of voting shall be as follows: The secretary shall cut the senate roll call into slips, the roll shall be called, and each senator shall obtain the slip bearing his own name. After having marked his vote, the secretary shall collect same and hand to the presiding officer, who shall then obtain the result of the vote, and shall announce the result in this way: "The confirmation of.....is agreed to," or "The confirmation of.....is refused." The president shall then place these ballots in an envelope and seal it, and retain same until the close of the legislative session, when he shall destroy them.

#### METHOD OF INTRODUCING AND READING OF BILLS

44. All bills and petitions to be introduced in the senate shall be filed with the secretary of the senate prior to the convening of the senate. When the time for introducing bills is reached in the regular order of business, the secretary will proceed in the same manner as if the bills were introduced from the floor. This rule does not deny a member the right to introduce a bill from the floor, but members so far as practicable, are requested to observe this rule.

45. Code revision bills shall have precedence over all other bills up to and including February 1, 1923. From and after February 1, general legislation shall have precedence over code revision bills, except, that when there is no regular legislation ready for the action of the senate or when by a majority vote the senate does so order, code revision bills may be taken up and considered and acted upon by the senate.

### RULES OF THE HOUSE

#### CALL TO ORDER

1. He (the speaker) shall take the chair every day precisely at the hour to which the house shall have adjourned; shall immediately call the members to order, and on appearance of a quorum shall cause the journal of the preceding day to be corrected.

#### PRESERVATION OF ORDER

2. He (the speaker) shall preserve order and decorum, and speak to points of order in preference to other members, rising from his seat for that purpose; and he shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house by any two members.

#### DECORUM IN PUTTING QUESTIONS

3. He (the speaker) shall rise to put a question but may state it sitting.

#### PUTTING THE QUESTION

4. Questions shall be distinctively put in this form, to-wit: "As many as are of the opinion that (as the question may be) say 'aye'"; and after the affirmative voice is expressed, "As many as are of a contrary opinion, say 'no.'" If the speaker doubts, or a division is called for, the house shall be divided. Those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterward those in the negative.

#### THE SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE

5. The house shall at its pleasure elect a speaker pro tempore. When the speaker shall from any cause be absent, the speaker pro tempore shall preside, except when the chair is filled by appointment by either the speaker or the speaker pro tempore. The speaker or the speaker pro tempore shall have the right to name any member to perform the duties of speaker, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. The acts of the speaker pro tempore shall have the same validity as those of the speaker. In the absence of both the speaker and the speaker pro tempore, the house shall name a speaker who shall preside over it and perform all the duties of speaker until such time as the speaker or speaker pro tempore shall be present, and his acts shall have the same force and validity as those of the regularly elected speaker.

#### APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

6. All committees shall be appointed by the speaker, unless otherwise especially directed by the house.

#### VOTE OF THE SPEAKER

7. In all cases of a call of the yeas and nays, the speaker shall vote; in other cases he shall not be required to vote unless the house is equally divided, or unless his vote, if given to the minority, will make the division equal, and in case of such equal division the question shall be lost.

#### DOCUMENTS SIGNED BY THE SPEAKER

8. All acts, addresses and joint resolutions shall be signed by the speaker, and all writs, warrants, subpoenas, issued by order of the house, shall be under his hand and attested by the clerk.

#### CLEARING OF THE LOBBY

9. In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby, the speaker or chairman of the committee of the whole house shall have power to have the same cleared.

#### REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS

10. After the journal is corrected the following order shall govern:
1. Business pending at last previous adjournment.
  2. Petitions or remonstrances to be offered.
  3. Reports of committees.
  4. Resolutions laid over under Rule 34.
  5. Bills to be introduced.
  6. Resolutions.
  7. Messages and communications on the speaker's table.
  8. Bills and resolutions read a second time.
  9. Bills on their passage.
  10. Reports in the possession of the house shall be taken up in their order.

#### RECOGNITION AND DECORUM IN DEBATE

11. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the house, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the presiding officer by his title, saying "Mr. Speaker," and shall not proceed until he shall be recognized by the chair, and shall confine himself to the question under debate and shall avoid personalities.

## CALLING TO ORDER AND APPEALS FROM THE CHAIR

12. When any member in speaking, or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the house, the speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, but may be permitted with leave of the house to explain; and the house shall, if appealed to, decide the case, but without debate. If there be no appeal, the decision of the chair shall be submitted to; if the decision be in favor of the member so called to order, he is at liberty to proceed. If the case requires it, he shall be liable to the censure of the house.

## RECOGNITION BY THE CHAIR

13. Should two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall designate the member entitled to speak.

## LIMITATION ON DEBATE

14. No member shall speak more than once on the same question without leave of the house, nor more than twice until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken, except as provided in section 26; provided further, when bills are being considered on their second reading debate thereon shall be limited to fifteen minutes to each member desiring to speak thereon, which may be extended by consent of the house.

## DECORUM DURING DEBATE

15. While the speaker is putting a question or addressing the house, no one shall walk out of or across the house; and when a member is speaking, no one shall engage in conversation or pass between him and the speaker.

## LIMITATION ON RIGHT TO VOTE

16. No member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is personally interested.

## COUNT ON DIVISION OF HOUSE

17. Upon a division and count of the house on any question, only those members standing in their places shall be counted.

## DUTY OF VOTING

18. Every member who shall be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the house for special reasons shall excuse him; but such a member must ask to be excused before commencing to take the vote on the main question.

## STATING THE QUESTION

19. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the speaker; or, being in writing, it shall be passed to the desk and read aloud by the clerk before debated.

## FORM OF MOTIONS

20. Every motion, except subsidiary or incidental motions, shall be reduced to writing if the speaker or any member desires it, but this exception shall not apply to motions to amend.

## ENDORSEMENT OF BILLS AND OTHER PAPERS

21. All bills, resolutions, petitions, memorials or other papers shall be accompanied by the name of the member presenting the same, and also the name of the county.

## WITHDRAWAL OF MOTIONS

22. After a motion is stated by the speaker, or read by the clerk, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the house, but may be withdrawn by leave of the house.

## ORDER AND PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS

23. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn; to lay on the table; for the previous question; to postpone to a certain day; to commit or amend; to postpone indefinitely; which several

motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged, and no motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit or postpone indefinitely being decided, shall again be allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition. A motion to strike out the enacting words of a bill shall have precedence of a motion to amend; and, if carried, shall be considered equivalent to its rejection.

#### ORDER ON QUESTION OF COMMITMENT

24. When a resolution shall be offered or a motion made to refer any subject, and different committees shall be proposed, question shall be taken in the following order: The committee of the whole house; a standing committee; a select committee.

#### MOTION TO ADJOURN

25. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when a member is speaking, or the house voting.

#### PREVIOUS QUESTION

26. The previous question shall always be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" When a member moves a previous question he shall specifically state in his motion whether it shall apply to the main question and the amendments, or to the amendment or amendments only. It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and when the motion prevails its effect shall be to put an end to all debate and to bring the house to a direct vote upon the question to which the motion applies, except when the motion applies to the main question, the member in charge of the measure under consideration, shall have ten (10) minutes in which to close the discussion before the vote is taken; when the motion applies to an amendment the person proposing the amendment shall have five minutes to close the discussion on the amendment. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to submitting the same, a call of the house shall be in order; but after such motion shall have been adopted no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question. If the previous question is decided in the negative the house shall proceed with the matter before it the same as though the previous question had not been moved.

#### MOTIONS NOT DEBATABLE

27. Motions to lay on the table, to adjourn, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate.

#### EFFECT OF INDEFINITE POSTPONEMENT

28. When a question is postponed indefinitely, it shall not be again acted upon during the session.

#### DIVISION OF THE QUESTION

29. Any member may call for a division of the question, which shall be divided if it comprehends questions so distinct that one being taken away, the rest may stand entire for the discussion of the house. A motion to strike out being lost shall preclude neither an amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

#### COMMITMENT

30. Motions and reports may be committed at the pleasure of the house.

#### IRRELEVANT AMENDMENTS

31. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

#### RECONSIDERATION

32. When a motion has been made and carried or lost, it shall be in order for any member of the majority, on the same or succeeding day, to move for a reconsideration thereof, and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions except the consideration of a conference report, a motion to fix the day to which the house shall adjourn, to adjourn, or to take a recess,

and shall not be withdrawn after the said succeeding day without the consent of the house; and thereafter any member may call it up for consideration, provided that such motion, if made during the last six days of the session, shall be disposed of when made. A motion to reconsider any vote by which a bill has passed or failed to pass the house shall require a constitutional majority to be sustained.

#### PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS

33. All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the house shall be filed by the member with the chief clerk or his assistant prior to the convening of the house. When in the regular order of business the time is reached for presenting petitions or remonstrances, the chief clerk or his assistant shall read a list of the petitions on file, giving the member's name who filed the same and a brief resume of the contents thereof, and the same shall be referred to the committee of his selection unless otherwise ordered by the house. Each member upon filing any such petition, memorial or other paper shall endorse thereon his name and a failure to do so will cause the same to be ignored.

#### CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTIONS

34. A proposition requesting information from the governor, secretary or any other state officer, and all resolutions shall lie on the table one day for consideration, and all such propositions shall be taken up for consideration in the order they were presented, immediately after the reports are called for from the select committee, and when adopted, the clerk shall cause the same to be delivered.

#### CALL OF THE HOUSE

35. Any five members, if the speaker be in the chair, shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members.

#### METHOD OF CALLING THE ROLL

36. Upon calls of the house, or in taking the yeas and nays on any question, the names of the members shall be called alphabetically, except that "Mr. Speaker" shall be called last. This rule does not preclude the use of the voting machine for the roll call and the use of the voting machine is hereby authorized.

#### ABSENCES AND EXCUSES

37. No member shall absent himself from the service of the house without leave unless he be sick or unable to attend.

#### METHOD OF CALLING THE HOUSE

38. Upon the call of the house, the names of the members shall be called by the clerk, and the absentees noted after which the names of the absentees shall again be called over, and the sergeant-at-arms be directed by the speaker to compel their attendance. Any member occupying his seat during a call of the house shall be counted by the speaker and his name entered in the journal as being present but not voting, for the purpose of making a quorum.

#### COMMITTEE MEETINGS

39. No committee shall sit during the sitting of the house without special leave.

#### QUORUM AND DEMAND FOR THE YEAS AND NAYS

40. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum, and upon demand of any two members the yeas and nays shall be ordered; the members demanding the yeas and nays shall arise for that purpose, and their names shall be entered in the journal.

#### TIME OF CONVENING

41. The hours to which this house shall stand adjourned from day to day shall be nine o'clock a. m., and two o'clock p. m., unless otherwise ordered by the house.

## COMMITTEE ON PAIRS

42. A committee on pairs may be appointed, to consist of two persons, one of whom shall be selected by the members of each of the two dominant political parties represented in the house. It shall be the duty of the committee to arrange all pairs between members, and to announce such pairs and the time for which they shall continue, to the house, which announcement shall be entered on the journal. Thereafter neither member so paired shall vote (upon any question of a political or partisan nature) until the time of pairing has expired, unless such pair is sooner dissolved by the mutual agreement of the persons so paired. When pairs are dissolved such dissolution shall be entered on the journal of the house.

## FORM OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

43. All bills and joint resolutions introduced shall be typewritten or printed on legal cap paper double spaced, with titles, enacting clause and body of bill as directed by the chief clerk of the house. The written or printed lines in the body of the bill, except the last line of each paragraph, shall contain in spaces, characters and letters, approximately sixty-five (65). Each bill shall be presented securely fastened in a bill cover, and be accompanied by two carbon or correct copies thereof, and by three copies of the title alone on separate slips.

## TIME OF INTRODUCTION OF BILLS. APPROPRIATION BILLS. DUTIES OF THE COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS

44. The final date for the introduction of bills shall be at the end of the third legislative day in March, 1923, excepting appropriation bills and committee bills introduced by the appropriations committee.

Bills carrying appropriations for state educational institutions and the institutions under the charge of the board of control shall not be introduced later than February 15, 1923, and no bill carrying an appropriation for any purpose shall be introduced after March 1st, except by the committee on appropriations.

The appropriations committee shall report back to the house not later than March 14, 1923, all bills in its hands.

Senate bills thereafter received carrying appropriations shall be referred to the appropriations committee, but must be reported back to the house within three days, and remain on the calendar three days before final consideration.

On or before March 14, 1923, the committee on appropriations shall prepare a schedule of all appropriations and have the same printed and laid upon the desks of the members, designating in such schedule such bills as may have already passed the house and such as remain to be considered.

## METHOD OF INTRODUCING AND READING OF BILLS

45. All bills to be introduced in the house shall be filed with the chief clerk, prior to the convening of the house. When the time for introducing bills is reached in the regular order of business, the chief clerk will proceed in the same manner as if the bills were introduced from the floor. This rule does not deny a member the right to introduce a bill from the floor, but members so far as practicable, are requested to observe this rule.

Every bill shall receive three several readings, but no bill shall have its second and third readings on the same day.

## FIRST READING AND RECEPTION OR REJECTION OF BILLS

46. The first reading of the bill shall be for information; and if opposition be made to it, the question is: "Shall this bill be rejected?" If no opposition be made, or if the question to reject be negatived, the bill shall go to its second reading without a question.

## SECOND READING, COMMITMENT AND AMENDMENTS

47. Upon a second reading of the bill, the speaker shall state that it is ready for commitment or amendment; and if committed then the question shall be

whether to a select or a standing committee, or to a committee of the whole house. If to a committee of the whole house, the house shall determine on what day.

All amendments offered to bills on file or on the calendar shall be accompanied by three copies and shall be filed with the chief clerk. Such amendments shall give the number of the bill sought to amend and the chief clerk shall number each such amendment thus: Amendment No. — to House File No. — or Senate File No. —.

#### COMMITMENT OF APPROPRIATION AND REVENUE BILLS

48. All bills to appropriate money shall be referred to the appropriations committee, and all bills pertaining to the levy, assessment or collection of taxes shall be referred to the committee on ways and means.

#### CONSIDERATION OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

49. After a bill has been committed and reported back it shall be considered on its second reading after the amendments of committee have been read.

#### RE-COMMITMENT

50. After the commitment and report thereof to the house, or any time before its passage, a bill may be re-committed.

#### ENGROSSMENT OF BILLS

51. Every bill shall be considered engrossed when ordered to a third reading, unless the house affirmatively directs engrossment.

#### CONSIDERATION OF BILLS UPON THIRD READING

52. No amendment, unless by way of correcting an error or omission, shall be received to any bill on its third reading, and no debate shall be allowed on the same.

#### CERTIFICATION OF BILLS

53. When a bill shall pass it shall be certified by the clerk noting the day of its passage at the foot thereof.

#### AMENDMENT AND SUSPENSION OF RULES

54. No standing rule or order of the house shall be rescinded or changed without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor, nor shall any rule be suspended nor shall any matter tabled upon motion be taken up except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; nor shall the order of business, as established by the rules of the house, be postponed or changed except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present.

#### TIME OF MAKING CERTAIN COMMITTEE REPORTS

55. It shall be in order for the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills to report at any time when no member is addressing the house.

#### PRINTING OF BILLS, MEMORIALS, AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

56. Bills and joint resolutions shall be printed in form as provided by law. Each house may direct the printing of an additional number of its own bills. A substitute for a bill offered by a member or by a committee, where it is entirely or substantially a complete substitute for the particular bill, unless otherwise ordered, shall be printed as a substitute for the original bill (and the caption shall so indicate, giving the substitute the same number as the original bill, but reciting "substitute for" such bill), and such substitute bill shall by the file clerk be included in the bill file next to the original bill and such substitute bill shall not be printed in the journals.

Local or legalizing bills of a strictly private interest shall not be printed in the journal, but are to be printed in bill form and placed in the files of the members, the same as other bills, in the order of their introduction. The cost of such printing shall be deposited with the superintendent of printing, in advance at the rate of \$2.00 per page, and the newspaper publication of the same shall be without cost to the state and the same shall not be published until the

cost of same shall be paid to the secretary of state. No legalizing act may be introduced until the provisions of section 74, chapter 286, acts of the 39th general assembly, providing for its printing, shall have been complied with.

#### COMMITTEE HEARINGS

57. When any matter is referred to a standing committee by motion of any member, it shall be the duty of the chairman of such standing committee to notify such member of the time of the sitting upon such matter referred, and such member shall be permitted to confer with such committee during their consideration of such matter, but no one not a member of the committee shall be present when the final vote is taken on any matter under consideration, and no final action shall be taken by the committee upon any bill on the day of public hearing thereon.

#### COMMITTEE CLASSIFICATION OF BILLS

58. Each standing committee of the house shall classify all bills referred to it. The bills of the greatest public importance shall be placed in the first class, and all other bills in the second class. Bills of the first class shall be first considered and reported to the house and no committee shall retain possession of any bill longer than ten days, except by consent of the house. But this shall not apply to the committee on appropriations, or code revision committee, or code commissioners' bills.

#### RULES OF PARLIAMENTARY PRACTICE

59. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the house in all cases where they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of this house and joint rules of both houses.

#### JOINT RESOLUTIONS

60. Joint resolutions shall be framed and treated as bills.

#### COMMITTEE PROCEDURE AND REPORTS

61. The chairman or clerk of a committee to which a bill is referred shall note thereon the date of its reference and it shall be the duty of each committee to report back all bills on its hands within ten days after the order of reference unless longer time is granted by a vote of the house, except as provided by rule 58. The minority of any committee may present its recommendations in writing with the report of the committee, and the same shall be printed in the journal, and said recommendation may, by a vote of the house, be substituted for the report of the committee. The clerks of the different committees shall be subject to their respective chairmen.

When a motion which works a final disposition of a bill in the committee is up for adoption the roll of the committee shall be called and the yeas and nays entered in the minutes of the meeting; this last provision, however, shall not apply to the committee on appropriations and judiciary.

It shall be the duty of the chairman to see that the record of the committee meetings as herein provided, is properly kept, and that the same is deposited with the chief clerk of the house at the final adjournment of the session.

#### COMMITTEE QUORUM

62. Seven members, or a majority, shall constitute a quorum of each standing committee; but each committee may elect to increase the number to constitute a quorum, in any number not to exceed a majority of the committee.

#### DECORUM DURING SESSIONS

63. No member or officer of the house shall be permitted to read newspapers within the bar of the house while the journal is being corrected, nor shall any person be permitted to use tobacco on the floor of the house during its session, or in the galleries at any time. This rule may be suspended by a majority vote of the members present.

#### ADMISSION TO THE FLOOR OF THE HOUSE AND PROHIBITION OF LOBBYING

64. No one shall be admitted to the floor of the house during its session, except members of the general assembly and employes in the performance of their duties, ex-members of the general assembly, the state officers and their

deputies, judges of the supreme and district courts, the families of members of the general assembly, superintendents and officers of the state institutions, and each member shall have the right to admit a friend who may be visiting him.

No person admitted to the floor of the house shall, while the house is in session, lobby or attempt to exercise any influence with any member for or against any matter then pending or that may thereafter be considered by the house. Any person violating this rule shall be summarily dismissed from the floor of the house, and shall forfeit his right to admission thereafter.

It shall be the duty of each member and employee of the house who believes that this rule is being violated to report such violation immediately to the sergeant-at-arms.

Lobbyists shall not be admitted, or be permitted to remain on the floor of the house or in the cloak rooms of the house, while the house is in session.

Representatives of the press shall be admitted to the reporters' gallery.

#### DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

65. *Chief Clerk.*—The chief clerk of the house shall have charge of the clerk's desk and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him. He shall be responsible for the custody and safe-keeping of all bills, resolutions and other matters laid before or introduced into the house, except while the same are in possession of the committee to whom the same shall have been referred, and when delivering the same to said committee he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall see that the journal of each day's proceedings is correctly and fully kept and fully made up before the next day's session, and be responsible for its safe-keeping. He shall have control of rooms four and five, which are assigned to said clerk for the use of himself and his assistants. He shall endorse on every bill or joint or concurrent resolution, the date of its introduction and by what member, or of its receipt from the senate, and also what action relating thereto is taken by the house. The assistant clerks shall be under his direction and he shall assign them their several duties in connection with the work of the clerk's desk.

*Sergeant-at-arms.*—The sergeant-at-arms shall wear the appropriate badge of his office, shall attend the house during its sessions, shall aid during the enforcement of order, under the direction of the speaker of the house, shall execute the commands of the house from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the presiding officer; shall, upon request of any member, have the house lighted up during any evening within the session, except Sunday, to an hour not later than 10 p. m.; shall see that no person, except those authorized to do so, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers, etc., thereat; shall see that the printed bills are properly distributed and filed upon the desks of the members, shall have charge of the files in the house bill room, and shall see that no copy of the bill is given except to or upon the order of the speaker of the house, or member, or state officer; shall see that an additional doorkeeper is detailed for duty at the house upon each day within the session, except Sunday, from 8:30 a. m. to 10:00 p. m.; but should no member of the house desire to occupy the chamber to that hour the detail may be relieved at 9:00 p. m.; shall have charge of the messengers of the house and see that they severally perform their duties, and shall promptly report to the speaker of the house any inefficiency or violation of duty on the part of said messengers.

*Doorkeepers.*—The doorkeeper of the house shall wear his appropriate badge of office; shall have special charge of the main door of the chamber during the sittings of the house, and shall see that the other doors of the house are properly attended to; shall have general charge and oversight of the additional doorkeepers of the house; shall detail such of the additional doorkeepers for such general or special duties as the sergeant-at-arms may deem proper or necessary for the efficiency of the house and the protection of the property within the chamber; shall see that the rule relating to admission to the floor of the chamber is strictly enforced; shall, ten minutes before the opening of each session of the house, see that the floor is cleared of all persons not entitled to occupy the same during the session; shall attend to seating visitors, and shall announce all committees and messages from the governor or senate.

*Janitors.*—The janitors of the house shall have charge, under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, of the cloak and retiring rooms adjoining the chamber, and shall see that the same are kept in proper order.

*Messengers.*—The messengers of the house shall attend the house during its sittings and perform the duties generally devolving on like employes. The messengers shall be under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms while the house is not sitting, and shall attend to such duties as he may assign them.

#### COMMITTEE CLERKS

66. Committee clerks of the house shall be under the general direction of the speaker. All committee clerks shall be on duty at the house from 8:30 a. m. until 5:30 p. m. except as herein otherwise provided. Any clerk absenting himself or herself from the house except for the noon luncheon without filing at the desk a written excuse signed by the members to whom he or she is assigned, shall not receive any pay for the day or days on which he or she is absent. Committee clerks shall do work for any member of the house upon request unless otherwise employed.

#### EXTRA COMPENSATION OF EMPLOYEES

67. No employe shall receive any extra compensation or tips for services performed while on duty. Any violation of this rule shall be ground for removal.

#### ORGANIZATION OF COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

68. In forming committee of the whole house, the speaker shall leave his chair, and a chairman to preside in committee shall be appointed by the speaker.

#### BILLS IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

69. Upon bills committed to the committee of the whole house, the bill shall be first read throughout by the clerk or chairman, and then read again or debated by the clauses, leaving the preamble to be last considered. After report, the bill shall be again subject to be debated and amended by clauses before a question to engross it be taken.

#### COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS TO MOTIONS

70. All amendments made to an original motion in committee shall be incorporated in a motion and so reported.

#### AMENDMENTS BY COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

71. All amendments made to a report committed to a committee of the whole house shall be noted and reported as in the case of bills.

#### FILLING BLANKS

72. In filling up blanks in the committee of the whole house, and in the house, the largest sum and the longest time and the highest number shall be first put.

#### RULES IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

73. The rules of the house shall be observed in committee of the whole house, so far as they are applicable.

#### HOUSE CALENDAR

74. Bills reported out by the committee shall not be acted upon until the report of the committee has been printed in the journal.

The chief clerk is hereby authorized to have printed and placed on the members' desks a calendar or typewritten copy of the titles of bills to be taken up for consideration.

## BIOGRAPHIES

## BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE OFFICERS

**N. E. KENDALL.**—Governor, was born March 17, 1868, on a farm in Lucas county and received his education in the rural schools of that county. Was admitted to the bar May 15, 1889; served two terms (1893-1897) as county attorney of Monroe county; five terms (1899-1909) as representative in the general assembly, last term as speaker; two terms (1909-1913) as member of congress. Was elected governor in 1920 and re-elected in 1922.

**JOHN HAMMILL.**—Lieutenant governor, was born in Linden, Iowa county, Wis., October 14, 1875. Attended the common schools of Wisconsin until 1889, when he moved with his parents near Britt, Hancock county, Iowa. Graduated from Britt high school in 1895. Graduated from the law department of the state university of Iowa in June, 1897. Engaged in the practice of law at Britt, Iowa. He was married to Fannie B. Richards on June 7, 1899. Elected county attorney in 1902, serving two terms. Was elected as a member of the state senate in 1908. Elected lieutenant governor in 1902. Re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**WALTER C. RAMSAY.**—Secretary of state, was born in Ford county, Ill., August 15, 1878. His parents were natives of Ohio, both being of Scotch-Irish lineage. Received his early education in the graded schools of Paxton, Ill., and the high school at Owatonna, Minn. He came to Iowa in 1895, locating at Garner, Hancock county. Taught a country school four years and moved to Belmond, Wright county, Iowa, in 1901, and engaged in newspaper work. Served as postmaster, mayor, and on the school board of Belmond and as chief clerk of the Iowa house of representatives in the thirty-sixth, thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies. Was second in the contest for secretary of state in the 1918 June primary. Appointed by the governor April 3, 1919, and assumed office July 1, 1919. Married October 2, 1904, to Miss Una Ames, of Minneapolis. Elected for the full term in 1920. Re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**GLENN C. HAYNES.**—Auditor of state. Residence, Mason City, Iowa. Was born at Centerville, Iowa, August 25, 1876. Son of Eugene C. and Elma Felkner Haynes. Married in 1896 to Mamie Lane, and has two children, Edna May and Theodore. Was for many years connected with the post office department as assistant postmaster and post office inspector. After world war engaged in the real estate business. In Spanish-American war was a sergeant in Co. E, 50th Iowa volunteer infantry. In world war was captain of Co. D, 168th infantry (Rainbow division), and major commanding 2nd battalion, 168th infantry. A republican.

**WILLIAM J. BURBANK.**—Treasurer of state, was born in Waverly, Bremer county, Iowa, May 21, 1866, of American parents. He received his education in the schools of Waverly. He is a Mason, a Knight Templar, and belongs to Waterloo camp of Sons of Veterans. At the age of 16 years was taken into his father's drug store at Allison, Iowa, and became a registered pharmacist (certificate 3669) in the year 1889. Was married December 14, 1895, to Miss Lena A. Hummell. While in the drug business at Allison he also served as postmaster four years during the Harrison administration. He was elected county treasurer of Butler county in 1898 and re-elected in 1900. Moved to Waterloo in 1904, going into the employ of the Paul Davis Dry Goods company. Nine years later he was elected county treasurer of Black Hawk county and re-elected in 1916 and 1918. Elected state treasurer in 1920. Re-elected in 1922. Republican in politics.

**R. W. CASSADY.**—Secretary of agriculture, was born November, 1881, Whiting, Iowa. Attended state university at Iowa City in 1899 and 1900. Attended Iowa state college in 1903 and returned there in 1908 and 1909 for special work in animal husbandry. Represented the Iowa state college on their 1909 judging team. Has been engaged in farming at Whiting, Iowa, and has paid particular attention to the breeding of purebred Hereford cattle. He is a member of the board of directors of the American Hereford Cattle Breeders' Association.

**MAY E. FRANCIS.**—State superintendent of public instruction, was born on a farm. She attended the rural school, high school; graduated from Iowa state teachers' college with additional work in state university of Iowa and Drake school of law, and completed a year's graduate work in Columbia university, New York. Has taught in Iowa rural schools, high schools, has been high school principal; superintendent of city schools; county superintendent of Bremer county four years, and served for two years as Iowa state inspector of grade and rural schools.

**BEN J. GIBSON.**—Attorney general, was born in Adams county, Iowa. Educated in Adams county common schools, Corning high school, university of Nebraska, university of Nebraska school of law. Practicing attorney, Corning, 1906-1921. County attorney, Adams county, 1908-1912. Senator, sixth district, 1916. Military record, Iowa national guard, 1901-1916; captain 3rd Iowa infantry, Mexican border service, 1916-1917; captain, 72nd United States infantry, world war service. Elected attorney general November, 1920; and again in 1922; took office January 3, 1921. Married September 5, 1905, to Miss Anna Rolston, of Adams county. Has three sons, Wayne, Wendall and Ben J., Jr. A republican.

**WILLIAM D. EVANS.**—Judge of the supreme court, was born in Marquette county, Wis., 1852. In 1858 he came with his parents to Williamsburg, Iowa. Here he attended the public schools and in 1873 entered the state university. While a student at the university he taught school and was an instructor in a number of teachers' institutes during vacation. He graduated from the classical course of the university in 1878 and the following year took the law course from which he graduated in 1879. Following his admittance to the bar in 1879, he located at Hampton. In 1902 he was elected judge of the district court for the eleventh judicial district. During the year 1907-8 he was law lecturer at the state university. In September, 1908, he was nominated for judge of the supreme court by the republican state convention to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Charles A. Bishop. He was elected at the general election and by reason of statute became chief justice of the supreme court in January, 1909. Was re-elected in 1910, again in 1916 and again in 1922. The Grinnell college conferred the degree of LL.D. upon him in 1916. He is a republican in politics.

**TRUMAN S. STEVENS.**—Judge of the supreme court, was born in Tama county, Iowa, 55 years ago. Attended the public schools, the Guthrie county high school; graduated from the law department of the state university and in 1892 located at Hamburg, Fremont county, where he still resides. Was appointed judge of the fifteenth judicial district February 1, 1917, and to the supreme court May, 1917. Was elected to said office in 1918 and re-elected in 1922. Has held no other public office except that of county attorney of Fremont county for one term. Was married in 1893 to Miss Cora Patterson. They had one daughter born to them, Velma, who died December 14, 1910, at the age of thirteen.

**BYRON W. PRESTON.**—Judge of the supreme court, was born at Newton, Jasper county, Iowa, February 13, 1858. Lived on a farm until 13 years of age, then went with his parents to Grinnell, Iowa. Attended public school and Iowa college at Grinnell. He engaged in mercantile business at Newton and Grinnell until 1883, when he went to Oskaloosa and read law with Judge L. C. Blanchard. Was admitted to the bar in 1884. Elected county attorney in 1891 and served four years. Was also city attorney. Elected judge of the district court in 1902 and served as such until January 1, 1913. In 1916 the Grinnell college conferred

upon him the degree of LL.D. Was elected judge of the supreme court of Iowa in 1912, re-elected in 1918. Married Nellie Blanchard of Newton in 1880, who died in 1914. Has two children, a son and a daughter. Is a communicant of St. James' Episcopal church at Oskaloosa, and a member of all Masonic bodies. A republican in politics.

**SILAS M. WEAVER.**—Judge of the supreme court, was born December 18, 1843, in Arkwright, Chautauqua county, N. Y. He acquired his education in the common schools and at Fredonia academy, Fredonia, N. Y. He was admitted to the bar at Buffalo, N. Y., in 1868. In the same year he moved to Iowa Falls, Iowa, where he has since resided. He served as representative from Hardin county in the twentieth and twenty-first general assemblies. In the twentieth general assembly he was chairman of the house judiciary committee, and in the twenty-first general assembly he officiated as chairman of the board of managers in the impeachment trial of John L. Brown. In 1886 he was elected judge of the district court for the eleventh judicial district and was re-elected in 1890, 1894 and 1898. In 1901 he was nominated and elected to succeed Josiah Given upon the supreme bench, becoming chief justice on January 1, 1907. He was re-elected to the supreme bench in 1908, 1914 and 1920. A republican in politics.

**FREDERICK F. FAVILLE.**—Judge of the supreme court, was born on a farm in Mitchell county, Iowa, June 5, 1865. He attended the public schools at Mitchell, Iowa, and later the Cedar Valley seminary at Osage, Iowa. He attended Iowa state college at Ames, from which he graduated with the degree of bachelor of science. He attended the law department of the university of Maryland at Baltimore, and completed his course in law at the state university of Iowa in 1891. After being admitted to the bar, he began the practice of law at Sioux Rapids, Iowa, and moved from there to Storm Lake in 1895. He served two terms as county attorney of Buena Vista county. He was presidential elector from the eleventh congressional district in 1904. In 1907 he was appointed by President Roosevelt as United States attorney for the northern district of Iowa, and served in that office over six years. In 1918 he moved to Fort Dodge, Iowa, and continued the practice of law, as a member of the firm of Healy & Faville. In 1920 he was elected to the supreme bench. A republican in politics.

**THOMAS ARTHUR.**—Is an Iowan, born and bred, a product of the farm, being born in Harrison county July 12, 1860. After attending common school and afterwards receiving an academy education, he entered the law department of the state university of Iowa, graduating in 1881, and was soon afterwards admitted to the bar. He taught school and served as clerk of the district court of Harrison county until 1891, when he entered the active practice of law at Logan. In 1911 he went upon the district bench in the fifteenth district, and served until September 15, 1920, when he was appointed a member of the supreme court of Iowa to succeed Justice Frank R. Gaynor, deceased. He was elected to the supreme bench in 1920. A republican in politics.

**LAWRENCE DEGRAFF.**—Born near Galena, Ill., June 1871. Educated at Morgan Park academy, Dixon college (A.B.), University of Chicago (Ph.B.), Northern Illinois college of law (LL.M.). Began the practice of law in Chicago, and removed to Des Moines in 1898, as secretary and instructor in the Highland Park college of law, and entered upon the practice in Des Moines with the firm Miller, Wallingford and DeGraff. First assistant attorney general of Iowa, under Hon. Chas. W. Mullan, 1904-1907. County attorney, Polk county, Iowa, 1907-1910. District judge, ninth judicial district, 1910-1921. Elected justice of the supreme court, 1920. Married August 14, 1901; two children, Lawrence, Jr. age 13, and Barbara, age 7. National head of the Sigma Chi college fraternity. Author of several legal textbooks. Republican in politics. Resides at 4920 Country Club boulevard, Des Moines, Iowa.

**DWIGHT LEWIS.**—Railroad commissioner, born in Oskaloosa, Iowa, where he first attended school. Later removed to Des Moines, where he continued his education, graduating from Drake university (law) in 1893, when he was also

admitted to the bar. Secretary of commission 1899 to 1911. Assistant commerce counsel, 1911 to 1917. Appointed to vacancy on commission January 3, 1917; elected to full term 1918, and re-elected for second term 1922. President of National Association of Railway and Utilities Commissioners 1922-1923. Republican.

**FRED P. WOODRUFF.**—Railroad commissioner, member of the railroad commission, was born at Knoxville, Iowa, September 21, 1876. Captain Woodruff was educated in the Knoxville public schools. In the Spanish-American war he served as first sergeant of Co. D, 51st Iowa infantry, in the Philippines. For meritorious service in action he was commissioned second lieutenant and brevetted a captain by Governor Shaw. On his return home he engaged in the retail clothing and shoe business and continues in that line now. He is also a director in the Marion county national bank and is interested in various other business enterprises. During the world war Captain Woodruff was active in promoting various war work activities, was a member of the Marion county council of defense and war work council, and later was commissioned captain and assigned to duty in the quartermaster department. He was married September 18, 1901, to Myrtle M. Elliott, and they have one son, Elliott. Was elected for full term in 1920 as railroad commissioner. A republican in politics.

**CHARLES WEBSTER.**—Railroad commissioner, was born on a farm at Waucoma, Iowa, in 1859, and still resides on the old homestead. Taught in the public schools, edited a county paper, and May 4, 1880, was appointed railway agent and operator at Waucoma. He immediately, in partnership with his brother, Ace, established the firm of Webster Brothers, who have since been extensive raisers and shippers of live stock, grain and produce. He is the president of several retail lumber companies operating in Iowa, North and South Dakota and Montana. He has been extensively interested in the building of telephone lines and exchanges. He has promoted and built gas and electric companies in Arizona. He was delegate to the national republican convention in 1908. Was a member of the state council of defense and later state fuel administrator. He was appointed railroad commissioner by Governor Harding to succeed Hon. E. D. Chassell, resigned, and assumed the duties of the office November 5, 1917. He was elected for a full term in 1918.

**ROBERT L. LEACH.**—Superintendent of banking, attended public school at Adel, Iowa, and later, Grinnell college. Graduated from liberal arts college, state university of Iowa, in 1905. Married in 1907 to Jessie Smith, daughter of Senator James A. Smith of Osage, Iowa. Three children. Vice president Adel state bank, Adel. Appointed by Governor Kendall May 4, 1923, for unexpired term of W. J. Murray.

**W. R. C. KENDRICK.**—Commissioner of insurance, born at Malcom, Iowa, September 11, 1878. Received his collegiate education at Iowa Wesleyan university, Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, and Ohio Wesleyan university, Delaware, O., and his legal education at the state university of Iowa. Was admitted to the bar in 1903, and practiced law at Keokuk, Iowa, until January 1, 1917, at which time he was appointed assistant attorney general by Attorney General H. M. Havner, and served four years, and was reappointed assistant attorney general by Attorney General Ben J. Gibson, and served two years. He was appointed commissioner of insurance, February 1, 1923, by Governor N. E. Kendall. Prior to joining the staff of the attorney general he was for six years at the head of the chamber of commerce at Keokuk, and for two years served as secretary of the Central Mississippi Valley league, composed of the commercial organizations in the principal cities from Chicago to Kansas City, and from St. Louis to St. Paul. For four years he served on the executive committee of the Upper Mississippi River Improvement association. He was formerly assistant adjutant general of Utah.

**CHARLES SCHAEFFER GRANT.**—President of the state board of health. Born in Ithaca, N. Y., in 1872, came to Iowa in 1889. Studied pharmacy at the university of Iowa, 1889-90. Graduated in medicine at the university of Iowa in

1897, served as first lieutenant and assistant surgeon and later major surgeon of 50th Iowa volunteers in the war with Spain. Was instructor in pediatrics in the medical college of Iowa state university for nine years. Was secretary and medical member of the southern district exemption board during the world war. Was major surgeon in the Iowa national guard for many years following the war with Spain.

**A. B. FUNK.**—Iowa industrial commissioner, administering workmen's compensation service. Born in Adams county, Ill., January 12, 1854. Came to Hamilton county in 1865. Identified with the Spirit Lake Beacon for thirty-five years. Established the Enterprise at Flandreau, Dakota, in 1878. In 1879 elected first mayor of Flandreau, and, returning to Spirit Lake, was in the same year chosen as its first mayor. Postmaster at Spirit Lake, 1882-5. Delegate to republican national convention in 1884. State senator 1888-1900. For three sessions president pro tem and chairman of ranking committee. Eleventh district member resolutions committee in ten republican state conventions. President capitol improvement commission by appointment of Governor Cummins. For six years vice president of state board of education under two appointments by Governor Carroll. Resigned to accept present position upon resignation of Hon. Warren Garst January 1, 1916, by appointment of Governor Clarke. Re-appointed 1919 by Governor Harding for term of six years.

**ULYSSES GRANT WHITNEY.**—Reporter of the supreme court and code editor, was born July 10, 1864, on a farm near Union, Iowa. Was admitted to the bar in June, 1890. Was county attorney in Sioux City for ten years. Was a member of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth general assemblies from Woodbury county. Was appointed by the judges of the supreme court to his present position in 1914 and reappointed in 1918. Re-appointed in January, 1923. Was a member of the Iowa code commission in 1919.

**BURGESS WILSON GARRETT.**—Clerk of the supreme court, was born on a farm in Van Buren county, Iowa, February 24, 1872. When a child his parents moved to Davis county, and later, to Decatur county. Mr. Garrett was educated in the public schools, Simpson college and St. Joseph university, from which institution he graduated. He educated himself, being dependent upon his own resources from the time he was fourteen years of age. He taught school for a number of years, being principal of the Decatur high school. Has been chairman of the county central committee; member of the senatorial and congressional committees. He was pardon secretary to Governor Cummins. Served in that capacity until July 1, 1907, when he became the first secretary of the board of parole. He resigned to become a candidate for the office he now holds. The office being made appointive, he has twice been appointed by the court. He has been active in politics, church and benevolent activities. Was president of the state missionary board of his church for seven years. Was temporary chairman of the republican state convention in 1916. A republican in politics.

**WILLIARD C. STUCKSLAGER.**—Member of board of education, was born in the town of Lisbon, Linn county, Iowa, October 24, 1869. He graduated from the high school at Lisbon in 1886. Then entered Cornell college at Mount Vernon, Iowa, going in 1893 to Chicago university. In 1894 engaged in the banking business at Lisbon, Iowa, entering the Stuckslager-Aurachter bank, founded by his father in 1874. At present is president of the bank and also of the Mount Vernon bank. Is interested in educational matters and has been a member of the board of trustees of Cornell college for the past eighteen years, twelve years of which time he has been a member of the executive committee. Elected representative in 1899 and served during the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth general assemblies. In 1903 he was elected to the senate and served during the thirtieth, thirty-first, thirty-second, thirty-second extra, thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. A republican in politics.

**PARKER KIMBALL HOLBROOK.**—Member of the board of education, was born at Onawa, Iowa, September 23, 1864, and is the son of Bernard D. Holbrook and Mary F. (Oliver) Holbrook. He was educated in Onawa high school and the

state university of Iowa, of which latter institution he was a member of the class of 1886, but did not graduate. In June, 1885, he entered the banking house of Holbrook & Brothers, in which he became a partner in 1894 and has continued in that business to the present time, being now president of the First Trust & Savings bank of Onawa into which the business of Holbrook & Brother was changed by incorporation, in 1910. He was elected regent of the state university in 1916, and re-elected in 1902 and 1908. Elected chairman of the executive of the board of regents in 1897, and continued in that position until the establishment of the state board of education. A republican in politics.

**PAULINE LEWELLING DEVITT.**—Was born April 10, 1877, in the Iowa state reform school for girls, which her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Lewelling, had recently organized near Mount Pleasant, Iowa. In 1887, shortly after the death of Mrs. Lewelling, the family moved to Kansas, of which state Mr. Lewelling was elected governor in 1892. Mrs. Devitt graduated from the Wichita high school and the state university of Kansas and taught in high school for four years. In 1901 she was married to J. A. Devitt of Oskaloosa, Iowa, at that time county attorney for Mahaska county. To this union three children were born. Mrs. Devitt was president of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association when a special session of the legislature ratified the federal suffrage amendment. In 1920 delegate-at-large to the national republican convention, one of the first women to serve in that capacity. At the time of her appointment to the state board of education by Governor Kendall she was serving on the local school board in Oskaloosa.

**CHARLES H. THOMAS.**—Member of the state board of education, was born in Warren county, Ill., in 1800, of Welsh and Scotch parentage. The father served in the Mexican war under General Zachary Taylor, blood-relation of the mother of this sketch. Came to Iowa in 1876 and completed his education in the Cromwell public school. At twenty he left the farm to enter business and has been actively engaged in mercantile life since. Served ten years on the local school board at Kent, Iowa. Represented Union, Ringgold and Decatur counties in the state senate 1913 to 1917. Author of the original Iowa "blue sky law," "teachers' minimum wage law," the prohibitory amendment voted on in 1918. Removed to Creston in 1916, where he is the senior member of the Creston Hardware Co., and one of the leading business men of the city. Married in 1886 to Miss Jemina I. Brown. Four children, Grace E., Hobart M., Mary I., and Carnot H., make up the family circle. A Methodist in church affiliation and an active republican in politics.

**GEORGE T. BAKER.**—Member of board of education, was born on a farm in Iowa county, Iowa. He was educated in the district schools of Iowa, Hall's school for boys, at Ellington, Conn., McClain's academy at Iowa City, and the Iowa State university. He remained one year at the state university and then completed four years of special work in civil engineering at Cornell university, Ithaca, class of 1879. During the years from 1879 to 1889 he was engaged in railway location, construction and maintenance work, after which he was chief consulting engineer for the high bridges built across the Mississippi river at Muscatine and Clinton, and Winona, Minn. From 1893 until January, 1910, he was engaged in general construction work on railways, paving, sewerage, water works, and heavy construction. Served as a member of the general assembly in the twenty-sixth regular and special session, was a member of the house of representatives from Scott county, was elected mayor of the city of Davenport in 1898, serving two years and was delegate at large to the democratic national convention in 1900. A democrat in politics.

**ANNA B. LAWTHER.**—Was born in Dubuque, Iowa, and is the daughter of William Lawther and Annie Elizabeth (Bell) Lawther. Her grandparents were among the earliest settlers of the state. She received her early education in the public schools of Dubuque. Miss Lawther was prepared for college at Miss Stevens' school, Germantown, Pa., and received her bachelor of arts degree from Bryn Mawr college in 1897. The year following her graduation she became assistant bursar of Bryn Mawr college. From 1904 to 1905 she was

the Warden of Merion Hall, Bryn Mawr college, and from 1907 to 1912 she was the secretary of Bryn Mawr college. After resigning her position at her Alma Mater Miss Lawther returned to Dubuque where she became interested in local activities. During the campaign for equal suffrage in the spring of 1916, Miss Lawther was the chairman of the Dubuque County Equal Suffrage league and in the autumn of the same year was elected president of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association and was twice re-elected to that position. She was a member of the state council of defense during the war. When presidential suffrage was granted to the women of Iowa by the thirty-eighth general assembly, Miss Lawther was made the democratic national committeewoman for Iowa and was sent as a delegate to the democratic national convention at San Francisco in 1920. She is at present the democratic national committeewoman for Iowa. She is one of the two women appointed by Governor Kendall to serve on the state board of education.

**EDWARD P. SCHOENTGEN.**—Member of board of education, was born August 16, 1873, in Council Bluffs. Attended local school until 12 years of age. Then attended an academy in Milwaukee, Wis., later entering the manual training school in Washington university, St. Louis. In 1891 he entered the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston, taking the course in architecture, receiving the degree of S. B. in architecture in 1895. Then followed about three years' foreign study, two of which were spent in Paris, France, at the Ecole des Beaux arts as a pupil of Jean Louis Pascal, Member L'Institute, and architect of the national library. The balance of the time was spent in the French provinces and Italy. Upon returning to this country, he was identified with architectural work in St. Louis and in 1899 opened an office in Council Bluffs, practicing in that city during the next ten years. He then relinquished the practice of his profession and became actively connected with the wholesale grocery firm of Groneweg & Schoentgen company. He was married in 1901 to Miss Mable Pratt, of Des Moines, daughter of M. M. Pratt. In 1902 appointed a member of the capitol commission by Governor A. B. Cummins. He rendered no other public service until appointed to the board of education by Governor Carroll. A democrat in politics.

**DANIEL D. MURPHY.**—Member of board of education, was born of Irish parentage near New Diggings, Lafayette county, Wis., August 22, 1862. He was educated in the public schools of the state of Wisconsin, and graduated from the Wisconsin State Normal school. In 1883 he came to Guttenberg, Clayton county, Iowa, as superintendent of the high school, which position he held for three years. In 1887 he was graduated from the law college of the State University of Iowa, and returned to Clayton county, finally locating at Elkader, where he has been engaged in the practice of law for many years. He served as county attorney of Clayton county from 1891 to 1895; has been a member of the school board of Elkader for several years. He is a member of the state bar association, and was president in 1907 and 1908; is also a member of the American Bar association, and of the American academy of political and social sciences. A democrat in politics.

**CHARLES RICHMOND BRENTON.**—Member of board of education, was born near Dallas Center, Iowa, January 30, 1864. When fourteen years of age he moved to Dallas Center with his parents, where he has since resided. Was married in 1893 to Miss Carrie Woodward. Has always been a republican and was a delegate to the national convention at St. Louis in 1896. He has been president of the Dallas Center school board for many years and the Dallas Center high school has long been his special pride. He served four years on the board of trustees of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. Mr. Brenton and his brother are the owners of several thousand acres of Iowa land, several banks and many other large outside investments. He is now vice president of the bank of Dallas Center. Mr. Brenton was a delegate to the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church held in Baltimore in 1908. He is a member of the Masonic order and several other fraternal organizations.

**W. H. GEMMILL.**—Secretary of the Iowa State Board of Education, was born in Ontario, Canada, March 14, 1871. In September of that year his parents moved to Keokuk county, Iowa, and settled on a farm near South English. He attended the rural schools and graduated from the South English high school in 1889. He entered the Iowa state college at Ames and graduated in November, 1894, with the degree of bachelor of science. During these years, he taught several terms in country schools. He has taken educational work in history and economics in Highland Park college, Drake university and Des Moines college. He was principal of schools at Gibson, Iowa, two and one-half years; county superintendent of Keokuk county four years; superintendent of schools at Dallas Center from 1901 to 1911, and superintendent of the Carroll schools 1914 to 1917 and resigned to become secretary of the Iowa State Board of Education. He was married in 1895 to Birdie D. Richards. They have four children, Agnes, John, Helen and Iva.

**WILLIAM R. BOYD.**—Chairman of the finance committee of the board of education, is a native of Iowa, having been born in Lisbon, Linn county, May 19, 1864. His boyhood was spent in Tipton, Iowa, where he attended the public schools. He was graduated from the college of liberal arts of the state university in June, 1889, having earned his way by teaching school and clerking in a store. He was principal of the school at Mechanicsville, Iowa, two years. He was editor of the Tipton Advertiser two years, editor and associate editor of the Cedar Rapids Republican sixteen years. Mr. Boyd served as postmaster of Cedar Rapids from 1899 to 1909, resigning this office to accept his present position. He has long been interested in educational matters, and was for several years a member of the board of trustees of Coe college, and for a time lecturer on political economy in that institution. Mr. Boyd is a director of the American Trust and Savings bank, and president of the Perpetual Savings and Loan association, both located in Cedar Rapids. A republican in politics.

**THOMAS LAMBERT.**—Member of finance committee of the board of education, was born on a farm near Sabula, Jackson county, Iowa, in 1855. Received his education in a select school in Sabula, and has been a resident there from birth. In 1880 he entered the newspaper field, purchasing the Sabula Gazette, which he owned and controlled for thirty-nine years. His political affiliation is with the democratic party. He served for four years as city recorder, followed by eight successive terms as mayor of Sabula. He was justice of the peace over twenty years and secretary of the school board twenty-eight. He was elected a member of the house of representatives in 1895 and 1897. Elected to the senate in 1899 and 1903, and served three sessions in the house and six in the senate. Served on the legislative commission appointed to investigate and report on the one board of management for the state educational institutions. Was a delegate to the democratic national convention in 1888. On August 3, 1883, he was united in marriage with Miss Jennie Cotton of Sabula. A democrat in politics.

**ANTHONY M. McCOLL.**—Member of the board of control of state institutions, was born in Caledonia, Livingston county, N. Y., May 19, 1858. He moved with his parents to Iowa in 1876. For many years he was engaged in farming and the lumber and grain business at Woodward, Iowa, and for three terms was clerk of the district court of Dallas county. Was elected state senator from the seventeenth district in 1910 and re-elected in 1912. Appointed a member of the board of control by Governor Clarke to succeed Gifford S. Robinson, whose term expired June 30, 1913. Appointed by Governor Harding for a term of six years ending June 30, 1925. A republican in politics.

**JOHN B. BUTLER.**—Member of the board of control, was born near London, Canada, in 1856. Came with his parents to Iowa in 1868 and settled on a farm north of Fort Dodge. Received his primary education in the country schools. Was a member of the class of 1876 of Iowa state college, but quit college near the end of the junior year on account of poor health. Taught

school for several years and served as county superintendent of schools of Webster county for four years. Was admitted to the bar in 1883. Served on the board of education of Fort Dodge for thirteen years, most of the time being president of the board, and at present is a member of the school board. A democrat in politics and has been the candidate of his party for the state senate and for congress.

**J. H. STRIEF.**—Member of the board of control of state institutions, was born in Galena, Ill., August 21, 1865. His parents located at Dubuque, Iowa, in 1866, a few years later moving to Chicago, Ill., and residing in the latter city until 1876; in August of that year again taking up residence in Iowa, at LeMars, Plymouth county, where he learned the printer's trade and conducted a weekly newspaper. Also published a weekly newspaper at Kingsley, Iowa, establishing the Times during the pioneer days of that town. In the years since 1876 he has been a continuous resident of Iowa. He later located in Sioux City and for years was connected with the daily newspapers of that city. He was president of the Iowa State Federation of Labor from 1913 to 1917. He married Miss Helena Bastian, of LeMars, and has two sons, Harry J., and William B. A republican in politics. Legal residence, Sioux City, Iowa.

**L. A. JENSEN.**—Member of the board of parole, was born in Osage, Mitchell county, Iowa, May 21, 1869. His father made homestead entry near Lake Mills on the same farm which the subject of this sketch took over from the other heirs and still owns. Was elected clerk of the district court of Winnebago county. Served eight years in this capacity, and read law in the office of George D. Peters, and was admitted to the bar. Elected county attorney for Winnebago county, serving three terms. He has been an active member of the Lutheran church, and was one of the founders of Waldorf Lutheran college at Forest City, serving as secretary of the association from the time of its organization. He was also for many years secretary of the board of education in his home city and has been chairman of the republican central committee for many years, having been an active republican all his life. He was appointed by Governor Kendall April 8, 1921, to fill the unexpired term of W. S. Withrow on the board of parole, and also appointed to the full term of six years, commencing July 1, 1921.

**J. R. MURPHY.**—Member of the board of parole, was born in Vernon township, Dubuque county, Iowa, May 2, 1887. Attended school at Ida Grove, Iowa, and graduated from high school. Attended liberal arts college and law school, State University of Iowa, was graduated from law school in 1912. County attorney Ida county two terms. Mexican border service 2d Iowa infantry 1916-17; world war 34th and 28th Divisions, rank of captain; resumed practice of law after war at Ida Grove; appointed to the board of parole in January, 1923, to fill unexpired term of George T. Reddick, which expires June 30, 1923. A democrat in politics.

**JOHN O. WOODMANSEE.**—Member of the board of parole, was born in Decatur county, Iowa, in 1881. His education was acquired in the public schools and at the American School of Osteopathy, graduated in June, 1901. He began the practice of his profession in Des Moines immediately on graduating. Located in Leon in September, 1912, where he has since resided. Has been a member of the Leon school board. He was appointed a member of the board of parole by Governor Harding for the term beginning July 1, 1919. A republican in politics.

**LOUIS G. LASHER.**—Adjutant general of Iowa, was born in Davenport, Iowa, March 17, 1873. His education was acquired in the grade and high schools of Davenport, and the military school Kemper Hall, and Griswold college. His business career began as a traveling salesman in 1891, and in 1897 he accepted the position of manager of the provision business of Swift & Co., at Alleghany City, Pa., from which place he rejoined Company B, 50th Iowa Volunteer infantry in May, 1898, for duty in the Spanish-American war. He served from

May 12 to November 30, 1898, in Des Moines, Iowa, and Jacksonville, Fla. On January 5, 1899, he enlisted in the 12th U. S. infantry for service in the Philippines, and was discharged January 4, 1902. On his return to the United States, he traveled until July, 1905, when he helped organize the Lasher Manufacturing Co., of Davenport, Iowa. September 1, 1906, he accepted the general managership of the C. O. D. Cleaning & Dyeing Co., of Davenport, Iowa, and in 1910 became the president and general manager of that firm. On July 24, 1915, he was appointed by Governor Clarke as a lieutenant colonel and A. D. C., and was re-appointed to the same position by Governor Harding on February 1, 1917. On July 20, 1918, he was appointed colonel and assistant adjutant general of Iowa, and on September 1, 1918, he was promoted to be brigadier general, and adjutant general of Iowa, to fill out the unexpired term of Adjutant General Logan. A republican in politics.

**ROBERT HENDERSON.**—Superintendent of printing and ex-officio secretary of the state printing board, was born at Burlington, Iowa, in 1874, and has lived all his life in Iowa. He was many years engaged in newspaper work at various points in Iowa, and prior to that worked at his trade as printer. He is married and has three children. He was appointed superintendent of printing June 1, 1921, to serve at the pleasure of the state printing board. A republican in politics.

**J. H. HENDERSON.**—Commerce counsel, born in 1848 in Warren county, Iowa, on the present site of the town of Ackworth, and has ever since resided in Warren county. Received his education in the public schools and in college at Indianola. Admitted to practice of law 1870. Member of school board at Indianola. Secretary of the board of trustees of Simpson college from 1869 until 1919, during which time was and is now a member of the board of trustees of that institution. Delegate to the republican national convention in 1904. Elected as circuit judge to fill vacancy in 1885. Elected district judge for the fifth judicial district in 1886. Re-elected in 1890, and again in 1894. Resigned January 1, 1896. In 1901 formed a partnership with his son and continued the practice of law under the firm name of Henderson & Henderson until his appointment as commerce counsel July 1, 1911. Re-appointed July 1, 1915, 1919 and 1923. Member of the state board of law examiners four years; member of the Methodist church. Belongs to the Odd Fellows, is a Mason and Knight Templar. Member of Grant club and Des Moines club.

**EDGAR RUBEY HARLAN.**—Son of Samuel A. and Marinda E. (Rubey) Harlan; born of Kentucky Quaker ancestry at Spartansburg, Ind., February 28, 1869; brought to a farm in Cedar township, Van Buren county, Iowa, in 1873; attended "Morris" district and Keosauqua high school, graduating 1889, and Drake university, completing the law course with degree of LL.B., and admitted to the bar June, 1896; practiced law at Keosauqua ten years, serving as county attorney 1898-1902; appointed by Charles Aldrich assistant curator of the historical department of Iowa, 1907; acting curator after death of Mr. Aldrich, March, 1908, until appointed curator by Governor Carroll, October 1, 1909; elected curator by board of trustees, June, 1913; honorary member Iowa chapter, American Institute of Architects; honorary member National Sculpture society; member American Historical association; a founder and member of board of directors, Mississippi Valley Historical association; member and secretary Iowa Flag commission; member and secretary Allison Memorial commission; member Iowa Board of Conservation, Plant Life commission; member and director Des Moines Fine Arts association; member American Civic association and delegate to Germany, France and England, tour 1913.

**RAYMOND E. JOHNSON.**—Secretary of the state executive council, born at Wilton Junction, Muscatine county, Iowa, March 26, 1886. Moved to Muscatine in 1894 and graduated from public schools there. Appointed deputy treasurer of Muscatine county in January, 1908 and in January, 1910, was appointed county treasurer to fill vacancy. He served as treasurer of Muscatine county for five terms and resigned February 1, 1920, to accept the position he now fills. Married May 22, 1907, to Edna I. Ryan, of Muscatine. A republican in politics.

**R. G. CLARK.**—Chief, division of dairy and food of the department of agriculture, was born in Massachusetts. In 1872, when ten years old, he came with his parents to Manchester, Iowa, where his father, an old-time produce merchant, embarked in the creamery, egg and poultry business. The son completed his education in the public schools, the Manchester academy and Grinnell college. In 1883 he started out for himself in the butter and egg business at Marcus, Iowa. In 1885 he went to Webster City, where he continued in the creamery, egg and butter business until appointed by Governor Kendall dairy and food commissioner May 1, 1922. He was a member of the twenty-seventh and the twenty-eighth general assemblies, and was Webster City's postmaster from 1903 to 1913. A republican in politics.

**PETER MALCOM.**—Chief of the division of animal industry of the department of agriculture, was born at St. Marys, Ont., Can. He is an honor graduate of the Ontario Veterinary college, Toronto, Can., having been graduated on April 3, 1890, and is still a member of the Ontario Veterinary Medical association. He moved to Iowa in March, 1891, locating at New Hampton, where he continued in the practice of veterinary science until July 1, 1920. On November 29, 1900, he received the appointment of assistant state veterinary surgeon from Governor Shaw; was re-appointed by Governor Cummins on April 27, 1902. On the 26th day of November of the same year he was appointed a member of the state board of veterinary medical examiners, which commission he held for six years. On July 1, 1919, he was made a member of the commission of animal health, and on July 1, 1920, was appointed state veterinary surgeon by Governor Harding.

**J. A. TRACY.**—State fire marshal, was born in Washington county, Iowa, May 5, 1858. At the age of thirteen he began working on the farm and at the age of eighteen engaged in the manufacture of brick, was later engaged in timber and building material business, real estate, etc. He served under Presidents McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft as deputy United States marshal. In 1911 was appointed deputy state fire marshal and served under Ole Q. Roe for eight years, when he was appointed state fire marshal in which capacity he is still serving. A republican in politics.

**FLOYD E. FARR.**—Was born at Macon, Mo., January 4, 1878. Received his grammar grade schooling at Moberly, Mo. When he was 15 years old he entered the employ of the Cramer Drug Co., of Cowgill, Mo., but soon went to Humeston, Iowa, where he served his apprenticeship, receiving his certificate in September, 1898. Was appointed commissioner of pharmacy by Governor Kendall, March 15, 1921.

**W. W. HAIRE.**—Born at Fort Dodge October 27, 1869. Attended public schools. Started as clerk in drug store July 4, 1887. Attended Iowa State university college of pharmacy 1890-91. Member of executive committee of Iowa State Pharmaceutical association, director in Druggists' Mutual Insurance association of Iowa, acting postmaster at Fort Dodge from October, 1918, to May, 1920. Appointed commissioner of pharmacy by Governor Harding April 24, 1920.

**GEORGE JUDISCH.**—Was born near Muscatine, Iowa, in 1869. He attended the public schools of Muscatine and began his apprenticeship in 1884. He has served for more than twenty years as instructor of pharmacy and materia medica in the veterinary division of Iowa State college. Member of the pharmacopoeial convention, 1910 and 1920. Received honorary degree of doctor of pharmacy, Highland Park college of pharmacy, June, 1919. President Iowa Pharmaceutical association, 1921 and 1922. Appointed pharmacy commissioner by Governor Kendall, April 22, 1922. A republican.

## BIOGRAPHIES OF UNITED STATES SENATORS

**ALBERT BAIRD CUMMINS.**—Republican, of Des Moines, Polk county, was born near Carmichaels, Pa., February 15, 1850; was educated in the public schools, preparatory academy, and was three years in Waynesburg (Pa.) college; the latter institution conferred the degrees of M. and A. and LL.D. upon him, and Cornell college, Iowa, that of LL.D.; is a lawyer by profession, and married; and was a member of the house of representatives of the twenty-second general assembly of Iowa; a member of the republican national committee from 1896 to 1900, and governor of Iowa from January, 1902, until elected November 24, 1908, to fill a vacancy in the United States senate caused by the death of Hon. W. B. Allison. Was re-elected in 1908, 1914 and 1920.

**SMITH W. BROOKHART.**—Republican, born February 2, 1869, in a log house in Scotland county, Mo. Moved in early life to Jefferson county, Iowa, and in 1882 to Van Buren county, Iowa. Educated in public schools and graduated from Bloomfield high school and the Southern Iowa normal, then at Bloomfield. Taught country schools and worked on the farm between times. Later was principal of the Bloomfield high school. Read law while teaching. Was admitted to the bar in 1892 and located at Washington, Iowa, where he has since practiced law and been interested in farming. Elected county attorney in 1894, again in 1896. Resigned in the spring of 1898 and volunteered in the Spanish-American war. Re-elected again in 1898. Married Jennie Hearne June 22, 1897, and has a family of four boys and two girls. Was a member of the Iowa National Guard after Spanish war and became expert trainer of rifle marksmen, commanding different champion teams. Served with the national guard on the Mexican border, volunteered in world war in 1917, serving until after the close of the war. Chief rifle instructor at Camp Perry, Ohio, and Camp Benning, Ga., at the close of the war. Elected United States senator to succeed Senator William S. Kenyon on November 7, 1922. His parents, A. C. Brookhart and Cynthia Wildman Brookhart, were both American born, and his father served three years with the union forces in the war between the states.

**WILLIAM F. KOPP.**—Republican, of Mount Pleasant, was born June 20, 1869, on a farm near Dodgeville, Des Moines county, Iowa; graduated from Iowa Wesleyan college, Mount Pleasant, Iowa, in 1892, and from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1894; was married December 4, 1894, to Miss Clara Bird; has actively practiced law since his graduation; served as county attorney of Henry county, Iowa, from 1895 to 1899; was postmaster at Mount Pleasant from 1906 to 1914; represented Henry county in the Iowa legislature in the thirty-sixth general assembly; was elected from the first Iowa district to the sixty-seventh congress, and re-elected to the sixty-eighth congress.

**HARRY E. HULL.**—Representative in congress from the second district of Iowa. Republican, of Williamsburg, Iowa, Iowa county, born in Belvidere, Alleghany county, N. Y., March 12, 1864; moved to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, 1873; common school education; grain buyer at Palo, Iowa, 1883; Williamsburg, 1884; married Mary Louise Harris June 3, 1891; wife died May 21, 1917; one child, Harris, 12 years old; married Ann Elizabeth Gittins June 21, 1921; alderman two years, mayor ten years, postmaster thirteen years, Williamsburg, Iowa; member Progress club, Episcopal church, I. O. O. F., K. of P., B. P. O. E., and Mason (thirty-second degree); nominated congress January 29, 1914; election held February 10, 1914. Elected to the sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh and sixty-eighth congresses.

**THOMAS J. B. ROBINSON.**—Representative in congress from the third district, was born in Lafayette county, Wis., August 12, 1868, and moved with his parents to Hampton, Iowa, in the spring of 1870. Following his gradua-

tion from the high school, he entered business and has since been actively engaged in banking and farming. Was married to Miss Belle Clinton and they have five children, two sons and three daughters; is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church and was elected to the general conferences of 1908, 1912 and 1916, and appointed delegate to the Ecumenical conferences in Toronto in 1911; member of the Iowa state senate 1912 to 1916; elected to the sixty-eighth congress. A republican in politics.

**GILBERT N. HAUGEN.**—Republican, of Northwood, Worth county, was born April 21, 1859, in Rock county, Wisconsin; since the age of 14, and prior to his election to congress, he was engaged in various enterprises, principally real estate and banking; was treasurer of Worth county, Iowa, for six years; was elected to the Iowa legislature, serving in the twenty-fifth and twenty-sixth general assemblies; was elected to the fifty-sixth, fifty-seventh, fifty-eighth, fifty-ninth, sixtieth, sixty-first, sixty-second, sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh and sixty-eighth congresses.

**CYRENUS COLE.**—Of Cedar Rapids, representative in congress from the fifth Iowa district, was born in Marion county, Iowa, was graduated from what was then Central university at Pella; was connected with the Des Moines Register from 1888 to 1898, and with the Cedar Rapids Republican as owner and editor from 1898 to 1921. Was elected to congress to fill vacancy, July 19, 1921, and was re-elected November 7, 1922.

**C. W. RAMSEYER.**—Of Bloomfield, Davis county, representative in congress from the sixth district, was born on a farm near Collinsville, Ohio, March 13, 1875. When two years old his parents moved to McLean county, Illinois, where his father died in 1881; since 1887, Davis county, Iowa, has been his home; was married to Miss Ruby Phillips June 2, 1915, and they have two children, Jane and Barbara. He is a graduate of the Southern Iowa normal, Iowa State Teachers' college, and the college of law of the State University of Iowa; taught school six years and practiced law at Bloomfield since 1906; was elected county attorney of Davis county in 1910 and 1912. Elected to the sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh and sixty-eighth congresses. A republican in politics.

**CASSIUS C. DOWELL.**—Representative in the congress of the United States from the seventh congressional district, composed of the counties of Polk, Dallas, Madison, Marion, Story and Warren, was born in Warren county, Iowa. American parentage. Republican in politics. Elected to the sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh and sixty-eighth congresses.

**WILLIAM RAYMOND GREEN.**—Of Council Bluffs, Pottawattamie county, representative in congress from the ninth district, was born at Colchester, Conn., November 7, 1856; received a high school education at Princeton, Ill., and graduated at Oberlin college, Oberlin, Ohio, in 1879 in the classical course; read law in the office of McCoy & Pratt, Chicago, and was admitted to practice at Ottawa, Ill., in 1882; began the practice of law at Dow City, Iowa; later moved to Council Bluffs and from there to Audubon in the fall of 1886; was elected judge of the district court in 1894, and re-elected in 1898, 1902, 1906 and 1910; and was elected representative in congress at the special election held June 5, 1911, to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Hon. Walter I. Smith. Elected to the sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh and sixty-eighth congresses. A republican in politics.

**L. J. DICKINSON.**—Republican, of Algona, Kossuth county, Iowa, representative in congress from the tenth district, was born in Lucas county, Iowa, October 29, 1873; his early education was received in the Danbury (Iowa) high school, from which he graduated with the class of 1892; attended Cornell college, Mount Vernon, Iowa, and graduated in 1898 with the B.S. degree; then took up a law course in the university of Iowa and was graduated in 1899 with the degree of LL.B.; admitted to the bar in 1899, and located at Algona, Iowa, July 1; was married August 21, 1901, to Miss Myrtle Call, two children being born to them, Levi Call and Ruth Alice; served as county at-

torney of Kossuth county two terms; committeeman tenth congressional district, republican state central committee, 1914-1918; elected to sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh and sixty-eighth congresses. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM DAYTON BOES.**—Republican, of Sheldon, O'Brien county, Iowa, was born January 3, 1857, on the farm that his father homesteaded in the year 1845 in Boone county, Ill.; came to Buchanan county, Iowa, with his parents in 1873; received his education in the country schools and public schools of Belvidere, Ill.; graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa with the class of 1880; was married in 1881; has two sons; located in O'Brien county, Iowa, October, 1881, where he practiced law continuously until appointed judge of the district court, fourth judicial district of Iowa, January 1, 1913; on a division of the district he became judge of the twenty-first judicial district of the state, and at the general election in 1914 was elected judge for the term of four years, which position he resigned March 31, 1918, to become a candidate for the republican nomination for congress; was elected to the sixty-seventh and sixty-eighth congresses. A republican in politics.

**BEN C. ABBEN, JR.**—Senator from the forty-ninth district, composed of Lyon, Osceola, Sioux and O'Brien counties; born January 20, 1887, graduate of high school and commercial college; president of Security Savings bank, Little Rock, Iowa. Elected senator 1920, a republican in politics.

**HENRY C. ADAMS.**—Senator from the forty-seventh district, composed of the counties of Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, Kossuth and Palo Alto, was born at McGregor, Iowa. Moved to Spencer, Iowa, where he acquired his education in the public schools, and by his own exertions became a registered pharmacist at the age of 18. He later located at Algona, engaging in the drug business. During the Spanish-American war served as hospital steward. At the close of the war he returned to Algona and entered the real estate and farm loan business, later entering the banking business. Was married June 6, 1900, to Irma D. Clarke. Is thirty-second degree Mason, a Knight Templar, Shriner, Knight of Pythias and an Elk. Elected senator in 1916 and 1920. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM S. BAIRD.**—Senator from nineteenth district, composed of Pottawattamie county, was born in Council Bluffs, June 3, 1863. Married Anna E. Wood, of Logan, Iowa, January 9, 1895, daughter of John W. and Eliza A. Wood. Children, William S., Jr., Lucy W. (deceased), Robert M., Donald P. and Margaret. Graduated from high school, Council Bluffs, 1880. Graduated from Cornell college, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, 1884. Admitted to practice law, 1887. Trustee free public library, Council Bluffs. Member of Masonic order and Knights of Pythias. Elected senator, 1920. A republican in politics.

**GEORGE SHERMAN BANTA.**—Senator from the thirty-third district of Delaware and Buchanan counties. He is a farmer and live stock breeder, living near Manchester. Born in Delaware county, July 2, 1884, his parents being farmers; a graduate of the Manchester high school, university of Iowa colleges of liberal arts, 1906, and law, 1911; devoted several years to newspaper work in Iowa City and Cheyenne, Wyo., and two years to the practice of law in Johnson county; elected senator in 1920 on the republican ticket.

**M. L. BOWMAN.**—Senator from the thirty-eighth district comprising Black Hawk and Grundy counties, was born at Galesburg, Ill. His parents moved to Hutchinson, Kan., when he was four years of age. While he was still a young boy death deprived him of both mother and father. He then came to Iowa where he has resided ever since. His guardian was a stockman, farmer and banker, and at the age of seventeen years he was stationed in the Chicago stockyards buying and shipping cattle for re-sale in the rural districts. In 1903 he entered the college of agriculture at Ames where he graduated in

1905 and for a portion of that time was superintendent of the college farm, which, together with extra work in the agronomy department, furnished him the means of paying his way through college. Upon graduation he was offered chair in the farm crop department under Prof. P. G. Holden, who had taken a special interest in him, and two years later was given a full professorship in charge also of the farm crops experimental work. He was the originator of the "Seed Oats Special" trains that ran throughout Iowa and accompanied Prof. Holden on all the seed corn special trains in that educational campaign. He was for three years secretary of the Iowa Corn Growers' association. He lives on a farm adjoining the city of Waterloo, specializes in pure bred Holstein cattle and takes an active interest in the affairs of the city, being secretary of the Greater Waterloo association, at the time he was elected to the state senate.

**J. L. BROOKHART.**—Senator from the tenth district, composed of Washington and Henry counties, was born September 9, 1871, in Missouri, and at an early age moved to Iowa, and in 1894 to Washington, Iowa. Attended rural schools, at the age of 17 began teaching, farming in the summer time. Graduated from the Washington academy in 1896, and was principal of the Washington school for two years. During this time he read law in the office of his brother, S. W. Brookhart. Passed the bar examination and was admitted to the bar in May, 1898, and in July of the same year was appointed county attorney. His father, A. C. Brookhart, is a veteran of the Civil war, and resides at Washington, Iowa. Elected senator in 1918 and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**A. T. BROOKINS.**—Senator from the forty-fourth district, composed of Floyd and Chickasaw counties, was born December 16, 1883, at Ionia, Chickasaw county, Iowa; graduated from the high school at Charles City in 1902; taught in rural and high schools; engaged in farming and stock raising in Chickasaw county; was married to Ruth Dodge of Orchard, Iowa, July 24, 1907; left the farm to accept a position in First State Savings Bank at Ionia, Iowa; was secretary to the Floyd County Business Men's Credit association for fifteen months; a member of St. Charles Lodge 141 A. F. & A. M.; Mason and a K. P. A republican in politics.

**CHARLES STEERE BROWNE.**—Senator from the twenty-third district, composed of one county, one of the oldest in the state, was born in June, 1875, at Baldwin, Iowa, where he acquired his education in the public schools. American born parents. Always lived in the county of Jackson, state of Iowa. Taught school at the age of 18 years. Buyer and feeder of live stock and farm owner. Never held an office of any description up to the year 1920. Eligible to the Sons of the American Revolution. Always a republican in politics.

**JONAS DEMOSS BUSER.**—Senator from the twentieth district, composed of Muscatine and Louisa counties, was born in Louisa county, Iowa, January 15, 1867, of American born parents. He attended the public schools of Conesville, Iowa, and Iowa City academy. He also attended the collegiate department of the state university, and in 1892 he completed one of the then two-year law courses in the state university. He was compelled to relinquish his school work because of serious eye trouble and engaged in farming. Served two terms as county supervisor, and was twice president of the state association of county supervisors. Elected senator in 1918. A republican in politics.

**WARREN A. CALDWELL.**—Senator from the fourteenth district, composed of Mahaska county. Was born on a farm near Wright, Iowa, January 17, 1886. After attending the rural school he attended Penn academy and college, after which time he taught rural school for two years. Was married in 1907 to Isabelle Hay, of Oskaloosa, Iowa. Has three sons, Norval, Harold and Robert. Operated farm until 1912, removed to Oskaloosa, Iowa. Was elected member of county board of supervisors. Served six years. Elected senator 1920. Is a Shriner, a K. of P. and an Elk. A republican in politics.

**ED. H. CAMPBELL.**—Was born on the farm near Battle Creek, Iowa, on March 6, 1882. Attended the rural school until 14 years of age. Graduated from the Battle Creek high school in 1900. Graduated from the university of Iowa in 1916, law department. Served as mayor of Battle Creek for three terms. Member of the house of representatives of the thirty-fourth general assembly. Senator for the forty-sixth senatorial district. Married Esta Fein in Los Angeles, Cal., October 25, 1913. Son, Romeo Campbell, born August 31, 1915. Republican in politics. Member of law firm of Campbell & Campbell, Battle Creek, being associated with his twin brother, Jed H. Campbell.

**T. C. CESSNA.**—Senator from the twelfth district, composed of Poweshiek and Keokuk counties, born in Bedford county, Pa. Came to Iowa in 1887, and located at Grinnell. He was educated in the public schools and by private instruction. Has been actively and extensively engaged in farming and the cattle business for the past thirty years. An active member of the Corn Belt Meat Producers' association. Is now chairman of the Poweshiek County Council of Defense. Elected senator in 1918, and re-elected in 1922. A republican politically.

**DANIEL CADY CHASE.**—Senator from the thirty-seventh district, composed of the counties of Hamilton, Hardin and Wright, was born in Webster City, Iowa, June 18, 1859, of American born parents. He attended the public schools of Webster City and later the university of Iowa from which he graduated. For a time after leaving the university he engaged in newspaper work but in 1880 he began the study of law in his father's office and was admitted to practice in 1881. He was elected city attorney of Webster City in 1890 and in 1891 served as special United States attorney in the celebrated river land cases. He was a member of the house of representatives from Hamilton county in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth general assemblies. In 1892 he was a delegate at large from Iowa to the republican national convention and in 1896 he was elected presidential elector from the tenth congressional district on the republican ticket. Elected senator in 1910, 1914 and 1922. A republican in politics. He died March 2, 1923.

**H. A. DARTING.**—Senator from the eighth district, was born in Harrison county, Iowa, February 5, 1873. Moved with his parents to Thayer county, Neb. Returned to Harrison county in 1881. Received his education in the rural schools. Moved to Mills county in 1911. Is a member of the Christian church. An Odd Fellow, a York Rite Mason, including the Shrine. Elected senator in 1920. Republican in politics.

**CHARLES M. DUTCHER.**—Born in Kansas, 1869. Removed to Iowa City, Iowa, 1877. Educated in the common schools and at the State University of Iowa. Admitted to the bar, 1894. Practiced law at Iowa City continuously since that time. County attorney of Johnson county 1897 and 1898. Delegate to republican national convention 1916. President of the Iowa State Bar association, 1921.

**JOHN J. ETHELL.**—Senator from the third district (Davis-Appanoose). Was born in Davis county, Iowa, November 16, 1872. Has lived in Bloomfield, Iowa, since 1881. A graduate of the high school of that city. Was married to Addie Hotchkiss, of Bloomfield, August 24, 1903. Has two children, Alice and George K., aged 16 and 8 years. Is a partner in the farm loan and abstract firm of Deupree & Ethell. A member of the Knights of Pythias and various Masonic bodies. Was elected state senator on the republican ticket in 1920, this being his first political office.

**CHARLES J. FULTON.**—Senator from the second district, composed of the counties of Jefferson and Van Buren, was born in Jefferson county, Iowa, January 27, 1860. His parents were American-born. He attended both common and private schools and was graduated in 1883 from Parsons college. Remained on the farm until the winter of 1891-2, when he became a member of the Loudon Machinery company. Was mayor of Fairfield from 1903 to 1907 and again in 1920. Served as chairman of the local exemption board for

Jefferson county during the World war. Was president of the Fairfield Chautauqua association for thirteen years. Is a trustee of Parsons college, a trustee of the Fairfield free public library, and a member of the school board of Fairfield. Was a member of the house of representatives in the thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. Elected senator in 1920. A republican in politics.

**FRED C. GILCHRIST.**—Senator from the fiftieth district, was born in Pennsylvania in 1868, removed to Iowa 1871, and has lived here since. Educated in common schools and at State Teachers' college. Taught school for two years and was county superintendent of Pocahontas county 1890-92. Completed law course at State University of Iowa in 1893 and was admitted to the bar. Married Ellen Hurley in 1896 and has three children. Was a member of the house in the twenty-ninth general assembly. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM J. GOODWIN.**—Senator from thirtieth district was born in Beaver, Iowa, 1878; the son of Robert Goodwin and Margaret Goodwin; attended rural school and graduated from schools of Grand Junction, Iowa; was graduated from Drake university, 1899. Engaged in manufacturing clay products with factories at Des Moines and Redfield, Iowa; also interested in Iowa land. Was republican county central committee chairman Polk county, 1912. Married to Miss Grace H. Kingman, May 22, 1901, Des Moines; has two sons, Robert, born May 23, 1904, and William Junior, born December 13, 1909.

**JOHN K. HALE.**—Senator from the twenty-fourth district, composed of Cedar and Jones counties, was born August 27, 1858, in Guilford, Conn. In 1859 moved with his parents to Anamosa, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the rural schools. Was married in 1882 and has two daughters. Has been engaged in farming for many years, in buying and selling grain and in the grocery and meat business. Was county supervisor for eight years. Elected representative from Jones county in the thirty-sixth general assembly. Elected senator in 1916 and 1920. A republican in politics.

**GEORGE S. HARTMAN.**—Senator from the fortieth district, composed of Allamakee and Fayette counties, was born November 13, 1871, in Sharon, Wis., and moved to Iowa in the fall of 1877, locating at Fayette. He received his education in the public schools of Fayette. In 1892 he entered the mercantile business at Fayette with his father and brother under the firm name of M. J. Hartman & Sons, which continued until the death of his father in 1915. The sons still continue the business under the firm name of Hartman Brothers. Senator Hartman has served on the city council and as chairman of Fayette county republican central committee and is director and vice president of the First National bank of Fayette. He was married to Miss Gertrude Clothier, of Rockford, Ill., in July, 1907, who died in February, 1920. He has two sons. Is a member of the Modern Woodmen, Elks and Yeomen. He was elected senator in 1920. A republican in politics.

**WILLIS G. HASKELL.**—Senator from the twenty-sixth district, composed of Linn county, was born June 5, 1857, in Bradford, Iowa. Attended the graded schools of Cedar Falls, Charles City and Independence. Was employed as telegrapher, station agent and traveling freight and passenger agent from 1873 to 1893, then entered the wholesale and retail coal business, in which he is still engaged. Is also interested in the manufacturing business, being president of the Johnson Gas Appliance Co., and is also interested in the real estate business, being president of the J. S. Anderson Land Co., and the Mound Farm Land Co. Has been director of the Merchants' National bank for a number of years. Has served as alderman of Vinton and Cedar Rapids. Chairman of the park commission of Cedar Rapids, member of the republican state central committee, president of commercial club and as postmaster from 1909 to 1913. Was married June 15, 1881, to Mae E. Williams and has four children, two boys and two girls. Is a member of the Masonic, Knights of Pythias and B. P. O. E. lodges. Elected senator on the republican ticket in 1916 and 1920.

**PERRY C. HOLDORGE.**—Senator from twenty-seventh district, composed of Webster and Calhoun counties, was born on a farm near Woodbine, Iowa, September 7, 1869; served as apprentice to brick mason and to printer; clerked in grocery and dry goods stores; worked his way through normal school; was engaged in public school work fourteen years. Settled in Rockwell City, where he has been city superintendent and now resides. He has managed the local (Central Mutual) telephone company since its organization. His largest financial interest is in farming. He is also interested in a number of banks. Was married in 1895 to Mattie A. Forest, of Dunlap, Iowa, and to this union two children were born, Donald in 1901, and Dorothy in 1905. Served as secretary and chairman of the republican county central committee. Elected to the Iowa senate in 1916 and 1920. A republican in politics.

**B. J. HORCHEM.**—Senator from Dubuque county, the thirty-fifth district, is principal of the Audubon school at Dubuque. He was born December 4, 1866, the son of John and Henrietta (Plaster) Horchem. His father, a Union soldier, died shortly after the war. In 1884 he was graduated from the Dyersville schools (of which he was afterwards principal); in 1892, from the normal school at Valparaiso, Ind.; and from the business college at Cedar Rapids. He has subsequently pursued special courses of sociology and psychology in Columbia university and the University of Chicago. He was three times elected superintendent of Dubuque county. His great achievement has been the development of the ideals of "Park Life," and "social center" activities. He is connected with numerous societies of an educational, sociological and scientific character. He is especially interested in all that pertains to education, health and general "uplift." He was elected representative in 1914, was re-elected in 1916, and elected senator in 1918.

**JAMES FOSTER JOHNSTON.**—Senator from the fourth district, comprising Lucas and Wayne counties, was born in Lucas county, Iowa, April 25, 1875. He received his early education in the country schools, and afterwards attended Western Normal college and Simpson college. For several years he taught school in winter and farmed in summer. His time is now devoted altogether to farming and stock raising. He was elected a member of the board of supervisors of his county in 1910, and served three years. He held no other public office prior to his election as representative to the general assembly in 1914 and 1916. Elected senator in 1920. He is a republican in politics.

**DAVID W. KIMBERLY.**—Senator from Scott county, was born in Deadwood, S. D., August 6, 1878. When he was six weeks old his parents moved to West Liberty, Muscatine county. He has lived on the farm most of his life. He received his education at the West Liberty, Springdale high school and Bryant-Strattons business college of Chicago. He was married to Elsie King, of Chicago. He is a member of the Mystic Shrine, Knights Templar, Scottish Rites, Mohassan Grotto, Eastern Star, Elks, Owls, Odd Fellows and Turner society. Was elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916, and to the senate in 1918 and 1922. A republican in politics.

**J. A. MCINTOSH.**—Senator from the fifth district, comprising Decatur, Ringgold and Union counties, was born in Mercer county, Mo., 1870, and moved with his parents to Iowa in 1882. He has been a resident of Decatur county practically all his life. He attended the rural schools, the Davis City high school, Central Normal university, from which he graduated with the degree of bachelor of science, and the state teachers' college. In 1899 he was elected county superintendent of schools of Decatur county and served four years. Before that time and some time after leaving the county superintendent's office he was a school teacher, both in the graded and rural schools. In 1904 he was married to Miss Della Cherrington and they have two children, a boy and a girl. He is a member of the M. E. church. He belongs to the I. O. O. F., A. F. & A. M., K. of P., M. W. A. and Homestead lodges, as well as the O. E. S. He has been chairman of the republican county central committee, also secretary of the Leon Carnegie library board, and president of the Leon school board. A republican in politics.

**H. J. MANTZ.**—Senator from the seventeenth district, comprising Audubon, Dallas and Guthrie counties, was born in Iowa, September 23, 1877. A lawyer by profession. In 1910, he married Miss Dorothy Sandberg. They have two children, Paul S., aged 7 and Kathleen J., aged 5. Was representative from Audubon county to the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies and a member of the senate in the thirty-ninth and fortieth general assemblies. Belongs to the Presbyterian church and the Masonic fraternity. A republican in politics.

**OSCAR L. MEAD.**—Senator from the thirty-ninth district, was born on a farm in Butler county in 1875. Received his education in the rural schools and in Shell Rock high school, afterwards attending business college at Nora Springs seminary. Was married to Gertrude Graham, of Shell Rock, in 1897, and to them have been born two daughters, Zola and Wanda. Has held the offices of township assessor and member of the school board. Is interested in banking, but has been an active farmer all his life. Elected representative in 1916, and re-elected in 1918. Elected senator in 1920. A republican in politics.

**JULIUS A. NELSON.**—Senator from the eighteenth district, was born in Cass county, Iowa, January 14, 1872, and has been a resident of that county nearly all his life. Received his early education in the rural schools, after which he attended high school, and is a graduate of a business college. Was married to Miss Elizabeth Brown January 1, 1902, and to this union three children have been born, Donald, Gaile and Margery. He has held the offices of township clerk, trustee, secretary of school board and school treasurer. Is director and vice president of Farmers' Savings bank of Atlantic, also president of Atlantic Building & Supply company. Was elected senator in 1918 and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**BYRON W. NEWBERRY.**—Senator from the thirty-sixth district, was born in Lorain county, Ohio, September 1, 1853. In 1855 with his parents he moved to Strawberry Point, where he has since resided. He was educated in the common schools and at the Upper Iowa university, where he graduated in 1875. He attended the law department of the State University of Iowa, where he graduated in 1876. In 1877 he opened a law office at Strawberry Point, and in 1887 formed a partnership with his brother, Charles W. Newberry. He is also identified with agricultural interests. He served as senator in the thirtieth, thirty-first, thirty-second, thirty-second extra and thirty-seventh sessions of the general assembly of Iowa. In 1905 he was married to Miss Eva M. Buckley. They have no children. He was again elected state senator in 1916 and re-elected in 1920. A republican in politics.

**CHARLES OLSON.**—Senator from the thirty-first district, composed of the counties of Boone and Story, was born in Sweden, May 9, 1870, of Swedish parents. At the age of two years, his father died, and a year later he was brought by his mother to the United States, later settling in Boone county where he received his early education in the public schools, then attended Drake university. He remained on the farm until 1896 when he moved to Boone, and served two terms as county recorder, later moving to a farm, and he has been engaged in farming since that time. He is vice president of the Beaver Savings bank, also secretary of the Beaver Co-operative Elevator company, and has served on the Beaver school board. He is a member of the Methodist church, is married and has four sons. Was elected senator in 1920. A republican in politics.

**GEO. B. PERKINS.**—Senator from forty-eighth district composed of Greene, Carroll and Sac counties, was born at Fond du Lac, Wis., August 11, 1874. He attended the public schools of Fond du Lac, and the German and English academy. He moved to Sac City, in July, 1896, and became identified with the Sac County State bank. In 1900 was elected clerk of the district court of Sac county and held this office for four years. On January 1, 1905, became president of the First National bank, Sac City. In June, 1899, was married to Lola May Early of Sac City. They have one son, George Early, and two daughters, Miriam Larrabee and Eloise Loraine. Was elected representative in 1918 and 1920, and senator in 1922. Republican in politics.

**JOHN R. PRICE.**—Senator from the fifteenth district, composed of the counties of Marion and Monroe, was born in Glamorganshire, South Wales, Great Britain, on June 23, 1875. Moved with his parents to the United States in May, 1881, and has been a resident of Marion and Monroe counties since that time, except two years spent in the state of Washington. Attended the public schools until eleven years of age, then secured a position in the mines, but continuing his education. At the age of eighteen he sustained an injury from which he has never fully recovered. Entered Central university at Pella, Iowa, from 1894 to 1897, then taught school for several years and read law under the direction of John T. Clarkson, of Albia. Was admitted to the bar and began the practice of law at Albia in 1900 which vocation he still follows. Was deputy clerk for about one year. Was married April 27, 1899, to Mary E. Welch. Elected senator in 1916 and 1920. A republican in politics. Serving as grand master of Odd Fellows of Iowa for fiscal year 1920-1921.

**CARL W. REED.**—Senator from the forty-second district, Howard and Winneshek counties, was born at Cresco, Iowa, May 6, 1878, and has always lived at Cresco; is a graduate of the Cresco high school, and of the college of law, University of Minnesota. Engaged in the practice of law at Cresco with his father, Henry T. Reed, who was a member of the general assembly, from 1896 to 1904, then practiced alone until December, 1910, when he formed a co-partnership with Charles Pergler, now the representative to the United States from the new Bohemian republic. Has been city solicitor of Cresco, and county attorney of Howard county. Is married, and has three children; a member of the Masonic, Odd Fellows and Elks lodges. Elected to the senate in 1918, and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**S. C. REES.**—Senator, was born in Warren county, Iowa, educated in common and high school; took Horace Greeley's advice, went west and located in Fremont county. Married Miss Lula Harris in 1881. They have four children living, two sons and two daughters. Represented Fremont county in the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh general assemblies; was elected to the senate in 1922. Politics, republican; business, farming; sideline, real estate and insurance.

**E. W. ROMKEY.**—Senator from the ninth district, was born on farm near Burlington, Iowa, July 3, 1869. Attended rural schools and business college. Resides at present on old homestead. Was married to Nellie Lloyd in December 27, 1894, and has one daughter, Helen, and one son, Donald. Has held public office almost continuously since 1900. Elected to the fortieth general assembly from the ninth senatorial district in 1922. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM SCHMEDIKA.**—Senator from the thirty-seventh district, composed of the counties of Hamilton, Hardin and Wright, was born in Shellsburg, Wis., August 19, 1869. In 1876 his parents moved to Hardin county, Iowa, settling in the western part of the county. His early boyhood days were spent on the farm and attending the rural school. Later he attended the Dexter Normal school at Dexter, Iowa. He has lived on the farm all his life, for years farming in the summer and teaching school in the winter. Later he quit teaching and farmed extensively, together with buying, feeding and shipping live stock. Also a heavy writer of fire insurance, being with the Farmers of Cedar Rapids thirty years. In 1889 he was united in marriage with Clara Awe. To them were born two boys and two girls. His wife died in 1907. He is a member of the K. of P. lodge. Was elected representative in 1914; and in 1923 was elected senator to fill vacancy caused by the death of D. C. Chase. Elected senator as an independent.

**RAY PAUL SCOTT.**—Senator from the twenty-eighth district, born in North Eaton, O., June 8, 1884. Came to Marshalltown in 1899, graduated from Drake university in 1909. Served as county attorney of Marshall county from 1914 to 1918. Elected to the legislature in 1918. Elected senator in 1920. Republican in politics. Thirty-second degree Mason, Knight Templar and Shriner.

**J. O. SHAFF.**—Senator from the twenty-second district, was born January 6, 1885, on a farm near Shaffton, Iowa; married Evelyn Lily Purcell, July, 1921; graduated from Iowa state college and Wisconsin university. Was a member of the thirty-seventh general assembly; principal occupation, farming, specializing in Holstein cattle; operates grain elevators at Shaffton, Princeton and McCausland; is president of the Citizens Savings bank, Low Moor, and director in City National bank, Clinton. Actively interested in republican politics for the past ten years.

**FRANK SHANE.**—Senator from the thirteenth district; was born May 16, 1875, in Mahaska county, Iowa. He graduated from Letts high school 1892, attended Iowa Wesleyan college, Mt. Pleasant, and college of physicians and surgeons, Keokuk; taught school in Appanoose, Van Buren and Lee counties. Started in the retail drug business at Stockport in 1900; moved to Eldon in 1902, where he owned and operated a drug store until 1912. During his residence in Eldon he served as a member of the school board, as justice of the peace, and as mayor, and was elected representative from Wapello county in the thirty-fourth general assembly. He also served as president of the Iowa Pharmaceutical association. Moved to Ottumwa in 1913 and engaged in the insurance business. Has been agency manager for southeastern Iowa for the Royal Union Mutual Life Insurance company for a number of years. Served as county chairman of the Wapello county republican central committee for two terms and was elected state senator in 1922. Is a member of the Masonic, Knights of Pythias and Elks fraternities. Also a member of the Rotary club and of Wapello club. Married to Gail Walker, of Chariton, Iowa, in 1899. Two children, George W., age 16, and Elise, age 8. A republican in politics.

**A. J. SHINN.**—Senator from the thirty-fourth district, composed of Harrison, Crawford and Monona counties; was born in Pottawattamie county, Iowa, November 7, 1866. In February, 1880, he moved with his parents to a farm in Harrison county, in which county he has since resided. In 1889 he married Margaret Whiteside and to them were born two daughters, Ada and Edith. He received his education in the rural schools. Has been engaged in farming for many years. In 1901 he was elected sheriff of Harrison county and he served two terms. Also served as trustee a number of terms. He is a Mason. A republican in politics.

**J. M. SLOSSON.**—Senator from the forty-first district, composed of Mitchell, Winnebago and Worth counties, was born in Worth county, Iowa, in 1876. His parents were pioneer settlers of Worth county. He attended the rural schools, Northwood high school and Nora Springs seminary. Was married June 1, 1899, to Sophie Savre. Served six years as county recorder of Worth county. He is engaged in farming and the buying and selling of farm lands. Represented Worth county in the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies. Elected senator in 1920. A republican in politics.

**Ed. M. SMITH.**—Senator from sixteenth district, composed of Adair and Madison counties, was born in Jackson county, Iowa, October 31, 1870. His parents moved to a farm in Madison county in 1886. Began teaching school in 1892 between farm seasons. Was county school superintendent 1897 to 1900. In 1899 entered the publishing business as publisher of the Winterset Madisonian, in which business he is still engaged. Was postmaster at Winterset, from April, 1904, to August, 1908. Attended the Dexter Normal college, and Drake university. Married Evalyn Crossley, of Patterson, Iowa, on June 1, 1898; they have four children. Is a member of the Presbyterian church, Knights of Pythias, Des Moines Consistory of Scottish Rite Mason, Za-Ga-Zig Temple Mystic Shrine. A republican in politics.

**I. N. SNOOK.**—Senator from Lee county in the first district of Iowa, was born in Union county, Pennsylvania, in the year 1848. At the age of six years, his parents, with the rest of the family—four girls and four boys, was brought to Iowa for the purpose of securing a western home. They settled in Lee county, two miles north of West Point, in June, 1854. The family was five weeks on the road; came in two covered wagons. Here the senator

grew to manhood with the rest of the family. He got his education in the old Farmers' college. At the age of 23 he married Rachel Box, five years his junior in age. Six children were born to this union, Ola Dell, Crilla Alice, Edward, Frank Emmet, Gertrude and Charles I. Snook. All children grew to man and womanhood. The eldest girl, when 15 years of age had the responsibility of the rest of the family, as the wife and mother died at this time. A widower and never re-married. All his life he has been in the pursuits of agriculture. Served his township sixteen years as justice of the peace. Has held all township offices. Has been state thresher president fourteen years, and is now national director for Iowa. Has threshed fifty-six years, and has been very successful in his agricultural pursuits. Owns two Iowa farms of one-half section. Now serving his county of Lee as state senator at the age of 75 years. Is hale and hearty.

**BERTEL M. STODDARD.**—Senator from the thirty-second district, composed of Woodbury county, was born at Minonk, Ill., January 21, 1871. Graduated from Illinois college, Jacksonville, Ill., in 1891. Engaged in the grain business at Toluca, Ill., for seven years, moving to Sloan, Iowa, in 1901. He was married in 1897 to Wilhelmina E. Simater. They have a son, Bela M., and a daughter, Jane M. He has been a member of the school board for twenty-five years, a member of the county board of supervisors, drainage trustee, chairman of the local board for Woodbury county, county chairman for the Y. M. C. A. and Red Cross drives, the United War Service fund, and the third and fourth liberty loan campaigns. With his son they operate grain elevators at Sloan and Owego, Iowa. They are also engaged in farming and stock raising. He was elected in 1918 to fill the unexpired term of Senator C. F. Lytle, resigned. He was re-elected in 1920 for the full term. He has always been a republican.

**LLOYD THURSTON.**—Senator from the eleventh district, Clarke and Warren counties; born in Osceola, Iowa, March 27, 1880. Educated in the public schools and college of law, state university of Iowa, class of 1902. County attorney of Clarke county, four years. Served with the 51st Iowa regiment in the Spanish-American war, in the Philippine Islands; also as captain in the world war. Republican.

**J. C. TUCK.**—Senator from the sixth district, was born in Haldimand county, Ontario, Canada, May 20, 1866. In 1891 he moved to Corning, Iowa, where he has since resided. He received his education in the common schools of the place of his birth. Was married to Hattie May Anderson in 1894. Member of Episcopal church. Is a Mason and K. P. Elected senator, 1920. A republican in politics.

**HARRY C. WHITE.**—Senator from the forty-fifth district, comprising the counties of Benton and Tama, was born in Guernsey county, Ohio, October 6, 1869, of Irish parents. When he was six months old his parents moved to Benton county and settled on a farm near Garrison. Educated in the district schools, Tilford academy and Cornell college, Mount Vernon. Taught school for several terms. Now owns and operates a large stock farm. Has been vice president of the Farmers' Savings bank, of Garrison, since it was organized in 1905. Was married in 1894. Elected representative in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Elected senator in 1914, re-elected in 1918 and again in 1922. A democrat in politics.

**JOHN E. WICHMAN.**—Senator from forty-third district, was born at Galena, Ill., April 16, 1859. Educated in the public schools of Galena and North-western German English Normal school. Removed to Hancock county, Iowa, in 1879, where he has since resided. Taught school in Illinois and Hancock county, Iowa, for four years, and was admitted to the bar in 1884, and since that time has given his attention to the practice of law, and to banking. Was county attorney for four terms. Was married to Mary L. Prescott in 1888 and has two daughters, Lois and Charlotte. Was elected representative in 1918, and re-elected in 1918. Elected senator in 1920. A republican in politics.

**JOHN H. AIKEN.**—Representative from Ida county, was born at Iowa City, March 27, 1875. He was taken, by his parents, to Ida county in 1876, where he has since resided. In October, 1903, he was married to Henrietta Hass, of Holstein, Iowa. Mr. and Mrs. Aiken have three daughters, Patience Louise, Thelma Norine and Virginia Helen. Mr. Aiken is a republican in politics and was elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922.

**C. E. ANDERSON.**—Representative from Webster county, was born on a farm near Stratford, Iowa, June 24, 1886. Received his early education in the rural schools and in the Stratford high school. Attended the Moody Bible institute in Chicago for five terms. Was appointed street commissioner in Stratford in 1914. Has served on the Stratford police force and fire department. In 1913 was married to Annä Ahlstrom. They have one child, Frank G. Is a member of the Methodist church, the Modern Woodman of America and the farm bureau federation. Elected representative in 1922. A republican in politics.

**JOSEPH H. ANDERSON.**—Representative from Winnebago county, was born on a farm in Winnebago county, Iowa. He received his education in the rural schools of his county and in the state teachers' college at Cedar Falls, from which institution he graduated in 1898. For two years after his graduation he was principal of the schools at Fairbank, Iowa. Since that time he has been engaged in farming except from January 1, 1905, to January 1, 1913, during which time he served as clerk of the district court of his county. In the fall of 1914 he was elected to the legislature from the ninety-fifth representative district. Re-elected in 1916, 1918, 1920 and 1922. Speaker of the fortieth general assembly. A republican in politics.

**H. S. BERRY.**—Representative from Monroe county, was born on a farm in Wapello county, Iowa, July 22, 1857; moved with his parents to Monroe county in 1865. Received his education in the country schools; taught school four years; served as member of the board of supervisors six years. Served as mayor of the city of Albia eight years. Is married and has three children. His occupation is that of farmer and live stock dealer. Elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM R. BLAKE.**—Representative from Fayette county, was born on a farm in Jo Daviess county, Ill., October 1, 1878, coming to Iowa in 1900. He is a graduate of the Elizabeth high school, Danville normal and Chicago Park Business college. He taught school and while in high school began to learn the printing trade. He had connections with several papers in Illinois and Michigan before going to Delaware county, Iowa, where he did newspaper work until the summer of 1905 when he went to Clermont, Fayette county, and started the publication of the "Enterprise" of which he is still editor and publisher. Married Miss Bessie B. Morgan in 1904 and has two children, William Burdette and Anna Lolita. Was councilman at Clermont one term and mayor for three terms; is a member of the Masonic, I. O. O. F. and Modern Woodman lodges. Was elected representative in 1920 and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**THEO. C. BLUME.**—Representative from Crawford county, is a native of Marshall county, Ill., where he was born on December 10, 1861. The family removed in 1880 to Crawford county, Iowa. He secured his early education in the country schools. After passing his majority he attended college, securing a normal training and later bachelor of science degree. For twelve years he followed the teacher's profession, being for a number of years an instructor in Greer college, and later was principal of the Dyersville, Iowa, Crawford public schools. In 1894 he purchased the old Blume homestead in Crawford county, and engaged in farming. Mr. Blume was united in marriage with Olive Amalia Girard in 1894. Their family consists of four daughters and

two sons. The farm name is "Lawngrove" and the firm name "Theo. C. Blume & Family." Mr. Blume was a member of the twenty-seventh and twenty-eighth general assemblies. Re-elected in 1922.

A. V. BRADY.—Representative from O'Brien county, was born at Sanborn, O'Brien county, Iowa, September 9, 1885. Graduated from the Sanborn public school in 1903 and had one year in business college and part of a law course in the Iowa state university. Has been actively interested in farming since 1905. Has been an officer of the local farm bureau since its organization, serving as president since 1917. Is a director in the Sanborn Savings bank and also the Sanborn school board. Was married in 1910 to Marguerite E. Kings, of Sanborn, and has three children, Ezra, Norman and Betty. Is past master of the Masonic lodge, member of Consistory and Shrine. Republican in politics. Elected to the house in 1920 and re-elected in 1922.

JOHN BRADLEY.—Representative from Poweshiek county; born in Bureau county, Ill., April 2, 1864. Came to Iowa with his parents in 1868 and settled on a farm near Montezuma. Attended the rural schools and remained on the farm with his father until twenty-one years of age. Took a business course at Elliott's Business college, Burlington, Iowa. Taught school for a number of years. Was engaged in the clothing business in Montezuma from 1894 to 1906. Since that time has been engaged in farming. With the exception of a few years spent in southern Idaho, has made that county his home to this time. After finishing the public school course at Glenwood and after some time in Tabor college, he farmed for a few years. He then engaged in banking and the retail lumber business for about ten years after which he returned to the farm, feeding live stock for market and doing general farming. A republican in politics.

L. V. CARTER.—Representative from Hardin county, was born on a farm near New Providence, Iowa, January 30, 1879. Member of school board. Member of the Congregational church. A republican in politics.

DR. E. J. COLE.—Representative from Harrison county, was born in Harrison county, January 24, 1865. Attended the public schools in Woodbine, Iowa state college at Ames and Rush Medical college, Chicago, where he graduated in medicine in 1889. Has practiced his profession at Woodbine, since that date. He is interested in farming and the banking business and is president of the First National and the Peoples Savings banks of Woodbine. In June, 1891, he was married to Maude Allen. They have four children, a son and three daughters. He is a Mason and a Knight of Pythias. A democrat in politics.

W. S. CRISWELL.—Representative from Boone county, was born on a farm in that county, in 1809. Has lived in Boone county all his life. Received his education in the rural schools, the Boone high school and the business department of Highland Park college at Des Moines. Was married to Etta Brown of Boone, February 11, 1894, and to them have been born four children—Clara, Lulu, LeRoy and Grace. From 1894 to 1904 he farmed in summer and taught school in the winter. Graduated from the law school of the state university of Iowa in June, 1921. Has since that time engaged in the practice of law at Manchester. In April, 1917, he volunteered for service in the world war and received a commission as second lieutenant and was assigned to Company E, 168th infantry, serving with that organization throughout the war. Was wounded in July, 1918, in the Champagne defensive and was twice promoted, being mustered out as captain of the company on June 2, 1919, after nineteen months' service in France and seven major operations. L. B. FORSLING.—Representative from Woodbury county, was born in Sioux City, March 23, 1890. Attended grade and high school in Sioux City, graduated in law from Cumberland university; general practice in law in Sioux City since 1915. Police judge of Sioux City, 1918. Married Lillian Nash, February 12, 1914. Elected representative, 1920; re-elected 1922. Republican in politics.

HENRY FRAHM.—Representative from Carroll county, was born in Schleswig, Germany, September 19, 1873. At the age of six months he came with his parents and located in Clinton county, Iowa. In 1882 his parents moved to a farm in Washington township, Carroll county, where he has since continually resided. Attended the public schools of the county. He was married to Emma Hagge of West Side, Iowa, on February 18, 1898. They have one daughter, Ann E., and two sons, George H. and Herbert J. A democrat in politics.

JOHN P. GALLAGHER.—Representative from Iowa county, was born in that county, of Irish parentage, quite a while ago, and resides on a farm a short distance from the place of his birth. He never attended anything but the public schools, and not very much of that. For several years he was editor of The Journal-Tribune of Williamsburg, but later moved back to the farm. He was elected to the fortieth general assembly in 1922. He is a member of the Catholic church and a third degree member of the Knights of Columbus. He is not married.

J. S. GARBER.—Representative from Floyd county, was born in Floyd county, April 18, 1865. His parents were pioneer settlers, coming to this state in 1852. He received his education in the rural schools. Has been engaged in farming all his life. Was married December 7, 1898, to Marcia C. Petty of Olean, N. Y. Served three terms as township assessor and two as county supervisor. Is president of the Farmers' Co-operative Elevator company of Marble Rock and has

been director of the Floyd County Mutual Insurance association for a period of twenty-three years. Was elected representative in 1918 and re-elected in 1920 and 1922. A republican in politics.

**R. O. GARBER.**—Representative from Adair county, was born in Adair county October 16, 1887. Graduated from the Adair high school in 1906. Attended college of liberal arts and college of law S. U. I. Practiced law at Adair since 1914. Entered the service August 27, 1917. Served as Lieutenant in air service until January 8, 1919. Married to Miss Helen Graham December 25, 1920. He is a member of American Legion, Masons and Knights of Pythias. Elected representative in 1920 and 1922. Republican in politics.

He was admitted to the bar in 1914 and has been engaged in the practice of law at Marshalltown since that time. He is a Mason and a member of the American Legion. Elected representative in 1920, and re-elected in 1922. Republican in politics.

Taught country school for two terms; afterward engaged in the clothing business for some years. Is now connected with the Cedar county state bank as vice president. Is also interested in several other banks and is secretary and stock holder of the Tipton Canning company. Is a member of the Knights of Pythias, Consistory, Mystic Shrine, State Historical society and the farm bureau. Is vice president of the Cedar county Red Cross and director of the Tipton Community club. Secured only those advantages which come through the common schools. Engaged in the drug business at Oxford Junction, Iowa, in 1887, after three years of apprenticeship at Independence, Iowa. After thirty-three years in this business, disposed of same on July 1, 1920, and was elected to the house in November of that year, and re-elected in 1922.

**JOHN T. HANSEN.**—Representative from Scott county, was born in the city of Davenport, Iowa, November 28, 1858. He attended the rural schools and afterwards received some private instruction. Learned the blacksmith trade, but went to farming when he became of age. Was married March 12, 1887, to Emma Harst of Scott county, who died October 6, 1897. There were born to them four children, two boys and two girls. Both boys are world war veterans. One served with the 88th division in France. Has served eleven years on the board of education of Sheridan township, one term as justice of the peace and ten consecutive years as vice president of the Scott county farm bureau, and also as a member of the Iowa farm bureau federation. Served in the 37th and 38th general assemblies, and elected to the fourtieth general assembly. A member of the Woodmen of the World. A republican in politics.

**ERNEST P. HARRISON.**—One of the representatives from Pottawatomie county, was born at Wittman, Md., November 22, 1883. Removed to Yorkville, Ill., in 1902 and learned the printers' trade in the office of the Kendall County Record. Was married June 15, 1907, to Ethel Brubaker and has one son and two daughters. Was elected representative in 1920, and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**H. C. HATTENDORF.**—Representative from Osceola county, was born in Lake county, Ind. He received his education in the parochial and public schools. Learned the carpenter trade and worked at it for a number of years. He has served as township clerk for twelve years and as secretary of the school board for twenty years. He was a member of the county board of supervisors for three terms and was elected twice chairman of the board and for two years he has been township assessor. He married Louisa Glade in 1892. He has been engaged in farming and stock raising ever since. He was elected representative in 1922. A life long republican.

**A. O. HAUGE.**—Representative of Polk county, Iowa, was born on a farm in the county, in 1879, moved with his parents to Emmet county and then to Wright county. He attended the common schools and entered Humboldt college, where he remained for seven years, first as a pupil and later as an instructor. In 1902 he took charge of the commercial department in the east high school, Des Moines, was cashier in the state treasurer's office and held a position in the United States treasury department. Re-entered Highland Park college and in the fall of 1909 enrolled in Drake university college of law; admitted to the practice of law in 1912. For a period of ten years he has been identified with the farming industry. At the present time engaged in the hardware and general mercantile business at Frederika. He is a member of the Lutheran church. Was re-elected representative in 1922. A democrat in politics.

**CHARLES RHINEHART.**—Representative from Dallas County, was born in Dallas county March 4, 1876; was reared on a farm; graduated from Iowa state college in 1899; married to Frances B. Schamel, 1906; has two children. A member of the Sons of the American Revolution, Sons of Veterans, Odd Fellows and Masonic lodges. A farmer by occupation and republican in politics.

**PAUL N. ROBSON.**—Representative from Greene county, was born April 24, 1895, on a farm near Galva, Ill. Came to Iowa in the spring of 1896 with his parents, who located on a farm near Scranton. He received his early education in the rural schools and the high school at Scranton, and later attended Iowa state college at Ames, where he took the course in animal husbandry, and was graduated in 1919. He is a member of the M. E. church, Masonic lodge, and American Legion. He is a veteran of the world war, having entered the service in September, 1917. In August, 1918, he was commissioned second lieutenant of infantry. He was discharged from the service on December 12, 1918. Upon his return from the army, he completed his course at Ames, and then resumed his farming operations. He was married to Miss Charlotte Aughey of Woodbine, Iowa, on November 25, 1919. He was elected representative in 1922. In politics he is a republican.

**RALPH L. RUMBLEY.**—Representative from Decatur county, November 2, 1891, and has resided on a farm near Leon all his life. Graduated from Leon high school in 1912. Entered Iowa state college in the fall of 1912, taking A.H. course, was on varsity base ball team spring of 1914. Left school after 1914 and taught rural school for five terms near his home. Was elected clerk of district court of Decatur county in the fall of 1916. Entered army September 4, 1917, and was at Camp Dodge for seven months. Transferred to Camp Jackson, S. C., received a commission there, and was sent to school of fire, Ft. Sill, Okla., received a certificate from this school and was transferred to Camp Kearny, Calif., in 64th F. A. Was discharged from that place and returned to farm near Leon. Was vice commander of American Legion post at Leon. Also secretary of Decatur county farm bureau. Member of Farmers' union and belongs to Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, Knights Templar, Shriners and Elks. Was elected representative in fall of 1920. Republican in politics.

**HEIKE A. RUST.**—Representative from Franklin county, Iowa, was born in Franklin county, December 12, 1883. Was graduated from Sheffield high school; attended Des Moines university for two years and later attended Iowa state college at Ames. Has been actively engaged in farming since leaving Ames. Married Miss Gladys Stubblefield of Ipava, Ill., October 8, 1921. He is president of the Sheffield Community Creamery; director of Franklin County Mutual Insurance association; was township clerk for eight years; was secretary of county farm bureau for five years, and is at present active in farm bureau and other community activities. Elected representative in 1922. A republican in politics.

**FRANK C. SAMPSON.**—Representative from Audubon county, was born on a farm in Audubon county, Iowa, April 12, 1881. He attended the rural schools, graduated from the Audubon high school, and then went to Grinnell college. Later he entered Iowa state college at Ames, giving special attention to animal husbandry and agricultural subjects. Since finishing his education he has devoted his time largely to the operation of his stock farm in Audubon county, a part of which was once the homestead of his father. His interests are almost entirely agricultural. Upon announcing his candidacy for representative, he re-

signed as secretary of the Audubon county farm bureau, a position held by him since its organization. In 1920 he was elected for the fourth time as treasurer of the Audubon County Fair association and is now treasurer of the Audubon County Community club. He is a stockholder and one of the organizers of the Iowa Savings bank at Audubon. In 1907 he married May Layland. They have a daughter, Mary Louise. He is an active Methodist, and a member of all Masonic bodies. Elected representative in 1920 and re-elected in 1922 and is a republican in politics.

WM. E. G. SAUNDERS.—Representative from Palo Alto county, was born in Blairgowrie, Scotland, in 1865. Came to United States in 1882. Lived four years in New Mexico and moved to Emmetsburg, Iowa, in 1886. Was quartermaster 52nd Iowa volunteer infantry during Spanish-American war. Elected from Palo Alto county to fourtieth general assembly on independent ticket.

W. F. SCHIRMER.—Representative from Jackson county, was born June 16, 1873, at Bellevue, Iowa. Attended the public schools and graduated from high school in 1889. Entered the office of the Bellevue Leader in 1890, later becoming editor and is now publisher of that newspaper. Married Miss Antoniette Wickie June 12, 1901, and they have one son, Allen F. Member of the Presbyterian church, board of education and Masonic lodge. Elected representative in 1920 and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

H. H. SCHULTE.—Representative from Worth county, was born on a farm in Clayton county, November 19, 1863. Received a common school and high school education. Was married to Margaret Bierbaum February 23, 1889. In the spring of 1889 moved from Clayton county to a farm in Worth county, where they now reside. Has served as township trustee for ten terms and four years as county assessor, is president of the Farmers' Savings bank of Manly, Iowa, since 1911. He and his family are members of the Evangelical church. Elected representative in 1920 and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

C. H. SCOTT.—Representative from Appanoose county, was born on a farm in that county September 14, 1862. He received his education in the rural and graded schools. Is engaged in farming and truck gardening. He was married to Miss Lura F. Campbell on April 1, 1887. To them were born fourteen children, four boys and eight girls living. Served as school director and township trustee for many years. He was elected representative in 1916, 1918, 1920 and 1922. A republican in politics.

WILL C. SCOTT.—Representative from Fremont county, was born May 1, 1864, at Sterling, Ill. Came with his parents to Fremont county, Iowa, in 1877. He attended the grade and high schools of Rock Falls, Ill., and later at Riverton, Iowa. He was raised and worked on a farm until 1892. Was united in marriage February 26, 1888, to Cordelia Simmerman of Farragut, Iowa. He entered the mercantile business in 1892 at Farragut, Iowa, continuing twenty-eight years. Served as clerk of his township sixteen years, township committeeman twelve years, secretary to the county central committee two years. A member of the Congregational church, a Mason and a Modern Woodman. Elected representative in 1920 and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

GEORGE F. SLEMMONS.—Representative of Buchanan county, was born on a farm in that county on August 17, 1875. Received his education in the rural and graded schools of the county, and at Lenox college, Hopkinton, Iowa. He has spent his entire life on a farm. Was married on June 1, 1904, to Miss Mabel L. Thompson of Buchanan county. To them were born two children, John W. and Ruth Gertrude. Has held office of township trustee, assessor, bank director and numerous other offices. Served on local school board twenty-five years. Member of Odd Fellows, Masonic and M. W. of A. lodges. Presbyterian in religion. Republican in politics. Elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922.

**C. D. SMITH.**—Representative from Lucas county, was born in Muskingum county, O., in 1857. When five years of age he emigrated with his parents to Iowa, locating in Lucas county where he has since resided. When a young man Mr. Smith engaged in farming and feeding which has been his chief business. He is also interested in banking, being vice-president and director of the Russell State bank for the past fourteen years. He is president and director of the Chariton ice cream and butter factory, and is a director of the Iowa Packing company of Des Moines. Mr. Smith is the inventor and patentee of the first adjustable road drag granted a patent in the United States. He has been treasurer of his school district for thirty-three continuous years. In the late war Mr. Smith served on the county council of defense and on the fuel administration. He is in church affiliation a Methodist. In politics a democrat.

**WARD B. SMITH.**—Representative, was born at Bradford, Chickasaw county, Iowa, March 20, 1858. Attended the common schools and Bradford academy. Acted as traveling salesman for a few years. Then married Rose McCreary to whom one child was born—now Hazel M. Meler of Nashua, Iowa. In 1884 moved to farm which he occupied for several years. Retired in 1906 and acted as member of the board of supervisors from 1915 to 1921. Was married to Luna Bartsch in 1921. Elected to the legislature in 1922. Republican in politics.

**MICHAEL F. SPRINGER.**—Representative from Decatur county, born on a farm in that county January 15, 1870. Lived continuously on the farm until 1920, when he moved to Leon, but still continues the active management of the farms. His education consists of what he could acquire, attending the country schools some three months during the winter term. On December 25, 1895, he was married to Mary Francis Stone and to this union three children were born, George and John, who are now students at the Iowa state university, and one daughter, Helen, who finished the high school course in 1923. A life long democrat. He served in various township offices and has been chairman of the county central committee for a number of years. Was secretary of the farm bureau and at the present is president of the Leon school board.

**T. B. STOCK.**—Representative from Allamakee county, was born on a farm near Waukon. At the age of sixteen years he took a position with one of the leading mercantile firms of Waukon and continued in their employment for about five years, and at the end of that time he went into business for himself, in which he continued until 1912. Was one of the organizers of the Peoples' National bank and was elected president of that institution, which position he now holds. He is a member of the Reformed church, also a member of the Masonic, Knights of Pythias and the Woodmen lodges. Member of the city council for a number of years; also elected mayor of the city of Waukon. Has always been a democrat in politics.

**ARTHUR STOKESBERRY.**—Representative from Davis county, was born in that county February 14, 1882. Is a farmer, owning and operating his own farm. Is an ordained minister of the Christian church. A graduate of the Southern Iowa Normal school of Bloomfield and of the Chillicothe business college of Chillicothe, Mo. Has also attended Drake university. Has taught sixteen terms in the public schools of Iowa and Oklahoma. Was elected clerk of the district court of Davis county in 1916 and re-elected in 1918. He is married. A democrat in politics.

**JOHN A. STORY.**—Representative from Warren county, was born on a farm in Pennsylvania, April 13, 1851. Attended country school and graded school. Graduated with the degree of A.B. from Washington and Jefferson college, Washington, Penn., in 1874. Read law and was admitted to the bar of Iowa in 1876. Practiced law until 1905, then went into the banking business. Was elected to the twentieth general assembly in 1883 and to the twenty-first general assembly in 1885 from Adair county. Was elected as presidential elector in 1884. Was a delegate to the national republican convention at Philadelphia in 1900, from ninth district, Iowa. Was appointed a judge of the fifth judicial district of Iowa, in 1895, and served one year. Was a special assistant deputy at-

torney general of the United States in 1899 and 1900. Moved to Omaha, Neb., in the fall of 1900, then to Indianola, Iowa, in fall of 1905 and still resides there. Was a member of the thirty-ninth general assembly of Iowa. Re-elected to the fortieth general assembly.

**WERNER STRIPPEL.**—Representative from Benton county. Served in the city council of Vinton, Iowa, for ten years. Was also president of the Commercial club in the city of Vinton for three years. He is vice president of the Kelly Canning company at Waverly, Iowa; secretary-treasurer and general manager of the canning company at Clarksville, Iowa, and president of the Peoples Savings bank at Vinton, Iowa. A republican in politics.

**OSCAR ULSTAD.**—Representative from Wright county, was born at Leland, Ill., October 30, 1867. At the age of five years he moved with his parents to Lee county, Ill., where he resided until twenty years of age, when he moved to Wright county, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the rural schools of Illinois. Was engaged in the mercantile business at Holmes, Iowa, for fifteen years, retiring in 1913 and has lived on a farm adjoining Holmes since that time. Was postmaster at Holmes for seventeen years, township trustee four years, township clerk two years and was president of the school board. Is married and has five children. Elected representative in 1916, 1918, 1920 and 1922. A republican in politics.

**G. L. VENARD.**—Representative from Sioux county, was born in Muscatine county, Iowa, August 7, 1860. His parents came from Indiana in 1865 taking up land in Muscatine county. Received his education in the rural schools and attended the Wilton academy two years. Since that time he has been actively engaged in farming, for the past twenty years in Sioux county. Served on the board of education eighteen years, was township clerk fourteen years, and assessor four years. Was elected representative March, 1921, to fill vacancy. Re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**EARL W. VINCENT.**—Representative from Guthrie county, born on a farm in Washington county, Iowa, March 27, 1886. Was graduated from the Keota high school in 1904, from Monmouth college in 1909, and the law school at the state university of Iowa, in 1912, and since said time engaged in the general practice of law at Guthrie Center, Iowa. Was married to Madge Lee in 1916, at Center-ville, Iowa, and to them has been born one child, Marjorie Lee. Was county attorney of Guthrie county from 1919 to 1922, inclusive. President of State Association of County Attorneys, 1921-22. Is a member of the Presbyterian church and is a Mason. A republican in politics.

**BREDE WAMSTAD.**—Representative from Mitchell county, was born in that county April 17, 1878. Attended the rural schools and later the St. Ansgar seminary and institute. Graduated normal course in 1899. Married June 29, 1915, to Catherine Rone of Worth county, Iowa. Has one daughter, Constance. Appointed deputy county auditor of Mitchell county, in 1903. Has been actively engaged in farming since the spring of 1906. At present is a director of the Osage Cooperative Grain & Supply company, and of the Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance association of Mitchell county, and is a member of the county board of education. Has taken an active part and interest in farm organizations. A member of the Evangelical Lutheran church. Elected representative 1920 and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**JOHN H. WEBER.**—One of the representatives from Dubuque county, was born at Cascade, Dubuque county, August 1, 1866. Received a common school education. Entered the drug business at Cascade, Iowa, May 1, 1889, and is at present conducting the drug store founded on that date. Was married to Mae E. McLean at Cascade, Iowa, June 13, 1894. Has four children. Is a member of the Knights of Columbus, being a past grand knight. Was elected representative to the thirty-ninth general assembly November 2, 1920. Re-elected in 1922. A democrat in politics.

W. WALTER WILSON.—Representative from Tama county, was born at Franklin, Ind., in 1869. At the age of six months he moved with his parents to Illinois. When four years of age he moved to Iowa in one of those historic prairie schooners, crossing the Mississippi on a ferry at Burlington, and settled in 1873 on a farm in Black Hawk county, the deed to which bears the signature of Franklin Pierce. At the age of nineteen, he entered the state teachers' college, from which he was graduated in 1892. In 1894 he was graduated from the state university. After teaching school five terms he was married to S. Sophie Keeler and took up the business of farming for himself, first in Hamilton county, and later in Tama county, and is still following farming. He has three children, Carl, Iris, and Dorothy. He has held the office of secretary of the Buckingham Grain company since its organization and also the presidency of the Farmers' Lumber company, at Traer since its origin. He was president of the Tama county farm bureau when elected to the office of representative without opposition either in the primary or general election November 7, 1922. He is a member of the Methodist church. He is a 32nd degree Mason. A republican in politics.

THOMAS L. WOLFE.—Representative, was born in Linn county, Iowa, December 16, 1872. His parents came to Iowa in 1837 from Ohio and settled at Ivanhoe, Linn county, the present Wolfe homestead and the ownership of which has been and is in the Wolfe family. He has been in the active practice of Medicine in Mt. Vernon for twenty-five years and also farming and real estate business in Iowa and the south.

RAY YENTER.—Representative from Johnson county, born in Johnson county, near Oxford, August 17, 1887. Attended the rural schools, Oxford high school, Cedar Rapids business college, and graduated from the law college of Valpariso university in 1910. Married November 24, 1915, to Elizabeth Rose Flannery. Served as captain in first Iowa cavalry on the Mexican border, 1916 and 1917, and during the world war as captain, field artillery, U. S. A., during which time he commanded battery F, 126th field artillery. Engaged in the real estate and investment business. A republican in politics.

STATE JUDICIAL CONVENTION

The state judicial convention of the party was held at Waterloo August 9, 1922, with county representation the same as at the regular state convention of August 2. This convention, as provided by law, nominated party candidates for justices of the supreme court. Under the law, no person could serve as a delegate to this convention who had sat as a delegate in the convention of August 2d.

PARTY PLATFORM

The Republicans of the State of Iowa in convention assembled reaffirm their steadfast devotion to the principles of the party, and declare themselves as uncompromisingly in favor of the orderly processes of law, of upholding the honor of the nation, of protecting the rights of America and American citizens, both at home and abroad, of promoting the growth and development of American institutions, and of preserving American markets to American manufacturers and American labor.

**REPUBLICAN ACHIEVEMENTS**—When the Republican party took over the executive branch of the government, March 4, 1921, it found a demoralized country and a distracted world. During the war, and immediately thereafter, practically every principle of sound business procedure had been disregarded. The result was a state of affairs bordering on chaos.

The President faced his gigantic task modestly, but unafraid. He did not promise the impossible. He called to his council table some of the ablest men of the nation and went to work. The achievements of the seventeen months since President Harding assumed his duties are unparalleled in the annals of government. Agriculture, which was in the depths of a sudden and drastic depression, was, by means of an emergency program, which included tariff readjusting, immigration restrictions, rural financing through the War Corporation Board and many lesser things brought back within a few months to a sound basis, with prices above the pre-war levels. Industry generally revived and millions of men went to work.

We congratulate the President upon the success thus attained in restoring sound business conditions throughout the country and we sincerely regret that the rapid return of prosperity in all lines of business has been checked and impeded by industrial disturbances, resulting from gross errors of the late Democratic administration.

We endorse the wise and able leadership of President Harding, and pledge ourselves and our candidates for seats in the halls of congress to support loyally the program which he has inaugurated and is endeavoring to carry out.

The Washington conference for the limitation of armaments, conceived and called by the President, was the greatest and most successful single achievement for the prevention of wars that the world has ever witnessed and the treaties adopted by the conference constitute a great forward movement in the progress of the world toward universal peace.

The enactment by congress of the law establishing a budget system, at the request of President Harding, has proven a potential and successful means of bringing government expenditures and the number of employes in the various departments and bureaus within reasonable limits, after the unprecedented extravagance inaugurated during the World War. It has effected a saving of more than two hundred fifty millions of dollars in our ordinary routine expenditures, tax collections have been reduced one and one-half million dollars in the treasury, and our bonds heretofore selling at a ruinous discount, are now above par.

**REPUBLICAN OFFICIALS COMMENDED**—We commend and endorse the worthy and patriotic service of the Republican Congressmen and Senators from Iowa and our distinguished son, The Secretary of Agriculture, Henry C. Wallace. We especially commend, as an example of patriotic and self-sacrificing citizenship and fearless, sagacious and distinguished statesmanship, the career of our Senior Senator from Iowa, Albert B. Cummins.

We endorse the administration of Governor Kendall and his able assistants in office.

**SUPPORT OF LAW AND CONSTITUTION**—The administration of justice through courts with juries is the highest development and greatest achievement of civilization and the only true safeguard of the inherent and precious rights of life, liberty and property. They are the only orderly, peaceful and efficient means which have ever been devised for the interpretation of constitutions and statutes and the determination and adjudication of the rights of the people, individually and collectively.

Courts were established by the people for their own protection and have properly, uniformly and fearlessly performed their functions and should be supported and maintained by all. We deprecate and condemn all efforts to bring into disrepute, cripple or destroy the courts, whether emanating from Socialists and those seeking to destroy our whole system of government or from demagogues seeking for their own selfish purposes to arouse passions and prejudice of the people and to array class against class.

We urge the dissemination of a better knowledge of our system of constitutional government and of the conduct of our courts to the end that all the people may appreciate the value of a government of law rather than a government of designing, selfish and ambitious men.

**FEDERAL RESERVE SYSTEM**—The Federal Reserve Banking System was adapted by a Democratic administration from measures previously introduced by Republicans in Congress. It was subjected to immense strains by the exigencies of the World War, and errors of administrative judgment are in evidence. Too lavish loaning, followed by too rapid liquidation, was the source of much additional hardship to member banks and their clients.

It ought to be understood, however, that through the operation of this comprehensive financial system, the country was saved from widespread bankruptcy, perhaps from a temporary breakdown, in our vast financial fabric, involving disaster unparalleled in the experience of this country.

The Federal Reserve Board appointed by President Wilson, was not representative of the business interests of the country as a whole. It should be made so. The Federal Reserve Banking system, however, has demonstrated its immense capacity for usefulness and relief in times of financial stress, and it is deserving of our full confidence and support.

**FRIENDLY TO LABOR**—The Republican party has always been the friend of labor and of those who labor. It has consistently advocated and supported the doctrine of protection to American industries and the fostering of American institutions as a means of furnishing employment to American labor.

We believe that the laboring people of the United States are entitled to better wages than those of any other country, and in the interest of American homes and of society, we pledge ourselves to support such measures and policies as will insure to labor fair compensation and fair treatment, at the hands of employers and the public in exchange for fair and honest work.

We believe that labor should be accorded the largest measure of freedom in solving its own problems, and that the powers of the state or the federal government should only be invoked when employers and employes fail to agree, or when necessary to preserve order or protect the rights of the individual or the public. We recognize the right of labor to organize for its own protection, and its right to act collectively in a lawful manner. In so declaring ourselves, we do not overlook the rights of the individual. The constitution of the United States guarantees to every citizen the rights of life, liberty, property and the pursuit of happiness, and every individual who wants to engage in any legitimate employment, whether he be a member of any labor organization or not, has the right to do so without being molested or intimidated. The right of the individual to pursue such form of peaceful employment as he may choose is so fundamental and so sacred that every power of the state and the nation should, when necessary, be used to protect him in that right.

**AVOIDANCE OF INDUSTRIAL WARS**—The time has come when earnest, honest effort must be put forth to the end that industrial wars,—sometimes more costly in dollars and cents than armed conflicts,—may be avoided. Neither of the parties directly involved in these controversies nor the general public can afford to forever rest under either the menace or the burden of these all too frequent clashes, which disorganize and sometimes almost paralyze industrial life. There must be a recognition of the fact that our complex modern life has created conditions which make it intolerable for any man or group of men to disregard the general interests of the community.

We deplore the fact that in the coal and railroad strikes, both the employers and the employes have failed to show proper regard for the authority of the federal government to deal with such controversies through its legally constituted boards, commissions and public officials. If this government is to endure as the government of the people, its authority and supremacy must be recognized and maintained. We, therefore, express to President Harding our abiding faith in his sincerity of purpose, and commend his firm and courageous stand in dealing with the industrial controversies which have so vitally affected the interests of the country at large, and we pledge our loyal support in upholding and sustaining the authority of both state and federal government.

**A PROGRAM FOR AGRICULTURE**—Agriculture is the dominant and basic industry of our State. Its stability and prosperity transcend all other requirements of our commonwealth. Its prosperity is recognized as vital and essential to the prosperity of all the people. The Republican party pledges its support to the following:

1. The development and amplification of the functions of the Iowa Department of Agriculture consistent with the magnitude and importance of the industry in our State. We recommend the reorganization of the State Department of Agriculture and the merging of all agricultural activities under one head so that its varied branches may function more efficiently, expeditiously and economically in behalf of the industry.
2. To assist in the reduction of public expenses in efficiently, expeditiously and economically in behalf of the industry.
3. Legislation necessary to bring about a reduction in intra-state freight and passenger rates, and the assurance of every assistance and support contemplating relief from exorbitant freight and passenger rates on intra-state traffic, and the return of full authority over intra-state railroad affairs to the Railroad Commission of our State.
4. We pledge our continued support in the enactment of laws aiding the farmer in his effort to create agricultural finance, and marketing agencies and reforms in our tax laws, and adjusting of interest rates to the end that his income may be more uniform and large enough to show a fair return on capital invested.

5. We urge early action by Congress raising the Federal Farm Loan limit to \$25,000.00, and legislation providing for intermediate credit. We endorse the activities of the Iowa Member of Congress in procuring the enactment of much needed legislation for the farmers' relief, and urge upon Congress the necessity of continued activities along this line till cooperative associations are granted access to all grain and livestock markets.

6. We recommend that the Governor appoint a committee to make a thorough inquiry and investigation without expense to the State of the Rural Credit System Departments of Agriculture and the cooperative associations now in existence in neighboring states, and legislation affecting agriculture. Such committee to report to the Governor the result of its investigations prior to the convening of the next General Assembly.

**PARTY NOMINATIONS**—At the Republican State Convention, held July 20, 1920, the following resolution was adopted:

"Actual experience has demonstrated that great evils have arisen in the use of the present primary law of this state. It has been given a fair trial and found to be unwieldy, expensive and unsatisfactory. We favor its repeal and the substitution therefor of such primary legislation as will guarantee to all voters the full right to take part and be heard in the counsels of their party, and will provide for them an opportunity for free and fair expressions as to both candidates and measures."

We emphatically reaffirm this declaration and call upon the General Assembly for prompt enactment consistent therewith.

In the event, however, that the General Assembly shall not comply with this demand for a substantial revision of our nominating system, then we instruct the Republican State committee in calling the state convention for electing delegates to the next Republican National convention, to call such state convention for a date not later than February, 1924, and to include in the call therefor, as a part of the business of that convention, the duty of endorsing candidates for senator, governor and other state officers, to be supported by the party as a party in the ensuing primaries; and the State Committee shall at the same time prescribe suitable rules for the fair and free choice of delegates to such state convention under Republican auspices and by Republicans only.

**PATRIOTIC SERVICE**—Since its organization, the Republican Party has steadfastly stood as the sponsor for all legislation and executive action for the benefit of those who rallied to the colors in vindication of the Constitution and the defense of our rights and liberties.

The Republicans of Iowa yield to none in their appreciation of the services of the Nation's defenders and devotion to their interests, both in War and in Peace. We unreservedly approve the Act of the 39th General Assembly for the relief and assistance of former service men and women, which will come before the people for their ratification at the November election as a measure of justice to those coming within its provisions and as an expression of the people of Iowa of appreciation and gratitude for their sacrifices and services.

The first great duty of the Nation growing out of the World War is to provide ample means for the most scientific medical and psychopathic treatment and the most modern hospital care and the proper education and rehabilitation of its disabled veterans and in furnishing aid to their dependents. To this end, there must be sympathetic and efficient administration and ample funds provided by Congress as necessities require for these purposes.

We also favor the immediate enactment by the Federal Government of legislation for substantial adjusted compensation of world war veterans and the provision therein of suitable and adequate ways and means for the payment thereof, both as a measure of justice and as a grateful act of a Republic to its defenders.

We recognize that the people are under deep and lasting obligations to the Civil, Spanish and World War veterans and their organizations and pledge them our entire sympathy and undivided support in all their worthy endeavors.

We endorse the principal of universal, conscription of material and personal resources and urge such action on the part of Congress during times of peace as will automatically affect such result upon the declaration of war.

**COOPERATION OF WOMEN**—The women of Iowa, are to be congratulated on their earnest and intelligent exercise of their new freedom. The ballot has not changed their traditional functions of wife, mother, sister, home builder and member of society. They are still accomplishing, but in a larger way, their aims and ambitions to defend the home and country, to raise to higher standards the environment of youth and to better living conditions. They are resolved to use the ballot with their best brain and highest impulse. A Republican Congress and Republican States enfranchised women, and with enfranchisement came the duty of deciding whether they would remain non-partisan or attach themselves to one of the great political parties which sought their favor. Women voters quickly discerned that non-partisanship is the no man's land of politics. That our government is a government of parties, and that it is only by giving allegiance to one party or the other that they can have any influence in public affairs. Political parties express and realize the ideals of the people.

The women of Iowa and the nation recognize in the Republican party the glory of the past and the hope of the future, and in overwhelming numbers have become affiliated with the party of Lincoln, McKinley, Roosevelt and Harding, and we welcome them to our councils.

We favor the adoption of an amendment to the constitution of Iowa, recognizing the legal right of women to hold any office within the gift of the people of the state.

**RESERVE BOARD**—We present Willis L. Stern as Iowa's Candidate for appointment by the President, on the Federal Farm Loan Board, and request the Iowa delegation in Congress to use every honorable effort to secure his appointment to that position.

**PARTY CHAIRMEN**—We are proud of the record and achievement of Hon. Chas. A. Rawson as Chairman of the Republican State Committee for the past ten years and for the effective and unselfish work which he has performed for the Republican Party and for the advancement of sound Republicanism, and we deeply regret that his public service requires his retirement as Chairman of the Republican State Committee.

**NOMINEES COMMITTED TO PARTY PLEDGES**—Finally, this declaration of principles is formulated and adopted in conformity with the provision of Section 1087-a-27, of the Code Supplement of 1913, whereby this convention is empowered, "to formulate and adopt the State platform of the party it represents;" and to this platform are hereby committed the nominees of the party, as chosen under the law from which this convention derives its authority, and to them our support is pledged.

## STATE JUDICIAL CONVENTION

The state judicial convention of the party was held at Des Moines, August 9, 1922, with county representation the same as for the regular state convention of August 2. Candidates for justices of the supreme court were nominated.

## PARTY PLATFORM

**PLANK ONE**—The Democrats of Iowa, in convention assembled, conscious of a growing appreciation by our people, regardless of party, of the genius and statesmanship of Woodrow Wilson, are pleased to remind the people of the state and the nation as well, that the constructive legislation of his administration is founded upon the fundamental principles of our historic party and his peace policies pointed the shortest route for the return of happiness and prosperity to a war-weary world.

With reverence we salute our great leader and with tenderest solicitude we hope that he may yet see the supreme triumph of his policies. We deplore the partisan hatred and cruel jealousy that conspired to defeat the return of peace to a suffering world under a pretext, never intended to be observed, that an association of nations, free from every hazard to our national sovereignty, would be immediately formed.

The most shameless spectacle of our national life, was the abandonment by the Harding administration, of our assured position of world leadership, attained by the vision and genius of Woodrow Wilson. Through his leadership the world has come to trust us. We condemn the cowardly desertion of our allies, when America should have led in restoring peace to a disordered world, upon terms that justified our participation in the war. We urge upon the attention of the thoughtful people of our state a consideration of the responsibility and consequence of delayed peace in Europe.

The whole of Europe is yet in chaos and conflict.

The nations of Europe are on the very verge of bankruptcy.

The world's markets are destroyed and as a consequence American commerce is in a state of stagnation.

The people of this state and of all America are today suffering the inevitable consequence of the loss of foreign markets, shattered prices, business depression, idle labor and capital with necessarily attendant distresses.

**PLANK TWO**—The chaos that has overtaken our country and the rest of the world is directly the result of the breakdown in Europe. To this breakdown, the American senate contributed in no small measure. The war was won by the power of cooperation. Peace has been impossible on terms of isolation.

Industrial and financial paralysis inevitably followed in the wake of that fatuous and shortsighted policy. For this the republicans party must take full responsibility. Blind to the havoc its blundering actions have wrought, it now seeks to write the last chapter of a Robinson Crusoe policy of isolation by erecting a tariff barrier that will close to America the markets of the world. The price the Iowa farmer receives for the products of his toil depends upon his ability to market his surplus.

Today that surplus is being hurled back into his teeth with the result that prices are demoralized. Europe can't buy our goods, for her money exchange has gone down with a crash. She can't trade for our goods, if repelled with a prohibitive tariff. Peace will never be secure, industry will never flourish, commerce will never revive, prosperity will never be possible until this self-centered program of pettiness is abandoned. It points straight to national suicide.

**PLANK THREE**—We indorse the pronouncements and pledges of the democratic national and state platforms of 1920. With feelings of exultant pride, we challenge attention to the achievements of our party during the period it was last in control of the legislative and executive branches of our national government:

1. The federal reserve act is acclaimed by all to be the legislative masterpiece of the last half century. Under the provisions of this act, our government was able to finance a great war, and during the disturbances of a returning peace a financial panic was averted.

2. The income tax law admittedly the fairest method of taxation ever devised, places the burden of meeting the expenses of government where the ability and obligation of payment most surely rests.

3. The federal trade commission, created to inquire into unfair trade practices and to correct abuses to the end that there shall exist unrestrained competition, free from the vices of combinations and the conspiracies of trusts.

4. The Clayton act, which presents the first recognition by congress that "labor is not a commodity" and that the life, energy and aspirations of human beings do not come within the same classifications of property and wealth.

5. The federal farm loan act is designed to enable the farmers of the country to obtain long-time loans for the permanent financing of their business, with low rates of interest, commensurate with the high class security tendered free from sudden change or manipulation of the money market.

These five measures constitute a matchless page of long needed legislation, which a republican congress has not dared to erase even on the face of increasing demand that the loan limit from the farm loan banks be increased to at least \$25,000 which we heartily indorse.

**PLANK FOUR**—We commend the enlightened public sentiment, as expressed through the public press of both parties, upon the rostrum even by members

of the president's cabinet, condemning the congress for its wanton profligacy, utter inefficiency, total disregard for constitutional duty, and complete failure to function as a department of government. The senate has become a select body of obstructionists. The house of representatives, an unwieldy convention of individuals, representing local or selfish interests, with neither the disposition nor the capacity to comprehend or serve the needs of a great nation.

Four four years the republican party has been in full control of both houses of congress, and must bear full responsibility for the glaring inefficiencies of both houses. Limping and leaderless, congress continues to pursue its pitiful course of endless twaddle and interminable debate; aimless and helpless and hopeless, with no great problem solved, and not a single platform pledge redeemed. The return to "normalcy," promised during the campaign, has become the scoffing cry of a despairing people. With stagnant commerce, smokeless factories, idle labor, ruined markets, empty dinner pails, and social unrest in the land, congress is utterly impotent. In the words of Secretary Weeks, "it has reached its lowest ebb."

**PLANK FIVE**—We indorse our candidate for governor, J. R. Files, and present him to the electors of the state as a candidate worthy of trust and confidence. He possesses the vigor of youth and the intelligence, training and experience required in the person of a governor of this great state. As governor, Ray Files will approach the duties of this exalted place with an integrity of purpose and high resolve that will assure to the people of this state an administration characterized by fearless leadership, business management and rigid economy.

We pledge our candidate for governor to a constant urging and the employment of every constitutional power to the reduction of state taxes by the abolition and consolidation of the many overlapping boards and commissions and by an abandonment of the unbusinesslike methods of the administrative department of our state. We pledge our party to the enactment of remedial legislation outlined in our platform of 1920.

We present to the people of Iowa, as just cause for the repudiation of the administration of Governor Kendall, his failure to redeem his pre-election pledges. He promised a reduction in taxation, but delivered increased burdens. He promised a readjusted system of business in the administrative department, but delivered additional methods of wasting public money. While a candidate for the great office of governor he deplored the shameless waste of public funds in the support of fifty-six boards and commissions. He promised abolition and consolidation in the interest of economy. Today, he asks to be returned to his exalted office, though not a single board or commission has felt the axman's hand, and the cost of their operation during his administration has increased 18½ per cent.

**PLANK SIX**—We most heartily indorse the nominee of our party for the United States senate, Clyde L. Herring. We congratulate the people of Iowa upon the privilege they now have, of selecting a representative to the senate of the United States, possessed of a broad and varied business experience, a clear vision of the needs of all the people, a keen intellect, sterling integrity and earnestness of purpose. His force of character and sense of justice will make him a fitting representative of all of the people of our state.

Mr. Herring is thoroughly American, imbued with the spirit of constitutional government, and a thorough believer that through the orderly administration of government under the constitution the rights of persons and the rights of property will be secure and the inalienable rights of man to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness will be preserved.

We invite the men and women of Iowa, irrespective of party, to join with us in assuring the nation that Iowa will send to the senate of the United States a man thoroughly and devotedly attached to our form of government, a man who will by his every act uphold and support the constitution and defend it from assaults by enemies from within as well as from without.

Our form of government is the outgrowth of a conflict extending over centuries for the recognition of the principle that the primary function of government is to secure to the citizen the enjoyment of his natural and inalienable rights. Whenever a candidate for public office, high or low, is known to be

out of sympathy with our form of government he should be repudiated as unworthy of trust and confidence by members of his own and every other party.

The duty of the electorate of the state rises higher than party loyalty. The men and women of Iowa should learn that the party label of both of the great political parties may be claimed at times by a candidate whose declared principles are wholly incomparable with party creed of either.

**PLANK SEVEN**—The democratic party is now and always has been the firm friend of honest labor. By action of a democratic congress, labor was dignified by the creation of the department of labor in charge of a cabinet officer. To our party must be given the credit for the enactment of the child labor law, the workmen's compensation law, the eight hour law and the vocational training law. Labor is not a commodity and the principle must be recognized in all legislation. We believe that our national security, the safety of our lives and our property, depend upon a just recognition of the inalienable rights of human beings. Real prosperity is impossible unless we can assure all who toil an honest and commensurate return for that toil.

The enormous losses resulting from conflicts between employer and employe affect not only the parties in direct conflict but the general public. The public has an absolute right to demand that justice be done by labor, and that labor shall respect the rights of the public. The remedy for the distressing condition of today can not be found in legislation for enforced labor. That would be nothing short of involuntary servitude.

Neither can the remedy be found in enforced idleness, imposed by intimidation upon those who are willing to work. Labor must be humanized and its right protected. A public guaranty of a return of profit upon the investment of an employer, is indefensible while to his tender mercy is left the vital question of the workman's wage.

**PLANK EIGHT**—The railroads of the country were taken over by the government as a war measure to assure the swift transportation of troops, munitions and supplies. Federal operation under the management of Director General McAdoo was marked by a high degree of efficiency that greatly minimized loss.

Economies in management enabled operation without the raising of rates that might otherwise have been required. When the war closed it became necessary for the government to return the railroad properties to their respective owners. The president's order for the return of the railways gave the republican congress a full year with which to enact the necessary legislation. The full time was consumed by congress and on the eve of the return of the railways the president was confronted with the choice between the chaos of a veto, involving retention of the roads by the government and the approval of the Cummins-Esch bill, notwithstanding its serious imperfections and defects.

President Wilson reluctantly signed that law, saying that he despaired of getting anything better. Although the republican party has been in complete control of both houses for four years the correction or amending of this act has not been attempted.

We condemn the principle involved in the Cummins-Esch railroad bill, which guaranteed returns upon invested capital in the railroad business. The application of the principle involved in said act resulted in the imposition of exorbitant freight rates and we pledge our candidates if elected to such remedial legislation as will bring relief in reduced freight rates to the people of Iowa.

The return to which the railroads are entitled is a fair return upon an honest capitalization and in this connection we believe its employes should receive a living wage based upon a decent American standard of living.

**PLANK NINE**—It is generally recognized by all people that agriculture is the essential base of all prosperity in this state and in the nation as well and that consequently the slacking in this industry is the occasion for real alarm. The most vital thing in the nation's life is food, so it is not merely the farmer or the farm owner who is interested in the prosperous and successful agricul-

ture, but it is really the first interest of every man, woman and child of America and lies at the very foundation of the success of every business enterprise in the land.

In the solution of this most serious problem there are responsibilities resting upon the federal government and for the solution of these we must look to congress. We commend the attention of the people of Iowa to the democratic national platform, adopted in San Francisco, as an expression appreciative of the importance of the subject and as a program of constructive remedies. The improvement of inland waterways will greatly enlarge the means of transportation and stabilize freight rates; the removal of obstacles to co-operative marketing and bargaining on the part of the producer and consumer of farm products will promote economy in distribution, inuring to the benefit of both producer and consumer; the giving of federal aid to the state in the construction of good roads is proving of large benefit to the state and the continuance and extension of this policy will aid in increasing the attractiveness of farm life.

We believe it is essential to increase to the utmost the percentage of farm owners resident upon the farms of Iowa and we pledge our candidates for congress to an extension of the federal farm loan principles so that properly qualified citizens may acquire farms. We favor a thorough inquiry into our system of land tenure with a view of providing legislation that will make provision for long term leasing of farm land and that will secure and encourage improvement and maintain the productivity of the soil by the tenant.

We pledge ourselves to such legislation as will aid the tenant farmer to obtain working capital. We favor supervision of the methods and business practices of middle men, especially of those who have power to control distribution by processes of hoarding or otherwise, and those who have the power to control the price paid to the producer and the price charged to the consumer.

We believe the co-operative elevator, warehouse and stockyards are essentials in the economical distribution of farm products, and we pledge ourselves to the promotion thereof and the adoption of necessary legislation therefor.

We pledge ourselves to the enactment of the necessary legislation to require railroads to grant sites and trackage on rights of way to co-operative elevators, warehouses and stockyards. We believe that good roads are essential factors for the economical and advantageous distribution of farm products and will increase the attractiveness of farm life, and we pledge ourselves to the promotion of these improvements.

**PLANK TEN**—The pronounced menace to our national peace, happiness and security is found in the lack of respect for law and governmental authority so prevalent in all parts of our country. We believe that the power of legislation is vested in congress and in our General Assembly and that all laws emanating from either of these bodies should be respected and enforced. People may differ in judgment as to the wisdom of particular legislation, but so long as such legislation stands as the law of the land it should be respected and enforced.

**PLANK ELEVEN**—We believe the agitation for the repeal of the primary system of selecting public officers if successful would be a backward step. A return to the old system of subjection to the dictation of party bosses and attendant corruption is unthinkable. We believe the present primary law should be amended to remove the existing cumbersome provisions and assure to the individual voter a voice in nominating candidates for office.

**PLANK TWELVE**—The republican administration's shameful treatment of that vast army of wounded, sick, maimed and broken world war veterans who returned from the battlefields of France, is one of the darkest blots on the history of the United States. The administration boasts that it is spending \$1,000,000 a day for hospitalization and relief of these sufferers, but it does not admit the appalling truth that a large part of this golden stream of taxpayers' money is diverted into the maws of a horde of political parasites who hold countless jobs by appointment from the republican officials in power, and that thousands of disabled veterans have died in the meshes of republican red tape.

We vigorously condemn the inexcusable ignorance of Brigadier General Sawyer, President Harding's personal physician, in dealing with the disabled veterans' problem. In his position as chief co-ordinator of the Federal Board of Hospitalization. This man, who had a small private practice in Marion, O., and who was President Harding's family doctor, and who never had a day's service, was made a brigadier general by the president and then placed in charge of veterans' hospitalization by the president who said it was an efficiency move.

We now unqualifiedly indorse the American Legion's demand that Brigadier General Sawyer stand aside that there may be a better opportunity for the disabled to get relief, although the record of carelessness, neglect, inefficiency and extravagance of the administration's agents in handling this problem should forfeit the confidence of all Americans in the republican party.

We deplore the republican party's disgraceful wrangling and lick-spittle policy over the adjusted compensation bill in congress. This measure should have been passed long ago and would have been but for the opposition of President Harding, Secretary Mellon and certain republican leaders in the senate. We urge the immediate passage of the adjusted compensation bill as it now stands, although we cannot deprecate too strongly the republicans' emasculation of the bill as it was originally submitted by the American Legion.

We do, however, oppose the addition of a sales tax provision as insisted upon by President Harding which would increase the burden on the already bended backs of the veterans themselves and the millions of others who are struggling under excessive taxation, the high cost of living and the lack of employment—all caused by unredeemed republican campaign promises, and the republican party's subservience to the privileged interests.

We also condemn the administration who have supported appropriations of billions of dollars for the railroads, the shipping interests and war contractors and then held that the government cannot afford one cent for economic relief for the nation's defenders in the world war. We believe, in the words of Frank B. Yetter, of Davenport, past president of the Iowa Bankers' Association, "for the United States to say that we cannot afford in a small measure to adjust the difference in compensation between the fellow who stayed at home and the fellow who went to war is to indict us for incompetency and impeach us for ingratitude. The American soldier is not asking for adjusted compensation half as loudly as the American people should be demanding it for him."

We earnestly urge all Iowa voters to vote for the state adjusted compensation bill which will be voted on at the general election next November. We pledge the American Legion and all other patriotic organizations supporting this measure our unstinted support to carry it through to a successful and glorious victory.

**PLANK THIRTEEN**—We favor the advancement of education in the state and suggest that in so far as possible, that the state superintendent of schools be removed from partisan politics.

**PLANK FOURTEEN**—We welcome the women of Iowa as equal sharers with the men in the responsibility of administering the political affairs of the state and nation. To this end we believe the constitution of Iowa should be so amended as to render woman eligible to hold any office in the state to which she may be elected. We would remind the women of Iowa that Woodrow Wilson was the first president in our history to place his leadership and the powers of his great office squarely in the fight which finally gave women the ballot. Just as truly as Lincoln was the emancipator of the slaves, so surely will history forever record that Woodrow Wilson was the greatest single contributor to the elevation of women to the rights of suffrage.

We welcome the service of Iowa and young manhood everywhere to participate in the councils of our party, that our organization may be made and kept a forward looking, forward stepping agent of progress, prosperity and good government.

### PRIMARY ELECTION

The term "Primary Election" is construed under the law to apply to an election by the members of various political parties for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for public office, for selecting delegates to conventions, and for the selection of party committeemen. The law provides that the primary election shall consist of an election by all political parties and shall be held at the various voting places of the several precincts on the first Monday in June, in the year 1912 and biennially thereafter, for the nomination of candidates for such offices as are to be filled at the general election in November next ensuing (except candidates for Judge of the Supreme, District and Superior Courts, which shall be by a Judicial Convention), for senator in the congress of the United States, and for the electors of the President and Vice-President of the United States in the years in which senators or president and vice president are to be elected.

The Board of Supervisors of each county (acting as a County Board of Canvassers) meet on the second Tuesday following the primary election in June and canvass the votes cast at the several precincts and make an abstract thereof. A separate abstract of the canvass duly certified is then forwarded to the Secretary of State for the following offices:

United States Senators.

Electors of the President and Vice President of the United States.

All State Officers.

Representatives in Congress.

Senators and Representatives in the General Assembly.

On the second Monday after the June primary election, the Executive Council meets as a State Canvassing Board, and opens and canvasses the abstract returns received from each county in the state. Said board makes abstracts of its canvass, showing the number of ballots cast for each person voted for, and the person having the highest number of votes in the state or district (provided he receives 35 per cent of all the votes cast by the party for such office), is duly and legally nominated and is entitled to have his name printed on the official ballot for the General Election.

## PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS FROM 1789 TO 1920

## AGGREGATE POPULAR VOTE AND ELECTORAL VOTE FOR CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT AT EACH ELECTION.

NOTE.—There is, properly speaking, no popular vote for President and Vice-President; the people vote for electors, and those, chosen in each state meet therein and vote for the candidates for President and Vice-President. The record of any popular vote for electors prior to 1824 is so meager and imperfect that a compilation would be useless. In most of the states, for more than a quarter century following the establishment of the Government, the State legislatures "appointed" the presidential electors, and the people, therefore, voted only indirectly for them, their choice being expressed by their votes for members of the legislature. In this tabulation only the aggregate electoral votes for candidates for President and Vice-President in the first nine quadrennial elections appear.

\*The candidates starred were elected. (a) The first Republican party is claimed by the present Democratic party as its progenitor. (b) No candidate having a majority of the electoral vote, the House of Representatives elected Adams. (c) Candidates of the anti-Masonry party. (d) There being no choice, the Senate elected Johnson. (e) Eleven southern states, being within the belligerent territory, did not vote. (f) Three southern states disfranchised. (g) Horace Greeley died after election, and Democratic electors scattered their votes. (h) There being a dispute over the electoral vote of Florida, Louisiana, Oregon and South Carolina, they were referred by Congress to an electoral commission composed of eight Republicans and seven Democrats, which, by a strict party vote, awarded 185 electoral votes to Hayes and 184 to Tilden. (i) Free Democrat. (j) Free Silver Prohibition party. (k) In Massachusetts. There was also a native American ticket in that state, which received 184 votes. (m) Middle of the Road or Anti-Fusion People's party. (n) United Christian party. (o) Union Reform party.

## ELECTORAL VOTES.

**1789.** Previous to 1804 each elector voted for two candidates for President. The one who received the largest number of votes was declared President, and the one who received the next largest number of votes was declared Vice-President. The electoral votes for the first President of the United States were: George Washington, 69; John Adams, of Massachusetts, 34; John Jay, of New York, 9; R. H. Harrison, of Maryland, 6; John Rutledge, of South Carolina, 6; John Hancock, of Massachusetts, 4; George Clinton, of New York, 3; Samuel Huntington, of Connecticut, 2; John Milton, of Georgia, 2; James Armstrong, of Georgia; Benjamin Lincoln, of Massachusetts, and Edward Teifair, of Georgia, 1 vote each. Vacancies (votes not cast), 4. George Washington was chosen President and John Adams Vice-President.

**1792.** George Washington, Federalist, received 132 votes; John Adams, Federalist, 77; George Clinton, of New York, Republican (a) 50; Thomas Jefferson, of Virginia, Republican, 4; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 1 vote. Vacancies, 3. George Washington was chosen President and John Adams Vice-President.

**1796.** John Adams, Federalist, 71; Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 68; Thomas Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 59; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 30; Samuel Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 15; Oliver Ellsworth, of Connecticut, Independent, 11; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 7; John Jay, of New York, Federalist, 5; James Iredell, of North Carolina, Federalist, 3; George Washington, of Virginia, John Henry, of Maryland, and S. Johnson, of North Carolina, all Federalists, 2 votes each; Charles Cotesworth Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 1 vote. John Adams was chosen President and Thomas Jefferson Vice-President.

**1800** Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 73; Aaron Burr, Republican, 73; John Adams, Federalist, 65; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 64; John Jay, Federalist, 1 vote. There being a tie vote for Jefferson and Burr, the choice devolved upon the House of Representatives. Jefferson received the votes of ten states, which being the largest vote cast for a candidate, elected him President. Burr received the votes of four States, which being the next largest vote, elected him Vice-President. There were 2 blank votes.

**1804.** The Constitution of the United States having been amended, the electors at this election voted for a President and a Vice-President, instead of for two candidates for President. The result was as follows: For President, Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 162; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 14. For Vice-President, George Clinton, Republican, 162; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 14. Jefferson was chosen President and Clinton Vice-President.

**1808.** For President, James Madison, of Virginia, Republican, 122; Charles C. Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 47; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 6. For Vice-President, George Clinton, Republican, 113; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 47; John Langdon, of New Hampshire, 9; James Madison, 3; James Monroe, 3. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen President and Clinton Vice-President.

**1812.** For President, James Madison, Republican, 128; De Witt Clinton, of New York, Republican, 89. For Vice-President, Elbridge Gerry, of Massachusetts, 131; Jared Ingersoll, of Pennsylvania, Federalist, 86. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen President and Gerry Vice-President.

**1816.** For President, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 183; Rufus King of New York, Federalist, 34. For Vice-President, Daniel D. Tompkins, of New York, Republican, 183; John Eager Howard, of Maryland, Federalist, 22; James Ross, of Pennsylvania, 5; John Marshall, of Virginia, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, 3. Vacancies, 4. Monroe was chosen President and Tompkins Vice-President.

**1820.** For President, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 231; John Q. Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 1. For Vice-President, Daniel D. Tompkins, Republican, 218; Richard Stockton, of New Jersey, 8; Daniel Rodney, of Delaware, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, and Richard Rush, of Pennsylvania, 1 vote each. Vacancies, 3. James Monroe was chosen President and Daniel D. Tompkins Vice-President.

## CENTRAL COLLEGE—PELLA.

In the fall of 1854 the academic department of Central University of Iowa opened for work and by 1861 freshmen, sophomore and junior classes in the collegiate department were doing regular work. During 1861-62 one hundred twenty-three professors and students enlisted in the army. Since that time the college has had a varied and checkered career, with many ups and downs, but has steadily continued its work and has constantly strengthened and enlarged it.
