


IOWA STATE BANNER

On March 29, 1921, the Thirty-ninth General Assembly adopted a resolution designating a design for a flag to be known as the "State Banner."

The banner was designed by the "Iowa Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution," and consists of three vertical stripes of blue, white and red, with the blue stripe nearest the staff and the white stripe in the center depicting a spreading eagle bearing in its beak blue streamers on which is inscribed in white letters the state motto, "Our liberties we prize and our rights we will maintain." The word "Iowa" in red letters is just below the streamers.



GREAT SEAL OF IOWA . . . was adopted in 1847, by act of the First General Assembly. It is retained in the custody of and under the control of the governor.



The Capitol Building

The cornerstone of this impressive-looking building was laid on September 29, 1873, the twenty-seventh year of Iowa's statehood.

The towering central dome is covered with 22-carat gold leaf and the four smaller domes have dotted lines of gold, like seam marks, adding further attractiveness to the structure.

On the first floor of the Capitol are the offices of the Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Attorney General, Secretary of Agriculture and the Supreme Court Chambers.

On the second floor will be found the law library and the House Chamber to the north and the Senate Chamber to the south.

From the top of the dome one may see all of the capital city to surrounding rolling hills and farms.

Iowa State Capitol

The administrative, legislative and judicial functions of the state of Iowa are centralized in an imposing and substantial state capitol occupying a prominent place in a spacious park on a hill commanding the capital city of Des Moines.

In its architectural features, its lines of simple beauty, its convenient interior arrangement, and in its decoration and adornment, the Iowa state capitol compares favorably with those of other states. It has served well the needs of the state as a seat of government for more than half of the state's first century of statehood. The surrounding grounds, or park, provide a setting which in extent and attractiveness is unequalled. The state has an investment in this plant for the transaction of public business of over seven million dollars.

The governor and other elective state officials have offices in the capitol, on the first or main floor, conveniently grouped around two central halls in the form of a cross, the offices amply, but not luxuriantly, furnished with modern equipment. On this floor sits the highest judicial tribunal of the state, in the supreme court chambers, which harmonize with the dignity and importance of that body. The legislative chambers are on the second floor, while in the ground floor and on the third floor there are many business offices and work rooms. The law library and many needed committee rooms are on the second floor. The speaker of the house and the lieutenant governor have offices near the large halls for the senate and the house of representatives.

Design of the Building

The architectural design of the capitol, rectangular in form, with great windows and high ceilings, follows the traditional pattern of the nineteenth century planning for public buildings, a modified and refined Romanesque style which gives the impression of strength and dignity combined with utility, both severely plain and handsomely decorated.

The commanding feature of the capitol is the central towering dome. It is constructed of steel and stone and is entirely covered with pure gold, which, glistening in the sunlight, can be seen from far distant places. The dome is surrounded by a lookout lantern that may be reached by long and winding stairs, and it terminates in a finial that is 275 feet above the ground floor. The rotunda beneath the dome is 67 feet in diameter. Four smaller domes of simple design rise from the four corners of the capitol. The pediment over the front entrance discloses a fine piece of allegorical sculpture.

The exterior is entirely of stone, of several kinds and differing qualities, with elaborate columns and handsomely designed cornices and capitals. The substructure is of a dark

and coarse-grained attractive stone quarried in Iowa. This is topped by a heavy course of vari-colored and beautifully marked granite cut from boulders scattered by glacial action over the prairies of the state. The superstructure, or main part of the building, is of a sandstone of a delicate buff color, fine-grained in texture, secured from Missouri in quarries along the Mississippi River. The approaches to the capitol are by four sets of steps mainly of granite.

Native Woods Used

The interior finish of the capitol is of native wood—cherry, walnut, catalpa, oak and butternut. There is much fine wood carving, and the supreme court bench is especially handsome as to material and workmanship. The main floors are of tile. Wainscoting and shelving are of marble, American and foreign, and some of this is very rare and unusual. There are imposing columns in the rotunda of fine sandstone, and on the second floor of granite, and in the legislative chambers of fabricated stone.

In size the capitol is 364 feet north and south by 247 feet wide. The cross-halls meet in rotunda, with a wide opening from the basement floor to the base of the dome. The house chamber is 79x91.4 feet in size, with ceiling 47.9 feet high; the senate chamber is 58x91.4 feet and 41.9 to the ceiling. Each member of the General Assembly is provided with a separate desk, 108 in the house and 50 in the senate, and the house is equipped with an electric vote recording system.

Central Location Chosen

The history of the state capitol, the choosing of the location, the construction thereof, and provision for a proper setting and surroundings, covers the whole period of statehood. Almost every step taken during the state's first century encountered opposition from selfish or sectional interests, or from pretended reasons of economy, and this was true as to the proper site near the center of the state, the size and character of the building and securing the necessary ground for the plant and equipment in which to transact the state's business.

The wisdom of a central location in the state for the seat of government was recognized by the First General Assembly, and before the state was two months old, a resolution was adopted looking to that end. A commission was authorized to choose a site and lay out a capital city, which was done, but the location did not meet with approval and the project was abandoned. Eight years later in 1855 the Fifth General Assembly, despite fierce opposition, by legislative act directed the location of the state capitol near the Raccoon forks of the Des Moines river. The precise place for the building was entrusted to a commission and a site was selected half way between the abandoned old Fort Des Moines and the scene of the last Indian agency on "Keokuk's Prairie." This place was decided upon

because of the generous donation by citizens of Des Moines of a nine-acre tract and several buildings for a temporary capitol which was in use for nearly thirty years.

By proclamation of Governor Grimes in 1857 the city of Des Moines became the state capital, and near the close of that year the books and papers of the state were brought from Iowa City, the old territorial and first state capital.

Fifteen Years Building

The state capitol was in process of building fifteen years. The Thirteenth General Assembly, in 1870, created a commission which selected the design, commenced work and in November, 1871, laid the cornerstone. The plan adopted was a modified composite of several designs submitted in competition. Messrs. Bell & Hackney were employed as supervising architects. Material for the foundation was purchased from Iowa quarries, as directed by law; but the stone proved unsubstantial and nearly all had to be removed.

The first building commission was discharged and a second was authorized to take charge of construction. Work proceeded under direction of a supervisor and foreman, a working force was employed by the day, and material and equipment were purchased on bids or by contract. The legislature made small appropriations every two years and the work proceeded as rapidly as funds and material would permit.

Cornerstone in 1873

The cornerstone was relaid by the second commission on September 29, 1873, and it contains manuscripts, books, coins, money and historical material. It is simply inscribed "Iowa, A. D. 1873."

Construction had been so nearly completed that the legislative halls were occupied and many of the state offices when dedication was made in 1884. The temporary capitol was in use, however, for the supreme court and some other offices; but in 1886 the supreme court chambers were occupied. The work of the commission was brought to a close June 30, 1886. There was never a hint of misuse of public funds in connection with the construction, and a final audit of the \$3,296,256 expended showed a net error of only \$3.77 in computing of bills and accounts.

In 1902, in order to modernize the capitol and make needed changes and repairs, a third capitol commission was created and appropriations made for the work. While this work proceeded, there occurred a disastrous fire in the north wing on January 4, 1904, which ruined the house chamber and damaged other offices. The commission restored the building, purchased paintings and mosaics, and redecorated the entire interior. The original decorations are still in the Senate.

Historical Building and Library

The Historical Memorial and Art Building is 260x110 feet in size and was begun in 1896, at first as a home for the Aldrich collection of historical matter. It is occupied by the Historical Department, the State Traveling Library, the State Medical Library and offices of the Library trustees. The State Law Library is located on the second floor of the capitol.

Battle Flags, Lunettes, Statues

The battle flags carried by the Iowa regiments in various wars are preserved in niches on the main floor—Civil War 36; Spanish-American War 13; First World War 26. In the west hall is a fine plaque done by Nellie V. Walker in commemoration of the work of Iowa women in the fight for civic and political equality. In the south hall is a monstrous photograph in colors, showing the grand review of Iowa troops on return from France.

Twelve statues, high within the rotunda, beginning north of the library door, represent History, Science, Law, Fame, Art, Industry, Peace, Commerce, Agriculture, Victory, Truth and Justice.

Eight lunettes, or half-moon-shaped paintings, surrounding the rotunda are the work of Kenyon Cox, a famous American artist, who was paid \$8,000 for them. They are entitled: Hunting, Herding, Agriculture, The Forge, Commerce, Education, Science, Art. They are allegorical and indicate the progress of civilization.

Over the main stairway is the large painting "Westward," and on the floor above the picture are six mosaics, designed by Frederick Dielman of New York and made in Venice of very small pieces of colored stone, permanent in color. The subjects represented are Defense, Charities, the Executive, the Legislative, the Judiciary and Education. These cost the state \$10,000 and are among the finest and largest in America.

The Iowa State Capitol Park

The limited area of the capitol grounds became a major political issue in 1914 in Governor George W. Clarke's administration. Looking to the future it was apparent that expansion would have to come to provide space for office buildings. The Thirty-fifth General Assembly set up a tax to raise \$3,000,000 to purchase lots, buildings and residences to clear the way for expansion to 93 acres. The land was landscaped, drives were put in and a system of lighting was installed to enhance the beauty of the capitol.

A new state office building was completed and fully occupied in 1952. A tunnel connecting the state house and the building was also constructed. In the expansion program to centralize the offices of the state, the International Harvester

building was purchased and its five floors were completely remodeled. The old school building on the northwest corner of the grounds was razed. The former home for governors north of the capitol was fitted for training of disabled persons. And the Amos Hiatt school building was remodeled for offices for the Commerce Commission. The impressive and well equipped historical building on Grand Avenue is fully described in its departmental section in this book.

Monuments Erected on Grounds

The most striking monument is the granite shaft rising 145 feet, erected to the memory of the soldiers and sailors of the Civil war. The heroic bronze figure "Victory" is predominant while at the base there are four groups representing different branches of the military or naval service, and numerous historical plaques and medallion portraits of typical soldiers. The original design was by Harriet A. Ketcham and work was commenced in 1894. A small and appropriate memorial to Christopher Columbus, erected by Iowa citizens of Italian ancestry, stands nearby.

General Grenville Dodge erected a monument honoring Iowa's long-time Senator William B. Allison. This is an allegorical design of heroic dimensions, depicting civic duties in the public service, and it is encompassed by a flower bed.

Monument to Pioneers

West of the capitol is an impressive bronze statuary group depicting "The Pioneer." The cannon and mortar on the grounds are of Civil war days. The grave of Willson A. Scott, one of those who gave the state the capitol grounds, is near where he lived and is appropriately marked. A bronze cannon taken in the Spanish-American war and the headpiece of the Battleship Iowa are near the historical building. A granite block dedicated to the soldiers of the Spanish-American war also stands on the plaza east of the capitol.

In 1950, the fine record of Iowa citizens in war bond drives was rewarded with the presentation of a replica of the Liberty Bell, and it is properly stationed just across the street west of the new office building. Boy Scouts presented a replica in miniature of the Statue of Liberty and it is erected between Grand Avenue and the parking area east of the capitol building. A stone erected by the W.R.C. in honor of Crocker Post No. 12, Department of Iowa, was set in 1944.

The magnificent golden dome of the capitol, one of the largest in the world, is a landmark that can be seen for many miles. The capitol, the state historical building, and the capitol park are visited annually by thousands of people of Iowa and tourists from other states. On the grounds there are several very large native trees, and the grounds are further adorned by many shrubs, trees and flowers.



WILD ROSE, STATE FLOWER OF IOWA . . . was officially designated as the flower of the state by the Twenty-sixth General Assembly in extraordinary session. The resolution was adopted May 7, 1897.

The Governor's Office

The outer office of the Governor is impressive with desks and furnishings which have come down through the years. The chandelier centering the ceiling was imported in 1927 from Czechoslovakia, at a cost of \$800. It weighs 500 pounds, has 500 octagonal crystal teardrops, 18 crystal bells with clappers and is lighted by 65 fifty-watt bulbs.

The hand-frescoed ceiling has the original colors, as the artists used water colors in painting freshly plastered surfaces before the plaster dried. Thus the pigments of the water color penetrated the plaster, making a permanent and lasting surface which is preserved by careful cleaning.

The woodwork, mantel-mirror and marble paneling carry out the atmosphere of quiet elegance. A huge desk, used by Governors in the past, adds to the dignity of this outer office. In an adjoining room is an unusually large grandfather's clock, noticeably of special interest to visitors.

The Governor's private office, with a handsome desk, elegant furnishings and fireplace surmounted by a large mantel-mirror bespeaks impressively the dignity of that high office.

MAJOR IMPROVEMENTS IN OFFICE BUILDINGS

In order to get various state departments centralized, a number of major projects have been completed within the past few years, chief of which was the new office building, erected east of the capitol.

There are five departments off the capitol grounds—the Banking Department located in Central Bank Building, and the Iowa Development Commission, at 200 Jewett Building at Ninth and Grand Avenue. The Employment Security Commission is at 114 West 11th Street. The Aeronautics Commission headquarters are at the airport south of the city and the Highway Commission is at Ames.

The six-story and basement office building, 120 by 246 feet, was fully occupied on April 24, 1952, when the Public Instruction department moved from the capitol. The Social Welfare department was the first to move in on September 1, 1951.

The Forty-ninth General Assembly appropriated \$1,650,000, available July 1, 1941, to start the building fund. Total cost was \$4,935,892.45.

The tunnel, connecting the statehouse with the new office building, was completed early in 1953. Its total cost was \$92,841.71.

Office and Laboratory Building

The International Harvester building, on the southwest corner of the statehouse grounds, was bought in 1945. Total cost including remodeling was \$541,972.

Description of "Westward"

The great painting entitled "Westward" is an idealized representation of the coming of the people who made Iowa. Edwin H. Blashfield, the artist, wrote of it:

"The main idea of the picture is a symbolical presentation of the Pioneers led by the spirits of Civilization and Enlightenment to the conquest by cultivation of the Great West. Considered pictorially the canvas shows a prairie schooner drawn by oxen across the prairie. The family ride upon the wagon or walk at its side. Behind them and seen through the growth of stalks at the right come crowding the other pioneers and later men. In the air and before the wagon are floating four female figures: one holds the shield with the arms of the State of Iowa upon it; one holds a book symbolizing enlightenment; two others carry a basket and scatter the seeds which are symbolical of the change from wilderness to plowed fields and gardens that shall come over the prairie. Behind the wagon and also floating in the air, two female figures hold respectively a model of a stationary steam engine and of an electric dynamo to suggest the forces which come with the later men.

In the right hand corner of the picture melons, pumpkins, etc., among which stand a farmer and a girl, suggest that here is the fringe of cultivation and the beginning of the prairie. At the left a buffalo skull rather emphasizes this suggestion."

Many competent critics have pronounced the picture one of the great American murals. The artist was paid \$10,000 for his work. The state received it in 1904.

At the top of the staircase on the south wall is a painting of a basket of corn by Floyd V. Brackney. He was paid \$1,000. This picture was the center of the Iowa exhibit at the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco, 1915. He was a native of Marshall county.

Famous Thoughts

Above the grand stairway, facing the large "Westward," are quotations. On the south side is one by Patrick Henry—"No free government or the blessings of Liberty can be preserved to any people but by a firm adherence to Justice, Moderation, Temperance, Frugality and Virtue and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles."

On the north side is one by G. W. Curtis—"Courageous confidence in the intelligence of the community is the sure sign of leadership and success."

Underneath it is one by Solon—"The ideal state—that in which an injury done to the least of its citizens is an injury done to all."

Around the rotunda on the frieze above the columns is the famous Abraham Lincoln quotation—"That government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

History of Iowa



Long before the coming of the white man the ancestors of the Indian roamed the land that is now Iowa. Frequently referred to as Mound Builders, these shadowy inhabitants are best commemorated in the Effigy Mound National Park above McGregor. Dr. Charles R. Keyes, who served for thirty years as State Archaeologist, identified at least six different prehistoric cultures—the Algonkian, Hopewell, Oneota, Mill Creek, Effigy Mound, and Glenwood. The Algonkian culture was found over nine-tenths of Iowa, while the other five were more localized—the Hopewell, Oneota, and Mound Builders being largely in Eastern Iowa, the Glenwood in southwest Iowa and the Mill Creek in northwest Iowa. Evidence of their presence in Iowa is recorded in village sites, cave and rock shelters, shell heaps, mounds, cemeteries, trails, spirit places, rock carvings and paintings, stone dams or fish traps, flint and hematite quarries, boulder effigies, caches, workshops, and enclosures.

The Indian who roamed Iowa in historic times knew little or nothing about these ancient people. Almost a score of tribes belonging to three different linguistic stocks have been associated with the Iowa country since the advent of the white man. The Ioways, Winnebago, Osage, Oto, Missouri, Omaha, Ponca, Sisseton, and Wahpeton were tribes belonging to the Dakota or Siouan Linguistic Stock or Family. They are commonly referred to as Plains Indians. Their bitter enemies were the Woodland or canoe people—members of the Sauk, Fox, Mascoutin, Illinois, Chippewa (Ojibway), Miami, Ottawa, and Potawatomi tribes. These were members of the Algonquian Linguistic Stock or Family. The Iroquoian stock is only remotely associated with Iowa, being mainly responsible for driving other tribes from the Michigan, Ohio, and Indiana area west of the Mississippi into Iowa.

The French in Iowa

The written history of Iowa begins on June 17, 1673, when Joliet and Marquette and their five rugged voyageurs paddled out of the Wisconsin River and into the Mississippi opposite present-day McGregor. Eight days later, on June 25, Joliet and Marquette met the Illinois Indians near the mouth of the Iowa River. It was the first meeting between the white man and the Indians on Iowa Soil.

The French lost no time in exploring the vast wilderness drained by the Mississippi and its tributaries. In 1680 LaSalle sent an expedition under Michel Aco to discover the headwaters of the Mississippi. Aco and his two companions, Father Hennepin and Antoine Auguel, were captured by the Sioux Indians above the mouth of the Wisconsin River but were later released and fled down the Mississippi. Another Frenchman, Nicholas

Perrot, taught the Miami Indians how to mine lead in the Galena-Dubuque area and hunted buffalo with them in Iowa. Perrot was

the first white man to meet and describe the Ioway Indians. Lahontan and LeSueur left records of their exploits, and William DesLisle drew an amazingly accurate map of Louisiana in 1718 showing the first river-to-river road across Iowa from the mouth of the Wisconsin to the Big Sioux River. DesLisle located Ioway Indian villages on Lake Okoboji and the Big Sioux. The expedition of Joseph Des Noyelles with eighty French soldiers and their Indian allies against the Sauk and Fox Indians ended in a pitched battle at the Raccoon Fork of the Des Moines on April 19, 1735.

Spain in Iowa . . .


The Spanish Period covers a scant four decades from 1762 to 1800. Jonathan Carver and Peter Pond, two Connecticut Yankees who visited northeast Iowa in 1766 and 1773 respectively, were the first to appear during the Spanish regime. Jean Marie Cardinal mined lead in the Dubuque area during the Revolutionary War and actually lost his life in the defense of St. Louis. Thereafter, Spain assumed control and made three land grants in Iowa—to Julien Dubuque in 1796, to Louis Honore Tesson in 1799, and to Basil Giard in 1800. Dubuque was the only permanent settler in the Spanish Period, living at the mouth of Catfish Creek from 1788 until his death in 1810.

Louisiana Purchase

In 1800 Spain retroceded the land west of the Mississippi to France. Napoleon in turn sold it to Jefferson in 1803. One hundred and thirty years had passed under French and Spanish rule since the discovery of Iowa by Joliet and Marquette, but a scant score of names are remembered in history. On March 26, 1804, Congress provided for the government of the newly acquired territory by dividing it into two separate jurisdictions—the Territory of Orleans and the District of Louisiana. The Iowa country formed a part of the District of Louisiana, which was placed under the jurisdiction of the Governor and Judges of the Territory of Indiana. In 1805 Iowa became a part of the Territory of Louisiana, in 1812 it was a part of Missouri Territory, and in 1821, when Missouri was admitted into the Union, Iowa was left unorganized territory without government of any kind.

Exploration of the Iowa country promptly followed the Louisiana Purchase. Lewis and Clark ascended the Missouri in 1804, requiring thirty-three days to pass along the western border of Iowa. Sergeant Charles Floyd, the only man to die on this expedition, was buried on the present site of Sioux City. In 1805 Pike ascended the Upper Mississippi, recommending the present site of Burlington and the bluff below McGregor as suitable locations for military posts. Other notable Americans explored Iowaland: Stephen H. Long, Henry R. Schoolcraft, and Stephen Watts Kearny were outstanding military men. Manuel Lisa was a Missouri River fur trader, while George Catlin spent eight years painting pictures of Indians on the Upper Mississippi and Missouri frontier. Caleb Atwater, G. C. Beltrami, Nicollet, Father DeSmet, Marryat, Murray, and Fredrika Bremer left eye-witness accounts of Iowaland more than a century ago. As a result of Kearny's Dragoon expedition of 1835, Lieutenant Albert Miller Lea wrote his *Notes on the Wisconsin Territory: Particularly with Reference to the Iowa District or Black Hawk Purchase*. Published in Philadelphia in 1836, this was the first book dealing specifically with Iowa. In the years that followed, John Plumbé, Jr., Isaac Galland, John B. Newhall and a dozen others published books that focussed the attention of millions on Iowa.

Forts in Iowa . . .

The presence of the Indian and the fur trader led to the establishment of forts in the Iowa country. Fort Madison, the first American fort in Iowa, was erected in 1808 and evacuated and burned in 1813. Fort Edwards, located opposite the mouth of the Des Moines River, was erected in 1815. Fort Armstrong was erected on Rock Island in 1816, and Fort Crawford at Prairie du Chien the same year. Fort Des Moines No. 1 was built on the present site of Montrose by Colonel Kearny in 1834. Fort Atkinson, Fort Dodge, Fort Des Moines No. 2, Fort Sanford, and Fort Crogan are other military establishments associated with early Iowa history.

The *Western Engineer* made the first steamboat voyage up the Missouri as far as present-day Council Bluffs in 1819, while the *Virginia* ascended the Mississippi to Fort Snelling in 1823.

Ten years later, on June 1, 1833, permanent settlement began in Iowa. Iowa was attached to Michigan Territory for purposes of government in 1834, and formed a part of the newly-created Wisconsin Territory in 1836. The first Federal census showed 10,531 inhabitants in the Black Hawk Purchase that year.

Iowa As A Territory


On July 4, 1838, the Territory of Iowa was born, with Robert Lucas serving as first governor. The territory was named by Albert M. Lea in 1836 from the Iowa River, which derived its title from the Ioway Indians. Twenty-two counties containing 23,242 inhabitants had been established west of the Mississippi in the Black Hawk Purchase and other Indian cessions in 1838. Between 1833 and 1838, churches were founded, schools, academies, and seminaries established, newspapers published, and a bank opened. The first public surveys were begun in 1837, and two land offices established the following year at Burlington and Dubuque.

Statehood!

Scarcely had the Territory of Iowa been established when a clamor arose for statehood. In 1844 a constitution was adopted featuring low salaries, limited indebtedness and restrictions on banks and corporations. Congress refused to accept the boundaries requested by the people in 1844, and they in turn rejected those proposed by Congress. A new Constitution with the present-day boundaries (embracing 56,147 square miles) was adopted in 1846. Iowa was admitted into the Union as the first free state in the Louisiana Purchase on December 28, 1846.

Politics . . .

Democrats dominated state politics between 1846 and 1854. Ansel Briggs was elected first governor, and A. C. Dodge and George W. Jones were named United States senators. A steady flow of northern immigrants during the 1850's, coupled with the successful campaign of dynamic James W. Grimes in 1854, swept the Whigs into office. Two years later Grimes founded the Republican Party in Iowa. Subsequently Dodge and Jones were defeated, the Constitution of 1857 adopted, and the capital moved from Iowa City to Des Moines. Ralph P. Lowe became the first Republican governor in 1858. Only four Democrats—Horace Boies (1890-94), Clyde Herring (1933-1937), and Nelson Kruschel (1937-1939), and Herschel Loveless (1957-)—have served as

governors in the intervening one hundred years that were marked largely by Republican chief executives.

The names of many Iowans are written boldly in the annals of the Republican party. James W. Grimes, James Harlan, Samuel J. Kirkwood, William Boyd Allison, Jonathan P. Dolliver, and Albert B. Cummins achieved high distinction in their day. Allison served thirty-six years in the United States Senate. Among the Representatives the names of C. C. Dowell, Gilbert N. Haugen, J. A. T. Hull, William P. Hepburn, and David B. Henderson loom large. In addition to these legislators, Iowans have achieved high rank in the councils of the nation: fifteen have served in Presidents' Cabinets, Henry A. Wallace was elected Vice President, and Herbert Hoover gained the presidency.

Although Republicans dominated state politics, there have been occasional revolts. These revolts have come mainly from the tillers of the soil. Iowa is an agricultural state. Farmers drew up the constitution of 1846, formed the first agricultural societies in 1852, held the first state fair in 1854, founded an agricultural college in 1858, and established in 1877 a society that grew into the Iowa state dairy association. When hard times came, however, thousands of Iowa farmers deserted the Republican party to support third-party movements. James B. Weaver was twice nominated for the presidency and the Granger and Populist movements won strong support.


Iowa and War

The settlement of Iowa grew out of the Black Hawk War. Iowa men fought gallantly in the Mexican War. Such place names as Buena Vista, Butler, Cerro Gordo, Guthrie, Hardin, Mills, Palo Alto, Ringgold, and Taylor commemorate famous men and battles.

Iowa furnished almost eighty thousand men in the Civil War. Her troops were especially prominent in such battles as Wilson's Creek, Pea Ridge, Shiloh, Iuka, Corinth, the siege of Vicksburg, the capture of Fort Donelson, and Sherman's march to the sea. Over 12,000 Iowa men were killed, 9,000 wounded, and another 10,000 discharged because of ill-health.

Iowa men served with equal distinction in the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, and the Korean conflict. Veterans from these wars have played an important role in state and local politics. At its peak, the G.A.R. counted 20,324 members, whereas the American Legion numbered over 44,000 members before World War II.

Steamboats plied the Upper Mississippi and the Missouri before the opening of white settlement in 1833. In 1848 the telegraph reached Iowa; in 1854 the first railroad reached the Mississippi opposite Davenport; in 1856 the first bridge spanned the Father of Waters between Rock Island and Davenport. The North Western was the first railroad to reach Council Bluffs, the first bridge to span the Missouri was built at that point. Railroad mileage reached its peak in 1914 with over 10,000 miles of track in Iowa.

Telephone construction in Iowa began about 1878. Today almost every farm in Iowa can boast a telephone. The introduction of the automobile around the opening of the 20th century was followed by actual horseless carriage construction in Iowa.

Religion and Education

The first church in Iowa was erected by the Methodists at Dubuque in 1834. By 1838 the Baptists, Congregationalists, Quakers, Presbyterians, and Roman Catholics had established churches. Inspired Christian leaders are associated with the Iowa story, many notable names being associated with the numerous academies, seminaries, and colleges that dotted the state during the 19th century. Iowa Wesleyan College, established in 1842, is the oldest collegiate institution in Iowa, and Grinnell College is the second oldest college. A score of other denominational schools, supported by church-going citizens who have often expressed their faith in the temperance movement and moral crusades, attest Iowa's claim to the title of "Corn and Bible Commonwealth." In addition to denominational colleges, the State University of Iowa at Iowa City, Iowa State University at Ames, Iowa State Teachers College at Cedar Falls, and seventeen junior colleges afford Iowa children an opportunity to receive collegiate training.


Iowa's richest asset over the years has been its crop of fine children. These have grown and achieved fame as artists and actors, baseball players and billiard players, musicians and novelists, architects and industrialists, preachers and poets, statesmen, scientists and scholars. Whether serving in their home town, their state, in the nation, or in some far-flung corner of the world, these sons and daughters of Iowa demonstrate by their actions and accomplishments the truth of Sidney Foster's toast to his native state in 1886: "In all that is good, Iowa affords the best."






Iowa Congressional Districts


The office of Statistician of the Judicial Department was created by the Legislature in the enactment of House File 349 during the 56th General Assembly. The express purpose of the Act was to provide for the gathering of information for the benefit of the future general assemblies and to assist in the current administration of business conducted by the various courts in the Judicial System of the State. These purposes are more specifically set forth by the Legislature in Section 4 of the Act, which is as follows:

"Sec. 4. Under the direction of the supreme court the statistician shall:

1. Collect and compile statistical and other data and make reports relating to the business transacted by the courts;
2. Collect statistical and other data and make reports relating to the expenditure of moneys for the maintenance and operation of the judicial system and the offices connected therewith;
3. Obtain reports from clerks of court, judges, justices of the peace, mayors, and magistrates, in accordance with law, or rules prescribed by the supreme court as to cases and other judicial business in which action has been delayed beyond periods of time specified by law or such rules, and make report thereof;
4. Examine the state of the dockets of the courts and determine the need for assistance by any courts.
5. Make reports concerning the overloading and underloading of particular courts;
6. Make recommendations relating to the assignment of judges where courts are in need of assistance;
7. Examine the administrative methods employed in the offices of clerks of courts, probation officers, and sheriffs, and make recommendations regarding the improvement of same;
8. Formulate recommendations for the improvement of the judicial system with reference to the structure of the system of courts, their organization, their methods of operation, the functions which should be performed by various courts, the selection, compensation, number, and tenure of judges and court officials, and as to such other matters as the chief justice and the supreme court may direct; and
9. Attend to such other matters as may be assigned by the chief justice and the supreme court."

Memorial Service

Memorial services were held in the House Chamber April 15, 1959, commemorating the life, character and public services of former members of the General Assembly who had died since the previous session. Rep. William E. Darrington presided at the memorial session.

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The Fifty-eighth General Assembly 1959

The Fifty-eighth General Assembly was in session longer than any other Legislature in Iowa's history. The session ran 116 days, and broke, perhaps forever, the 100-days traditional length.

A total of 1,358 bills and joint resolutions were filed in the two houses—792 in the House, 566 in the Senate.

The legislators voted an all-time high budget of more than \$171 million a year—a total of \$28 million more than the previous budget. It was also more than a million dollars higher than the \$169,800,000 recommended by Governor Herschel Loveless.

Some \$24 million of that budget was for catching up on new buildings and improvements, and the legislators wiped out the state's \$20 million reserve fund to provide for most of the cash.

Although this session of the Legislature spent more than any in history, taxes were raised little.

The only tax increases voted were one-cent-per-package tax on cigarettes and a corporation tax hike from two to three per cent.

Legislative leaders in both parties started out firmly pledged to do something about reapportionment. Rural and city Representatives and Senators agreed reapportionment was necessary.

But as time went on, it became apparent that the word "reapportionment" meant different things to different people.

Lawmakers from the small population counties battled to retain as much of their present power as possible, while the larger counties insisted on larger representation for the densely populated areas.

Large city newspapers and the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation were blamed in floor debates for the stalemate, as several plans were voted down and conference committees became bogged down over compromises. Whoever was to blame, the gulf couldn't be bridged—as it had not been for more than 50 years previously.

The question of a Constitutional Convention will be on the ballots of the General Election of 1960—as it must be each 10 years by state law.

Undoubtedly, if a convention is held, reapportionment would be among other Constitutional revisions discussed. The conventions must be set up by the Legislature, and although one was approved by the voters in 1920, the Legislature failed to set one up.

Other issues which the Legislature did not approve included proposals for liquor-by-the-drink; licensing and regulating "key clubs"; providing a plan for long range financing of future classroom building needs at state educational institutions.

The lawmakers voted to make the State Commerce Commission appointive instead of elective, and started action toward a constitutional amendment to establish non-partisan selection and more secure tenure of Supreme and District Court Judges.

The Legislature did not enact a bill to give the governor broad powers to reorganize the executive branch of the government, or to consolidate state inspections under a single agency, as Governor Loveless had requested.

Neither did it honor the governor's requests to transfer the state gasoline tax division from the treasurer's office to the State Tax Commission, or lump the industrial commissioner, Bureau of Labor and Mine Inspectors under one department.

A bill to set up a state civil service system passed the House but died in the Senate. And of a series of election reform bills proposed by the Legislative Investigating Committee and passed by the House, the only one accepted by the Senate was one dealing with voting machine procedures.

Speaker of the House Vern Lisle, Clarinda Republican, said one of the Legislature's greatest accomplishments was giving the public more information about its doings.

"We dragged those tough, controversial issues, such as liquor-by-the-drink and the right-to-work law, out on the floor and talked about them in the open," he said. "I think the public appreciated it."

Major accomplishments of the session included passage of a complex bill revising and recodifying Iowa corporation laws. It is hailed as an important step toward inducing more industry to locate and incorporate in Iowa.

In the field of traffic safety the lawmakers made more progress. They set speed limits of 75 miles an hour in the daytime and 65 at night on the interstate highway system; 70 miles an hour daytime on primary highways and 60 miles an hour daytime and 50 at night on secondary roads.

The Legislature also added 25 members to the Iowa Highway Patrol; created a fund to encourage installing railroad grade crossing protective devices and authorized installation of "Yield Right-of-Way" signs instead of stop signs.

Gerald Bogan, executive secretary of the Iowa Good Roads Association, said the session had enacted "more good highway legislation than any session in years."

Among other things, the new legislation requires the Highway Commission to adopt a 10-year long-range primary highway construction program and bring it up to date each 10 years.

The Legislature also set up a fiscal, administrative and engineering study of all Iowa highway and street problems, and allocated more road use tax money to cities and towns for street purposes, pending completion of the study.

Bills embodying a new "family plan" concept and liberalized benefits for unemployment compensation also were enacted. In the social welfare field, \$125,000 was provided for a modest start on a program of aid to the permanently and totally disabled, heretofore unavailable in Iowa but in operation in 45 other states.

This legislative service was established by the General Assembly in 1955 and has been in operation since December of that year.

The Research Bureau does legislative research and reference work and drafts bills for legislators. The general policy for the operation of the Bureau is set by the six-member Legislative Research Committee.

Through a small, professionally trained staff the Research Bureau furnishes services to legislators and conducts research studies at the request of the legislature as a whole, legislative committees, or five-member groups of legislators. The 58th General Assembly provided that joint legislative advisory committees may be appointed to assist the Research Bureau on any interim research study.

Research study reports are sent to all members of the legislature. Neither the Research Committee nor Bureau makes recommendations in these reports.

Stepping Stones Along the Way

Iowa is Indian for "This is the Place," or "The Beautiful Land." Centuries of wilderness and four glacial epochs prepared the soil of Iowa.

Upper Mississippi River and Iowa discovered June 17, 1673, by Marquette and Joliet, 181 years after Columbus found America.

Iowa, favorite Indian hunting land, purchased with Louisiana, 1803.

Black Hawk purchase, 1833, opened eastern Iowa to white settlers.

Second purchase, 1837; central Iowa, 1842; northwest Iowa, 1851.

In four years, 1833-1836, Iowa grew rapidly and became a territory.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the Governor, whose term of office is two years.

No person is eligible who has not been a citizen of the United States and resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the offices of government, civil and military.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the Governor has power to fill such vacancy.

He may convene the General Assembly in extraordinary session.

He is required to communicate by message, to the General Assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the Governor has power to adjourn the General Assembly to such time as he may think proper, but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next General Assembly.

All bills, including appropriations, must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the Legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The Governor has power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of sentence until the case shall be reported to the General Assembly. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, and shall report to the General Assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation or pardon granted, and the reasons therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the Senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgements of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the request of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

The Lieutenant Governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the Governor.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the Governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the Lieutenant Governor, as Acting Governor.

The Lieutenant Governor is president of the Senate, but can vote only when the Senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the Senate.

He receives the same mileage and expense allowance as a member and double the compensation of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building only during the meetings of the General Assembly.

The office of Secretary of State is established by the Constitution of Iowa. Its three principal departments are the land office, the division of corporations and trademarks, and the general or custodial office.

Through his general office the Secretary of State serves as custodian of original and official documents of the state, including the constitution, the original statutes of Iowa, authenticated journals of the General Assembly, Administrative Rules and Regulations, and election records. The bonds of various elective and appointive officials are filed in this department.

The state land office maintains the records of the annexation or severance of land by the state and by incorporated cities and towns. Records of original patents issued by the state are also kept in the state land office.

Under the law of Iowa, charters of corporations for pecuniary profit, corporations not for pecuniary profit and cooperative associations are granted by the Secretary of State. Foreign corporations doing business in Iowa are required to obtain permits from that officer. Protective registration of trademarks, labels and forms of advertising is provided by the state department. These statutes are administered by the division of corporation and trademarks.

The Secretary of State is ex officio chairman of the Iowa Real Estate Commission, is an ex officio member of the State Executive Council, the State Board of Health, the State Printing Board, the State Permit Board and the Employment Agency Commission.

The Auditor of State is a constitutional official and at least once each year makes full settlement between the state and all state officers and departments and all persons receiving or expending state funds, and makes a complete audit of the books, records and accounts of every department of state. These departments include the office of the governor, the executive council, state comptroller, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, supreme court, superintendent of printing, adjutant general, state board of control and all institutions under its control, department of health, board of education and all institutions under its control, department of public instruction, department of agriculture, highway commission, liquor commission, state fair board, state tax commission (including sales, income and chain-store tax divisions), board of railroad commissioners, banking department, conservation commissions, state relief associations, and all other departments, boards and commissions.

The Auditor of State also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, the fiscal affairs of all political subdivisions, including schools and school districts and building and loan associations. He appoints the county examiners, the municipal and school examiners, and the examiners of building and loan associations, examining their reports, conferring and discussing with said examiners the affairs of the counties, cities, etc., as disclosed by the reports, advising, suggesting and recommending such changes in policy as he deems expedient. No building and loan association can transact business in the state without a certificate of authority from the Auditor of State.

All offices of the 99 counties are examined annually, as well as all cities and townships of municipal corporations with a population of 2,000 or more and school districts with a population of 5,000 or more, but in cities, towns and school districts the audits are optional with the governing bodies and are made upon request.

For the purpose of examining, auditing and checking, the various departments of the state may be classified roughly into three groups, viz.: all those departments, boards and commissions located in or adjacent to the state house; the state highway commission and the institutions under control of the board of control and the board of regents; counties, cities, towns and schools.

The Auditor of State submits annual and biennial reports to the governor, as well as individual audit reports. The annual reports are on municipal finances, and the biennial reports on the operations of the auditor's office, and on the state and county, and building and loan affairs, are as narrative and statistical as the auditor deems necessary and the individual audit reports contain schedules, exhibits, comparative figures, etc.

Ex officio, the Auditor of State is a member of the executive council, printing board, geological board, bonus boards and department of health.

The Treasurer of State is a constitutional official. The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department. A record is maintained to show the sources of all income, the funds to which such incomes apply, the dates received, and the amounts received. Disbursements are made only upon warrants issued as certified by the state comptroller. A record is kept of each warrant paid, as well as the date of issuance, date of payments, to whom paid and against which fund such warrant is drawn.

When remittance of state revenue is made by bank draft, check or money order, such items are deposited for collection in a bank or banks in the state which have previously been duly designated and approved as depositories for state funds.

The Treasurer of State also handles funds diverted under the public fund deposit guarantee acts of the Forty-first General Assembly, reimbursing losses of public funds which may be sustained on deposits in banks placed in receivership for liquidation.

The Treasurer of State is ex-officio Treasurer and custodian of the Unemployment Compensation Fund and ex-officio Member of the State Board of Health, also, member of the Board of Trustees and custodian of funds of the Public Safety Peace Officers Retirement System. Member of the State Board of Appeal, World War I Soldiers Bonus Board. The State Treasurer serves as Treasurer of the Iowa Centennial Memorial Foundation.

The Treasurer of State shall maintain in the state treasury a cash balance sufficient to pay the anticipated expenditures by the Highway commission for the ensuing month. When necessary to restore the cash balance in the state treasury, he shall draw against the motor vehicle funds collected by the treasurers of each county of the state in proportion to the amounts in their possession, a sum sufficient in the aggregate to restore said cash balance. Such drafts shall be honored by the treasurer of each county upon presentation.

Acts of the 45th General Assembly Extraordinary Session, provides for the refund of the license fee paid when gasoline is not used on the public highways.

Acts of the 55th General Assembly require the Treasurer of State to collect from distributors a license fee of 6c per gallon on all gasoline used in the State of Iowa except when used in federal and state owned cars.

The 53rd General Assembly created a Road Use Tax Fund by embracing the following: All net proceeds of registration fees of motor vehicles; all net proceeds of motor vehicle fuel tax or license fees; the compensation tax on motor vehicle certified carriers; all revenue derived from use tax on motor vehicles, trailers, equipment and accessories for same; 10 per cent of net sales tax revenues and any other funds by law credited to the Road Use Tax Fund. The fund is distributed monthly as follows: To Primary Road 42 per cent; to Secondary Road Construction Fund 35 per cent; to Farm-to-Market Road Fund 15 per cent and to the Street Construction Fund of Cities and Towns on a population basis 8 per cent.

All accounts are audited daily by the Auditor of State.

The Attorney General is a constitutional official and he is elected for a period of two years.

It is the duty of the Attorney General to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the Governor, executive council or General Assembly, or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all cases in the Supreme Court in which the state is a party or interested.

The Attorney General is given supervisory power over county attorneys.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the General Assembly or any state department.

It is also the duty of the Attorney General to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the Governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

The Attorney General is ex officio Chairman of the State Board of Law Examiners and an ex officio member of the State Printing Board.

The Iowa Department of Agriculture was created by the Fortieth General Assembly in 1923 for the express purpose of promoting and advancing the interests of agriculture.

At the present time the Department of Agriculture is responsible for the administration of fifty-two laws and employs a field force of fifty-six inspectors and nine district veterinarians.

The Iowa Department of Agriculture is a most important branch of our state government. Its functions and services vitally affect the health and welfare of every person in the state. Producers and consumers are protected by the enforcement of sanitary laws relating to the production, manufacture, processing and sale of food products. Business interests and consumers alike are protected through the elimination of unfair competition by the impartial enforcement of laws relating to the adulteration and mislabeling of foods, paints, petroleum products, insecticides, feeds, fertilizers and seeds. Agriculture is benefited by livestock disease control, the promotion of farm shows and exhibits, control of noxious weeds and insect pests, and the enforcement of labeling and standardization laws relating to agricultural feeds, seeds and fertilizers. In addition, the department, in cooperation with the federal government is responsible for service reports concerning weather, market news, crop statistics and crop estimates and yields.

The various divisions of the department and the work of each are set forth in the following outline:

The Fifty-eighth General Assembly provided that "the terms of the presently elected Commerce Commissioners * * * are hereby extended through June 30, 1963. Within sixty (60) days after the convening of the regular session of the General Assembly in 1963, the Governor shall appoint, with the approval of two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) of the Senate in executive session, successors for the Commerce Commission. One shall be appointed for a term beginning July 1, 1963, and ending June 30, 1965, one for a term beginning July 1, 1963, and ending June 30, 1967, and one for a term beginning July 1, 1963, and ending June 30, 1969." It further provided that "the Iowa State Commerce Commission shall be composed of three (3) members, not more than two (2) of whom shall be from the same political party, and each commissioner appointed in or after 1965 shall serve for six (6) years from July 1 of the year of his appointment."

In 1878, the Seventeenth General Assembly created a board of railroad commissioners consisting of three members to be appointed by the governor and confirmed by the executive council. In 1888, the Twenty-second General Assembly passed a law making the commissioners elective. In 1937, the Forty-seventh General Assembly, by House File 133, changed the name from "board of railroad commissioners" to "Iowa State Commerce Commission."

The powers and duties of the Iowa State Commerce Commission are: to generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical condition, conduct and management of such railroads and report their conditions to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to pass on necessity for spur tracks to be constructed and maintained not exceeding three miles in length to an existing industry under terms and conditions approved by the commission as set out by law; to make reasonable rules for the crossing of steam and interurban railways and to require, when necessary, interlocking switches at railroad crossings;

to make report on first Monday in December in each year to the governor of its doings for the preceding year accompanied with appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employees of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disapproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission being prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable maximum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates, unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before a railroad company may appropriate coal, coke or oil received for shipment, it must first secure the written consent of the commerce commission.

Before any railroad company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the commission must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used consent of the commission must be obtained.

The Thirty-fifth General Assembly, 1913, gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes, over, along and across any public lands, highways or streams or the land of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time prescribe."

The commission is directed by an act of the Thirty-ninth General Assembly, 1921, to "undertake and carry forward such investigation and preparation as shall be necessary to properly represent the interests of the state in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission."

An act of the Forty-sixth General Assembly, 1935, amended by the Forty-eighth General Assembly, 1939, provides the operators of grain elevators must be licensed in order to receive grain for storage. It also makes provisions for using warehouse receipts issued by the warehouseman on his own products and on the products for others as collateral for financing loans. The act also provides for storage of other agricultural products, and products principally consumed on farms, in warehouses of types different from that of grain elevators which cover such products as wool, canned goods, sugar, seed, commercial feed, etc.

The Fortieth General Assembly, 1923, conferred on the commission the power to issue certificates authorizing motor carriers to operate over the public highways of the state, upon a showing that the proposed service would promote "the public convenience" and authorized the board to prescribe rules and regulations for the operation of motor vehicles used by such carriers "for the protection and safety of the public." The Forty-first General Assembly, 1925, revised the laws on the subject, but left their administration with the railroad commission.

The Forty-third General Assembly, 1929, provided for the supervision or regulation by the commission of persons operating motor trucks principally used for public transportation of freight for compensation, not operating over regular routes nor between fixed termini.

The Forty-fourth General Assembly, 1931, provided that pipe lines shall be subject to regulation by the board under a permit issued by the board.

The Fifty-third General Assembly, 1949, provided for the supervision or regulation by the Commission of persons operating motor trucks used for transportation of freight for compensation under contract.

The Fifty-seventh General Assembly, 1957, provided that persons engaged in transportation for compensation of liquid products in bulk upon any highway in this state should be required to obtain from the Commission a certificate declaring that public convenience and necessity require such operation.

Commerce Counsel

The Thirty-fourth General Assembly, 1911, created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the Iowa state commerce commission for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by the Senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the commissioners.

The duties of the office briefly are as follows: legal advisor of the Iowa state commerce commission; investigate and present matters with reference to intrastate rates, and prosecute same before the Iowa state commerce commission or before any court to which same may be taken; investigate on his own motion, or at request of the state commerce commission, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested or affected, and present same to the interstate commerce commission and prosecute to final determination; act as attorney and counsel for and represent the Iowa state commerce commission in all courts of this state or the United States, in which the validity of any order of the state commerce commission is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary for proper enforcement of any rule or order of the said Iowa state commerce commission or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be questioned or involved.

COMMISSION OF AERONAUTICS

Appointed by the Governor with approval of the Senate

Term six years

The Fifty-first General Assembly created a new aeronautics commission and prescribed its duties and powers; also prescribed registration of persons engaged in aeronautics and operation of aircraft and aeronautics facilities; prescribed penalties and repealed old sections of the laws which authorized a commission of limited power. Commission membership carries no salary. Expenses and \$9 per diem, when engaged in duty for the commission, are authorized with a maximum of \$450 a year per member. The commission numbers five and the following have been appointed by the governor:

The Aeronautics Commission's primary purpose is to promote and foster development of aviation within the state of Iowa and to register all Iowa owned airplanes annually, as well as all Iowa airmen. During 1957 Iowa ranked 13th in the nation in the number of privately owned airplanes—1,621. There are approximately 18,152 pilots in the state of Iowa and 7,138 of them are active. While ranking 22nd in population nationally, Iowa ranks 6th in the number of aircraft per capita.

The commission provides the following services to Iowa aviation: airport consultation, contractual agreements with cities and towns for the construction and development of airports, engineering services to cities and towns, Air Age Education, liaison with all flying groups and organizations, accident investigation, information service for all airmen and the enforcement of all the Iowa Aviation Laws.

As a result of the airport development program of the Aeronautics Commission there has been an increase in the number of municipally owned airports from 46 in 1948 to 74 in 1958. The 74 airports in Iowa are lighted all night, which is third in the nation.

Board members receive no compensation. No person shall be eligible for more than two consecutive terms of office. Under the provisions of the law, the board meets at least four times during the year; at least two of such meetings shall be held in the state house. The examination fee for those taking an examination to qualify as certified public accountants is \$25. Persons granted a certificate to practice must furnish bond to the auditor of state in the sum of \$5,000. However, in lieu of the \$5,000 bond, such person may file a certification from an insurance carrier that such person is insured, as an individual or a member of a partnership, under an accountancy liability policy in an equal or greater amount. The board publishes an annual register of all persons authorized to practice accountancy in this state.

Transferred and federally recognized major general air force on January 24, 1955. Member of the Adju-

The adjutant general issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military forces and the duties thereof. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the General Assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of his office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the national guard and state guard are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers for the Civil, Spanish-American and World War I are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia and national and state guard are given by him under the seal of his office. He is disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the national guard and as adjutant general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the national guard and state guard, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the national guard and state guard of the state as the war department may from time to time require.

The Forty-second General Assembly passed a law forming a board of architectural examiners specifying that all persons who wish to practice architecture in Iowa under the title "architect" must secure a certificate from the board. 

The superintendent of banking is charged by law with supervision, direction and control of all banks and trust companies operating under state charter, as well as loan companies operating under Iowa Small Loan act and Iowa credit unions. He is chairman of the Banking Board of five members which acts in an advisory capacity to the banking department. Deputies and bank examiners are appointed by the superintendent, subject to the approval of the banking board, which fixes remuneration of such appointees within limits prescribed by law and passes upon all applications for new bank charters.

The basic science law enacted by the 46th General Assembly establishes a state board of examiners in the fundamental sciences underlying the practice of the healing arts, providing for its organization and powers, and that certification by such board following examination in the six basic sciences of anatomy, physiology, chemistry, pathology, bacteriology and hygiene is prerequisite to eligibility for examination for a license to practice medicine and surgery, osteopathy, osteopathy and surgery, and chiropractic. It establishes uniform educational standards in the fundamental sciences for all applicants for license to diagnose and treat human ailments. The act does not apply to dentists, dental hygienists, nurses, pharmacists, optometrists, embalmers, podiatrists, barbers or cosmetologists practicing within the limits of their respective professions, or Christian Scientists.

The personnel of the board consists of six members learned in the basic sciences, having no degrees in the healing arts. The members of the board receive as compensation \$10 per diem for the time actually employed and necessary expense incurred in the discharge of their duties which is paid out of funds in the state treasury received as fees from applicants for examination.

The board meets in Des Moines and there conducts the examinations in the basic sciences four times each year, respectively on the second Tuesday in January, April, July and October. The examination fee is \$10.

The Commission for the Blind, created in 1926, offers the following rehabilitative services to the blind in Iowa: Help is offered with problems of acceptance and adjustment to blindness, through home teachers, themselves blind, who call on blind persons in the state and offer, in addition to counseling, training in braille, typing, handcrafts, home-making, cooking and other activities which have been made difficult by reason of blindness. The objective is to help the person to see how he can pursue normal activities despite the visual handicap.

Help is offered to blind persons in regard to employment problems; and guidance, including testing, counselling and information, if offered to help individuals to formulate a realistic vocational goal by giving them information about the jobs being held by other blind people, thus assisting them to come to the realization that blindness need not mean helplessness and is, in fact, no more than a physical nuisance if training and opportunity are made available. It is important to the blind person (especially the newly blinded) to learn that blind persons are actually working as full-time, regular electricians, turret lathe operators, machinists, farmers, lawyers, and even doctors and scientists. Where indicated help is offered with the cost of vocational training, after which the blind person is helped, where needed, to find suitable employment.

Small refreshment canteens are established by the Commission in hospitals, post offices and other public and private buildings throughout the state. These are operated by blind persons and this has proved to be a stable source of employment.

Home work units are established in the homes of blind persons and products produced, including rugs, mats, ironing board covers, etc., are marketed throughout the state.


Phonographs, called Talking Book Machines, which "read" a wide variety of recorded literature, are distributed by the Commission to both blind children and adults in the state.

A register of the blind in Iowa, showing cause of blindness, age and other statistical information valuable in program evaluation and planning is maintained by the Commission.

The superintendent of buildings and grounds shall, on or before September 30, preceding each regular session of the General Assembly, make a verified report to the executive council which shall cover all transactions for the preceding biennial period.

It is the duty of the superintendent, except as otherwise provided by law, to have charge of, preserve and adequately protect the state capitol and grounds, and all other state grounds and buildings at the seat of government and all property connected therewith or used therein or thereon; to see that all parts and apartments of said building are properly ventilated and kept clean and in order; to see that all visitors at proper hours are properly escorted over said grounds and through said buildings, free of expense; to have at all times charge of and supervision over the police, janitors, and other employees of his department in and about the capitol and other state buildings at the seat of government; to institute in the name of the state, and with advice and consent of the attorney general, civil and criminal proceedings against any person for injury or threatened injury to any public property under his control; and to keep plans and surveys of the public grounds, buildings and underground constructions at the seat of government; to perform all duties required by law or order of the executive council.

Governor's Home Maintenance

The superintendent of buildings and grounds of the state of Iowa, under the direction of the governor, is hereby authorized to provide, furnish and pay for public utilities, service, heat, maintenance, minor repairs, and equipment in operating and maintaining the official residence of the governor of Iowa, located at 2900 Grand Avenue, Des Moines, Polk County, Iowa.




SARSFIELD, Glenn D. Republican

The state comptroller audits all demands by the state and preaudits all accounts submitted for the issuance of state warrants; controls the payment of all moneys into the state treasury and all payments from the state treasury; prescribes all accounting and business forms and the system of accounts and reports of financial transactions by all departments and agencies of the state government other than those of the legislative branch; keeps a central budget and proprietary control accounts of the state government; establishes a reasonable cash revolving fund for each department or institution for disbursement purposes where needed; has the custody of all books, papers, records, documents, conveyances, leases and other documents appertaining to the fiscal affairs and property of the state which are not required to be kept in some other office; apportions the interest of the permanent school fund; prepares biennially a list of all standing appropriations and furnishes a report of same to each member of the Legislature; prepares the budget document and drafts the legislation to make it effective; reviews such requests for allotments as are submitted to the governor for approval; determines the need for all transfers of appropriations submitted to the governor; makes such investigations of the organizations, activities and methods of procedure of the several departments and establishments as he may be called upon to make by the governor and executive council or the Legislature; furnishes any committee of either house of the Legislature having jurisdiction over revenues or appropriations such aid and information regarding financial affairs of the government as it may request; prepares and submits to the governor and the Legislature, on or before December 1 of each year, an annual report setting forth in detail, and in summary form the financial condition and operations of the government; and prepares such other reports as the governor or the General Assembly may from time to time require of him.

SUPERIOR COURTS

The Iowa statutes provide that any city of 4,000 population, or over, may establish a superior court. There is at present one such court located in Keokuk. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which court is located.

The judges appoint a shorthand reporter, whose compensation is fixed by order of the court for the time actually employed.

MUNICIPAL COURTS

Any city, now or hereafter having a population of 5,000 or more, as shown by the last preceding United States census, may establish a municipal court. All civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located shall constitute the municipal court district and its jurisdiction is co-extensive with the territorial limits of the county in which the court is located.

The salary of municipal court judges is \$5,875 in cities with population less than 30,000; \$6,500 with population from 30,000 to 75,000; \$6,750 with population 75,000 or over. Compensation of court reporter is fixed by the judge at not to exceed \$12.50 per day in cities under 70,000 and \$15 per day in cities over 70,000 population. Salary of clerk is \$3,800, \$4,300, and \$5,500 and for bailiffs is \$3,600, \$3,850 and \$4,100 according to population of the cities as above indicated.


The conservation commission makes recommendations for the acquirement of state parks and preserves, forests and other state conservation areas, and is charged with the duty of administering same. The commission is charged with the duty of protecting, propagating, increasing and preserving the fish, game and fur-bearing animals, and protecting the birds of the state and the enforcement of laws relating thereto. The administration and enforcement of laws relating to boats and navigation in the state-owned inland waters of the state is a duty of the commission. The Commission has jurisdiction over the state-owned meandered lakes and streams of the state and the construction of dams and other improvements relating to such waters.

Commission Jurisdiction

The State Conservation Commission has jurisdiction over the following lands and water areas of the state: Eleven meandered streams, 800 miles; 123 wildlife refuges, 34,786.19 acres; 24 artificial lakes, 3,210 acres; 72 natural lakes, 43,235 acres; 161 public hunting grounds, 90,498 acres.

BOARD OF CONTROL OF STATE INSTITUTIONS

The board of control of state institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the Twenty-seventh General Assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the institutions under its management.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control.

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial conditions of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the board or its agent is required to visit each hospital for insane once each month. The board is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to require official bonds of certain institution officers, to make a semi-annual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to perform other duties provided by law. Following is a list of the 14 state institutions under the supervision of the board of control and the executive officer of each.

Affiliated with Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity, Masonic Lodge, Presbyterian church, and Rotary International.

Iowa Cares for Children and Veterans

The state board of control has jurisdiction over 14 state institutions, of which six are for the mentally unfit and three are for criminal offenders. The remaining five are divided as follows: two training schools, designated as correctional institutions: one for boys, at Eldora; one for girls, at Mitchellville; two orphanages, at Toledo and Davenport; and the soldiers home at Marshalltown.

Training School for Girls, Mitchellville

The training school for girls was established in 1868, to be located on property in Lucas county, leased from a Society of Friends, or Quakers. The first admission was April, 1873. In 1880 the present training school, at Mitchellville, was located, taking over the Lucas county plant.

Girls between the ages of 10 and 18 are admitted, on commitment from district, juvenile and municipal courts or on transfer from other institutions by the board of control.

Under competent instruction and supervision, girls are taken through the twelfth grade of regular public school work, and are taught all necessary branches of home economics.

The present superintendent is Mrs. Marie L. Carter.

Juvenile Home, Toledo

The state maintains a juvenile home, or orphanage, at Toledo. Dependent, destitute, homeless and neglected children are admitted and given care until they are 21 years of age, most of them being placed in good private homes, under the supervision of women state agents.

The buildings are substantial and kept in a home manner as far as possible. Generally the children are happy and contented and make good progress in their school work.

The present superintendent is Lyle E. Kelley.

Iowa Annie Wittenmyer Home, Davenport

The second state orphanage is known as the Iowa Annie Wittenmyer Home and is located at Davenport.

The first child was admitted July 4, 1864. Dependent, neglected and abandoned children are admitted upon court order or personal application of parent or guardian, approved by court or board of supervisors.

The children are given scholastic and industrial advantages, with moving pictures, all manner of games and sports, picnics and the like.

The present superintendent is Leon R. Lyle.

Iowa Soldiers Home, Marshalltown

The board of control also manages the Iowa Soldiers Home at Marshalltown, founded in 1887.

Life is lived pleasantly by the soldiers, with plenty of amusements, moving pictures, billiards and pool, cards, horseshoe pitching and all manner of games and light sports. The nearby river permits fishing and boating and families are kept together by the presence of the veterans' wives. The men and women take frequent furloughs, to visit relatives and friends. Upon their return they seem more than ever satisfied.

The present commandant is Ward M. Loftus.

Training School for Boys, Eldora

The training school for boys at Eldora was opened March 31, 1868. This school is for incorrigible and delinquent boys, sent there upon court order. The school has farms upon which are learned, by practical work, and have various entertainments and amusements, including movies, the various phases of farming and gardening. In addition there are industrial shops, tailor, blacksmith, automobile, shoe, printing, sewing room, bakery, machine shop, plumbing, carpenter, mason and painting.

Competent schools are presided over by efficient teachers. Athletics, debates, home talent plays, a fine band, moving pictures, a good library and other opportunities are provided to improve mind and body.

The present superintendent is Hollis L. Miles.

Iowa Penal Institutions

Under Supervision of Board of Control

State Penitentiary at Fort Madison

The prison at Fort Madison is more than 100 years old. It was established in 1839, the year after Iowa became a territory, and seven years before it became a state.

Under the able guidance of the board of control and recent wardens, the Fort Madison penitentiary has achieved high rank among the nation's penal institutions. Outbreaks have been few and escapes infrequent. A parole system enables the men of highest intelligence and best records to work on the prisons farms, away from the enclosure, and even to go to the state's various other institutions under the board of control (state hospitals and schools) to work and live on an honor system.

The inmates as far as possible are kept at work, according to their terms of sentence, many being fitted for industries at which they can support themselves after release. Each prisoner is interviewed, upon admittance, by the chaplain and the warden, in an effort to see what work he should be put to and what can best be done to reclaim him.

The inmates have recreation and amusement opportunities. Headphone radios are installed in the cells and good programs are furnished from a central control. A good library is well patronized; athletics and moving pictures make life more bearable. Baseball, kittenball, tennis, boxing, wrestling, horseshoe pitching, football and basketball give ample opportunity to most of the men to keep in good physical trim.

Under the law all condemned prisoners are executed at Fort Madison.

The present warden is John C. Bennett.

Men's Reformatory at Anamosa

The men's reformatory is located at Anamosa, where the first prisoner was admitted on May 13, 1873. Originally intended for first and youthful offenders, and the criminally insane, within recent years prisoners have been transferred from Fort Madison as conditions demand.

Grain and livestock farming are carried on here on a large scale. A large modern canning plant is operated here as an industry. Most of the vegetables for the other state institutions are canned here. Other industries include the manufacture of soap, clothing, automobile number plates, road signs and cheese.

The prisoners are kept at work, according to the sentences imposed on them, but they have ample recreation and amusement facilities, including various sports and games, radio programs and moving pictures. Part of the reformatory yard, or enclosure, is flooded during the winter, permitting ice skating.

The warden of the men's reformatory is Ray Purcell.

Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City

Women over 18 years old, convicted of offenses which carry a term of more than 30 days, are sent to the women's reformatory at Rockwell City. The first prisoner was received on May 2, 1918.

The fact that many short-term offenders are sent to Rockwell City, instead of being kept in county jails, makes the per capita cost of maintenance large. The women are given an opportunity to attend school dances, lectures and recitals, home talent plays and picnics.

The superintendent is Mrs. Elda M. Kyles.

Iowa Cares for Mental and Needy Cases

Iowa mental institutions are administered by the state board of control, under the supervision of Dr. J. O. Cromwell, Director of Mental Institutions.

On February 27, 1861, the first patient was received at the state hospital at Mount Pleasant, generally said to be the first institution of its kind west of the Mississippi river.

For the past 49 years Iowa has had four institutions to care for its mentally afflicted, those at Independence, Clarinda and Cherokee having been added. These are now known as Mental Health Institutes.

Four Hospitals for Mental Cases

In order of their establishment Independence comes second, the first patient having been admitted there on May 1, 1873; Clarinda is third, December 13, 1888; Cherokee, fourth, August 18, 1902.

Two Homes for Feeble-Minded

The reports of these four state hospitals do not begin to tell the entire story of what Iowa is doing for its mentally deficient and unfit. The state board of control has jurisdiction over two other institutions belonging to this same general classification: The Glenwood State School at Glenwood, which received its first patient on September 1, 1867; and the Woodward State Hospital and School at Woodward, which received its first patient on September 3, 1917.

Each of these six institutions is open to general visitors within certain prescribed hours each day, and parents at any time. To the limit of funds available they are well kept, sanitary and attractive, the buildings at each place being surrounded by large grounds, nicely landscaped and properly tended. While the atmosphere is not at all depressing, entertainment is arranged for as many as can mentally enjoy it.

The present superintendents are as follows: Mount Pleasant, Dr. W. B. Brown; Independence, Dr. Selig M. Korson; Clarinda, Dr. Karl Catlin; Cherokee, Willard C. Brinegar; Glenwood, Dr. J. O. Cromwell, acting superintendent, and Woodward, Dr. Grace M. Sawyer.

Under Chapter 96, Code of Iowa, the Iowa Employment Security Commission administers a program designed to assist workers to gain a more profitable and satisfactory employment status and to provide employers with satisfactory workers. The program is planned to assist unemployed workers in finding suitable work and to enable employers to stabilize their employment and to secure workers skilled in the type of work offered.

The Employment Security Law levies a tax upon employer payrolls of four or more workers in commercial and industrial employment for the purpose of providing a fund from which weekly benefits are paid to workers who are unemployed and who meet eligibility requirements.

Each employer's contribution rate is based upon his individual employment record. If his employment record is favorable his contribution rate will be lower than the standard rate. The plan is intended to encourage employers to provide steady employment and to avoid lay-offs.

The Iowa payroll tax is known as one of the lowest in the United States. For several years past about one-half of all covered employers of the state have so stabilized their employment that they are not required to pay any contribution tax to the state, at the same time a reserve amounting to more than \$107,000,000 has accumulated.

Workers who are employed by employers liable under the law build up wage credits, and upon becoming unemployed, if found eligible and no suitable work is available, are paid weekly benefits based upon the amount of their earnings but not to exceed \$30 per week and for not more than 24 weeks in a 12-month period.

The Iowa State Employment Service was established in 1915 by legislative action. In 1933 the Congress enacted the Wagner-Peyser Act establishing the United States Employment Service, thus providing a nation-wide employment service with local offices in every state. With the enactment of the Iowa Employment Security Law in 1936, administrative control of the Iowa State Employment Service was given to the Iowa Employment Security Commission. Thirty-five full-time local employment service offices serve every section of Iowa.

The Commission, through its system of local employment offices, receives and processes all claims for unemployment insurance under the Employment Security Law, finds jobs for unemployed workers, gives effective job counseling and offers a testing service to determine proficiency and natural fitness.

The Employment Security Commission, under terms of an agreement with the U. S. Secretary of Labor, is authorized to administer Title IV of the Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1952, which provides

unemployment benefits to veterans of service on or after June 27, 1950, at the rate of \$26.00 per week, with a maximum entitlement of \$676.00. Benefits are paid or denied in accordance with the provisions of the Employment Security Law except that veterans' benefits may not be canceled through disqualification. This program will terminate on January 31, 1960.

The Employment Security Commission also, under the terms of an agreement with the U. S. Secretary of Labor, is authorized to administer the Ex-Servicemen's Unemployment Compensation Act of 1958 under the provisions of Title IV, Public Law 85-848, which provides unemployment benefits to ex-servicemen whose service began after January 31, 1955, or was terminated after October 27, 1958. Benefits are paid or denied in accordance with the provisions of the Employment Security Law.


Under terms of an amendment to Title XV of the Federal Social Security law the Iowa Employment Security Commission administers the program providing unemployment insurance to federal civilian employees, in accordance with provisions of Chapter 96, Code of Iowa.

Under Chapter 97, Code of Iowa, the Commission has the responsibility of carrying out the provisions of the Iowa Old Age and Survivors Insurance law, enacted by the Fifty-first General Assembly of Iowa, to insure the rights of all public employees retired under or otherwise affected by this recently repealed statute.

The Commission administers Chapter 97B, Code of Iowa, known as the Iowa Public Employees Retirement law, receiving and processing all claims and collecting contributions from both employees and employers.

Under terms of the State Supplemental Retirement law, Chapter 97B, Code of Iowa, Fifty-fifth General Assembly, the Commission receives retirement applications through the facilities of its system of local employment service offices throughout the state.

The Employment Security Commission administers Chapter 97C, Code of Iowa, which together with amendment to Title II of the Federal Social Security Act, extends to employees of the State and its political subdivisions the protection and benefits afforded under the Federal Social Security Act. This entails the withholding of a 2½ per cent tax upon the wages of all employees, collecting of a like amount from public employers, accounting for all funds and transacting other business.



**BUSINESS OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL**

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa are the following: To act upon all state activities and to notify all interested persons of action taken thereon; to determine the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof; to approve articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plan for liquidation of said associations; to approve property purchases and acceptance of gifts; to authorize department leases; to approve the issuance of patents, corrected patents and easements; to approve and purchase all state vehicles; to authorize and pay special assessments; to authorize and pay court costs, and special attorney general fees, to authorize condemnation proceedings; to authorize payment of institutional vouchers; approve bank depositories of public funds; authorize issuance of "dummy" plates; approve compromise tax settlements; reimburse school district taxes under Sec. 284, Code, 1954; to purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for the state departments and offices; to execute contracts for fuel, lights and repairs; to approve all requisitions, issue purchase orders and authorizations; has custody of supplies for state offices and commissions; the canvass of votes cast for state and district officers; the declaration of changes in classifications of cities; the assignment of office rooms to state officers; the approval of out-of-state travel; the appointment of the board of examiners of mine

inspectors; the approval of plans for state buildings; the authorization of printing pamphlets, posters and booklets for various departments.

The secretary of the executive council is also secretary of conservation commission and of the board of engineering examiners. He also has the direct supervision of the state postoffice employees and the telephone office employees.

Report of Executive Council Secretary

Section 19.6, Code of Iowa, 1958, requires that a report of the secretary of the executive council be published in the Iowa Official Register. That portion of the report of the secretary dealing with matters of general interest is presented here. Other matters required in the report as to Iowa cities and the official canvass of Iowa election results are presented in tables elsewhere.

There were 49 council meetings held during the year 1957, and 19 special meetings. In 1958 there were 46 council meetings and 19 special meetings.

The state board of engineering examiners was created by the Thirty-eighth General Assembly in 1919. No person can practice professional engineering or land surveying without first being registered with this board. The board meets from time to time and conducts examinations of applicants for registration.

The law provides that the membership of the board shall consist of five members who shall be appointed by the governor. Each member of the board shall be a professional engineer at least thirty-five years of age and shall have been a resident of this state for at least three years immediately preceding his appointment and shall have had at least ten years active practice preceding his appointment and during such time shall have charge of engineering work as principal or assistant for at least two years, and shall be a member in good standing of a recognized state or national engineering society. No two members of said board shall be from the same branch of the profession of engineering.

OELKE, President, Iowa Academy of Science.****H. GARLAND HERSHEY, Director and State Geologist, Iowa City,** appointed by the geological board to serve during the pleasure of the board.

It is the duty of the Geological Survey to collect, interpret, and report information on basic geologic features of the state. These include surface and underground water supplies, coal, gypsum, sand and gravel, ceramic clay and shale, limestone and dolomite, raw materials for the manufacture of cement, ore deposits, and other mineral resources. Studies are continuing on the oil and gas possibilities in Iowa, particularly in the southwestern portion of the state, and the geological sections of the oil and gas law are being administered. Geological studies of dam sites are made on some of the flood control and recreational prospects of Federal and state agencies, and reports on the mineral resources of such reservoir areas are frequently prepared.

The Survey is the repository for all basic geologic data obtained in the state.

Collection and dissemination of data on water wells, water levels, stream flow and sediment loads, lake levels, and other hydraulic data are accomplished in cooperation with the Water Resources Division of the U. S. Geological Survey. Topographic mapping of the state, by quadrangles approximately 220 square miles in area, is being conducted in cooperation with the Topographic Division of the U. S. Geological Survey.

As a part of the result of its work, the Survey has published 38 volumes of annual reports and accompanying scientific papers. These publications include special reports and maps covering the geology and mineral production of all but six of the 99 counties, as well as special reports on mineral production of all sorts. There are also three technical papers on Iowa coal and six water-supply bulletins. Geological and mineral resources maps of the state have been prepared. Other summaries of specialized geological studies have been published in geological periodicals. These published reports, together with the large file of unpublished data obtained during more than half a century of continued study, serve as a reliable basis for up-to-the-minute reports to Federal, state and municipal agencies and to private concerns and individuals who request and need the available information on water supply and other mineral resources of Iowa. Information, advice and direct assistance in the increasing development of large water supplies are freely given to the limit of funds and personnel.



Cancer Control

The Division conducts frequent Cancer Institutes for physicians in various areas of the state wherein doctors are kept informed as to the latest developments in this field.

Through lectures, literature, movies, etc., the public is made conscious of the importance of prompt attention to the earliest even insignificant signs of the disease.

In the six tumor clinics strategically located, any citizen is given an opportunity for expert diagnosis and the collective judgment of a group of physicians as to adequate treatment measures.

Communicable and Preventable Diseases

Preventable diseases are by their very nature of vital concern to the community and the state. Reports of various infectious diseases are received daily from physicians and health officers throughout the state. These reports are surveyed and tabulated so as to make possible a study by weeks and months of the current prevalence of disease as compared with the preceding year and period of years. Field investigations are made upon request of local health officers or other officials, to determine the nature and extent of outbreaks and to assist with control measures. The Department through articles, reports, literature, talks, correspondence and graphic presentations, aims to inform the public about disease prevention.

The staff of the Divisions includes a veterinarian and several nurses, all with special training in their respective fields of public health.

The public health veterinarian is responsible for much of the work relating to diseases of animals transmissible to man. The public health nurses work with the Tuberculosis Control, the Venereal Disease and the Preventable Disease programs. These staff members co-operate at all times with local physicians and health officers in the problems of communicable disease control, in the conduct of special surveys and in any measures that may be necessary to prevent the spread of infection either on a local or a state basis.

Dental Hygiene

The Division promotes programs for the prevention and care of dental diseases by working with organizations interested in health such as schools, parent-teacher units and other local groups. Fluoridation of public water supplies is a primary interest.

This is the thirtieth year of the Iowa Plan of Dental Health Education. The plan is for use in rural, town and parochial schools.

Gerontology, Heart and Chronic Diseases

The Division of Gerontology, Heart and Chronic Diseases was established July 1, 1953.

There is an increasing awareness of the greater incidence of heart and chronic diseases as a public health problem as the population grows older and a need of community responsibility on the part of all health, civic and governmental agencies concerned.

It is the purpose of this Division to promote such community responsibility toward establishment of special diagnostic centers, particularly in the larger hospitals, as well as better facilities for treatment, rehabilitation and restoration of health as far as possible.

Hospital Services

This Division is charged with the duties of administering the Federal Grants-in-Aid Program authorized by the Hospital and Medical Facilities Survey and Construction Act (Hill-Burton Program). The Division annually inventories all existing hospitals, diagnostic and treatment centers, rehabilitation centers, nursing homes and related facilities; determines the need for them; and allocates approximately two million dollars annually to local communities to assist in the construction of medical facilities.

The Division is further charged with the responsibility of promoting safe and adequate care of individuals in approximately 175 hospitals and 600 nursing homes through a program of inspection and licensing.

Hygienic Laboratory

This unit provides diagnostic services to those licensed to practice the healing arts, hospitals, laboratories and health organizations of the state relative to the diagnosis and control of diseases communicable to man and consultation pertaining thereto.

These services are many, the majority dealing with the public water supplies of the state, control of stream pollution, milk supplies, venereal diseases, rabies, typhoid group of diseases, tuberculosis, brucellosis, parasitic and fungus diseases, virus and rickettsial diseases, and many others. Marriage certificates are initiated and returned to physicians submitting blood specimens for persons contemplating marriage.

Private, hospital and city laboratories are appraised annually to perform venereal disease tests, water, milk and sewage analyses. Laboratory technicians of the state are constantly being trained in the State Hygienic Laboratory in these areas.

Licensure

Under the provision of the Code of Iowa, Chapter 147, the following are required to obtain a license before entering upon the practice of the respective profession: Chiropody; chiropractic; funeral director and embalmer; dental; dental hygiene; optometry; osteopathy; osteopathy and surgery; barbers and cosmetology; medical.

The Boards of Barber, Chiropractic, Cosmetology, Medical and Osteopathy maintain separate offices with an executive secretary.

Under the provisions of the Code of Iowa, Chapter 135D, the State Department of Health is authorized to administer the law relating to Mobile Home Parks, and the Division of Public Health Engineering has been designated to direct the same. The Division of Licensure only accepts the applications and fees, and by direction of the Division of Public Health Engineering, the licenses are issued.

All of the above licenses are signed by the Commissioner of Public Health.

Maternal and Child Health

The activities of this Division are designed to make known to those concerned, the health needs of mothers and children and how they should and can be met. Personnel specifically trained in public health aspects of pediatrics, obstetrics, dentistry, nutrition and nursing direct these activities. Educational programs and techniques are developed to reach the lay people through the family physician and dentist and through public health visiting and school nursing services.

Nutrition

Public health trained nutritionists work with staff members of other divisions of the Department on programs involving nutrition education. They serve as consultants on state-wide programs and, insofar as possible, to local public health people who can carry out their recommendations.

Public health nutritionists review nutrition materials and films and assist in writing of manuals and other guides to be used in program planning; give consultation service to hospitals without dietitians, and dietary consultation to nursing homes, children's homes and day-care centers.

Public Health Education

The Division of Health Education co-operates with and assists other divisions, regional health services, and county and city health departments in health education programs. Through newspapers, radio, television, films, conferences, exhibits, lectures and other media it reaches the citizens of Iowa with up-to-date health information.

The Division works with schools, and community, county and state organizations in the development of their health programs.

Public Health Engineering and Industrial Hygiene

Primary functions and duties of the Engineering Division pertain to general supervision over construction, maintenance, and operation of public water supplies, swimming pools, sewerage and refuse disposal. Activities include inspections of existing systems and review of plans and specifications for new installations.

Administration of the stream and lake pollution law requires the investigation of the existing conditions of pollution with authority to order abatement thereof, and the issuing of permits for new sewer installations.

The Division prepares amendments to the State Plumbing Code and advises local officials on proper installations of private water supply and sewage disposal systems. It regulates the sanitation requirements of mobile home (trailer) parks, makes inspections, and approves them for annual licenses. It also inspects all Grade A milk supplies and certifies their qualities to the Department of Agriculture.

General supervision is exercised over administration of the housing law and local officials are aided in its enforcement. Advisory service is rendered to local boards of health on enforcement of sanitation laws and regulations, and on administration of local sanitation programs.

Industrial hygiene activities consist of an advisory service to management and other agencies on control of occupational diseases caused by manufacturing and other industrial operations.

Public Health Nursing

This Division recruits, trains, places and gives guidance to public health nurses. It also evaluates nursing services and formulates plans and policies for nursing in the various programs of the State Department of Health such as in preventable diseases, maternal and child health, handicapped children, adult and chronic diseases and dental health.

Vital Statistics

The Division is responsible for the handling of all birth, death, fetal death, marriage, divorce and related records for the State of Iowa.

The vital statistics system includes the registration, collection, preservation, amendment and certification of vital statistics records, and activities related to those records, including the tabulation, analysis, and publication of statistical data. Certified copies of birth and other vital records are issued for a fee of one dollar.

The Iowa Board of Nurse Examiners was made a department separate from the Department of Health by S. F. 50, passed by the Forty-sixth General Assembly and became effective upon publication. The board gives examinations and issues licenses to two classifications of nurses: 1, registered nurse; 2, licensed practical nurse. Examinations are held semi-annually in Des Moines.

The examination fee is \$10.00; the reciprocity fee, \$10.00; certification fee, \$5.00, and the annual renewal of license, \$2.00.

Through its Executive Secretary the board keeps records pertaining to the licensing of nurses in the state, receives all applications for licensure, collects all fees and issues all licenses.

It is the duty of the board to enforce the laws governing the practice of nursing in the state.

Since 1907 when the first regulatory measure affecting the practice of nursing in Iowa was enacted, 30,411 nurses have become registered, giving them the right to use the title Registered Nurse. At the close of the 1958 fiscal year 629 Iowa Registered Nurses were endorsed under seal to other states. During the same fiscal year 303 nurses licensed in other states qualified for registration in Iowa.

In 1949 regulatory measures were enacted pertaining to the practice of practical nursing. At the close of the 1958 fiscal year 2,062 individuals had qualified for practical nurse licensure.

The board also formulates administrative and educational policies for the 26 schools of Professional Nursing and the seven schools of Practical Nursing.

Married on November 18, 1921 to Helen Hayes of Vinton. Father of one child, Joan (Mrs. D. F. Pierce).



Start and Progress of State Highway Commission

The first law creating a state highway commission in Iowa was adopted by the General Assembly in 1904. That law simply stated that the Iowa State College should act as a state highway commission. Acting under said law, the state board of education appointed Dean Anson Marston of the engineering division, and Dean Charles F. Curtis of the agricultural department of Iowa State College as the directors of the commission. Thomas H. MacDonald, U. S. Commissioner of Public Roads, was appointed by the directors as secretary and engineer for the commission. The duties of the commission at that time were to make investigations and studies of highway conditions and to advise with local authorities with respect to highway improvements.

This organization continued until 1913, when the Thirty-fifth General Assembly passed an act creating a state highway commission of three members and separated said commission from Iowa State College.

In 1927 the General Assembly passed an act which now appears as chapter 307 of the Code of 1954, creating a state highway commission of five members, all to be appointed by the governor, not more than three of whom could be from the same political party.

The law of 1927 placed the primary road system under the direct control and supervision of the state highway commission. Thomas H. MacDonald, who became secretary and engineer of the highway commission in 1904, was designated as chief engineer of the highway commission in 1913 and continued in that capacity until 1919, when he resigned and F. R. White was appointed to that position. Mr. White retired from the position of chief engineer in 1952 and E. F. Koch was appointed as chief engineer in October of that year. Mr. Koch resigned on March 31, 1954, and Mr. Butter was appointed chief engineer on April 1, 1954.

Outline of State Highway Commission Work

All construction and maintenance work on the primary road system is directly under the supervision of the highway commission.

The highway commission's duties are fivefold:

First: Construction and maintenance of primary roads.

Second: Marking and signing of primary roads for safe operation.

Third: Approval of plans and contracts for secondary road construction in co-operation with county authorities.

Fourth: Approval of budgets for secondary roads.

Fifth: Providing engineering assistance for other state departments.

The Commission has entire charge of and responsibility for all construction and maintenance work on the primary road system. It prepares the necessary surveys, plans and specifications for primary road improvements, lets the necessary contracts and supervises the construction work. It has charge, for the state of Iowa, of the expenditure of all federal aid road funds allotted to this state.

The commission, on request, renders engineering assistance to various other state departments. This includes the making of surveys and preparation of plans and general supervision of construction and maintenance of public highways upon or adjacent to lands belonging to the state at the various educational, charitable and penal institutions, and at

state parks, engineering assistance to the executive council on street improvements on and adjacent to the capitol grounds, assistance to the national guard on projects in connection with the national guard camp, and various other technical matters which may come before such other state departments.

The highway commission employs a force of officers to enforce laws with reference to size, weight, registration and load of vehicles operated on the highways of the state.

The secondary roads (all rural roads not included in the primary road system and not classified as state institutional roads under chapter 308, Code 1954) are under the supervision of the county board of supervisors in their respective counties. However, the law places on the highway commission certain duties and responsibilities in connection with such secondary road work.

The secondary roads in each county are classified into two groups or systems—the farm-to-market road system which includes about 35,000 miles of main traveled secondary roads, and the local secondary road system which includes about 58,000 miles. Changes or modifications in the farm-to-market road system are initiated by the county board and are subject to approval by the state highway commission. It is the duty of the county to initiate projects for the construction of farm-to-market roads, to make surveys and prepare plans for the improvement of farm-to-market roads, and submit these plans to the state highway commission for approval. It is the duty of the state highway commission to advertise for bids on projects involving Federal-Aid funds, let construction contracts and give general supervision to the construction of farm-to-market road projects.

County boards of supervisors must prepare a budget showing estimated secondary fund receipts and proposed expenditures from this fund for each calendar year, and submit such budget to the state highway commission which shall have the power to approve or to disapprove the budget. Procedures to be followed are provided in the law in case of disapproval. Secondary road construction programs for each calendar year must also be submitted to and be approved by the highway commission. Plans prepared by the county engineers for secondary road improvements must be submitted to the highway commission for approval. Contracts awarded by the boards of supervisors for secondary road construction work involving a cost of \$2,000 per mile or more than \$5,000 in the aggregate, or more than \$2,000 for any one bridge or culvert, must be approved by the state highway commission before becoming effective.

In case two adjacent counties are unable to agree on any county line road or bridge construction or maintenance matter, either board may appeal to the state highway commission to determine said controversy.



Roberts, 1940; one daughter, Jean. Joined the staff of the Department in 1933 as Museum Assistant, later Museum Director. Served as Staff Ornithologist, National School of Wildlife Protection, McGregor, Iowa, 1939 and 1940. Author of "Waterfowl in Iowa," contributor to several books and author of many articles in the fields of history, natural history, and outdoor sports. Lecturer and wildlife photographer; recognized authority on many phases of Iowa history and natural history. Active as Boy Scout counsellor. Member of American Ornithologists' Union, Outdoor Writers' Association of America, and many other organizations in fields allied to science, wildlife, conservation and natural history; Episcopal church; Masonic orders.

The State Historical Department was organized in 1892 by Charles Aldrich; the State Historical Building, erected in 1889 and 1908. The department was reorganized in 1939 as the Iowa State Department of History and Archives.

The chief purpose of the department is the preservation of Iowa History from earliest geological time through the days of the Indians, the coming of the pioneers, to the present; to bring this history to life and make it available to the people of Iowa. Allied with these purposes are many other services.

Following its founding, the Iowa Historical department quickly became an important part of the educational and cultural activities of the state. From a small beginning the department has grown until it now overflows the original building, and the addition erected in 1908; the Kasson Memorial Building, a block away, was purchased to serve as a workshop for the archivists and provide storage space for the state archives which had been stored in the Historical Building.

Here is a unique and unrivaled institution in which all Iowa takes pride; its people visit both individually and in groups for conducted tours; its doors are open every day. Here the people of our state can see how the Iowa of today arose from the Iowa of yesterday; how the land, mines, quarries, rocks, and minerals came to be; how the Indian lived before the coming of the white man; how the pioneer changed the face of the land and the way of life. Here too are many sources of reference on Iowa history, ranging from newspapers to manuscripts, including books and census records; here are the state archives, readily available to officials of the state and to serious students of Iowa history.

In the museum is a wide range of exhibits. Displayed are tools, utensils and implements used by Iowa pioneers to conquer the wilderness; there is a collection tracing the history of pioneer transportation, including horse drawn vehicles and early automobiles; pioneer agri-

cultural implements and many household articles from the time of the very earliest settlers. There is a fine collection of Kentucky rifles, both flintlock and percussion, as well as many other early firearms. The extensive G.A.R. collection, including portraits of all past commanders, is now housed in the Historical Museum.

Indian history of Iowa is traced from the time of the mound builders to modern times; many ancient Indian artifacts are on display along with an unusually fine collection of modern Indian materials including bead work, canoes, and a wickiup.

Iowa's geology is represented by rock samples and fossils from every formation of the state, covering a billion years of geologic time. There is an outstanding exhibit of fossil crinoids from LeGrand, an area known throughout the world for the fine specimens which have come from it.

Many study collections are of interest and use to the citizens of the state—a large collection of maps of Iowa and of the country as a whole; an extensive collection of Iowa wildlife, many of which are record specimens; specimens of mounted birds and animals, some of which were common in pioneer days but are gone from the state today; the beautiful and elaborate silver service of the Battleship Iowa; a collection of photographs of people and places of historic interest, many of them the only pictures available. In addition many thousands of items are catalogued and stored for future display, and the collection is constantly growing.

In connection with the museum, the department maintains guided tour service for school groups, approximately 1500 annually, covering all phases of history and natural history, and at all levels, from kindergarten through college; each group is given a special tour, depending on the age of the students and the subject they are studying. The museum serves as an "identification bureau" for all manner of objects of natural and historic interest which citizens, teachers, and students bring in.

The Department has a large collection of autograph letters and papers of authors, explorers and statesmen, including several letters signed by Abraham Lincoln. On this foundation has been built the manuscript division, used for research by historians from all over North America.

On the shelves of the Historical Library are approximately 50,000 books by Iowa authors or about Iowa, Iowa state and county histories, family records and references for research in genealogy.

The census department is used in establishing records of birth and genealogy and in many cases can supply the only records of birth and residence available to many of our citizens.

The Newspaper division receives all the leading daily and weekly newspapers in the state, adding them to a systematic collection which dates back to the very earliest newspapers published in Iowa. These publications are an invaluable source for the historian and the growing file of present day papers is part of the Department's work of recording history day by day. All current newspapers are now preserved in permanent form on microfilm.

Portraits of many outstanding Iowans hang in the portrait gallery. A War History division contains many manuscripts, reports, official publications, enlistment records and other materials pertaining to Iowa's participation in six great wars.

The Annals of Iowa, a historical magazine issued quarterly, contains interpretive studies and articles on the history of the state.

The Iowa public archives comprise more than 35 million items beginning with the territorial government, all catalogued, so as to be readily available when needed by state officials or for historical research.

The Department also has jurisdiction over all monuments and mementos on the State House grounds.

All these divisions of the Department contribute to realization of its objectives, to preserve the history of the state of Iowa and make it readily available to the citizens of the state.



William J. Petersen was born in Dubuque, Iowa, on January 30, 1901. He was educated in the Dubuque public schools, received his B.A. from the University of Dubuque in 1926, his M.A. from the University of Iowa in 1927 and his Ph.D. from the same school in 1930. He was appointed research associate in the State Historical Society of Iowa in 1930 and became Superintendent in 1947. In 1937 he married Bessie Rasmus. Dr. Petersen is the author of several books and almost 300 articles on Iowa History. He has taught the course in Iowa history in the University of Iowa since 1930.

Organized in February, 1857, its purposes are to preserve the history of Iowa and further its dissemination among the people of the state. In fulfillment of these purposes a permanent program of activities has been gradually developed and put into execution. This includes (1) the discovery, collection and preservation of materials of Iowa history; (2) research in the field of Iowa history; (3) publication of the materials of Iowa history; (4) dissemination of the materials of Iowa history through public depositories and members. The society publishes a monthly magazine, *The Palimpsest*, and a quarterly magazine, the *Iowa Journal of History*. In addition, it issues numerous books on the political, social, economic and religious history of Iowa. It has published seven volumes on the *Messages and Proclamations of the Governors of Iowa*, six volumes in the *Applied History Series* dealing with state, county and local government. Among the better known books are Mrs. Shambaugh's *Amana That Was and Amana That Is*, Gingerich's *The Mennonites in Iowa*, Swisher's *Iowa—Land of Many Mills*, Petersen's *Steamboating on the Upper Mississippi* and *Iowa—The Rivers of Her Valleys*, Richman's *Ioway to Iowa*, and Cole's *Iowa Through the Years* and *I Remember, I Remember*. Books recently published include Galland's *Iowa Emigrant* (reprint), Ross's *Iowa Agriculture*, Petersen's *Iowa History Reference Guide*, Scholl's *Arnewood—The Story of an Iowa Dairyman*, Nollen's *Grinnell College*, Younger's *John A. Kasson*, Sage's *William Boyd Allison*, Newhall's *A Glimpse of Iowa in 1846* (reprint), and Ross's *Jonathan Prentiss Dolliver*.

The library of the society now includes about 107,630 titles. It also contains over 10,000 volumes of newspapers. In addition, hundreds of volumes of Iowa newspapers are preserved on microfilm.



The Workmen's Compensation Law was enacted by the Thirty-fifth General Assembly in 1913. Iowa was one of the first states to provide compensation benefits for injuries sustained by Industrial Workers. Succeeding legislatures have made many changes and increased benefits. The Fifty-first General Assembly established a second injury fund for the benefit of Veterans, who were maimed by loss of members, making it possible for an employer to hire a maimed Veteran without taking undue risk. The Fifty-second General Assembly enacted an occupational disease law. Reports of all industrial injuries resulting in disability for more than seven days or death are required to be made to the Industrial Commissioner. Settlement agreements are submitted for his approval. In the event an amicable settlement is not reached an Arbitration Hearing before a Deputy Commissioner or Arbitration Commission is held in the county where the injury occurred and the claimant, employer or insurance carrier may appeal to the commissioner. Review hearings are held in the commissioner's office and an appeal may be taken to the District Court of the county where the injury occurred.



The office of commissioner of insurance, as the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa, was created by chapter 146, of the laws of the Thirty-fifth General Assembly (1913) and the first commissioner took office July 1, 1914. Previous to that time, the supervision of insurance had been under the direction of the auditor of state.

The commissioner of insurance has general control, supervision, and direction over all insurance business transacted in the state, and is charged with the responsibility of enforcing all the laws of the state relating to insurance.

Under the law, all securities in which the reserves of Iowa life insurance companies are invested are required to be deposited with the commissioner and complete records are kept showing each item on deposit at all times. The amount of approved securities representing these and other incidental deposits in the hands of the commissioner on December 31, 1958 was \$1,915,324,241.81.

The commissioner supervises all transactions relating to the organization, reorganization, liquidation and dissolution of domestic insurance corporations. He supervises the sale in the state of all stock or other evidences of interest either by domestic or foreign insurance companies. He is the statutory receiver in the event of liquidation of any Iowa insurance company.

All foreign companies, as well as all local companies, must, before engaging in the insurance business in this state, obtain a certificate of authority from the commissioner of insurance. These certificates expire annually on April 1, and action is taken on their renewals after analysis of complete financial statements filed covering the condition of the

company as of the previous year end. All insurance agents must likewise obtain individual licenses to solicit business. In 1958 there were 850 insurance companies authorized to do business in the state, and approximately 80,000 individual agents' licenses were issued.

A state statute requires insurance companies to file all rates with the insurance commissioner for approval, and a rating division has been set up within the insurance department to handle rate filings together with supporting statistical information.

The commissioner conducts examinations of all domestic insurance organizations every three years. He may also make an examination of any foreign insurance company authorized or seeking to be authorized to do business within the state. All policy forms used by any company within the state are required to be approved by the department.

Securities Department

The state securities laws, designed to protect the Iowa investing public through regulation of securities dealers and qualification of securities offered for sale, are administered by the commissioner of insurance.

The volume of business handled by the securities division has nearly doubled in the past two years.

The commissioner also has jurisdiction over the sale of stock on the installment plan and sale of memberships or certificates of membership entitling the holder thereof to purchase merchandise, materials or services on a discount or cost-plus basis.

Purpose of the Iowa Development Commission

The activities of the Iowa Development Commission are centered on achieving and maintaining in the state an economy balanced between industry and agriculture. While the land has been and will always remain a mainstay of Iowa's economic life, technological advances and increased mechanization in agriculture have made necessary greater diversification of the economy. Factories and manufacturing plants must provide job opportunities for those no longer needed on the farm; new tax revenues must be supplied to support state, county and city governments; additional markets for Iowa products and services must be created.

Records of Iowa's accomplishments in agriculture and assessments of its assets in industrial development, together with evaluations of changing conditions which affect the state's growth and prosperity, are maintained by the Development Commission through its department of Research and Statistics. A file of some 1,800 subjects forms the core of the Commission's research, market analysis and statistical work.

The Industrial Promotion department of the Commission devotes itself to the attraction of new industries to Iowa and assists those firms already in existence within the state's borders. Since a favorable industrial climate is created only by proper community attitude, this department works closely with local Chambers of Commerce and community development organizations dedicated to the betterment of the individual city and town. Assistance is rendered in the fields of community education, financing and promotion. Close liaison is maintained at the executive level with industries throughout the nation, management consultants and industrial development organizations.

Creation of favorable public opinion for Iowa, recognition of its accomplishments in the fields of agriculture and industry, promotion of its cultural, social, and economic advantages—these are the responsibilities of the Commission's department of Publicity.

The spotlight is turned on Iowa through all available media—newspapers, magazines, radio, television, periodicals and business publications, together with travel guides, encyclopedias and school books. Monthly summaries of Iowa's achievements and assets are compiled for libraries, schools and lecturers. The department also lends its cooperation to other state agencies in preparing publications for distribution to the general public.

Iowa's scenic beauty and recreational resources are also highlighted for the traveling public through brochures and pamphlets prepared and distributed by the Development Commission.

More than 60,000 requests for information on Iowa's agricultural prowess, industrial achievements, natural resources and recreational advantages are processed each year.

THE STATE LIBRARIES

A board of trustees, composed of the governor, the state superintendent of public instruction and a member of the supreme court, control the state law library and the state medical library. The law library is located in the state house, the other in the Historical building.

The salary of each librarian is \$6,000.

STATE MEDICAL LIBRARY
(Second Floor, Historical Building)

The Iowa state medical library was established as a department of the state library in July, 1919, and became a separate library in the reorganization of the state libraries by the Forty-eighth General Assembly in 1939.

The library contains 53,888 accessioned volumes and receives 347 medical and scientific periodicals annually, having over 100,000 unbound periodicals. The main work of the medical library is its mailing service, whereby proper material is selected and placed in the mail the same day doctors request literature by mail, phone or telegram.

The library also has a small museum of old medical instruments.

STATE LAW LIBRARY
(Second Floor, Capitol Building)

The Iowa state law library, with its collection of upwards of 150,000 volumes, is one of the largest and most complete law libraries in the United States.

In addition to legal reference facilities provided for the Iowa supreme court judges, attorney general and other state officials, it is used as well by attorneys and the general public.

IOWA STATE TRAVELING LIBRARY

The Fifty-sixth General Assembly established the Iowa State Traveling Library Board of Trustees consisting of five members, none of whom shall be practicing librarians, to be appointed by the Governor, three of whom may be from a list of six nominations submitted by the Iowa Library Association and one chosen from a list of three nominations submitted by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The first members appointed by the Governor were appointed for terms of one, two, three, four and five years, and all subsequent appointments shall be for terms of five years. Vacancies shall be filled in like manner for the remaining term. The Board shall meet at least once in each quarter of each fiscal year to transact business and shall at the first meeting of the new year elect a chairman from said board.

To continuously survey the needs of libraries throughout the state, and to ascertain the requirements for additional libraries and for improving existing libraries to provide adequate service to all residents of the state.

To loan books and related materials to libraries, schools, colleges, universities, library associations, farmers' institutes, granges, study clubs, charitable or penal institutions, public officials and individuals without library service.

Don W. Lowe of Des Moines, Iowa was named as Labor Commissioner July 1, 1957, by appointment of Governor Herschel Loveless. At the time of his appointment he was business agent for street railway employees local 441 in Des Moines, a union to which he has belonged since 1937. In 1948 he was elected president of the Iowa State Association of Bus Drivers. He served as president of the Des Moines Trades and Labor assembly for the 1951-52 term. He was chairman of the Des Moines Central Labor Union's Education committee, 1953 to 1957. Mr. Lowe, one of five children, was born in Des Moines on March 24, 1908. He attended the Bloomfield township school system and graduated from Lincoln high school in Des Moines. In 1938 he married Frances Severson of Ames, Iowa and they have two children, a son James and a daughter Betty. Mr. Lowe is a member of Central Christian church.

The office of labor commissioner was created by the Twentieth General Assembly in 1884.

Under the provisions of law, the commissioner is also a member of the board of vocational education and rehabilitation, and the employment agency commission. The commissioner is executive secretary of the employment agency commission.

The bureau is responsible for the enforcement of laws relating to health and safety, child labor, passenger and freight elevators, installation and inspection of steam boilers, generators and superheaters, private employment agencies, arbitration and conciliation, and industrial accidents for reinspection and statistical purposes.

Eight factory inspectors devote full time to inspection of factories, mills, work shops, theatres, buildings, public buildings, passenger and freight elevators, private employment agencies and general employment conditions. The law requires that one of the inspectors shall be a woman who shall give special attention to places employing women and children. The chief boiler inspector for the state works under the commissioner and is responsible for the inspection of all boilers over 15 pounds pressure.

Since July of 1949 the Bureau has dropped its publication "Iowa Employment Survey" because of the duplication with the report of the Iowa Employment Security Commission. However, the Bureau undertook the job to publish reports on Child Labor, Apprenticeship Registration, Construction Activity, and Iowa Work Injuries. At this time monthly statistical reports are being published and distributed throughout the state to aid both labor and management.

The Bureau recognizes the need for a broader survey and hopes that in the near future it will be able to furnish more extensive and pertinent information.



The commission has sole power to buy, import and have in its possession for sale and sell liquors; to establish, maintain and discontinue state liquor stores and special distributors in such cities and towns as deemed advisable; to rent, lease and equip any building or any land necessary to carry out the provisions of the act; to appoint necessary employees; to determine the nature, form and capacity of packages kept or sold under the act and to prescribe the labels and seals to be placed on same; to license, inspect and control the manufacture of alcoholic liquors in Iowa; and to make rules and regulations necessary for carrying out the provisions of the act.

The Iowa merit system council serves as the central personnel office for those state agencies who receive certain federal funds. It provides progressive and uniform personnel practices to about 1,800 individuals who work in about 200 different classifications in the five agencies served.

The "regulations for the merit system," as adopted by the above agencies, provide, in part:

"A merit system council shall be appointed by the governor . . . The council shall be composed of three members, who shall be public-spirited persons of recognized standing and of known interest in the improvement of public administration and in the impartial selection of efficient government personnel. No member of the council shall have held political office or have been an officer in a political organization during the year preceding his appointment nor shall he hold such office during his term. No member of the council shall have been an employee of the agencies within one year prior to his appointment.

"Members of the council shall serve for a term of three years or until successors have been appointed by the governor. . . In appointing a successor to a member of the council, the governor shall make his selection from a panel of three names presented to him through joint action of the participating agencies. A member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of a term shall be appointed for the remainder of such term. Members of the council may be reappointed at the expiration of their term of office.

"It shall be the duty of the council within the scope of these regulations:

- (a) to establish general policies for the administration of merit examinations and the hearing of personal appeals.

- (b) to hear such appeals or to establish impartial bodies to hear such appeals on its behalf;
- (c) to appoint a merit system director with the approval of the participating agencies to advise with him in formulating procedures for the conduct of merit examinations and to inspect and review his activities for the purpose of assuring conformity with these regulations and the policies of the council;
- (d) to review the classification and compensation plans and to advise with the state agencies on their adoption and subsequent revisions;
- (e) to make recommendations to the agencies relative to their internal personnel practices to assure conformity with these regulations;
- (f) to approve a budget for submittal to the state agencies covering all costs of merit-system activities as covered by these regulations;
- (g) to promote public understanding of the purposes, policies and practices of the merit system. As a means thereto, the council shall examine into and make a written report to the governor and to the state agencies at least annually on the operation of the merit system, including the conduct of examinations, the establishment of registers, certifications from registers, promotions, salary advancements, dismissals, demotions, transfers, and separations, and the maintenance of the classification and compensation plans. Such reports shall be filed with the governor and the state agencies and shall be open to public inspection.

The operation of Iowa coal and gypsum mines is hedged around by exacting laws designed for the safe operation of the mines, the safety of the workers in mines and other incidentals.

Laws provide for safeguards against fire, for adequate ventilation, for escape ways and other safety features.

The work of the inspectors consists of examination of mines and mine working conditions. Safety devices for workers, ventilation measures, escape ways, maps of mines and all regulations concerning operations of mines come in for their check.

The Fifty-third General Assembly declared it to be the policy of the state to correlate and vest the powers of the state in a single agency with the duty and authority to establish and enforce an appropriate, comprehensive, state-wide plan for the control of water and for the protection of surface and underground waters of the state, recognizing and including in such plan the resultant effect thereof of other resources of the state; and created the Iowa Natural Resources Council as the agency of state government to promote the policies set forth in the Act, and to represent the State of Iowa in all matters within the scope of the Act.

The functions and duties of the Resources Council include the establishment of a comprehensive state-wide program of flood control, and a comprehensive state-wide program for the conservation, development and use of the waters of the state.

The Resources Council has been designated as the agency with which the Federal government agencies carry on relations for cooperation in cases involving investigations and studies for works or improvements for navigation or flood control affecting the state.

The Resources Council receives, reviews and determines the issuance of permits for the erection of any structure, dam, obstruction, deposit or excavation in or on any floodway and has the power to abate as a nuisance any of the foregoing which adversely affect flood control.

The Resources Council is composed of nine members who are electors of the State of Iowa and appointed by the governor with the approval of two-thirds of the members of the senate. They serve on a part-time per diem basis and are appointed for six-year terms.

By statute, each member serves as chairman in the last two years of his appointment.



The advisory board of the Iowa Pharmaceutical Association annually recommends to the governor a list of six persons for appointment (Code of Iowa, 1954, section 147.15), who have the qualifications prescribed for examiners of the profession, and the governor in making the appointment to the board shall select one of the persons so named. Confirmation by the Senate is not required.

It is the duty of the pharmacy examiners to enforce the laws governing the uniform narcotics act which controls the use of morphine, cocaine, marijuana, and other narcotic drugs of both illegal and legal distribution.

It is the duty of the board to enforce the drug store licensing act.

This original Retail Drug License and Wholesale Drug License fee is \$25.00; the renewal fee is \$15.00.

It is the duty of the board to enforce the laws governing the sale and distribution of drugs for the licensing of pharmacists. The examination fee is \$10.00. A record is kept of all pharmacists licensed and a fee of \$5.00 is required each year for the renewal of certificates; \$2.50 of this amount is retained by the pharmacy department, and \$2.50 is remitted to the treasurer of the Iowa Pharmaceutical Association. Itinerant vendors of medicines are licensed by the department and the license fee is \$50.00 per year.

STATE BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

The statute establishing a Department of Public Instruction, under the direction of a state board, was enacted by the Fifty-fifth General Assembly. The law provides for the election of members of the State Board and prescribes their powers and duties. Members are elected, one from each of the eight congressional districts as they existed on January 1, 1953, plus one board member who is appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the senate. The term is for six years.

The State Board of Public Instruction is a policy making board made up of lay people. The function of this board has the same relationship to the schools in the State of Iowa as the county board of education has to the county school system and the local board of education has to a local school district.

The law also provides for the appointment of a superintendent of public instruction, assistant superintendents, and such other staff members and employees as necessary. The powers and duties of the superintendents and staff members are also prescribed.

By act of the 55th G.A., under S. F. 377, there was established a centralized printing department, to operate under the control of the State Printing Board. Multilith machines that had been located in the several state offices were assembled in a room on the ground floor of the state office building, for printing of work to be produced for short runs and quick service. Paper and envelope supplies were transferred from the Executive Council to be distributed as requisitioned, on signed orders from each Department.



Governor Loveless appointed Donald M. Statton as Commissioner of Public Safety, effective August 1, 1959, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Russell Brown. Statton is 34, married, father of three daughters; Mary Ann, 5, Jeanmarie, 3, Sara Jane, 3 months; graduate of Boone High School; served in Navy Air Corps. He is a graduate of Drake University with an L.L.B. in 1950. Served three terms as Boone County Attorney; did not run again in 1958. He was Boone City Attorney at the time of appointment and member of firm of Jordan, Statton and Jordan. He is a member of the Evangelical Free Church; has been chairman of the church board; American Legion member; chairman of the board of directors of the Evangelical Free Church Home for the Aged.

Duties of State Department of Public Safety

The Iowa State Department of Public Safety was created by the Forty-eighth General Assembly in 1939 by consolidating several bureaus and divisions under one executive designated as Commissioner of Public Safety. One of the obvious purposes was to facilitate the cooperation and coordination of the law enforcement agencies of counties, cities and towns. In addition, the department directs the law enforcement activities of the State Highway Safety Patrol and functions in the fields of safety education, fire protection, criminal investigations, police radio communications, vehicle registration, driver and dealer licensing, safety responsibility and accident statistics, and other related activities affecting public safety. The activities of the department's various sections are as follows:

Division of Highway Safety Patrol

DAVID G. HERRICK, Cass County, Colonel.

The Iowa Highway Safety Patrol was created by the Forty-sixth General Assembly with a personnel of 53 men. This authorized strength was increased to 128 by the Forty-seventh General Assembly; to 160 by the Fifty-first General Assembly; to 225 by the Fifty-fourth General Assembly; to 275 by the Fifty-seventh General Assembly (1957); and to 300 by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly (1959).

The original duties of the Highway Patrol were to enforce all provisions of the motor vehicle laws relating to the regulation of motor vehicles and laws of the road, with power to arrest without warrant any person or persons committing or attempting to commit within their presence or view a breach of peace or other violation of the law. The Forty-eighth General Assembly broadened the scope of the patrol's powers by providing that they shall have and exercise all the powers of any peace officer of the state. There are, however, certain restrictions on the exercise of their general powers. Patrol duties and restrictions are stated in full in Chapter 80, Code of Iowa, 1958.

Besides enforcing motor vehicle laws and exercising police powers, the members of the Highway Patrol conduct hearings in connection with revocation of operators' and chauffeurs' licenses, and investigate serious accidents occurring upon the highways of the state. Drivers' licenses are issued by uniformed examiners.

Activity of the Highway Patrol has increased steadily in recent years. In 1958, patrolmen traveled 10,843,511 miles and contacted 253,895 drivers on the highways. Of these drivers contacted, 29,440 were motorists who had car trouble or other distress and were assisted by the patrol.

Patrolmen during 1958 issued 31,625 memorandums of warning to drivers. These warnings do not immediately penalize the motorist, but they are marked on his driving record. A series of warnings to a particular driver within a reasonable period may be basis for suspension of his license.

Notifications of illegal or faulty equipment were issued by the patrol in 134,248 cases. Summons tickets issued during the year totaled 49,528 in number. Fines collected in cases where summonses were issued amounted to \$714,040. Stolen property valued at a total of \$290,824 was recovered, and another \$647,054 of privately owned property was saved from destruction by fire, as a result of patrol activity.

Arrests in O.M.V.I. (operating motor vehicle while intoxicated) cases numbered 1,184 during 1958, and 6,979 police demand orders were served. Average patrol strength during the year was 238.

Criminal Investigation Division

TILLMAN A. THOMPSON, Wright County, Chief.


The Criminal Investigation Division is a service organization which cooperates with and supplements the work of local officers of the state of Iowa. It is not a local policing unit but serves the law enforcement officers of counties and municipalities as a central agency to which all may come for help on difficult criminal investigations. It is also charged with responsibility for certain matters involving the internal security of the state of Iowa. In addition, it is called upon to investigate matters involved in the functioning of state government and cooperates with the various elective and appointive officers of the state in all such matters.

There are three main subdivisions of the Criminal Investigation Division, namely, the investigative section, the identification section and the technical laboratory.

The investigative section is concerned with the work of special agents of the division. Upon receiving a request for aid from a duly authorized law enforcement officer, a special agent is given a definite assignment to assist that officer in the investigation of the specific case. Daily reports are required from all special agents and these are carefully studied and reviewed with the special agent, usually before an arrest is made. Investigations conducted by special agents of this division range from cases involving murder, rape, robbery, extortion, bank robbery, etc., and through the entire category of major crime.

The identification section is a huge storehouse of information. Here are kept the fingerprints of over 2,000,000 criminals, a civilian fingerprint for personal identification, files of modus operandi of various classes of criminals including their photographs, a criminal record file which reflects in chronological order each arrest and sentence of the subject and a card index file including the name and all aliases known to have been used by the subject.

The fingerprint files in this division constitute the clearing house of criminal records for the state of Iowa. Under Iowa law, sheriffs and police departments are required to fingerprint those arrested for commission of specific types of law violations and to forward copies of such fingerprints to this division. Fingerprints have long been recognized as the only infallible method of personal identification known to man. As

the fingerprint cards are received, they are classified and searched against the master fingerprint file. If they are identified with a previous record, a complete transcript of the subject's criminal record, as contained in the files of this division, is immediately forwarded to the agency which submitted the fingerprints.

The technical laboratory of the Criminal Investigation Division is a modern crime laboratory which utilizes the aid of science in the solution of crime mysteries which frequently could not be solved in any other way. One of the important services rendered by the laboratory to local officers is the comparison of handwritings, particularly in fraudulent check cases; however, the problems are many and varied. They may involve a question of fraudulent alteration of a document, the restoration of faded or obliterated writings, comparison of typewritten material or possibly a comparison of inks or papers.

Photography is an important tool of the modern trained investigator and the technical laboratory is equipped to handle many photographic problems from "shooting" the crime scene to the use of ultra-violet light in photographing of permanent record invisible stains, invisible writings and alterations on documents, latent fingerprints on multi-colored surfaces, etc.

Other work done in the technical laboratory includes firearms identification, microscopic examination, polygraph tests (lie detector), examination of tool marks, restoration of obliterated serial numbers on metal and examination of glass fractures.

The services of this division include testimony of the special agent and technicians in court. The services of this department of state government are available without charge to all duly constituted law enforcement agencies and the courts of this state upon request as provided by statute.

Division of Radio Communications

BOYD F. PORTER, Polk County, Director.

The Division of Radio Communications of the State Department of Public Safety is charged with the operation of seven police radio stations located at Des Moines, Cedar Falls, Storm Lake, Atlantic, Fairfield, Maquoketa and Belmond and automatic repeater stations at Essex, Ladora, Van Wert, Calmar, Burlington, Lake Park, Moorhead, Merrill, Scranton, Glenwood and Solon. This division operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

This division is also responsible for the installation, maintenance and servicing of the two-way radio equipment in the 296 mobile units (cars) operated by the Iowa Highway Patrol, Division of Criminal Investigation and other state agencies.

Services of the Police Radio Network are available to all municipal and county peace officers within the state. Interstate traffic is also handled by this division for the other 47 states and for peace officer personnel within this state. In addition, special and routine orders for members of the Division of Highway Patrol and Criminal Investigation Division for immediate delivery by the two-way radio.

This division also handles traffic relating to the Federal and State Office of Civil Defense.

Complete files of all broadcasts since the origination of this division are maintained at the Des Moines station.

During 1954, the Radio Communications Division relocated the Atlantic and Fairfield radio stations and completed a new police radio station near Belmond in Wright County. During 1956 this division also built four new repeater stations near Merrill, Glenwood, Scranton and Solon to improve its coverage of the state.

Major activities of the Radio Division during the year of 1958 included broadcasting 3,347 items regarding stolen property and criminal actions; origination of 36,430 messages directed to specific officers or departments; relaying of 11,773 messages to city and county depart-

ments; handling of 11,734 interstate messages; and 598,962 two-way car contacts.

Since 1945, the number of county sheriffs and city police departments served by the Radio Division has increased from 10 to 272.

Division of Fire Protection and Investigation

ED. J. HERRON, Linn County, Fire Marshal.

The duties of the State Fire Marshal are to enforce all laws of the state relating to the suppression of arson, and to apprehend those persons suspected of arson; to investigate into the cause, origin and circumstances of fires; to promote fire safety and reduction of loss by fire through educational methods; to enforce all laws, and the rules and regulations of the Iowa Department of Public Safety, concerned with the storage, transportation, handling and use of flammable liquids, and explosives; the storage, transportation, handling and use of liquefied petroleum gas; the electric wiring and heating, and adequate means of exit in case of fire, from churches, schools, hotels, theatres, amphitheatres, asylums, hospitals, nursing homes, college buildings, lodge halls, public meeting places, and all other structures in which persons congregate from time to time, whether publicly or privately owned; to review the design and regulations for fire escapes and exits; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill each month.

For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the Fire Marshal, suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the State Fire Marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire, he shall cause such person to be arrested.

Reports are required to be made to the State Fire Marshal by the Chiefs of Fire Departments of each and every fire where the fire loss is \$50.00 or more; where there is no established fire department protection, the report is to be made by the Mayor or Township Clerk.

The State Fire Marshal is required to make an annual report of the affairs concerning his office which shall be published and distributed as the reports of other state officers.

Division of Motor Vehicle Registration

JOHN F. CARLSON, Polk County, Director.

Besides maintaining complete records of all motor vehicle licenses and titles issued and revenue collected from such issuance, the Motor Vehicle Registration Division has direct jurisdiction over the licensing and titling of motor vehicles, official vehicles, and non-resident vehicles, and also the issuing of licenses to itinerant merchants.

Residents of the State of Iowa license and title their motor vehicles at the County Treasurer's office in the county in which they live. Official vehicles and vehicles owned by non-residents but domiciled and operated in Iowa are licensed and titled by the Motor Vehicle Registration Division.

The law provides that all revenue from motor vehicle registrations and titles shall go to the state's road use tax fund, with the following exceptions: (1) Three per cent of gross collections to the general fund of the state for expense of the registration division subject to appropriation and balance remaining at end of fiscal year credited to road use tax fund. (2) One per cent of collections to a reimbursement fund from which to pay refunds. (3) Collection fees of 50 cents on each registration, 40 cents on each title and 65 cents on each notation of lien retained by County Treasurer.

Division of Motor Vehicle Dealers' License

D. H. DAY, Franklin County, Director.

The Dealers' License Division of the Department of Public Safety was created by act of the Forty-seventh General Assembly at the request of the automobile dealers for the protection of the buying public, its purpose being to prevent the practice or commission of fraud in the sale, barter, or disposition of motor vehicles at retail in this state, to prevent irresponsible, unreliable or dishonest persons from engaging in the business of selling, bartering or otherwise dealing in motor vehicles at retail in this state and to encourage reliable persons to engage in the business. "Motor Vehicle" means any vehicle subject to registration under the laws of this state.

The Dealers' License Division is further charged with the administration of the dealers Disclosure Law which makes certain specific demands as to the items that must be contained in the dealers "Retail Installment Contract" and the "maximum" finance charges that may be assessed to the purchaser.

All fees and funds for the Dealers' License Division accrue from licenses and transfers of "Motor Vehicle Dealers", are paid into the state treasury monthly, and constitute a separate and distinct fund known as the "Motor Vehicle Dealers License Fee Fund." All expenses incurred in the administration of this division are paid out of said fund in the same manner as other state expenses are paid. Any amount in such fund in excess of ten thousand dollars at the end of any fiscal year is credited to the state general fund.

Safety Responsibility and Drivers' License Division

BRIAN CONNELL, Polk County, Director.

The Safety Responsibility and Drivers' License Division of the State Department of Public Safety was created October 1, 1947, to administer the Motor Vehicle Financial and Safety Responsibility Act enacted by the Fifty-second General Assembly.

During the year 1958, the Department processed 55,914 accidents reporting an estimated loss of nearly 38 million dollars in property damage and bodily injury. A total of 148,618 drivers and owners were involved with 4.6 per cent failing to comply with the Financial Responsibility Act, requiring the Department to institute suspension of their motor vehicle privileges. The percentage of uninsured motorists involved in accidents in Iowa has shown a decrease of nearly 13 per cent since enactment of the Financial Responsibility Act.

The operating privileges of 2,743 drivers were revoked and the privileges of 5,577 were suspended upon traffic convictions. This is an increase of 1,191 over the total for the preceding year.

This division maintains a cumulative permanent record of over 2,000,000 drivers showing all restrictions, violations, accidents, suspensions or revocations against their driving records. Under the Drivers Improvement Program the records of potential problem drivers are reviewed. The driver may be issued an advisory letter, re-examined, interviewed, placed on probation, or his driving privileges may be withdrawn. The records of 76,356 were reviewed during the year; 10,010 drivers were issued advisory letters, 4,651 were re-examined, 1,824 were interviewed, and 1,075 were placed on probation. Drivers' licenses are suspended or denied to those persons who are physically or mentally incompetent to operate a motor vehicle safely.

Research and Statistics Division

CLIFFORD O. SWANSON, Story County, Director.

The Research and Statistics Division was formed August 15, 1957, for the purpose of collecting, organizing, recording, analyzing and applying the results of statistics and information to the best advantage of the various divisions within the department. In addition, such applied research and investigative studies as are deemed advisable for the most proficient operation of various phases of public safety were centered in the division.

A close working relationship has been established with the several state educational institutions, the Iowa State Highway Commission and several national organizations resulting in a more efficient use of the data and information available to the state. Approximately 35 applied research studies and investigations have been completed or were in the process of being completed in 1958, in all areas of public safety.

Motor vehicle fatalities in the state were reduced by 13.3 per cent, injuries by 4.5 per cent and total reportable accidents by 1.9 per cent. This placed Iowa among the top five states in the nation showing the greatest reduction in motor vehicle deaths during 1958, as contrasted to 1957.

Division of Safety Education

FRANK B. ULISH, Webster County, Acting Director.

The Division of Safety Education was created by action of the Forty-eighth General Assembly for the purpose of promoting highway safety through public information and education. Besides carrying out its own program of activities, this division works in cooperation with the National Safety Council, Iowa Safety Council and affiliated local organizations and renders other valuable services in the interests of public safety on our highways.

Fieldmen for the Division of Safety Education travel throughout the state, delivering lectures, showing safety films, giving radio and TV talks and demonstrations; aiding in local safety projects; assisting schools in

setting up and conducting driver education courses, school boy patrols and bicycle safety programs; consulting with city officials on traffic problems; and cooperating with the safety activities of other organizations such as the Parent-Teacher Association, American Legion, Federated Women's Clubs and many others, such as Teen-Age Driving Clubs.

The division produces weekly programs and announcements on radio and television stations; maintains a safety film library and exchange.

Through all media for public information, the division undertakes to keep the people of Iowa informed on accident trends, new traffic legislation and safety precautions. Extensive mailing lists are maintained in this office for the distribution of posters, pamphlets, other safety promotion material and information to schools, organizations and informational media.

Point System

On April 1, 1958, the Iowa Department of Public Safety began assigning number values to various types of traffic law offenses. This was the beginning of what is popularly known as the Point System. Points, from one to ten, were assigned to the records of drivers convicted of traffic violations. The number of points assigned depended upon the seriousness or intent of the violation. The Safety Department used the number of points accumulating on a driver's record as a measure of that driver's need for corrective action, and as a guide to administrative action. When a driver accumulated 10 points, the department took action to suspend his license under authority in section 321.210 of the Motor Vehicle Code. The major effect of the Point System was to impress on drivers the fact that licenses could be and are suspended on the basis of performance. It gave each driver a clear, simple rule by which to measure his own performance. The Point System was introduced as an administrative measure by Russell Brown, Commissioner of the Iowa Department of Public Safety.

The first real estate license law was enacted by the 43rd General Assembly and became effective January 1, 1930. The law was administered by the secretary of state who was designated as real estate commissioner. This law was amended and revised by the 51st General Assembly and among other things provided that as of January 1, 1946, the law would be administered by a five-member commission composed of the secretary of state as chairman and four additional members appointed by the governor with the approval of the Senate.

During the past ten years it has been the administrative policy of the Real Estate department to correct most of the evils in the real estate brokerage business which have developed over many years of uncontrolled practice. This has resulted in elevating the real estate business to a professional status and has tended to encourage men and women in all walks of life to enter this business where income is based on intelligence, initiative and hard work.


While the present law requires a rather complete and comprehensive written examination for all applicants it has not tended to deter or discourage the many people who are endeavoring to get into this business. During the calendar year of 1958 more than 1,000 men and women were examined and as of the end of the first quarter in 1959 nearly 7,200 licenses have been issued. The examinations are held once a month at a specific time and place set by the Commission.

The fees for a Broker's and Salesman's examination are \$10.00 and \$5.00 respectively. The same amount is charged each year for renewal of the license which expires on December 31 of the year of issuance. For

the last audit period the total received from all fees amounted to \$64,000, from which amount \$21,900 was allotted for operational expense and the balance of \$42,100 was left in the general fund as revenue to the state. Since the first years of its operation the department has lived within its income and not required an appropriation.

The department prepares and distributes to the citizens of Iowa a Real Estate Primer which is a basis for the qualifying examination and which has been accepted and used as a textbook by many high schools, colleges and universities in Iowa and many other states. This Primer and the educational institutes held over the state each year have contributed materially in reducing law violations to a minimum and have facilitated the economical and efficient operation of the department.

The department is also charged with the responsibility of regulating and investigating the business conduct of all real estate licenses in their relationship with the public and to hold hearings on formal complaints which contain evidence which would indicate a violation of the law.



On December 2, 1842, the new Stone Capitol was occupied at the opening of the Fifth Legislative Assembly, having been erected at Iowa City as the permanent capitol of the territory. It was used until 1857 when the capital was moved to Des Moines.

Vinton

The Iowa Braille and Sight-Saving School was opened at Iowa City on April 5, 1853. Nine years later (August, 1862) the school was moved to its present location at Vinton.

The Iowa Braille and Sight-Saving School is an educational institution which offers complete educational opportunity to visually handicapped boys and girls from the kindergarten through the high school.

The curricula parallels that found in the best public schools for the fully sighted.

In addition to academic subjects, special emphasis is placed on music, industrial arts and physical education. After satisfactorily completing the four-year high school course, students may enter colleges and universities. The records of those who do so have been excellent.

Supported by appropriations made by the State Legislature, the school is governed by the State Board of Regents. No charges are made for room, board, laundry, tuition and educational supplies. School is in session for a nine months' period.

In September, 1943, a sight-saving department was established to meet the needs of pupils with partial vision. Students in this department study large-type print instead of Braille and do their school work in classrooms especially equipped with excellent lighting, special desks, green chalk boards and other materials designed for this purpose.

The purpose of the Iowa Braille and Sight-Saving School is to prepare its boys and girls to take a contributory place in life. In addition to the regular academic course of study, pupils may enroll in industrial arts, music, home economics and physical education. Parties, dances, swimming, wrestling, band, chorus, track, 4-H Clubs, and skating are a few of the extra activities.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

Council Bluffs

Lloyd E. Berg, Superintendent

The Iowa School for the Deaf was founded in 1855, and was first located at Iowa City and then moved to Council Bluffs in 1870. In 1902, fire completely destroyed the main building, which housed the executive quarters and dormitories for pupils. A substantial fire-proof structure now stands in its place, where sufficient room is provided for 375 pupils.

The school represents a capital investment for the state of \$2,000,000 and occupies 200 acres, with twelve fine buildings and beautiful grounds. There is a separate building to accommodate seventy-five of the youngest pupils. The school affords an education for children of the state too deaf to make progress in the hearing schools. The entrance age is five years and students are required to remain in school until nineteen years of age unless excused for good cause. The work embraces thirteen years with training largely through writing, speech, lip-reading and through the use of hearing aids where possible. The course of study provides a strong elementary education, together with substantial vocational training. The philosophy of the school is to bring the child with impaired hearing as near the normal as possible. Pupils of the school become skilled workmen and graduates, with remarkably few exceptions, are self-supporting, useful citizens of the state. Among the vocations taught are baking, shoe repairing, book-binding, printing, cabinet making and upholstering. Instruction in rhythm is also given, and a well-rounded course in almost everything which will make life more pleasant for those bereft of their hearing.

State University of Iowa

The pioneering vision of the First General Assembly of the State of Iowa created the State University of Iowa by an act adopted on February 25, 1847. During the 112 years since, the University's work has touched and benefited every city, village, and home within the boundaries of Iowa.

The University's objectives have been three-fold: to educate in her classrooms, to advance the frontiers of knowledge through research, and to carry the wealth of knowledge from her libraries, her laboratories, and her learned faculty to the people of Iowa.

Throughout her history, the University has maintained an educational program of the highest integrity as the base for all her activities and the foundation upon which a superstructure of professional, semiprofessional, and graduate education has been erected. The University is a member of the Association of American Universities, an association of forty-one of the outstanding institutions of higher learning in the United States and Canada.

The University has pioneered in liberal education, for both men and women students, and today ranks with the leaders in the general education movement.

Teaching and research functions have been carefully integrated at the University to achieve the greatest efficiency in the teaching and learning processes. Balanced living with proper attention to pleasant housing, maintenance of good health, and recreational, religious, and cultural activities has been provided as no less important to a rounded college experience.

The University Today

From the days when she stood in the midst of Iowa's physical wilderness, the State University of Iowa has been on the world's educational frontier. While the University can point with justifiable pride to many distinguished contributions which its staff and students have made to the well-being of the State of Iowa and to the advancement of knowledge, the search for new knowledge is seldom spectacular in itself and only occasionally will public attention be drawn to some of the hundreds of University researchers who quietly seek to add to man's store of useful knowledge.

International attention has recently been focused on the University, for instance, because of the contributions which SUI physicists made to this nation's satellite program and the International Geophysical Year. To cite yet another example of the University's research efforts, victims of the nervous disorder known as "Parkinson's Disease"—and their doctors—are looking hopefully to SUI's Department of Neurosurgery, where careful tests are being made of a device which utilizes high-frequency sound waves for delicate brain operations. And the recent launching of the American College Testing Program, important though it may ultimately be to hundreds of thousands of college-age youth, is but another milestone in SUI's emergence as an internationally-recognized testing and test-processing center.

To provide instruction, foster research and respond to Iowa's de-

mands for service, the State University of Iowa is organized into ten colleges, four schools, and several bureaus and institutes related to one or more of the colleges. To protect and restore the health of Iowa's people, the University offers the facilities of its Medical Center, which embraces four hospital units—the University General Hospital, Children's Hospital, Psychopathic Hospital, and Hospital School for Severely Handicapped Children—and the State Bacteriological Laboratory.

Enrollment

Prior to World War II, the University stood among the fifteen largest colleges and universities in the country in the total number of different students of college grade enrolled annually. Its growth has proceeded apace with the general upward trend of college enrollment. The University's enrollment of 1,542 different campus students of college grade in 1900-01 rose to 9,283 in 1940-41, forty years later.


Then came the overwhelming influx of the veteran students. During the war, in 1943-44, the campus enrollment of college grade went down to a low of 4,891. Just four years later, 1948-49, the enrollment had risen to 13,354. This pattern is comparable to the experience of other large universities.

The enrollments in higher educational institutions fell away sharply beginning in 1950, due to the decline in the World War II veterans' enrollment of about 40 per cent from the post-war peak and because of the Korean Conflict. However, the lull was anticipated and enrollments continued to decline gradually until the fall of 1954. Since 1954 the enrollment has increased rapidly and in the fall of 1958 a total of 10,516 students were in attendance. This increase is expected to continue past the highest immediate post World War II peaks and will continue to spiral, reaching the pinnacle in the 1960's and possibly the early 1970's. Best estimates today indicate that the University will have in the neighborhood of 13,000 students of college grade on its campus during the fall of 1965-66 and 15,000-16,000 in 1969-70. Forecasts are based on past experience with enrollments with recognition of the influence of the increased birth rate of the war and post-war years and the trend toward the enrollment of higher percentages of the population in higher educational pursuits.

State University of Iowa—Iowa City

It is significant to note that the University usually enrolls from 21 to 23 per cent of the college enrollment in the State of Iowa, and grants about 30 per cent of all the degrees granted by Iowa colleges. This is perhaps the best evidence of the relationship of the University to the total pattern of higher education in the State of Iowa. The University is a partner with the four-year colleges and junior colleges of Iowa in the field of general education—the process of training citizens for good citizenship.

Beyond that level the University provides the professional and specialized programs which provide opportunities for further study at an advanced level for the graduates of junior colleges and four-year colleges, as well as for her own students. In so doing, the University is an integral and indispensable part of the total program of higher education in the State of Iowa.

Public Service

Service to the state stems naturally from the University's teaching and research functions. In addition to the variety of help and service provided by SU's colleges and departments in the course of carrying out their day-to-day work, the University has established specialized teaching and research units which offer additional opportunities for direct service through making direct application of the knowledge garnered in those units.

Some of the principal service units are: The University Hospitals, Psychopathic Hospital, the Iowa Hospital School for Severely Handicapped Children, the State Bacteriological Laboratory, and other affiliated organizations in the medical service field; the Iowa Child Welfare Research Station, the Extension Division with its bureaus of Audio-Visual Instruction and Correspondence Study, the Bureau of Business and Economic Research, the Bureau of Labor and Management; the News and Information Service, the Institute of Hydraulic Research, the Institute of Public Affairs, and the Iowa Center for Continuation Study. The University has more recently added research Institutes in the fields of Agricultural Law, Agricultural Medicine, and Gerontology.

Through the activities of these units, and others, the University serves hundreds of thousands each year, both on and off the campus.

Courses of Study

A minimum of four academic years of study is required for a baccalaureate degree from the College of Liberal Arts with its affiliated schools, and the same time is required for a bachelor's degree from the Colleges of Business Administration and Pharmacy. Engineering requires a minimum of four and one-half years.

Six years of study, two in pre-professional and four in professional study, are required for a degree from the College of Dentistry. Law requires three and one-half years beyond the three years of liberal arts, while seven years are necessary, three in pre-medical and four in medical study, for the degree of Doctor of Medicine. A four-year course in nursing leads to the Bachelor of Science in Nursing and the certificate of Graduate Nurse. A one-year course for Practical Nurses is offered by the College of Nursing. Graduate work in Nursing is available through the Graduate College and College of Nursing.

Advanced degrees from the Graduate College are earned under approved programs of study and research with a minimum of one year required for a master's degree and three for the doctorate.

The various courses of study and the fields of specialization and the degree conferred upon graduation are as follows:

BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION—Accounting, Economics, Labor and Management, Marketing, Office Management and Business Education, and General Business majors lead to the degree Bachelor of Science in Commerce. Graduate work through the Ph.D. is offered.

DENTISTRY—Four-year course, in addition to two years of pre-dental study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree Doctor of Dental Surgery.

Graduate work leading to the degree of Master of Science, from the Graduate College, is available in the fields of Crown and Bridge Prosthesis, Basic Oral Surgery Science, Operative Dentistry, Orthodontics, Pedodontics, Periodontics and Prosthodontics. A course for the training of women in Dental Hygiene is offered.

EDUCATION—Courses for the professional preparation of teachers of the undergraduate level are integrated with the curricula of the Colleges of Liberal Arts and Business Administration and lead to degrees in those colleges. Graduate programs for teachers, principals, supervisors, superintendents, directors of student teaching, and research and teaching positions in higher education lead to the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in the Graduate College.

ENGINEERING—Chemical, Civil, Electrical, and Mechanical Engineering leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in the designated curriculum; and Commercial leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science without designation. In each curriculum certain specialized options may be elected; for example, automotive, industrial, aeronautical, hydraulic, sanitary, structural, communication, power, or metallurgical. Considerable emphasis is placed on graduate work leading to the Master of Science and Ph.D. degrees in Sanitary Engineering, Industrial and Management Engineering and Mechanics and Hydraulics.

LIBERAL ARTS—Actuarial Science, American Civilization, Art, Astronomy, Bacteriology, Biochemistry, Botany, Chemistry, Child Welfare, Chinese, Classics, Economics, Education, English, European Literature and Thought, Geography, Geology, German, Greek, History, Home Economics, Humanities, Hygiene, Journalism, Latin, Library Education, Mathematics, Medical Technology, Museum Training, Music, Occupational Therapy, Oriental Studies, Philosophy, Physical Education, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Religion, Romance Languages (French, Spanish, Italian), Russian, Social Science, Social Work, Sociology and Anthropology, Speech and Dramatic Art, Speech Pathology and Audiology, and Zoology leading to the degree Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Fine Arts or to advanced degrees through the Doctor of Philosophy.

Specialized courses in the Department of Chemistry and the Division of Physical Education lead to the degree Bachelor of Science in the respective fields.

Students who select courses to prepare for dentistry, law, and medicine may study pre-professional subjects in the College of Liberal Arts for the required number of years and then enter the professional college. If all specific requirements for the bachelor's degree are included in the pre-professional program and the first year of professional study is completed successfully, the student may receive a bachelor's degree from the College of Liberal Arts, since the college will give credit for one year of professional work in lieu of the fourth year necessary for a bachelor's degree.

SCHOOL OF FINE ARTS—Combines departments of art, music, and dramatic arts. Students enroll in the College of Liberal Arts or the Graduate College and may be candidates for one of the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Master of Arts, Master of Fine Arts, or Doctor of Philosophy.

SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM—Offers study sequences through the College of Liberal Arts in Community Journalism, Editorial Journalism, Radio Journalism, Television Journalism, Advertising, Magazine Journalism, Pictorial Journalism, and Public Relations. Awards a Certificate of Journalism on basis of scholarship and concentration in the field.

SCHOOL OF RELIGION—In cooperation with the College of Liberal Arts offers a field of concentration leading to Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts, and Doctor of Philosophy degrees. It is inter-faith in nature

and professorships of Catholic, Jewish, and Protestant faiths are maintained by the respective groups.

SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK—Offers a two-year graduate curriculum as preparation for social work. Some undergraduate subjects recommended as preparation for professional training are now being given.

LAW—Three and one-half academic year course, in addition to three years of pre-law study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree LL.B. or J.D.

MEDICINE—Four-year course, in addition to three years of pre-medical study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree Doctor of Medicine.

The College of Medicine offers postgraduate work leading to advanced degrees in the Graduate College. Special training is also offered in Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, and Radiology.

At frequent intervals each year, the College of Medicine also offers postgraduate conferences designed to provide new and refresher information for practitioners in the State of Iowa.

COLLEGE OF NURSING—The degree Bachelor of Science in Nursing and the Graduate Nurse certificate are offered at the conclusion of the four year program, of which the first year is completed in the College of Liberal Arts. Students who have received the Graduate Nurse certificate may enroll for additional work leading to the degree Bachelor of Science in Nursing.

Work is offered through the Graduate College toward the Master's degree in Nursing. A one-year course for Practical Nurses is also offered.

PHARMACY—Four-year course, leading to the degree Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy, including unique training in Hospital Pharmacy. Advanced work through the Ph.D. is also offered.

GRADUATE—Opportunity for study at the graduate level is available in all fields listed above at this time. It is also available in the fields of Child Welfare and Hospital Administration. Such study leads to the degrees Master of Arts, Master of Fine Arts, Master of Science, and Doctor of Philosophy.

CORRESPONDENCE STUDY—Courses at the college level are offered in many of the departments through the Extension Division for students who cannot be in residence but wish to prepare themselves for more effective work in their respective occupations, or who wish to continue work toward degrees while out of residence.

The Campus

Symbolic center of the State University of Iowa's 1,300-acre campus is the Old Capitol, first capitol of Iowa Territory and of the State of Iowa and still one of the state's most beautiful structures in its pioneer simplicity. Some 80 other buildings and facilities about the campus comprise a physical plant valued today at approximately \$57,500,000. It is interesting to note that, as of June 30, 1958, tax funds had provided slightly less than half (47.6 per cent) of building construction costs, gifts had provided nearly one-fifth (18.5), and earnings from self-liquidating facilities had provided one-third (33.9 per cent).

Since the last (1957-58) *Iowa Official Register* was published, the following new construction has been completed at the University:

Medical Research Center, opened in the fall of 1957;

Research Animal Quarters at Oakdale Sanatorium and Medical Laboratories Building, completed in fall of 1957;

Laundry Building, opened in spring, 1958;

Installation of Turbogenerator at University Power Plant, into operation in fall, 1958;

Pressbox at Iowa Stadium, opened in September, 1958;

Burge Hall, dormitory for women, opened in September, 1958;

Baseball bleachers (permanent), completed in fall, 1958;

Budgets for these projects totaled \$7,191,830, of which some \$496,000

was provided by appropriated (tax) funds, the remainder being met from gifts, grants, athletic earnings or anticipated earnings of self-liquidating housing units.

A number of individual repair, replacement and alteration projects have also been completed in the past biennium, financed from legislative appropriations made for this purpose. Many other "RR&A" projects will be undertaken in the current biennium, as the University seeks to preserve its valuable physical plant and meet current needs for modernized instructional space.

During the 1959-61 biennium, work will proceed on the following major construction projects at the State University of Iowa:

Completion of dining facilities at Hillcrest, men's dormitory;

Completion of the first 192 units of Hawkeye Apartments, married student housing project;

(Budgeted at a total cost of \$4,345,000, these two projects will be entirely financed from student board-and-room payments and apartment rentals.)

Law Center (addition to present Law Commons to provide new facilities for College of Law);

Utilities (developing additional water supplies and storage facilities, improve heating plant, renovate steam tunnels and piping);

Addition to University Library;

Additions to Lakeside Laboratory;

Pharmacy Building;

Addition to Chemistry Building;

Student Infirmary addition to Children's Hospital;

Addition to Psychopathic Hospital for Expanded Training Program;

Addition to Psychopathic Hospital for Emotionally Disturbed Children;

(To accomplish the nine immediately preceding projects, a total of \$6,190,000 was appropriated by the 58th General Assembly.)

The Future of the University

Like every other major institution of its kind, the State University of Iowa is faced today with the problem of maintaining quality instruction and research in the face of steadily-rising enrollments, increased competition from industry and government for university-caliber teachers, and a "building deficit" caused by war, depression and too many years of inadequate building funds. This problem is compounded by the need to prepare for vastly-increased numbers of students—conservatively estimated at 16,000 by 1970, or half again as many as are currently enrolled.

The problem of recruiting and maintaining qualified staff members is nation-wide. Given some natural advantages which accrue to employment at the University, SUI can hold its own in relation to most other institutions if salary schedules can be maintained at a competitive level. Both the 57th and 58th General Assemblies recognized this fact and appropriated substantial funds for faculty salary increases, thereby enabling the University to retain some key teachers and putting it into a somewhat better competitive position to recruit new teachers. Any subsequent increases at other institutions, however, will once more reduce the University's ability to compete effectively in the faculty market.

The 58th General Assembly also provided some \$6,190,000 as the first step in meeting accumulated building needs at the University. As the University looks ahead to the increased numbers of young Iowans who will be on its campus by the end of the 1959-61 biennium, by 1965 and by 1970, however, it is obvious that the problem of finding some means of long-range financing for long-range needs must be of paramount concern to this institution, to the government and to the people of the State of Iowa.


Outer Space Research At State University of Iowa

Within hours after America's first satellite shot into orbit on January 31, 1958, President Virgil M. Hancher of the State University of Iowa received a telegram extending President Dwight D. Eisenhower's congratulations to Professor James A. Van Allen, his assistants and several of his students in the State University of Iowa Department of Physics, for the successful functioning of the miniature instruments which the Iowa physicists had designed and built for Explorer I.


Sixteen months after that first historic launching, *Time* magazine wrote in a cover feature on the head of the Iowa physics department, "In the race into space, the Russians can claim bigger satellites and more powerful rockets. If the U.S. can retort that it has a big lead in scientific achievement, the man most responsible is James Van Allen, whose instruments, designed and largely constructed in his basement laboratory, brought back from space discoveries the Russians never made." The laboratory in the basement of the S.U.I. Physics Building *Time* had described earlier in its article as "the most famed space-instrument laboratory in the U.S."

Described as "a key figure in the cold war's competition for prestige," James A. Van Allen is a native Iowan, born (1914) and educated at Mount Pleasant. He took his first work in physics at Iowa Wesleyan College in his hometown, where he earned the Bachelor of Science degree in 1935 before going on to the State University of Iowa to earn M.S. and Ph.D. degrees. Following his graduate study he worked at the Carnegie Institution of Washington and the Johns Hopkins Applied Physics Laboratory before accepting an appointment as head of the S.U.I. Department of Physics in 1950.

. . . delicate instruments

The delicate instruments devised by the Iowa physicists discovered two doughnut-shaped belts of intense radiation encircling the Earth, evidently trapped by Earth's magnetic field. Named the Van Allen radiation belts by other scientists taking part in the International Geophysical Year, they explain the age-old mystery of the Northern Lights and present a deadly hazard to be reckoned with by space travelers.

The Iowa researchers have a long record of interest in and contributions to the science of outer space. Beginning with plastic balloons launched from the running track beside the Iowa Stadium in the early 1950's, the program quickly grew in scope and complexity. Grants from various sources and cooperation with such agencies as the Office of Naval Research and the National Science Foundation made it possible for Dr. Van Allen and his students to launch their instrument-carrying balloons and rockets from ships and from land installations in such far-off places as the Arctic and Antarctic Oceans, Guam and Hudson Bay. Needing some means of getting their instruments higher—closer to the source of cosmic rays—the Iowa scientists devised the "Rockoon," a combination of vehicles in which a balloon lifts the instrument-bearing rocket far above the relatively heavy atmosphere surrounding the earth, after which the rocket is fired by radio signal and carries the instruments much farther than they could otherwise travel out into space. It was this work, and the ultimate limitations of what they might learn through these methods, which led directly to the Iowa scientists' interest in the U.S. satellite research program.

The State University of Iowa's high altitude research program is widely acknowledged as ranking among the leading programs in the world. Students who took part in the far-flung research now hold university or government positions. Others have become specialists in designing and building ingenious, miniature devices which were aboard a total of 113 space vehicles—including five Explorer satellites, three Pioneer lunar probes, balloons and rockets—during the International Geophysical Year (July 1, 1957 to December 31, 1958).

These Iowa scientists will continue to contribute to this unique and important area of research for the years to come.

Iowa State University of Science and Technology

Ames

As America's people flooded westward a century ago an Industrial Revolution was stirring the land. In this pioneering age were ardent supporters of education. But they dreamed of a new sort of education, particularly at the higher levels, which was to be tailored to new times and a great new nation.

Where, heretofore, colleges and universities had confined themselves to classical studies and the training for such professions as teaching, the ministry, medicine and law, it was now proposed that they should meet more directly the practical needs of all citizens. This new education was to be made available at minimum cost to the individual.

Particularly did Americans want emphasis on research and instruction which would increase agricultural production and improve conditions of rural life. Joined with this was an insistence on research and instruction in technology and engineering.

Iowans were believers in this new philosophy. Almost from the beginning of statehood in 1846 they had talked about the establishment of an agricultural college, since agriculture was almost the sole industry on the Iowa prairie more than 100 year ago.

The bill creating such a college was drafted by three young and progressive farmers who were members of the Seventh General Assembly which passed the measure. Benjamin F. Gue was from Scott County, Robert A. Richardson from Fayette County, and Ed Wright from Cedar County.

Governor Ralph P. Lowe signed the bill into law on March 22, 1858, making that the official birthday of the institution.


Meanwhile, in Congress, Justin P. Morrill had been advocating federal aid for the new education. It was his bill, passed by Congress, and signed by President Abraham Lincoln on July 2, 1862, that provided for federal lands to be sold in each state for endowment. In the new colleges the leading object would be "without excluding other scientific and classical studies, and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and the mechanic arts, in such manner as the legislatures of the States may respectively prescribe, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions in life."

Iowa was the first state to accept the provisions of the Morrill Land-Grant Act.

It was a broad charter to make higher education available on a more nearly universal level, and to include areas of study which heretofore had not been taught by the classical colleges and universities.

The Land-Grant idea became an amazing success—it has been called the major contribution of the United States to education—and has been widely approved and copied elsewhere in the world. For 100 years Iowa State has been a leader in Land-Grant affairs. During that time it has blossomed into a scientific and technological university.

Iowa State was the first Land-Grant institution to admit women from

the beginning. It became a pioneer in Home Economics, and today has the largest program in this area to be found anywhere in the world.

Iowa was the first state to establish a school of Veterinary Medicine at one of its state institutions.

Iowa State took the lead in teaching and research in Agriculture. Its faculty almost from the beginning worked with all Iowa through institutes and short courses in various parts of the state. It developed the first pattern of the Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics now used throughout the nation. It began early to work with farm youth in the program that later became 4-H.

In Engineering Iowa State was the first (with Illinois) to organize its research into an Engineering Experiment Station, and it developed one of the large and fine engineering schools of the nation.

In Science it achieved wide fame in the physical and biological sciences. During World War II, Iowa State scientists solved some key problems in the production of uranium as part of the nationwide atomic bomb project. Following the war the United States Atomic Energy Commission located a major laboratory on the campus as a part of the Iowa State Institute for Atomic Research.

As Iowa State opened its second century in 1959, recognition came in various ways, attesting the record of the past 100 years.

Near Ames the 16 million dollar Animal Disease Research Laboratory was near completion. The Laboratory is part of the United States Department of Agriculture, and will be operated by the department. However, its location at Ames was attributed in no small part to the outstanding record in science—particularly animal science and veterinary medicine—which Iowa State had achieved. Moreover, the library at Iowa State has an outstanding collection of scientific journals, especially in the area of veterinary medicine and sciences pertaining thereto.

When the Animal Disease Research Laboratory reaches full operation several years hence, it will employ several hundred scientists, technicians and helpers.

The United States Atomic Energy Commission plans soon to add six million dollars in new buildings to the Ames Laboratory of the Commission. Included in the building program is a metals processing building to further the outstanding program of metallurgy at the Laboratory, and a nuclear reactor to aid various research programs.


During the year 1958, Iowa State, while still a college, became a university. In March it was invited to join the Association of American Universities, which has a total of 41 members. In its own words, the association "approved an increase in its membership by the inclusion of a limited number of institutions of national prominence with a sound and proven record in the fields of scholarship and teaching."

During the summer of 1958 Iowa State was elected to membership in the National Association of State Universities.

By act of the Iowa General Assembly the institution officially became Iowa State University of Science and Technology on July 4, 1959. In its early days it had been known as "Iowa State Agricultural College and Farm" and in 1896 its name had been changed to "Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts." The change to the title of Iowa State University came as a recognition that in its program of education and research in various sciences it had, in fact, attained the scope and function of a university.

The University has recently made some notable advances in the modern equipment needed for today's teaching and research programs. Largely through a grant of \$150,000 from the United States Atomic Energy Commission it was able to purchase a teaching reactor which is to be used for the most part in the graduate curriculum of nuclear engineering, but is also available for experimental work.

With the aid of grants from the National Science Foundation and from the Alumni Achievement Fund of Iowa State, a high-speed digital computer was constructed. Such computers have become an absolute

necessity in solving the complicated and lengthy mathematical problems involved in present-day research. The machine is a valuable addition to the University's computing center.

A grant of \$450,000 received in 1958 from the Kellogg Foundation will support the program for the Center for Agricultural Adjustment which will enable the University to undertake pioneer work in this important new area. This program, aimed at helping agriculture adjust to economic growth, has created national interest.

The Center is being established primarily for the purpose of providing solutions for adjustment problems which will lead to:

- (1) Incomes for people engaged in agriculture which are on par with those received in other industries; and
- (2) The benefits of improved agricultural technological developments being fully realized by consumers.

These studies will involve more than just adjustments to agriculture. They must of necessity involve other segments of our economy as well as agriculture.

The second century, as did the first, will see Iowa State University striving for excellence in the three areas of teaching research and extension services—areas in which it is charged with responsibility under the mandate of the General Assembly.

The most important assignment of the University is to educate young people for useful lives. They must be educated, first of all, to become good citizens, with a solid grasp of the social, economic and political problems of the day, but they must also be scientists, engineers, agriculturists and home economists of the stature which will bring them to leadership in their respective professions.

Learning advances through research, and as its second responsibility the University conducts a broad research program for the benefit of agriculture, industry and the home.

The Land-Grant Colleges and Universities have been from the start the leaders in taking programs of education to the people on the farms, in factories and places of business, and in the homes. Iowa State has been in the forefront of this work.

Academic Program

A quick review of the areas in which the University gives major emphasis can be gained from the following list of curricula leading to the degree Bachelor of Science, and now offered.

AGRICULTURE—Agricultural Business (with options in Farm Management, Marketing Industries, Agricultural Economics, Public Service and Administration), Agricultural Education, Agricultural Engineering, Agricultural Journalism, Agronomy, Animal Husbandry, Dairy Husbandry, Dairy Industry (with options in Chemistry or Economics), Entomology, Farm Operation, Fish and Wildlife Management, Food Technology, Forestry (with options in Forest Management and Wood Utilization), Horticulture, Industrial Education, Landscape Architecture, Plant Pathology, Poultry Husbandry, Rural Sociology.

ENGINEERING—Aeronautical Engineering, Agricultural Engineering, Architectural Engineering, Ceramic Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Electrical Engineering, Industrial Engineering, Mechanical Engineering.

HOME ECONOMICS—Applied Art, Child Development, Food and Nutrition (with majors in Dietetics, Experimental Foods or Community Nutrition), Home Economics for General Education, Home Economics Journalism, Home Economics and Related Science, Home Economics Education, Home Management, Household Equipment, Institution Management (with majors in College Food and Housing, Administration, Restaurant Management or School Food Service), Textiles and Clothing, Textiles and Clothing Merchandising.

SCIENCE AND HUMANITIES—Bacteriology, Botany, Chemical Technology, Chemistry, Economics or Sociology, Foreign Trade and Service, Genetics, Geology, Government, History, Industrial Administra-

tion, Industrial Psychology, Mathematics, Naval Science, Physical Education for Men, Physics, Statistics, Technical Journalism, Zoology. (Also special programs in preparation for human medicine and preparation for veterinary medicine.)

In addition, the college offers studies leading to the degree of Bachelor of Architecture (five-year program) and Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (six-year program), and offers graduate courses leading to the degrees of Master of Sciences and Doctor of Philosophy.

For the benefit of students unable to spend four years or more in college study special programs are offered which may be terminated in less time and for which a certificate of completion is offered. These programs include Dairy Plant Operation, and several two-year programs leading to the certificate in Technical Agriculture. These two-year programs are in the following departments: Agriculture Business, Agronomy, Animal Husbandry, Entomology, Farm Operation, and Fish and Wildlife Management.

Research Program

Research at the University is organized within six units, each of which has a responsibility in a particular area:

THE IOWA AGRICULTURAL AND HOME ECONOMICS EXPERIMENT STATION conducts research on the campus at Ames and at farms near Ames and Ankeny, as well as in outlying farms and experimental plots in major soil areas of the state.

THE IOWA ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION has as its objectives to foster and develop the industries of Iowa through engineering research, to aid in the development of raw materials and natural resources of the state, to increase utilization of agricultural by-products, and to aid in the solution of engineering problems for industry and for the state and local governments.

THE INDUSTRIAL SCIENCE RESEARCH INSTITUTE provides fundamental facts and principles which underlie the successful solution of agricultural and industrial problems of Iowa.

THE INSTITUTE FOR ATOMIC RESEARCH includes the Ames Laboratory of the United States Atomic Energy Commission where basic research is conducted in the field of nuclear energy.

THE STATISTICAL LABORATORY is a cooperative project with the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the United States Department of Agriculture, and has developed techniques of great assistance to modern research.

THE VETERINARY MEDICAL RESEARCH INSTITUTE works on problems of controlling or eradicating disease in food producing animals.

Extension Services


THE COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE IN AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS is part of a nationwide Extension Service operating through the United States Department of Agriculture. In addition to several hundred paid employees, nearly 50,000 volunteers each year assist in carrying extension activities to every county in Iowa. In a single year information from the Extension Service results in changed practices on more than 125,000 Iowa farms, and 70,000 homes.

ENGINEERING EXTENSION operates in the fields of public service, industry, technology and engineering. It conducts vocational-educational training for persons in semi-technical or technical positions for which an engineering degree is not required. It carries on professional education for engineers, executives and supervisory personnel of industry. It gives specific advisory and information assistance to Iowa industries, municipalities, associations and citizens.

In addition, the University maintains public services such as its radio and television stations which devote large portions of their programming to education and public service features, and its largely self-supporting seed testing laboratory and soil testing laboratory.

A further public service are the 100 or more special short courses and conferences held on the campus each year,

Iowa State College played a leading part during World War II in the basic research which resulted in the large-scale release of atomic energy. The Iowa State Board of Education felt that the College should maintain this leadership after the war; therefore, in November 1945 the College was authorized to establish the Iowa State College Institute for Atomic Research. The Institute was set up as a separate budgetary division of the College and operates in a manner similar to the graduate school and experiment stations.

In May 1947, the United States Atomic Energy Commission formally announced the location of one of its major research facilities at Ames, to be known as the Ames Laboratory and to operate as an integral part of the Institute for Atomic Research.


The principal objectives of the Institute are to maintain research programs in the basic sciences, to conduct pioneering-type development work, and to contribute fundamental knowledge basic to the release, effects, and utilization of atomic energy. The research programs are administered under five categories: chemistry, physics, metallurgy, engineering and biology.

600 Are Employed Here . . .

The Ames Laboratory employs nearly 600 persons, of whom about 150 are graduate students in chemistry, physics, metallurgy and engineering. Fifty group leaders form the nucleus of the research staff, often sharing their time with the various departments on the Iowa State Campus. The annual budget of over \$4,000,000 is primarily supported by Federal funds provided through the Atomic Energy Commission.


The facilities of the Institute include four buildings; two of these, the Synchrotron Building and the Office and Laboratory Building were built by Iowa State. The Research Building and the Metallurgy Building were built with funds from the Atomic Energy Commission.

The major contribution of the Ames Project to the wartime effort was the production of over 1,000 tons of uranium metal between 1942 and 1944. The project developed processes for producing pure uranium and thorium metal, and these processes are still being used in industry for large scale production of these metals. Furthermore, as a result of the research effort, considerable basic information was obtained on uranium, thorium, plutonium and the fission products. Information important to reactor design and the large-scale separation of plutonium was obtained.


A number of scientists trained at Ames were assigned responsible positions at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, Hanford, Washington, and Los Alamos, New Mexico, as these installations took over various phases of the work.

The Ames project was mentioned in the original report of the Secretary of War as one of the four outstanding university projects in the atomic bomb program, and was presented the Army-Navy E Award with four stars.

Since the war years, many significant developments have resulted from research in the Institute. The rare-earth separation processes have been developed to the point where they have been taken over by industry. Methods for making metals from the salts have been developed for these rare earths. Basic research is continuing on the new metals, and applications for them are being found in the atomic energy program. Research on thorium resulted in the production of more than 100 tons of this metal. A method was developed for the production of yttrium and more than 18,000 pounds of this metal was produced for use in important atomic energy programs. Further progress is continuing in the fields of chemistry, physics, metallurgy, engineering, and biology.

Iowa State Teachers College

Cedar Falls

The State of Iowa maintains at Cedar Falls an institution of higher education whose primary function is the preparation of teachers, supervisors, and administrators for the schools of the state. The Iowa State Teachers College has the additional function of assisting in the maintenance and further development of an effective system of public education throughout the state.

The institution had its origin from an act of the Sixteenth General Assembly creating the Iowa State Normal School at Cedar Falls and instruction began on September 6, 1876. Not until 1904 was the institution authorized to offer a four-year curriculum and the bachelor's degree. In 1909 the name of the institution was changed to Iowa State Teachers College.


The enrollment of 3483 full-time students during the fall semester of 1958 represents an increase of 56% since the fall of 1953. Ordinarily, 30% to 35% of the undergraduate students plan to become elementary teachers; 50% to 55%, secondary teachers; 10%, specialists in such areas as teachers of art or music and school librarians; and only 5% to 8% plan for careers other than in the field of education. Enrollment of graduate students amounts to 4% to 6% of the total enrollment during the academic year but increases to approximately 35% during the summer session. From 80% to 85% of each year's graduates begin to teach within a short time after graduation; the vast majority teach in Iowa public schools.

(1) Undergraduate education

At the undergraduate level the college prepares teachers for all instructional positions common to the public schools of Iowa. All curricula are four years in length and the successful completion of any undergraduate curriculum leads to the bachelor of arts degree. Two curricula are available for prospective elementary school teachers: the lower elementary, which includes the kindergarten and grades 1, 2, and 3; and the upper elementary, encompassing grades 4, 5, and 6. A special curriculum is available for those who desire to teach at the junior high school level—grades 7, 8, and 9. High school teachers are prepared in the following areas: business education, geography, English, foreign languages, home economics, industrial arts, mathematics, music, physical education (for both men and women), safety education, school librarian, science, social science, and speech.

Each undergraduate curriculum for the education of teachers has three parts: (a) the general education program, designed to improve the student as a person and as a citizen; (b) work in areas of specialization, designed to give depth of understanding in one or more subject-matter areas necessary for success as a teacher, and (c) the profession-education program, designed to assist the prospective teacher in developing knowledge of the teaching-learning process of the school as

a social institution, and of materials and methods of instruction, as well as skill in actual teaching in the public schools.

The general education program consists of a common core of courses, amounting to approximately three-eighths of the four-year program, with work in social science, science and mathematics, the humanities, and communication skills.

The professional education program, amounting to about one-sixth of the four-year program for prospective high school teachers and about one-fourth for those who plan to teach at the elementary or junior high school levels, provides for study and practical experiences in the art of teaching and in the understanding of children and the modern school.

The college maintains the Malcolm Price Laboratory School primarily to provide opportunities for students to observe children in classroom situations and to see how good teachers handle specific teaching problems. The laboratory school enrolls some 800 students of the Cedar Falls community school system.

A curriculum laboratory contains instructional materials from all over the nation, as well as audio-visual aids, and is widely used by students and teachers. A very limited number of students do their student teaching in the laboratory school. Most student teaching is done in affiliated public schools—Waterloo, Independence, Mason City, Charles City, Fort Dodge, Newton and the Iowa Braille and Sight-Saving School at Vinton.

The work in the area of specialization seeks to provide the depth in one or more fields deemed necessary for teaching in this subject at a specified level.

(2) Graduate education

Since 1952, the college has offered graduate work leading to the master of arts in education degree. Curricula are available for elementary teachers and for secondary teachers of art, business education, English, mathematics, music, industrial arts, speech, science, and social science, and for such school administrative positions as superintendent, principal, supervisor and counselor.

(3) In-Service education

The college feels that it has a definite responsibility to assist school administrators and teachers throughout the state with instructional and administrative problems. To do this, many conferences are held on the campus each year; some thirty pamphlets, monographs, and books have been published and are distributed at cost; staff members serve as consultants at workshops and conferences; by radio and television a dozen programs are broadcast each week; and extension classes and opportunities for correspondence study are made available to teachers in service.

Most significant is the program of consultant services to the schools of the state. Under this program, staff members are freed for a semester from their regular departmental duties and schedule to visit those schools that have asked for assistance. In addition to the aid given to the school system, this program provides an excellent opportunity for members of the college staff to keep in touch with the public schools.

Iowa State Teachers College is primarily a residential college; nearly one-half of the men students and five-sixths of the women live on campus. Although there are fraternities and sororities, these organizations are not permitted to maintain houses. Extra curricular activities of both the recreational and educational types are available at all seasons of the year.

Iowa's Public Junior College System

The first public junior college in Iowa was organized as a department of the public schools of Mason City, and began operations in September, 1918. It was established without legal sanction, as there was no law on the statute books at the time authorizing the organization of junior colleges as a part of the public school system.

Two years later Burlington Junior College was organized. From there on, the movement spread rapidly until by 1930, thirty towns in Iowa had organized junior colleges as a part of their public school systems. The junior college movement in Iowa reached its crest in 1927, during which year nine were added to the list. After 1930, no more junior colleges were added until 1946, when Clinton Junior College was organized. Keokuk Community College followed in 1953.

To be considered comprehensive in function, a junior college should encompass the following areas:

Academic: Each junior college should provide the first two years of senior college work for the students who plan a transfer to a senior college after completion of two years in junior college. This training should be broad enough to include the first two year requirements in the liberal arts, scientific, engineering, and professional fields.

Terminal Education: A complete training should be given those who will finish their period of formal education in the junior college. This training commonly referred to as terminal education should be designed to achieve occupational competence, civic competence, and personal adequacy.

Adult Education: Every junior college should co-operate with other educational institutions in providing instruction to meet the needs of adults living in the community. The program of training should include cultural and vocational education.

Guidance, Counseling, Testing: Another important function of public community or junior colleges is that of furnishing an adequate testing and guidance program for students enrolled in the institution. Such a program will tend to encourage those who can profit from additional college work to go on to a four-year institution of higher learning for the two additional years needed to acquire a Bachelor of Arts degree, or in one of the professional fields.

Private Colleges and Universities

In addition to its three state institutions of higher learning, Iowa has a large number of liberal arts colleges and universities which are material factors in making this state stand first in literacy and intelligence. There are few places in Iowa more than 40 to 50 miles distant from some institution of higher learning well fitted by curriculum and faculty to teach those things which lead to the higher and better life and provide the education that makes for culture and higher citizenship.

Besides the colleges giving four-year courses, Iowa provides that Junior Colleges may be created and conducted by any community that accepts the provisions as set up in the law. Thus many students take two years of advanced learning, before going on for further work in a four-year institution.

Private colleges of Iowa which are fully accredited and offer four-year liberal arts courses are the following, arranged alphabetically:

Buena Vista College, Storm Lake

Interest in education was manifested by the Presbyterians of northwest Iowa from the time of the early settlements. The beginnings of Buena Vista College may be traced to an academy originally established at Calliope, near Hawarden, and later relocated at Fort Dodge. In 1886 the academy was reorganized as the Fort Dodge Collegiate Institute and was operated as such for some years. After several years, a decision was reached to establish a college at Storm Lake. On July 8, 1891, a committee representing the Presbyteries of Fort Dodge and Sioux City met in Storm Lake and formally organized and incorporated Buena Vista College. At its next meeting, the Synod of Iowa unanimously adopted the college as its own. The college is under the control of the United Presbyterian church.

Briar Cliff College, Sioux City

Briar Cliff College, a four-year college for women, is conducted by the Sisters of St. Francis of the Holy Family of Dubuque, Iowa. The college began its first scholastic year September 18, 1930.

Central College, Pella

Central College, at Pella, was opened in 1853 as a Baptist church institution. Dominic Scholte, leader of a colony of 800 from the Netherlands to Pella, donated the land for the campus. In 1916 the sponsorship of the school was transferred to the Reformed church in America, which has continued its support as a Christian, liberal arts college, open to students of all denominations.

Clarke College, Dubuque

Clarke College, the first four-year liberal arts college for women west of the Mississippi, dates back to 1843. Formerly called Mount St. Joseph College, Clarke was renamed in 1929 to honor its foundress and the foundress of the community which conducts the college, the Sisters of Charity, B.V.M. Clarke's eight buildings are spread over a 50-acre campus on one of Dubuque's seven hills.

Chicago Evangelistic Institute, University Park

Chicago Evangelistic Institute at University Park was organized in Chicago in 1910. In the summer of 1951, it was moved to University Park, Iowa. The college is an accredited member of the Accrediting Association of Bible Institutes and Bible Colleges, Collegiate Division. The Accrediting Association is a constituent of the American Council of Education. The college is interdenominational, coeducational and is a Bible College, offering courses leading to the Bachelor of Arts Degree in Bible and the Bachelor of Music Degree.

Coe College, Cedar Rapids

Coe College was founded in 1851 by the Rev. William Jones, a clergy-

man who opened a school in his home. The original enrollment of 16 received the basic liberal arts courses—a tradition that Coe has never abandoned.

Operating fitfully as the "Cedar Rapids Collegiate Institute" and the "Parsons Seminary," the college received from Daniel Coe, a Pennsylvania farmer, money needed to buy an 80 acre tract of land. Other endowments followed, and later, in 1879, the college was incorporated as Coe College.

A coeducational college, Coe maintains an informal relationship with the Presbyterian Church. Enrollment during the past few years has averaged over 750, and the college has gained the reputation of being one of the finest independent liberal arts colleges in the Midwest.

Cornell College, Mount Vernon

Cornell College, Mount Vernon, Iowa, founded in 1853, is a coeducational, liberal arts college with an enrollment of 760 students. Cornell has a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa and six other national honor societies. An honors program and advanced standing for students of superior ability are recent additions to the college program. Although the college is related to the Methodist church, it is non-sectarian in student body and staff. The campus consists of 29 buildings on a wooded hill-top.

Drake University, Des Moines

Drake University, at Des Moines, was established in 1881 and named after Governor Francis Marion Drake of Centerville. The university is an independent, non-tax-supported school and includes nine colleges: liberal arts, business administration, education, fine arts, pharmacy, community, law school, Divinity school, and graduate division. The university grants nine undergraduate and seven graduate degrees. Home of the famous Drake Relays, the school has a campus of about 35 acres in northwest Des Moines.

University of Dubuque, Dubuque

The University of Dubuque now in its second century was founded in 1852 as a Theological School. It is now a fully accredited College of Liberal Arts and Theological Seminary with separate student bodies living on the same campus. First known as The German Theological School for the Northwest, it has been and is now actively affiliated with the United Presbyterian Church U. S. A.

Grinnell College, Grinnell

Grinnell College, at Grinnell, is the oldest four-year liberal arts college west of the Mississippi river. In 1846 it was founded as Iowa College at Davenport by the "Iowa Band," a group of young Congregational ministers who came to Iowa as missionaries in 1843. In 1859 Iowa College merged with Grinnell University, founded in 1856, at Grinnell. The two continued as Iowa College until 1909, when the present name was adopted. Grinnell is privately endowed, non-sectarian, and coeducational.

Iowa Wesleyan College, Mount Pleasant

Iowa Wesleyan College, older than nearly four-fifths of the present colleges in the United States, was first organized as the Mount Pleasant Literary Institute in 1842 and reorganized the following year as the Mount Pleasant Collegiate Institute, and is the oldest college in Iowa having a continuous history from the time it was founded. The college has always been under the control of the Methodist church. The name was changed to Iowa Wesleyan University in 1849 and to Iowa Wesleyan College in 1911.

Loras College, Dubuque

Loras College, a Catholic church institution, at Dubuque, developed from St. Raphael's seminary founded in 1839. The school is under the supervision of the archbishop of the Dubuque archdiocese. The college

has one of the largest private libraries in the state, over 119,000 volumes. Iowa's oldest college, Loras has an enrollment of 1,270 students.

Luther College, Decorah

Luther College, at Decorah, was founded in 1861 as a college for men, and become coeducational in 1936. It is a college of the Evangelical Lutheran Church. The historical record of Norwegian pioneers in Iowa and elsewhere in the United States is preserved in notable collections in Koren Library and in the Norwegian-American Historical Museum maintained by the college.

Marycrest College, Davenport

Marycrest College, founded in 1939 as the women's division of St. Ambrose College, became an independent four-year liberal arts college for women in 1954. Marycrest is now conducted as a corporate unit under the direction of the Sisters of the Humility of Mary.

Morningside College, Sioux City

Morningside College at Sioux City was founded by the Methodist church, by merging the University of the Northwest of Sioux City and the Charles City College in 1894. It has ten modern buildings on a 23-acre campus.

Parsons College, Fairfield

Parsons College, at Fairfield, was founded in 1875, under the endowment fund provided in the will of Lewis C. Parsons (1793-1855). It is affiliated with the United Presbyterian church. The first class was graduated in 1880.

Simpson College, Indianola

Simpson College, at Indianola, named in honor of Methodist Bishop Matthew Simpson, will celebrate its centennial in 1960. A four-year, coeducational Christian Liberal Arts institution affiliated with the Methodist Church, Simpson emphasizes highly personalized education believing that, in general, education is creative and effective in proportion as it is personal. A new curriculum at Simpson called the "Vital Center" currently is being praised by educational leaders.

St. Ambrose College, Davenport

St. Ambrose College, Davenport, is a four year Liberal Arts college for men, founded in 1882 under the auspices of the Roman Catholic diocese of Davenport. 1939-1954: Corporate unit of St. Ambrose College. Since 1954: Accredited by North Central as independent College, a four-year Liberal Arts College for women, operated by the Sisters of Humility of Mary, of Ottumwa, Iowa.

Upper Iowa University, Fayette

Upper Iowa University was founded in 1857. An independent, non-tax supported liberal arts college with strong programs in Education, Music, the Sciences and Business. Four new buildings since 1955. Located in the beautiful Northeast Iowa hills. An outstanding faculty employing Christian higher education in an independent college.

Wartburg College, Waverly

Wartburg College is a coeducational liberal arts college of the American Lutheran church. It offers courses leading to the degrees: Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Science in Education. It is a member of the North Central Association of colleges and secondary schools, of the American Association of colleges for teachers education, of the National Council on social work education, and member of the National Association of schools of music. Its origin dates back to 1852.

Westmar College, Le Mars

Westmar College, at LeMars, formerly known as Western Union College, merged with York College 1955, sponsored by The Evangelical United Brethren Church. Has 32 buildings on campus of 42 acres; founded 1890.

Upper Iowa University, Fayette, Iowa

Upper Iowa University was founded in 1857. An independent, non-tax supported liberal arts college with strong programs in Education, Music, the Sciences and Business. Four new buildings since 1955. Located in the beautiful Northeast Iowa hills. An outstanding faculty employing Christian higher education in an independent college.

William Penn College, Oskaloosa

William Penn College, at Oskaloosa, operated under the auspices of the Society of Friends, was opened in September, 1873. Following the destruction of the first building by fire in 1916, several new buildings were erected on a 30-acre campus near the original site.

The board of social welfare was created by act of the Forty-seventh General Assembly in 1937. The Forty-eighth General Assembly amended the original law by enacting legislation relating to membership, salary, terms of office and removal from office of its members.

The board of social welfare has authority to administer state and federal funds appropriated by the federal social security law and the Iowa Legislature for old age assistance, aid to the blind, child welfare services, aid to dependent children and emergency relief.

Under the terms of the law, county social welfare boards, also bipartisan, are appointed by the county boards of supervisors. The county welfare boards receive applications for assistance from needy aged and blind in the various counties and make recommendations for assistance to the state board. Further enactment of the Forty-eighth General Assembly provided for the administration of funds made available to the counties for emergency relief, and relating to relief labor and the powers and duties of the boards of supervisors in connection therewith. The county boards also cooperate with the state board in giving service to neglected and dependent children.

The board of social welfare is required to cooperate with the federal government according to the provisions of the federal social security law, to make reports to the federal social security board on administration of assistance, and the federal children's bureau of the U. S. department of labor on its services to children.

The division of child welfare will carry on services to children in the State of Iowa except those performed by the institutions under the jurisdiction of the board of control.



**PUBLIC WELFARE PROGRAMS
OF ASSISTANCE AND SERVICE**

State-wide monthly aid to needy persons in Iowa is provided under the programs of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children. A plan for Aid to Disabled was approved by the General Assembly effective July 4, 1959, with first payments to be made early in 1960. The State Department of Social Welfare also administers, through its 99 county offices, the Remedial Blind program and Child Welfare Services.

Through these programs cash payments are provided on a need basis to individuals meeting specific eligibility requirements. As of June 1, 1959, there were 35,385 recipients of Old Age Assistance, 1,442 Aid to Blind recipients, and 8,626 families including 31,891 individuals receiving Aid to Dependent Children benefits. For the twelve months ending June 30, 1959, the cost of assistance payments to recipients was \$44,664,780.51; this included payments for medical care, paid directly to doctors and druggists on behalf of these recipients for the first six months of 1959. Of this total, approximately 61.2 percent was paid from federal funds, 32.7 percent from state funds, and 6.1 percent from county funds.

In Iowa, approximately 12 out of each 100 persons past 65 years received Old Age Assistance. About 7,000 or approximately 20 percent, of these recipients are being cared for in private nursing homes.

In addition to regular assistance payments the state provided funeral expenses for Old Age Assistance recipients totalling \$325,496.91. The state and counties shared equally the \$1,918.23 approved for funerals of children in Aid to Dependent Children families. Funeral expenses for Aid to Blind recipients totaled \$5,058.00, of which the state paid three-fourths and the counties one-fourth.

The Remedial Blind program, costing \$65,659.35 for the year, provided medical and hospital services to needy individuals of all ages requiring specialized treatment to restore vision or prevent blindness. The state pays three-fourths and the counties one-fourth of the total costs.

Effective July 4, 1959, an act of the legislature placed in the hands of the department responsibility for providing general relief to Indians living in settlements within the state, and made an appropriation of \$10,000 annually for this purpose.

The legislature, through the State Department of Social Welfare, has provided for its needy aged, blind, and dependent children families with financial assistance and services which have contributed effectively to the welfare of these economically deprived groups. The addition of the Aid to Disabled program will give Iowa a complete program of assistance as provided under the Federal Social Security Act.



**Information on State Fair**

For over 100 years, the Iowa State Fair has been gaining steadily in size, prestige and public service. Today, it is nationally recognized as America's greatest agricultural and livestock fair. Situated in the heart of the world's wealthiest agricultural empire, it is the focal point each year for exhibitors of the finest livestock and farm products. In attendance, too, it stands in the front rank of the great educational and entertainment expositions on the North American continent.

The Iowa State Fair, the original "State Fair" of a best-selling novel and of two hit motion pictures, is held in Des Moines each year. It runs for 10 days, starting in late August and sometimes carrying into the first few days of September. Attendance each year now runs over 500,000.

The livestock show, largest of its kind in America, attracts over 8,000 of the finest farm animals from 20 leading agricultural states. The 4-H and F.F.A. shows, state-wide congresses of farm young people's organizations and their livestock and projects, add to the fame of the fair. Other major educational features include the corn and small grain show, farm machinery exposition, flower and garden show, art salon, photographic salon, school exposition, women's exposition, harness and

saddle horse show, culinary and needlework departments, and the fish and game exhibit.

From the huge State Fair grandstand, one of the finest amphitheaters in the nation, fairgoers witness a varied series of spectacles and events, including national championship auto races, midwest circuit horse races, thrill day stunts, musical extravaganzas, fireworks and circus acts.

The first and second Iowa State Fairs were held in Fairfield, Iowa, in 1854 and 1855. From 1856 to 1879, the State Fair moved from city to city. It was held in Muscatine in 1856 and 1857; Oskaloosa, 1858 and 1859; Iowa City, 1860 and 1861; Dubuque, 1862 and 1863; Burlington, 1864-1866; Clinton, 1867 and 1868; Keokuk, 1869, 1870, 1874 and 1875; and Cedar Rapids, 1871, 1873 and 1876-1878.

In 1879 the State Fair moved to Des Moines to stay. In 1884 the Legislature appropriated \$50,000 to purchase a state fairgrounds, on condition that the city of Des Moines raise an equal amount for buildings and facilities. The city concurred, and Iowa thus became the second state in the Northwest to acquire a permanent site for its fair.

In 1923 the General Assembly changed the former method of fair administration by providing for an Iowa department of agriculture and a state fair board, and giving this board the duty of managing the fair and the custody of the fairgrounds. Under this law, the fair board comprises one director from each congressional district. These directors together with the president and vice president of the fair, are elected at the annual midwinter session of the state agricultural convention. Immediately after that convention, the state fair board elects its secretary and its treasurer.

All operating expense, maintenance and other costs of the fair are paid out of fair receipts, except where the Legislature may deem it advisable to make a special appropriation for such purposes. The law provides that the state will not be liable for any expenses or liabilities incurred by the fair.

Since 1902 the Legislature has appropriated \$1,130,500 for the construction of permanent buildings on the fairgrounds, purchase of additional land and for necessary improvements. In recent years, however, the State Fair has used only its own revenues for these purposes. Altogether, since 1902, the fair itself has expended \$3,621,087 for maintenance and improvements from actual profits of the fair. One of the latest major building projects financed by fair funds is the new fireproof 4-H Girls' dormitory, on which construction was begun in the spring of 1949. It was formally opened and presented to the Girls 4-H Club for their use at the 1950 Iowa State Fair. Another is the beautiful new Radio and Television Center providing studios for programs originating on the grounds as well as established programs featuring well known announcers and entertainers. This building was built and in use in 1956. Premiums, amounting to over \$190,000 a year, are also provided by the fair for winners in exhibits and contests.

How the State Fair has grown during over 100 years of progress can best be shown by comparing statistics on the first fair of 1854 and the average figures for the 1957 and 1958 fairs:

Duties of State Tax Commission

The state tax commission was established in 1929 and was originally known as the state board of assessment and review. The duties of the commission as fixed by law include the supervision of the assessment system of the state, and the assessment of public utilities, including railroads, telephone and telegraph lines, pipe lines, water works, transmission lines and plants producing electricity.

In addition to these duties the commission administers the individual and corporation income tax, sales and use tax, chain store tax, cigarette tax, beer and inheritance taxes and many other minor activities.

The total collection of taxes received by the tax commission for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1956, aggregated \$123,607,665.


In addition to duties in relation to the assessment and collection of taxes, the commission also administers the provisions of the homestead credit act, under which more than 24 and three-quarter million dollars annually is now being credited upon the real estate and personal property taxes of persons entitled to homestead grants.

The tax commission also administers the military service tax credit act under which local taxing bodies are reimbursed more than one million seven hundred thousand dollars annually for losses incurred through the exemption of property owned by persons who have been in military service.

The tax commission has supervision of local property assessments. It is in charge of the general direction of county and city assessors under the law enacted by the 52nd General Assembly.


State Permit Board

Chapter 124 of the 1954 Code of Iowa, provides for the issuance of permits for the manufacture, sale and taxation of certain nonintoxicating liquor, with the provision that such fees and taxes shall be collected under this act, accrue to the general fund of the state of Iowa. The state permit board is constituted of the chairman of the state tax commission, who is also chairman of the board, the secretary of state and the auditor of state. The board reviews the action of any governing body in any case where a hearing has been had relative to the cancellation or revocation of a permit issued under the provisions of this act.

The Fifty-first General Assembly created a watchmakers' board to register all persons or firms engaged in watchmaking or repair. Members of the board are paid \$10 per day during sessions of the board, with maximum compensation of \$300 a year. They are required by law to meet at least once every six months.

The Indians in Iowa

The Mesquakie Indians who are residents and voters in Iowa number around 500. Iowa was for many years the cherished home of their ancestors and friends.

They own, as a tribe or family, 3,600 acres of land in the Iowa river valley in Tama county. This is their collective farm, bought by them with their own money, managed and cultivated by them, on which they live, where they study and have their religious services. The State of Iowa many years ago by law gave them authority to own tribal land and property and the title is held in trust for them. They pay taxes and those qualified are voters.

They have a genuine democratic government for themselves, elect a council of managers and the council has a chief or president. They have a school and all of the younger people can write the English language. Some of the older ones have never learned other than their own language, which is used by all of them.

The Mesquakie tribe is of the Algonquin family. They formerly lived on the Atlantic coast, then moved westward through New York and Canada, and in Wisconsin in the early fur trading days, they formed a federation with their kinsmen, the Sacs, or Saukies. The Mesquakies were called by the traders Reynards or Foxes and their name means the "people of the red earth." A century ago they lived in several camps along the Mississippi river, then moved into the Des Moines valley, followed the agency and army to Raccoon forks, and departed from Des Moines when Iowa was admitted as a state.

Some of the Mesquakies so loved their homes in Iowa that they gave up their government payments and returned from their southwestern reservations. The state gave them permission to live in Iowa as a tribe and with money received in settlement with the government they bought their present lands.

On their Tama county farm they live in comfortable houses and dress, in the main, as their white neighbors. Formerly the head men resisted efforts at educating the young, but now they go to school and are apt scholars. They keep their wickiups, not to live in, but for their visits and ceremonies. They also have one large tribal hall in which they hold their religious ceremonies regularly, several services each week, conducted in their own language by their own leaders and preserving their own forms of worship.

They are quite skillful in various industries—weaving, basket making, bead work and in leather. One-third of the land is cultivated but the remainder is largely rough pasture land. The tribe has a tractor, but uses horses for farm work. They raise cattle, hogs and chickens.

Grand Army of the Republic

The Grand Army of the Republic was a patriotic and fraternal organization of the Union survivors of the military and naval forces of the Civil War who served between April 12, 1861, and April 9, 1865.

Iowa was one of the first states of the Union to attempt organization of the Grand Army of the Republic, receiving as a department its first charter on July 12, 1866. Its permanent organization dates from January 23, 1879.

There were over 519 posts chartered in Iowa, Membership stood at its peak in 1890 when 52,013 veterans held membership.

Six veterans of the Civil War served as governors of Iowa: Colonel William M. Stone of Knoxville, 1864-1868; Colonel Samuel Merrill of McGregor, 1868-1872; Colonel Cyrus C. Carpenter of Fort Dodge, 1872-1875; Captain Joshua G. Newbold of Mount Pleasant, 1877-1878; Captain Buren R. Sherman of Vinton, 1882-1886; Lieutenant Colonel Francis M. Drake of Centerville, 1896-1898.

To the Grand Army of the Republic goes the credit for having instituted Memorial Day, with all the tender and reverent patriotism which that occasion always reveals, and for having kept alive, in history and story, the brave deeds performed upon the battlefields by many a gallant soldier. To them goes the credit of having preserved the Union at a critical period in its history. Their average age when they fought the war was nineteen.

Nate E. Kendall, former governor of Iowa, was principal speaker at the dedication of the Iowa monument on the battlefield of Shiloh. He eulogized the veterans of that sanguine conflict, when he said: "No soldiery ever entered a field with such noble purpose, and none ever emerged with a record of such glorious accomplishment. When our beloved flag was insulted, when our territorial integrity was threatened, when our national life was imperiled, they promptly responded to the appeal of President Lincoln, and cheerfully embraced self-immolation to secure the perpetuity of the government of the people, by the people and for the people, and to render forever positive the certainty that the government, after being baptized in the sacred blood of the Revolutionary fathers, should not disappear from the earth, but that it, under God, should have everlasting life.

"And over the graves of the fallen dead the spring has cast its tender violets, the summer its gorgeous field of flowers, the autumn its golden withered leaves, the winter its blanket of snow. All is forgiven, all is forgotten except the glorious results of the combat in which our soldiers were engaged.

"The United States of America! The immortal principles of justice and equity which underlie it! The incomparable benefits which it secures to its citizenship. The inestimable sacrifices which have been suffered to maintain it! It is our home, our country, our beloved government, bequeathed to us forever by the venerated fathers, the most invaluable inheritance ever bestowed upon the sons of men."

The Iowa Department lost its last member in the death on September 20, 1949, of James P. Martin of Sutherland. Thus the last Iowa member of that long line of the Grand Army of the Republic answered "taps" and bivouaced on the eternal camping grounds.

The 55th General Assembly dismantled the G.A.R. room in the capitol and stored the records with the History and Archives department.

Spanish-American War

The United Spanish War Veterans came into existence because of the desire to carry on the comradeship that came from their associations in the service with the only 100 per cent volunteer war the world has ever known.

In this organization, the Iowa Department is one of 52 departments, and maintains its headquarters in room 102 in the north corridor, basement floor of the state capitol. Here are kept the records of the organization and personnel. Plans are made for the annual encampment, service work given in claims for pensions for widows and the orphans of deceased veterans.

The men who served in Iowa's four regiments of infantry and the two batteries of light artillery numbered 5,696; there were two killed in action, 38 wounded and 163 died of disease.

Out of this war came men who later served their state and national governments in high positions—Dan Turner, Corning, Governor, 1931-1933; Joe Hanley, Muscatine, later Lieutenant Governor of New York state; Lloyd Thurston, Osceola, member of the State Legislature, and the U. S. Congress, National Commander in Chief, 1954-1955, United Spanish War Veterans; Horace M. Havner, National Commander in Chief of the United Spanish War Veterans 1947-1948.

The leaders of the American Army in World War I were all veterans of this war. Among them were such men as Matthew A. Tinley, Council Bluffs, Colonel of the famous Iowa Regiment, the 168th Infantry, and all of the field officers of that regiment.

The war was the only one fought by an army of this country where the returns were greater than the total cost of the war.

Iowa in World War I

These Iowa soldiers came from every walk of life. The adjutant general reported to the government that, of the men drafted in Iowa, 51.7 per cent were farmers and farm laborers.

This registration was for the purpose of uncovering persons, 45 through 64 years of age, who possessed critical skills required in war production or civilian activities vital to the successful prosecution of the war effort. This age group was not vulnerable to military service.

The number of officers and enlisted men and women from Iowa in World War II is placed at 262,638. No distinction is made between persons who entered service through induction or enlistment. Although no specific figures are available, it is estimated that persons served in the various components as follows:

The American Legion in Iowa

The American Legion was born in Paris, March 15, 1919. The Legion was launched formally at St. Louis, May 8, 1919, by World War veterans from nearly every state in the Union, who had been selected by temporary secretaries named at the request of Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., who acted under instructions from the Paris caucus.

The first Iowa state convention was held in Des Moines, September 4, 1919. The first national convention of delegates from the newly organized state departments was held in Minneapolis on Armistice Day, 1919.

The American Legion Auxiliary of mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of Legionnaires was organized in 1921. The Iowa department was launched at Sioux City.

La Societe des 40 Hommes et 8 Chevaux, a national fraternal order of Legionnaires, was organized in 1921.

Hanford MacNider established the Iowa Legionnaire, with Frank Miles as editor on March 4, 1921. He was succeeded as editor on April 1, 1946, by A. F. Faber.

The Disabled American Veterans in Iowa

The Disabled American Veterans, commonly known as the D. A. V., was organized nationally in 1920 by groups of disabled veterans then undergoing vocational training courses, and chartered by Congress in 1932, to render service to, for and by disabled veterans. The D. A. V. has, ever since its inception, been the spokesman for the disabled war veterans of America, in Congress and before its various committees as well as before the Veterans' Administration and its local regional offices and facilities.

During 1920 and 1921 the first three chapters of the Iowa department were organized in the vocational training centers at Des Moines, Iowa City and Ames. The department of Iowa D. A. V. held its first state convention in 1922 at Iowa City.

American Veterans of World War II

The American Veterans of World War II, commonly known as the AMVETS, were organized nationally in September, 1944, at Kansas City, Missouri. The AMVETS were granted a national charter by an act of Congress and President Truman signed the measure on July 23, 1947. AMVETS is the only nationally chartered World War II veterans' organization.

AMVETS got their start in Iowa at Atlantic in 1944, and were incorporated as the Iowa Department of AMVETS on May 2, 1945. The first state convention was held in Des Moines in 1947. AMVETS were recognized as a nationally chartered World War II veterans' organization by the Iowa Legislature in March, 1949, and entered as such in the Iowa Code.

The AMVETS principles are (1) to promote world peace, (2) to perpetuate the American way of life, (3) to help the veteran help himself.

The AMVETS have a national and state auxiliary comprised of the wives, mothers and sisters of World War II veterans.

Iowa Veterans of Foreign Wars

The Veterans of Foreign Wars, department of Iowa, was granted its charter by the national organization on May 28, 1921. Its objects are fraternal, patriotic, historical and educational; to preserve and strengthen comradeship among its members and to assist worthy comrades; to perpetuate the memory and history of its dead; and to assist their widows and orphans; to maintain true allegiance to the government of the United States and fidelity to its constitution and laws. V.F.W. is composed only of American men who have served honorably in the army, navy, marine corps or coast guard of the United States, in hostile waters or on foreign soil during any foreign war, insurrection, or expedition.

Veterans of Foreign Wars has a Ladies Auxiliary of mothers, wives, sisters and daughters, and a fraternal order consisting of the Military Order of Cooties of V.F.W. members.

The Department of Iowa, consisting of approximately 200 posts, has its headquarters at 3601 Beaver Avenue, Des Moines 10.

Iowans in Presidents' Cabinets

Fifteen Iowa men have served in the cabinets of thirteen presidents of the United States. The list of these is as follows:

JAMES H. HARLAN—Mount Pleasant. Served as secretary of the interior in the cabinet of President Andrew Johnson in 1865 and 1866.

WILLIAM W. BELKNAP—Secretary of war in the two administrations of President Ulysses S. Grant. Made his home in Keokuk for a number of years.

GEORGE W. McCRARY—Served as secretary of war in the cabinet of President Rutherford B. Hayes.

SAMUEL J. KIRKWOOD—Iowa's Civil War governor was secretary of the interior under President James A. Garfield.

FRANK HATTON—Burlington. Co-publisher with Robert J. Burdette of the Hawkeye, was assistant postmaster general from 1881 to 1884 and postmaster general in the cabinet of President Chester A. Arthur from October 14, 1884, to March 4, 1885.

JAMES WILSON—Served as secretary of agriculture for sixteen years in the cabinets of Presidents McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft.

LESLIE M. SHAW—Denison. Served as secretary of the treasury in the two administrations of President Theodore Roosevelt.

EDWIN T. MEREDITH—Secretary of agriculture in the cabinet of President Woodrow Wilson. Born in Avoca, Iowa, in 1876.

HENRY C. WALLACE—Secretary of agriculture in the cabinets of Presidents Harding and Coolidge.

HERBERT HOOVER—Served as secretary of commerce in the cabinets of Presidents Harding and Coolidge, 1921 to 1929. Elected president of the United States in 1928, the first man born west of the Mississippi river to attain this high position.

CURTIS DWIGHT WILBUR—Born at Boonesboro, Iowa, on May 10, 1867. Served as secretary of navy in cabinet of President Coolidge.

RAY LYMAN WILBUR—Born at Boonesboro, Iowa, on April 13, 1875. Served as secretary of the interior in the cabinet of President Hoover.

JAMES WILLIAM GOOD—Born near Cedar Rapids in 1866. Became secretary of war in the cabinet of President Herbert Hoover.

HENRY AGARD WALLACE—Son of Henry C. Wallace. Served as secretary of agriculture in the first two terms of Franklin D. Roosevelt. Elected vice president in 1940. Appointed as secretary of commerce in 1945.

HARRY L. HOPKINS—Born in Sioux City in 1890. Secretary of commerce under President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Iowans in United States Supreme Court

SAMUEL F. MILLER—Born April 5, 1816, at Richmond, Kentucky. Located at Keokuk, Iowa, in 1850. Was personally acquainted with President Lincoln who nominated him for the United States Supreme Court in 1862 where he served for 28 years.

WILEY BLOUNT RUTLEDGE, JR.—Born July 20, 1894, at Cloverport, Kentucky. Professor of law and dean of the College of Law at the University of Iowa from 1935 to 1939. Appointed Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia in 1939. Appointed Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court and sworn into office February 16, 1943. Served until his death in 1949.

Iowans in Diplomatic Service

HORACE M. TOWNER—Born October 23, 1855, at Belvidere, Illinois. Located at Corning, Iowa, in 1880. Served as a representative in Congress from March 4, 1911, to April 1, 1923, when he resigned to become governor of Puerto Rico.

WILLIAM I. BUCHANAN—Born in Covington, Ohio, September 10, 1853, and moved to Sioux City, Iowa, in 1882. Envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary to the Argentine Republic from 1894 to 1900. First United States minister to the Republic of Panama. Served as high commissioner to settle disputes between the United States and Venezuela and at the time of his death was agent of the United States for the future arbitration at The Hague of one of the Venezuelan questions.

JOHN H. IRWIN—Born in Ohio in 1847. Came with his father's family to Keokuk, Iowa. Appointed by President Arthur as governor of Idaho territory in 1883. In 1890 he was appointed by President Harrison as governor of the territory of Arizona. Appointed by President McKinley in 1899 as American minister to Portugal.

EDWIN H. CONGER—Born in Knox county, Illinois, March 7, 1843. In 1868 he located on a farm near Dexter, Iowa. He was appointed by President Harrison as minister to Brazil where he served four years. In 1897 he was again appointed to that position by President McKinley. Later he served in China during and after the Boxer uprising.

AUGUSTUS C. DODGE—Born January 2, 1812, in the territory of Louisiana. In 1838 he was appointed registrar of the United States land office at Burlington. Appointed by President Pierce as minister to Spain where he served until 1859.

JOHN A. KASSON—Born at Charlotte, Vermont, January 11, 1822. Moved to Des Moines in 1857. In 1863 he was elected to Congress where he served six terms. Appointed and served as minister to Austria-Hungary and Germany.

ALBERT W. SWALM—Oskaloosa. Consulship at Montevideo, Uruguay, 1897-1903; Southampton, England, 1903-1919; Hamilton, Bermuda Island, 1919-1922. Died August 24, 1922, at consular residence at Hamilton.

JOHN E. ROWEN—Clarion. U. S. Consul, Port Stanley, Falkland Islands, 1897-1907; Pienta Arenas, Chile, 1907-1911. Died May 1, 1914.

JOHNSON BRIGHAM—Cedar Rapids and Des Moines. Born at Cherry Valley, New York, March 11, 1846. U. S. Consul, Aix-la-Chapelle, Germany, 1893-1894. Died in Des Moines October 8, 1936.

EUGENIE ANDERSON—Adair, May 26, 1909. Ambassador to Denmark, 1948-1953.

Iowans now in diplomatic service as ambassadors are Raymond A. Hare to United Arab Republic; Christian Ravndal to Ecuador; Scott McLeod to Ireland.

The Government of Iowa

The government of the State of Iowa is based upon a constitution adopted by the people and upon statute laws enacted from time to time by the General Assembly.

Iowa has always used the separation of powers doctrine, dividing the governmental authority into its legislative, executive and judicial components. Iowa has had two state constitutions, the first approved in 1846, the second in 1857. Only eight states are now using constitutions adopted prior to the Iowa Constitution of 1857. The present constitution has been amended twenty-one times.

The Iowa Constitution's "Bill of Rights," Article I, is one of the best sections of the state constitution. It has been used as a reference guide for the model state constitution written by the National Municipal League and by the framers of the 1948 New Jersey Constitution.

The Electorate—All men and women who have lived in Iowa for six months, in the county in which they claim residence for sixty days, and in the precinct ten days, are entitled to vote if they are citizens of the United States twenty-one years of age or over. Persons convicted of infamous crimes and those declared idiotic or insane are, however, disfranchised. The right of women to vote in Iowa is based upon the nineteenth amendment to the United States constitution.

Election Days—The regular elections for national, state, district and county officers are held on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November of the even-numbered years. Candidates, with a few exceptions, are nominated at the primary election held on the First Monday in June preceding the general election. Provision is also made for nominations by petition or convention. Political parties must use the primary for nominating candidates, except for the judiciary, but in case no candidate receives the necessary thirty-five per cent at the primary, a convention may nominate.

The regular election date for municipal officers is the first Tuesday following the first Monday of November of the odd-numbered years. If a municipal primary election is necessary it is held on the second Tuesday prior to the regular municipal elections.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

General Assembly—the legislative authority of the State of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a General Assembly which consists of a Senate and a House of Representatives. The terms of both senators and representatives begin on the first day of January following their election. Regular sessions are held biennially, commencing on the second Monday of January of the odd-numbered years. Special sessions of the General Assembly may be called by the proclamation of the governor.

House of Representatives—The House of Representatives consists of one hundred eight members, elected for two years. Each of the ninety-nine counties is entitled to one representative and each of the nine counties having the largest population elects an additional representative. Any person who has resided in the state for one year and has the qualifications of a voter is eligible for election as a representative. Women were admitted to the General Assembly by an amendment of the state constitution adopted in 1926.

The House of Representatives elects a speaker and other officers. Each house makes its own rules of procedure.

Senate—The Senate consists of fifty members, elected by districts for a term of four years. A senatorial district contains from one to three counties, and elects one senator. According to the constitution, approximately one-half the senators are to be elected at each alternate biennial election, but due to changes in the districts, the terms of twenty-one senators now expire at the end of each alternate legislative biennium and those of twenty-nine in the intervening years. Senators must be twenty-five years of age and have the other qualifications required of representatives. Members of both houses of the Iowa General Assembly are paid \$30 for each day that they are in session. The Speaker and Lieutenant Governor are paid \$60 per diem.

The last change in the apportionment of the Iowa legislature occurred in 1904.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

Elective Officers—The constitution of Iowa makes provisions for a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state and attorney general, who are elected for terms of two years at the regular biennial elections in the even-numbered years. In addition, the General Assembly has made provision for a secretary of agriculture, elected for two years; a board of commerce commissioners of three members elected for a term of four years. A superintendent of public instruction is chosen by a State Board of Public Instruction, consisting of one member from each congressional district in Iowa and one appointed at large by the governor.

Governor—the supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor. It is his duty to see that the laws are enforced, to supervise the official business of the state, to make recommendations to the General Assembly, and to appoint various officers and boards. Most major appointments are subject to confirmation by the senate. He has the power to call special sessions of the Legislature and veto acts passed by the General Assembly, but a majority of two-thirds of each house may pass a bill over his veto. To qualify as governor, a person must have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of the state for at least two years and must be thirty years of age or over at the date of election.

Lieutenant Governor—The lieutenant governor who must possess the same qualifications as the governor succeeds the governor in case of his death, resignation or disability. His chief function is to act as president of the Senate.

Appointive Officers—In addition to the executive officers mentioned, all of whom are elected, there are a number of appointive officers, including the comptroller, the superintendent of banking, the insurance commissioner, the labor commissioner, the adjutant general, the commissioner of public health, the industrial commissioner and commissioner of public safety, all appointed by the governor, usually with the approval of the senate. The governor also appoints the members of a number of administrative boards, including the state board of regents, the board of control of state institutions, the state tax commission, the board of parole, the state board of conservation, the liquor control commission, the state highway commission and the unemployment compensation commission.

Executive Council—The executive council is an ex-officio board made up of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and secretary of agriculture.

State Printing Board—The state printing board has three ex-officio members—the secretary of state, auditor and attorney general—and two members appointed by the governor. This board appoints the superintendent of printing.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT

The judicial department of the State of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a supreme court, district courts and inferior courts as the General Assembly shall provide.

Supreme Court—The supreme court consists of nine justices, elected for terms of six years, approximately one-third being elected at each regular biennial election. The senior in time of service is chief justice for six months until each judge has served in that capacity. The supreme court appoints a reporter of the supreme court who is also the code editor to supreme court statistician, and a clerk. Appointments are for four years.

Attorney General—The constitution also provides for an attorney general who is elected at the regular biennial election for a term of two years. He represents the state in legal matter, gives advice to state officers, and has, in addition, certain administrative functions.

Judicial Districts—The State of Iowa is divided by law into twenty-one judicial districts, composed of from one to nine counties. The voters in each district elect from two to seven judges.

There are now seventy-four district judges in the state. One of the district judges presides over the district court sessions in each county. A county attorney and a clerk of the court are elected by the voters in each county.

Inferior Courts—The General Assembly has provided also for other inferior courts. Each township is authorized to elect two justices of the peace who hear cases involving minor offenses and hold preliminary hearings on more serious charges. Municipal courts, superior courts, police courts and mayors' courts are authorized in cities and towns under various restrictions. Municipal courts are optional in cities having a population of five thousand or more and superior courts in cities with four thousand or over. Both municipal and superior court judges are elected for four-year terms.

Municipal Courts—If a city of the first class has neither a municipal nor a superior court, the council shall appoint a police judge in commission governed and city manager cities and may provide for the election or appointment of a police judge in such cities under the general law. In all municipalities having none of these special courts, the mayor acts as the police judge.

Jury Trials—Jury trials are the rule for serious cases, but under certain conditions may be waived or denied. Petit juries consist of twelve persons who must be "electors," except in some courts of restricted jurisdiction where the number of jurors may be six persons.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

County Officials—The State of Iowa is divided into ninety-nine counties, the boundaries of which may not be changed unless the change is approved by the voters of each county concerned. A board of supervisors consisting of three, five or seven members is the chief administrative agency in the county. They appoint a county engineer, county home steward, county welfare director and other administrative officials. In addition, an auditor, who is the clerk of the board of supervisors; a sheriff, county attorney, recorder, treasurer, coroner and clerk of the district court are elected biennially by the voters.

A county superintendent of schools is chosen every three years by a county board of education. The county assessor is chosen by the board of supervisors, county board of education and the mayors of the various towns in the county, for a term of four years. They likewise fix his salary.

Local Functions—The Iowa county is a quasi-political corporation which collects municipal, school, county and state taxes, enforces state laws, has charge of poor relief and certain other welfare activities, and shares with the state highway commission the management of the roads and bridges in the county.

Townships, which in earlier days were effective units of local government within the counties, have lost almost all their functions, except for the election of justices of the peace in which many townships default.

City Government—The laws of Iowa also authorize the incorporation of cities and towns. These municipalities derive their authority from the General Assembly and have only the powers specifically granted to them. Four cities and towns are governed by special charters granted before the adoption of the present constitution which forbids such acts of incorporation. Four cities have the commission form of government; seven have adopted the city manager plan by popular election; and thirteen others have a city manager by ordinance. Members of the commission are elected by the voters. The city manager in cities adopting that plan by a popular vote is appointed by the council.

Municipal Classes—All other municipalities are under the general law. Municipalities are classified according to population into cities having over 15,000 population; cities having from 2,000 to 15,000 population; and towns having less than 2,000 population. Nine hundred and sixteen municipalities have the mayor-council form of government, both the mayor and the members of the council being elected by the voters for two-year or four-year terms.

City Councils—The council is the policy-making body in municipal government and it is also the chief administrative agency in the mayor-council cities. The mayor presides over the council, although he is not a member, and has the power to veto acts of the council subject to a two-thirds majority vote over his veto. He supervises municipal activities and in cities and towns which do not have a municipal, superior or police court, he serves a police judge. He also appoints certain officers, including the marshal or chief of police, the city health officer, and members of the police and fire board, and other officials that the council may direct him to appoint. The city solicitor and clerk, and in some cases the engineer and members of the zoning board of adjustment are chosen by the council.

TAXATION

Tax Sources—Taxation is probably the most important governmental power. The present state tax system of Iowa is a multiple tax system based largely on sales, personal income and corporation taxes. There are also taxes on inheritance, gasoline, cigarettes, beer and chain stores. The property tax is the primary source of revenue for local government in Iowa.

Tax Levies—Property is assessed by the county assessors with some aid from the state tax commission. Assessments are subject to revision by local boards and by the state tax commission. Various mill levies for state, county, school and municipal purposes are computed by the county auditor on the assessed valuation. Tax money is paid to the county treasurer who distributes it to the proper fund. Levies for county, school or municipal purposes are, in most cases, limited by state law, in larger cities, city assessors function in addition to the county assessors.

Calendar of Official Dates

Code 1954, section 541.85, provides that the following designated days ". . . Shall be regarded as holidays for all purposes relating to the presentation for payment or acceptance, and for the protesting and giving notice of the dishonor of bills of exchange, drafts, bank checks, orders and promissory notes, and any bank or mercantile paper falling due on any of the days below named shall be considered as falling due on the succeeding business day."

Filing Nomination Papers

State and National—For United States senator, representatives in congress, and all elective state offices, to be filed in the office of the secretary of state not more than eighty-five nor less than sixty-five days prior to the date set for holding the primary election. (§43.11) (56 G.A.)

County—For all elective county offices, to be filed in the office of the county auditor at least fifty-five days prior to the date fixed for holding the primary election. (C., §43.11.)

Township or Precinct—For elective offices of a subdivision of a county to be filed with the county auditor fifty-five days prior to the primary. (C., §43.21.)

Cities and Towns—For elective offices in all cities and towns to be filed at least four weeks prior to primary election. (56 G.A.)

School—For all elective offices in each independent city, town or consolidated district, shall be filed with the secretary of the school board not earlier than thirty nor less than ten days before the election. (C., '54, §277.4.)

Primary Election Dates

Municipal—The primary election in all cities and towns on the second Tuesday prior to the regular election. (54 G.A., Ch. 145.)

General—The primary election shall be held the first Monday in June in each even-numbered year. (C., '54, §43.7.)

Election Dates

Cities and Towns—Regular city and town elections shall be held biennially on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of odd-numbered years.

School—The regular school election shall be held annually on the second Monday in March; except in cities over 125,000 population, where the election will be held biennially on the second Monday in March of odd-numbered years. (C., '54, §277.1.)

General—The general election for state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the first Tuesday next after the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year. (C., '54, §39.1.)

Political Convention Dates

County—Each political party shall hold its county convention on the fourth Friday following each primary election. (C., '54, §43.89.)

State—Each political party shall hold a state convention not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Wednesday following the county convention. (C., '54, §43.107.)

Judicial—Each political party shall hold a state judicial convention not less than one or more than two weeks after their regular state convention. (C., '54, §46.1.)

District—Each political party shall hold a district judicial convention in districts where judges are to be elected not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Thursday following the county convention. (C., '54, §46.8.)

Presidential or Special—Precinct caucuses, county conventions and state conventions of each political party are held in the years presidents are elected and usually during the months of March and April on call of the state chairman of the political parties.

Election of State Officials

Each two years in Iowa, the people elect their Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of State, Treasurer of State, Secretary of Agriculture and Attorney General.

State Commerce Commissioners were elective officials until 1959 when the 58th General Assembly enacted legislation providing for their appointment by the governor. The Superintendent of Public Instruction is named by a State Board of Public Instruction, consisting of one member from each Congressional district and one appointed at large by the Governor.

The Justices of the Supreme Court are elected for terms of six years. District Judges are elected for terms of four years.

Members of the Senate are elected for four years; House members for two years.

County Officers Given Four Year Terms

In 1960 a Clerk of Courts, Auditor and Sheriff will be elected for four years; the Treasurer and Recorder two years. Then in 1962 and thereafter all will hold office four years. The County Attorney to be elected every two years.

Elections in Iowa occur in even-numbered years.

Election of Federal Officials

Federal elections occur each four years, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of even years. The next election will be in 1960. The Constitution provides that the only elected Federal officials are the President, Vice-president, U. S. Senators and U. S. Representatives. All other officers are appointive—practically all by the President. U. S. Senators serve a term of six years; House members serve terms of two years.

Tax Assessments

Chapter 427, 1958 Code of Iowa, contains provisions as to property taxable and property exempt from taxation. Section 427.13 provides that all property not specifically exempted by statute is taxable.

Personal property shall be listed and assessed each year in the name of the owner thereof on the first day of January; real estate shall be listed and valued in 1933 and every four years thereafter. (Sec. 428.4)

In each year in which real estate is not listed, all new buildings erected since the last previous assessment must be listed, and the valuation added to the valuation of the real estate on which the buildings are situated. (Sec. 428.4)

The statutes of Iowa require all property subject to taxation to be valued at its actual value, and to be assessed at sixty (60) per cent of such actual value.

There are 120 duly appointed, qualified and acting assessors in the state of Iowa, of whom 99 are county assessors and 21 are city assessors. All city and county assessors must qualify for the position by examination conducted by the state tax commission and by an examining board, and are appointed by the conference board of the city or county, as the case may be. The term of office of an assessor shall be for six (6) years.

***Sessions of Boards of Review.** The city and county boards of review shall be in session from May 1 to May 31, both inclusive, each year and shall hold as many meetings as are necessary to discharge their duties. Such boards shall hold meetings in quarters provided by the board of supervisors. The assessor shall be clerk of the board of review.

The board of review shall have the power to equalize assessments by raising or lowering the individual assessments of real property, including new buildings, personal property or moneys and credits made by the assessor. It shall also add to the assessment rolls any taxable property which has been omitted by the assessor.

Any property owner or aggrieved taxpayer who is dissatisfied with his assessment may file a protest against such assessment with the board of review on or after May 1 to and including May 20, of the year of assessment. Said protest shall be in writing and signed by the one protesting or by his duly authorized agent. Taxpayer may have an oral hearing thereon if request therefor in writing is made at the time of filing the protest. Such protest must be confined to one (1) or more of the grounds specified in the statute.

Homestead Tax Credit Law. Every home owner in the state of Iowa, who resides upon his homestead six months out of the year and fulfills the other requirements of the law, is entitled to a homestead tax credit upon his taxes.

The amount of credit to which he is entitled depends upon the value of his homestead and the millage rate of credit allowed by the Iowa state tax commission.

No home owner can receive a credit upon his taxes upon any value in excess of \$2,500 and the Iowa state tax commission cannot refund in excess of 25 mills upon such valuation. In other words, no home owner can receive in excess of \$62.50 refund.

Under this law, a home owner is:

- (1) One who holds fee simple title to the homestead.
- (2) A person occupying a homestead as a surviving spouse.

*Provided for in House File 709, 58th G. A., to become law as of July 5, 1959.

- (3) A person occupying property under contract of purchase where it can be shown that not less than ten per cent of the purchase price named in the contract has been paid and that such contract has been made a matter of record in the office of the county recorder.
- (4) A person occupying a homestead under devise or by operation of inheritance laws.
- (5) A person occupying property under deed which conveys a divided interest to other blood relatives or legally adopted children.

Under this homestead tax credit law, a dwelling house is defined as any building which is occupied wholly or in part by the owner as a home.

In rural districts it cannot exceed 40 acres and in cities and towns, if its assessed valuation is less than twenty-five hundred dollars, the land area may be enlarged until its assessed valuation reaches that amount.

A homestead may contain one or more contiguous lots or tracts of ground with buildings upon it, used in good faith as a homestead.

Home owners desiring to avail themselves of the benefits of this law must file application for such tax credit with the assessor each year between January 1 and up to and including July 1. This application is for taxes payable in the succeeding year.

Budgets Prepared and Submitted

Preparation—all taxing districts except townships must at least twenty days prior to August 15 of each year prepare a budget of anticipated expenditures and estimated amount to be raised by taxation by funds. Rural schools post budget estimate ten days before dates of hearing. Other taxing districts subject to the budget law publish their budgets in a newspaper.

Certification—After hearing and decision of local board, budgets are certified to the county auditor not later than August 15. (C. '58, §24.17.)

Submitted to State Comptroller—As soon as taxes are certified by each local board and have been computed by the county auditor he shall forward a copy of each budget, together with a summary of all budgets, to the state comptroller.

County Budget—On or before December 31 of each year, each county is required to appropriate in detail anticipated expenditures for every office or department for each and every purpose for which expenditures are authorized or demanded. The budget in detail must be completed and adopted by January 31 of the year to which it applies. This procedure is appropriating in detail the budget certified in August by funds.

State—On or before September 1, next prior to each biennial legislative session, all departments and establishments of the government shall transmit to the state comptroller estimates of their expenditure requirements for each fiscal year of ensuing biennium.

The comptroller shall prepare and file in his office, on or before the first day of December of each even-numbered year, a state budget report.

Not later than February 1 of the year of each biennial legislative session, the governor shall transmit to the legislature a document to be known as a budget, setting forth his financial program for each of the fiscal years of the ensuing biennium.

Levies. The board of supervisors fixes the county tax levies at the September meeting. School corporations make their levies and certify them to the office of the county auditor on or before the fifteenth day of August. Cities and towns also certify their tax levies within the same time. Township trustees make, and the clerks certify, the township levies within the same time.

The state tax commission fixes the rates necessary to meet the amount required for any state levy authorized by the comptroller or treasurer.

All taxes are due and payable January 1 of each year. The first installment of taxes becomes delinquent April 1 and a penalty of three-fourths of one per cent per month attaches. The second installment of taxes becomes delinquent October 1 and a penalty of three-fourths of one per cent per month attaches.

Tax sales are held on the first Monday in December of each year. Prior to tax sales, an advertising fee of 60 cents attaches and, in case of sale, \$1.00 is added for each tax sale certificate.

Redemption. For redemption from tax sale, four per cent penalty is added to the sum paid by the purchaser at tax sale and all subsequent taxes paid by him under sale. Also six per cent interest is added from time of payment until time of redemption, together with 25 cents for redemption certificate.

Tax sales run three years before purchaser is entitled to a tax deed. Purchasers at a scavenger tax sale are entitled to a deed after one year.

Taxes a Lien on Real Estate. Taxes due from any person upon personal property are a lien upon any or all real estate owned or afterwards acquired by such persons for a period of 10 years from December 31 of year in which levied. As against the purchaser, taxes are a lien against real estate on and after December 31 of the year in which they were assessed and levied.

Military Exemptions. The following should receive the attention of soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses who have participated in the several wars in which this country has engaged, subsequent to and including the war with Mexico, who are entitled to exemptions from taxes. The exemptions are as follows:

\$3,000 assessed value of any soldier, sailor or marine of the Mexican or Civil War.

\$1,800 assessed value to any soldier, sailor, marine or nurse of the war with Spain, Indian wars, Chinese relief or Philippine insurrection.

\$750 assessed value to any serviceman or woman of World War I.

\$500 assessed value to any serviceman or woman of World War II.

\$500 assessed value to any serviceman or woman during the Korean war, from June 27, 1950 to July 27, 1953.

The property, to the same extent, of the wife of any such soldier, sailor, marine or nurse, where they are living together and he has not otherwise received the benefits above provided; also the property to the same extent of the widow, remaining unmarried, where they were living together at the time of the death of such person; and the property to the same extent of the widowed mother, remaining unmarried, of any such soldier, sailor, marine or nurse where the said widowed mother is, or was at the time of the death of the soldier, sailor, marine, or nurse, dependent upon such person for support and he has not otherwise received the benefits above provided; also the property to the same extent of a minor child or children of any such deceased soldier, sailor, marine or nurse.

The above exemptions may be made from any property owned by the claimant and said claim for exemption, if filed on or before July 1 of any year and allowed by the board of supervisors, shall be effective to secure an exemption only for the year in which such exemption is filed.

Designation of the property upon which the claimant desires to claim the exemption is to be made by July 1 of the year and if no designation is made, the exemption shall apply to the homestead, if any.

The law also requires that the person claiming any of the above exemptions must be a resident of and domiciled in the state of Iowa.

Soldiers in actual military service are permitted to retain their homestead rights even though they are not for the period of their service residents of or domiciled in Iowa.



LEGISLATIVE OFFICERS FOR THE TERRITORY OF IOWA

Before Iowa was admitted as a state in 1846, the Senate of the territory was called the Legislative Council. The presiding officer was known as the President of the Council. Iowa's constitution, approved by a vote of the people in 1857, created the office of Lieutenant Governor and named him as the ex officio President of the Senate.

The 1838, 1839 and 1840 sessions were held at the territorial capital at Burlington. The 1841 through 1845 sessions were held at Iowa City. In 1855 the 5th General Assembly voted to change the location of the capital to Des Moines.

Dwight D. Eisenhower and Richard M. Nixon of California were the Republican candidates for President and Vice-president on the Republican ticket. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois and Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, were the Democratic candidates. Eisenhower received 457 electoral votes and Stevenson 74.

Meeting at the governor's office Monday, December 17, 1956, the following Presidential Electors cast the state's vote for Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Electors at large—Mrs. Daisy B. Long, Union; Phil R. Wilkinson, Winterset; District Electors—First, Ben Galer, Mt. Pleasant; Second, Abraham Pilicer, Cedar Rapids; Third, Carl Bluedorn, Waterloo; Fourth, Mrs. Anita Seitsinger, Oskaloosa; Fifth, Roy Tallman, Perry; Sixth, Angus Cotton, Lone Rock; Seventh, Rita Van Dercreek, Council Bluffs, elected, but Mrs. J. A. Lueth served; Eighth, Harvey Hindt, Rock Rapids.

Besides the honor, electors received \$5 each and 5 cents per mile for travel to and from the state house.

Data on Senatorial Successions

James Harlan resigned to accept the cabinet portfolio of Secretary of Interior in Lincoln's cabinet. Samuel Kirkwood was elected to fill vacancy.

James W. Grimes resigned. James B. Howell elected to fill the unexpired term and George C. Wright elected for the new term.

Samuel Kirkwood resigned in 1881 to accept the cabinet portfolio of Secretary of the Interior. James W. McDill named by the governor to fill the vacancy.

Senator William B. Allison died August 4, 1908 and Albert B. Cum-

mins was selected at the special session of the 32nd G. A. on November 24, 1908, to fill the remainder of Senator Allison's term. Senator Cummins was also elected by the 33rd G. A. for the term beginning March 4, 1909.

John H. Gear died July 14, 1900. Johathan P. Dolliver was appointed August 22, 1900, to fill the vacancy. He was also elected by the 29th G. A., January 9, 1902, to fill out the remainder of the term ending March 4, 1907, and was elected for another full term.

Senator Dolliver died October 15, 1910. Lafayette Young was appointed November 12, 1910, to fill the vacancy. The 34th G. A. on April 12, 1911, elected William S. Kenyon to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Dolliver. He resigned February 24, 1922, to accept an appointment as Judge of the Federal Circuit Court. Charles A. Rawson was appointed February 25, 1922, to fill vacancy of Senator Kenyon and served until November 7, 1922.

Smith W. Brookhart was elected November 7, 1922, for the unexpired term of Senator Kenyon and served until 1925.

Brookhart-Steck contest. In the election of November 4, 1924, the vote showed Brookhart 477,594 and Steck 446,840 votes. The election was contested. On April 2, 1926, the U. S. Senate voted 16 Republicans, 29 Democrats to unseat; 31 Republicans, 9 Democrats and 1 Farmer-Labor voted against unseating. Brookhart was elected in 1926 over Claude Porter.

Albert B. Cummins died July 21, 1926. David W. Stewart was appointed to fill the vacancy until election, November 2, 1926. Senator Stewart was elected to fill the unexpired term.


On the death of Louis Murphy in 1936, Guy Gillette was elected for the short term over Berry Halden. The term expired January 3, 1939.


Redistricting Jan. 24, 1848. Population 192,914.




Redistricting Jan. 28, 1857. Population 674,913.




Redistricting April 8, 1862. Population 874,913.




Redistricting April 17, 1872. Population 1,194,020.




Redistricting April 10, 1886. Population 1,624,615.

Iowa Statehood Centennial Commemorative Half Dollar



Iowa Centennial Memorial Foundation

The sale of memorial half dollars in Iowa's Centennial Year, 1947, brought the state \$188,000. This fund is administered by the Iowa Centennial Memorial Commission, and has grown to \$200,000. The commission is authorized to spend the income from the fund for awards and scholarships, amounting to about \$4,000 yearly. This amount provides for 17 to 20 scholarships each year.

In 1951 the Iowa Award was created and presented to ex-President Herbert Hoover, and in 1956 to Jay N. Darling. More than 100 scholarships to Iowa colleges and universities have been granted.

Membership of the commission includes all former governors, four citizen members, and several state officials who serve ex officio. The commission was set up in 1949 by Governor Robert D. Blue. Members include the governor, who is chairman; president of the State Board of Regents, secretary; state treasurer, treasurer; and attorney general, attorney.

Citizen members are Mrs. Mary Humeston, Albia; Mrs. Helen Mitchell, Mason City; Ralph Evans, Davenport; and John M. Henry, Des Moines.

GREAT SEAL OF THE UNITED STATES

The Great Seal of the United States, adopted by Congress June 20, 1782, carries on its obverse side the Coat of Arms of the United States. The stripes on the shield represent the states; the blue above represents Congress. In its talons the eagle grasps an olive branch and a cluster of arrows—the Congressional power to make peace or war. The constellation of thirteen stars above denotes a new Nation in the world.

The reverse of the seal shows a pyramid, to signify "strength and duration," while the eye over it and the motto, "Annuit Coeptis" (He has favored our beginning), allude to "the many signal interpositions of Providence in favor of the American cause." The Roman numerals give the year of Independence; the motto, "Novus Ordo Seclorum" (a new order of the ages), signifies the beginning of the new American era.

The national motto, "E Pluribus Unum," was first suggested on August 10, 1776, by a Congressional Committee, consisting of Benjamin Franklin, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson.

If you are curious to see these seals and shield, look at a one dollar bill.



The Flag of the United States

On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress adopted a resolution that brought into being the U. S. Flag: "Resolved, That the Flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field representing a new constellation."

The action of the Continental Congress came almost a year after the Declaration of Independence. The Flag with thirteen stripes and thirteen stars continued to be used as the national emblem until Congress passed the following act, which President Washington signed:

"That from and after May 1, 1795, the flag of the United States be fifteen stripes, alternate red and white; and that the union be fifteen stars, white in a blue field."

This action was necessitated by the admission of the States of Vermont and Kentucky to the Union. The flag of 1795 had the stars arranged in three rows of five each instead of in a circle, and served for 23 years.

With the admission of more new states, however, it became apparent that the 1795 flag would have to be further modified; hence in 1818 a law was passed by Congress providing:

"That from and after the fourth day of July next, the flag of the United States be thirteen horizontal stripes, alternate red and white; that the union have twenty stars, white in a blue field.

"That on the admission of every new state into the Union,

one star be added to the union of the flag; and that such addition shall take effect on the Fourth of July next succeeding such admission."

Iowa was admitted to the union as the 29th state.

Alaska made the 49th star, and Hawaii will add the 50th, July 4, 1960.

The Stars and the States

The stars in the flag represent the states in order of their admissions.

United States Flag Etiquette

When the flag is draped down, the blue field always must be at the left. * * * The flag must never be used as a drape, nor as background for some ornament. * * * The correct shield does not have any stars—just a plain blue field at the top, and seven white and six red stripes.

The Pledge of Allegiance

I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

The American's Creed

I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a Democracy in a Republic; a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect Union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my Country to love it; to support its Constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its Flag; and to defend it against all enemies.

(The creed was written by William Tyler Page, Clerk of the U. S. House of Representatives, in 1917. It was accepted by the House of Representatives April 3, 1918.)

. . . The Gettysburg Address

(See page 485)

The text on the opposite page was copied from manuscript of the address delivered by President Abraham Lincoln at the Gettysburg Cemetery grounds on November 19, 1863. After the President had delivered his short address, he turned to Marshall Lamon, who had presented him less than five minutes before, and said, "Lamon, that speech won't scour. It is a flat failure."

There are five known copies in President Lincoln's handwriting of the Gettysburg address. The original and second drafts were given by the President to his secretary, John Hay. On April 11, 1916, they were presented to the Government by Colonel Hay's three children.

That Lincoln wrote the address on a rough bit of paper on the way to Gettysburg is an exploded but persistent legend. Actually, the first sheet of the first draft was written in Washington, on Executive Mansion stationery. The corrections and the second page were written in lead pencil, probably at Judge Wills' house in Gettysburg, the night of the 18th.

The second draft, believed to be the reading copy at the dedication ceremony, is assumed to have been written on the 19th, between breakfast and the start to the cemetery. There are changes from the first version, slight matters of punctuation, or of a single word—a "that nation" and a "this nation" for "the nation", "consecrated" for "hallowed," "but" for "while," and the like. Lincoln's eye evidently strayed in copying, for "We have come" of the first version was changed to "We are met," then crossed out and the original form restored above it. The first important change is "those who here gave their lives" instead of "those who died here." The sentence, "This we may, in all propriety do," became "It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this." The entire beginning of the first draft's third paragraph is rephrased. Instead of "It is rather for us, the living, we here be dedicated to the great task remaining before us" ["we here be dedicated" had been corrected in pencil above the scratched-out "to stand here"] Lincoln added a parallel sentence: "It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they have, thus far, so nobly carried on. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us——".—Data from Library of Congress.

A final addition in the fourth line from the last of the address was made after the word "nation." The two words are "under God." This final form was placed in the rotunda of the State House by the Department of Iowa, Woman's Relief Corps, Auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic, February 12, 1927.

. . . The Lincoln Plaque

A plaque hangs in the rotunda of the capitol which includes the complete Gettysburg address. Below is pictured a portion of the plaque, together with the text of the historical address. Further details on page 484.



Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth, upon this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation, so conceived, and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met here on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of it as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But in a larger sense we can not dedicate—we can not consecrate—we can not hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember, what we say here, but can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they have, thus far, so nobly carried on. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they here gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this nation shall have a new birth of freedom; and that this government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IOWA

INTRODUCTION

Iowa was organized as a separate Territory by an act of Congress approved on June 12, 1838, but it was not until 1844 that steps were taken to secure admission into the Union. A constitutional convention met at Iowa City in October, 1844. The Constitution drafted by this convention was twice submitted to the voters of the Territory of Iowa and twice rejected by them, largely because of dissatisfaction with the boundaries of the proposed State.

A second constitutional convention met at Iowa City in May, 1846. The Constitution drafted by this convention was ratified by a majority of 456 votes at an election held on August 3, 1846, and Iowa was admitted as a State on December 28, 1846.

The Constitution of 1846, however, contained a number of provisions which were found to be unsatisfactory in practice. One of these was the prohibition of banking institutions. As a result of this dissatisfaction, the legislature in 1855 provided for an election on the question of calling a convention to revise or amend the Constitution of 1846. The vote was 32,390 for a convention and 14,162 against a convention. Delegates were elected on November 4, 1856, and the convention met at Iowa City on January 19, 1857.

The delegates drafted a new constitution which was submitted to the people at an election held on August 3, 1857, and ratified by a vote of 40,311 to 38,681. This Constitution went into effect by proclamation of the governor on September 3, 1857.

The Constitution of 1857 has, since that time, remained the fundamental law of the State of Iowa; but it has been amended a number of times.

THE CONSTITUTION¹

WE, THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF IOWA, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government by the name of the STATE OF IOWA, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River, at a point due East of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines River, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River, to a point on said river where the Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri—as established by the Constitution of that State—adopted June 12th, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River; thence Westwardly along the said Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri River; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri River to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux River, according to Nicollet's Map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux River, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes North latitude; thence East along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River; thence down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi River to the place of beginning.

ARTICLE I. BILL OF RIGHTS

Section 1. All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

Sec. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

Sec. 3. The General Assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for building or repairing places of worship or the maintenance of any minister, or ministry.

¹The text of the Constitution was taken directly from the original manuscript copy preserved in the office of the Secretary of State. Compiled, edited, and documented by Benjamin F. Shambaugh and Ruth A. Gallaher, of the State Historical Society of Iowa. All words, phrases, and sections which have been eliminated from the Constitution or rendered inoperative by amendment appear in *italic*. Material added to the Constitution by amendment is enclosed within brackets. Besides being indicated in their proper place in the text, the amendments are also printed in full chronological order following the Constitution.

Sec. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceedings shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

Sec. 5. Any citizen of this State who may hereafter be engaged, either directly, or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the General Assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

Sec. 7. Every person may speak, write, and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appears to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

Sec. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

Sec. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the General Assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

Sec. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life, or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

Sec. 11. All offenses less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a Justice of the Peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentation or indictment by a grand jury² except in cases arising in the army, or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

Sec. 12. No person shall after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

Sec. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

Sec. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the State in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

Sec. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 16. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open Court.

Sec. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishment shall not be inflicted.

²See amendment 3 of those adopted in 1884.

Sec. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.

[The General Assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the State, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The General Assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.]³

Sec. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

Sec. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for a redress of grievances.

Sec. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

Sec. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this State, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property as native born citizens.

Sec. 23. There shall be no slavery in this State; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of a crime.

Sec. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

Sec. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

[Sec. 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The General Assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions thereof.]⁴

ARTICLE II.

RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE

Section 1. Every *white*⁵ male⁶ citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this State six months next preceding the election, and of the County in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

Sec. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

Sec. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

Sec. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this State by being stationed in any garrison, barracks, or military or naval place, or station within this State.

Sec. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or persons convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

Sec. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.

[The general election for state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.]⁷

³The material between the brackets was added by an amendment adopted in 1908.

⁴This amendment was proposed by the General Assembly in 1880; readopted in 1882; ratified at a special election held on June 27, 1882; and certified adopted on June 28, 1882. On April 21, 1883, the Supreme Court of Iowa, in deciding *Kochler and Lange v. Hill*, held, that owing to certain irregularities, the amendment had not been legally submitted to the voters and hence was not a part of the Constitution—60 Iowa 543.

⁵The word "white" was eliminated by an amendment adopted in 1868.

⁶The word "male" remains in this section of the State Constitution, but it was rendered inoperative by the Nineteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, adopted in 1920. The General Assembly of Iowa ratified the Nineteenth Amendment on July 2, 1919.

⁷This section was added by an amendment adopted in 1884. It was repealed in 1916.

[Sec. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the General Assembly may by law provide.]⁸

ARTICLE III.

OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS

Section 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the Legislative, the Executive, and the Judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

Section 1. The Legislative authority of this State shall be vested in a General Assembly which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

Sec. 2. The sessions of the General Assembly shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the Governor of the State shall, in the meantime, convene the General Assembly by proclamation.

Sec. 3. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, *on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the Presidential election when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November,*⁹ and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Sec. 4. No person shall be a member of the House of Representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a *free white*¹⁰ *male*¹¹ citizen of the United States and shall have been an inhabitant of this State one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the County, or District he may have been chosen to represent.

Sec. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years at the same time and place as Representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of Representatives as to residence and citizenship.

Sec. 6. The number of senators shall not be less than one third, nor more than one half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of Senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

Sec. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

Sec. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Sec. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules and proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and, with the consent of two thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the General Assembly of a free and independent State.

Sec. 10. Every member of the General Assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent

entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

Sec. 11. Senators and Representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the General Assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

Sec. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the Governor, or the person exercising the functions of Governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

Sec. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasion as in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

Sec. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

Sec. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses, shall be signed by the Speaker and President of their respective houses.

Sec. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the General Assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but, if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the Governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the General Assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the Governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the General Assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the Secretary of State, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

Sec. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the General Assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

Sec. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the General Assembly.

Sec. 19. The House of Representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the Senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two thirds of the members present.

Sec. 20. The Governor, Judges of the Supreme and District Courts, and other State officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust, or profit, under this State; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the General Assembly may provide.

Sec. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

Sec. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this State, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the General Assembly; but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

Sec. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public monies, shall have a seat in either House of the General Assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this State, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

Sec. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

Sec. 25. Each member of the first General Assembly under this Constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no General Assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

Sec. 26. No law of the General Assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session, shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the General Assembly by which they were passed. If the General Assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the State.

Sec. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the General Assembly.

Sec. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this State; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

Sec. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

Sec. 30. The General Assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for State, County or road purposes;
 For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;
 For changing the names of persons;
 For the incorporation of cities and towns;
 For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;
 For locating or changing county seats.

In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the State; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

Sec. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the General Assembly.

Sec. 32. Members of the General Assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm, (as the case may be) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of Senator, (or Representative, as the case may be), according to the best of my ability." And members of the General Assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

Sec. 33. *The General Assembly shall, in the years One thousand eight hundred and fifty nine, One thousand eight hundred and sixty three, One thousand eight hundred and sixty five. One thousand eight hundred and sixty seven, One thousand eight hundred and sixty nine, and One thousand eight hundred and seventy five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all white¹² inhabitants of the State.¹³*

Sec. 34. *The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white¹⁴ inhabitants in each.¹⁵*

[**Sec. 34.** The Senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session

of the General Assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the preceding census,¹⁶ (but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) Senator.)¹⁷

Sec. 35. The Senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the House of Representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the State, according to the number of white¹⁸ inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law one-half of that number or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereafter be formed.¹⁵

[**Sec. 35.** The House of Representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representatives shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.]¹⁶

Sec. 36. At its first session under this Constitution, and at every subsequent regular session, the General Assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.¹⁵

[**Sec. 36.** The General Assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the representatives, as hereinbefore required.]¹⁶

Sec. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

Sec. 38. In all elections by the General Assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

ARTICLE IV.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

Section 1. The Supreme Executive power of this State shall be vested in a Chief Magistrate, who shall be styled the Governor of the State of Iowa.

Sec. 2. The Governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the General Assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Sec. 3. There shall be a Lieutenant Governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the Governor. In voting for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as Governor, and for whom as Lieutenant Governor. The returns of every election for Governor, and Lieutenant Governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the State, directed to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both Houses of the General Assembly.

Sec. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the General Assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, as the case may be. [If, upon the completion of the canvass of votes for Governor and Lieutenant Governor by the General Assembly, it shall appear that the person who received the highest number of votes for Governor has since died, resigned, is

unable to qualify, fails to qualify, or for any other reason is unable to assume the duties of the office of Governor for the ensuing term, the powers and duties of the office shall devolve upon the person who received the highest number of votes for Lieutenant Governor until the disability is removed and, upon inauguration, he shall assume the powers and duties of Governor.]¹⁸

Sec. 5. Contested elections for Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, shall be determined by the General Assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the State, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

Sec. 7. The Governor shall be commander in chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this State.

Sec. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of the government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

Sec. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

Sec. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the Constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the Governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the General Assembly, or at the next election by the people.

Sec. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the General Assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they have been convened.

Sec. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the General Assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the State, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

Sec. 13. In case of disagreement between the two Houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the Governor shall have power to adjourn the General Assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next General Assembly.

Sec. 14. No person shall, while holding an office under the authority of the United States, or this State, execute the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

Sec. 15. The official term of the Governor, and Lieutenant Governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Lieutenant Governor, while acting as Governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for Governor; and while presiding in the Senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a Senator, and none other.

Sec. 16. The Governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the General Assembly at its next meeting, when the General Assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the General Assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reasons therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

Sec. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the Governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the Lieutenant Governor.

Sec. 18. The Lieutenant Governor shall be President of the Senate, but shall only vote when the Senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of Governor, the Senate shall choose a President pro tempore.

Sec. 19. *If the Lieutenant Governor, while acting as Governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the President pro tempore of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives.²⁰*

[**Sec. 19.** If there be a vacancy in the office of Governor and the Lieutenant Governor shall be reason of death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability become incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor, the President pro tempore of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled or the disability removed; and if the President pro tempore of the Senate, for any of the above causes, shall be incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and if the Speaker of the House of Representatives, for any of the above causes, shall be incapable of performing the duties of the office of Governor, the Justices of the Supreme Court shall convene the General Assembly by proclamation and the General Assembly shall organize by the election of a President pro tempore by the Senate and a Speaker by the House of Representatives. The General Assembly shall thereupon immediately proceed to the election of a Governor and Lieutenant Governor in joint convention.]²⁰

Sec. 20. There shall be a seal of this State, which shall be kept by the Governor, and used by him officially, and shall be called the Great Seal of the State of Iowa.

Sec. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the State of Iowa, sealed with the Great Seal of the State, signed by the Governor, and countersigned by the Secretary of State.

Sec. 22. A Secretary of State, Auditor of State and Treasurer of State, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

ARTICLE V. JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT

Section 1. The Judicial power shall be vested in a Supreme Court, District Courts, and such other Courts, inferior to the Supreme Court, as the General Assembly may, from time to time, establish.

Sec. 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of three Judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold Court.²¹

Sec. 3. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the General Assembly may prescribe. The Judges of the Supreme Court so elected, shall be classified so that one Judge shall go out of office every two years, and the Judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be Chief Justice of the Court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each Judge of the Supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall be ineligible to any other office in the State, during the term for which they have been elected.

Sec. 4. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a Court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the General Assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior Judicial tribunals throughout the State.

Sec. 5. The District Court shall consist of a single Judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the District in which he resides. The Judge of the District Court shall hold his office for a term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of Judge of the Supreme Court, during the term for which he was elected.

Sec. 6. The District Court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal

matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

Sec. 7. The Judges of the Supreme and District Courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the State.

Sec. 8. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

Sec. 9. The salary of each Judge of the Supreme Court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each District Judge, one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year Eighteen hundred and sixty; after which time they shall severally receive such compensation as the General Assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

Sec. 10. *The State shall be divided into eleven Judicial Districts; and after the year Eighteen hundred and sixty, the General Assembly may re-organize the Judicial Districts and increase or diminish the number of Districts, or the number of Judges of the said Court, and may increase the number of Judges of the Supreme Court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one District, or one Judge of either Court at any one session; and no re-organization of the districts, or diminution of the number of Judges, shall have the effect of removing a Judge from office. Such re-organization of the districts, or any changes in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of Judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.*²²

[At any regular session of the General Assembly, the State may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be re-organized and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no re-organization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a Judge from office.]²³

Sec. 11. The Judges of the Supreme and District Courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each Judge shall commence on the first day of January next, after his election.

Sec. 12. The General Assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an Attorney General by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

Sec. 13. *The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of District Judge, elect a District Attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.*²⁴

[**Sec. 13.** The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1836, and every two years thereafter, elect a County Attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.]²⁵

Sec. 14. It shall be the duty of the General Assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article and to provide for a general system of practice in all the Courts of this State.

[The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the General Assembly may by law provide, or the General Assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.]²⁶

ARTICLE VI.

MILITIA

Section 1. The militia of this State shall be composed of all able-bodied *white*²⁷ male citizens between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this State, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the General Assembly may provide by law.

Sec. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace; provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

Sec. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia, (staff officers excepted,) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the Governor.

ARTICLE VII.

STATE DEBTS

Section 1. The credit of the State shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the State shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the State.

Sec. 2. The State may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 3. All losses to the permanent, School, or University fund of this State, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the State. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the State, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.

Sec. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the State in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this State, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each County, if one is published therein, throughout the State, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

Sec. 6. The Legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrevocable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

Sec. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

[**Sec. 8.** All motor vehicle registration fees and all licenses and excise taxes on motor vehicle fuel, except cost of administration, shall be used exclusively for the construction, maintenance and supervision of the public highways exclusively within the state or for the payment of bonds issued or to be issued for the construction of such public highways and the payment of interest on such bonds.]²⁸

ARTICLE VIII.

CORPORATIONS

Section 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the General Assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation, the same as that of individuals.

Sec. 3. The State shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the State.

Sec. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

Sec. 5. No act of the General Assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

Sec. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the General Assembly may also provide for the establishment of a State Bank with branches.

Sec. 7. If a State Bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and the branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

Sec. 8. If a general Banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning by an officer of State, of all bills or paper credit designated to circulate as money and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the State Treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of States in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent, below their average value in the City of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent, on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stock shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of the stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

Sec. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all of its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

Sec. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the billholders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

Sec. 11. The suspension of specie payment by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

Sec. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the General Assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the General Assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

ARTICLE IX.

EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LAWS

1st. EDUCATION.

Section 1. The educational interest of the State, including Common Schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a Board of Education,²⁹ which shall consist of the Lieutenant Governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the Board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the State

Sec. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said Board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the State.

Sec. 3. One member of said Board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this Constitution, the Board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the Board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

²⁹Under the provisions contained in Section 16 of this part of Art. IX, the Board of Education was abolished by act of the legislature in 1864.—Laws of Iowa, 1864, Ch. 52. This act by the General Assembly rendered Sections 1 to 14 of the first part of Art. IX inoperative and obsolete, although they have not been repealed.

Sec. 4. The first session of the Board of Education shall be held at the Seat of Government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the General Assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

Sec. 5. The session of the Board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the Board, the Governor may order a special session.

Sec. 6. The Board of Education shall appoint a Secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the Board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the Board, and the laws of the State. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the General Assembly.

Sec. 7. All rules and regulations made by the Board shall be published and distributed to the several Counties, Townships, and School Districts, as may be provided for by the Board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

Sec. 8. The Board of Education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to Common Schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the School or University fund of this State; but all acts, rules, and regulations of said Board may be altered, amended or repealed by the General Assembly; and when so altered, amended or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the Board of Education.

Sec. 9. The Governor of the State shall be, *ex officio*, a member of said Board.

Sec. 10. The Board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the General Assembly.

Sec. 11. The State University shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the University fund shall be applied to that institution and no other.

Sec. 12. The Board of Education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the State, through a system of Common Schools, and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three month in each year. Any district failing, for two successive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

Sec. 13. The members of the Board of Education shall each receive the same per diem during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the General Assembly.

Sec. 14. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation or law, for the government of Common schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the Board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the Board shall be "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

Sec. 15. At any time after the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the General Assembly shall have power to abolish or re-organize said Board of Education, and provide for the educational interest of the State in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

2ND. SCHOOL FUNDS AND SCHOOL LANDS.

Section 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the General Assembly of this State.

Sec. 2. The University lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all monies belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the State University. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said University.

Sec. 3. The General Assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of the intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this State, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new States, under an act of Congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several States of the Union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent, as has been or may hereafter be granted by Congress,

on the sale of lands in this State, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the General Assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of Common Schools throughout the State.

Sec. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several Counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several Counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said Counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of Common Schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the Board of Education shall from time to time provide.

Sec. 5. The General Assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this State, for the use of the University, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said University, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the General Assembly as soon as may be, to provide official means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said University.

Sec. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same, that by law, receive and control the State and county revenues for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

Sec. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of Common Schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the General Assembly.

ARTICLE X.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

Section 1. Any amendment or amendments to this Constitution may be proposed in either House of the General Assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two Houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the General Assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all the members elected to each House, then it shall be the duty of the General Assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the General Assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the Constitution of this State.

Sec. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

Sec. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the General Assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a Convention to revise the Constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a Convention for such purpose, the General Assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such Convention.

ARTICLE XI.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Section 1. The jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace shall extend to all civil cases, (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise,) where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

Sec. 2. No new County shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the County of Worth, and the counties west of it along the Northern boundary of this State, may be organized without additional territory.

Sec. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last State and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

Sec. 4. The boundaries of the State may be enlarged, with the consent of Congress and the General Assembly.

Sec. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, and also an oath of office.

Sec. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Sec. 7. The General Assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been, or may be granted by Congress to this State, and the location of which may be given to the General Assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred and twenty acres.

Sec. 8. The seat of Government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law at the City of Des Moines, in the County of Polk; and the State University, at Iowa City, in the County of Johnson.

ARTICLE XII.

SCHEDULE.

Section 1. This Constitution shall be the supreme law of the State, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The General Assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this Constitution into effect.

Sec. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this Constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

Sec. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this Constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment, in the same manner as they would have been, had not this Constitution been made.

Sec. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the State, or to any County therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the State, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 5. All bonds executed to the State, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

Sec. 6. The first election under this Constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven, at which time the electors of the State shall elect the Governor and Lieutenant Governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such State Senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and members of the House of Representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the sessions of the General Assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

Sec. 7. The first election for Secretary, Auditor, and Treasurer of State, Attorney General, District Judges, Members of the Board of Education, District Attorneys, members of Congress, and such State officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, (except the Superintendent of Public Instruction,) and such county officers as were elected at the August election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except Prosecuting Attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight: Provided, That the time for which any District Judge or other State or County officer elected at the April election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, shall

not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

Sec. 8. The first election for Judges of the Supreme Court, and such County officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

Sec. 9. The first regular session of the General Assembly shall be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

Sec. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by a vote of the General Assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this Constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this Constitution, (except as in this Constitution otherwise provided,) shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this Constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this Constitution prescribed.

Sec. 12. The General Assembly, at the first session under this Constitution, shall district the State into eleven Judicial Districts, for District Court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the General Assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution.

Sec. 13. This Constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the State at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this State. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the Constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the Constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general election of the State, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the Secretary of State, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of State officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this Constitution are in favor of the same, the Governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such Constitution shall be the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

Sec. 14. At the same election that this Constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word 'white' from the article on the Right of Suffrage, shall be separately submitted to the electors of this State for adoption or rejection in the manner following—Namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the Article on the Right of Suffrage? Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the Article on the Right of Suffrage? No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this Constitution, then said word "White" shall be stricken from said Article and be no part thereof.²⁰

Sec. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the County of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth Judicial District of this State.

[Sec. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd number years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would

otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended to one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and term of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.]³¹

Done in Convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty-first.

Governor Grimes' Proclamation

Proclamation

Whereas an instrument known as the New Constitution of the State of Iowa, adopted by the constitutional Convention of said State on the fifth day of March A.D. 1857, was submitted to the qualified electors of said State at the annual election held on Monday the third day of August 1857, for their approval or rejection, and whereas an official canvass of the votes cast at said election shows that there were forty thousand three hundred and eleven votes cast for the adoption of said Constitution and thirty eight thousand six hundred and eighty one votes were cast against its adoption, leaving a majority of sixteen hundred and thirty votes in favor of its adoption.

Now, therefore, I, James W. Grimes, Governor of said State, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me, hereby declare the said New Constitution to be adopted, and declare it to be the supreme law of the State of Iowa.

On testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the Great Seal of the State of Iowa Done at Iowa City this third day of September A.D. 1857 of the Independence of the United States the eighty second year of the State of Iowa the Eleventh

Amendments to the Constitution of Iowa

AMENDMENTS OF 1868 ²²

- 1st. Strike the word "white" from section one of article two thereof.
- 2d. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-three of article three thereof.
- 3d. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-four of article three thereof.
- 4th. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-five of article three thereof.
- 5th. Strike the word "white" from section one of article six thereof.

AMENDMENTS OF 1880 ²³

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

AMENDMENTS OF 1882 ²⁴

Add as section 26 to article I of said Constitution the following: Section 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage, any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The General Assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

AMENDMENTS OF 1884 ²⁵

Amendment 1. The general election for state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

Amendment 2. At any regular session of the General Assembly, the State may be divided into the necessary Judicial Districts for District Court purposes, or the said Districts may be reorganized and the number of the Districts and the Judges of said Courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the Districts or diminution of the Judges shall have the effect of removing a Judge from office.

Amendment 3. The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the General Assembly may by law provide, or the General Assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

Amendment 4. That section 13 of article 5 of the Constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section:

SECTION 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter elect a County Attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

AMENDMENTS OF 1904 ²⁶

Add as section 16, to Article XII of the Constitution, the following:

SECTION 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, State Senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the House of Representatives. The terms of office of the Judges of the

Supreme Court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in add numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the General Assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of office of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The General Assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The General Assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

That sections thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa, be repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

SEC. 34. The Senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

SEC. 35. The House of Representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representatives shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

SEC. 36. The General Assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.

AMENDMENT OF 1908 ³⁷

That there be added to Section eighteen (18) of Article one (1) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa, the following:

"The General Assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The General Assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation."

AMENDMENT OF 1916 ³⁸

To repeal Section seven (7) of Article two (2) of the Constitution of Iowa and to adopt in lieu thereof the following, to wit:

"The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide."

AMENDMENT OF 1926 ³⁹

Strike out the word "male" from Section four (4) of Article three (3) of said Constitution, relating to the legislative department.

AMENDMENT OF 1928 ⁴⁰

That the period (.) at the end of said Section thirty-four (34) of Article three (3) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa be stricken and the following inserted:

" , but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator."

AMENDMENT OF 1936 ⁴¹

Amend Article three (III) by repealing Section thirty-three (33) relating to the state census.

AMENDMENT OF 1942 ⁴²

That Article seven (VII) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa be amended by adding thereto, as Section eight (8) thereof, the following:

"All motor vehicle registration fees and all licenses and excise taxes on motor vehicle fuel, except cost of administration, shall be used exclusively for the construction, maintenance and supervision of the public highways exclusively within the state or for the payment of bonds issued or to be issued for the construction of such public highways and the payment of interest on such bonds."

AMENDMENT OF 1952 ⁴³

Amendment 1. That section four (4) of Article IV of the Constitution of Iowa be amended by adding thereto the following: "If, upon the completion of the canvass of votes for Governor and Lieutenant Governor by the General Assembly, it shall appear that the person who received the highest number of votes for Governor has since died, resigned, is unable to qualify, fails to qualify, or for any other reason is unable to assume the duties of the office of Governor for the ensuing term, the powers and duties of the office shall devolve upon the person who received the highest number of votes for Lieutenant Governor until the disability is removed and, upon inauguration, he shall assume the powers and duties of Governor."

Amendment 2. That section nineteen (19) of Article IV of the Constitution of Iowa be repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof: "If there be a vacancy in the office of Governor and the Lieutenant Governor shall by reason of death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability become incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor, the President pro tempore of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled or the disability removed; and if the President pro tempore of the Senate, for any of the above causes, shall be incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and if the Speaker of the House of Representatives, for any of the above causes, shall be incapable of performing the duties of the office of Governor, the Justices of the Supreme Court shall convene the General Assembly by proclamation and the General Assembly shall organize by the election of a President pro tempore by the Senate and a Speaker by the House of Representatives. The General Assembly shall thereupon immediately proceed to the election of a Governor and Lieutenant Governor in joint convention."

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the Powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.—We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.—That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.—That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its power in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shown, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.—Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.—He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.—He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.—He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.—He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their Public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into complacency with his measures. He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his in-

vasion on the rights of the people.—He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the Legislative powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the meantime exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions from within.—He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.—He has obstructed the Administration of Justice, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary Powers.—He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.—He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our People, and eat out their substance.—He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies, without the Consent of our legislatures.—He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power.—He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their acts of pretended Legislation:—For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:—For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from Punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:—For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:—For imposing taxes on us without our Consent:—For depriving us in many cases, of the benefits of Trial by Jury:—For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offenses:—For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighboring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies:—For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws, and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Government:—For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with Power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever:—He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.—He has plundered our seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.—He is at this time transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most hazardous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation.—He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their


Hands.—He has excited domestic insurrection amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stages of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people. Nor have We been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.—

We, Therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do.—And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.

The Declaration of Independence was adopted by the Continental Congress on July 4, 1776. The text as here presented was copied verbatim from *Documents Illustrative of the Formation of the Union of the American States*, published by the United States government in 1927, which in turn printed it from the engrossed copy of the original manuscript in the Library of Congress.

CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES¹

Preamble

We the People of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained the Age of twenty-five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.²

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by *adding to the whole number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other Persons.* [counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed.]³ The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at Least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Section 3. *The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.*⁴

[The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from

each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State Legislature.]

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one third may be chosen every second Year; and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies.⁵

[When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.]

No Person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.⁶

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

The Senate shall chuse their other officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two-thirds of the Members present.

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of honor, Trust or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except at to the Places of choosing Senators.

[The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different Day.]

[The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.]

Section 5. Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business; but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each house may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behavior, and, with the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their Judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one-fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

Neither House, during the Session of Congress, shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and

for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other place.

No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any Civil office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

Section 7. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it becomes a Law, be presented to the President of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his Objections to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two-thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two-thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten Days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a Law, in like Manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return, in which Case it shall not be a Law.

Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of Adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take Effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

Section 8. The Congress shall have power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow Money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes;

To establish a uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject of Bankruptcies throughout the United States.

To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;

To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;

To establish Post Offices and post Roads;

To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;

To constitute Tribunals inferior to the Supreme Court;

To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offences against the Law of Nations;

To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water;

To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;

To provide and maintain a Navy;

To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;

To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrection and repel Invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining, the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise Legislation in all Cases whatsoever, over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may by Cession of particular States, and the Acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the

Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be, for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, Dock-Yards, and other needful Buildings;—And

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers, vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Section 9. The Migration or Importation of such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a Tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.

The Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

No Bill of Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.

No Capitation, or other direct Tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census of Enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

[The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.]⁸

No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.

No Preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another; nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States; And no Person holding any Office of Profit or Trust under them, shall, without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind whatever, from any King, Prince or foreign State.

Section 10. No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coin Money; emit Bills of Credit; make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bills of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts, or grant any Title of Nobility.

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its Inspection Laws; and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State on Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Control of the Congress.

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Duty of Tonnage, keep Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any agreement or Compacts, with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded or in such imminent Danger, as will not admit of delay.

[All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.]⁹

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected as follows: Each State shall appoint, in such manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress; but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two Persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all the Persons voted for, and of the Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify and transmit sealed to the Seat of Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate, shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of Votes shall be the

President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the List the said House shall in like Manner chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States, the Representation from each State having one Vote; A quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two-thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case after the Choice of the president, the Person having the greatest Number of Votes of the Electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by Ballot the Vice Presidents.¹⁰

[The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate; The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted;— The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for President, the House of Representatives shall choose, immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. *And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President.*¹¹ The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-president, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice President of the United States.]¹²

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

[The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3d day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

[If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the terms of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

[The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.]¹³

No Person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained the Age of thirty-five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.¹⁴

In Case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said office, the Same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation, or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:—"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Section 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject relating to the Duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offences against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two-thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the Supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law; but the Congress may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior Officers, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

The President shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

Section 3. He shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

Section 4. The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on Impeachment, for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other Crimes and Misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services, a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

Section 2. The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases, in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties made, or which shall be made, under their Authority;—to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls;—to all Cases of admiralty and maritime Jurisdiction;—to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party;—to Controversies between two or more States;—between a State and Citizens of another State;—between Citizens of different States;—between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and

between a State, or Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.

[The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any foreign State.]¹⁵

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be a party, the supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

The Trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crime shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the Trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed.

Section 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in Levying War against them, or in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

The Congress shall have Power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attained.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof.

Section 2. The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

A Person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on Demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

No person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.¹⁶

Section 3. New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by the Junction of two or more States, or Parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

Section 4. The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic Violence.

ARTICLE V.

The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to the Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two-thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all intents and Purposes, as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislature of three-fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and

fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.

ARTICLE VI.

All Debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

[The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.]¹⁷

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any Office or public Trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The Ratification of the Conventions of nine States, shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same. done in Convention by the Unanimous Consent of the States present the Seventeenth Day of September in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and Eighty-seven and of the Independence of the United States of America the Twelfth. Amendments to the Constitution of the United States¹⁸

ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II.

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III.

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use; without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime, shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

ARTICLE XI.

The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.¹⁹

ARTICLE XII.

The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate;—The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted;—The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose, immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representatives from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, *before the fourth day of March next following*, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President. The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.²⁰

ARTICLE XIII.

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Section 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²¹

ARTICLE XIV.

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Section 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, Representatives in Congress, the Executive and Judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion,

or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Section 3. No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice-President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by votes of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

Section 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Section 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.²²

ARTICLE XV.

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²³

ARTICLE XVI.

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.²⁴

ARTICLE XVII.

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.²⁵

ARTICLE XVIII.

Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Section 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been rati-

fed as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the State by the Congress.²⁶

ARTICLE XIX.

The right of the citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²⁷

ARTICLE XX.

Section 1. The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3rd day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

Section 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3rd day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Section 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

Section 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Section 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

Section 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.²⁸

ARTICLE XXI.

Section 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Section 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or Possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by Congress.²⁹

ARTICLE XXII

Section 1. No person shall be elected to the office of the President more than twice, and no person who has held the office of President, or acted as President, for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected President shall be elected to the office of the President more than once. But this Article shall not apply to any person holding the office of President when this Article was proposed by the Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of President, or acting as President during the term within which this Article becomes operative from holding the office of President or acting as President during the remainder of such term.

Section 2. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the State by the Congress.³⁰
