
MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL MEETING OF THE

ADMINISTRATIVE RULES REVIEW COMMITTEE



The special meeting of the Administrative Rules Review Committee (ARRC) was held on Monday, April 11, 1994, in Room 22, State Capitol, Des Moines, Iowa.

Members present

Senator Berl E. Priebe and Representative Janet Metcalf, Co-chairs; Senators H. Kay Hedge, John P. Kibbie, William Palmer and Sheldon Rittmer; Representatives Horace Daggett, Roger Halvorson, and David Schrader. Representative Minnette Doderer absent.

Convened:

Senator Priebe convened the meeting at 7:10 a.m. and recognized David Ancell, Betty Grandquist and Beth Bahnson from Elder Affairs for the following:

ELDER AFFAIRS

ELDER AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT[321]

Ch 24, 25

At Metcalf's request, Ancell outlined changes made to chapters 24 and 25 and advised they were not as complex as previous rules and would allow more flexibility. Comments at the public hearing were considered by the Department and many were incorporated in the rules.

Ch 26

Bahnson explained changes in Chapter 26 which included clarification of definitions and regulation of new construction for elder group homes.

Halvorson expressed concern that facility standards (26.9) were too stringent and that it would be difficult for existing homes to qualify. Bahnson stated that the minimum requirement of 30 inches width for hallways had been deleted from 26.9(2)"a"(6). References to fire safety were deleted since rules of public safety govern this area.

Hedge was informed that about 45 facilities had expressed interest in the rules relative to elder group homes but no applications had been received since the rules were not in effect.

Daggett echoed Halvorson's concerns. No Committee action.

PUBLIC SAFETY Mike Coveyou and Roy Marshall, the state fire marshal, were present for the following agenda:

The fire safety rules for elder group homes were before the ARRC. Daggett was informed that no public comment was received at the hearing. Discussion focused on the requirement for two exits on each level with resident sleeping rooms (5.625(2)).

Kibbie expressed opposition to the rule as being in noncompliance with legislative intent. Marshall responded that the two-exit requirement had been in existence for many years for facilities occupied by more than three people. Kibbie would have no problem with these rules if these were requirements for more than three occupants. Coveyou interjected that the definition of an elder group home was three to five residents. The rules would not be applicable to fewer than three. Marshall interpreted Senate File 3 as directing the fire marshal to promulgate rules to ensure safety in these facilities. [Code Supp. §231B.2(2)"d"]

Priebe had also received complaints about the two-exit requirement on the second floor.

Hedge inquired about fire safety for bed and breakfast facilities. Marshall advised that with two guest rooms, only smoke detectors were required. excess of two, more stringent hotel rules would apply.

Requirements in 5.625(14) regarding basements exits were discussed. suggested provision for separate exit if the basement were used for sleeping quarters.

Dierenfeld expressed support for two exits on each floor.

Kibbie asked to be recorded as opposed to implementation of rule 661—5.625.

Ch 75

Walker gave a brief overview of amendments to Chapter 75, conditions of eligibility for medical assistance (ARCs 4695A and 4661A). No questions.

Ch 77-79, 82

Medicaid reimbursement of ICFs/MR was before the Committee. Priebe advised that these rules scheduled to become effective June 1, 1994, would be placed on the May 10 agenda for afternoon review. Any formal action could be taken by the Committee at the May meeting.

Responding to Kibbie, Gesaman stated that rates could not be raised during any official delay of the rules.

Schrader commented on the wide range of per diem rates among the providers.

Priebe requested the Department to provide data on facilities that have divided their costs "across the board" on all levels of care versus those that have added administrative costs to the highest level of care which would inflate the higher levels. Gesaman distributed information to the Committee that ranked facilities from lowest cost to highest cost. Gesaman said that administrative costs must be reasonably allocated among the different levels of care but he would review the matter.

HUMAN SERVICES (Cont.)

Halvorson echoed Schrader's concerns on the wide range of per diem costs.

Daggett was advised that copies of comments at the public hearing had been sent to Joe Royce for the Committee.

Palmer arrived.

In review of federal flood relief supplemental social services block grand funds, Bennett advised Priebe that the 25 percent awarded to Human Services would be used in such areas as home-based services or day care.

No questions or recommendations on ARCs 4660A or 4694A.

7.5(8) et al. Welfare Reform

In review of the amendments regarding welfare reform, Schrader advised that the Committee should make a decision on the objection voted on 41.24(8)"f," regarding the two-parent household under a FIA. At the appropriate time, he would move to delay that paragraph. In response to Metcalf, Schrader took the position that these were the options from which to choose. Schrader expressed frustration that the Council chose to override the ARRC as well as the working group created to develop these rules.

Motion to Delay

Schrader then moved to delay 41.24(8)"f" for 70 days for further study.

Howard explained the effect delay would impose on subsequent portions of the rule. In general, it would eliminate any type of consequence or reality for the two-parent family, including the initial encouragement to make the appointment with the PROMISE JOBS office.

Rittmer was hesitant to hold up the program.

Halvorson concurred that time was needed to monitor the effectiveness of the program. He cited a situation in his area where it was working.

Metcalf would resist the motion to delay.

Schrader made closing remarks in support of his motion.

Motion failed

Motion failed on a tie vote, four to four.

Motion—Objection

Metcalf moved to lift the objection placed on 41.24(8)"f." Motion carried 7 to 1.

Kibbie was advised that if an agency eliminated a position they should notify the Board so their rules could be modified (as explained in 11.2).

Ch 13 Chapter 13, executive branch lobbyists, was discussed. Williams explained the

thrust of this rule would be focused on those outside of government who lobby an

executive agency.

Committee Business Priebe brought to the Committee's attention that the ARRC Rules of Procedure should be amended to denote "Chair" and "Co-chair" rather than "Chair" and "Vice-chair." Kibbie moved that Barry be authorized to correct the Committee's Rules of Procedure which are published in the IAC. Motion carried unanimously.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE

Royce called attention to the Substance Abuse rules placed under "No Rep" category on the agenda. A doctor in Cedar Rapids who treats heroin addicts with methadone wanted to comment on rule 643-3.35 and the Department was not opposed to delaying the rule for further study.

Motion

Hedge moved to delay rule 643—3.35 for 70 days.

Schrader voiced opposition to the delay, noting that seven votes were required to remove a delay. However, he indicated a willingness to support such action if the Committee would agree to lifting the delay as a first order of business at the May meeting.

Metcalf would support a delay citing time element for ARRC review during the legislative session.

After perusal of the "No Representative called" agencies, the Committee concurred that the following should be added to the May agenda: General Services, Terrace Hill; Public Health, drug testing and immunization; and Racing and Gaming, exotic wagering.

Royce advised that he had been contacted by the board of supervisors in Woodbury County who expressed concern over increased costs because of inconsistencies in the IQ level for determining mental retardation. Priebe asked that the issue be placed on the May agenda – 441—Chapters 22 and 24.

Recess

After a ten-minute recess, the following Environmental Protection Commission agenda was reviewed:

McAllister informed the Committee that the proposed amendments and new Chapter 67, relating to sewage sludge, were intended for federal compliance.

Schrader asked if these rules were liberalizing the disposal of sewage sludge in landfills. McAllister responded that, if anything, the rules would be more stringent because of additional monitoring and reporting requirements.

Metcalf inquired about any other significant changes that would affect Polk County. McAllister said that more testing and reporting would be required for pathogen and vector reduction.

Priebe reported on telephone calls he had received in opposition to alleged sale (600 at \$500 each) of wild turkeys out of Iowa which cut back on the fall season. Cummings explained that these turkeys were trapped on farms with depredation problems where farmers have asked for help, e.g. Allamakee County. Money from the sale of these turkeys is placed in a trust fund to purchase turkey habitat.
