### Death of "Lon" McPherson

Forrest McPherson received word Saturday of the death of his uncle, A. L. McPherson at Elgin, Oklahoma. No particulars have been received further than that his death resulted from an accident with a horse.

Mr. McPherson was among the early residents of Stuart. He was in the livery business for some years, his barn being located on the spot where Johnston Bros' bakery now stands. Later, but as early as 1878, he was engaged in the newspaper business for a few years, conducting the Independent Citizen, a Greenback paper which he bought of Ham Kautzman. Later he sold his plant to Davies & Caldwell, who changed the name of the paper to the Stuart Register.

The deceased took an active part in politics and the local affairs of Stuart and Guthrie county. We do not recall that he ever filled any public position, but he was a man of energy although up to the time of his leaving Stuart for Oklahoma, a number of years ago, he had not met with the financial success which his energy deserved. After locating in Oklahoma he entered the real estate business and later banking, at which he is reported to have succeeded splendidly.

### His Work Praised

### Particulars Concerning Accidental Death of A. L. McPherson

Through the courtesy of the Farmers' Champion published at Elgin, Oklahoma, we are enabled to give to our readers the particulars concerning the accidental death of A. L. or, (as he will be remembered by our older citizens) "Len" McPherson, of which mention was made in our issue of last week:

"About five o'clock Friday evening, January 3 the telephone wires brought word to our little city that sent pain to every heart and cast a sad gloom over the entire community. Every quiver of the wire seemed to be barbed with grief when it hurriedly stated that A. L. McPherson had just been killed in an accident, some seven miles east of Elgin.

Shortly after three o'clock on that fatal afternoon, Mr. McPherson and James H. Crawford left Elgin for a farm some eight miles east of town. They were driving a very spirited horse and on their return, in passing the farm house of Mr. Lockwood, a dog suddenly charged upon them, frightening the horse, which wildly plunged to one side with such force as to completely overturn the buggy, pinning the occupants beneath. Another plunge or two jerked the buggy from off the victims and Mr. Crawford, who had grabbed the lines, held on and was dragged several feet. In the meantime, Mr. Lockwood, who had witnessed the accident, had reached them. With his help the horse was held and untangled from the harness and vehicle. In another instant Mr. Lockwood was at the side of the prostrated man and had placed the buggy cushion under his head. After this was done Mr. McPherson looked around for a moment and then suddenly and quietly passed away to the great beyond. His neck had been

remains back to Elgin. Near relatives  
were notified, and the body was em-  
balmed to await their coming on Sun-  
day.

Funeral services were held at the  
Methodist church Monday morning at  
10:30, conducted by Rev. W. E. G.  
Humphries; and, notwithstanding the  
blizzard that was raging, was attended  
by almost the entire community. The  
sermon was most appropriate and  
touching, and the music soul inspiring.  
The pall bearers were: Dr. Gamble, L.  
C. Coffin, T. R. Bennett, G. W. Temple,  
E. Stone and J. B. Stackhouse.

At 1:50 p. m. the attending rela-  
tives left with the remains for Wood-  
ward, Oklahoma, where the bankers  
and other prominent citizens in that  
part of the state had requested that  
the remains lie in state a day or so  
that his host of friends there might  
pay due respect to the resting form of  
one who had been such a valuable and  
prominent citizen among them so long  
and whom they had learned to respect  
and love. The remains were tem-  
porarily buried there Wednesday  
afternoon. Later on they will be re-  
moved to Des Moines, Iowa, and in-  
terred in the body's final resting place.

Mr. McPherson, during his residence in Iowa, served two terms in the legislature of that state. He also served his country in the army during the great war of the Rebellion, and served on the staff of General McPherson, of whom he was a cousin. In 1889 he moved with his family to El Reno, Oklahoma, where he took a prominent part in the then territory for years. He was appointed by Secretary Noble, under President Harrison's administration, as allotting agent of the C. and A. Indians. He spent the major part of one summer in Washington as a lobbyist in the interest of these Indians. After having opened up the territory of the C. and A. country, he acted as governor townsite agent and laid out and platted many of the now important towns of the state. He afterwards moved to Woodward, where he established a large stock ranch and engaged extensively in the cattle and banking business, and continued in the latter up to the time of his death. He purchased the bank of Elgin something over a year ago, of which he was president and his son, Everett McPherson, cashier.

Mr. McPherson was a man of generous impulses, and never forgot the hospitality of the early pioneers. He was a royal entertainer and at his home there was always a cordial welcome for everyone. He was at home at the bedside of the sick, and delighted in all kinds of true neighborly courtesies. He had borne adversity bravely and enjoyed prosperity unostentatiously and quietly. He had filled the various relations of life, as

## THE MC PHERSONS

(By Mrs. Priscilla McCoig and Mrs. George Compton)

Joseph W. McPherson (the son of George D. McPherson and Charity H. Locke, daughter of Captain John Locke of Roanoke, Virginia), was born in Ohio in 1815, and as a young man taught school in Indiana, following the carpenter's trade in the summer. In 1834 he married Sarah Lenington and they were blessed with twelve children: George B., Abraham L., John B., Augustus W., Mary Jane (Mrs. W.C. Wollen), James Monroe, Rufus K., Emma C. (Mrs. Edward L. Pugh), Exaline S. (Mrs. George Burgan), Myrta E. (Mrs. J. Fowler), and two who died in infancy.

Coming to Guthrie County in 1857 in a Conestoga wagon, Joseph bought 200 acres of Iowa prairie and timber land, and established the Mackville post office at his house between Greenfield and Redfield while he carried the mail between the two points and served as a circuit-riding preacher for the Methodist Church.


George B. raised fine Hereford cattle and Percheron horses; and in 1896 he and his sons migrated to a ranch near Hereford, South Dakota. Abraham L. graduated from Iowa State University, served in the Civil War, then bought land and represented this tract in the State Legislature, and in 1867 gave much time, land and money for the advancement of the town of Stuart. John B., while a student at Iowa State University, enlisted in the U.S. Cavalry in the Civil War, later entering the mercantile business.

Augustus W. enlisted in the Army, then turned to railroading. Mary Jane was one of the first teachers in Adair and Guthrie Counties. Emma C. and Exaline S. graduated from Drake University and taught in Stuart and other Guthrie County schools. Rufus K. was a furniture dealer in Portland, Oregon. James Monroe was a farmer, and with his brother George opened a livery stable in Stuart.

In 1876, James Monroe McPherson married Priscilla Ann Miller of Stuart. Two children, Forrest and Maude, were born to them; and Priscilla Ann died in 1895. A year later, James Monroe married a widow, Mrs. Lillie Barnett (the mother of George and Floyd Barnett); and to this union were born Matilda McPherson Lyall, Harold and Monroe McPherson.

Forrest S. McPherson was born at Stuart in 1881, the son of James Monroe McPherson and the grandson of Rev. Joseph W. McPherson. He graduated from Stuart High School in 1897 and has given the invocation at many alumni banquets. When young he taught five winter terms at North River and Lincoln Center schools. He married Ida Jane Mount, daughter of Agnes McKee and Charles Wesley Mount, settlers south of Stuart where the Mounts helped in founding the Mt. Vernon Methodist Church. Forrest farmed west of Stuart and won silver trophies at the State Fair for his purebred Berkshire hogs. The McPhersons

were members of the Country Club, and he taught a Young Adult Bible Class at the Stuart Methodist Church a number of years. He spent twelve years in the insurance business.

The Forrest McPhersons have three living children: Chase Monroe, Priscilla and Inez Maude. There have been several Methodist ministers from this family. Chase has held pastorates in Iowa and Virginia and is now in charge of a Wesley Methodist Church at Salem, Ohio. One daughter, Priscilla while teaching in the Stuart Junior High school coached the National Spelling Champion, Jean Trowbridge. Priscilla married Dr. Austin G. McCoig from East Tennessee who was for 30 years a pastor in the Holston

and Florida Conference of the Methodist Church. The younger daughter, Inez married a lawyer, Franklin Winslow and is medical social consultant in Detroit, Michigan schools. Her son, David Winslow was recently ordained in the Methodist Church, and is now in Seminary at Drew University. David grew up in the Stuart church until he was ten years old in his grandparents' home, and not long ago gave the Sunday morning sermon here. About 100 years ago his great-grandfather, Rev. Joseph McPherson preached the first Methodist sermon in Stuart in the old wooden depot, and later held divine services in the hotel known as the Dunham House.

## THE EIGHT-SIDED HOUSE

(By Belva Cooper)

Robert Ewers of Ohio came here about 1854, bought land east of Stuart, and in 1860 built this eight-sided house around a tree, with a look-out tower on the rooftop. He surveyed land, farmed and served as Justice of the Peace. The Ewers family attended the Quaker Church, and the parents are buried in North Oak Grove cemetery.

In the picture are shown Joseph Diebold and family who bought the farm in 1881. He stands beside the buggy which holds the urn from which he delivered milk to Stuart customers. The Diebolds squared the outside of the house, which formerly had a square central area surrounded by eight rooms of varied shapes; and it remained standing until 1965.


