OBITUARY.

Another One of Dubuque County's Pioneers Passes Away.

Hon. Dennis Donovan, whose serious illness was mentioned yesterday, died this morning at his residence on Locust street, between Eighth and Ninth, aged about seventy years. He had been in ill health for some time and his demise was not unexpected. Mr. Donovan was a native of County Cork, Ireland, and emigrated to this country about fifty years ago, and had been a resident of Dubuque county for about fifty-five years. Until quite recently he resided on his farm in Table Mound township, but increasing years caused him to give up the active management of the farm and he moved into the city. He was well educated and recognized as one of the influential men of the county. For nine years he served as a member of the Board of Supervisors and he also served two terms in the lower house of the legislature. He was a man who had many warm friends and whose honesty and integrity were never questioned. He leaves six children--two sons and four daughters.


