ANOTHER PIONEER GONE.

Obituary Notice of Hon. Stephen Tillson by an Intimate Personal Friend.

In the legira which followed the collapse of Sergeants Bluffs as a rival of Sioux City, two of its citizens besides myself found homes in Onawa; John Elwell and Stephen Tillson. As the survivor it has been and is a duty and pleasure to pay a brief and truthful tribute to the character of these, my early townsmen and friends, who have preceded me to that Unknown whence no man returneth.

Of Judge Tillson's early life I know little. He was born in Huron county, Ohio, July 25, 1822, and raised on a farm. He was a graduate of the State University of Michigan and also of its law school, and ranked very high in his classes in both. The evidences of his scholarship and mental training were always apparent in his deportment and conversation. He practiced law for some years in Chicago and removed thence early in 1856 to Sergeants Bluffs, where he continued the practice until he removed to Onawa, about the beginning of 1858. He was married to Mrs. Esther R. Case, January 5, 1859, who with their only child, Stephen, survives him.

In this county his avocation has been farming. Beginning with little, he, by strict economy, amassed a large competence. He deservedly occupied a high position in the esteem and confidence of his fellow-citizens. At one time he was called to fill the important and responsible office of county (probate) judge, and at another he was chosen to represent three counties in the general assembly of the state, and was, as I can personally testify, a very faithful, diligent, and conscientious legislator. Judge Tillson was a man of extensive, varied and accurate information. He loved knowledge for the sake of knowledge, and "sought it long with ardor ever new." His perceptive faculties were not of the highest order, and he was for this reason lacking in practical business tact and capacity of dealing successfully with men and things as they are. His reasoning faculties, though not broad and deep, were remarkably accurate, acute and distinct; and, though frequently failing to take in the whole subject at one view, he reached his conclusions with a directness and clearness seldom surpassed. In looking at a subject his mind seemed to see not one great comprehensive life like picture, but only a map of outlines—distinct indeed, but lacking in that blending of design and coloring which constitutes one great harmonious whole. He was a fine conversationalist, and his thorough education and knowledge, coupled with his direct and clear mental processes, made him in his best moods a very entertaining and instructive talker. Though somewhat reserved, he was by no means destitute of the finer social qualities and feelings, and his friendships, though not strong, were constant and lasting. He was fond of the young and always had for them a word of praise, encouragement or advice. He was in all things a moral man. All his impulses and motives were good. His mind was too pure to conceive, much less harbor, any thought ever entered his mind. No obscene word ever passed his lips. He was in every respect perfectly honest.

pulses and motives were good. His mind
was too pure to conceive, much less har-
bor, wrong; He was without a vice. No
impure thought ever entered his mind. No

was eminently just. He was always stri-
ctly truthful. He was absolutely free of
guile. He could neither conceal nor dis-
simulate. His mind and speech were as
frank, open and honest as a child's. His
soul ever reflected—as a constituent part
of itself—truth and justice, twin sisters of
immortality. His very failing—a strict
economy, re-inforced and intensified by a
love of gain—had its origin in virtues; and
so the last was softened and held in check
by the many nobler qualities of his mind
and character. Never for one moment
did it dispute the absolute dominion of
truth and justice in his being and his ac-
tions. It never shriveled to the littleness
of selfishness nor rose to the dignity of
avarice. And while he intensely desired
prosperity for himself, he was always to-
gether to envy, and too generous not to rejoice
in the prosperity of others.

There is a story of his earlier life
of which, with a heroic born of crushing
affliction and worthy of himself, he made
no man the confident—of a young wife an-
nounced snatched, in all the beauty and im-
mence of youth and childhood, from a loving
husband and father, and of the energetic
and aspirations and ambitions of a bril-
liant young manhood buried in their
graves. Who hath stood by the open grave
as it received the loved ones in whom were
centered the affections and joys and hopes
of life, and hath felt the heart strings sunder
and the brain reel, uncovers with re-
verence and sympathy. Such are the ac-
cidents and foibles which give direction and
coloring to life. The tiny bark of life
launched on the still waters of an inland
rill, grows as it drifts, and drifts as it
grows, until it reaches the stormy ocean—
a majestic ship with sails spread and colors
flying. Who would bring the great ship
through its long voyage safely, gallantly
and nobly to port, must have the chart in
view, the eye on the compass and the hand
ever firmly at the helm; must determine
the direction and force of the winds and
the waves, ascertain the course and drift-
ing of the currents, search out the chan-
nels, discern the buoys which mark the
rocks and the shoals, and turn the face
constantly and unflinchingly, mid storm
and darkness and adverse winds and
waves, to the great lights which ever guide
to the entrance of the harbor. What won-
der if the shore be strewn with wrecks,
and the harbor lined with bare and broken
masts and battered and rotten hulks

Coming to Webster County, Iowa, he followed the same avocation, near Ft. Dodge, after which he came to Monona County, and makes his home with his son. He was married, December 18, 1853, to Adeline Olson, a native of the same section of Norway, born May 27, 1832, and who was a daughter of Ole Ogenson. Their children are as follows: John O., the subject of this sketch; Adeline, who was born in Norway, December 12, 1859; Lena, in LaSalle County, Ill., November 20, 1865; Julia M., in LaSalle County, Ill., February 20, 1869; and Oscar C., in Lee County, Ill. February 6, 1873.

John O. Johnson, at the age of six years, came to America with his parents, and spent his childhood and youth in LaSalle County, Ill. From the age of twelve years he worked on neighboring farms for the benefit of his father, after which he commenced railroading, and in the fall of 1873 went to Rice County, Minn., and was there engaged at farm labor for a year. We next find him in Webster County, Iowa, laboring on the railroad, and two years after, in the spring of 1877, coming to Monona County. After tilling the soil on rented farms for about three years, and practicing economy, thereby saving some little money, in 1880 he purchased eighty acres of land on section 3, Jordan Township, where he has since lived. By honest toil, thrift and economy, he has raised himself from comparative poverty to a position among the well-to-do farmers of the community, and has now a fine farm of one hundred and sixty acres of excellent land, all under fence, and ninety acres of it under cultivation. General farming and stock-raising are the branches he follows.

HON. STEPHEN TILLSON, SR., one of the earliest settlers and most prominent citizens of the county of Monona, in his day, came here in February, 1856. He was a native of Huron County, Ohio, born near Norwalk, July 25, 1822. He received his education in the common schools, and at the Michigan State University, at Ann Arbor, Mich., being graduated from the law department of the latter noble institution, about

1847. He then engaged in the practice of law at Chicago, Ill., where he attained some eminence, but seeking a larger scope for his abilities and energies, in 1856, he came to Monona County and settled. He was one of the leading attorneys in this section of the State, and took an active part in the politics of the county and district, and represented this district in the Lower House in the Twelfth General Assembly, in 1868-69. He died here November 13, 1884.

ESTHER R. TILLSON, *nee* DAVIS, one of the earliest pioneers of Monona County, now residing on section 5, Franklin Township, came here with her brother, Isaac Davis, November 13, 1855, from Lee County, Iowa, and made the entire trip with an ox-team. She made her home with her brother until December 25, 1856, when she was united in marriage with Francis C. Case, a widower with five children. He was a native of Indiana, and died here April 19, 1858, after having been just elected to the office of Sheriff, but the duties of which he had not yet assumed. By this union there was one child: Francis C., Jr., born June 21, 1858, who now resides at home and carries on the farm for his mother. On the settlement of the estate, Mrs. Case took charge of her late husband's youngest daughter, then a girl ten years of age, who staid with her about four years.

Our subject again assumed the marital vows, January 5, 1859, being united with Hon. Stephen Tillson, a sketch of whom appears elsewhere, and by this union had one child: Stephen, Jr., a rising young attorney of Onawa, who was born December 9, 1859. The latter, after founding his education in the schools of the county, finished it at Quincy, Ill., and in the Iowa State University at Iowa City.

Mrs. Esther R. Tillson, was born in Columbiana County, Ohio, July 17, 1818, and is the daughter of Isaac and Edith Davis, natives of Wales and Virginia respectively. About 1810 her father removed from Ohio to Quincy, Ill., and after an extended stay, came by way of Nauvoo, to Lee County, Iowa, where he purchased a farm and
