The game was for a good-sized purse and was witnessed by a crowd of 500 people or more.

—The Lemon Squeezers base ball team invaded the Oquawkas own country yesterday and defeated them in a fast game of base ball. The score at the end of the ninth inning was 9 to 4. The Oquawka boys are good players and put up an excellent fight for the game, but the Burlington team besides being in fine trim were in exceptionally good spirits and played brilliant ball.

—The Grace M. Allen industrial school closes its summer term at the end of this week and will not be opened again until October 6, when the winter term will begin. This little educational institution has accomplished no small amount of good in the community. It is under excellent supervision and deserves all the good wishes and patronage it receives. A fine future is promised for it if it continues along the successful lines it has thus far pursued.

—An agreement was reached yesterday between the Lemon Squeezers and the Clinton-Copeland teams by which the rival base ball aggregations will each be enabled to demonstrate its boasted superiority over the other. They are to play next Saturday afternoon at Athletic park. Both teams claim the championship of the Jobbers' league. The game promises to be an interesting one. Both teams have a good many adherents with a great deal of faith in their ability to win.

—The health of Samuel Childs, who lives at 1300 Perkins avenue, has lately taken a turn for the worse. The paralysis with which he is afflicted has finally rendered him speechless. The story of the latter years in the life of the old soldier is a most pathetic one. After returning from the civil war for a time he was one of the prominent conductors on the Burlington road. But he was stricken with paralysis over two years ago and has been slowly succumbing to it ever since, until now it appears to be but a question of a short time before its hold upon him will be forever released.

—The funeral of the late Robert L. Banks was held yesterday afternoon from the residence of William Parr on South Seventh street. It was largely attended. Dr. Hurlburt officiated and preached a short but touching sermon, eulogizing the career of the deceased and dwelling on the lessons to be derived from his sudden death regarding the uncertainty of this life. There were many beautiful floral offerings, testimonials of friends of the family. The pall-bearers were Messrs. McKinley, Curtley and Lowry, of Hannibal, and E. O. Graesser, Geo. Walschmidt and Ed Beard of this city.

—Mrs. Mathilda M. Strack died at Burlington hospital at 11 o'clock last night. She had been sick for five or six weeks with typhoid fever. She was the wife of Louis B. Strack of this city. Mrs. Strack was born in Sweden, where her parents still live, and came to this county when a young girl. She had lived in Burlington for twenty years. She was a member of Charity Lodge, Degree of Honor, of this city, and was quite well known here, numbering a great many of the residents of Burlington among her friends. The occupants of the rig were spilled out and received several bad scratches and bruises. In the effort to get the horse on its feet again part of the harness was loosened. The animal finally jumped to its feet, broke away from the rig entirely and galloped down West Hill at break-neck speed to Unterkirchers' barn on Third street. The horse and buggy sustained no injury, though the harness was broken up. It is exceedingly fortunate that the gross carelessness of leaving the dirt-pile unprotected by lanterns did not result in a serious accident to the young people who were interested parties in the runaway.




