

RAILROAD MANAGERS HOPE TO HOLL

SSIAN MAY ABDICATE

POTATOES DROP TO 80 CENTS A PECK

The most noticeable change in the local markets for the past week was the drop in the price of potatoes from 90c to 80c per peck. The continued drop in the price of eggs was also a welcome change but this was offset in a way by the rise of 5c in the price of a pound of butter.

Several other changes have also been noted in the past week. In the buying prices, hens and springs have risen a little but other poultry has dropped on the average of a cent per pound. Corn is being bought at \$1.05 instead of \$1.00. Other buying prices aside from those mentioned, remain the same.

In the selling prices, butter is up to 45c and eggs down to 27c while flour remains the same. Bran is up 10c per hundred, springs are up 2c per pound and corn is up 5c per bushel. Graham flour is 5c cheaper per sack while oil meal has gone up 10c per hundred. Other prices are the same as last week.

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CLAUDIUS B. MILLER DIED AGE NINETY-TWO

COUNTY LOSES ONE OF ITS BEST
KNOWN CITIZENS

WAS UNIONVILLE RESIDENT

Came to County in Early Day—Served in the Civil War—Had Been in State Legislature for Two Terms

Claudius B. Miller, aged 92 and one of the oldest citizens of Appanoose county, a resident for 70 years, passed away at his home in Unionville Wednesday night at 11 o'clock. Mr. Miller, owing to his advanced age, had been failing for the past five years and had been slowly weakening, although he had been able to keep up his short daily walks until recently. For the past few weeks however, he had been especially weak and it was feared that he could not survive this last illness. On Monday he became critically ill and never fully rallied to his natural self before death came.

The death of "Uncle Claudius" as he was familiarly called by all who knew him, comes to Unionville and community with a great deal of sadness. For three quarters of a century he had been one of the most active figures in that community and partially by his exerted energy had the little town of Unionville been known for these many years as a great trading center. It was when Appanoose county was divided between wild prairie and dense woods that C. B. Miller first moved to Union township. RAILWAY MANAGERS HOPE TO
DELAY FOR DECISION

SOME PLACE EMBARGOES

St. Louis and Chicago Both Report Partial Restrictions on Live Stock and Food Shipments on Roads

(By United Press.)

New York, Mch. 15.—With a strong possibility of intervention by President Wilson to avert a national railway strike the brotherhood and railway representatives met here today to attempt settlement of the employes demands for an eight hour day and pro rata pay for overtime.

The railway managers intimate that the railroads attitude would be conciliatory and that they would seek to negotiate over a compromise proposition, hoping to postpone strike action until Monday when they believe the supreme court may announce its decision in the Adamson law case.

The proposed progressive strike would start Saturday night in the east and would work west until next Wednesday night all the brotherhood passenger and freight men in the country would be involved.

Offer by the Roads.

ARREST MADE IN THE STATE HOUSE

(By United Press.)

He continued in the mercantile business, both in business by himself and in partnership with G. M. Barnett of this city and then later with W. M. Dukes, of this city, until fifteen years ago when he retired from active business.

Claudius B. Miller was born in Hickman county, Tenn., Dec. 1, 1824, and was a son of Nathaniel Johnson Miller, whose birth occurred in North Carolina, and who was of Irish descent. The mother of C. B. Miller had several brothers who were soldiers in the Revolutionary war. C. B. Miller was reared upon the old home farm in Tennessee and there acquired his education. He was married in 1846 to Martha Baldrige who traveled life's journey with him for twenty-seven years before passing away in this county in 1873. They had come here soon after their marriage in 1847. Their children were Benjamin G., deceased; Joseph D., a resident of Missouri; Mrs. Laura J. Hicks, of Unionville; Mrs. Amanda Miller, of Unionville; Sarah, deceased; William C., and Mrs. Rosa B. Large of Oklahoma. After the death of the first wife Mr. Miller was again married in 1876 to Miss Dorcas E. Jennings. There were born to this union two children, Mrs. Fred Koehler, of Oklahoma, and Agnes, who lived with her father at the time of his death. Mr. Miller was recognized as a leader in business, political and social circles. In 1871 and 1873 he was elected to represent his district in the state assembly and left the impress of his individuality upon the legislation enacted during those sessions. At the time of the Civil war he was equally loyal to his country, joining the 36th Iowa infantry under the command of Col. Kittridge. He did faithful service in defense of the government and at the time of his death was a valued member of the Grand Army of the Republic, thus maintaining pleasant relations with his old comrades. He belonged to the Masonic fraternity and to the Methodist Episcopal church and there are few men who held the esteem of all as did C. B. Miller. He also leaves to mourn his death a sister who resides in Unionville and is just two years younger than her brother, Mrs. Jane Miller, who is past 90 years of age.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Friday afternoon from the Methodist church, in Unionville.

Embargo on Live Stock

St. Louis, Mch. 15.—Several railroads here have put an embargo on live stock and other freight as the first precautionary step in preparation for the threatened railroad strike.

Food stuffs are still being accepted this morning subject to delay or loss from delay.

Embargo at Chicago.

Chicago, Mch. 15.—Five railroads here today placed an embargo on live stock and perishable shipments. The Illinois Central was the only one touching Iowa. The Rock Island will order no embargo at this time. Officials of the other roads passing thru Iowa will meet here late today or tomorrow to determine their attitude on the embargo movement.

Despite their indifference the railway managers admit that a strike seems likely to come.

The hysteria that prevailed among the traveling public just before the crisis last fall is missing today.

Subject to Delay.

St. Paul, Mch. 15.—Instructions were today sent to all the agents of the Northern Pacific road to accept shipments of live stock and perishable freight, which will not reach their destination by Sunday evening, "subject to delay." The time set by the brotherhoods for a strike on the Northern Pacific is Sunday evening and the instructions are regarded as an embargo.


