DIED--At his home in Van Meter township on Saturday, August 22nd, 1885, at 5 o'clock P. M., of typhoid fever, H. G. Van Meter Esq., aged 54 years.

Probably the announcement of the death of no other citizen of Dallas county would cause more universal and deeper sorrow than does the above. Mr. Van Meter came to Dallas county in 1851, and purchased a part of the land owned by him in Van Meter township at the time of his death and a couple of years later settled and has remained here since that time. In the year 1860 he took for a wife Miss Damaris Dodge and leaves her with five children to mourn his death. The deceased was doubtless the wealthiest man in Dallas county and no man was more ready to give of his funds to charitable and worthy causes than he. The amount of suffering he has warded off of those around him less favored with this world's goods no one can tell, as what he did was not for the sake of display but because he was a true Christian. The life of this man was very near to the ideal life of a Christian. He was a member of the Christian denomination and his death, to that branch of the church, is an incalculable loss as he was always connected with its good works and it never lacked for funds when its wants were made known to him. Dallas county will sadly miss H. G. Van Meter.

and the President has unlimited control over the public purse, subject only to the consent of the Senate, one of the strongest safeguards of the people against oppression is broken down.

Mr. Loughridge was succeeded in the Forty-second Congress by M. M. Walden, but in 1872, was elected to serve in the Forty-third Congress, which will make six years in that capacity, and must be quite gratifying to one who endeavors to do his duty faithfully, regardless of frown or favor. One fact must be apparent to every one who has watched the congressional career of Mr. Loughridge. He has been faithful and impartial in the discharge of his duty, and this loyalty to manhood, should be honored by all true men.

In 1856, Mr. Loughridge was married to Miss D. L. Jones, of London, Ohio, the daughter of a Buckeye mechanic. She died in October, 1860, leaving two children, Charles and William. William followed his mother to the summer land in March, 1861.

Religiously he is a Presbyterian, and politically a Republican—his first vote being cast for Martin Van Buren as the Free Soil candidate for President in 1848.

Thus briefly we have outlined the record of the Hon. Wm. Loughridge. He is a man of sterling qualities and of indomitable will. But few men have made a more worthy record, and among our Iowa representatives he has not a superior in mental ability or in moral qualifications. He has honored himself, his state, and the nation by a faithful and an honest performance of every imposed duty. He is worthy and well tried—let him retain the place he is so well qualified to fill.

#### HUGO GROTIUS VAN METER.

REPRESENTATIVE, DE SOTO, IOWA.

Mr. Van Meter was born November 15, 1831, in Bartholomew county, Indiana. His ancestry were early emigrants from Europe—and having obtained grants of land on the south branch of the Potomac River, settled a colony, and still resided on

the land during the revolution. In about 1780, the great-grandfather, Jacob Van Meter, moved to Kentucky, then a dense wilderness. He settled in Hardin county, where he remained until the time of his death. The grandfather, Jacob Van Meter, Jr., accompanied his father to Kentucky, when a young man. He married, raised a family of fourteen children—all of whom lived to have families of their own. He died at the age of 80 years. The father, Joseph H. Van Meter, was born in 1792, in Hardin county, Kentucky, where he was raised to manhood, married a Miss Elizabeth B. Goundy, by whom he raised a family of four children. She died in 1832, when the subject of this sketch was but three months old. The father is still living with his son, Hugo, at De Soto, aged 81 years, and as healthy, to all appearances, as he was twenty-five years ago.

Young Van Meter was educated in the schools of Indiana, before the inauguration of the present efficient system of common schools. In 1852, he moved to Iowa, and settled near De Soto, in Dallas county. In company with his brother Jacob R., they purchased and located a farm of 320 acres, on which they began their career in the development of the resources of Iowa. In 1857 he sold a part of the farm and moved to Adel, the county seat, and began merchandizing. In 1859 he sold his store, and in 1860 began the erection of a flouring mill, one and a half miles north of De Soto, on the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railroad. His brother, J. R., had an equal interest in the milling enterprise, until December 1863, when J. J. Van Meter, another brother, purchased his interest. In 1868 he sold out and Hugo became the sole owner. He has put in many improvements, and the mill to-day is noted as one of the best in the country, the flour having an extensive sale in Southern Iowa and North Missouri, as well as the more accessible points in Central Iowa. The mill is a large

three story frame building, run by water, on South Coon. It has three run of burrs, and can use 350 bushels of grain every day. The mill cost about \$10,000.

In 1867 he was married to Miss Damaris Dodge, a native of Illinois. They have a family of two children.

In 1871 he was elected to the Legislature, and served through the session of 1872, and the adjourned session of 1873. He served on five committees, including public buildings, ways and means, etc.

Active, industrious and energetic, with an indomitable will and unimpeachable integrity, he moved in the legislative halls as one whose conscience was unclouded by any menial services, or by any unworthy word or deed. He is a man among men—worthy of the good opinion he enjoys as a loyal and desirable citizen, neighbor and friend.

#### ALVA WINSLOW VOODRY.

CAPITAL CARRIAGE WORKS, DES MOINES,

Mr. Voodry was born in Burk, Caledonia county, Vermont, January 24, 1825. He is of French ancestry, his grandparents having emigrated to America soon after the revolutionary war. The father, Lewis Voodry, is a native of Canada; is now living in Vermont, which has been his home from boyhood. He has ever followed the labors of the farm; is now about 90 years old, and having lived a life of industrious toil, is waiting for his change to the more active duties of the better land.

A. W. Voodry was raised on a farm in his native State, sharing the advantages of the common schools. At the age of twenty he engaged in the wagon shop of B. F. Bradley, of Fairfield, Vermont, for the purpose of acquiring the trade. After six years in the shop he moved to Peoria, Ill., where he labored at jour work, in a store
