### GEORGE MAXWELL ON THE BENCH

12 Jurors Summoned to Appear on The 4th Day of March

The February term of the Clarke County District Court will commence first of next week, with Judge Maxwell on the bench.

Twelve grand jurors are summoned to meet at 11 a. m., Tuesday, February 23. The trial jurors are called for the fourth day of March.

The docket for the term contains a large number of civil cases and three criminal cases in which George Holliday, Huddleston, T. J. Anderson, Cave and C. E. Fry are the defendants.

Under the heading of civil causes there are 87 cases. In the appearance there are 49 cases, with only 19 prosecutions.

Two murder cases entitled State vs Artie Cave, of Decatur County will take up considerable time this term.

## HON. R. A. DAGUE DEAD

Passed Away Last Saturday at the Age of 77 Years

Hon. R. A. Dague died at the home of Mrs. Myron Smith in Creston Saturday, February 16, 1918, at the age of 77 years. He was a brother of our townsman, J. B. Dague and was well known in Osceola.

Mr. Dague was born near Stanton, Morrow County, Ohio, March 27, 1841, and in 1863 he entered the army as sergeant in Co. G 88th Ohio Inf. He was discharged on account of poor health and soon after settled in Osceola, Iowa.

He was married to Miss Mary Jane Reed and to this union were born two children, one dying in infancy, and the other, Russell, now living in New York, was present at the funeral services in Creston and at the burial in Osceola.

In 1870 Mr. Dague represented this district in the Iowa Senate. He was also a well known newspaper man and writer, having been in that business most of his life, and was at one time editor of the Osceola Sentinel.

He leaves the son, Russell, and a wife in Creston who was too ill to attend the funeral. Also a brother in California and J. B. Dague of Osceola.

The remains were laid to rest in Maple Hill cemetery. The burial ceremony was conducted by the Rev. James J. McKay, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church.

Cards have been mailed out by the board asking the men to report here Friday.

A dinner in honor of the drafted men who will go to Camp Dodge will be given Friday noon at the Christian church by the Sons of Veterans, the G. A. R. and the W. R. C. Following the banquet a program will be given and the public is invited to attend. The program will begin at 1:30. Patriotic addresses will be given by Dr. Douthett, Rev. Cannon, Rev. Muynon and other citizens. Mrs. Joe Goodman will give a reading.

The men will leave Osceola Saturday morning at eight o'clock for Camp Dodge.

hours of closing, and in doing they have kept in mind the rest for conservation of man power, etc. From and after this date merchants will open in the morning as they did prior to the fuel administration's order, and in the evening they will close their stores promptly at 6 o'clock. Two deliveries will be made each day, this plan adopted to save man power and fuel. The morning delivery is to be completed before noon so far as is possible, but orders for the forenoon delivery must be in by 9:30 o'clock. Orders for the afternoon delivery must be in by 3 o'clock. Later orders can be delivered until the following

next Tuesday, February 19th. Grocers and meat dealers will work with the Women's Council of Defense in efforts to make a success of the patriotic meeting to be held at the Grand. This is in line with the recommendations of the food administration. The groceries and meat markets will be closed during the forenoon meeting, from 11 o'clock until 4 o'clock. People should govern themselves accordingly. Remember the groceries and meat markets will be closed during the afternoon meeting.

**Other Merchants May Join.**  
Creston merchants other than grocers and meat dealers are considering a plan to join in compliance with the recommendations of the Fuel and Food Administrations. It is proposed that stores open at either 7:30 or 8 o'clock in the morning and close at 6 o'clock in the evening. There are some objections to this and the matter has not been fully determined. Merchants want to do what is best and they want to help in food and fuel conservation. So it is likely that some agreement will be agreed upon which will lengthen the hours of business, at least on Monday.

A meeting is called for Monday evening at 10 o'clock at the rooms of the Creston Club, when the entire matter will be considered. All retailers in the city are asked to be present at that meeting. Of course grocers and meat dealers have de-

## Stock Raisers Facing Tremendous Losses

Washington, D. C., Feb. 16.—Although assured by the food administration that efforts to stimulate wartime meat production would be rewarded by reasonable profits, stock raisers of the country now are experiencing and facing tremendous financial losses because the government has neglected their interests. The senate food inquiry was told today by T. W. Tomlinson of Denver, secretary of the American National Livestock association.

The president, the food administrator and the states have appealed for increased beef production to meet extraordinary demands at home and overseas, said the witness, but apparently no attempt has been made to safeguard the stockman's financial interests.

The threatened meat shortage is no myth Tomlinson declared, as 55 per cent of the stock feeders will be compelled to go out of business unless the government comes to their relief.
