WEETS.—Groehen Weets was born
July 7, 1820, in Germany, and died
February 11, 1902, aged 73 years, of
general debility at her home in Maquo-
keta township. In 1852 she was mar-
ried to Uve Weets, and together with
their family crossed the broad Atlantic
to America in 1887. In 1888 they located
on a farm near Bridgeport. On May 10,
1898, the beloved husband and father
died and now nine living children and
twenty-five grandchildren are called
upon to part with a kind and devoted
mother and grandmother, though eleven
children were born to her. She was a
good Christian and a faith-
ful member of the Lutheran
church from childhood. The living
children are Will, Jerry, Ellert, Uve,
Martin, Mrs. Grava Lutzen, Mrs. Hannah
Wurster, Mrs. Teda Huling, Mrs. Eliza-
beth Fitcher. The funeral took place
Friday at 11 o'clock from the house
with services at the German Lutheran
church at Andrew and interment also
took place at the cemetery in that town.

DIED.—Nancy Caroline Edwards was
born at Bethel, Ohio, September 21, 1818,
and died at her home in Maquoketa, on
South Niagara Street, February 11, 1902,
aged 83 years, 4 months and 20 days.
She was married to P. L. Carter in Ohio
in 1838. They moved to this county in
1869 and two years ago removed to this
city, where the deceased has since re-
sided and where her husband died in
June, 1900. This union was blessed with
nine children, two of whom, James and
John of Maquoketa survive to mourn
their loss of a faithful and loving
mother. Services were held at the home
on South Niagara Street on Thursday at
1 p. m., and burial at the Union church
cemetery, Rev. Boomershine officiating.

Death of an Old Pioneer.

Eben E. Dorr, one of the early settlers
of Jackson county and for many years a
resident of De Witt, Clinton county,
died at his home in Wiser, Washington,
February 11, at the age of 80 years. He
was one of the pioneers of the Hawkeye
state and a member of its first legislature
from Jackson county and subsequently
represented Clinton county in the same
body. Mr. Dorr was well known by the
early settlers of Maquoketa and taught the
first school of this place in what was called
the old root school house (being made
of sod and roots). In the early fifties
he was married to Miss Catherine, daugh-
ter of W. G. Earle. He was a man of the
strictest integrity, high moral standing
and more than ordinary ability.
