UNDERSTAND EACH OTHER.

Council and Terminal Company Come to Terms.

The city and the Terminal company came to a more direct understanding at night as to the status of levee work than has been enjoyed heretofore.

As a result of the action of the Terminal company in attempting to push forward the laying of its tracks east of Brady street, contrary to the orders of the city council, a meeting of the grounds and building committee was ordered, and Frank P. Blair of the Terminal company, was called upon the carpet to explain matters.

He made the same statement that had been made to Mayor Baker earlier in the day; disavowed all responsibility for the action of Foreman Crowley, under whose supervision the tracks were put down, and stated that Mr. Schuler, on behalf of the company, was much chagrined at the manner which the city officials viewed the mistake. As for himself, Mr. Blair stated that he was in Moline and know nothing of the hurried laying of tracks east of Brady.

The committee accepted the statement as made, without comment. Mr. Blair was asked why the Terminal company stopped filling the big hole west of Gaines street, as soon as the right of way had been secured. The hole is filled with water and no filling has been done for some time. When the high water recedes, the hole will be left in an unsanitary condition. For this reason it was demanded that the company proceed at once with the fill, and Mr. Blair agreed to do so.

The committee stated in no uncertain terms that the fill must be made, that the council proposed that it should be made at once, and that unless all agreements were lived up to no more concessions as to right-of-way would be granted. The council has the whip-hand in the matter and proposes to hold it. As to the matter of the fill between Main and Rock Island streets, the city is in no position to do anything more, as the Terminal company, as far as is known, stands willing to act. High water is washing the fill out, and as the 14 feet of water renders it impossible to place the retaining wall at present, it is economy to make no more fill until the stage of water is lower.

OLD CITIZENS.

HON. ERNST MUELLER AND HON. ROBERT LOWRY OF DAKOTA.

Mr. Mueller Died at his Home in Butler Township Last Night—Mr. Lowry's Funeral Here Today—What the Des Moines Register Says of Him.

Hon. Ernst Mueller of Butler township, one of the most prominent and respected citizens of Scott county, died at his home Tuesday evening.

About two years ago Mr. Mueller suffered a severe stroke of paralysis. He gradually grew worse, and the death of his wife about a year ago was another hard blow to him. For the past week he has been in a critical condition and failing fast. The end came quietly last night.

Ernst Mueller was born in Dahl, near Hagen, in the province of Westphalia, Germany, Nov. 12, 1832. He received a common school education at his home till he was apprenticed, at the age of 15, to the carpenter trade. This he followed till, in 1851, he migrated to this country. He spent a few months in Philadelphia, lived for a time in New York, and then went to Fairfield county, Ohio, where he remained, engaged as a carpenter, for two years more. In the spring of 1854 he came to this county. He continued to work at his trade here till 1862, when he bought a tract of 160 acres in Butler township, and moved onto it and took up the life of a farmer. He has added to his holdings of land in this county till at the time of his death he was one of the largest land owners in the county.

Mr. Mueller, during his residence in this city, and his earlier years on the farm, took an active part in politics, and was repeatedly honored with election to public office. He was all his life an ardent republican, remaining with that party in the days of the eighties, when so many others left it. He was for a dozen years an acceptable member of the state legislature from this county, and has been favored for it since he retired at the end of that term, when his party has been casting about for the strongest candidate. He was a man of intelligence, possessed of a large fund of that sort of self acquired education that it is fair to call wisdom, and was always esteemed and respected as a man of sterling integrity and sound character.

Mr. Mueller was married in this city, March 30, 1862, to Miss Christina Ketselsen. One son and six daughters compose the family, which was one of the happiest in this vicinity.

DONATED FUNDS.

The Old Bank Clerk Intimates That The Need Looking After.

"One thing that I have noticed in the course of a good many years in the bank," said one of the oldest bank clerks in the city today, "is that the tag end of more than one fund, raised for some specific purpose, has disappeared, and yet no account has been made of it going.

"I do not mean to say that the trustees of these funds have appropriated them to their own account, but I have been impressed with the fact that the dollars that remain in bank, after some scheme for which the people have given their money has been carried out, are very often not accounted for when they are withdrawn. They may be put to good use, but there is no knowing.

"In the case of the Saengerfest Bazaar the remaining funds have been distributed to a number of good causes, and the fact has been publicly mentioned, all the papers in the city giving publicity to it, so no question can ever arise there, but there have been other subscriptions, big and little, that have not been wound up in this manner. They, too, have had cash balances on hand, but what has become of those balances I don't know. The money has been drawn and that has been the last of it.

"Seems to me it would be a good thing to have a standing committee or general trustee for such funds, under bond, etc., whose duty it should be to take charge of these moneys, and finally account for them. Many funds that are thus raised from the popular purse are strictly accounted for, but not all of them."

HON. ERNST MUELLER.

Pioneer Scott County Farmer and Pro-
minent Legislator Passes Away.

Yesterday morning at his home in
Butler Township occurred the death of
Hon. Ernst Mueller one of the best
known and most highly respected res-
idents of the county. About two years
ago Mr. Mueller suffered a stroke of
paralysis from which he had never
fully recovered and his final dissolu-
tion had been expected for some time.

The deceased was one of the most
prominent of Scott County farmers
and his services as a member of the
state legislature and as a grand jury-
man will be long remembered. A man
of sterling character he was a good
husband and father and a good neigh-
bor and citizen. He was a member of
the state legislature from 1878 to 1882
and was one of few republicans who
opposed the enactment of prohibition
law. He it was who first called atten-
tion to the unconstitutionality of the
prohibition amendment.

Ernst Mueller was born at Dahl
Westphalia Germany Nov 21 1832 and
came to America in 1851. He remained
in Philadelphia for three months went
from there to Long Island and Amanda
Ohio and came to Scott county in 1854.
He first worked at his trade as a car-
penter and in 1862 purchased a 160 acre
farm in Butler township.

On March 30 1867 he was married in
this city to Miss Christine Ketelsen
who preceded him in death June 14
1898. He is survived by six daughters
and one son. They are Mrs. Linal Zabel
Fritz Mueller, Mrs. Mathilda Ott, Mrs.
Meta Randolph, Mrs. Alvina Wolf, Mrs.
Anna Smith, and Miss Thekla Mueller.
Besides his children he leaves an aged
mother, one sister Mrs. Werner of Le
Claire and one brother Carl Mueller of
Butler Township.

The funeral will be held from the
home on Friday afternoon at 1 o'clock
with interment in the Tiedje cemetery.

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T. J. DODDS.

THE subject of this sketch is the present postmaster of Le Claire, Iowa, and is a descendant from one of the old and highly respected families of Pennsylvania. He first saw the light of day in the old Keystone State, Butler County, May 4, 1830. His parents were James and Elenore (Sproll) Dodds.

Mr. Dodds received but a common school education, after which he learned the tanner's trade under his father. He came to Iowa at an early day. In 1860 he took an extended trip to the Rocky Mountains in the interest of his health and to prospect. After a year in the mountains he returned home. Mr. Dodds is a member of the Masonic Snow Lodge, No. 44, of Le Claire, and has been since 1860.

In political matters Mr. Dodds affiliates with the Democratic party.

HON. ERNST MUELLER.

MR. MUELLER was born November 21, 1832, in Dahl, Germany, and was educated in the common schools of his native place, and at the age of fifteen he was apprenticed to the carpenter's trade. In 1851 he decided to come to America, and with that object in view, he sailed alone, and staid three months in Philadelphia, where he secured employment in a bakery. He then moved to Long Island, New York, and worked nine months at his trade, when he went to Amanda, Fairfield County, Ohio, and followed his trade two years, and in the spring of 1854 he removed to Scott County, Iowa. Securing employment

at his trade he worked for eight years, when he purchased one hundred and sixty acres of land in the southeast part of Butler Township, and resided thereon until 1872, when he moved to his present home. Mr. Mueller has eight hundred acres of very valuable land in his adopted County.


Mr. Mueller has held almost every office of trust at the hands of his people in the Township. In 1874 he was elected to the State Legislature on the Republican ticket, and for ten years he filled that office to the entire satisfaction of his constituents. Both he and his wife are members of the German Lutheran Church.

JOHN L. GAST.

THE subject of this sketch was born February 3, 1823. His parents were George and Susan (Lamer) Gast, the place of his birth being on the Juniata river in Huntingdon County, Pennsylvania, where he received but a common school education, and was reared on a farm. In October, 1845, he moved to Delaware County, Ohio, and settled on the Scioto river, and remained until 1851, leaving there in May of that year and landing in Scott County in June. He came overland with a team and was twenty-one days making the journey. Mr. Gast first purchased a tract of eighty acres of land from "Pancake" Jones (as he was familiarly called), after which he entered two hundred and eighteen acres of Government land, and on July 4 he moved into a shanty which he had erected.

Mr. Gast was united in marriage to Miss Margaret Moyer, November 6, 1845. The result of their union was three children. Susan J. died in infancy, William E. married Rebecca Henry, and Mary M. married Charles Like.

Mr. Hemenway was born 18 December 1927 and was raised in Gloversville, New York. His parents were Frank DeGolyer Hemenway and Emma (Disbrow) Hemenway. He served in the U.S. Navy from 1945 to 1947 and graduated as an accountant from Rider College, Trenton, New Jersey, in 1951. HENNING FAMILY

My immigrant ancestors of the Henning family set sail from Hamburg, Germany, in the early spring of 1854. Their place of origin was listed as Prussia/Pomerania. This family consisted of Helmut Frederick Henning and his wife Maria; a son Frederick and his wife Louise; a daughter Wilhelmina and her husband Carl Rudolph Krenz and their infant daughter Bertha; a daughter Frederika who was married in America to Herman Poetsch.

The family landed in Canada but soon made their way to Boston, Massachusetts where they lived four or five years before coming to Davenport, Iowa. My grandfather Frederick Henning had learned the trade of a blacksmith in Germany, but after a few years he saved enough money to purchase a farm near Buffalo, Iowa in 1872. His first wife, Louise, died in 1876. In February of 1877, Frederick married my grandmother, Jennie Marie Logstrup, a native of Denmark. They continued living at Buffalo, Iowa, until the spring of 1888 when they moved to a farm in Butler Township near McCausland. By this time, the family consisted of Charles Henning born to Frederick and his first wife, Louise, Otto Henning, Lou Henning (my father), Emma and Fred. Many of the descendants of these children continued to farm in Scott and Clinton Counties.

My father, Louis Henning, married Wilma Zabel whose grandfather and grandmother William and Sophia (Dreves)

Zabel set sail from Hamburg, Germany on October 31, 1866. Their place of origin was Mecklenburg, Germany. They came directly to Scott County, Iowa, where Sophia's sister and brother-in-law Mary and John Baustian lived. It wasn't long and they, too, became farmers in Butler Township. The William Zabel family consisted of:

William who married Magdalena Runge.

Fritz married Caroline Mueller (my grandparents).

Amelia married Andreas Schwarz.

Theodore married Wilhelmina Horst.

Charles married Amanda Knutsen.

Meta married Henry Thode.

Albert married Annie Kay. A daughter Alvina died young.

My great-grandfather Ernst Mier, father of Caroline (Mueller) Zabel was my first ancestor to land on American soil. He was born in Dahl, province of Westphalia, Germany, and emigrated in 1851. At first he worked in Philadelphia, then New York and two years in Ohio as a carpenter before coming to Scott County, Iowa, in 1854. He worked at this trade until 1862 when he purchased a farm in Butler Township, Scott County, Iowa. At the time of the 1894 Atlas of Scott County, he owned 821 acres of farm land, most of it in Butler Township. He married Christina Kettlesen whose family also came from Germany (Schleswig).

Ernst and Christina's family consisted of:

Caroline who married Fritz Zabel.

Frederick married Anna Henrichs.

Matilda married William Ott.

Meta married George Randolph.

Alvina married Ferdinand Wolf.

Annie married William D. Smith.

Thekla married Christian Wiese.

HENSEN-SCHEHF FAMILY

Hans Mathias Hensen was born 2 December 1816 in Bannsdorf, Fehmarn, Germany to Gertrude (Niebuhr) and Hans Heinrich Hensen. He was married 14 October 1840 to Anna (Margareth) Schehf (also School), born 7 October 1822 in Burg, Fehmarn to Henrich Schehf and Catharine Elisabeth (Stampe). They farmed in Cleona Township, and had one son Henry. Margareth died 22 January 1890 at 309 Brown Street in Davenport and Hans died 16 June 1892 when he walked into the side of a moving train in Walcott. Both are buried in Maysville.

Henry Hensen was born 20 March 1845 and married Magdalena M. (Demmy) Bothman, who was born 21 February 1844 in Germany to Anna (Holler) and Johann Bothmann. There were six children born in Cleona Township where they farmed. Henry died 4 October 1892 in Scott County and Demmy died 22 September 1930, at the home of son-in-law Henry Mumm at 710 8th Street, Durant, where she had kept house for fifteen years.

Theodore was born 6 December 1865 and married on 15 October 1887 in Davenport to Anna Christina Wiese. Anna was born 13 October 1869 in Germany to Lena (Liedymann) and Claus Wiese. They came to America in 1878. Theodore farmed northwest of Davenport in the Probstei area. He died of appendicitis on 7 January 1890. They had a daughter, Alma, who married Albert Siem.

Anna met widower George Struck when he clerked her farm sale. He had a son Harry. Anna and George had Ella (who married a Bartholamew) and Theodore. George died of tuberculosis in 1898.

Anna and the children lived in Stockton and married Christian Henry Burmeister, who was in the cement business in Durant. They lived in Oklahoma, Kansas and Durant, Iowa. They had a daughter, Adele, who married Gilbert Stoltenberg. Anna died 23 May 1953 and is buried in Durant.

Anna Margaretha was born 8 January 1867 and married on 19 February 1885 in Davenport to Henry Mumm. Henry was born 25 May 1863 to Margaretha (Brandt) and Johann Mumm. They farmed in Cleona Township and had three children, Alfred, Olga and Arnold. A. Margaret died 3 August

1909. Henry died 11 July 1953 while residing at 706 8th Street, Durant, Iowa.

Henry was born 18 November 1870 and married Ida Schlichting who was born 10 March 1869 in Cedar County. Ida was the daughter of Anna (Stark) and John Schlichting, proprietor of the Walcott Hotel and had seven children. Only three lived to adulthood: Viola, who married Otto Kurtz, Gilbert, and Orville. Henry died 16 March 1909 in Davenport. Ida married Albert Paul on 25 August 1914. She died 3 November 1956.

Louis B. was born 26 September 1874 and married 27 January 1897 in Davenport to Minnie M. Quistorf who was born in 1876 in Liberty Township. She was the daughter of Helen (Steffen) and F.A. Quistorf. Louis farmed and was a painter and paper hanger. Louis died 2 January 1952 while residing at 1502 Sturdevant St., Davenport, and Minnie died 4 June 1948. They had no children.

Amanda was born 22 August 1877 and married 19 February 1896, in Davenport, to John Pahl. John Pahl was born 7 September 1873 in Buffalo Township to Rosa (Cooper) and Henry C. Pahl. Henry married a second time to Mrs. Lizzie January. John farmed near Walcott, Dixon, Iowa, and Columbia, Montana. They had twelve children: Ella, Alonzo, Raymond, Lucinda, Helen, Wilbert, Lucille, Irene, Leona, Leroy, Victor, and Frances. John died 9 January 1921 and Amanda died 30 December 1958 and are buried at Oakdale Cemetery. Submitted by Jean Mumm

DANIEL H. HIMES

Daniel moved to Davenport from the Chicago area in the mid 1940s along with his father and mother, Dr. Marshall and Eva Lois Himes and his sister, Marsha Lee. In 1909 Daniel's grandparents, James and Florence Meyer, lived briefly in Davenport. They graduated from Palmer School of Chiropractic.

Marsha graduated from Northeast Missouri State Teacher's College in Kirksville, Missouri and later taught in the Des Moines School System.

Daniel met and married a Palmer College student, Fay E. Burmeister, who grew up in Howard County, Iowa. They were married in 1965 in Wilmette, Illinois. Fay graduated in 1967 from Palmer College. They had three children: Shamin Bonita, born in Story County, Iowa in 1966; Darius Daniel, born in Scott County in 1970 and David Lee, born in Scott County in 1974. From 1967 to 1970 Daniel and family lived in Davenport and Bettendorf. Daniel was employed by Deere and Company.

At the end of 1970, Daniel and family moved to the South Pacific to the island of Papua, New Guinea. Fay opened a Chiropractic practice there, operating a flying Chiropractic service to several towns on the island. Daniel worked for a computer company and later taught in a Teacher Training College in Goroka in the Eastern Highland District. The main purpose for their stay in Papua New Guinea was to teach the Baha'i Faith there. The main teaching of this religion is the Oneness of God, the Oneness of Religion and the Oneness of Mankind.
