... home here on Miami street Saturday, January 1st, occurred the death of Peter Petersen, aged nearly 84 years. He had been ailing for a long time and the death of his aged wife on November 12th last no doubt hastened the end. Death resulted from a complication.

He spent his early life in Germany, he there married Sophia Stock, and they came to America in 1852, settling in Clinton county and engaging in farming. Amassing a competence they retired from active life in 1887, coming to Lyons and settling down. Here they have since resided.

Mr. Petersen was a man of quiet, retiring nature, a good citizen and an esteemed neighbor. His death causes sincere regret to a large circle of friends.

He leaves to mourn his loss four sons, H. H. Petersen, banker at Teeds Grove; Otto Petersen, mayor of Loup City, Neb.; Detlef Petersen, also of Loup City, and August Petersen, of Rockyford, Colorado.

The funeral will take place from the residence on Miami street at 2 p. m. Tuesday, Jan. 4th, followed by interment in Oakland cemetery.

Svendsen.

At his home at Bryant, January 1st, occurred the death of Capt. Edward Svendsen, one of the oldest and most respected of Clinton county's citizens. Capt. Svendsen was born Oct. 9, 1829, and was therefore at his death a little over eighty years of age.

He was a veteran of the 26th Iowa Infantry, enlisting early in the great civil war. He received his rank as first lieutenant September 30, 1862; was wounded at the battle of Arkansas Post; was promoted to captain of Company E February 7, 1864, and mustered out at Washington, D. C. June 6, 1865. He was a brave soldier, a good citizen and a faithful and loving husband and father.

He is mourned by his wife and family and a host of friends. The funeral arrangements cannot yet be announced.

ALONG THE RIVER.

U. S. Engineers Begin the Investigation of Ice Gorges.

Muscatine, Jan. 4.—The formation of ice gorges and the consequent damage by flooding and the crumbling of the river banks has attracted the attention of the United States engineers at Milan, Ill., and will in all probability result in the dredging of objectionable sand bars next summer.

Supt. William Molis of the Muscatine water works yesterday received a letter from the United States engineer's office at Milan asking him to furnish the office with data in regards the rise and fall of the river for several weeks. According to the letter the engineers are of the opinion that the gorge has formed between here and Rock Island, but it is the opinion of Supt. Molis that the bar at the head of the big timber is responsible for the gorge. The river by the way, has been at a standstill for the past four days, registering 9 feet even, which is about 6 feet higher than it should be at this time of year.

William Molis, Supt. Muscatine Water Works:

Dear Sir—The United States engineer's office is anxious to have river gauge readings taken at a few points between Rock Island and Muscatine for the purpose of helping determine the location of the gorges between Muscatine and Rock Island, until the ice goes out in the spring. We wish aid in this matter and desire the following information regarding the gauge reading in your city:

Is the water gauge you read there the same old one on the reservoir near the river and is it in good condition? Do you take readings daily? Can you send down reports and data on the river once a week, taken three times

CAPT. EDWARD J. D. SVENDSEN.
Further Biographical Sketch of One Much Respected.

The following additional sketch of the late Capt. Svendsen will be found of much interest to the many friends who mourn him:

Edward Johann Detlef Svendsen, born in Kiel, Holstein, Germany, on Oct. 9, 1829. Died at his home near Bryant, Iowa, Jan. 1st, 2 p. m. Volunteer in Schleswig-Holstein war for two years. Came to America in 1851, to Davenport, but soon after settled in Clinton county, where he has lived since. In the civil war, captain of Company E of the 26th Iowa Infantry. After the war revisited his aged mother in Germany in 1865.

Married Caroline Reiff in Holstein in 1866, and they came to America that year, to the farm near Bryant where he has since made his home. To them were born seven children—Clara, Lydia, Julia and Edward at home; Mrs. Mathilda Bolck of Almont, Iowa; Mrs. Ida Petersen of Whiting, Iowa, and Alfred of North Yakima, Wash. His wife and all the children survive.

His final illness was of short duration, acute bronchitis. He suffered little and simply went to sleep peacefully.

Funeral Wednesday, Jan. 5th, at 1 p. m. Interment at Ingwersen cemetery.

Says Both Are at War With the Republican Party—Refers to Copperheads.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 4.—"Senator Cummins' speech contains nothing new—it is a reiteration of what he has said before, simply a renewal of his war on the Republican party. He has added nothing to his controversy with his party which requires an answer. I suppose he is afraid that the people will forget the war he is waging unless he keeps reminding them of it."

In this manner Speaker Cannon disposed of the attack on himself and other so-called "standpatters," made by Senator Cummins of Iowa at the Des Moines "dollar dinner" Saturday night.

"The only statements he has added to his attacks on his party in his latest speech were those which denied his party the credit of passing some legislation touching on transportation subjects," continued the speaker. "That is a question of fact. A Republican congress adopted the Hepburn law, the rebate law and the employers' liability law, and a Republican president approved them. Mr. Cummins was not in congress then—we were. I voted for those bills and Senator Cummins was out in Iowa when we passed them."

"I can add nothing to the answer I have already made to Senator Cummins and to Bryan, too, for their cause is a common one—a war on the Republican party. When I made my speech in Kansas City I made the answer which still fits the case, and I can sum it up in the following extract from that speech:

"Senator Cummins declares that the Payne law is a repudiation of the Chicago platform. President Taft, when he signed the bill, made a public statement, in which he said:

"There have been a great number of real decreases in rates, and they constitute a sufficient amount to justify a statement that this bill is a substantial downward revision and a reduction of excessive rates."

"In his Winona speech the president declared, 'The Payne tariff bill is the best tariff bill the Republican party has ever passed.'"

"Senator Cummins declares that the issue from now until the national convention of 1912 is 'Shall the men now in control of party destinies be permitted further to disregard plain party platforms?'"

"President Taft is the recognized leader of the Republican party, and the great majority of the Republicans are his followers. The president and the Republican majority in congress co-operated in the legislation that has been written on the statute books. With whom did Senator Cummins co-operate? Let the record of the vote on this legislation from beginning to end decide."





drawn around him a wide patronage and a large circle of friends and acquaintances. Mr. Michelsen was married in 1872, to Mary Sanford, a native of Lyons and a daughter of John Sanford. They have four children: George, Emma, Leigh and Donald.

Mr. Michelsen is in politics a Republican, and with his wife is a member of the Congregational Church. Their residence stands on Sixth street and Fifth avenue, and is handsome and convenient, while its owner ranks high among the men of the county for solid worth and substantial merit, and is a man of enterprise as well as an honorable citizen.

EDWARD J. D. SWENDSEN, a farmer whose home is situated on section 6, Hampshire Township, and who is one of the most progressive citizens in this section, was born in Kiel, in the Province of Holstein, Germany, Oct. 9, 1830, and is the son of William and Gishen (Rëymars) Swendsen. His father died Feb. 18, 1852, and his mother in 1871. Mr. Swendsen came to America in July, 1852, and landed at Quebec. He received his education in the high schools at Kiel, and in that place graduated. He was also active as a volunteer in the war of 1848, the object of which was to secure a Republican form of government in Holstein. He served three years in Germany as a clerk in the custom-house. He came to Iowa in July, 1852, and located in Davenport, remaining until March, 1853, when he came to Clinton County, and located on section 24 of Deep Creek Township. On Aug. 9, 1862, he enlisted in the 26th Iowa Vol. Inf., Co. E, under Col. Smith. He went into service as a private but was appointed First Lieutenant of his company. They were ordered at once to Helena, Ark., but remained only a short time, taking a part in the struggle of Arkansas Post. Our subject was there wounded by a fragment of a shell. In the spring of 1864 he was promoted Captain, at Woodville, Ala. He was never missing in time of danger, but dauntlessly came to the front, leading his men forward to meet the foe. He was in all the battles of the 15th Corps, was with Sherman in his noted march to the sea, and

was finally discharged in June, 1865, and was mustered out at Washington, D. C., and from there returned to his native land in the fall of 1865, with the strong desire to once more behold the old familiar places.

In the spring of 1866, on the 30th day of March, he was united in marriage with Caroline Reiff, and the newly-wedded pair at once started from Hamburg for America. She was born July 10, 1840, and her parents are both deceased. There were five children in her father's family. Mr. Swendsen has seven children, as follows: Clara, born in December, 1866; Caroline, Dec. 25, 1867; Edward, 1869; Matilda, 1871; Ida, 1873; Alfred, 1876, and Julia, 1880. He has been Supervisor of his county and served three years; was elected to the General Assembly, in 1874, and served two years; was also School Director, and is a highly influential and enterprising citizen in this section of the country. He owns 160 acres of finely cultivated land, on which he has a neat dwelling and barn. Both he and his wife are generous and kind-hearted, ever ready to alleviate suffering, and do much good in many directions. In politics he is a Democrat.

MICHAEL F. QUIGLEY, a member of the Board of Supervisors of Clinton County and a resident on section 30, Waterford Township, is the subject of this history.

He is highly esteemed as a citizen and is always responsive to the call of duty. Mr. Quigley was born in Ottawa, Canada, April 26, 1849. His father, John Quigley, was born in County Tipperary, Ireland, in 1802, where he married Bridget Riordan. About 1832, he left Ireland with his wife and four children and came to America, locating in New York City, where he was employed in the grocery trade for a few years. He then removed to Buffalo, N. Y., thence to Ottawa, where he engaged in the grocery trade and also conducted a hotel till fall. In 1849 he went to Cattaraugus County, N. Y. The New York & Erie Railroad was in process of construction at the time and he undertook contracts to build various portions of the same.
