OBITUARY.

Dr. L. Brown.

Dr. L. Brown, who passed away at the hospital in Pensacola, Fla., January 19, was laid to rest ten days later in the beautiful national cemetery which is located nine miles from the city of Pensacola. To be buried here was a wish expressed by Dr. Brown, who throughout his travels, had always taken a great interest in the national cemeteries. The burial service was conducted by the local G. A. R. Post, assisted by the chaplain and a squad of world war veterans from Ft. Barrancas. Music was furnished by the tourist club quartet. The service was attended by a large number of G. A. R. men beside the local Post. At the close of the impressive service the twelve world war soldiers took their places at the side of the grave and fired three salutes, after which the bugler sounded final taps.

A pioneer resident of the state, for thirty years Dr. Brown had been an honored citizen of Rockford. He was a member of the Congregational church and was identified with the best interests of the community. He was also a member of Charles J. Pixley Post, G. A. R., and of the Masonic and Eastern Star orders. He was a man of pronounced views and of sterling character. He continued the practice of his profession until the weight of advancing years made it necessary for him to cease active work, since which time he had spent his summers in Rockford, visiting various points in the South during the winter months. He was a keen observer and wrote interesting accounts of the places of interest which he visited. He is survived by his wife, his daughter, three grandchildren; one great grandchild, three sisters and numerous nieces and nephews.

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Dr. Brown was born January 10, 1838, in Ellsworth, Ohio, and moved with his parents to Patch Grove, Wis., when a small boy. He served three years in the Civil War, most of the time as a hospital steward. After the close of the war he finished his medical course, which he began be- fore the war, at Rush Medical College, Chicago, and in the spring of 1866 he began the practice of his profes- sion at Postville, Iowa. He was mar- ried in 1868 to Miss Elia A. Lyons, and one daughter was born to this union, who is the wife of Dr. J. O. Thrush of River Falls, Wis. In 1876 Dr. Brown was sent to the legisla- ture from Allamakee Co. In 1884 he took a post-graduate course at Rush Medical college. He served three years on the McGregor pension board examiners, and in 1890 moved to Rockford, Iowa, to be near his wife's parents. In 1900 he went abroad for the purpose of taking post-graduate work in the London hospitals. He and Mrs. Brown visited many of the principal cities of Europe and con- tributed letters of travel to the Rock- ford register and Postville Review.
