Sterling Davis died Saturday, Aug. 23, 1902, at 2 p.m., at his home in East River township, of lung trouble, age 80 years and 7 days. He leaves a widow and one son here by his second marriage, and four children by his first marriage, the latter living in Oregon, one in Kansas, and one in northwestern Iowa. The funeral was held Sunday at the home, conducted by Rev. D. Pruitt of Shambaugh. The burial was at Old Memory. He had lived in Page county a little over twelve years. He was a member of the Pleasant Ridge Methodist Episcopal church, and a member of the Masonic fraternity. He was an excellent man.

Hon. Edwin B. Hoag, who represented Page county in the Iowa general assembly in its sixteenth and seventeenth sessions, died recently in Kansas. His remains were brought to College Springs, where the burial took place beside her grave of his wife. Mr. Hoag was a Republican. He was first elected to the Iowa legislature at the election held in Page county Oct. 12, 1875, when he received 1256 votes. Against him were cast 7 scattering votes—4 for W. W. Morsman, and 1 each for O. A. Rogers, J. W. Holden and M. A. Jones. He was re-elected Oct. 9, 1877, when he received 1295 votes. Cast against him then were 665 votes for O. A. Rogers, 334 for C. F. Klise, 28 for N. Morrison, and 5 scattering. In the legislative session of 1876, when he first served Page county in the house, Hon. Alfred Hebard was state senator from this district, and two years later, at the session of 1878, Dr. P. W. Lewellen, then of Clarinda, was the state senator from this district.
