

Hon. Wesley C. Hobbs Dead.

Hon. Wesley C. Hobbs, of St. Louis,
 died at the residence of his brother-in-
 law, E. D. Smith, at Ft. Madison, yester-
 day afternoon at 6:30 o'clock. Death
 had been expected for some days. The
 family in St. Louis were telegraphed for
 and are expected to arrive in Ft. Madi-
 son this morning. The time and place
 of funeral is not yet decided upon. As
 a coincidence it may be interesting to
 state that Mr. Hobbs delivered the Me-
 morial Day oration in Keokuk in 1878,
 six years before the day upon which he
 died and to the hour when he was the
 honored guest of our city.
