VINTON WOMAN SEEKS INFORMATION OF KIN

MARSHALLTOWN-BORN GIRL HAS
LOST ALL TRACE OF
RELATIVES.

THINK MOTHER IS NOW
RESIDENT OF THIS CITY

Mrs. O. O. Donley, of Vinton, Writes
Times-Republican in Effort to Secure
Information of Long Lost Family—
Adopted Into Reece Family After
Father's Death.

Mrs. O. O. Donley, of Vinton, anxious
to learn of the whereabouts of her
mother, and believing her now to be a
resident of this city, has written the
Times-Republican in an effort to se-
cure some information that will en-
able her to see and know her mother
again. Mrs. Donley's maiden name was
Chase, and as Maude Chage she was
adopted into the family of D. H. Reece
when 5 years old, or shortly, she be-
lieves, after the death of her father.

Mrs. Donley was born in this city
April 7, 1886. Shortly after being
adopted by the Reeces the family
moved to Des Moines. In later years,
Mrs. Donley says, she learned that her
mother had married again, her second
husband being a veteran of the civil
war. Again she learned that after her
mother's second marriage she moved
to Chicago. Now Mrs. Donley says she
has heard that her mother is in Mar-
shalltown, living near Linn creek.

Knows Little of Family.
Mrs. Donley knows but little of her
her father's family there were six or
seven children. She does not remem-
ber their christian names, but thinks

"No Reason For Delay"—Pawlick.

Clark Confesses He Doesn't Know.

He said that if he thought he would know any more about it by delaying action, he might be in favor of postponing, but he was no mind reader, and he didn't know the real intentions of the two sides interested. His friends on one side would come to him, he said, and say one thing, and his friends on the other side would tell him just the opposite. If he knew just what should be done it would be a "wonderful relief." He was not sure, however, that the contract specified sufficient time for the one who elected to build a new plant.

McCarten With Gregory.

Mr. McCarten expressed the same opinion as did Mr. Gregory, and said that this question was a deep one, and one that the council should take ample time to consider. He thought the members of the council had sufficient ability to act intelligently on the question, at least to grasp the meaning after a careful consideration, but he did not think that it was possible to get the full import of the subject with one or two readings.

"Squandered Enough Time."

Mr. Herman thought the council had already "squandered enough time" on the franchise business, and that it had been understood in caucus just what would be done, and that this understanding was exactly in accordance with what had just been read. He thought that the contract, as now prepared, was up to both companies to sign, and if they couldn't meet its provisions, they should let it alone. He didn't think there was any contract that could bind them down too strongly. Herman doubted if either side would sign, but the council was looking out for the interests of the majority of the citizens, not any individual.

Gregory Pins Herman Down.

Mr. Gregory rose to assert that the contract was a territorial and state legislative source. He also said that the contract was not in accordance with the understanding in the caucus, and that

HON. DELOS ARNOLD IS CALLED BY DEATH

FORMER SENATOR AND REPRESENTATIVE FROM THIS COUNTY DIES AT LOS ANGELES.

END CAME THIS MORNING FROM GRADUAL BREAKDOWN

Body Will Be Cremated, and Ashes Brought to This, the City He Loved, For Interment—Arnold School Bears His Name—Built Boone County Court House.

Death this morning, at his home in Pasadena, Cal., claimed Hon. Delos Arnold, according to a telegram received by the Times-Republican at noon. The end was not altogether unexpected, as Mr. Arnold had grown feeble with his advancing years, and had been declining gradually for several months. His death was due to general debility.

Mr. Arnold's body will be cremated, and his ashes will be brought to Marshalltown, the city he loved, and which still bears his name in a public building—the Arnold school.

Representative and Senator.

Delos Arnold was one of the foremost citizens of Marshalltown in an early day, and was honored by his townsmen in many ways. He repre-

sent this county in both the house and senate for twelve years, serving four years as representative, and eight as senator. Mr. Arnold was also county attorney and county treasurer of this county for several years.

In an early day Mr. Arnold took the contract for building miles and miles of wooden sidewalk in Marshalltown. This was in the days when cement was unknown for walks, and brick was not used to any great extent. Mr. Arnold was the contractor who built the present Boone county court house in the early '70s. The old Arnold home was at the corner of Sixth and Boone streets, on "Baptist Hill," but the house is not standing today.

Honored at Pasadena.


Upon moving to Pasadena several years ago Mr. Arnold was honored by the people of that city, many of whom had known him in Marshalltown. Mr. Arnold was a member of the Pasadena school board for ten or fifteen years, and has been honorary president of the Iowa Plenic Association for several years.

Sketch of Life.

Delos Arnold was born July 21, 1830, in Chenango county, New York. He was educated in the common schools of his native state, and at Fredonia Academy, in Chautauque county. He studied law at the Albany law school, from which he graduated in 1853. In the same year he moved to Marshalltown, where he lived until 1886, when he moved to Pasadena. President Lincoln appointed Mr. Arnold as United States assessor of internal revenue for the Sixth Iowa district, and he served as such four years. During his incumbency in the legislature he served as special state auditor to examine the accounts in connection with the capital of the state.

Mr. Arnold possessed one of the finest collections of minerals, fossils, shells, and corals ever gathered in California, and last winter presented the collection, valued at \$15,000, to the Leland Stanford University at Palo Alto.

Mr. Arnold has many friends both in the city, county and throuth the state, who will regret to hear of his death.

ANSON, HENRY, far.; born in Canadaigua, Ontario Co., N. Y.; when 5 years of age, moved to Ohio; he started April 7, 1851, with his team, for Iowa; leaving his family in Illinois, he came here and and built a shanty; then went after his family, and arrived here in July, 1851, and pre-empted a quarter of a section of land, on which the town now stands, from Main street south; with his team, he drove through the tall prairie grass to make a track for a road where Main street is located, and he cut grass and made hay here; he was the first settler in this town, and is the oldest settler living here; he engaged in locating land for settlers, and doing a land agency business; in 1852, he built the first steam mill in the county, and sawed all the lumber for buildings and fences, and he built the first cabin here with windows in. He was elected Justice of the Peace in 1852, and served four years, and did a large conveyancing and surveying business; was appointed County Surveyor. Owns a farm adjoining the city limits. Married Miss Jennette Rice, from the State of New York in July 1846, she died in January, 1859; they have three children living—Sturges R., Adrian C.; lost one son—Melville F.; his son, Adrian C., was the first child born in Marshalltown.

ARNOLD, DELOS, born in Chenango Co., N. Y., July 21, 1830; received his education in that State, and was a graduate of the Law Department of the Albany State University, in the Spring of 1853, and came to Iowa in the Fall of the same year; the day following his arrival in Marshall Co., he was appointed Prosecuting Attorney, he being the only attorney in the county at that time; he held that office four years; after practicing his profession seven or eight years, he was obliged to give it up on account of his health. Was elected to the State Legislature in 1856,

and again in 1869; was elected to the State Senate in 1874, and still fills that position; he was appointed by President Lincoln the first Assessor of Internal Revenue of the Sixth District, embracing about one-third of the area of the State, and held the office four years and was removed by Andrew Johnson, for political reasons, and was succeeded by Hon. Thos. H. Benton. Mr. Arnold had nothing when he came here, and few citizens of this State have been more successful. Married Miss Hannah R. Mercer Nov. 28, 1855, at Marietta; she was of the Order of Friends, and was from Columbiana Co., Ohio; they have three children—Theresa, Delos, Jr., and Ralph; they have lost three children in infancy.

ARNOLD, SETH C., of the firm of Arnold Bros., furniture dealers; born in Otsego Co., N. Y., March 21, 1833; lived there eighteen years, and removed to Monmouth, Warren Co., Ill., and lived there until 1856, when he came to Iowa and located at Iowa Falls, and was engaged in the mercantile business there until 1874; then came to this city, and with his brother engaged in the furniture business. Has held the office of Superintendent of Schools several years, and Town Treasurer, and other town and school offices. Married Miss Jennie Wells, from New York, May 9, 1860; they have three children—Clara L., Nellie and Harry O.

BAILEY, W. T., merchant, grocery, provision and crockery; was born in Piatt Co., Ill., May 22, 1845; lived there until 1868, and was engaged in the mercantile business for several years; then entered the army. Enlisted in Co. E, 2d Ill. V. I.; was in a number of fights and skirmishes, and was severely crippled at Baton Rouge, La. After the war, in 1868, came to Marshalltown and for the past eight years, has been engaged in his present business. Married

outbreak of the war started for home to go into the army. While on the plains, en route for Wisconsin, he was met by a band of rebel deserters from the United States army posts on the frontier going southward to join the confederates. The doctor had with him a stock of one hundred and fifty horses, mules and cattle, of nearly all of which the deserters robbed him, together with a valuable lot of furs. He afterward recovered seven head of cattle, and with six of these continued his journey eastward, making the journey of nearly twelve hundred miles in about forty-eight days. The following amusing incident is worthy of mention: At Clear Lake, in Cerro Gordo county, meeting a man who began to vindicate the south, he told him that he was about to fight the rebels, and might as well begin at once, at the same time drawing his revolver. The rebel sympathizer took to his heels, and the result was a short, hot chase, resulting in harm to neither party.

Upon his arrival at Eau Claire, Wisconsin, his old home, he at once proceeded to organize a company, and enlisted as a private in the 16th regiment Infantry, but at Madison was promoted to the rank of surgeon of the Iron Brigade. During the retreat of the Union forces at the second battle of Bull Run, Dr. Allen, with self-sacrificing patriotism and devotion, gave himself up as a prisoner, that he might attend to our wounded soldiers who were left on the field. He was retained a prisoner for eight days

before being paroled, and during that time worked incessantly with the wounded, without one third of the usual allowance of food, and when he came into our lines was utterly prostrated, and afterward confined to a hospital for four months. On recovering he was placed in charge of a hospital in Washington during one year. The rest of the time, until the war closed, he was surgeon of the 5th Wisconsin Infantry. At the battle of Saylor's Creek he had the entire charge of the wounded, and superintended their removal to Berksville, Virginia, which task occupied about five days. It is doubtful if there was a more self-sacrificing and more patriotic surgeon in the Union army.

Dr. Allen has been a member of the Masonic order since 1865.

He has always been a republican, and firmly adheres to the principles of that party. His religious sentiments are orthodox.

He was married on the 10th of November, 1857, to Miss Selah Denison, of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, and by her has two sons.

Dr. Allen thinks and moves rapidly, being of a nervous-bilious temperament; is of average height, and weighs one hundred and sixty-five pounds. He settled in Mason City in 1867, and has built up an extensive practice; and in all matters of public interest touching the welfare of his city or state he has shown a most admirable spirit of energy and enterprise.

HON. DELOS ARNOLD,

MARSHALLTOWN.

DELOS ARNOLD, born in Chenango county, New York, on the 21st of July, 1830, is of Scotch-English descent. His family was first represented in this country just prior to the revolutionary war, and settled in Providence, Rhode Island. His great-grandfather followed a sea-faring life after his arrival in America, and was lost while in command of a vessel on a voyage from Bordeaux, France. Many of the descendants still reside in Providence; others are found living in various parts of the United States, serving their generation in several industrial pursuits that make up American civilization. His father, a native of New York, was a tanner and trader by occupation, and died at Marshall, in 1856, while visiting his son.

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When Delos was eleven years old, his parents removed to Chautauqua county, New York, and there he passed his youth and early manhood. At the age of fourteen he left home and spent a year and a half visiting various cities and places of interest throughout the country, and upon his return devoted his attention to study. He spent about two years in Fredonia Academy, teaching during the winter months, and in 1851 entered the Albany Law School, from which he graduated and was admitted to the bar in 1853. Removing at once to Iowa, he settled at Marshalltown and began the practice of his profession; having been appointed prosecuting attorney the day after his arrival, an office to which he was twice elected, and in which

he served four years. In the winter of 1853-4 he taught the first school in the county, occupying the court-house at Mariette for that purpose. In 1857 he was elected to the legislature, and served during the last session held in Iowa City. After the organization of the internal revenue department he was made the first assessor of the sixth district, embracing one-third of the area of the state, and held that position until his removal by President Johnson in 1865. In the fall of 1869 he was elected to the thirteenth general assembly, and served through the session of 1870. In 1861 he abandoned the profession of law, and at the close of his official term engaged in the real-estate and money-loan business, and in 1870 took charge of a furniture store, which he has since conducted.

In the summer of 1872 Mr. Arnold took an extended tour, in company with several other gentlemen, through Colorado and the Rocky Mountains,

returning in the fall much improved in health and spirits. He spent the summer of 1873 visiting the World's Exposition at Vienna, and the noted places of Europe; and in the fall of 1875 was elected to the state senate for the term of four years. He is also at the present time (1877) engaged in the coal business, in Boone county, and is a half owner of the Iowa Railroad Coal and Manufacturing Company.

In his political views, Mr. Arnold is identified with the republican party. He cast his first ballot for General Scott, and in 1856 supported Fremont.

He was married on the 28th of November, 1855, to Miss Hannah Mercer, daughter of John Mercer, of Ohio, and by her has three children.

Beginning without means, he has, by honesty, industry and fair dealing, gained a liberal competence, and lives now in the enjoyment of a pleasant home, surrounded by a wide circle of true friends.

HON. JAMES CUSHING,

DUBUQUE.

NOT many genuine examples of sturdy western self-made men come into public notice. Born and brought up in indigence and obscurity, they have fought the battle of life so earnestly and well that they seldom think of congratulating themselves upon their ultimate success; and in general they are unwilling to believe that they deserve any consideration for the notable examples of honest, healthy and successful life which they have given us.

James Cushing, the subject of this sketch, was born in West Scituate, Plymouth county, Massachusetts, on the 4th of August, 1830. When eight years old his father's family removed to Peoria, Illinois, where his mother died the following year, and the breaking up of the family being the result, he hired to work on a farm at three dollars a month. His education was gained at the common schools, where he made good use of his time, and later, in his nineteenth year, using his accumulated savings, he attended for two years the academy at Mount Palatine, Illinois.

In his twenty-second year he commenced life for himself by going into the ice and wood business at La Salle, Illinois; this he continued successfully until the spring of 1859, when he removed to Du-

buque, Iowa. Buying out the interest of his father in the firm of Carter, Piper and Cushing, ice dealers, he engaged in the same business. He finally bought out the entire interest by assuming the debts of the firm, which at that time would not pay fifty per centum. He had at that time two competitors, but by energy and fair dealing he soon gained the entire trade of the city, and during nine years had exclusive control of the business, and, after he had obtained that control, never took advantage of it, but made fair dealing his motto and successfully worked by it. After getting the business in his own hands he assisted one of his employes to an interest, doing so by taking his notes, which were promptly met, and the profits of the business have made him a man of property in the city. In 1863 he loaned money to a friend who was engaged in the manufacture of vinegar, in Dubuque, and in order to secure the amount found it necessary to take hold of the business with him, and in so doing expended much capital in bringing the arrangements for manufacturing to a successful condition. Owing to this circumstance he became associated with the manufacture of vinegar, and has continued it to this time, making it a study, and expending large sums to bring the methods of manufacturing
