### The Grim Reaper's Work.

#### HIGGINS.

On Sunday evening, at ten o'clock, the spirit of Allan Higgins passed peacefully away. Mr. Higgins had been a patient sufferer for more than a year, and he calmly met and welcomed death as a relief from bodily pain. He was surrounded by his family in his last moments, and his death bed was made peaceful by the assurances that he had experienced, that he enjoyed God's favor and was heir to a crown of glory and a home in heaven. The funeral occurred on Tuesday morning at nine o'clock, and was largely attended. Keystone Lodge No. 112, A. F. & A. M., attended the obsequies in a body and paid the last sad honor of the order to the memory of the deceased. Mr. Higgins was a member of Faith Lodge No. 179, of Mt. Ayr, Iowa. He was in the 60th year of his age, and was a much respected citizen of our community. He leaves a large circle of friends to mourn his departure. #### BROOKS.

William Brooks, a former well known resident of this city, fell dead at Arkansas City last Thursday. The physicians pronounced heart disease as the cause of his death. It seems that he was in poor health and had started to return to his parent's home this city with his brother, Charles T. Brooks, who resides here. Getting into a cab to go to the Santa Fe depot, the driver made a mistake and did not reach the right place until too late for the train. While returning to the hotel he stopped for a moment in a store, and then started to walk the rest of the distance, but death overtook him before he had reached the place. His brother, supposing he had decided to remain until the following day, had returned home. Almost immediately upon his arrival came a telegram announcing the death of William Brooks. The remains were interred at Arkansas City and will not be brought to this city at present. The parents and relatives here, have sympathy of the community in their bereavement.
