problem," the paper stated. "Today, she is an established town of 900 people (which number is rapidly increasing) with busy merchants and tradesmen, and streets crowded with loaded teams from the rich country that surrounds her on every side. One year ago she had one branch road, with one train a day, bringing in the passengers and freight together.

"Today she has the branch turned into a thoroughfare, the Iowa Southwestern, and branching again within the limits of the town; besides the main line of the great Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway, which also passes through the incorporation, and while we write, is constructing a fine depot and freight house immediately at the end of Main Street. Both these roads give us close and direct communication with Chicago, Des Moines and Council Bluffs, and with Carroll, Audubon, Harlan and the fine new towns on the line of the Milwaukee."

TOWN NAMED FOR O.H. MANNING

The town of Manning was named in honor of O.H. Manning who had a checkered career ranging from schoolteacher, newspaper publisher, lawyer, to politician.

In 1881, the 33 year old Manning was attorney for the Iowa southwestern branch of the Chicago & NorthWestern Railroad. As such, he handled the transaction of land for the Western Town Lot Company, which purchased the prairie farm land and sold it to Manning for city lots.

Born in Indiana in 1848, he came to Adel with his family in 1854. After studying at Western College in Linn County, he moved to Jefferson to teach school. He received his legal training in Jefferson; in 1868, he was admitted to the bar and located his offices in Carroll.

A crusader who "detected irregularities in the county government," Manning purchased the Carroll *Herold* in 1877. Through his role as newspaper publisher, he attempted a general house-keeping of the local government.

His first political office was that of County Treasurer. At the age of 28, he was elected to the Iowa Legislature. During his second term, he was appointed chairman of the House Committee on Rail Roads. In 1881, he was nominated for the office of Lieutenant Governor of Iowa, and served that position for two, two-year terms.

He was known for his brilliant political record, his skill as a leader, and by his strength as a debater.

In 1885, he accepted the position of Legal Counsel for the Central National Bank of Topeka, Kansas; from there, he went to Denver, Colorado, as the attorney for the Atchinson, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad. In 1889, he moved to Chicago, Illinois, to take charge of the legal interests of a number of Illinois corporations, under a 15-year contract. He spent his remaining years there.

GEOLOGICAL FORMATION

The Manning landscape is the result of many geological processes and their interaction with both the hydrologic and biological processes. Manning is located in what is known as the Southern Iowa drift plain with topography of steeply rolling hills interspersed with areas of level alluvial low-lands along larger streams. Manning is located near the divide between the Mississippi River Basin and Missouri River Basin, which is one of the major drainage divides in the United States. Water from the Manning area flows into the West Nishnabotna River and then into the Missouri River.

The topography of steeply rolling hills resembles ocean waves with seldom an extensive vista because the elevations of the crest of the hills are approximately the same. Basically, this topography is a result of the glacier deposits and loess deposits on the bedrock of the area. Drill log records from a well to the south of Manning indicate that the bedrock surface is 365 feet below the land surface and consists of Pennsylvanian rocks of the Des Moines series. These Pennsylvanian rocks consist mostly of shales with interbedded limestones and minor coal units. Other well log records indicate that a sandstone of the Cretaceous system of the Dakota formation also makes up bedrock of the area.

Little evidence remains to indicate an association of this region with continental glaciers. Knowledge of these massive sheets of glacier ice comes from the tens of feet of glacial drift carried by the ice and deposited on the bedrock surface. This drift consists of glacial till belonging to the Nebraskan age on top of which Kansan age drift was deposited.

Since Kansan time most of the land has been exposed to stream erosion, weathering processes, soil development, and loess deposition. The drainage patterns we now see had their origin on the glacial deposits. At times it is possible to see red zones or reddish brown zones on the hillsides or in fresh road cuts. This material is a result of oxidation of iron and is an ancient soil profile or paleosol developed on the Kansan till surface.

During the latter part of the Pleistocene, loess, a wind-blown material of uniform particle size, was deposited over the glacial till. This loess is thickest to the west of Manning and thins to the east, the source being the Missouri River Valley. The high fertility soils of the area were derived from the loess and are mainly of the Marshall series.

NEW YORKER GIVEN CHANCE BY JUDGE

Niagara Falls Youth Sentenced on Forgery Charge Free.

RENTS MUST REPORT
Every Four Months Conduct of Son Shall Be Sent to Iowa.

DES MOINES, Ia., May 17.—Special: Attending Reinhard Frye, the Niagara Falls boy forger, to ten years in the penitentiary yesterday morning, Judge Will released the boy to his mother.

He will be sent back to Niagara Falls for a court parole, made possible by a law passed just last year. He will be in charge of his parents who will be required to make a report every four months. If Frye shows good behavior he will be permanently released after the end of parole.

Strong recommendations of Niagara Falls officials and social workers figured largely in getting the boy's release. According to these reports his past record was the best and it was on the strength of his good standing that Frye was given his chance.

Injured in Runaway.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., May 17.—Mrs. Elam Ballinger, 70 years old, was fatally injured in a runaway Thursday late yesterday. The team Ballinger was driving became frightened just as a bridge was reached and she drove the rig into a deep ditch. Mrs. Ballinger had both arms broken, several ribs crushed and her head partly bed.

Birthdays of Famous Iowans

MAY 18, 1914.

Martha Coobley Callanan, one of the organizers of the State Equal Suffrage association and one of the founders of the Benedict Home for Friendless Girls, was born in Albany county, New York, May 18, 1826. Her early life was spent on a farm, and later she attended school in Albany. In 1846 she married James Callanan. They came to Iowa in 1863 and located in Des Moines. Mrs. Callanan was an active worker in many of the early reform movements in Iowa, particularly suffrage and the Woman's Christian Temperance union. She aided in the organization and support of the Home for the Aged in Des Moines, and was for many years president of the Equal Suffrage association. A great part of her life was devoted to philanthropic work and in aiding the unfortunate. She died Aug. 16, 1901.

Oriando H. Manning, former lieutenant governor and a prominent lawyer, was born at Abington, Ind., May 18, 1847. He came with his parents to Iowa in 1863 and located at Adel. He graduated at Western college and taught school for a time at Jefferson. Later he began the study of law and was admitted to the bar in 1868, and began practice at Carroll. He took charge of the Carroll Herald in 1870 and served in the capacity of editor until he was elected to the legislature as representative in 1875. He was re-elected in 1877 and at the republican state convention in 1881 was nominated lieutenant governor and elected on the ticket with Governor Sherman. He resigned in 1885 and removed to Council Bluffs, where he resumed the practice of law.
