Well-Known Agriculturalist To Be Buried in Oakdale Cemetery.

Funeral services for Bruce T. Seaman, 89, well known agriculturalist who operated the "Golden Sheaf" farm on Harrison street for many years, and who died at 2 a. m. Sunday, will be held at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday at Hill & Frederick's chapel. Burial will be in Oakdale cemetery.

During his entire life Mr. Seaman took an active interest in all public affairs and was considered an authority in all branches of agriculture. At the outbreak of the Civil war, tho too young to enter active service, he organized and drilled a troop, for which service he received the commission of first lieutenant.

He was one of the founders of the Farmers' institute still conducted at Eldridge. With Albert Dawson, the late Col. French and others, Mr. Seaman organized the Scott County Pioneer association. Altho afflicted with blindness for many years, he took an active interest in city, state and national

After his marriage in 1869 to Louisiana L. Wicks, who preceded him in death five years ago, he moved to the farm known as the "Golden Sheaf," where he resided for 49 years, retiring and moving to Davenport in 1918.

Surviving are three daughters, the Misses L. Winne, Grace A., and Bertha E., at home; two sons. Don D., at home, and James W., Garber, Okla.; and a granddaughter, Miss Louell, daughter of a son, Wright, who died in 1917, also in Garber.

BRUCE T. SEAMAN.

To many Davenporters the announcement of the death of Bruce T. Seaman meant simply another resident gone. To those who knew Mr. Seaman in his prime, it meant the passing of a Scott County stalwart—one of the men who helped point the way to modern farming, and to lay the basis of such organizations as the Mississippi Valley Fair Association and other foundations of our present farming progress.

Mr. Seaman's personality always impressed itself on any movement in which he took part. Therefore, where this writer has forgotten the other members of a group which tramped up the Rock Island right of way to the Locust street neighborhood, several decades ago, looking for a suitable location for a Scott county fair grounds, he well remembers that Mr. Seaman was in the party. One was found southwest of Five Points—any one of that day would have told you, "just go west on Locust street to P. N. Jacobsen's—it's just west of that."

And so a chronicle of the farm activities of the years around the turn of the century would show Bruce T. Seaman in the midst of all of them. That the loss of his sight since then relegated him to retirement is a loss to all those who have missed contact with so vital a character.

Mr.Rogers held the office of justice of the peace here for four years, and was elected for the third term, but refused to serve. He is a member of the A. O. U. W. Lodge.

Gustav C. Rusch was born in Sheridan Township, July 18, 1852. His father, Nicholas J. Rusch, now deceased, was a native of Holstein, Germany, and settled in Scott County in 1847. The subject of this memoir was reared on a farm and obtained a good education in Bryant & Stratton's Business College, of Davenport. He married Minnie Harding in May, 1877. She is a daughter of Peter B. Harding, of German nativity, who located in Scott County, in 1850. Mr. and Mrs. Rusch have one child, Emily. Mr. Rusch owns a fine farm of 165 acres in Sheridan Township, and is classed with Scott County's most prosperous and enterprising farmers.

Bruce T. Seaman is a son of Joseph Seaman, who is a native of Washington Co., Pa., and is now a resident of Scott County. Bruce T. Seaman was born Nov. 19, 1845, in Greene Co., Pa., and came to this county in company with his parents in 1846. His boyhood days were spent on his father's farm. He was educated in the common schools, and also attended the State University at Iowa City. He was united in marriage Jan. 10, 1869, with Louisiana L. Micks, a daughter of Gilbert Micks, of this township. She was born in Dearborn Co., Ind. They have had six children, five living, viz.: Earnest W., James W., Winnifred L., Grace and Bertha. Mr. Seaman is known as a breeder of blooded stock, and makes a specialty of fine horses; he has a farm of 160 acres on section 33. He represented Scott County in the General Assembly two terms. He has held the office of justice of the peace for the past 10 years; has also been school director and constable.

Eggert Schmidt was born Jan. 6, 1819, in Holstein, Germany. He attended school there until July, 1852, when he came to the United States, and located in Davenport Township, where he remained some time; thence to Sheridan Township, in 1855. His marriage to Annie Harder occurred in 1855. Their married life has been blessed with eight children, six living—Mary, Emma, Herman, Lena, Laura and Clara. He owns 80 acres of fine land on section 23, which is under good cultivation and thoroughly stocked. Mr. Schmidt is known as one of Scott Counties most enterprising farmers.

E. V. Van Eps is the proprietor of a general store at Eldridge. The store was first established in 1871 by S. H. Burris, who employed Mr. Van Eps as a clerk. Mr. Burris sold to Mr. Young, who subsequently disposed of his stock to Mr. W. S. Block in the spring of 1879. He carries a stock of \$2,000; his annual sales amount to \$6,000. He is a native of Schenectady Co., N. Y., born Sept. 10, 1833. He enlisted in Company C, 66th Illinois Sharp-Shooters, under Col. Birge, and fought in the battles of Fort Donelson,

James and Anna Cunningham. He was graduated from Dixon College, Dixon, Illinois, in 1888 and the same year removed to Humboldt County, Iowa, where he taught school for two years. He was also graduated from Humboldt College, Humboldt, Iowa. He followed farming for some time. In 1900 he was elected county auditor, was three times reclected, and served eight years. He read law under Judge D. F. Coyle of Humboldt, was admitted to the bar in 1907, and in the fall of 1998 was elected county attorney, was three times re-elected to that office and served eight years, or until January 1, 1917. He continued in the practice of law at Humboldt the remainder of his life. He he'd many other positions—township assessor, member of City Council, mayor, member of School Board, and in 1934 was elected representative and served in the Forty-sixth General Assembly. Politically he was a Republican.

WILLIAM LUTHER ETER was born in Franklin County, Pennsylvania, in 1860 and died in Sigourney, Iowa, June 20, 1935. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. John W. Etter. He removed to Cedar County, Iowa, in 1883 where he worked on a farm, and taught school. He was graduated from Cornell College, Mount Vernon, in 1889 and the fall of that year was elected superintendent of schools of Cedar County and was twice re-elected, serving six years. He followed that by being superintendent of the city schools of Tipton from 1896 to 1899. The fall of 1899 he removed to Sigourney and became editor and publisher of the Sigourney Review. In 1908 he was elected representative and served in the Thirtythird General Assembly. In 1926 he was the Democratic nominee for Congress in the Sixth District, but lost in the general election to C. W. Ramseyer, the then congressman. In 1928 he sold his newspaper property to his son, Cotton Etter. He was a member of the Presbyterian church, a man of good reputation, and was prominent in the councils of the Democratic party in his part of the state.

Brucer T. Sexuax was born in Greene County, Pennsylvania, November 11, 1845, and died in Davenport, Iowa, June 30, 1935. About six months after his birth he was brought by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Seaman, in their removal to Scott County, Iowa. His boyhood was spent on his father's farm. He attended public school and entered the Preparatory Department of the State University of Iowa the fall of 1864 and attended for four years, or until the spring of 1868, finishing the first three years of the liberal arts course. He devoted his attention to farming and the breeding of livestock, especially horses. For many years he owned and operated the "Golden Sheaf" farm near Davenport. He served his township as justice of the peace, and in other positions, was elected representative from Scott County in 1877, was re-elected in 1879, and served in the Seventeenth and Eighteenth general assmblies. In his later years he was considered quite an authority on agricultural subjets, and was a very useful citizen.


