

JUDGE G. R. STRUBLE CLAIMED SUNDAY

HONORED TOLEDO CITIZEN DIED
AT ADVANCED AGE—WAS
LOVED BY ALL

Widely Known Thruout Iowa as At-
torney and Politician—Funeral
Services Held Wednesday After-
noon from Home.

Funeral services for Judge G. R. Struble, who died at his home in this city Sunday night, were held from the home Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and were in charge of Dr. W. L. Alexander of the Toledo Methodist church. The service was one especially fitting to one so greatly loved and highly respected in the community in which he so long lived, and many gathered at the Struble home to pay their last tribute to the departed neighbor and citizen. All of the business houses were closed

during the service, and members of the Masonic order from Toledo, Tama, Montour and Chelsea, the Order of Eastern Star and Belle Plaine Commandery attended in a body.

The musical numbers were exceptionally pleasing. A quartet composed of Miss Dorothy Robinson, Mrs. Ethel Carpenter, C. B. Stiger and W. F. Shadle sang "That Will Be Glory for Me," and Miss Robin-

existed until 1864, and was followed within the succeeding six years by professional connections with Isaac L. Allen, then attorney general of the state, and C. B. Bradshaw; later he was associated in the practice of law with C. N. Goodrich, and then for some years with L. G. Kinne; in 1881 the firm of Struble & Stiger was organized of which firm Judge Struble was an active member until a few years prior to his departure.

From 1870 to 1872 he served ably on the circuit bench; in 1879 he was elected to the general assembly of Iowa; he was re-elected to the Nineteenth general assembly and after a notable contest with a strong opponent, was chosen as speaker of the house.

In 1890 Judge Struble was the republican candidate for the Fifth Congressional District, but went down in the general land slide which carried the balance of the party ticket. In 1896 he served as delegate from the Fifth District to the republican national convention which convened at St. Louis, he having been for many years a notable figure on the floor of numerous state conventions.

During the larger part of Mr. Struble's residence in Toledo he was an active worker and loyal member of the First Congregational church of Toledo, and friendly and generously helpful to every meritorious home movement and institution. He was a 32nd Degree Mason, his local membership being with Toledo Blue Lodge No. 118. He was also a member of the order of the Eastern Star No. 380 of Toledo. He understood its teaching, he lived its ideals and was revered by all of his brethren as one who was a credit to the order and by his upright life, a worthy example to all his brethren.

On April 19, 1860, George R. Struble was united in marriage with Sophia J. Nelson, who came to Iowa from New York with her mother when she was 14 years of age. Mrs. Struble in the fullness of her years, preceded her husband to the better land only seven months.

They are survived by their children, Agnes Struble Day, May Struble Overholser, Gertrude Struble Barrows, Jessie Struble, George Herbert Struble and Grace Struble Smith, all of whom were present at the funeral service.

George Rix Struble is descended from a fine noteworthy ancestry. His more immediate ancestry was established in New Jersey where in Sussex county, he was born on July 25, 1836. He inherited from his father, Isaac Struble, his fine mind and noble qualities; from his mother, Emma Teasdale Struble, his gentle, lovable disposition, through whom also came the line of law, the grandfather being Judge Cox of Virginia.

The family moved from New Jersey to Virginia near Fredericksburg, and then to Ohio; in 1857 when Mr. Struble was 20 years of age, his parents moved to Iowa City and the same year he came to Toledo. On arriving at Toledo he took up the study of law. He was untiring in his application to the task and this with his natural aptitude to the profession, brought him through all obstacles in three years, and in 1860 he was admitted to the practice. His first partnership was formed with Albert Stoddard which

Primarily a lawyer and one of the strongest and most upright who ever plead a case at the Iowa bar, with half a century of practice behind him, he was the nestor of his local brethren. During his later years he was able to spend his time in studious leisure, in the balm of a beautiful home and a warm circle of friends.

Mr. Struble made a high record at the bar, on the bench, as a public man of the state, and as an ardent and powerful champion of all moral reforms. He did not misuse the splendid gift nature bestowed upon him. His intellectual powers, his noble character, the lofty sentiments controlling his fine nature were ever used in making right prevail over wrong, justice over injustice. Society, his age, have reaped the reward of his unselfish life. In the realization of his ideals and fine ambition he marshalled the full powers of his mind, his great heart and his conscience.

He was a strong, pure man. Our love for him is due to the fact that in his struggles and triumphs, in his friendships, in his relations to wife and children, in his battle with death, his was the best type of manhood. He was a friend who did not wait the call; when dark days came to his friends he was at their side with sympathy, counsel and substantial aid.

He was a modest man; false pretensions were no part of his nature. He was a man, born a gentleman, who lived up to his opportunity and his ideals. They who knew him best loved him most. His life, his example, will linger in the memory of his family and friends as a benediction, and make them better men and women for having been able to call him father, friend and neighbor.

On last Sunday, surrounded by his loved ones, in his beautiful home that he loved so well, he slept. His gentle spirit went across the river to the Master, where the sweetheart of his boyhood, the mother of his children, the faithful wife of their many years of mutual comradeship and love, awaits him. This friend of humanity, this loyal man, this useful citizen has completed his life work and passed to the spirit land.

years spent in this manner, came to Toledo, read law, and in March, 1857, was admitted to the bar at Marion, Linn county. He was born on the 18th of May, 1830, at what is now Attica, Wyoming county, New York. His father was a blacksmith by trade, and as soon as William became of sufficient age, he learned the trade and followed it until coming to Toledo in 1856. On the 22nd of August, 1852, he was married to Miss Emily Baugh, of Jones county, this State. Four children have been born to them—Emma, wife of M. J. Boyle, of Toledo; Seward J., George Sumner, and Lillie V., wife of W. B. Louthan, junior member of the firm of Stivers & Louthan.

Hon. George R. Struble, the present Speaker of the House of Representatives of Iowa, and a member of the law firm of Struble & Kinne, Toledo, has been a prominent lawyer in Tama county for the past twenty-three years. He was born July 25, 1836, in Sussex county, New Jersey. His parents were Isaac and Emma T. (Cox) Struble, both of whom are still living near Toledo, Iowa. When quite young, Mr. Struble removed from New Jersey to the vicinity of Fredericksburg, Virginia, and there remained with his parents until their removal to Chesterville, Ohio, in 1847. In 1856, Mr. Struble left Ohio, came to Iowa, and located first in Iowa City, but only remained in that place until the following spring, when he came to Toledo, Tama county, and has since made this his home. Mr. Struble was married at Toledo, Iowa, on the 19th of April, 1860, to Miss Sophia J. Nelson, daughter of Seth B. and Jane Nelson, and niece of Rev. Dr. H. A. Nelson, formerly

of St. Louis, now of Geneva New York. Mr. Struble first commenced the study of law in the office of T. Walter Jackson, and was admitted to the bar in February, 1860, at the regular term of the district court, Judge W. E. Miller presiding. In 1863 he formed a partnership with Isaac L. Allen, under the firm name of Allen & Struble. The partnership continued until 1865. During most of the time of this partnership, Mr. Allen was occupying the position of Attorney-General of the State. In 1870, Mr. Struble was elected judge of the circuit court of the Eighth judicial district, and held that responsible position until 1872. Mr. Struble was elected a member of the House of the 18th General Assembly of the State of Iowa, and re-elected to the 19th General Assembly, of which he was elected Speaker in 1882. He is now practicing law in Toledo, in partnership with L. G. Kinne, under the firm name of Struble & Kinne. He is also a member of the loan firm of H. J. Stiger & Co., and is one of the directors of the Toledo Savings Bank. In politics he is a republican, and is a member of the Congregational church of Toledo, Iowa. Mr. and Mrs. Struble have been blessed with six children; Agnes N., wife of Hiram Baldwin, cashier of Toledo Savings Bank; May T., Gertrude N., Jessie F., George Herbert and Grace. Judge Struble is of medium height, well proportioned and is a fine appearing man; has a high forehead, a keen, penetrating eye. Socially, he is pleasant, affable and courteous, though always considering business paramount to social ties. As a lawyer, he is quick to see a point, has a ready and eloquent flow of language to push it; is a forcible

speaker, well educated in his profession, and withal a most successful practitioner. Judge Struble is a man in whom not only the county, but the State may take pride; and the honors that have been bestowed upon him have only served to make him more deserving of them. In his public life he has fully demonstrated himself to be a man of thorough integrity and sterling worth, possessing qualities which make him a leader among men.

D. D. Appelgate has been one of Toledo's attorneys since 1868, and is among the oldest settlers of Tama county. He was born in Jackson county, Indiana, October 31, 1829, and was there reared upon a farm. In 1848 he left Indiana and came to Iowa, locating in Cedar county, where he remained until September, 1851, when he came to Tama county and located in Carlton township. In the spring of 1853, he was elected the first clerk of courts of Tama county; was re-elected from time to time and served until January, 1869, in the meantime reading law with Isaac L. Allen, ex-Attorney General, of Iowa, and in 1868, was admitted to the bar. He has followed the profession ever since. In 1856, Mr. Appelgate was married to Miss Margaret McLaury, of Delaware county, New York. They have six children. He was formerly an "old line Whig," but since the organization of the Republican party, has advocated its principles. He is a member of the Masonic fraternity, and of the A. O. U. W. organization, a much respected and worthy citizen.

C. B. Bradshaw was born December 26, 1839, at Richmond, Jefferson county, Ohio. His parents were Harvey and Susan (Sullivan) Bradshaw; the former a native of

Connecticut; the latter of Pennsylvania. His father died at Mt. Vernon, Iowa, November 8, 1861; and his mother in June, 1873, at Toledo, Iowa. His father was a Methodist minister, and at the time of his death, agent of Cornell College, Mt. Vernon. The family consisted of two sons—C. B., and H. S. Bradshaw, the latter practicing law at Ida Grove, Ida county, Iowa. C. B. was reared in Ohio, receiving his early education in the common schools. He came to Iowa in the spring of 1860, and entered Cornell College, remaining until August, 1862. At that time he enlisted in Co. F. 24th Iowa Vol. Inf'ty, joining Grant's forces at Helena, Arkansas, started to Vicksburg, but before reaching there, was in the battles of Port. Gibson and Champion Hills, reaching Vicksburg on the 24th of May, 1863, and was there during the siege of that city. In July, 1865, he was discharged at Davenport, where his regiment disbanded. He then went to Michigan and entered the law department of Ann Arbor University, graduating in 1867. Mr. Bradshaw was admitted to the bar of Iowa, at Marion, Linn county, at a term of the district court, Judge Rothrock presiding. He then came to Toledo, and formed a partnership with G. R. Struble, which continued until the fall of 1870, at which time Mr. Struble withdrew from the firm to enter upon the duties of Circuit Judge, to which office he had been elected. Mr. Bradshaw has since been alone in business. He was married in December, 1867, to Miss Mary Ann Hayzlett, daughter of William and Elizabeth Hayzlett, a native of Linn county, this State. Mrs. Bradshaw graduated in the classical course at Cornell College,

sires of his age in both first and second generation. Mr. Stout died in Dubuque, July 17, 1900.

JOSEPH M. STREET was born in Lunenburg County, Virginia, December 15, 1782. He went to Kentucky, studied law with Henry Clay and practiced a few years. Later he was editor of the *Western World*, published at Frankfort, which became famous for exposing the conspiracy of Aaron Burr to dismember the Union. Street was repeatedly assailed by the friends of Burr and at one time severely wounded. He lived for several years at Shawneetown, Illinois, where he held various offices. In 1827 he was appointed by President Adams agent at Prairie du Chien for the Winnebago Indians. During his long service in that position he established schools and instructed them in farming. He protected them from plundering traders and acquired great influence with that tribe. During the Black Hawk war he removed the Winnebagos out of reach of the influence of the Sac chief with whom they sympathized. He was instrumental in securing the surrender of Black Hawk and fifty members of his band who escaped from the massacre of Bad Ax, to General Taylor at Fort Crawford, and was also instrumental in procuring the removal of the Winnebagos from Wisconsin to northern Iowa upon lands they had accepted in exchange. In 1835 General Street was transferred to Rock Island as agent for the Sac and Fox Indians. In 1838 he selected the site for the new agency of the Sac and Foxes on the Des Moines River which became known as Agency City, which was in Wapello County, near where Ottumwa stands. Here General Street died May 5, 1840, and was buried near the grave of the chief Wapello.

GEORGE R. STRUBLE was born in Sussex County, New York, July 25, 1836. He became a resident of Ohio at an early age where he attended the common schools and the Academy at Chesterville. He removed to Iowa City in 1856, studied law and was admitted to the bar. In 1857 he removed to Toledo in Tama County, where he began the practice of his profession. He served several years as circuit judge in the Eighth Judicial District. In 1879 he was elected Representative in the Eighteenth General Assembly and at the close of the term was reelected. He received the nomination of the Republicans and was chosen Speaker of the House of the Nineteenth General Assembly. In 1890 Judge Struble was the Republican candidate for Representative in Congress from the Fifth District; but that year the Democrats for the first time since 1853 elected a majority of the Representatives in Congress from Iowa, and Judge Struble was one of the Republicans defeated.

ISAAC S. STRUBLE was born near Fredericksburg, Virginia, on the 3d of November, 1843. He received a common school education and at-

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
