FUNERAL OF DR. WAGNER


Was Held at Blairstown on Thursday and Was Largely Attended.

The funeral of the late Dr. Jacob K. Wagner of Van Horne was held at Blairstown on Thursday. The services were conducted by Rev. S. C. Cole. The remains were escorted from Van Horne overland by pall bearers from the Odd Fellows' lodge and a delegation from the Masons. After the sermon the fraternal of St. Bernard commandery, K. T., took charge of the remains of the Sir Knight and buried them in the Blairstown cemetery with all the honors of the institution.

Dr. Jacob K. Wagner was born in Chambersburg, Franklin county, Pennsylvania, October 23, 1843; died at Van Horne, Iowa, at 12:25, May 15, 1899. In 1856 Dr. Wagner, with his parents, removed to Iowa, living one year in Muscatine county. In 1857 they removed to Western, Linn county. At the age of 17 he enlisted in the union army and for four years and three months fought for his country's flag. He belonged to the Second Iowa cavalry. Returning from the war he studied medicine with Drs. Mansfield & Smith of Cedar Rapids and graduated from Rush Medical college, locating at Blairstown, Iowa, in 1868. On October 14, 1871, he was married to Miss Virginia S. Swinney. In 1882 when the Milwaukee built its Council Bluffs line, establishing a new town at Van Horne, he was appointed railway surgeon and moved to that point, which was then made a prominent division. His parents were connected with the United Brethren church, but he held no membership. He was a Sir Knight of St. Bernard commandery, stationed at Belle Plaine; was also a consistory member of DeMolay, Clinton. He belonged to the Odd Fellows' lodge at Van Horne and also of the G. A. R. He was a member of the Eighteenth general assembly of Iowa, a member of the State Medical association and also of the Order of Railway Surgeons. His wife, three daughters, two sons, five brothers and one sister survive to mourn his loss.

The cause of his death really dates from an extremely cold day last January, when, to reach the home of Peter Wheeler, north of Luzerne, he walked from the station through a heavy storm and bad roads. A catch or short pain in the region of his heart rendered him speechless when he arrived at the home and from that hour this pain recurred at intervals until finally it laid the gallant knight low. He was uncomplaining and extremely determined. Saturday, May 13, two days before his death, he was at his office and gave medical advice and medicine. In fact on Sabbath day medicine was sent out under his directions. Monday morning he arose and was dressed, but found himself unable to go to his office as he had intended, and returned to his bed. Death occurred at 12:25.

Death of Dr. Wagner.

The sad news of the death of Dr. Wagner, of Van Horne, reached Vinton yesterday morning. We understand he died of rheumatism of the heart. He had been a practicing physician at Blairstown and Van Horne for many years. He was a member of the Second Iowa cavalry, and was a prominent member of the veterans association. He always took a prominent part in public and political affairs and was a leading member of the Republican party. He served the county in the legislature, but aside from that he did not seem to care for public office. His death will be universally mourned in the county.

Death of Dr. G. A. Marietta.


Dr. G. A. Marietta, of Clarion, this state, brother of J. E. Marietta, of this city, died at his home in Clarion, May 14, 1899. He was born in West Salem, Ohio, August 6, 1853, and came to Iowa with his parents in 1872. He graduated in medicine at Ann Arbor university in 1880 and commenced practice in Clarion the same year. Success attended him from the start. He was married Nov. 16, 1881 to Miss Rilla Deaman and one child, a daughter now 15 years old, was born to them.

He was seriously ill for four weeks and the immediate cause of his death was uremic poisoning.

The remains were brought to Vinton Sunday night accompanied by an escort of Odd Fellows of Clarion.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon (May 15) at the residence of his brother, J. E. Marietta, being conducted by Rev. Frank L. Loveland, and the remains laid away in Evergreen cemetery. The Vinton Odd Fellows had charge of the services at the grave.

DEATH OF DR. WAGNER.

Began His Medical Studies In This City Years Ago.

Died, May 15, 1899, at his home, Van Horne, Iowa, Dr. Jacob K. Wagner. Dr. Wagner was born in Chambersburg, Penn., Oct. 23, 1843. He moved with his parents to Muscatine, Iowa, in 1856. A year later they moved to Linn county.

At the age of seventeen he entered the army and served with the Second Iowa cavalry in the civil war. At the close of the war he studied medicine with Dr. Smith of Cedar Rapids and graduated from Rush Medical college in 1868, and came to Blairstown the same year. He built up an extensive practice here and became popular in political circles also, and was elected to represent this county at the state assembly of 1879-80.

In 1882 he moved to Van Horne where he has since resided.

He was a member of the Order of Railway Surgeons, the State Medical association, the I. O. O. F. and the Knights Templar commandery. The beautiful funeral ceremony of the latter was conducted over his remains at Blairstown, Iowa, yesterday where a large concourse of friends from surrounding towns and country had gathered to pay a tribute to his memory.

NEGROES TO FOUND CITY

Will Try Self-Government in Jersey Town.

New York, May 18—Long will soon have a new city composed entirely of negroes, who will be all brought up from Georgia and North Carolina to be colonized. This scheme, which may cause opposition and strife, is the suggestion of Rufus L. Perry, a brilliant young colored lawyer of Brooklyn, who desires to elevate his race and that is possible to counteract the lynching system in the south.

The proposed colony will be situated in Suffolk county, Long Island, and will have the form of an independent municipality in which negroes will be allowed to live. Three thousand acres of land have been all secured, and the promoters have option on another tract of the extent. The land is owned by capitalists, and white capitalists also build the factories. The capitalists agreed to invest in this enterprise on condition that negro labor could be obtained at a certain figure.

Dr. Wagner Dead

Many people in Cedar Rapids were pained to learn Monday of the death at his home in Van Horne on Sunday evening of Dr. J. K. Wagner, who dropped dead of heart disease. Dr. Wagner was one of the best known men in this part of the state. He was a member of the eighteenth general assembly. 
Death of Dr. Wagner.



Thomas Jefferson was the greatest expansionist of his day. He purchased the territory of which Iowa is a part. His purchase has paid good dividends, as all admit, and the area included in the Louisiana purchase was relatively more than all the East and West Indies combined.
The Chicago Chronicle writes a very uncomplimentary biography of Andrew Carnegie. It affirms that he has piled up his millions through the agency of the slave-driver's lash. Of course he was an iron dealer and perhaps an iron master. The Chronicle, on the other hand, is a free trade organ and rather free in its use of language and expressions of bitterness.

The democratic party will have a difficult problem to solve in the south. During the recent war the southern states were aggressive and loyal and seized upon every opportunity to prove their sincerity. The belief in expansion is prevalent throughout the south and when the attempt is made to commit the party to the anti-expansion doctrine there will be strong protests, if not division and desertion.

Roswell P. Flower's death closed one of the greatest business careers in America. He was entrusted with extended and complicated business interests at a very early age; was a millionaire at forty, and possessed with an ambition to become the king of Wall street. He possessed an all-absorbing passion for money-making. All self improvement, pleasure, or interest in good works found no place in his program. His ideal was certainly a false one. The accumulation of wealth for the sake of being rich is not the noblest ambition.

There were eighty-eight candidates for admission to the bar at the late session of the supreme court, sixty-one were admitted. This is the largest class that ever presented itself for admission to practice law. The percentage of failures was also the largest. The number of lawyers is increasing too rapidly, so many of our judges think. It is too easy they say to secure a certificate to practice law in Iowa. The tendency is toward the requirement of three years of study in place of two. Atty. Gen. Remley thinks that many good farmers are spoiled in the effort to make poor lawyers. The standard of the profession has been allowed to fall too low in Iowa and an attempt will be made to raise it even higher than formerly.

Fish Laws.
Beginning to-day it is permitted to take game fish from the rivers of Iowa providing you do so in a manner according to the laws of the state. No one can use more than two lines with one hook upon each line, except in case of a trot line which may be extended half way across a stream. A trolling line with spoon hook consisting of three hooks fastened together may be used. The possession of a spear or a seine on the water on the shore with the net foot of the water is prima facie evidence of intent to violate the law. Except that a seine not more than five yards in length and of three-eighths inch mesh may be used to obtain minnows for bait. And if the fry of any game fish is found in such a seine it must be returned to the water. A fine of from \$5 to \$50 or imprisonment in the county jail from one to ten days shall be the penalty upon conviction, and the catching of each fish contrary to law is a separate offense. The limit of the season is December 1.

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
