

J. WILSON WILLIAMS DIES.

A DES MOINES COUNTY PIONEER GONE
 TO RESIDE IN A NEW COUNTRY.

The citizenship of Des Moines coun-
 ty has been deeply touched the past
 week by the death of several old and
 highly esteemed men. Foremost
 among the number in prominence was
 Mr. J. Wilson Williams, of Huron
 township. He was a very old man,
 and was never robust, so that his
 recent illness, from general debility,
 was not surprising to his friends and
 neighbors. His death occurred on
 Wednesday at the homestead in Hur-
 on where he had lived in con-
 tentment and honor for a great
 many years. Mr. Williams was

a historic character in early Iowa
 history; and his work as a surveyor
 and a civil engineer is still the accept-
 ed authority all over the Southeastern
 part of the State. He was a man of
 the finest sentiments, had broad and
 noble views, he lived to do good, and
 he was universally esteemed. His
 qualities were fine and broad enough
 to leaven the entire community. He
 was always mentioned by people who
 knew him with the utmost respect
 and affection. His death leaves a per-
 manent void in the ranks of the pio-
 neer element. Mr. Williams was a
 native of Vermont, and was born in
 1816. He was educated at Montpelier,
 and in early life came West, being
 county surveyor of Hancock county,
 Ills., for twelve years. In 1854 he was
 commissioned by the government to
 survey the islands of the Upper Mis-
 sissippi, a work which occupied him
 for several years. In the year 1850 he
 had located on the Huron township
 farm, which at one time comprised
 nearly two thousand acres. In politics
 Mr. Williams was first a Whig and
 then a Republican. In political life
 he was contemporaneous with Govern-
 nor Grimes, and for fourteen years
 was a member of the Iowa general
 assembly. His long life was charac-
 terized by honorab's effort to serve and
 better his race, and was full of good
 work. He leaves two sons and a
 daughter, who for many years have
 lived on farms adjoining the old home-
 stead.

JOHN WILSON WILLIAMS.

JOHN WILSON WILLIAMS, who was prominently connected with many of the early surveys of the State, and has left the impress of his individuality and ability upon the legislation of Iowa by reason of his service in the State Senate and his influence in political circles, was born in Charlotte, Vt., March 25, 1816, his parents being John Wilson and Minerva (Barnes) Williams. His education was acquired in the early schools of his native town and in the high school at Heinsburg. He was reared by Mrs. Anna Barnes, his grandmother and also his guardian, and when he was twenty years of age she gave him a portion of his patrimony, having complete confidence in his business ability and trustworthiness. He then started out in life on his own account, making his way westward to Hancock county, Ill., where he made investments. He determined to become a surveyor, and received his theoretical knowledge of the profession from a Mr. Johnson in Vermont, while his practical training came from Mr. Sheldon, a noted civil engineer of Jacksonville, Ill., under whose direction he followed the business until he became a practical and skilled civil engineer.

Mr. Williams maintained his residence in Illinois until 1849, when he came to Des Moines county, Iowa, where he had previously purchased three hundred acres of land lying in various tracts. He settled on a tract of one hundred acres in Section 13, Huron township, and thereon continued to make his home until his death, which period covered almost forty-five years. He developed this property from its primitive condition, turning the first furrows in the fields, and continuing the work of improve-

ment until modern buildings and rich harvests gave evidence of his care, supervision, and practical methods. Indeed, his farm became one of the best in the county; but it did not represent alone his landed possessions, for, as he was able to save from his profits a sum sufficient for further purchase, he added to his land, and at one time was the owner of twenty-seven hundred acres, while at the time of his death he retained possession of about sixteen hundred acres. He also became greatly interested in stock-raising, and fed many hundred cattle. He likewise pastured many others, his landed interests giving excellent opportunity in this direction. He also followed surveying, after his arrival in this county, and as an expert representative of the profession he surveyed the boundary line between Missouri and Iowa, and also surveyed many of the islands in the Mississippi River for the government. He did only expert work in this line, having gained a reputation as one of the most skilled followers of the calling.

In his political affiliations Mr. Williams was a Whig in early life, casting his first presidential ballot for the candidate of that party in 1837. Upon the organization of the Republican party he joined its ranks, and was one of its staunch advocates throughout his remaining days. A man of marked influence and capability, his fitness for leadership was readily recognized, and he was elected to the State Senate, where he rendered conspicuous and distinguished service to the commonwealth. He was also a representative in the lower house of the State Legislature, and was connected with many important constructive measures, while to each question which came up for settlement he gave earnest and thoughtful consideration.

Mr. Williams was married in Burlington, Dec. 1, 1847, to Miss Julia Ann Robison, a daughter of Charles and Jerusha (Kellogg) Robison. Mrs. Williams was born in Ohio, on Mill Creek, where her people were prominent pioneer residents, her natal day being Feb. 14, 1822. The six children born of this marriage were as follows: Herrick, born Oct. 7, 1848, in Hancock county, Ill., married Emma J. Pugh, a daughter of James L. and Mary E. (Barnett) Pugh. They have three children living and three deceased: Frank H., who resides on the island; Maggie, who died in 1896 at the age of fifteen years; James Wilson, who is married, and resides upon part of the old homestead farm; Ida M., wife of Ed. McFadden, living in Oakville; Charles, who died in 1887, at the age of nineteen months; and Elmer, who died about 1891, when nine months old. Lela Minerva, the second child of Mr. and Mrs. Williams, died when about twenty months old. Wilson Barnard, living in Oakville, owns a part of the old homestead property in Huron township, but much of the farm was sold to German settlers who located here in 1902. Minnie Minerva, the next member of the family, died in 1886 at the age of twenty-five years. Julia Eliza is the wife of David Waddle, a resident of West Plains, Mo. One child died in infancy unnamed.

Mrs. Williams came to Des Moines county at a very early epoch in its development, and was one of the first school-teachers within its borders. She did not regard her own education as completed at that time, and afterward continued her studies in Warsaw, Carthage, and Galesburg, Ill. She remembers the boats that plied the rivers in 1829, and relates many interesting reminiscences of pioneer times. In fact, she has written

many articles concerning the early days, and is one of the most intelligent and cultured pioneer women of the county. To her husband she was ever a faithful companion and helpmeet on life's journey.

Mr. Williams was a Congregationalist in religious faith, and took an active and helpful part in every movement tending to promote the social and material welfare of the community, and to uphold its legal, political, and moral status. He bought land at the first land sale held in this locality, and served as deputy county surveyor of Des Moines county while still at work in Illinois. From that early day until his death he was closely associated with the improvement and progress of this section of the State, and was numbered among its most distinguished pioneer residents, his efforts contributing to the best interests of the commonwealth, as well as to his home community. He was thorough in all that he undertook, possessed keen discernment, recognized possibilities and utilized advantages not only for his personal profit and advancement but also for the welfare of the whole community. True nobility of character won him high esteem, strong purpose caused his efforts to be crowned by successful accomplishment, and thorough reliability made his name a respected one wherever it was known.

HERMAN MEYERS, owner of extensive landed interests in Des Moines county, his realty holdings aggregating six hundred and twenty acres, was born in Prussia, Germany, Aug. 13, 1839. When three years of age he was brought to America

valley of the Turkey River. He was at the head of the company that built the Iowa Eastern Railroad to Elkader, and furnished most of the means for its construction. He died on the 20th of August, 1891.

JOSEPH WILLIAMS was born in Huntington, Pennsylvania, December 8, 1801. He studied law, was admitted to the bar and began practice in Hollidaysburg. In 1838, when the Territory of Iowa was created, President Van Buren appointed Joseph Williams one of the judges of the Supreme Court of the Territory. The appointment was secured at the earnest request of Jeremiah S. Black who became Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania and later Attorney-General and Secretary of State in the Cabinet of President Buchanan. At this time Judge Williams was thirty-seven years of age and had never been a prominent lawyer. He was a close observer, possessed an excellent memory and was popular, if not a learned judge. He served until the Territory was admitted as a State when he was appointed by Governor Briggs Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. He was elected by the following General Assembly for a term of six years. In 1857 he was appointed by President Buchanan District Judge of the Territory of Kansas and removed to Fort Scott. During Lincoln's administration he was appointed United States District Judge for Tennessee. He died at Fort Scott in March, 1871. Judge Williams was a younger brother of Major William Williams, founder of the town of Fort Dodge, and commander of the Spirit Lake relief expedition.

J. WILSON WILLIAMS was born in 1816, at Charlotte, Vermont, and was educated for a civil engineer. In 1836 he came to Hancock County, Illinois, and was, for twelve years, county surveyor. When the boundary line was established between Iowa and Missouri, Mr. Williams was one of the engineers employed in that work. In 1850 he located at Huron, in Des Moines County, Iowa, which became his permanent home. In 1852 he was elected on the Whig ticket with James W. Grimes as a colleague to represent that county in the House of the Fourth General Assembly and again elected to the Sixth, in 1862, as a Republican and in 1866 was chosen to the same position for the fourth time. In 1874 he was elected to the Senate, serving four years, and again in 1880 was a member of the House, serving fourteen years as a member of the Iowa Legislature. In 1866 he was chosen one of the trustees of the State Agricultural College and served on the building committee during the erection of the main structure and the organization of the college. He died on the 29th of August, 1893.

WILLIAM WILLIAMS was born at Huntington, Pennsylvania, December 6, 1796. He was the eldest son and for many years after the death of his father devoted himself to supporting and educating the
