- He left home at age 15 going to Batavia, New York where he lived for 6 years.
- He taught school at Jackson, Michigan for 2 years.
- He then moved to Rochester, Wisconsin. He then moved to the Princeton, Wisconsin where he lived for 26 years. He and his brother erected and operated a flour and custom mill. They also planted and operated a nursery of 40 acres.
- In 1867 he purchased land in Pleasant Valley, Linn County of Floyd County near Nashua, Iowa. He remained on the farm until 1893 when he moved into Nashua, Iowa.

HON. WALDO S. FLINT.

Died at Nashua, Iowa, October 1, 1900
Hon. Waldo S. Flint, aged eighty years,
seven months and eight days.

Waldo S. Flint was born at Braintree, Vermont, being the fifth in a family of eight children. He was of revolutionary stock both on his father's and mother's side, and of the seventh generation from Thomas Flint, who settled in Salem, Massachusetts in 1650. The race is of the sturdy New England character that has produced many eminent examples in all lines of thought and action. Phineas Flint, father, died when Waldo was six years of age. He was early thrown upon his own resources. Leaving home when he was fifteen years of age he went to Batavia, N. Y. where he remained six years. He engaged in teaching school at Jackson, Michigan, two years. From thence he went to Rochester, Wis., where he lived two years. In 1850 he located in Princeton, Wis., where he spent twenty-six years of his active life. Here with his brother Alvin he erected and operated a flour and custom mill bringing water from the McCann river through a canal that they opened up, a distance of seven miles. They also planted and operated a nursery of forty acres and engaged in farming on an extensive scale and other enterprises. In 1867 Mr. Flint purchased a large tract of land in Pleasant Valley, Riverton Township, Floyd Co., Iowa, about five miles from Nashua. He moved onto this farm with his family in 1876. His beneficial influence was soon felt in the improved condition of roads and better buildings and farm improvements in the neighborhood. Mr. Flint remained on this farm until 1893 when he moved to Nashua, where he has since lived. Mr. Flint held many positions of honor and trust in his life time. He served in both branches of the legislature in Wisconsin and represented Floyd County in the 19th General Assembly of Iowa. In 1853 he was married to Sarah J. Rosebrooks who survives him with two sons; Edwin W. who resides on the farm located by his father in Riverton Township; and Charles M. who is engaged in business in Chicago; a daughter, Carrie, an accomplished lady married to Dr. Cutler, died at Fergus Falls, Minnesota, February 1, 1891.
