Dreams do come true. Our dreams of a perfect open air school has come true, through the kind generosity of Dr. and Mrs. Smouse.

We had often talked of it, this wonderful new school, as we studied together in our little three room building; which barely accommodated forty-eight children. Forty-eight, when nearly 300 needed the special care which teachers with large classes in public schools were unable to give.

We were lucky, and knew it. We played and laughed and shared our books. We used the cafeteria and pool at North High, even played on their grounds. Each spring, our few feet of side yard was measured into tiny plots—and gardens were made. We planted whatever we wished:

We were happy to be in school. Our wish was that the rest of the 300 might share our good fortune and be happy with us.

Now they shall, for the dream is about to be realized.

A school with room and special provisions for all the crippled children, for those who are deaf and hard of hearing; those who have speech defects and others whose eyesight is poor. Also for the child who is anemic and nervous and the ones who have breathing difficulties, so that they may have the educational advantages of the normal child.

We will have a school with an auditorium, stairs and inclines, a swimming pool of our very own, and a gymnasium where mothers' club may meet and homemade plays may be comfortably acted. There will be sunlight windows with a view of a lovely lawn and trees under which to sit and study occasionally and plenty of room for gardens, where each child may plant a tree, a bush and enjoy watching the green things grow.

Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Shaull were dinner guests in the Mrs. Catherine Morse home.


