MIKE M'DONALD, 80, DIED AT HOME IN NEW ORLEANS

Pioneer of Bayard, Former Sheriff of County Passed Away.

Michael McDonald, 80, died at the home of his daughter Mrs. May Gunderman at New Orleans, La., Saturday night at 10 o'clock, according to word received by relatives at Bayard Sunday morning. Mr. McDonald was a pioneer resident of Bayard, helping to lay out and plan the town.

Born in Ireland July 28, 1846, he came with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Patrick McDonald and settled in Pennsylvania. In the year 1856 they came to Iowa, settling in what is now Highland township. In August 1862 Michael enlisted in Co. I 29th Iowa Volunteers, serving the union cause for three years.

Upon his discharge in 1865 he returned to Bayard and organized the State Savings bank. In the year 1871 he was elected sheriff on the democratic ticket serving in that capacity for two terms. He was a member of the 19th general assembly and also of the twenty-sixth general assembly.

Mr. McDonald was the first commander of the Robert Henderson Post No. 196 of the G. A. R. He was also a past Iowa department commander of the G. A. R.

For many years he was a farmer, meeting with success in that pursuit as he did in everything else in which he engaged.

He was the father of Charles P., Ed S., William, and Mrs. Ed Horton, all of the vicinity of Bayard.

We have not been advised as to the funeral arrangements, but the remains will doubtless be brought to Bayard for burial.

 Among those who came from foreign lands to take a place among the Commanders of the Iowa Department of the Grand Army of the Republic was Michael McDonald, born in the County of Mayo, Ireland, on July 28, 1846. Young McDonald spent his boyhood days in Pennsylvania and came to Iowa with his parents in 1856, locating on a farm in Guthrie County. At the age of sixteen he ran away from home, went twenty miles on foot, and enlisted in Company I, Twenty ninth Iowa Volunteers, serving for three years. He was at the battles of Jenkins Ferry and Helena, at the capture of Spanish Fort, and in the Red River Campaign. When the war ended, McDonald returned to become a farmer, then sheriff, and later a banker in Guthrie County. In 1882 and again in 1896 he represented his county in the Iowa General Assembly. He was for many years a member of Robert Henderson Post No. 196, Grand Army of the Republic, at Bayard, of which he was the first Commander. At the thirty fifth Annual Encampment, held at Fort Dodge in 1909, Comrade McDonald was elected Commander of the Iowa Department.

Dear Comrade:-

IN MEMORIAM

Michael McDonald, Department Commander 1909-1910

Comrade McDonald was born in County Mayo, Ireland, July 20, 1845, the son of Patrick and Anna McDonald, being near 81 years of age at the time of his death.

When six months of age he came with his parents to America, finally settling in 1856 in Highland township, Guthrie Co. Iowa. In 1862 when but 17 years of age he enlisted in Co. I, 29th Iowa infantry, serving in all the battles that his regiment was engaged and discharged at New Orleans, August 15, 1865.

On May 10, 1868, Comrade McDonald was united in marriage to Eliza J. Carnes a native of Ohio, to this union ten children were born, six daughters and four sons. Surviving the father are three daughters and four sons. The wife and mother passed away in August 1909.

Comrade McDonald was very active in public life and highly esteemed by all who knew him. He served two terms as sheriff of Guthrie County. In 1880 he was elected to the General Assembly of Iowa, and again in 1896. He was a member of the Iowa State Fair Board for fifteen years, and was Department Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic for the term of 1909 - 1910. He served the town of Bayard as its first mayor, and was engaged in the grain business in Bayard, also in the Banking business being the President of the Bayard Savings bank until 1910, when he retired from business.

Comrade McDonald resided with his daughter Mrs. Mae Gundersen of New Orleans, La. at the time of his death, which occurred Saturday June 1926, with interment in Chalmette National cemetery the following Monday.

In the death of Comrade M. McDonald, the Department of Iowa Grand Army of the Republic lose a much loved and most highly esteemed comrade whose memory will be cherished by all his comrades.

Above is a pretty fair picture of Comrade Mike McDonald, of Bayard, Guthrie county, and the subjoined announcement tells its own story. There is not, perhaps, a better or more favorably known old coffee cooler in Iowa than is this same genial whole-hearted Mike McDonald, nor is his fame as a jolly, good fellow confined to Iowa, for it is as wide as the expanse from the Atlantic to the Sea. Nor is this fact the only basis of his claims upon the department for with the above knowledge if him goes the further knowledge that he is thoroughly equipped to fill the place to which he aspires, and that the welfare of the old soldiers and their dependent ones is ever uppermost in his heart. The Post to which he belongs puts him forward in the following language:

Bayard, Iowa, Dec. 12, 1908.
Hall of Robert Henderson Post, No. 196.

Comrades:

For our next Department Commander we present the name of Comrade Mike McDonald for your favorable consideration.

Comrade McDonald enlisted in August, 1862, at the age of sixteen. He was a private in Company I, 29th Iowa Vol. Inf., and was mustered out in September, 1865, having served three years. He was on the firing line in every engagement that his regiment participated in, from the capture of Little Rock, Arkansas, to the seige and surrender of Mobile, Alabama. For three years he carried a gun and was mustered out by expiration of service. He was born in Ireland in 1846. His parents came to Guthrie county in 1856, and from this county he enlisted, and returned here and has resided here continuously to the present time. In 1883

he assisted in the organization of Robert Henderson Post, No. 196, and was its first commander, and has been actively connected with this Post for the past twenty-four years. He is proud of his Post and we are proud of him. This is in brief the record of Comrade McDonald, whom this Post nominates for your suffrage as Department Commander by the following resolutions passed unanimously by the Post at their regular meeting on the 12th day of December, in response to the repeated mention of his name for that position. The resolutions follow:

Resolution of Robert Henderson Post, No. 196.

To the Comrades of the G. A. R. Department of Iowa, Greetings:

Whereas Comrade Mike McDonald of Robert Henderson Post, No. 196, has consented to allow his name to be presented as a candidate for Department Commander at the next encampment of the Department to be held at Ft. Dodge in 1909,

Resolved, That Robert Henderson Post, No. 196, heartily endorses the candidacy of Comrade Mike McDonald, and vouches for his ability and uprightness as a man and a citizen; his loyalty as a comrade; his record as a soldier, and his qualifications to fill the position of Department Commander if elected.

Resolved, That should the Comrades of the G. A. R. of Iowa confer this honor upon Comrade McDonald Robert Henderson Post, No. 196, pledges that the splendid record of its former Department Commander will not be lowered, but will be continued on its present high level.

EARLY CITIZEN DIES IN SOUTHERN HOME

**M. M. McDONALD, CIVIL WAR
VETERAN, PASSES AWAY
IN NEW ORLEANS**

M. M. McDonald, pioneer settler of Highland township and Civil War veteran, passed away last Saturday evening at ten o'clock at his home in New Orleans, death being due to infirmities of old age.

Michael McDonald, the son of Patrick and Anna McDonald, was born in County Mayo, Ireland, July 20, 1845, being almost 81 years old at the time of his death.

When six months of age, he came with his parents to America, where the family settled in Pennsylvania. Here they remained until April 1856, when the family moved to Des Moines. Five months later the family moved to Highland township, Guthrie county, being one of the first families to locate in this part of the country. The trip from Des Moines was made in a covered wagon drawn by oxen. Upon their arrival here they erected a log cabin near Coon river.

In 1862, when but 17 years of age, Mr. McDonald enlisted in Co. I, 29th Iowa infantry. This company was organized at Council Bluffs, and was mustered into service December 1, 1862. The regiment was engaged at Helena, Arkansas Post, Terenoi and Spanish fort. It was long kept from participation in active service by being stationed in Arkansas, and while it did not take part in some of the more important battles of the Civil conflict, it was one of the bravest and best disciplined regiments in the Union Army. The regiment was mustered out at New Orleans August 15, 1865.

On May 10, 1868, Mr. McDonald was married to Miss Eliza Jane Garnes, a native of Ohio. To the union ten children were born, six daughters and four sons. Agnes passed away in July, 1873; Blanch in August of the same year, and Anna Grace died in June 1909. The wife and mother passed away in August, 1909. Surviving the father are three daughters, Mrs. L. H. Gunderman and Mrs. Victor Pasero, both of New Orleans; Mrs. Wm. Horton of Bayard; and four sons, Edward S., Wm. P. and Chas. P., all of Bayard, and Robert Emmett of Yale S. D.

Mr. McDonald is also survived by one brother, Edwin of Coon Rapids, and two sisters, Mrs. Kate Caraher of Bayard and Mrs. J. W. Holden of Seranton.

In 1912 Mr. McDonald was united in marriage to Mrs. Jennie Jewett a

One of the greatest delights of Mr. McDonald's life was his membership in the local Masonic lodge. Mr. McDonald was a Mason for 59 years, becoming a Mason August 31, 1867, in old Carrolton Lodge No. 197. In 1873 he demitted to Benevolent Lodge No. 451, being one of the charter members of the local lodge, and serving as its first Worshipful Master. On August 4, 1922, Mr. McDonald with Dr. E. H. Lockwood and J. W. Cornish were honored by the local lodge in recognition of their fifty years of Masonry, these three gentlemen being very much responsible for the organization of the local institution. Mr. McDonald was also a charter member of Robt. Henderson Post G. A. R., and served as its first commander.

Mr. McDonald was always looked upon as a leader in all public meetings. He was always on the square with everyone, and his word, once given, was most sacred. He was always ready to help any worthy person in time of need, and a great number of middle-aged people of the community secured their start in life only through his aid and assistance.

Following his marriage to Mrs. Jennie Jewett in 1912, Mr. McDonald resided for short time in Biloxi, Miss., later moving to New Orleans, where he made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Mae Gunderman. His last wish, that he be buried in Chalmette National cemetery, was observed. Funeral services were held Monday, the 10th, and the burial




