MAJ. J. A. PICKLER DEAD.

As Representative, He Introduced First
Successful Rural Delivery Bill.

Aberdeen, S. Dak., June 13.—Maj. **John A. Pickler**, who while a member of Congress from South Dakota introduced the resolution which authorized the first rural free mail delivery, died at his home in Faulkton today. He was 66 years old.

Maj. Pickler was commissioned a major at the age of 21 for bravery in the civil war.

MAJOR PICKLER IS DEAD

Former South Dakota Congressman
Passes Away.

Faulkton, S. D., June 14.—Former
Congressman John A. Pickler of this
place is dead after a long illness. Mr.
Pickler was born near Salem, Ind.,
Jan. 24, 1844. He removed with his
father to Davis county, Ia., at the age
of nine years; entered the army at
the age of eighteen and served three
and a half years, two years in the
ranks of the Third Iowa cavalry.

Major Pickler removed to Dakota in
1883 and was elected to the Dakota
legislature in 1884; appointed inspec-
tor in public land service in the in-
terior department April, 1889; was
elected to the Fifty-first, Fifty-second,
Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth congresses
as a Republican.

While in congress Major Pickler in-
troduced the resolution which author-
ized the first free delivery of mail to
farmers. He was a pioneer and lead-
er in developing the state.

After his retirement from congress
Major Pickler practiced law and built
up large real estate interests. He is
survived by his wife and several chil-
dren.

At twenty-one he had become a ma-
jor in the Civil war by his bravery.

MAJOR PICKLER IS CALLED HOME

Sad news reached numerous alumni today, when a message came announcing the death of Major John A. Pickler, formerly a congressman from South Dakota.

He passed away yesterday in Faulkton, S. D., aged 66.

He was a soldier of the Civil war, having enlisted when but 18. He was in the Third Iowa cavalry three and one half years.

He was an alumnus of S. U. I, college of Liberal Arts, class of 1870 and won his law degree at Michigan Law school, in 1872.

He served as district attorney, in Adair county, Mo.; moved to Muscatine, Iowa; was a Garfield elector from this district in 1880; and was a member of the Iowa legislature, from Muscatine, in 1882.

Two years later, he removed to South Dakota where he was again elected a law maker, going to the legislature of that state, in 1884.

Afterwards, he served as inspector in the public land service in the Interior department; and served in the national congress, in the 51st, 52nd, 53rd and 54th sessions, as a republican member.

Since leaving congress, up to his death, he practiced law and attended to his large real estate interests. Surviving are his widow, several children, and a brother, a Minneapolis surgeon.

He married in Toledo, Ohio, Miss A. Bangea; they have five children—John T., Andrew, Mary Theresa, Joseph and May Agnes. Mr. Nester is a Democrat; members of the Catholic Church. Mr. N. is always prepared to do first-class horse-shoeing and repairing of all kinds; in fact, anything requiring mechanical skill and practical workmanship.

G. J. NYENHUIS, proprietor of brick yard on Lucas Grove road, South Muscatine; Mr. Nyenhuis was born in Holland, in 1820; emigrated to Baltimore, Md., in 1848; came to Muscatine in 1853. He married, in Holland, Miss Anna E. E. Boyenk; they have eight children—Mary, now Mrs. A. Hine; Hattie, now the wife of M. Bodeman; Dennie, Senni, Annie, Vandal B., Hiram and James. Mr. Nyenhuis and wife are members of the Baptist Church; he is a Democrat; he has been engaged in the manufacture of brick fourteen years, and does an extensive business.

J. S. PATTEN, of the firm of S. S. Patten & Co., wholesale and retail dealers in lumber; is a native of Columbus, Ohio; born Jan. 25, 1826; he lived there until 24 years of age, when he came to Iowa and located in Muscatine; arrived here April 1, 1850; he engaged in manufacturing sash, doors and blinds for six years, then went in the marble business for three years, and since then he has been engaged in the lumber business; he has held the office of City Councilman, has been a member of the School Board for many years. He married Miss Sarah A. Neidig, a native of Harrisburg, Penn., May 5, 1853; they have three children—May V., Ellsworth C. and Milton H.

J. P. PHELPS, artistic photographer, Second street, over Post Office; Mr. P. was born in this city, in 1848. In 1872, he married Miss Louisa Waller, of Natchez, Miss.; they have two children—Florence P. and Effie L.; Mr. P. acts with the Democratic party; he has been engaged in his present business since 1862.

MAJ. J. A. PICKLER, attorney at law, of the firm of Hoffman, Pickler & Brown, was born in Washington Co., Ind., Jan. 24, 1844; when 9 years of age, his parents came to Iowa and located in Davis Co., where he was brought up; after the breaking out of the rebellion, he enlisted in 1862, as private in Co. D, 3d Regiment I. C.; he was promoted through all the non-commissions to Second Lieutenant, then to First Lieutenant, and afterward commissioned Captain of Co. D; he was in a number of battles; was commissioned Major of the 138th Regiment U. S. C. T.; after his return from the service, he entered the State University and went through the collegiate course; then studied law, attended the law school in Chicago, and afterward entered the Law Department of the Michigan University, and graduated at that institution in 1872; he practiced law in Missouri for two years, and held the office of Prosecuting Attorney of Adair Co.; in 1875, he came to Muscatine and associated with Mr. Hoffman, and since has practiced his profession here. He married Miss Alice M. Alt, of Johnson Co., Iowa, in 1870; they have two children—Lulu A. and Madge E.

B. PRIESTER, proprietor of general repair and horse-shoeing shop, South Muscatine; Mr. Priester is a native of Holland; was born in 1836; emigrated to Buffalo, N. Y., in 1869; came to Muscatine in 1870. In 1875, married Miss Minnie Mager; she was also a native of Holland; have five children—Josephine, George, John, Nicholas and Katie. Mr. Priester and wife are members of the Protestant Church; he is a Republican in politics. He is fair-dealing and straightforward in all his transactions, and all who favor him with their patronage will be satisfied.

J. A. REULING, dealer in all kinds of family groceries, Second street; Mr. R. is a native of Germany, born in 1824; emigrated to Burlington, Iowa, in 1838; came to Muscatine in 1848. Mr. R. has been twice married; his first wife was Miss V. Schneir; his present wife was Louisa Schneir; their children are—Annie, James,



Biography: Major John A. Pickler

John Alfred Pickler was born near Salem, Indiana on Jan. 24, 1844, eldest child of George and Emily (Martin) Pickier. In 1853, when John was 9 years old, his father moved the family to Monterey, Davis Co., Iowa

When he was seventeen years of age, John attempted to enlist in the Union army, but was persuaded by his father to remain at home until he was eighteen. He then at the age of eighteen joined Company D of the 3d Regiment of Iowa Cavalry as a recruit and rose from the rank of Sergeant to Captain of his company. Near the close of the war, when black troops were enlisted, John A. Pickier was given command of the 138th South Carolina Regiment of Colored Troops and promoted to Major, a title he carried the rest of his life. At this time he was only 21 years old. The Regiment was stationed at Atlanta, Georgia and Major Pickler remained in command until he was mustered out at the close of the War. When Major Pickler was mustered out in January of 1866, he had served 3 ½ years in the Union Army, two of those years in the Iowa 3d Cavalry.

After the war, following his return home, Major Pickler enrolled in the University of Iowa at Iowa City, where he graduated in 1870. While attending the University, he made the acquaintance of Alice Mary Alt, whom he married Nov. 16, 1870. He also attended the Chicago University Law School for one year. Next he entered the law department of the University of Michigan, where Major Pickler graduated in 1872.

The Picklers then moved to Kirksville, Missouri, where the Major practiced law and the same year was elected States Attorney of Adair Co., Missouri. In 1874, they removed to Muscatine, Iowa, where he was a Garfield elector for the Iowa Second District in 1880. Major Pickler represented his District in the Iowa State Legislature in 1882, but resigned upon his removal to South Dakota. In the spring of 1883, Major Pickler, his wife and children moved to the Territory of South Dakota and were among the first settlers of what is now Faulkton, South Dakota.

He was elected to the Dakota Territorial legislature from 1885 to 1887. At the time South Dakota was admitted to the Union, the Major had gone to Washington to be present at the inauguration of Benjamin Harrison as President. There he met Col. John W. Noble of the 3'd Iowa Cavalry, his old comrade, who was then Secretary of the Interior. Col. Noble appointed Major Pickler to the position of Land Inspector in April 1889, his first duty being to go to Oklahoma and open up the territory for settlement. While

acting in that capacity, he was chosen as a Representative to Congress from South Dakota. Major Pickler was elected from South Dakota to the 51st, 52nd, 53rd, and 54th Congresses as a Republican, serving in all, eight years.

After his retirement from Congress, Major Pickler practiced law in Faulkton and built up large real estate interests. A few years before his death he suffered a stroke and had been an invalid. The Major died at age 66, on June 13, 1910 at his home in Faulkton, South Dakota.



US Congressman. During the Civil War, he enlisted in the Iowa 3rd Cavalry and arose to Captain. Toward the end of the war he was given command of a regiment of colored troops and promoted to Major, a title he carried the rest of his life. He graduated from Iowa State University in 1870 and Michigan Law School in 1872. He was elected District Attorney in Adair County Missouri. He moved to Muscatine Iowa and in 1874 and was a Garfield elector for the Second District of Iowa. In 1881 he was elected to the Iowa State Legislature. In 1883 he moved to Faulk County, Dakota Territory and was elected to the Dakota Legislature in 1884. In 1889, he received an appointment as public land inspector in the US Interior Department. His first duty was to travel to Oklahoma and open up the territory for settlement. He was elected four times to represent South Dakota at-large in the United States House of Representatives, serving from 1889 to 1897. He was credited with proposing the idea of Rural Free Delivery Service in Congress. While in the Dakota territorial legislature, he was instrumental in introducing the first bill to give women the right to vote in Dakota Territory. He and his wife Alice promoted women's suffrage and were friends with Susan B. Anthony, a well known women's rights advocate. (bio by: [Priscilla](#))
