FOUR DEATHS REPORTED

Old Pioneer of Jasper County Brought to Monroe for Burial—Flames Destroy Home

Monroe

Mirror—Rev. John M. Tool, pioneer, died at Eureka Springs, Arkansas, August 7, and was buried at Monroe August 11. The funeral services were held at the M. E. church, conducted by Rev. Johnson assisted by Rev. Sharp. By our standard of time here he was aged 78 years, 8 months and 25 days, but he now is in the land of perpetual youth and where none that enter will ever grow old. Born near Abingdon, Washington County, Virginia, November 12, 1834. He moved with his parents in 1836 to Colds County, Illinois, and from there to Jefferson County, Iowa, in the fall of 1841, and from there in 1843 to the place where Monroe is now located in Jasper County, Iowa, he made his home for 60 years. He was married to Miss Jane E. Paul, January 19, 1854. To them were born five children two of whom died in infancy, the other three, Mae L. Jackson, Roscoe P. Tool and Cassius E. Tool with Grace M. Davis, his adopted daughter surviving. In the early part of his life, he filled several of the minor offices with the township. He was elected Representative from Jasper County in the fall of 1879 and served in the General Assembly. In the fall of 1881 he was re-elected and served in the 19th General Assembly. While at school at Fairfield in Jefferson County, he was happily converted and united with the M. E. church at Monroe, at the age of 17, making the 18 member of the Class, and has been a faithful member of this church for over 60 years. He was class leader in the church for over 15 years and at the age of 35 he was licensed to preach, and for the next thirty years he spent a great deal of his time preaching the Gospel, organizing societies in the outward places, laying the foundation for the future erection of churches. His wife departed this life February 22, 1899 after 45 years of loving faithful companionship, while he has remained to the present, waiting patiently until God should remove him from his earthly cares to the brighter companionship above. He was always an earnest, faithful worker in the Sabbath school, serving as Superintendent during the time of the civil war and always teaching a class except when suppling charges. After the death of his wife he made his home with his son, Cassius E. Tool, at Edmond, Oklahoma. In December he went to his daughter, Mae L. Jackson, at Eureka Springs, Arkansas, and lived with her until his death on August 7, at midnight, making almost four score years of life, before hearing the welcome of the master. "Well done thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joys of thy Lord."

TYLER, JOHN, grocer, Monroe; born in Switzerland in 1836; came to this country in 1857; lived in Bureau Co., Ill., three years; while there, engaged in stock dealing; in 1860, he came to this county, and engaged in farming until 1872, which year he entered into his present business. He married Miss Mary Lieb, in this county, in 1867; she was born in Lancaster Co., Penn., in 1843; they have four children—Charley, Oscar, Fred and Samuel. Mr. Tyler is a member of the I. O. O. F. Is Democratic in politics. Mrs. Tyler's father, B. F. Lieb, was a native of Pennsylvania. He married Ann Smith; they moved to Ohio in 1845; thence to this county in 1853; she died in 1869; he died in 1873; they are buried at Vandalia, this county; there were three

youngest in a family of eight sons. Dr. Perry Engle, of Newton, is one of the most successful surgeons of Iowa, a leading politician and State Senator from his district. He is noted for his excellent qualities of heart and mind, and has devoted his life largely to the poor and oppressed. Alexander was a soldier in the Civil War, and was killed at the battle of Shiloh. Adam enlisted in the army, but was discharged on account of disability. He is a prominent inventor, and lives at Newton, Iowa. John, who served in the Civil War, was on the ill-fated "Sultana" when it exploded on the Mississippi River. He was blown into the river and floated for fourteen miles before he was rescued. After the war he went to Florida, and was killed by accident in that state in 1882. Lorenzo is a prominent citizen of Baxter, Iowa, and was a defender of the Union during the late war. Andrew, who is the inventor of the Engle Crematory, is a resident of Des Moines, and Melvin is a farmer of Jasper County, Iowa.


Jacob Engle, the father of the above mentioned sons, was born in Somerset County, Pa., in 1812. His father emigrated to America when he was young, settling in Maryland, and later removing to Pennsylvania. Jacob Engle married Louisa Probst, whose father was of French and her mother of English descent. Mr. Engle settled in Findlay, Ohio, in 1838, where he worked at his trade as a mechanic until 1858. His death occurred ten years later, and his widow went to Ann Arbor, Mich., to give her sons a good education. She died in Newton, Iowa, in 1884.

Dr. Theodore Engle, of this sketch, received his early education in Ohio, and later attended the Ann Arbor University. He afterward went to the Hazel Dell Academy, in Newton, and when he was twenty-one years old commenced the study of medicine with his brother Perry, teaching school at the same time. This routine he followed for three years, after which he entered the medical department of the Ann Arbor University, taking the two years' course. He practiced with his brother Perry until 1880, when he came to this place and established himself here in the practice of his chosen profession. Wishing to keep pace with the great advance constantly made in medicine and surgery,

he took a special course in the Missouri Medical College, from which he graduated March 3, 1885. Since that time he has made a specialty of surgery, and has performed some of the most difficult operations of central Iowa, and always with marked success. One instance which we will mention was that of removing a forty-four pound tumor from a lady, a resident of State Centre. She is now a well and energetic woman.

In 1880 Doctor Engle wedded Carrie Kenyon, daughter of Nelson Kenyon, a well-to-do farmer of Newton, Iowa. The worthy couple were the parents of three children: Lyle, two years of age; Eldra, now seven years old; and Ilma, who died in early childhood.

In politics our subject is independent, and in 1892 he was a candidate on the People's ticket for County Auditor, running far ahead of his ticket, but was not elected. He is a prominent factor in local politics. For ten years he has been Physician of State Centre, and is a member of the Order of United Workmen. He is kind hearted, and many an incident is told of his benevolence and tenderness to the poor and afflicted.



hON. JOHN M. TOOL. The official work of this gentleman has extended over a number of years and has brought him before the notice of the citizens of Jasper County, and in him his constituents have found a man of ability and integrity, and one whose activities have ever been employed for the good of the community. He is a native of the grand old state of Virginia. He was born in Washington County, November 12, 1832, to the union of Adam M. and Susan H. (Stinson) Tool, both natives of Virginia, the former born in Augusta County, July 3, 1794, and the latter in Washington County, October 31, 1800, and of Scotch descent.

The father of our subject was of Scotch-Irish descent, his father having been born in the North of Ireland. At an early date the latter came to this country and settled in Augusta County, Va.,

where he died in 1810. Adam M. Tool was second in order of birth of three sons, and his eldest brother, John, was one of the very early pioneers of Woodford County, Ill. The other brother, Jacob, remained in Virginia; he was a cabinet-maker by trade, and became wealthy. In 1817 Adam M. Tool married Miss Stinson and resided in his native state until seven children were born, five daughters and two sons. Eliza Jane, born October 10, 1818, married John Frost and died June 27, 1841. Mary, born January 10, 1821, married Washington Flenor, who died in 1848; her second marriage was with James McClery, and she now lives in Oberlin, Kan., where her daughter, Emma, is County Superintendent of Schools of Decatur County. Susan Adeline, born December 18, 1822, married Willard Hill, who was a soldier in the regular army, and who was killed by a horse at Santa Fe during his service in 1847; she married the second time, in 1852, William Delong, and they now reside in Colorado; three sons and one daughter were born of this union. James A., born June 12, 1825, married Sarah Foust, and in 1843 took a claim four miles east of Monroe, where he now resides. M. Elizabeth, born August 22, 1827, married the Hon. Henry B. Mitchell, a man of considerable prominence; he was Supervisor in Jefferson County, a member of the State Legislature, and now lives at Fairfield. Martha C., born February 22, 1830, married Wyley W. Moore, and died March 25, 1857. He and his daughter now live in Des Moines.

In 1837, when our subject was but five years of age, his parents moved to Coles County, Ill., where they resided for five years, and then came to the Hawkeye State, settling west of Fairfield and near the Indian boundary line. On the 23d of April, 1843, seven days before the territory embracing Jasper County was opened for settlement, Adam M. Tool and several others started out to find a location in the new country. They made their way to the present site of the village of Monroe, where Mr. Tool placed his stake, and in 1851 he laid out the town of Monroe. This pioneer settler erected the first hewed log house in Jasper County, and in Monroe passed the balance of his days, his death occurring April 4, 1877.

Mrs. Tool was the first Postmistress in the county. They kept an hotel in the early days, and their home was the headquarters for all the travelers. Mrs. Tool was a woman of more than ordinary education and a devoted Christian. She died January 28, 1862. Previous to his marriage, Mr. Tool served faithfully in the War of 1812.

Our subject was but eleven years of age when his parents penetrated the wilderness of Jasper County, and from that time until the present he has resided here. The incidents in his early life were not materially different from those of other boys living on farms in the new country. He was taught to work at anything necessary for him to do, and to make himself useful around the pioneer homestead. As did other boys, young Tool attended school during the winters, and in summer assisted in clearing the land, fencing the fields and raising crops after the land was improved. Although his educational advantages were not of the best, he was a thorough student, and by close attention he mastered all the important branches. In early life he engaged in farming and trading in stock, and for a time was also engaged in merchandising.

The members of the Tool family as far back as we have any knowledge were Methodists, and our subject is no exception to the rule. In 1870 he was ordained to preach in the Methodist Episcopal Church, and since that time has been a local preacher. In 1879 he was nominated for the Legislature, getting one hundred and nineteen votes out of one hundred and twenty-two cast, and served in the Eighteenth and Nineteenth General Assemblies. On the 19th of January, 1854, he married Miss Jane Paul, the daughter of the Rev. Joseph Paul, a Methodist Episcopal preacher. She was a native of the Hoosier State. One of her brothers, Thomas, is a Methodist Episcopal preacher at Walla Walla, Wash.

Mr. and Mrs. Tool were blessed with five children, two of whom died in infancy. Mary R., born June 22, 1857, married A. C. Carwile and lives in Silver City, N. Mex.; Roscoe Paul, born December 13, 1863, married Miss Minnie Mateer April 4, 1889, and resides on a farm near Monroe; and C. E., born November 18, 1865, received his

education at the college at Indianola, and is now a teacher in the public schools. The father of these children is a man of broad views, who has traveled extensively, and who is well informed. He has done much to benefit his fellow-man.



CHARLES WATERS, one of the leading farmers of Linn Township, Marshall County, is a native of the Buckeye State, he having been born in Delaware County, April 10, 1827. He is a son of Charles and Harriet M. (Bennett) Waters. Grandfather Jacob Waters was born near Hartford, Conn., September 15, 1752. His great-grandfather emigrated to the Nutmeg State from Aberdeen, Scotland. Jacob Waters, who was a farmer by occupation, died May 25, 1814. His wife, formerly Martha Davis, was born October 12, 1752, and bore him eight children, namely: Isaac, Martha, Jacob, Juba, Ruth, Eber, Charles and Maria.

Our subject's father was born April 17, 1792, in Connecticut. Like his ancestors for several generations, he turned his attention to agricultural pursuits. He was married May 14, 1817, and with his young wife soon after went to Ross County, Ohio, and thence to Delaware County, where he cleared and improved a farm of two hundred acres. He and his wife were members of the Baptist denomination. In politics he was a Whig, holding several township offices. He was called from the shores of time December 1, 1843; his wife died September 17, 1839. They were the parents of eight children. William B., M. D., was Surgeon of the Thirty-second Iowa Regiment during the war, later Surgeon of the Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown, and died October 20, 1892. Eber and Marilla G. are deceased. John B. enlisted in an Ohio regiment, and died in Virginia; his son, who also enlisted in the same regiment, is now Mayor of Westerville. Charles is next in the order of birth. Mary is the wife of Doctor Maulsby, of Redfield, Iowa. Micah D., who served in the Fourth Kansas Regiment, and rose to the rank of Captain, died

after the war, in Riley County, Kan. Harriet M. died in early childhood. The mother of these children was born in Connecticut and was a daughter of William Bennett, whose birth occurred December 16, 1762. His father, Nathaniel Bennett, who died October 18, 1800, emigrated from Stonington, England, and settled in Mansfield, Conn., about 1750.

Charles Waters, Jr., was born and reared in Ohio. After attending the district school, he completed his education in Central College. He afterward taught several terms of school, but when seventeen years of age began learning the carpenter's trade. In 1852 he erected the court house in Paulding County, Ohio, where he lived for about one year. He also superintended the building of a number of houses and mills. On his return to Paulding County he bought a section of land of the Government, but afterward removed to Marshall County, Ind. In 1860 he went to Wayne County, Iowa, where he engaged in farming for fourteen months, and finally, in the fall of 1861, he became a resident of Marshall County, Iowa. For a short time he operated a tannery at Marietta, and for the four years succeeding he carried on a grocery store at Marshalltown. In the fall of 1870 he became the owner of the one hundred and sixty acre farm on which he still resides. He has greatly improved this land, making it one of the best farms in the neighborhood. There are good and substantial buildings upon the place, and the marks of thrift are to be seen on every hand. Sixty acres of the original purchase he has since disposed of, and invested the proceeds in another farm of eighty acres. Mr. Waters is a successful agriculturist, and is so considered in this county.

The marriage of Mr. Waters and Miss Mary Sheak was celebrated October 1, 1851. The lady is a native of Ohio, and is a daughter of John and Eliza (Praul) Sheak. Jacob Sheak, the paternal grandfather of Mrs. Waters, emigrated from Germany to Pennsylvania. He was a soldier in the War of the Revolution, and was a farmer and early settler of Delaware County, Ohio. John Sheak was born in the Keystone State, and when fifteen years old went to Ohio, and thence to Indiana, where his death occurred. He was a member of
