- He was licensed to preach in 1836.
- His father was also a physician and when he was a boy he started studying medicine from his father.
- He moved to Iowa in 1839 locating in Cedar County, Iowa where he lived until 1864.
- He was always active in churches wherever he lived. He was ordained a deacon in 1841 by Bishop Marois of Plattsburgh, New York in 1841 and became a bishop at Waterloo in 1881 by Bishop Hunt.

Iowa State Sunday School Association:

One of most helpful organizations of the state to the cause of Christian education is the Iowa State Sunday School Association. It is one of a series of state, provincial and territorial organizations forming the International Sunday School convention and maintaining the Interdenominational series of Sunday School Lessons. It is in the strictest sense interdenomination. Its sole object being to increase the efficiency and extend the influence of evangelical Sunday School throughout Iowa. To effect this purpose the Executive Committee of the State Association urges the sustaining of county and township associations. The result of such organization in every county where maintained have been new schools, larger schools and better schools. For more effective work, during the present year, the state has been divided into sixteen districts, each of which is under the supervision of a member of the state executive committee. As a result of this plan a convention has either been held or is arranged for in every county of the state. In about thirty counties have also been held institutes continuing from one to four days in which training lessons on teaching and the Bible have been given.

From reports made at the last annual meeting of the State Association we learn that there are in Iowa 4782 Sunday Schools, with a total membership of 370,147. This is an increase of 4 per cent over the attendance of the previous year. While the increase of the attendance at the public schools has only been 1 1/5 per cent. Sixty-six and two thirds per cent. of the schools are open all the year. The average attendance is 65 per cent of the total membership. Twenty-five per cent of the total membership are adults. Ten per cent of total membership are officers and teachers. Two and one-half per cent of total membership have united with the church. Nine per cent of the school hold teachers' meeting.

The general officers of the Association are Rev. John W Geiger, Marion, President; Mrs. Mattie M. Bailey, Shenandoah, Secretary; Mr J. W. Johnson, Oskaloosa, Treasurer. The next annual meeting will be held at Chari

Death of Dr. N. Rathbun.

Dr. N. Rathbun, a pioneer of Cedar and Liun counties, died at his home in this city last Saturday evening. He has been in declining health for several months. No citizen of Mariou was more highly respected than Dr. Rathbun, whose death will be mourned by all who knew him.

He was born Jan. 14, 1814, in Champaign county, Ohio, the son of John and Lydia Rathbun. He joined the M. E. church December 26, 1828, and was married to Eleanor Fox in 1836. He was licensed to preach in the same year. His father was a physician and when a boy he commenced the study of medicine. He moved to Iowa in 1839 and located in Cedar county, where he resided until 1864. During most of his residence there he was engaged in the practice of medicine, but was always active in church work. He was ordained deacon in 1841 by Bishop Morris at Plattsville, Wis., and elder at Waterloo, Iowa, by Bishop Hurst in 1881.

He was elected representative from Cedar county October 26, 1846, to the first state legislature of Iowa

In 1864 he moved to Marion and remained a resident of this city until his death, Saturday evening, May 6th. His wife died at the family residence in Marion, April 13th, 1882. Their children are five, two sons and three daughters, all of whom were with him when he passed away. They are Capt. S. W. Rathbun, Mrs. Dr. Caldwell and Miss Josie Rathbun, of Marion, Dr. R. S. Rathbun, of Glinton, and Mrs. Edgington, of Waterloo.

The funeral services took place at the Methodist church Monday afternoon, at which there was a large attendance. The sermon was preached by Rev. Van Ness, while the pastors of the other churches of the city were present and assisted in the services.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.

THE FOURTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE CEDAR RAPIDS DISTRICT.

One Hundred Delegates in Session at the Methodist Church in Marion--The Proceedings Last Night and Today--Officers of the Organization.

MARION, May 7--The initial meeting of the fourth annual convention of the Epworth League of the Cedar Rapids District, was held at the Methodist church of this city last evening. There were present over a hundred delegates and the late trains last night and early morning trains today, brought many more so that the sessions today are attended by about 150 delegates aside from the local members, workers and church friends of the organization.

The officers of the district organization are as follows: President, Prof. J. J. Dollenmeyer, Marion; first vice president, Mrs. Laura M. Gould, Tipton; second vice president, Rev. H. A. Bassett, Walker; third vice president, H. N. Newlin, Viola; recording secretary, Mrs. Aly Parsons, Marion; corresponding secretary, Rev. W. H. Slingerland, Marion; treasurer, Christian Dht. Vinton. The executive committee consists of Rev. J. B. Allbrook, Mt. Vernon; Prof. T. L. Neff, Iowa City; Mrs. W. H. Smith, Mechanicsville.

The meeting last evening opened with a praise service lasting from 7:30 to 8 o'clock. It was led by Prof. Dollenmeyer and was full of life and animation.

E. F. Mills of the Marion chapter gave the address of welcome. He urged the necessity of active work by the members. He urged upon members to so live that their conduct might speak for their motives. In the name of the local lodge he welcomed the visiting delegates.

Rev. J. W. Ginton of Vinton, made the response. How to utilize the power for good of the young people of the church had been a perplexing question. But this perplexity like all others connected with the church had been solved, for God's angels had rolled away the stone. The Epworth league was in one sense now, in another old, for the mother of John and Charles Webster had organized a league at the old Epworth parsonage. This convention was met to further the kingdom of God and look after the interests of the Methodist church.

The address of the evening was given by Rev. J. U. McKee. The theme of the speaker was, "The Four Foundation Stones of the Epworth League." The address was very earnest and eloquent, and abounded in a splendid train of thought. He praised co-operative effort in church work, as well as business. The four foundation stones of the Epworth League were culture, spirituality, sociality and evangelistic power. The league meant spirit and brain culture for the young people of the church and the devotion of the better qualities of the head to the furtherance of the church. It meant heart culture--holiness of heart. It meant the young life of the church and all the world dedicated to the service of God.

AN IOWA PIONEER.

The Late Dr. Rathbun of Marion, Goes To His Reward--The Record of a Long And Useful Life.

Dr. N. Rathbun, whose death has been announced, was one of the early settlers of Iowa and for many years was one of its foremost citizens. He was born January 14, 1814, in Champaign county, Ohio, the son of John and Lydia Rathbun. He joined the M. E. church December 26, 1823, and was married to Eleanor Fox in 1836. He was licensed to preach in the same year. His father was a physician and when a boy he commenced the study of medicine. He moved to Iowa in 1839 and located in Cedar county, where he resided until 1860. During most of his residence there he was engaged in the practice of medicine, but was always active in church work. He was ordained deacon in 1861 by Bishop Morris at Plattsville, Wis., and elder at Waterloo, Iowa, by Bishop Hurst in 1881.

He was elected representative from Cedar county October 26, 1846, to the first state legislature of Iowa.

In 1866 he moved to Marion and remained a resident of that city until his death. Saturday evening, May 6th, his wife died at the family residence in Marion. April 13th, 1932. Their children are five, two sons and three daughters, all of whom were with him when he passed away. They are Capt. S. W. Rathbun, Mrs. Dr. Caldwell and Miss Josie Rathbun of Marion, Dr. R. S. Rathbun of Clinton, and Mrs. Edgington of Waterloo.

The funeral was largely attended, and the ministers of Marion all took part in the services.

HOW THEY GROW.

We have compilation before us by Dr. Max Wallner illustrative of the intellectual advancement of the Bohemian people, says the Bohemian Voice. The main feature of the compilation are the names and addresses of 2300 living Bohemian writers, the names, location and membership of 100 political organizations, the names and addresses of 205 Bohemian book-sellers and publishers, the subscription lists of principal newspapers, etc. The arrangement of the book is bad and the data relating to the United States is usually incorrect. The author, for example, estimates the number of Bohemians belonging to various orders in this country at 10,000, while as a matter of fact, there are four or five times as many. The membership of the C. S. P. S. order alone exceeds 10,000. The organization of the Catholics is of about the same strength as the C. S. P. S. Besides these there is a perfect host of social, gymnastic, benevolent and theatrical societies. Again, Dr. Wallner includes in the list of Bohemian-American "writers" people, whose literary productions, as far as our knowledge reaches, consists of private correspondence, omitting those who are entitled to that doubtful distinction.





