Shanghai, Mar. 30—The Shanghai peace conference met again today as public agitation in Shanghai against the Chinese nationalist government administration added to the tension caused by the continued skirmishing between Japanese and Chinese troops near Soochow Creek.

A growing demand was apparent among Shanghai public bodies from the end of Kuomintang (nationalist party) rule in China, and the establishment of a national administration along non-party lines until the present emergency is passed.

Shanghai, Mar. 30—A sharp skirmish between Japanese and Chinese forces at Chlawangiao took place today, according to Japanese military authorities, punctuating a lull in the peace parleys which are slated to be resumed again tomorrow.

The Japanese said the Chinese were driven to the south side of Soochow creek, on the north side of which they were reported last week to have been digging trenches and erecting defenses. The Japanese notified British authorities then that drastic measures might have to be taken to force the Chinese to observe the limits fixed in General Uyeda's ultimatum of last February.

**Charge Delay**

The Japanese peace negotiators, meanwhile, charged the parleys were being delayed because the Chinese delegates lacked responsibility and authority to make decisions and the Chinese countered with a charge that the Japanese were trying to break up the conference.

Chinese officials expressed strong sentiment against the tactics of the Japanese, charging they were trying to throw responsibility for the deadlock on the Chinese.

"The fundamental issue is the withdrawal of the Japanese troops from Chinese territory," said a statement issued through the Chinese official Kuo-Min news agency, "but the Japanese refuse to negotiate for its realization. It seems they intend to maintain an army of occupation in the Chinese territory adjacent to hanghai indefinitely."

The Chinese press featured reports that the peace conference was doomed to collapse.

**Soldiers Wounded**

Five Japanese soldiers were wounded when two motor trucks on the way to the front lines struck submerged mines near Kating. The Japanese said the Chinese honeycombed a wide area in that section with explosives before they retreated.

The municipal police of Shanghai reported 61 civilians were killed and 16 wounded in the International Settlement during the period of hostilities. Their survey showed, they said, that 314 projectiles fell within the settlement during the fighting, amazing 262 buildings. Approximately 486,000 persons were deprived of the means of subsistence, they said, by the shutting down of industries in the settlement during the fighting.

A noticeable increase in Sino-Japanese military activity in the Chinese suburb of Nantao, next to the French concession, was being countered during the day by the French who strengthened the sandbag defense along the boundary.

**Residents Nervous**

Residents of Nantao have been nervous here, fearing they might suffer the fate of the citizens of Chapel, the other large native section which was almost annihilated

# Phil Livingston Pioneer Of Boone County Is Dead

Phil Livingston, 92, prominent in Boone county political circles for many years, succumbed yesterday afternoon at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. J. Jenkins, at Madrid. For some time his health had been declining due to the infirmities of old age and the end came at 4 p.m. Tuesday.

He was born in New York and served as a regimental clerk in the army of General Sheridan during the Civil war. Subsequently he studied law at Janesville, Wis., and in 1867 became station agent for the C. & N. W. railroad at Moingona through which the main line than ran.

**Was Legislator**

He served as a member of the Iowa house in the 20th general assembly and for three terms held the office of clerk of the district court in Boone county. His name was prominent in political circles of the county for many years.

His wife succumbed in 1907 and for the past two years he had been living with his daughter in Madrid. Blaine Livingston, resident north of Boone on the Linn street road, is a son. Another son, Robert, and another daughter, Mrs. C. J. Sandberg, survive and both live at Madrid.

**Funeral Thursday**

Funeral services will be held at the Jenkins home, 516 S. Water street, Madrid, Thursday forenoon at 10 o'clock. In charge will be Dr. Clarence DeFur, pastor of the Madrid Church of Christ. Interment will be in the Moingona cemetery.

The deceased was for many years a resident of the Moingona community.
