### Death of Wm. Lynch.

Hon. Wm. Lynch died at his home  
 near Kingston, Thursday afternoon.  
 As we have heretofore mentioned his  
 serious illness, this will not be a sur-  
 prise to our readers. He was, for  
 many years a resident of this township,  
 owning and living on the farm now  
 owned by Mr Farris, some 2½ miles  
 northwest of this place. Some years  
 ago he removed to his late residence  
 at Kingston where he fitted up a home  
 and spent the remainder of his days.  
 Mr. Lynch was an honest, upright, cit-  
 izen, a staunch democrat, which party  
 honored him by sending him two  
 terms to the Legislature from this  
 county. He also served as county sup-  
 ervisor one or more terms. We have  
 no further particulars of his death nor  
 of his funeral arrangements at this  
 writing.
